

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Nelson in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
  - 3. To choose Delegates to the National Convention.
- 4. To see what sums of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairing highways and bridges or take any action in relation thereto.
- 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate money to calcium chloride parts of Class V roads or pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow a sum of money, not to exceed \$2,000.00, said money to be used as town's share in completing State Aid road Nelson to Harrisville.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$320.40 for Town Road Aid, or take any action relating thereto.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

- 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen the right to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of library.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to build a new town barn and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the addition of twenty cents to each poll tax unpaid on September 1, 1940.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for repair of Town Hall or pass any vote relating thereto.
- 16. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

### SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Nelson:

I herein submit my seventeenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The American system of public schools is today facing the greatest challenge of a century in the scholastic training of its youth during the formative period of life.

For half a century, to my knowledge, we have heard echoing down the stream of education the slogan "Back to Fundamentals."

Admitting that this slogan has laid a firm foundation for our educational structure and also that it is highly essential today, yet we note in the rapidly changing conditions of the world greater emphasis must be placed on the preservation of American institutions.

Indeed, our pupils must drink more deeply and more freely from the fountain heads of Liberty and Freedom, viz. the Bill of Rights and the Magna Charta of English history and from our own Constitution.

It may be true that the pupils under a dictatorship are as well trained in so-called fundamentals but they do lack the major part of that education which is needed for citizenship under our form of government. Democracy's slogan is onward to the most helpful conditions of living for the masses and of opportunities for participation in a democratic society. The founders of our republic believed education essential to the success of democracy. The experience of a century and half in representative government confirms that belief so strongly that we may say without fear of contradiction that "Our public schools are our first line of defense;" "Our education is the bulwark of the citadel of Liberty."

When the cataclysm of arms in Europe has spent itself and we approach the world-wide renaissance of modern living, we must have our leaders prepared. They must be endowed with the highest type of citizenry, a type which implies the closest cooperation, supplementation and coordination of three vital elements of society, viz. the school, the home and the church.

History tells us that in all great emergencies the great bulk of leaders come from rural sections of the country. Let us hope that Nelson may furnish its quota.

First Aid Kits were refilled to take care of minor injuries and infections at school. The use of antiseptics in school teaches the pupils the importance of treating cuts and scratches promptly, which if neglected might result in serious infections.

Tooth brushes were furnished at cost (8c) to all who needed them.

Cod Liver Oil was furnished through the school to pupils who were not having it at home. The pupils know the value of this added nutrition, and respond to the opportunity in larger numbers each year.

There were 2 cases of whooping cough reported during the year, 4 cases of pediculosis, and 2 cases of impetigo; these were attended to. Plans are made to help the parents take care of the unvaccinated pupils, when the weather is warmer.
