TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To hear reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500 for the payment of outstanding bonds and make an appropriation for the same.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for support of highways, bridges and sidewalks, more than the law requires, for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day and make appropriation for the same.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, more than the law requires, for the town library for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for electric street lighting for the ensuing year.

9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.

10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000, the state to give a like amount, for Trunk Line Construction for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,887.72, the state to give \$6,656.58, for Trunk Line Maintenance for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for preservation of shade trees in public highways in accordance with the provisions of chapter 89 of the Laws of 1925.

15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town forest and to pass any vote relating thereto.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise three hun-

dred dollars (\$300) to advertise Lake Sunapee, the Selectmen to co-operate with the Lake Sunapee Board of Trade in expending same and to co-operate with the Towns of Sunapee and of Newbury if said towns raise like amounts; and pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate two hundred dollars (\$200) to build snow fences on the state road between the post office and Wilmot town line.

18. To see if the town will vote to accept the deed of Mrs. Jane A. Tracy, of the proposed library building, and pass any vote relating thereto.

19. To see if the town will vote to contract the Trunk Line construction work and to pass any vote relating thereto.

20. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

10. To see if the district will authorize its school board to enter into a contract with The Colby Academy for high school tuition.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of New London:

Since my official duties in your District did not begin until March 1, 1925, my report for the year ending June 30, 1925, must of necessity be incomplete.

Three schools including the five rooms indicated in the statistical table were maintained. I wish to call attention to the excellent attendance record of all the schools and to the reduction of tardinesses in the Low Plain school. Such a record reflects credit both to teachers and pupils and to parents and transportation drivers.

The following class of seven pupils received in June promotion from the eighth grade:—William Clough, Jr., Helen Morey, Nathaniel Parker, Evelyn Rollins, Laurence Rowe, Eunice Stanley, Warren Towne.

Buildings and Equipment

During the summer extensive alterations were made in the Elkins schoolhouse. These included standard window space abolishing crosslighting and providing adjustable shades, convection heating and ventilating equipment, sanitary chemical toilets entered directly from the schoolroom and entry, and warmed coatroom with ventilated garment racks and wet sink.

A porcelain enamel flat back drinking fountain with sanitary bubbler was installed in the lower corridor of the Colby Hill building.

In the Low Plain schoolhouse a foul-air exit flue, leading from the schoolroom into the base of the chimney, was added to the heating and ventilating equipment. Repainting of the interior has added much to the neatness and cheerfulness of this schoolroom.

Organization

For the present school year New London was fortunate in retaining three former teachers: Miss Hazel A. French, principal of the Colby Hill school and the grammar grades; Miss Theresa P. Davis, teacher of the primary grades; and Miss Emma I. Stanley, teacher of the Elkins school.

After long and valuable service in the Low Plain school Mrs. Sadie M. Shepard was granted her request for release. Miss Dorothy V. Bixby of Wilmot was elected to the vacancy. Miss Bixby is credited with two summer sessions of teacher training in Keene, and has had two years of experience as a successful rural school teacher.

From a large group of candidates Miss Hattie M. Boswell of Quincy, New Hampshire, was elected teacher of the intermediate school at Colby Hill. Miss Boswell is credited with five summer sessions of teacher training in Plymouth, and brings to her work four years of very successful teaching experience.

The smaller enrollment in the grammar room at Colby Hill made possible the transfer of the sixth grade to the upper grade room and consequently relieved the congested condition in the intermediate room. No room teacher now has more than thirty-five pupils.

The employment of a story-hour and play leader to supervise the activities of first and second grade pupils, who are transported and who consequently have

a long wait between the close of their school session and the departure of their conveyance, is worthy of continuance with extension of educational aims.

Objectives

Two objectives receiving particular attention this year are health supervision in the schools combined with follow-up work in the homes, and the vitalizing of instruction in reading, history and geography particularly in the intermediate grades.

For the three months, beginning with November, New London in combination with three other school districts secured the full time services of Miss Della V. Carr, R. N., as physical examiner and school nurse. The following summary from the report of your nurse gives in part her activities in New London. In addition there were health talks to pupils, conferences with teachers, personal hygiene instruction and attendance at the dental clinic.

Through the generous co-operation of the parents, the School Boards and the Red Cross organizations of New London and Wilmot the work of the School Nurse was supplemented for eleven days by a dental clinic. Dr. G. Arthur Danforth of Manchester was the dentist. His report shows:

The extent of the clinic work was particularly gratifying not only in view of improved dental conditions but also from the fact that defective teeth are known to enhance the danger from diseased tonsils.

Your superintendent recommends that by a similar combination with other districts provision be made to retain the services of your School Nurse another year.

The second objective, the vitalizing of instruction, recognizes the necessity of connecting school work with the immediate interests and ambitions of the pupil. To this end basal reading has been extended to the fourth and fifth grades, and in addition to the best in biography and fiction this reading is designed to coincide with those activities of the home, school and community in which the child participates and through which he develops character. Commencing in geo-

graphy with the natural features, the resources and industries of the pupil's home town, supplemented by the history of its pioneer settlers and leading citizens, effort is directed to creating in the child a feeling of union with the past, to inspiring him with local pride and to fostering an ambition to maintain worthy standards. This cannot be a textbook course; nor is it capable of rapid development. It is essentially a community course requiring much time for the obtaining and organizing of suitable material. This year the pupils of all grades with the assistance of their teachers and of some of the older residents of the town have made a valuable beginning. Such in brief is some of the work now contributing to vitalized instruction. Hand work in the practical arts, beginning with the fifth grade, would be a valuable contribution to this objective. Such hand work would be considered in no sense vocational but a purely educational asset.

Conclusion

In conclusion I wish to mention with appreciation the loyalty of your community to the best interests of its boys and girls, the progressive co-operation and counsel of the School Board, and the faithful service of your teachers.
