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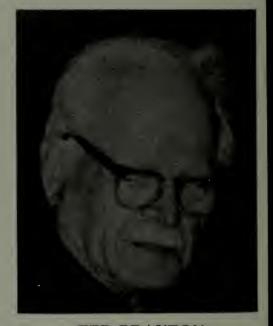

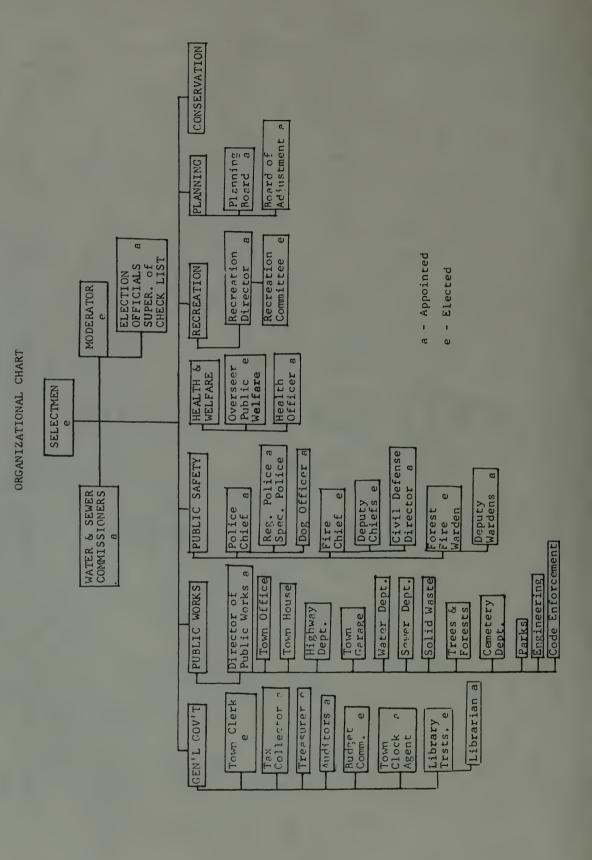

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Peterborough, in the County of

Hillsborough, in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon (Polls close at 6:00 p.m.) to ballot for Town Officers and other questions required by law to be decided by ballot. Pursuant to the authority of RSA 39:2-a and the vote of the Town on March 10, 1970, all business other than ballot questions will be recessed until 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, March 18, 1986 at Peterborough Elementary School, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

(By Ballot)

Article 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Of-

ficers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts to the Town in Trust or otherwise by any individual or individuals, or take any

other action relating thereto.

Article 4: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Office, Town House, Legal Expense, Street Lighting, Water Charge, Patriotic Purposes, Vital Statistics, Local Planning, Board of Adjustment, Conservation Commission, Supervisors of Checklist, Highway Summer, Highway Winter, Public Works Summary, Highway Garage, Police Department, Fire Department, Ambulance, Library, Probation Department, Health Department, Welfare Department, Parks, Recreation Department, Solid Waste, and for any other charge arising within the Town.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty-Eight Dollars (\$325,738.00) for paying of the Town debt and interest, or take any other action relating thereto.

(\$225,900.00 — Sewer \$99,838.00 — Fire Engine)

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow in anticipation of collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) to cover the interest on the notes, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amount in-

dicated, or take any other action relating thereto:

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept and use from the State of New Hampshire approximately Seventy-Three Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-Four Dollars (\$73,684.00) in Highway Subsidy moneys restricted to highway construction or reconstruction, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty-Nine Dollars (\$4,739.00) to join the Southwest Region Planning Commission, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) to update the Master Plan, or take

any other action relating thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000.00) to purchase a computer for the Town Office, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$28,900.00) for improvements to the Town House restrooms, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$40,500.00) for a comprehensive hydrological study and closure plan for the old landfill and balefill, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$3,690.0) for solid waste

planning, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for repairs to the wall along the Contoocook River near the Grove Street Dam, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) to purchase a 1986 Police Cruiser,

or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$3,300.00) to purchase radios for the Police Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$14,000.00) to purchase a 1986 pickup truck and plow for the Recreation Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to transfer and use the sum of Nine Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety-Five Dollars (\$9,995.00) from the income of the Albert W. Noone Fund to purchase a tractor for the Recreation Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for painting trim, doors and windows on the original library and the 1957 addition, or take any other action

relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to cover costs incurred for Civil Defense efforts during the January flood, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint a building study committee to study the space needs of the Town Office and submit a report of their findings to the Selectmen by September

30, 1986, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to sell Mercer Park off of Nichols Road in Pineridge and authorize the Putnam Park Committee to expend the proceeds for improvements of Putnam and Teixeira Parks, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 24. To authorize the Putnam Park Committee to expend any sums from gifts, or any other source, for the improvements of Putnam

and Teixeira Parks, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt written welfare guidelines as proposed by the Board of Selectmen. Chapter 380 of the Laws of 1985 requires the Town to adopt written welfare guidelines prior to April 1, 1986, or take any other action relating thereto.

(Copies of the full text of the proposed guidelines are on file with the

Town Clerk.)

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to cost-share with landowners the expense of them hiring a professional forester to oversee timber harvests on their lands within the Town. Said cost-share amount shall be determined by the Selectmen and shall not exceed 10% of the actual timber yield tax revenues paid by the landowner to the Town; and further to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for this purpose, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to be the franchising authority for cable television service as provided by RSA 53-C and any other legislation, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to be the franchising authority for any activity using a public right-of-way for any and all franchising as provided by legislation or in the absence of legislation to the contrary, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to designate Cornish Road as a scenic road pursuant to RSA 253:17, or take any other action relating

thereto. (By Petition)

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum

of Four Thousand Ten Dollars and Forty Cents (\$4,010.40) for the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, or take any other action relating

thereto. (By Petition)

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Two Hundred Forty Dollars (\$15,240.00) for the Home Health Care and Community Services to support the continuance of health services now being provided on behalf of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for the Monadnock Community Day Care Center, a non profit organization, or take any other action relating

thereto. (By Petition)

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for and to accept, on behalf of the Town or any department thereof, any grants from any individual or federal or state governmental unit or governmental agency for the purpose of constructing a child day care facility by the Monadnock Community Day Care Center, provided the Selectmen first hold a public hearing on any such application, and to further authorize that the funds by expended for the purposes stated, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the Grand Monadnock Arts Council, a non profit community arts organization, or take any other action

relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for the Womens Crisis Center, or take

any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4,450.00) to replace the front stage curtain and valance in the Town House Auditorium, or take

any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an ordinance under the provision of RSA 261:157-A to waive the registration fee for one motor vehicle owned by any ex-prisoner of war who meets the qualifications set forth by said ordinance, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to make the ex-prisoner of war motor vehicle registration ordinance retroactive to September 1, 1985, or

take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Peterborough and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the US Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 40. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 41. To transact any other business that may legally come before

this meeting.

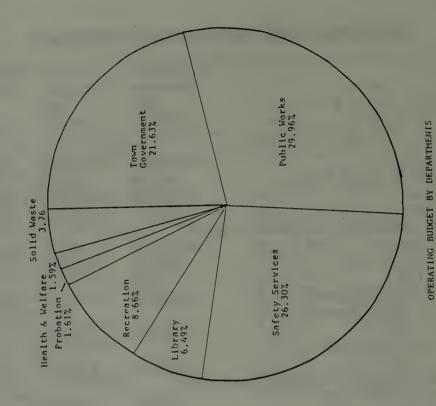

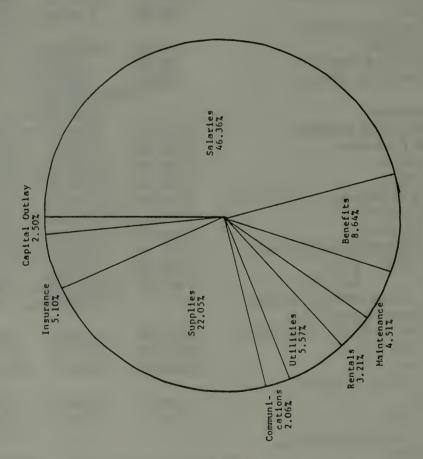

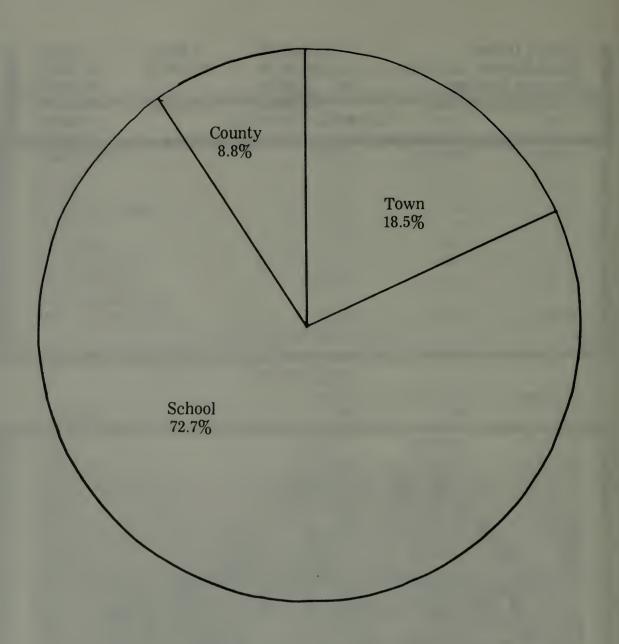

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1985

1. Summary of significant accounting policies:

The accounting policies of the Town of Peterborough conform to generally accepted accounting principles for local governmental units except as indicated hereinafter. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies.

Basis of accounting - The accrual basis is used for all fiduciary and proprietary funds. Governmental funds use the modified accrual basis whereby revenues are recorded when measurable and available. Expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred (accrual basis) except:

- a. Disbursements for inventory items (materials and supplies) are considered expenditures when purchased.
- b. Prepaid expenses are not normally recorded.

General fixed assets - The Town instituted general fixed assets accounting as of December 31, 1979. However, historical cost records were not readily available for most assets. Therefore, as of December 31, 1979, the assets were stated on the following basis:

<u>Land</u> - Independent appraisal in 1974 increased by 41% to reflect current values.

Buildings - Independent appraisal in 1973 increased by 58% by insurance company to reflect current replacement cost. Assets acquired subsequent to appraisal are shown at estimated cost, plus a percentage, to reflect current replacement cost.

Furniture, fixtures and equipment - Estimated current values.

Vehicles - Estimated original cost.

Acquisitions subsequent to 1979 have been recorded at cost.

Property, plant and equipment - Fixed assets in the proprietary funds are stated at cost. Depreciation has been provided over the estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Investments - Investments are stated at cost.

Continuing appropriations - Appropriations for certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year end are carried forward as continuing appropriations to the next year in which they supplement the appropriations for that year. At year end, continuing appropriations are reported as a component of fund balance and are detailed as follows:

Taxes collected for others - The Town collects taxes for ConVal Regional School District and Hillsborough County which are remitted to them as required by law.

Interfund transactions - During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services, construct assets and service debt. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary funds financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

Proprietary funds record operating subsidies as other income, whereas the governmental fund paying the subsidy records it as a transfer.

<u>Property taxes</u> - Annually, the Town establishes an amount for abatements, discounts and refunds of property and resident tax revenues known as overlay. All abatements, discounts and refunds are charged to overlay. Overlay is included under the classification of general government in the combined financial statements.

As prescribed by law, the tax collector sells, at tax sale, all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due, where applicable. The purchaser, at tax sale, has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the three-year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the lienholder.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1985

Reserve for delinquent taxes — When taxes receivable are reported, a reserve for taxes which remain uncollected after 60 days is established and offset against fund balance.

Retirement system - The Town provides for pension benefits to substantially all full-time employees through a contributory system under New Hampshire law. The law prescribes the formula for computing pension benefits and presently does not permit advance funding of pension liabilities. Pension benefits are paid from Town funding and employee contributions based on date of entry. Pension expense for the year ended June 30, 1985, the latest year end of the New Hampshire retirement system, was \$33,854. There is no unfunded past service liability and the value of vested benefits has not been determined. The date of the last actuarial report on the New Hampshire retirement system is June 30, 1983.

2. Purpose of funds and account groups:

The Town reports its activities in numerous individual funds to comply with the limitations and restrictions placed on both the resources made available to the Town and the services provided. Individual funds and account groups summarized in the accompanying combined financial statements are classified as follows:

A. Governmental funds -

These funds are intended to provide recurring general services. They are controlled by a budget approved by the voters.

General fund - Used to account for all revenues and expenditures which are not accounted for in other funds or account groups.

Special revenue funds - Used to account for specific restricted revenues and expenditures for various purposes. Receipts and expenditures of each fund are governed by the terms of contractual agreements, statutes or local law.

B. Proprietary funds -

<u>Enterprise funds</u> - These funds account for operations of entities that provide services on user charge or other basis to the general public.

C. Fiduciary funds

Trust and agency funds - These funds are used to account for assets held by the Town in a fiduciary capacity for various purposes, including cemetery operations. Receipts and expenditures of each fund are governed by statutes or local law.

3. Budget:

The Town budget represents departmental appropriations as authorized by annual or special Town meetings. The selectmen may transfer funds between operating categories as they deem necessary.

4. Long-term debt:

8. Contingencies:

The Public Service Company of New Hampshire (the Company) filed petitions for abatement of taxes with the Board of Tax and Land Appeals of the State of New Hampshire for the tax years beginning April 1, 1981, 1982 and 1983. 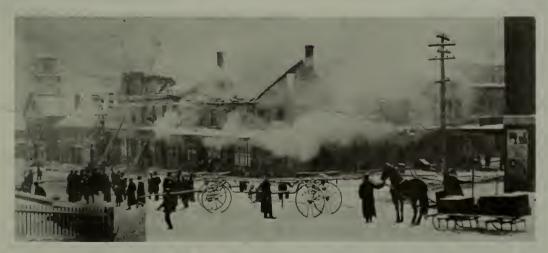

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC WORKS RELATIVE TO ADMINISTRATION OF

The following is a brief report of the Departments that I have ad-

ministered during the past year.

Highway Department

The year saw a major rebuild of Elm Street between Route 101 and Evans Road. The project included drainage, curbing, sidewalk, and new surface.

Also completed was the final segment of Pine Street reaching to the Cheney Avenue intersection.

New curbing and sidewalk were installed on a section of High Street,

replacing a hazardous walkway.

The labor shortage continued throughout the summer, however, late autumn wage increases attracted sufficient crew to staff winter operations.

The Town was unable to procure one contracted plow truck or a sander this year and will make do with equipment on hand.

Vandals continue to deface, damage or pilfer street signs, causing inconvenience to residents. Costs average over \$3,000.00 annually.

Water Department

A new 8" water main was installed on Union Street from Prospect Street to Windy Row. This project is part of the program to provide modern piping into West Peterborough as outlined by the department master improvement plan.

There were twelve new services installed in 1985.

Foreman, Howard Parker retired from the department after thirteen years in that position. Previously, he had toiled twenty-seven years with the Beverly, Mass. Water Department.

Sewer Department

The major project for the year was the demolition and reconstruction of a deteriorated distribution structure at the lagoons.

The department also added six new services in 1985.

Solid Waste

This department continues to buy time with the balefill operation. Eventual plans are to enter into a waste to energy plant in Keene, and negotiations toward that end are underway. By best estimate it will be two years at the earliest before that facility will be on line.

Trees and Forests

Forty-three dead or hazardous trees were removed by Town and contract crews.

Additionally, crews cut up another dozen as a result of the hurricane which fortunately fizzled out before it could do much damage here.

Town Office

The computer system that the Town has with Granite State Data in Weare is presenting several problems and it would be to the Town's benefit to have our own independent system. The Selectmen have appointed a committee to review and report on this possibility.

Town House

The ancient heating system has been replaced with a new hot water system and it provides more uniform heating for the entire building.

An inebriated individual managed to break the front doors to the Town House and new doors have been installed. The new doors are reproductions of the original doors and the culprit has been ordered to make restitution.

Cemeteries

Hans and John Kaufhold have completed half of the stone restoration work in the village burial ground and will finish the work in the coming season.

There were forty-eight burials during the past year.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the Selectmen, my office staff; Thelma Turner, Becky Baldwin, and Deanna Atkinson; my foremen; Pete Deiana, Tom Weeks, fellow department heads, and to you our valued citizens, for your support and encouragement during the past year.

REPORT OF THE WELFARE ADMINISTRATOR

As I make this, my first report as Welfare Administrator, I would be remiss in my duty if I failed to express my heartfelt thanks to Fred E. Murray for his unselfish assistance to me in this first year. He has given freely of his time and experience to make this year a rewarding one to me.

Six Hundred Eighty Four Dollars and thirty-five cents (\$684.35) was received from the Trust Funds. This, plus a very generous contribution from the Union Congregational Church, again provided holiday baskets

and remembrances through this office.

The Monadnock Community of Churches again sponsored the "Crop Walk for Hunger," which, with the addition of a contribution from a very generous local couple who wish to remain anonymous, replenished the Food Bank Account.

As you read the 1986 Budget request it can be noted that several categories have either been sharply reduced or eliminated. This is a result of the passage of Senate Bill 1, in which the County and State take over Juvenile Placement, Nursing Home Care, Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled.

On the opposite side of the scale, the Town becomes responsible for Direct Relief — without reimbursement from the County. The result is an

increased apportionment for the Direct Relief category.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Peterborough Board of Adjustment considered only twenty-eight cases during 1985, which represented a surprising reversal of the trend in

recent years toward more and more zoning activity.

The Board heard five cases concerning property located in the Family District. All of the requests were granted, three having been applications for special exceptions, and two for variances. One of the requests for a special exception involved the Town's first case of a two-family residence being converted to a two-unit condominium, an occurrence which the Board feels may be more common in the years to come.

By far the most applications were received with respect to property located in the General Residence District. Six of the cases involved special exceptions, and all were granted subject to protective conditions. Five more cases requested variances, of which all were denied except one which was also granted subject to numerous limiting conditions. There was also one appeal from the administrative decision of the Building Code Officer concerning the size of an apartment complex sign, and it was approved subject to conditions.

There were four cases heard concerning property in the Rural District, all of which requested special exceptions, and all of which were granted

subject to conditions.

In the Commercial District, there were three applications, two of which requested special exceptions and were granted subject to conditions, and one of which asked for a variance and was denied.

Only one application was received with respect to the Industrial District, and a special exception was granted, again subject to numerous

limiting conditions.

Finally, there were three cases which involved property located in two zoning districts. Two cases requested special exceptions for property located in the Commercial and Conservation Districts, one of which was denied and one was granted subject to conditions. Also, both a special exception and a variance were granted concerning a condominium project

located in both the Family and Rural Districts.

Again in 1985, the Board attempted to apply and interpret the Zoning Ordinance in a consistent and predictable manner. Except in extraordinary cases, variances of use restrictions were denied, while variances of setback, frontage and other dimensional requirements were more often granted, where reasonably necessary and appropriate. The Board continued to grant the majority of the requests for special exceptions, often subject to numerous restrictive or protective conditions, where it deemed that the spirit and intent of the Zoning Ordinance would be preserved.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT, 1985

1985 was the year of electronics for the library. We began ordering our books with a hand-held computer. Bataphone allows us to access our book jobber's computer in Pennsylvania, and receive confirmation of the shipment the next day. A copy of the computer-generated ship-list is sent via van to the New Hampshire State Library, where cataloguing information is sent on to Ohio. A computer there generates catalog cards for us. This all translates into faster processing time, from the minute the book is ordered until it is put out on the library shelves.

New telephone lines were installed in January, purchased with funds raised by the successful Friends of the Library Book Sale. This gave the library an additional outgoing line, a telephone in the reference room, and

an entirely new telephone/intercom system.

Our staff attended classes to better their expertise. Reference librarian Judy Garabrant completed the New Hampshire Library Techniques Program, certifying her for the State. Newest staff member, Jeannette Baker began attending these courses. Professional librarian and staff cataloguer Linda Tiernan was an instructor in cataloguing at the School for Lifelong Learning. Director Ann Geisel attended management and computer workshops. Betty James left the library to take another position. Her cheerful helpfulness at the desk is missed by all.

An attractive newspaper rack was given by the family and friends of Thomas J. O'Connell, in his memory. Also new to the adult leisure reading area is an art display rack, the handcrafted donation of Mr. George Grim-

shaw.

By Spring, even our work room was part of the technological revolution. The library is now able to generate book lists and form letters with the help of its Digital Word Processor and letter-quality printer. Its donation

was arranged through Chester Bowles.

Fall saw an increased effort to put a bite on our overdue problem. Staff members Jeannette Baker and Margaret Priest streamlined the overdue system. Trustee Warren Johnson took to the road, making house calls for overdue material. As a result, the library is pleased to report that our unrecovered overdues amount to one/third of one percent of our entire

circulation. This year, 63,458 pieces of material were borrowed.

Other statistics include the fact that our meeting rooms were used 1,000 times by 100 different groups. Our library discount has increased to 43.1% thanks to our cooperative buying power with New Hampshire Coop membership. One thousand, seven hundred twenty-one new books were added to the collection, of which five hundred forty-four were gifts. Other books donated but not added to the collection were placed in the book sale. The Friends of the Library reported \$1,935 realized. They will now purchase video software and display cabinets to accompany the library's own video equipment. Mr. George Grimshaw donated a new television and video cassette recorder, while Monadnock Cablevision has given the library free installation and a lifetime subscription to cable.

Plans for the future include a link with the New Hampshire State Library computer, allowing instant interlibrary loan, and access to data banks. To this end, we hope to begin bar-coding in 1986. A listing of our gains this year brings with it renewed appreciation for the support this community continues to show the first free library.

REPORT OF THE PETERBOROUGH CONSERVATION COMMISSION — 1985

The 1985 year may well be marked as a key year in the effort to preserve the environmental resources that have made Peterborough attractive. The Conservation Commission supported the Planning Board in every way it could to ensure passage of the building moratorium so essential to permit upgrading of zoning and subdivision regulations. The Commission will try to provide input to help develop regulations that will provide for (1) maximum protection of aquifers, (2) minimum pollution from failing septic systems, (3) continuation of reasonable building density, (4) proper set-backs to protect waterways and scenic views, and (5) any other requirements that will help ensure environmental protection.

The importance of proper Town action for aquifer protection was emphasized at the annual meeting of The New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions. It was made clear that local septic regulations need to be much more strict than state minimums and local enforce-

ment by health and building inspection is essential.

One of the surest ways to help prevent over-development of the town, and to preserve important natural recreational areas, is through removal of such key properties from the potential of development. The Commission has been very pleased this year that far-sighted landowners have placed conservation easements on significant acreages — especially 145 acres along the Contoocook abutting the Hancock line. With other land owned by the Town, and acreage to be dedicated as open space by a developer, the entire west bank of the river north of the landfill will be protected — at little or no impact on the tax rate. Similarly, acreage at the southedge of town, threatened with premature development was purchased by a citizen who plans to ensure that a major portion of the land will be protected.

As more land is placed under easement, the Conservation Commission is finding itself with increased responsibility for supervision of such land. This next year plans will be developed for recreational use of such areas and use of protective signs. Volunteers to help in this program will be

welcomed.

The Commission has been very pleased with the fact that the Fairfield Raymond Trail it dedicated in 1984 has been enthusiastically used by hikers seeking a new way to climb Pack Monadnock.

The Commission has welcomed the Monadnock Land Stewardship Program of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests and en-

courages anyone interested in protecting their land to contact Catherine Hahn at her office at the Shieling Forest on Old Street Road ('phone 924-7836).

We acknowledge with regret, and with thanks for very effective service, the resignation during the year of Commission member Cynthia Martell, our "agricultural member." Unfortunately, the duties of the dairy farm were too time-consuming, she felt, for her to continue to serve.

Finally, the Commission was saddened by the passing this year of two longtime and most dedicated former members — Fairfield E. Raymond, its Emeritus Chairman, and Theodore A. Brayton, whose environmental contributions to Peterborough were many. They will be greatly missed by the Town.

REPORT OF THE GROUNDWATER STUDY COMMITTEE

The Groundwater Study Committee was appointed by the selectmen after a vote by the Town Meeting of 1984, to look into present and future

situations of water supply and waste water disposal.

The committee's first year ended in the choice of an engineering firm. Whitman and Howard Inc. of Wellesley, Mass. and Concord, N.H. After studying the situation, the engineers submitted a report to the committee in November 1985.

Whitman and Howard did some test borings in 1985, and also studied results of tests done in past years. They have made maps showing underground water supply areas, which are known as "primary" aquifers (the ground from which water flows directly into a well), and "secondary" aguifers (lowlands and hillsides adjoining the primary areas).

The best-known of these areas are the "southern" and the "northern"

aguifers. Both lie in the valley of the Contoocook River.

The southern aguifer is the source which supplies the town's South Well. now closed because of pollution. The primary aguifer, whose outlines are fairly well known, is about a mile long, on both sides of Rte. 202 and the river. Its northern edge is a short distance south of the bridge at Noone Falls.

The northern aquifer is longer and narrower, and serves both the Summer Street and Tarbell Road wells. Its southern edge is north of Shadow Lane, and it extends to the marshy area northwest of Conval High School. Aquifers lie underneath the river, which is not very deep.

The engineers also listed some other places where further study might

reveal usable water supply.

The most likely aguifer area, of "major potential," is bounded by Grove Street, Morison Road, Powersbridge Road, and Route 101. This was first tested in 1952.

Whitman and Howard have listed some possible aguifers, which would need further study. In approximate order of useful potential, they are:

1. Sanitary landfill and Bogle Road. A test well exists near the landfill. The likely area extends under the Contoocook south of the landfill near Bogle Road, and could have "major" potential.

2. North swamp. The wetland on both sides of Route 202 near the Hancock town line could have major potential. There is one working well

now, at the Community Sanitation transfer station.

3. Sargent Camp. Test wells at the camp have indicated moderate potential. Land south of the camp has not been tested.

4. MacDowell Reservoir, Sand and gravel pits and soil types could have moderate potential, but no testing has been done.

5. Evans Flat. This area has minor potential, if any, according to evi-

6. Town Line Brook. Tests in 1952, east of Route 123 near the Sharon town line, show some minor potential.

As the public is aware, the primary and secondary aguifer areas for the

current town wells are also the areas where most of the town's population lives and works.

The South Well is closed by pollution, but the wells in the northern zone are meeting quantity and quality needs. What can be done to keep them this way?

These are the committee's views, based on the engineers' recommenda-

tions.

1. Aquifer zone. This, like the existing conservation and flood control zones, would be an "overlay" to the town zoning map. This year, during a partial subdivision moratorium voted in 1985, a revision of the town Master Plan is being studied. This is the logical time, the committee believes, to consider inclusion of protection districts for primary and secondary aquifers.

Secondly, the Conservation Commission should be encouraged to pursue a land and conservation easement program, to protect the

undeveloped potential primary aquifer areas.

- 2. Underground tanks. New tanks, for fuel oil, gasoline or chemicals, should be registered and inspected. Abandoned tanks should be pumped out, and either dug up or filled with sand, during a three-year search starting in aquifer areas and eventually covering the whole town.
- 3. Aboveground tanks. Commercial and industrial tanks should have a berm, or earthen protective wall.
- 4. Waste dumps. Certain sites, which may have had past or present dumping of waste oil or other pollutants, should be investigated.
- 5. Salty snow. The snow removed from streets after storms should not be dumped in primary or secondary aguifer areas.
- 6. Road salt. The engineers recommend a complete end to road salt in primary aquifer areas. At least, the town should test regularly for sodium and chloride at the wells.

7. Sandpits. Old sandpits, or "borrow pits," should be fenced, with locked gates, to prevent the entry of cars, and illegal dumping.

8. Well protection. The town does not own the recommended 400-foot circle of land around either the South Well or the Summer Street Well. Arrangements should be made with the owners to prevent development or pollution of the land.

9. Sewer extensions. Whitman and Howard recommends extension of the town sewer to Pineridge homes within 10 to 15 years; the commit-

tee's opinion is that the limit should be five years.

Guaranteed main line extensions are now authorized by a vote representing 75% of the building lots; the committee recommends changing the ratio to a two-thirds vote (67%). For the Pineridge situation only, the town as a whole should share some of the expense, to protect the aguifer.

The engineers recommend that sewers should reach, within 10 years, all aquifer areas which have more than one dwelling unit per acre, and that all new developments of more than one home per acre, within the aquifers, must be connected to the sewer.

PLANNING BOARD 1985 ANNUAL REPORT

Town planning is at a crossroads, as evidenced by the resounding 1,144-157 vote on November 21, 1985 for a one year "moratorium" on

residential developments of more than four building lots.

As a result of that Special Town Meeting vote on November 21, the Planning Board was presented with an interim growth management ordinance of 12 months' duration during which time steps must be taken by the Board to review and update the Town Master Plan adopted in 1974, consider changes in zoning and subdivision regulations, and compile data on what capital improvements — schools, police, fire, public works, library, sewer, water, etc. could be necessary in the next decade or more.

The key question is how fast does Peterborough expect to grow? If one is to believe a poll taken at the 1984 national election, 92% of those surveyed want no change in the Town, slight growth, or at most, moderate growth.

Uncontrolled growth is at Peterborough's doorstep, to wit the explosion of construction from Wilton east to Milford, Nashua, and beyond, particularly on Route 101. That situation, plus the pending break-up of two former estates in town — the Parker estate on Sand Hill Road, and the J.C. Fremont farm on Old Jaffrey Road — ignited public concern in June that land development was in danger of outstripping community services

and threatening to change the way of life here.

Two petitions bearing more than 500 signatures were delivered to the Planning Board, via the selectmen, calling for the Board to take appropriate action, hence the temporary moratorium. In December the Board made its first move to implement the interim regulation, and brought in William Dickson from Scarborough, Maine who wrote the 1974 Master Plan. At year's end Dickson was in consultation with the Southwest Region Planning Commission, about using that agency as the prime resource to assist the Planning Board in carrying out the Town's mandate.

Twelve subdivision applications received Board approval in 1985, for some 41 houselots. Also approved were a nine-unit apartment project on Summer Street, and, with conditions, 31 duplex homes on 96 acres on Scott-Mitchell Road, north of the town landfill. The apartments were under construction by year's end, but work had not started on the duplexes.

A new Chevrolet-Oldsmobile agency, on Sharon Road, off 202 South, was the largest commercial project presented for Board approval during the year. Among others were a 12,000 square foot addition to Ames at the Peterborough Plaza, 1,400 square feet for the Pizza Barn on 202 South, and

7,200 square feet for Belletete's on 202 North.

At Town Meeting in March, a rezoning application from Edward Lobacki, Wilton Road, involving 16 acres of the former Lobacki poultry farm was approved by placing all that land in General Residence subject to the owner bringing town water and sewer there at his expense. Denied by Town Meeting referendum were applications from Peterborough Industrial Development Corporation to change 95 acres on 202 North beyond

Conval from rural to industrial, and 65 acres north of Pineridge from

rural to Family District.

1986 will be a busy, and crucial, year for the Planning Board, and the Town as a whole, as wheels are set in motion to guide the community's future for a long time to come. Patience, and thoughtful assistance, will be most appreciated.

1985 was a year of change for the Peterborough Police Department; Chief Joseph V. McCarthy retired this year as the head of the department. I was and am extremely proud and consider myself fortunate to have been selected as your new Police Chief.

Other personnal changes have taken place during the past year. Officer Dana Hennessy was hired and subsequently graduated from the New Hampshire Police Academy. Officer Albert Caisse returned back to the department after a tour of duty with another New Hampshire Police Department. Officer Raymond Dodge was hired as a full-time officer and is awaiting entry to the Police Academy.

Training

We were fortunate to have had men attend training sessions in the areas of Intoximeter, Child Sexual Abuse, Identi-kit, Interviewing Techniques, Firearms Training, Management Issues, and DWI Apprehension. The Peterborough Police Department has instituted a much-needed in-service training program in order to ensure that the town has well-trained men patrolling the Town. We will continue to afford our men the benefit of further training during 1986.

When I took over the reins of the Peterborough Police Department, I instituted many changes. Among these were the friendly but professional manner of the personnel, an increase in the investigation of crimes and hence an increase in the cases being solved, an increase in the training of the personnel and a definite improvement in the morale of the department. These changes could not have taken place without the support and cooperation of the people of Peterborough, the Selectmen, the Police Officers, Judge Kenneth Brighton, the girls of the Town House, other department heads, Larry Bishop and the Fire Department, John Isham and the Public Works crew, State Police and other Police Departments. To all these people, I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation.

REPORT OF THE PETERBOROUGH FIRE DEPARTMENT 1985

Fire calls for the past year increased by twenty-seven over the previous calls in 1984. As will be noted elsewhere in the town report we overspent our budget for 1985 and the increase in the number of calls created the overspending. It is very difficult to estimate the fire calls from one year to the next so the figure in our budget for fire fighting pay is merely a guess. So as in years past fire fighting is the reason for our budget being overspent or having money left over. At this time we would like to point out that the fire pay remains at four dollars per hour and we are paid just when we are called and just for the time we spend at any emergency. The break-down of calls is as follows:

The largest increases were false alarms, auto accidents and mutual aid calls. We can't do anything about decreasing auto accidents and mutual aid calls but on repeat false alarms we can bill the people involved, and I am sure this will decrease the repeat calls. Once again the actual fire loss for the year remained very low which we are very proud of. Our ambulance calls the past year decreased by five for a total of 392. Our ambulance personnel remains about the same with us losing a few members and gaining a few. The ambulance part of the fire department in looking ahead will be the most difficult for us to remain a volunteer fire department. It is the Fire Department's desire to remain a volunteer just as long as possible.

As in the past we would like to thank all of our voters for making the job that much easier. By the time you are reading this we will have put in service the new fire truck which was purchased this last year. It certainly is a great addition to our fleet and will make our job that much easier. Once again we wish to thank each and every one for your fine support and assistance during the past year. It is greatly appreciated and without it our work would be that much more difficult. It is a pleasure to serve you

and we are asking you for your continued support.

RECREATION REPORT 1985

With child safety as the prime consideration, the year 1985 brought major fencing and continued electrical improvements at Adams Playground. All overhead wires on the South side of Union Street have now been placed underground. A cement block building was constructed to house the electrical main.

Largely through the volunteer efforts of the Monadnock Jaycees, Recreation Chairman Roland Patton and Alan Myhaver of Hancock a wooded addition above the aforementioned building serving as a press-box and scorekeepers area was also constructed.

The PRD also began Phase 1 of a conversion program changing its outdoor lighting system from Quartz to the more economical Metal Haylide.

Through UNH's Cooperative Extension Program the PRD received professional advice in several landscaping projects. The PRD is firm in its intent at saving as many trees as possible from Elm and other life threatening diseases.

A loaming and fertilization program was also initiated to insure the finest athletic and aesthetic conditions for the Adams Playground prop-

erty.

The open trench on the South side of Union Street was buried thus protecting the tennis courts, on the North side, from irregular drainage and

possible structural damage.

Adjacent to the West side of the tennis courts is the continued development of a new playground area. A new slide and jungle-gym set were installed. Nearby is the outdoor ice skating facility which was used extensively for volleyball this past summer.

Painting of the tennis and pool fences as well as the pool and bathhouse

building was also realized this year.

Through the kindness and generosity of American Legion Post #5 a new flag and 35' flagpole were purchased and erected at the main entrance of Adams Playground.

Moreover, the PRD is grateful to the Peterborough Fire Department for purchasing an additional flag and 35' flagpole in memory of Bruce Russell who was an outstanding athlete and friend to all within the Peterborough community.

Numerous flower gardens were also planted by Brownie Troop 49 head-

ed up by Judy Garabrant, Helenanne Adams and Claire Jutras.

The PRD is also indebted to the Friends of Recreation for co-sponsoring a student and adult recreation questionnaire made available to Peterborough residents last Fall courtesy of Custom Mailing of Peterborough. Results of the survey were very gratifying and assisted immensely in the PRD 10 year Master Plan which was recently made public.

Program Director Lynn Castonguay continues to reap praise for her creative and dedicated assistance in the planning and implementation of

numerous recreation program activities.

Homer Paradise rendered great productivity in various maintenance projects since early Spring of '85. Assisting Mr. Paradise in Summer Maintenance were Sean Crowley, Kevin Temple and Tim Wakefield. Playground Supervisor Roberta Wilkinson devoted herself enthusiastically throughout the summer and was a genuine Pied Piper for children in day to day activities. Also outstanding with children were tennis coordinator Monique Pelletier and Arts and Crafts Director Kelly Keating.

The Aquatic Staff for '85 was equally outstanding. In addition to Pool Director Lynn Castonguay lifeguards included Janet Chandler, Tom Feller, Cuffy Talbot and Chris Temple. Bathhouse attendants were Kathy

and Ann Forrest.

The PRD wishes to take time to thank the many team sponsors and local civic agencies for their involvement and concern for youth in Our Town.

Finally, I'd be remissed if I didn't pay tribute to the many program volunteers who give so wholesomely of their time and energy throughout the year toward making Peterborough pretty much the Child Capital of the state.

DRAFT BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

A number of short- and long-term issues came under the scrutiny of the Budget Committe in 1985, including a formal salary schedule for Town employees, cable TV franchising authority, and property tax reassessment. Five new faces appeared around the courtroom conference table during BudCom meetings — Charles Leedham and Carl Wiley, elected at 1985's Town Meeting and Wendy Peters, Marc Menard, and Linda Wilson, all of whom were appointed to seats vacated by resignation.

Under the leadership of Ted Barker, the committee continued to pursue its objective — to advise the Board of Selectmen on Town fiscal issues.

The committee's principal achievements in 1985 included:

- better communication with the Selectman and townspeople through regular representation at Selectmen's meetings and improved communication with the media;
- research into a lease for the District courtroom with a subsequent recommendation to the Selectman to grant a one-year lease to provide additional time to study the ramifications of forcing the Court to move elsewhere;
- research and recommendation that the Selectman place articles on the 1986 Town Meeting warrant concerning cable TV franchising authority, elderly person's property tax relief, and property tax reassessment;
- an illuminating tour of Town facilities that gave members a clearer picture of the current physical plant.

Of course, a great deal of the committees' effort was consumed by its yearly examination of the budget requests submitted by Town department heads. The results of these deliberations and the recommendations of the committee on both the 1986 budget request and special warrant articles are in a separate document available to all voters at the business portion of the 1986 Town Meeting.

Budget committee members welcome the ideas and suggestions of Peterborough residents. The committee meets regularly throughout the year and all its meetings are open to the public. Our sincere wish is that all town voters make the effort to stay informed about municipal financial matters. We urge every Peterborough taxpayer to attend the Selectmen's Budget Informational Public Hearing, held this year on March 5.
