THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the
County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote
in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Townhouse
in said Town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at
nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the follow-
ing subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the
year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be neces-
sary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and
make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to
raise for the repair of highways and bridges and make
appropriation for the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid
to be expended on the Robie Road, so called, and to raise
and appropriate the sum of \$2,380.00 for the same, the
State to contribute the sum of \$2,380.00, or, if the Town
will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$617.48, the
State contributing the sum of \$2,469.91 for the construc-
tion of Class V roads.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and
direct the Selectmen to discontinue for public use and
abandon for maintenance by the Town the lower road
along the Pemigewasset River from the corner near the
Coolidge Place to the Dallas Wallace corner, so called, a
distance of about 1.7 miles, to accept as compensation
therefor from the United States of America the sum of

\$7,267.50, to authorize and direct the Selectmen to execute and deliver to the United States of America such deed or deeds to said road as may be required by the United States of America, and to authorize and direct the Selectmen to take any other action necessary to carry out the provisions of this article.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to discontinue for public use and abandon for maintenance by the Town the following roads:

(a) The road which leads along the river from the highway running from the Bristol Bridge to Fiske School, to a point about 3,500 feet south of Blake Brook, a total distance of about 1.75 miles.

(b) The Blake Brook Road from its intersection with the above road to a point above the flow line of the Franklin Falls Reservoir, a distance of about 1,400 feet,

to authorize and direct the Selectmen to execute and deliver to the United States of America such deed or deeds to said roads as may be required by the United States of America, and to authorize and direct the Selectmen to take any other action necessary to carry out the provisions of this article.

7. To see if the Town will vote to apply the sum of \$7,267.50 when received from the United States of America for the payment of outstanding tractor notes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

9. To see how much money the Town will raise for Memorial Day and make appropriation for the same.

10. To see how much money the Town will raise for Old Home Day and make appropriation for the same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the Laconia Hospital to be used for the care of needy residents of the Town.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of old cemeteries.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to maintain Class V roads and to make appropriation for the same.

16. By request. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160.00 for the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire.

17. By request. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$880.00 and to advance the same to the executive committee of the Gordon-Nash Library as the publishers of the Town History, as the Town's guarantee for its subscription to one hundred and sixty copies of said history, said town (at its option) to be reimbursed pro rata with the other guarantors from the proceeds of the sale of said history.

18. By request. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a Town Dump, and make appropriation for the same.

19. By request. To see if the Town will vote to sell to Ralph E. Huckins a certain small portion of the Town Common located between land belonging to said Ralph E. Huckins and the old road leading from the Town House to the main highway, and authorize the Selectmen to give a deed for same.

20. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the floor on the lower bridge between New Hampton and Bristol and raise and appropriate money for the same.

21. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

22. To see if the Town will vote additional Fire, Police and Health protection and raise and appropriate money for the same.

23. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

At this time I would like to thank the deputy wardens and the townspeople for the cooperation that they gave me last year in fighting and preventing forest fires.

As you can see we were very fortunate in having a small territory burned over.

There is one thing that I would like to mention at this time and that is about obtaining permits. They cost nothing to get and a number of times save quite a bit of unnecessary expense such as investigating and telephoning.

The next fire season will be more serious now that we are actually at war. Our help will be much harder to get. We need all the protection and tools that we can get.

Picture if you can, what the situation would be here if we had ten or twenty fires going at once like the Marlow fires last year. It could happen here and it may unless we really become prepared for just the same problem.

The fact that we are at war is likely to require the use of our forest fire tools much more in 1942 than at any other time in the past. We must be ready. "Remember Pearl Harbor."

Once more I want to thank all of you for what you did last year.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in
relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any altera-
tion in the amount of money required to be assessed for
the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the
payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as
determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. By request of the State Tax Commission: To
see if the district will vote to petition the state tax com-
mission to have an audit made by the municipal account-
ing division and to make an appropriation to cover the
expense of such an audit.

10. To act upon any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The number of pupils enrolled in the public schools of New Hampton in 1941 was 96. In the three years previous there were 98, 104, and 101 respectively. There were five teachers, except in 1938 when there were six. The average cost for the teachers was about \$4,500 each year. Transportation has cost an average of \$2,539 per year. Tuition has cost an average of \$2,823. The per capita cost of education in New Hampton has always been high. It will continue to be high so long as five schools are maintained for fewer than 100 pupils.

I am aware that consolidation of schools is a very delicate subject to mention, but a subject that I am convinced New Hampton should begin seriously to consider, if the best interests of pupils are to be considered, rather than old traditions.

The School Board has been able to estimate each year very close to the amount necessary to maintain the schools. The present year, however, presents problems that will make an estimate difficult. First, the cost of every thing we buy for the schools has already increased in price from 30 to 50%. Arithmetic paper, for instance, which is what we buy most of, has increased from 16 cts. a package of 1,000 sheets, to 24 cts., and all other supplies in about the same proportion. Secondly—In the coming school year, 1942-3, the teacher situation will be rather a critical one. With so many men teachers called into the service, women will be called upon to take their places in the schools. This means a demand for trained women teachers all over the state; the cities and larger towns can offer more salary than the smaller towns and have first choice. Probably inexperienced teachers will have to be taken by the rural schools. The School Board of this town will have to plan on paying its teachers more than

formerly or resort to inexperienced teachers who also will cost more than heretofore. We now have teachers of experience, all of them. I think as a whole they are the best corps of teachers we have had and we have had some good ones. They should be retained if possible.

The New Hampton schools, like other schools of the state, are being equipped with officially suggested equipment for fighting incendiary bombs, and each school is being organized in special groups, each group having a specific duty to perform in case of need and are being practiced in those duties.

The graduating exercises last June were a credit to pupils and teachers alike. Mrs. Adams deserves much praise for excellent music work with the children.

The new school nurse, Miss Hevey, has had long service in nursing and is doing excellent work for us. She has a large area to cover in her work, having seven other towns besides New Hampton. We sometimes feel that the nurse does not get around to our schools as often as she should. But with all the towns Miss Hevey has to care for I am sure we will be satisfied with our proportionate share of her time.

I cannot refrain from mentioning the excellent bus now being used by Mr. Hadley for transporting the pupils to the Fiske school. This is a type of the right kind of transportation vehicle. If all our transportation was done in such busses, I feel that there would not be so much opposition to carrying pupils away from the home district.

The cooperation of school board, teachers, and citizens has been this year, as in previous years, much appreciated by the superintendent.
