THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nottingham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Nottingham on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum the Town will appropriate to pay interest and reduce debt incurred for Trunk Line Construction.
4. To see if the Town will appropriate \$1,100 for State Aid Maintenance of highways, the State to appropriate \$3,300.
5. To see if the Town will appropriate \$650 for Trunk Line Maintenance of highways, the State to appropriate \$4,875.
6. To see if the Town will appropriate \$873 for State Aid Construction of highways, the State to contribute \$1,746.
7. To see if the Town will vote to issue bonds to complete construction of the Main road from Northwood Line to Lee Line, and from Nottingham Center to Raymond Line, not exceeding \$15,000, provided the State will complete said roads.

8. To see if the Town will vote \$400 for Blister Rust eradication.

9. To see if the Town will vote to limit the salaries of the Town Officers to the following sums per year: Selectmen, \$100 each, Tax Collector, \$150; Treasurer, \$50; Town Clerk, \$25.

10. To see if the Town will vote to pay one-half the cost of providing a well for the use of the Center school and the Town Hall, on condition that Patuccoway Grange pay the other half.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money, in anticipation of taxes, if necessary, to pay current Town charges.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell real estate, acquired for non-payment of taxes, or other property no longer of use to the Town.

13. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for the early payment of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will vote to purchase, or authorize the Selectmen to arrange with owners, for repair of horse sheds at Nottingham Center.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for the improvement of cemeteries.

16. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue payment for the use of wells.

This year we have received taxes and interest for 1927, 1928, 1929 and 1930, the amount being \$535.03, leaving the 1931 tax of \$98.00 still to be paid.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Nottingham:

In these times of depression, there is an unusual responsibility resting upon the schools to care for the health and welfare of the children as well as their education. During the past year, forty-seven pupils were immunized from diphtheria at the toxin-anti-toxin clinic arranged by the school nurse. At the dental clinic, thirty-nine children received complete treatment, including 141 operations. No one can say how much immediate and future suffering, distress, and expense have been saved by these two activities alone. Miss Ruth B. Whitcomb, who had served us most faithfully as school nurse, was transferred elsewhere. Her work was taken up by Miss Margaret Macdonald, R. N., who now covers only the districts in our own supervisory union. This is an ideal arrangement for economy of time and efficiency of administration. Our hot lunch has doubtless aided in many cases to keep children from physical impairment due to the pinch of hard times. The teachers have gone even beyond the call of duty in their efforts to make this feature as valuable as possible. Home and school should try to surround children with an atmosphere of happiness and good cheer to offset the anxiety which uncertain times brings. Anything that our schools can do by way of handwork and practical arts will help to cultivate a taste for creative work and craftsmanship which will assist in keeping our population busily and profitably engaged, even during the over-production of a machine age. The best way to prepare for the return of prosperity is to keep the efficiency of the schools unimpaired. Our schools have been co-operating with the United States George Washington Bicentennial Commission and the New Hampshire Daniel

Webster Commission in celebrating the birthdays of these distinguished patriots.
