To the Inhabitants of the Town of Strafford in the County of Strafford in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Strafford Elementary School in said Strafford on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
 - 3. To see if the Town will vote to pay \$4.00 per hour for all hourly labor.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$15,350 for the operation of the Police Department. (\$3,000 from Revenue Sharing)
- 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$4,995 for the support of the Rural District Health Council. (\$2,000 from Revenue Sharing)
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$10,000 to maintain the Strafford Recycling Center.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$15,000 toward a fund for the establishment of a refuse center at the present recycling area.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$10,800 for the operation and maintenance of the Town Fire Department. (\$2,000 from Revenue Sharing)
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$4,215 for the following supplies and equipment for the Fire Department:

- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$78,000 for Highways and Bridges.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to allocate \$25,000 of the above appropriation to seal the following sections of roads:
 - 1.0 mi. Rickey Nelson Rd. (Dump Rd.)
 - 1.6 mi. Piper Rd. from Bow Lake Estates to Conroys
 - .8 mi. Wingate Rd. from Leighton Corner to middle of Howard Rd.
 - .8 mi. Canaan Rd. from 202A to Barrington Town Line
 - 1.2 mi 1st Crown Pt. Rd. from Howard Johnsons to Brown

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$6,000 to replace bridge (condemned) on 1st Crown Pt. Rd. across "Big River".
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,500 to "hot top" Lake View Drive (Murray Hill).
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$4,311 as its share to the Center Barnstead Fire Department to provide ambulance service for the Town of Strafford. (\$2,843 from Revenue Sharing)
- 15. To see if the Town will accept Town Road Aid and raise and appropriate \$970.11 to which the State of N.H. will contribute \$6,467.42.
- 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$5,756 for the operation of the Strafford Library. (\$1,000 from Revenue Sharing)
- 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$10,000 for Public Welfare and Old Age Assistance.
- 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200 as a donation to the Bow Lake Community Club to help defray the cost of the 4th of July fireworks display.
- 20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$2,500 for the support of the Recreation Commission. (\$500 from Revenue Sharing)
- 21. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200 for the support of the Conservation Commission.
 - 22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$250 for Civil Defense.
- 23. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$750 to keep Town Map up to date and to authorize the Selectmen to pay the above appropriation out of the Town Reappraisal reserve fund.
- 24. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$1,250 for the appraisal of new subdivisions, new buildings and additions during 1981, and to authorize the Selectmen to pay the above appropriation out of the Town Reappraisal reserve fund.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

- 28. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$8,000 for a cruiser for the Police Department.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and limit the annual increase in spending by the state or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent. (By Petition)
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a Recreation, Conservation and Forestry Lease Agreement from the New Hampshire Water Resources Board to land in Strafford, New Hampshire as shown on a plan entitled "Foss Mill, Isinglass River, Strafford, New Hampshire".
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 for the purchase of a used box trailer to be used at the Recycling Center for temporary storage of newsprint and cardboard.
- 32. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$1,000 for expenses incurred by the Planning Board for the ensuing year.
- 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.
- 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize prepayment of resident taxes and to authorize the tax collector to accept prepayments as provided by RSA 80:1-a.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey property or tax liens acquired by the Town by tax collector's deed by public auction or (advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.
- 36. To see if the Town will grant a 2% discount on taxes paid within ten days of the mailing of the tax bill.
- 37. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

STRAFFORD CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

With the appointment of David Bennett to the Commission, we now have seven members.

Plans have been made for the establishment of a scenic vista and erosion control in the area of the sand pit at the main entrance to the Storer Lot. This will be accomplished by using interest from the trust fund which was set up for the purpose of maintaining this property. Also the boundries have been marked and a forest inventory is in progress.

As will be evident in the Town Warrant, the Commission has been given the opportunity to manage under lease from the Water Resources Board, 18 acres of land at the junction of the Isinglass River and Pleasant Valley Road (Pig Lane). This is a valuable piece of property both historically and ecologically and we would be fortunate to acquire use of it.

At present we are in the process of constructing signs which will identify the Storer, McCabe, and French properties.

As in the past, students from the Strafford School continue to use the Town Forest for field trips.

Again this year we sent a student to Conservation Camp in co-sponsorship with the Strafford Women's Club.

We also reviewed several dredge and fill permits.

The Commission would be interested in hearing from anyone who would like to serve on subcommittees to assist us with our projects or anyone who would be interested in going on a field trip to any of the Commission properties.

We hope you will stop and see the exhibit which we will have on display at the school on Town Meeting Day.

Last year the Hill Library joined RALI (Rochester Area Libraries). From the grant received Hill Library now has available to use all the audio visual materials given to the cooperative. RALI members meet often to talk over their problems, to swap ideas and to find other ways in which they can cooperate to the advantage of each.

Hill Library received \$200 from the Dr. Harold Conrad, Jr. Memorial Fund. With this we purchased 13 sound filmstrips which were used with the Summer story hour. These can be used over and over again and enjoyed.

Your librarian took two more of the Library Techniques courses at the University of New Hampshire. She has attended all the DAC (District Advisory Council) meetings. She is also a member of the New Hampshire Library Association.

It is hoped that all citizens will support the newly proposed library bill coming before the state legislature, that the people of New Hampshire may have the best possible library service. The existence of the Statewide Library card depends upon funding being provided by this bill.

Hill Library still gives out Statewide Library Cards. If we do not have materials you want we can provide them through our service center and the State Library, provided they have them. The Bookmobile is no longer in service in our district

but we have the service of a van which is proving to be equally as good. We aim to give the citizens of Strafford the best possible service with the funds we have available.

REPORT OF THE TOWN GOVERNMENT COMMITTEE

The Strafford Town Government Committee, which was established by vote at the 1980 Town Meeting, has reviewed the various forms of government available for operation of New Hampshire towns and reports the following. There are currently three basic forms of administering towns: Board of Selectmen; Town Manager; and Selectmen with administrative assistant. At this time, the town manager form of government is not economically feasible based on the size of the town and the present scale of government operations. However, the situation that the Town of Strafford is presently in, concerning growth, the administration of regulations, agency coordination, and over-all governmental operation would benefit by the employment of an administrative assistant to the Board of Selectmen.

This conclusion was reached after committee meetings and consultations with governmental specialists within the state. The committee feels that it is unreasonable to expect the Board of Selectmen to effectively operate town government on a part-time basis and adequately discharge their duties and responsibilities. Because of this, we feel that it is in the best interest of the town and its citizenry to compliment the present structure with the expertise and skills of a professionally trained administrative assistant. Based upon research, the committee feels that this can be accomplished for less than twenty thousand dollars, and that the efficiency and effectiveness of this type of structure would more than pay for itself.

There is no specific reference to administrative assistants within New Hampshire statutes. Administrative assistants have no statutory authority; only responsibilities assigned by the Board of Selectmen. In no case, however, may the Board delegate its authority to the administrative assistant. In essence, the Board of Selectmen, should they appoint an administrative assistant, retain all authority granted it by statute, with the administrative assistant carrying out responsibilities assigned by the Board. The following is a list of responsibilities and duties being carried out by professional administrators in New Hampshire municipalities. These are provided as examples only:

Establish procedure for and coordinating all purchasing to include the review of all requisitions and the drafting of specifications for competitive bid.

Coordinate the preparation of the budget, its daily administration, and analyze expenditures and report potential problems.

Coordinate the daily administrative functions of the town, serve as liaison between the Selectmen and the different town agencies; handle advertising and legal requirements for all departments and committees, coordinate the preparation of agreements, easements, rights-of ways, and land use.

Supervise the preparation of the annual report and Warrant.

Answer and relay complaints to appropriate departments or committees.

Coordinate with the Road Agent, capital budget for and schedule major improvements, and review with Road Agent the seasonal or cyclical scheduling of road maintenance.

Arrange meetings at request of Selectmen; represent Selectmen; monitor activities of committees appointed by Selectmen; prepare press releases.

Maintain a log of activities together with results and pending actions.

Attend all selectmen's meetings, take notes, handle correspondence.

Handle complaints from public, refer to proper authorities.

Follow through on all projects as selectmen's representative.

Attend meetings as selectmen's representative in Concord.

Selectmen's calendar alerter, keep operation running smoothly.

Be on alert for new and better methods for the more efficient and effective operation of our town.

Explain.

This is a brief outline of what administrative assistants are doing in other towns. This form of assistance to standard governmental structures is being recognized by many municipalities as a means by which Boards of Selectmen may obtain the necessary assistance that they need to handle their ever increasing and complex workload.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL, INC. ANNUAL REPORT 1980

The Rural District Health Council continues as a Certified Home Health Agency covering nine towns - six in Strafford County and three in Rockingham County.

Many long hours of research and organization was done by selectmen and concerned citizens of the towns from 1966 until the first visit was made on May 5, 1969.

The priority service is the care of the sick program which includes visiting nurses,

physical therapist, occupational therapist, speech therapist and home health aides, providing visits in the patient's home. The agency also has contracts for home health aide with the Strafford County Home Health Aide program and Portsmouth Area Home Health Aide program.

A Maternal & Child Health program is offered to all children from any of the member towns, and includes physicals, immunizations, teaching and counseling for ages 0-6 years. It also provides home visits to the newborns on request and any follow-up care as requested by physicians.

A Dental program is also provided by the MCH Program and the Pre-School Dental Services and is held for children 3-6 years, which includes cleaning, and flouride treatments twice a year with referrals to local dentists for follow-up care when needed. The program also works closely with the Women & Infant Children Nutrition Program and the Strafford County Prenatal & Family Planning Program.

The agency also holds monthly adult health maintenance program which provides blood pressure checks, diabetic and anemia screenings, nutrition counseling and special diets and weight control.

The first and third Wednesdays screenings are held at the Town Hall in Farmington for the towns of Farmington, Middleton, and New Durham. The second Wednesday they are held at the Town Hall in Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield, Barrington and Strafford; the fourth Wednesday they are held in Milton at the Milton Health Center. They all start at 1:00 p.m. and continue until all patients are seen - the program is open to any one in the area. Within the next grant year, the agency looks to providing an ongoing program in Barrington area.

The Rural District Health Council cooperates with other agencies in the area to provide a continuation of good health and social services to its member towns.

The agency with the cooperation of Frisbie Hospital provides a discharge referral coordinator who assists the social services department at the hospital and the patient's physicians to continue care as needed from the hospital to the patient's home. The hospital funds this program in part with the council.

The strength of the Council lies with the dedicated staff who many times devote themselves above and beyond the call of duty reflecting the nurse who cares for people. Staff nurses providing service within the care of the sick program are Barbara Drew, R.N.; Myrtle Walsh, R.N.; Elizabeth Coons, R.N.; Dorothy Demmons, R.N.; and Mary Timmons, R.N.; also acting as part-time supervisor. Arlene Thorne, R.N.; is coordinator of the Maternal Child Health program and Paula Davis, R.N.; as clinic nurse and Elderly Screening Coordinator. Jean Germer, R.N., is the Discharge Coordinator. Joan Menez, LPN is part-time where needed and Alice Ziegra, R.N.; part-time. Home Health Aide services are provided by Gail LaRosa and Renee Wormell. Junellen Chase handles the office duties as Administrative Assistant

The Board of Directors has voted to decrease the per capita cost by \$.20 with a result of \$3.00 per capita for the fiscal year 1981. Many factors contributed to the decision. This year the agency has experienced in depth evaluation of our financial

status, having reviewed both expenditures and income sources. The Ad Hoc Committee was appointed and met frequently throughout the year; "after careful study the Committee recommends that no charge be made to participants of the Child Health Program". However, the Board voted to attempt a pilot study of asking for a \$2.00 donation at clinic sites, a \$1.00 donation will be asked for office visits and a donation for the Elderly Screening Clinics, all effective January 1, 1981.

The Board voted to become a United Way Agency; the grant was increased for the Maternal & Child Health Program through the efforts of the Community Health Care Association. The Agency also has an increase in the State Council on Aging grant and the Referral Coordinator. The total population has increased 751 residents. With this added income the Finance Committee feels the Council can continue to provide the many needed services to its member towns.

Home Health Agencies are delivering relatively inexpensive care to rural residents who might otherwise have no access to such care.

During the past year the Council has made for your town 156 skilled nursing visits, 85 home health aide visits, and 36 therapy visits; there have been 34 child health home visits and 68 children have attended the Child Health Program.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION - 1980

Harmony Anderson, an experienced elementary school teacher and qualified water safety instructor, conducted swimming lessons at the Bow Lake Dam in 1980. 89 students enrolled in the classes, which were conducted in two four-week sessions on weekdays in July and August. Mrs. Anderson voluntarily added a special early morning class for adult beginners, which was appreciated. Viki Tucker was again the weekend guard, and this season our budget allowed for weekday guarding during lesson time through the busy month of July. This added to the safety of the beach. Fees for lessons were increased to \$5 per child and \$12 per family this season, which increased our revenue by \$180.

The crib dock of telephone poles constructed with the special recreation fund monies in the Fall of 1979 received good usage. It appears to be a useful addition to our public water access facilities.

We plan no innovations for 1981 and our budget reflects this. We make no attempt to conduct year-round activities, which appear to be met by other citizen-led groups and individuals. Meetings of the Recreation Commission, which are held periodically, are open to the public and members of the Commission welcome suggestions from town's people.

The Strafford County Community Action Program conducted a soccer program and several trips for Strafford youngsters during the summer vacation period in 1980. Denny Thorne and Bernice Omand were the contact persons.

STRAFFORD SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES - 1979-1980

The major purpose of our health education program is to develop attitudes and behaviors which will promote physical and mental health. Nutrition, safety, disease prevention, life education, smoking, drugs and alcohol are a few of the essentials. This information should help make the student aware of the values of good health, in a healthy environment, and stimulate a personal commitment to, and responsibility for, maintaining and improving the health of all people.

Our student enrollment will be reaching the 250 mark in the fall of 1980. Any increase in our student body will increase the demands on the health service, first aid and classroom education. The nurse's time needs to be increased to three days now and full time in a year or two. Any new addition to our building needs to include larger health facilities and showers.

Yearly programs were carried out during the school year and included health screenings, vision and hearing, programs on safety, nutrition, dental care, hygiene, smoking, drugs, alcohol and life education.

The SAY sponsored the dental prophylaxic clinic and students K-8, totaling 122 students received cleanings and fluoride. The purchase of "Winnie the Pooh - Nutrition and You", by this organization added to our film library. Our thanks for their constant interest and support in our students.

Austin Cate Academy also added three new film strips to our health films,

"Safety Through the Year", "Donald's Fire Survival Plan", and "Careful with Strangers".

A scoliosis screening was held in grades 5-8 with 114 students checked.

Two clinics were held, with vaccines provided through the Rural District Health Council. Students received protection against DT, polio, measles, mumps, rubella and TB skin tests.

My position as school nurse for the past ten and a half years has been a rewarding experience and I leave with appreciation to all. Especially, my thanks to our great student body and staff members who have made working with them such a pleasure!

In August, 1980, I requested the State Department of Education to conduct an evaluation of all Elementary Schools in School Administrative Unit No. 44 in order to determine our present state of compliance with the State Department of Education's document entitled, Approved New Hampshire Elementary Schools, k-8. The purpose of this request was to utilize State Department services to obtain information which we could use as a point of reference at the local level in determining education goals for the system. The State Department among other recommendations suggested a thorough examination of present library services with particular attention being given to space and staff. Additional recommendations included: reviewing the pupil/teacher ratio in grade 2 and in grade 7 and funding part time positions for a guidance counselor and a secretary. The evaluation placed the Strafford Elementary School in category II which means that the school has complied with 90% of the State Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools.

Special Education continues to emerge as a particularly significant challenge to local school districts across the Nation as a result of Federal Law PL 94-142 and Strafford is no exception to this trend. During the course of the past several years, the School District has attempted to meet its obligation in this particular area. The high degree of support that these programs have received from the School District, the School Board, Administration and teaching staff is extremely evident and has resulted in the development of appropriate programming for the children. Specifically, as taxpayers and citizens you should be aware of the high degree of professional competence and dedication possessed by your Special Education teachers. The development of such support programs as those for children with special needs can only occur in a system where there is a high degree of professional sensitivity, awareness and co-

operation among the administration, specialists and classroom faculty. Mr. Boyle and the entire staff are to be commended for their cooperation and mutual support.

As the reader will note, there is an article in the warrant to see if the District wishes to establish a study committee to assist the School Board in determining the feasibility of Austin Cate Academy being purchased by the School District. I am in full support of this article for a number of reasons: 1) the School District is in immediate need of six additional classrooms and 2) based on the information that I have received as of this date, the tentative provisions of the potential sale by the Board of Trustees to the School District represents an outstanding opportunity for the Strafford School system. In summary the School District is in a position to more than satisfy immediate space requirements and to receive additional income through a combination of leasing sections of the facilities to the Strafford Learning Center and through the creation of a regional middle school, grades 7 through 9 with surrounding school districts which will generate additional revenue and provide an excellent atmosphere for our children. I strongly support the warrant article.

In closing, on behalf of the School Administrative Unit No. 44 Central Office staff, I wish to express our continued appreciation to the members of the School Board, the principal, teachers and citizens for the cooperation exhibited and progress achieved this past year. We look forward to a long and productive relationship in which our mutual goals will continue to be the best possible education for our young people.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE STRAFFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT March 11 and 18, 1980

At a legal meeting of the School District of the Town of Strafford, inhabitants qualified to vote in district affairs met at the Strafford Elementary School in said district on the 11th day of March, 1980 and elected the following officers:

Officers Erma Clark, Sandra Pierce and Elizabeth Carlson were sworn in by Moderator David Merserve.

The meeting was continued on March 18, 1980 and was called to order by Moderator David Merserve.

ARTICLE 1. School Board members Erma Clark and Edward Wingren distributed copies of the major increases in the 80-81 budget. Edward Wingren explained the hand out, then stated the Board would answer any questions from the floor.

Mark Thompson requested an explanation of the added teacher position. Edward Wingren explained the Board felt there may be a need to split the 80-81 school year fourth grade as this class is large at the present time.

George Waldron asked what percent is the increase to the teachers salaries. Edward Wingren replied they budgeted for a 6% plus one increment. This would be an average of a 10% increase over the present salary.

George Waldron stated he had figured the Principal's salary had increased 10% over last year. The Special Education Teacher's salary had a 14% increase over last year. The janiotr had received a 4.6% increase for last year and this year the Board had proposed an increase of 10 hours per week but had recommended a decrease in the hourly rate.

Erma Clark replied the Board had to hire someone to do work that could be done by a full time custodian.

The question was raised what are the hours of the present custodian and does the Board have a role description?

Erma Clark answered the present contract lists some duties but does not include things like mowing lawns.

Geroge Waldron stated when he was hired for the position he was told it was between five and six hours per day.

Dr. Fredrick Shiere, School Board Member, stated the present position was part time. Because of this there were things that needed to be done. The Board has been paying to have the mowing, painting, building shelving, etc. done by other contracted people. Their intent was to hire some one full time so these duties could be included in the position.

Albert Leighton asked clarification as to the hours per week and the number of weeks per year for the proposed full time position.

Erma Clark replied 40 hours per week 50 work weeks and 2 weeks paid vacation.

George Waldron pointed out he had figured the hourly rate at present was

\$4.29 for a thirty hour week. The proposed 40 hour week would be \$4.08 per hour. He stated he would be willing to continue in the position next year at the same rate if everyone else employed by the school would also agree to stay at the same rate as present. However, he did not feel it was fair to ask him to take a cut in pay.

Erma Clark replied when the Board made up their budget they had contacted other schools in the area to find out what they were paying their custodians. For example Rochester is paying their head custodian \$8,500.00 per year and this is the amount the Board has proposed for the position this year.

Mark Thompson moved the janitor's position remain at 30 hours per week and the salary be increased to \$7,370.00. This was seconded and voted in the affirmative.

Paul St. Clair spoke in favor of increasing the teachers salary and asked how much a substitute received per day.

Katrina Rhodes stated she wanted to clarify that the teachers were receiving a 6% increase and the step was automatic for doing a good job. It doesn't mean that it is a 10% cost of living increase.

Erma Clark replied the step was not necessarily automatic and she felt that the increase was all the town could afford.

Moderator David Merserve requested the Board clarify the salary scale.

Edward Wingren answered the salary scale contained ten steps. The teachers usually received one step per year. A teacher with one years experience would probably be on step one.

John O'Brien asked if it was based on longevity or merit:

Erma Clark replied merit.

Steve Pike asked if the step was considered cost of living raise, longevity, merit or whatever?

Erma Clark explained the salary scale was originally set up long before any of the present members were on the Board but she understood the reason it was adopted was to include the cost of living raise, however, the teachers have requested additional raises each year for the last several years.

George Waldron stated he had calculated the raises for the teachers for the last few years from the Town Report as 1977 8-10%, 1978 10-14%, 1979 10%, 1980 10%, this figure included the step.

Albert Leighton stated he calculated an increase in teachers salary since 1976 as a 50% increase.

ARTICLE 2. David Merserve read the article and inquired if there was any business to be conducted under this article. Since there was none the article was passed.

ARTICLE 3. Edward Wingren moved the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$484,154.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. This was seconded.

Katrina Rhodes questioned why the total proposed figure was the same as the motion since the janitor's salary had been changed.

Erma Clark replied the Board may have to hire contracted services.

Steve Pike asked what the per pupil expenditure of Strafford was and how it compared to other schools.

Superintendent Barry Clough answered, the present school year's figures were not available as it was not completed at this time. The per pupil expenditure for Strafford Elementary School for the 78-79 school year was \$839.95. Compared to other schools in the state it was 148th out of 154 school districts in New Hampshire or seven schools in the state were below Strafford in their per pupil expenditures.

Steve Pike asked where Strafford School ranked in quality of their education. David Merserve answered Strafford students had done well on testing and he

felt it was generally agreed the students were receiving a good education.

Paul St. Clair moved teachers salaries be increased to 11% plus increment. Moderator David Merserve explained a dollar figure was needed before the chair could accept an admendment to the motion.

John O'Brien moved to admend the motion to increase the amount to \$489,154. and the \$5,000.00 be added to the teachers salaries. This was seconded. An aye/nay vote was not a clear vote. Moderator Dave Merserve requested a hand vote. This appeared to be a tie, he requested a second show of hands and designated two people to help count the vote. The vote was 18 yes, 23 no. The admendment was delcared defeated.

There was no more discussion on the motion. Moderator David Meserve called for a vote on the motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$484,154.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of the school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligation of the district. This was carried and declared passed.

ARTICLE 4. Erma Clark moved the district create the office of Assistant Treasurer to perform the duties of the office whenever the person holding office of Treasurer shall by reason of illness, accident, absence from the state, or other cause, becomes temporarily incapacitated and unable to perform the duties of his office, said Assistant Treasurer to be appointed by the Moderator and to hold office until the next district meeting and thereafter to be elected annually with other district officers. This was seconded, no discussion. Voted and declared in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. Edward Wingren moved the district authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may not or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or state agencies. This was seconded. No discussion. Voted and declared in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. Edward Wingren pointed out that the cost of printing the Town Report has increased. He asked George Waldron what it cost this year. Mr. Waldron replied they purchased 700 copies at \$1.56 each which was approximately \$13.00 per page. Mr. Wingren asked if some of the material be printed on the school duplicating machine and distributed with the Town Report or if the reports should be printed entirely in the Town Report next year.

John O'Brien moved the printing in the Town Report be cut and the money saved be used to increase the teacher's salary. The motion was not seconded.

Roger Leighton pointed out the school district did not pay to have the printing done. The Town of Strafford paid for the printing of the Town Report.

Fredrick Shiere suggested the Board be instructed by the voters present to investigate naming the portion of the Provence Road to Range Road now known as the New Road, the Ricky Nelson Road after Strafford's eighth grade student who had recently died.

Roger Leighton, selectman, stated there was a procedure that had to be followed

when a road is named. At the present time the town did not officially name the roads. He stated he would investigate the procedure and if it required a vote of the town at Town Meeting, the selectmen would present it at that time.

George Waldron requested a clarification of encumbered funds and asked why the Town of Strafford had to transfer to the School District of Strafford all monies due them on or before June 30th each year. He stated the selectmen had to borrow money to pay the school district. The financial statement of page 57 of the Town Report shows interest income of \$77.77, the selectmen are paying more interest charges than is being received. The taxpayers of the town are paying unnecessary expense.

Mr. Barry Clough explained for the 1978-79 school year the Strafford School District had obligations of \$20,014.00. This included \$3,144.46 outstanding purchase orders, \$12,942.34 tuition payments due, \$1,205.20 special education transportation due, \$1,630.00 repairs, \$50.00 sports program, \$600.00 utilities, \$442.00 vocational transportation due. He explained tuition bills usually did not come to the Board for payment until after the books were closed as this would be for the last quarter of the school year which ended in June. The other items were approved commitments by the Board but the bills may not have been received and had not been approved for payment. Including the sum of \$1,532.00 due to the district for vocational transportation reimbursement the surplus was \$9,830.00. He offered to show Mr. Waldron the report after the meeting.

A speaker moved to adjourn the meeting at 8:45 p.m. This was seconded and voted in the affirmative.
