WARRANT
The State of New Hampshire

The Polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of PITTSBURG in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Bremer Pond Auditorium in said Pittsburg on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, or immediately following the business meeting of the Pittsburg School District, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for the election of one Selectman, for three years; one Road Agent, for one year; a Treasurer; a Town Clerk, for three years; three Auditors; one Overseer of the Welfare; a Library Trustee, for three years; a Library Trustee, for two years; and a Trustee of the Trust Funds, for three years.
2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under Article 1.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and elect a committee to set a date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service.
6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Vershire Center.
7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operating expenses and matching funds for Northern Coos Community Health Association.
8. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate as the Town share of the operation of the North Country Council, Inc.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand three hundred dollars (\$3,300) for the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) for a new police cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw three thousand dollars (\$3,000) from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund and apply the funds toward the purchase of a new police cruiser.
12. If the Town votes to purchase a new police cruiser, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to either sell the 1979 police cruiser and put the funds in the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund, or take any other action thereon.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for new equipment for the Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000) for a new 2½-ton dump truck purchased through state bid or other dealer that is equal to or within reason, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
15. If the preceding Article fails to pass, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000) for the purpose of ditching, graveling, or hot-topping town roads, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to seal tarred Town roads.
17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the William R. Jr. and Trudy Winters property, the Ralph and Alice Bean property, and the David Norton property, all acquired through tax title deeds, by public auction or advertised sealed bid, as justice may require.
18. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the budget for Covered Bridges.
19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate three hundred dollars (\$300) to purchase one-half acre of land to enlarge the Lakes Cemetery.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for perambulation of the Town line.
21. To see if the Town of Pittsburg will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the support of the Community Action Outreach Program.
22. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to construct a pole barn for storage of town highway equipment.
23. (BY PETITION) To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate action by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and the economy of Pittsburg and to the health and welfare of the people of Pittsburg.

These actions shall include: (1) Reduce at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990. (2) Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this Article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States.

24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.
25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
26. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Polls will not close before 6:00 P.M.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

During the year 1982 the Pittsburg Police Department received 794 calls through the Emergency Communications Center in Colebrook. In addition, Sgt. Lapoint and I received many calls at home.

1982 was a busy year, with most of the court cases being motor vehicle violations and unauthorized camping violations. There were a number of warnings given out, and still some cases waiting to go to Superior Court. The number of burglaries decreased, and most were cleared by arrest. Some of these arrests could not have been made if it weren't for you, the people who live here and reported as soon as possible whenever you saw something occur.

I would like to report that all the officers in this Department are certified as special police officers through the N. H. Police Standards and Training Council, and that this summer I plan to have all the officers certified in the use of hand gun and shot gun, and the use of a night stick.

In addition, I would like to remind you that for POLICE EMERGENCY please call the Emergency Communications Center in Colebrook at 237-5555, particularly during the daytime.

Also, for people who own and use trail bikes and other OHRV's when there is no snow cover, you need written permission from the landowner to operate an OHRV upon his land (RSA 215-A:21 I). St. Regis Paper Company has asked all law enforcement agencies in the area to enforce this law on their lands.

On behalf of myself, Sgt. Lapoint, Special Officers French and von Dohrmann, I would like to thank everyone for his help and support in the past year and hope we can continue to work together to make this community a good place to live.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Pittsburg Fire Department held its usual monthly meetings during the year, as well as three drills. In addition to regular meetings and drills, we encourage members to attend at least one outside fire school during the year. In 1982 five men attended a one day training session at Colebrook on April 25th., and fifteen men attended a two day training session, the Northeast Kingdom Fire School, on May 22nd. and 23rd. at Beecher Falls. Again this year the men have donated over 500 man-hours on the maintenance of trucks and equipment.

In 1982 we have added a quaint little structure on the west end of the station. This structure houses our hydrant system from a spring 1200 feet up the hill, providing a water source and protection for the station and nearby town and private buildings. We would like to single out and thank the following members for making this very important addition possible: O. French, F. Howe, P. Wright, and R. Owen. Thank you gentlemen, and anyone else I may have overlooked.

In 1981 we purchased a second-hand radio system and in February of '82 we applied for a license and frequency on which to operate it. We finally received the license in November and contracted with Wright Communications of Concord to modify the radios to two-channel systems. One channel will be our own frequency and the other will be the local mutual-aid frequency so that when working with other departments in the area we will have communications with them. We received a grant of \$500 from the U.S.F.S. Rural Community Fire Protection Program, and the Department has raised (through our raffles) another \$500 in matching funds to finance the modifications and installation of the radios. This should be a great help in communications and maintenance of a water supply during a fire. The radio room will be in the Firemen's Room over the town office, and will have, besides our own radio, a link-up with Forestry and CB's.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Across the United States there is escalating awareness that educational systems are facing severe problems in trying to meet the needs and demands of the nation in our rapidly changing and growing technological society. The current and anticipated shortages of a labor force adequately prepared to take on the tasks needed for the development of our economy, culture and security are rightly being called a crisis by leaders in the fields of education, business, industry and government.

As the total number of 18 and 19 year olds in our population continues to decrease into the 1990's, the percentage of high school graduates entering preprofessional and college level courses in humanities, science and engineering must be increased to meet future manpower needs and to address the problems of a rapidly changing world.

Already the nation is faced with a decline of talented students considering or entering the field of teaching on any level or sector be it private, public or post-secondary. Such a severe shortage of qualified science and mathematics teachers exists today that the problem is presently being addressed by industry, education and government on a national level. All are in agreement that incentives must be provided for high aptitude and motivated students to encourage them to pursue professional and scientific studies and that computerized instruction in all aspects of education can no longer be regarded as an innovative practice or technique but as a necessity in a rapidly growing technological society. In addition, incentives must also be provided for those presently in the teaching field to reduce the exodus into private industry.

Although an awareness of the pending crisis exists, solutions to the problem are not as readily evident. Providing quality education programs with limited financial resources is as difficult and challenging today, if not more so, as it was during the time after the launching of Sputnik. The continuing loss and reduction of federal and state monies coupled with a matching increase in mandated programs for specialized support services for handicapped students and adults is approaching and may shortly exceed the ability of local school districts to support all educational programs in its public schools. Adding to the problem of dwindling financial resources is the recent announcement by the State Department of Education that it will be reducing by 4 percent all aid monies presently being paid or owed to local school districts. The effect that this will have on

existing local budgets that reflected this anticipated and assured revenue will be realized shortly. Of encouragement is the statement made by President Reagan in his recent State of the Union message in recognition of the crisis in meeting technological change and the financial support that is to be rendered to states and local school districts in the form of Block Grant monies.

Perhaps no greater dilemma is faced by school board members developing and presenting budgets and by taxpayers who must support public education than the issue of what must legally be provided in the education program and what should be provided to assure that all students achieve their educational goals based on individual ability, all within limited financial resources available. The average cost to educate a student attending 12 years of public school varies in the United States from \$15,000 to \$25,200. The average cost of providing support services for exceptionally handicapped students over an 18-year period varies nationally from \$62,000 to \$216,000. Programs for exceptionally gifted and talented students vary in cost nationally from \$40,000 to \$120,000 over a 10-year period. The dilemma must be met and resolved if we are to provide a meaningful and realistic public education program for all our students.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Health appears to have a direct relationship to a person's quality of life. The World Health Organization asserted that "health is a state of complete physical, mental and social well being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity." Therefore, the main objectives of our school health program were to develop a pattern of health care for the children that included prevention, maintenance, detection and referral. Our programs strove to help reduce susceptibility to disease, to enable students to make decisions about health and to increase their abilities to perform as assertive individuals.

Dr. Marjorie Parsons again provided her professional medical advice as our school physician. Mrs. Mary Sasser, family nurse practitioner, assisted Dr. Parsons.

This year the following services were performed through the combined efforts of our health team:

1. Height, weight and dental checks
2. Hearing and vision testing
3. Physical examinations as standard requirements for grades 4, 8, 11 and new students as well as students participating in sports
4. Tuberculin testing in grade 11 and as needed for other students
5. Immunization clinics to update students' health records to state requirements
6. Urine testing for students in grades 4, 8 and 11
7. Scoliosis (curvature of the spine) screening for students in grades 5, 6 and 7
8. First aid and emergency care
9. Phone and letter contacts for follow-ups on health care and health care problems
10. Home visits
11. Encouragement and aid in promoting good mental health
12. Health instruction, counseling and supervision of general health.

New services provided were as follows:

1. Acquisition of equipment through an EMS Federal Grant for the purpose of teaching First Aid classes and CPR in the high school
2. The Red Cross Standard First Aid and Personal Safety course was taught at Pittsburg School to some of the junior and senior high students (using the above

mentioned equipment) by Madelene Judd.

3. The SNAP (School Nurse Achievement Program) was made available to the New Hampshire nurses for the purpose of increasing and updating the nurses' knowledge and skills in dealing with the handicapped child. Both school nurses in our S.A.U. attended these classes.

The N.H. Division of Public Health again sponsored a pre-school hearing and vision clinic in May for the early detection of vision and/or hearing problems.

The Sight Conservation Program provided by the State of New Hampshire helped students receive vision examinations and glasses when financial assistance was needed.

The Bureau of Handicapped Children provided or arranged for diagnostic and therapeutic medical, surgical, corrective or other services and care for all eligible children requiring assistance.

The N.H. Bureau of Dental Health once again presented their Dental Disease Prevention Program to our schools. In their program, elementary students were first examined by a state dental hygienist and instructed in proper brushing techniques. Proper flossing was taught to the students in grades 4 and up. The students then carried out daily brushing in school under teacher supervision. There was a fluoride rinse that was used once a week. The purpose of this program was to develop good oral hygiene habits and reduce dental disease.

The Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center was available to our area with a mobile unit used for evaluation of students having failed hearing screenings at school.

Northern Coos Community Health Agency assisted the schools by making available a speech therapist for students who needed this help.

As a reminder, the State Department of Education still requires each child entering our school system to meet the following requirements:

1. Physical Examination
2. Complete diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus vaccine series
3. Complete polio vaccine series
4. Rubella vaccine (German Measles)
5. Rubeola vaccine (Measles)
6. Mumps vaccine.

Pre-school clinics are available in this area to meet the above requirements. For more information and/or clinic dates, call the Northern Coos Community Health Agency at 237-8083.

All of the school health programs were planned to maintain the highest of health standards. As always, they greatly depended upon the support and interest of all parents.

PITTSBURG-CLARKSVILLE TITLE I ESEA

Title I is a federally funded program that features a reading program for grades 1-6 to provide extra help for pupils who need it. That need is established through a national standardized test. Title I also provides for a pre-school program for children who will enter school the following year. Eligibility for entry into the pre-school program is based on a readiness testing standard.

It has been statistically proven that the Title I reading program has helped pupils to reach a grade standard in many cases. Children entering first grade from a pre-school program have been able to make a better social adjustment to school life.

An active Parent Action Group (PAG) benefits any Title I program. Parents are cordially invited to become members of the PAG and to work with us to provide enrichment activities that are not federally funded.

The PAG has sponsored several events for the benefit of Title I. The past year's proceeds were used to purchase materials that were not available due to cuts in federal funding. Presently the PAG is planning to raise money for a field trip for the children.

Hallowe'en, Christmas and Valentine parties are part of the pre-schoolers' extra-curricular activities. During the spring of 1982, they were guests of Debbie and John Amey on a guided tour of the Amey farm.

Workshops offer pertinent information. During the past year an inservice training workshop for parents was conducted by Mrs. Andrea Young, Title I teacher. It was very informative and exceptionally well attended. In March, Debbie Amey, PAG chairperson, and Kate Lord attended an application workshop in Plymouth. Each year Title I parents and staff have the opportunity to attend the Title I Sharing Conference held in various locations around the state.

I wish to thank the elementary teachers, administration and parents who have been most helpful and cooperative.

The goal of Title I is to help a child achieve, gain self-confidence and to become a good school citizen.
