WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Finance committee recommend \$3,500.00.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept special State Aid for highways and appropriate money for the same.

Finance committee recommend \$1,000.00.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for bridges and appropriate money for same.

Finance committee recommend article to be passed.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and breaking snow for the ensuing year.

Finance committee recommend \$5,500.00.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing and building bridges.

Finance committee recommend \$1,000.00.

7. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 for cutting bushes along the highway.

Finance committee recommend \$300.00.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day observance.

Finance committee recommend \$20.00.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,050.00 for maintenance of Trunk Line.

Finance committee recommend \$2,050.00.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Blister Rust destruction.

Finance committee recommend \$300.00.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library.

Finance committee recommend \$200.00.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the services of a Community Nurse.

Finance committee recommend \$500.00.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying snow removal equipment and appropriate money for same.

Finance committee recommend \$700.00.

15. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and appropriate money for same.

Finance committee recommend the article be passed.

16. To see if the town will vote to discontinue pieces of Trunk Line highway made obsolete by the construction of the cement road.

Finance committee recommend this article.

17. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the (Gilman road) so-called, leading from the main highway near the residence of Alva Davis to the Ossipee town line.

18. To see if the town will vote to allow boxing exhibitions.

19. To see if the town will vote to approve the (Sunday sports bill) so-called, as adopted by the General Court.

Finance committee recommend this article.

20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for an unemployment fund to be expended on highways under the supervision of the selectmen.

Finance committee recommend \$700.00.

21. To see if the town will vote to elect a finance committee for the ensuing year.

22. To see if the town will instruct the Town Clerk to place the name of any legal voter on the ballot

for the annual March meeting, for the office he or she may wish to run for by the payment of one dollar, said name to be filed at least six days before the meeting exclusive of the day of filing and election day.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To the Citizens of Tamworth:

After looking over the school registers we are led to believe that a large majority of our voters do not visit our schools and for their benefit we give them the following information:

Within the last decade slate blackboards have been put in every schoolhouse in town. Heaters have been installed at Chocorua, Bennett's Corner, Whittier, and South Tamworth. New seats have been put in at Chocorua, the high school, grammar room, and the Downs' school. Chemical toilets have been provided for the village school, South Tamworth, Whittier, Chocorua, and Downs' school. A hot air furnace has been installed at the village school. Every school is provided with electric lights except Bennett's Corner. A fire escape has been put on the village schoolhouse. "Sure Stops" have been installed in several of the

schoolhouses. Galvanized iron has been put on the Chocorua, Downs, Whittier, South Tamworth, and Bennett's Corner buildings. Play grounds have been provided and fenced at the village school, South Tamworth, Whittier, Chocorua, and Bennett's Corner, requiring the procuring of land at South Tamworth, Bennett's Corner and Whittier.

These are improvements that are of a permanent nature and will not need replacement for a long period of years. In view of these facts, we do not ask for appropriations for new equipment, nothing for new building or alteration, and only a small amount for repairs, \$300.00, this year. We extend a cordial invitation to all citizens to visit and inspect our school buildings.

The Department of Education advises us that there is a general cut in teachers' salaries throughout the state, and as we are working in conjunction with the state, we have decided to cut the teachers' salaries \$450 in the aggregate. And as we feel if others receive reduction in pay so should the school officials. The School Board and Treasurer are given a 20% cut. Of course, this is up to the district, but it is our suggestion.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Tamworth:

I herewith submit my ninth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Citizens of Tamworth are to be congratulated for so generously supporting the finances of the school

district. Your schools are in good condition. Pupils passing from these schools are successful in other places. Those going on to complete work in higher institutions have been successful—several becoming excellent teachers. Let us guard the interests of our schools.

Our high school, under the faithful care of Principal Hatch, is preparing a class of ten to go to other institutions. The entire class is planning to complete high school. This is a fine record and citizens should feel pride in such a result. In addition to regular class work, the high school holds literary meetings, conducts athletic contests and is working to develop an orchestra.

The list of teachers and schools follows:

Osman P. Hatch at the High School has 14 pupils.

Edwin A. Blackey at the Grammar School has 27 pupils.

Mavis O. Corbett at the Primary School has 14 pupils.

Etta R. Thurston at the Downs' School has 16 pupils.

Anna M. Lein at the Chocorua School has 21 pupils.

Grace E. Shannon at the Pequaket School has 10 pupils.

Alice R. Whiting at Bennett's Corner School has 11 pupils.

Lula M. Ball at the South Tamworth School has 28 pupils.

Estella M. White at Whittier School has 17 pupils.

Statistics

For the year ending June 30, 1931, we had an average attendance of 149, an average membership of 159 and a per cent. of attendance of 94. We have more pupils enrolled. We have a lower per cent. of

attendance than we should. In a recent average of attendance for 18 weeks of the current year no town in the supervisory district had less than 95%. Tamworth had 96.99%. We seem to be improving this year.

Schools having an attendance last year of 95% or above were as follows:

- Whittier, 98.03 per cent.
- Pequaket, 96.00 per cent.
- Chocorua, 96.00 per cent.
- Tamworth Grammar, 95.59 per cent.
- Bennett's Corner, 95.00 per cent.
- Tamworth Primary, 95.00 per cent.

Health Work

The health work is now under the care of the school nurse, Miss Ruth S. Langille. A dental clinic held at South Tamworth was well attended. We are trying to stress especially this year health habits, first aid, evil effects of alcohol and correction of dental defects. Parents should cooperate in all these efforts.

School Property

The school board still continues its wise policy of keeping the property in good condition. This year electric lights have been installed at Downs and Pequaket, a heater has been placed at Bennett's Corner, Chocorua has been improved by a cement walk and steps. Inside, a steel ceiling and walls well painted add much to the condition of the room. Slate blackboards have been ordered for South Tamworth, Bennett's Corner and Downs. This will provide all schools with suitable slate. All schools have electric lights except Bennett's Corner which is not on an electric line. Screens were provided at Whittier and Bennett's Corner. They should be provided at the Village next year.

Fire escapes were provided at the Village, making exit safer for children in case of fire.

Our buildings and grounds are in commendable condition.

I recommend that Great Hill schoolhouse be sold as there are no children in that section of the town.
