#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Piermont in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges.
- 4. To raise and appropriate money for Town Road Aid.
- 5. To raise and appropriate money for Care of Cemeteries.
- 6. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Street Lights.
- 7. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.
- 8. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Fire Department.
- 9. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of Poor and Old Age Assistance.
- 10. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committees for same.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate money for an Oil Burner for the Town Hall.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 13. To raise and appropriate to the White Moun-

tain Region Association, for its program of advertising, etc. as a part of the Cooperative investment by regional Town, an amount equal to 10c per \$1,000 of the assessed valuation of the Town for 1950.

- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's Deeds or otherwise.
- 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to throw up Swain's Cross Road from the River Road to the Back Road subject to gates and bars or properly posted.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to throw up such parts and parcels of the Old North and South Road and the branch to the Tarleton Road near the Woodrow Noyes place as remain except the part near Charles Rodiman's, from the Tarleton Road south over the bridge and including the approach to the same.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to throw up the road from Alcide Fagnants place to the Haverhill line subject to gates and bars.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Piermont qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 13th day of March, 1951, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass and vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payments of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of a School Lunch Program for the ensuing year.

- 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to negotiate school bus contracts for a period of three years.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to apply to unanticipated expenses.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# Teachers and Pupils

There were two changes in the teaching staff as school started in September. Mrs. Christie Ritchie's resignation was accepted with regret, as music supervisor for the district, and was replaced by Miss Edith Emery of Monroe, N. H. Miss Emery is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, Class of '47, and had two years of teaching experience before coming to this district.

Mrs. Francis Patridge desired to be replaced after a successful year in the primary room. Miss Isabel Morrill of Littleton was secured to teach grades I and II. Miss Morril is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, Class of 1950, and holds a B. Ed. degree.

# **Building and Grounds**

It is gratifying to report that the new flush toilets have been installed, as well as lavatories and fluorescent lights. Windows were set in the primary room, a new congoleum laid and the walls were redecorated.

New swings, replacing the old ones, have been erected on the playground and a merry-go-round added to the equipment.

The school lunch room is more convenient for the workers because of the removal of the old chimney, abandoned last year. A Hobart food mixer and attachments have been added to the equipment which greatly adds to the efficiency of the program, which is again being ably administered by Mrs. Robbins.

The Board is to be praised for the well-planned and economically installed program of building improvements accomplished this year. The district now has a building in which the health and sanitary facilities have changed from poor to excellent since last year.

#### **General Information**

The district was fortunate in having the services, in December of a Federal Fluoride Unit, sponsored by the U. S. Public Health Department. This unit was located at the Woodsville Graded school building from November 13 to January 5th and to which 44 Piermont pupils in Grades I through VI came for treatment. Each child had a cleaning and four fluoride applications to its teeth free of charge.

#### Conclusion

May I take you for a moment, as a concluding thought for this report, to look outside our district borders and view four specific tasks which triumphant faith in education has imposed on our schools during the past 150 years, as expressed by H. Commager of Columbia University. THE FIRST AND GREATEST TASKS was to provide an enlightened citizenry in order that self government might work. With independence the problem of self-government became urgent. "To be long-lived," as Benjamin Rush observed, "republics must invest in education."

Has our investment succeeded? None can doubt that it has. Americans have, in short, made democracy work. Through all their history they elected some mediocre presidents but never a wicked or a dangerous one; they revealed in every crisis an ability to select able leaders. Only a people taught self-government could record these achievements.

THE SECOND GREAT TASK imposed upon education and on the schools — the creation of national unity — was equally difficult.

We created unity out of diversity, nationalism out of particularism. These were the contribution of poets and novelists, editors and naturalists, historians and jurists, orators and painters — and the medium through which they worked was the school. These men

gave to Americans, old and new alike, a people's common language with which to voice a people's common heritage:

"God sifted a whole nation that He might send choice grain over into this wilderness; As for me, give me liberty of give me death; If they mean to have a war, let it begin here; One if by land, and two if by sea; These are the times that try men's souls; I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country."

And then there were the songs and the pictures, too. In school and lyceum, children came to learn and remember at least snatches of the "Concord Hymn" or "Old Ironsides" or the "Midnight Ride of Paul Revere."

THE THIRD TASK IMPOSED on Education, and particularly on the public schools, was that which we call Americanization. Each decade after 1840 saw from two to eight million immigrants pour into America.

THERE IS A FOURTH AND FINAL SERVICE the schools have rendered the cause of American democracy. This most heterogeneous of modern societies has ever seemed the most easy prey to forces of riotous privilege and ruinous division. These forces have not prevailed; they have been routed, above all, in the schoolrooms and on the playgrounds of America. In the class-room, the nation's children have lived and learned equality. On the playground and the athletic field, the same code has ruled. Who can seriously doubt that the cause of democracy is served when it is a Murphy, a Schwartz, a Groglio or a Levitsky that the cheering stands applaud?

If, through the 19th and well into the 20th Century, American schools performed such magnificent service, the question remains: do they still serve the nation well?

In a day of specialization schools are called on more and more to prepare not so much for life citizenship or democracy as for particular tasks and competences.

Schools reflect the society they serve. Many of

the failures we ascribe to contemporary education are in fact failures of our society as a whole.

For a century and a half American schools have served and strengthened the commonwealth. If society clearly defines the new duties it wishes our schools to fulfill and if it steadfastly supports them not only with money but also with faith, they will surely justify that faith in the future as they have in the past.

The acknowledgment of my appreciation to the teachers; to the school board, collectively and individually; as well as to the citizens of the district, for their continued cooperation and support is hereby gratefully expressed.

### Gentlemen:

As requested by your board an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Piermont for the period from June 20, 1950 to December 31, 1950, has been made by this Division. The period from January 1 to June 20, 1950, was covered in our audit which was made in June. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which covers the entire fiscal year of 1950.

### Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Road Agent and Trustees of Trust Funds.

### **Financial Statements**

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1949-Dec. 31, 1950: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1949 and December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Surplus decreased by \$1,-246.83 in 1950.

### Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C and D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,582.06, less a net revenue surplus of \$1,317.52, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,264.54.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1950, is indicated in Exhibit F.

### **Audit Procedure**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

### **General Comments**

Our comments and recommendations relative to accounting and financial procedures are included in the report which was made to your board under date of July 14, 1950.

The accounts of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting and financial procedures conformed generally to the prescribed methods.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Piermont for their assistance during the course of the audit.
