

Commissioner's Report

In accordance with the Public Law of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Sullivan County, herewith present the anual report of the County Commissioners, the County Home and House of Correction, Treasurer, Auditors, Solicitor, Clerk of Court, Sheriff, Chaplain, and the Physician of the County Home for the year ending December 31, 1939.

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

Once more Sullivan County Commissioners submit their annual report for the year 1939 and it is a pleasure in many ways since we have been fortunate enough during the past year to live within our budget. No major changes were made in the county's policies of the past, but many minor improvements have been instituted which have contributed to further improvements of your county government. Being aware of the increasing wide-spread public interest in county government, we are making our report as completely detailed as possible in order that everyone may have a better understanding of the functions carried on in their county.

December 31, 1939 brings to an end another decade of county business. We believe it would be appropriate to submit some graphs in our report showing the comparisons for this decade.

COUNTY HOME

We wish to express our deep appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Grout, superintendent and matron of the county home, for their very efficient economical and humane supervision of the Home during the past year. We also wish to express our appreciation for the conscientious and faithful services of the chaplain, physician, and all connected with the Home.


No major improvements were made at the Home during the past year. General repairs were made to present buildings. A ramp was built to the second floor of the hospital, thus eliminating a great deal of difficulty in handling ambulance patients. This also provides a means of getting the old and infirm patients out of doors in proper weather.

In the middle of the summer the carpenter shop was practically destroyed by fire and this has been replaced with no additional expense other than what was received from the insurance.

The hospital section of the institution has carried an overload at all times, but at no time have the patients not received the excellent care that the home is noted for. A diet kitchen is badly needed if we are to continue treating as severe cases of illness as we have in the past year. Previous to this time most of our patients were of a chronic nature and did not require special diets.

From time to time it has been called to our attention by the State Board of Health that the sewerage system at the county home, which is made up of three rock trenches on top of the ground, did not meet with the state laws. November 7, 1939, we received a letter from the State Board of Health condemning our sewerage system and requesting that it be corrected as soon as weather and seasonable conditions would permit. A little later your board received a personal call from Charles D. Howard, Director of Division, Chemist and Sanitarian of the State Board who informed us that we must put in a septic tank and possibly filter beds within the coming year agreeable to the State Board of Health. At the present time the sewerage system is being studied and it is hoped that a new system can be installed without causing too large an outlay in money by the county.

The following bar graph covers an interesting comparison of the operating costs of the County Home for a period of ten years. It is interesting to note that the major jump in operating expenses took place in 1932, the year following the completion of the new alms house.




Comparative Costs of Operation of the County Home

WELFARE AND RELIEF

The relief situation is still the major problem of the county. For the past year all relief investigations have been made by your board of commissioners. We believe that this work carried on by us has been one of the major reasons for effecting a substantial decrease in the expenditures of poor relief off the farm. The carrying out of this work has increased the burdens of the commissioners tremendously and we believe it should be done for the best interest of the county. All continued reduction in this item can only be made by the untiring cooperation of industries and taxpayers who so willingly furnish requested information to us. If all relief clients would tell the truth when they are applying for aid, it would be an easy matter to decide what to do. More often a very good sounding story when ferreted out proves to be entirely different. There is also a great deal of relief given to families who seemingly in the public eye, could well take care of themselves but for the fact that the wage earner will not, or for other reasons does not provide the necessary support. Usually this wage earner would have been refused relief or sent to the farm to work, but for the fact that the other helpless members of his family would be made to suffer for the lack of responsibility of those who should give the support. At the present time there has been no satisfactory solution to the above situation, but we have tried to use our best judgment in such cases at all times.


We have been able during the year to effect a long needed change in the quarters of the relief office in Newport. Previous to this time, we had one small room which was used by the Board of County Commissioners, County Treasurer, and two or more stenographers as well as being used for interviewing relief clients. The new quarters consist of two rooms connected by a large hallway and a waiting room. One of the rooms is being used as a business office and the other as a conference room. This arrangement has proved very satisfactory.

The following circle graph depicts an average direct relief dollar and its proportions in the various towns. It is interesting to compare this graph with an average county tax dollar graph listed under Finances.

The following bar graph showing the comparative cost of direct relief over a period of 10 years is particularly interesting. The amount of unemployment for certain years was the major cause of its great variation.




Comparative Cost of Direct Relief Over a Period of Ten Years

CHILDREN

At the present time we are boarding in private homes and institutions 80 children. The amount of board is fixed by the State Board of Welfare and Relief at \$18.00 per month for those from three to sixteen years of age and at \$20.00 per month for infants under three years. The placing of these children is largely recommended by the State Board of Welfare and the N. H. Children's Aid and Protective Society working in conjunction with the State Board. This item has proven over a period of years to be rapidly increasing. We do not see any chance for a reduction in the future and therefore believe the public should carefully think the problem through. We do, however, feel that the expenditures are likely to pay eventually dividends to the tax payers of the county in the form of better citizens and less crime.

The following graph shows practically a steady increase over a period of ten years, or an increase from 1930 to 1940 of \$13,610.86.

W.P.A.


We have sponsored a men's WPA project at the Sullivan County Home for about thirty workers. This project has been twofold in its benefits; first, by giving work to men who would have required relief, and second, by improving the County Home. At no time have we worked at MADE WORK on various projects in order to give employment. We have a WPA Sewing Project for twenty-one women in Claremont and are co-sponsors of like projects with the selectmen of the towns of Newport and Sunapee which give employment to thirty-two women. On all three sewing projects we have endeavored at all times to place women who have had to take over the responsibility of being the major bread winner for the family. The clothing from these projects has been distributed among the relief and border line cases of our county. As long as we continue to place people that would be expensive relief cases on these projects, it is a financially sound policy for the county to continue these projects.

SURPLUS COMMODITIES

A surplus commodities depot has been operated throughout the year with regular deliveries in the county. These commodities are bought by the Federal Government to relieve the surplus in the markets and are sent to our depot for distribution to the needy. The county only pays for the distribution of these commodities. This program is entirely carried on by the county with both town and county cases receiving the benefits.


FINANCES

As may be seen by the balance sheet, the county closed the year of 1939 with all bills paid that were presented and had a very substantial balance on hand to begin the year 1940. We wish to thank the County Delegation for their cooperation in adopting the budget that has made this possible. We have again borrowed money for the year 1939 at an even lower rate than it ever was possible to before. It may be noted by the chart for net indebtedness that upon an adoption of a "pay-as-you-go" basis it has, with the exception of one year, continued to bring the net debt constantly down. The major jump in net indebtedness in the year 1930 and 1931 was due to the construction of the new alms house.




The Comparative Net Indebtedness Over a Period of Ten Years

Report of Superintendent of County Home

1939

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of Sullivan County:

We had hoped that during the past year our expenses would not be as great but owing to conditions over which we had no control we again found it necessary to expend money for repairs, construction, and much needed equipment.

As a protective measure we felt it expedient to have the jail equipment thoroughly overhauled. The cell doors were adjusted, a full set of up-to-date locks put on all doors, and one new steel door installed between the prisoners' dining-room and the corridor. This required the services of an expert repair-man from the factory, at a cost of about five hundred dollars.

The dam at the old reservoir has been in bad condition for a long time and it was necessary to completely reinforce this, which was done by building forms and placing about one foot of cement on the inside of the old dam. The dam was raised about two feet, increasing the capacity by several thousand gallons.

The plank floors in all the bull-pens had to be replaced with cement and this meant labor and the cost of cement.

The ramp in the rear of the new building, mentioned in our last report, has been completed with the aid of the W.P.A. workers and is a great help in transporting patients to and from the hospital. It is now possible to get some of the patients outdoors in wheel chairs.

An unforeseen expense was incurred by the fire which completely burned the interior of the carpenter shop, damaging the machinery, ruining all the belting, etc. The building has been entirely renovated at considerable expense and with much labor, as new windows, doors, belting, and some new shafting and pulleys were required. Previous to the fire we had started the foundation for a two-story addition to the carpenter shop, 42x24 feet, to be used as a machinery-repair and paint shop. This has been completed, necessitating the purchase of cement, windows, doors, steel roofing and hardware.

In the new building many of the walls in the basement, as well as in some of the rooms on the upper floors, have been a source of trouble because of the plaster falling, and these walls have been re-plastered and painted, with attendant expense.

A full set of aluminum dishes has been purchased for the men's dining-room, as the breakage of the old dishes was great and meant frequent replacements.

As usual, some new equipment had to be procured in order that we might be able to care for our increasing population. The old bake-oven was almost useless after about twenty years of service, so a new one was installed.

Four adjustable beds were bought for the hospital, as they were needed to help care for the increasing number of bed patients. Our hospital has been filled to capacity during the past year.

The operating room has been moved to a more central location on the hospital floor, making it more accessible to the men's ward. This change has given us a large sunny front room where we can accommodate four patients.

All the metal equipment in the operating room has been enameled and the sterilizer reconditioned.

We have had fewer inmates and prisoners and more boarders this year. This has lowered the number of weeks board for County charges. Our actual income is much higher, partly because of the increased income from boarders. Our inventory is lower and this fact makes the per capita cost appear higher than last year, but the cost to the County is much less. Our income is about \$4000 more than last year, making the actual cost to the County less than in 1938.

We would like to take this occasion to express to the Commissioners our gratitude for their unfailing help and advice. We feel that they have done their utmost to make the past year a successful one.

Again we wish to thank all who have sent flowers and magazines and furnished entertainment to our patients, and to all others who have helped our work here we are sincerely grateful.



North Charlestown, N. H., Jan. 29, 1940

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

Gentlemen:

My services as chaplain at the County Home began May the seventh, nineteen hundred and thirty-nine.

After the worship service the chaplain and his wife are afforded another spiritual uplift and sense of happiness by spending an hour visiting in the hospital and in the rooms of the under-privileged. We believe a splendid service is being rendered by the County to a needy group of men and women.

I have officiated at one funeral service. The hearty cooperation of the Superintendent and Matron together with all others who have assisted us in our efforts as chaplain, is deeply appreciated.

Physician's Report

Claremont, N. H., January 1, 1940

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

Gentlemen:

I submit the following report as physician to the Sullivan County Home.

There were thirty-four deaths all of which were due to a chronic disease. There were thirty-one births. This is ten more than the largest number of births in any previous year.

The number of inmates needing constant medical and nursing care has increased during the year. Many more persons acutely sick have been brought to Home for care and treatment. For these reasons I believe that it is necessary to employ more nurses. I recommend that no more obstetric cases be taken to the Home as it is no longer possible to care for them safely because of the danger of infection due to the crowded condition and lack of sufficient number of nurses. There has been no serious case of puerperal infection as yet, but conditions are such at the present time that it is not advisable to continue the obstetric service.
