SELECTMANS COMMENTS 2020 Town Report Troy, New Hampshire

There's very little positive spin on much of what happened in 2020. However, our strength is in our community. To paraphrase Queen Elizabeth II "...times such as these, I am reminded that our nation's history has been forged by people and communities coming together to work as one, concentrating our combined efforts with a focus on the common goal."

The fact that the Town of Troy remained relatively unscathed and we remained relatively free to come and go as we pleased seems like a pale consolation when compared to the dramatic limitations and difficulties experienced by friends and family in other parts of the country.

The Town of Troy, at this writing, un-audited, appears to have underspent its approved Operating Budget in 2020 by approximately 1% despite significant over runs in a few places. We attribute this largely to improved financial management within the Office of the Select Board by our Town Administrator, Mary Guild. We also believe that Mary's diligence in clearing up internal processes within the office has been instrumental in improving the Budget Committee's process this year which should pay us dividends in coming years by allowing the Select Board and other Departments & Committees to move forward in developing things like a much-needed Capital Improvement Plan, etc. The Select Board would bring to your special attention a change in Warrant Article 5 and three additional Warrant Articles.

On the recommendation of our Auditors and the NHDRA, Article 5 has been changed from prior years and now includes the Water & Sewer Commission Budget, previously this has been a separate article. This may look like a massive jump however it is simply a consolidation of two items into one.

We have on our Warrant a Bonding Article for Broadband installation town wide. The structure of this Bond is such that it will have no foreseeable tax impact on the Town of Troy. We strongly recommend this Article be passed. If nothing else, we have all learned the critical need for improved internet access coming out of 2020.

We have a Warrant Article again raising money to repair the Warehouse at the Depot. We approved this article last year however last year's Article lapsed at year end not having been fully expended, so this is not additional money, but the previously approved unexpended amount needed to wrap the project up.

We have had a Warrant Article for a new Ambulance proposed by the Selectmen and deleted at the Budget Hearing now two years running. The expense of purchasing and outfitting an Ambulance is daunting to say the least and our existing equipment is entering its "sunset years" having out lasted its functional life expectancy by a decade or more. Because of our experience of overusing equipment as an organization the Select Board has recommended more than the cheapest possible but by no means the most expensive option. We all *will need* this service at some point. Unfortunately, when pressed we have not been adequately able to answer the following questions about an ambulance purchase: *Why would a used Class I vehicle not be acceptable at 35-45% of the cost of new?; What is the foreseeable plan for staffing as the pool of trained individuals available to work continues to decline?; Is there a point and is it foreseeable at which the town should simply sign a contract for services like Swanzey?; What are the exact purchase/leasing terms and can they be amended to fit NHDRA guidelines?; Is there an administrative aspect to the service that if enhanced would enhance billing and result in overlooked revenues to the town and would it be cost effective to address?* It is apparent from these and other questions too numerous to list here that the Select Board has an obligation to pursue this issue in detail in the coming months before coming to the Town for a vote.

We have vacancies on many boards and committees, and we need your help for a diverse and prosperous Troy future. We had the opportunity to speak with over thirty news outlets earlier this year about other matters and almost all were interested, confused, and perplexed by our form of government by Town Meeting. Our form of governance is as close to pure democracy as possible; please vote, please participate.

TOWN TREASURER'S REPORT

The Town of Troy cash flow for the year 2020 was extremely low. We had to borrow a Tax Anticipation Note starting in April for \$500,000 to meet our obligations. This note was paid off in October. Because of tax bills going out late for the 2nd half, we had to borrow again in December, another TAN note in the amount of \$700,000. This note is due by December 17th, 2021. A portion of this note can be paid off before the due date, decreasing the amount of interest that we have to pay.

We had three outstanding bonds for 2020. The Landfill bond was retired this year. The Sewer Upgrade bond expires in 2027 and the Water upgrade bond in 2029. The town receives 30% grants on the sewer upgrade and the water upgrade, each. We have not received 2019 and 2020 grants on the landfill because of deficiencies that have not been addressed.

The town funded the Capital Reserve Funds for Revaluation, Fire Department, Highway & Streets, Highway Department and Police Department. Also funding the Expendable Trust Funds for the Town Building & Repairs, Samuel E. Paul War Memorial and Gay-Kimball Library.

We have a Special Revenue Fund for the Troy Transfer Station/Recycling which is funded by the sale of bags, CD dumpster fees and the sale of recyclables. The Transfer Station does not have a Capital Reserve or Expendable Trust, so this fund has to be maintained to purchase bags, for equipment needed and doing any renovations without putting a tax burden on the town. Also, a portion of money was used against the landfill long-term debt.

We have a Special Revenue Fund for Recreation, which supplements what the town has to appropriate each year. Revenues that come into this fund are rental of the center, volunteers doing fund raisers, earning money from community breakfasts, dinners, and other activities in the year. Because of COVID the roller skating program was not held.

The Mondanock Regional School District portion of the tax rate decreased in 2020, because of surplus money used against their appropriation. The Cheshire County rate came in higher.

State Education apportionment came in lower.

We had an increase in the town portion of the tax rate The town did not use any surplus on advice of the Department of Revenue Administration because we had dropped too low.

Article 11 – Demolition, Repair of Buildings Expendable Trust Fund

To see if the Town will vote to establish an Expendable Trust Fund for the Demolition or Repair of Hazardous & Dilapidated Buildings as defined by RSA Title XII Chapter 155-B as well as any similar structures for which the Town has obtained a court order to remove or repair or as may be mandated by prudence and public safety on an emergency basis. Any funds obtained from owners of such properties either through lien or voluntary payments for repairs shall be paid back into the fund and managed by the Trustees of the Trust Funds until needed for future withdrawals. Said fund is to be placed in the care of the Trustees of Trust Funds and the Board of Selectmen shall be named as agents to expend. And further to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) to deposit into the fund.

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 12 – Cemetery Operating Budget

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Three Thousand Seven Hundred Eight Dollars (\$33,708) for the care of cemeteries and to authorize the withdrawal of Thirty-Two Thousand Eighty-three Dollars (\$32,083) from the Cemetery Maintenance Expendable Trust and the Cemetery Perpetual Care Trust Funds. The balance of One Thousand Six Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$1,625) to be raised from taxation.

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 13 - Cemetery Maintenance Trust & Perpetual Care Trust

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900) to be placed in the following accounts with said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance. Three Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$360) to go into the Cemetery Perpetual Care Trust Fund and Five Hundred Forty Dollars (\$540) to go into the Cemetery Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund.

Article 14 – Roads and Streets

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000) for road repair and maintenance as specified:

- \$100,000 to reclaim and pave the existing paved portion of Quarry Road.
- \$25,000 for paver shim of Bigelow Hill Road.

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 15 – Transfer Station Bags

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500) to purchase transfer station bags and to authorize the withdrawal of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500) from the Transfer Station/Recycling Center Special Revenue Fund to offset this expense.

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 16 - Kimball Hall Siding Project

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Two Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$5,260) to finish the siding project on the east and west sides of Kimball Hall and to wrap the 16 windows of the building to finish the repair project. Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) to come from fund raising by the Troy Historical Society, with the remaining Three Thousand Two Hundred Sixty (\$3,260) to come from general taxation.

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 17 – Town Hall Remodel Project

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500) to complete the Town Hall foyer project begun in 2020.

Article 18 - Troy Depot Repairs - Warehouse

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) for the purpose of completing the project to stabilize, repair and paint the warehouse located on the Troy Depot property.

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 19 - Complete Streets Grant Project

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$58,800) for the purpose of completing a safe crossing zone at the intersection of New Hampshire State Route 12 and Monadnock Street. Forty-Two Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$42,800) to come from the Complete Streets Grant awarded to the Town and Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000) to come from the Highways & Streets Capital Reserve Fund.

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 20 - Wage Increases

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Eight Hundred Forty-Seven Dollars (\$3,847) for the purpose of providing Town employees with raises effective for all payroll after April 1, 2021. This raise shall not apply to Selectmen, Treasurer, Trustees of the Trust Funds, Moderator, Library employees or Water and Sewer Department employees. (Library and Water and Sewer Department employees raises are covered in their own budgets separately). The raises will be based on cost-of-living increases, longevity and merit as recommended by department heads to the Board of Selectmen.

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 21 – Support for Public Services

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-Three Dollars (\$15,923) to support public services as specified:

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 23 - New Hampshire Redistricting Resolution

To see if the Town will vote to urge that the New Hampshire General Court, which is obligated to redraw the maps of political districts within the state following the federal census, to do so, will ensure fair and effective representation of New Hampshire voters without gerrymandering.

The Board of Selectmen recommends this warrant article.

Fire Department

In 2020 the Fire Department responded to 529 calls for service, up by 100 calls from the previous year.

The department would like to thank all the men and women that dedicated a tremendous amount of time throughout the year to training and maintaining equipment and apparatus so it is ready for whatever they may face at the next call.

In 2020 The department purchased 650 ft. of $2\frac{1}{2}$ " hose to replace the old $2\frac{1}{2}$ " hose as well as a new $2\frac{1}{2}$ " blitz line smooth bore nozzle. These items were purchased in order to remain NFPA compliant. The department also purchased one set of turnout gear, six pairs of structural boots, six pairs of structural gloves and three helmets in order to remain compliant. The department upgraded the four hand lights on the ladder to led box lights including a five-bank charger and other lights for interior firefighting.

The department had some front-end repair performed on the Mack tanker in order to make it passable for state inspection. The department had Northeast Emergency Apparatus come to the station to check on the front-line engine due to lack of power. They found the problem to be the ambient air temperature sensor, which they replaced along with servicing the transmission on both the engine and the ladder trucks.

The department sent the ambulance to Monadnock Ford to have a new transmission installed due to a total failure. Concurrently, Ford diagnosed a severe oil leak which turned out to be the high pressure oil lines which had completely rotted on each side of the engine. They also checked the oil pan for rust and advised it was not currently leaking however, will need to be replaced in the very near future. Due to this being a labor intensive and extremely costly job the department opted not to replace it at that time.

The Troy Fire Association purchased a Shelter Logic garage to house the utility truck to keep it out of the weather. The association also purchased some tube steel to build a frame to put on the back of the utility truck to mount the 7.5kw generator and 35' light tower that was recently acquired from a neighboring fire department.

The association received a total of \$1400.00 from all the donations in Memory of John Callahan Sr. which was used to purchase three Zoll automatic defibrillators that cost \$1982.00. The association added the remaining \$582.00 to complete the purchase to put them in service in memory of John.

The Department would like to thank everyone involved with the Ambulance. We have had one new member join the ambulance this year. Anyone interested in joining the Fire Department or the Ambulance please contact the fire station at 242-7759 or come to the station on a Sunday morning around ten thirty in the morning.

I would like to thank all the men and women for all their time throughout the year whether it is day or night to respond to calls, training, and all of the other nights of meetings and maintenance on the building and all Department owned equipment. It has been a pleasure working with everyone over the past year.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

This year we experienced challenging wildfire conditions which led to deep burning fires in remote locations that were difficult to extinguish. Your local fire departments and the Division of Forests & Lands worked throughout the year to protect homes and the forests. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on high fire danger days. The towers' fire detection efforts are supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger is especially high.

Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Every year New Hampshire sees fires which threaten or destroy structures, a constant reminder that wildfires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildfire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at <u>www.firewise.org</u>. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

Between COVID-19 and the drought conditions, 2020 was a unique year. The drought conditions led to the need to have a Proclamation from the Governor, which banned much of the outdoor burning statewide. This, along with the vigilance of the public, helped to reduce the number of serious fires across New Hampshire. However, the fires which we did have burned deep and proved difficult to extinguish due to the lack of water. While the drought conditions have improved, we expect many areas of the state to still be experiencing abnormally dry and drought conditions this spring. For this reason, we ask everyone to remember Smokey's message about personal responsibility and follow his ABC's: Always Be Careful with fire. If you start a fire, put it out when you are done. "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!"

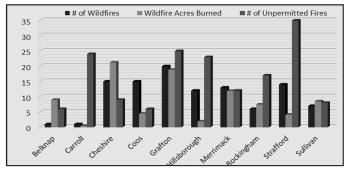
As we prepare for the 2021 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting <u>www.NHfirepermit.com</u>. The burning of household waste is prohibited by the Air Resources Division of



the Department of Environmental Services (DES). You are encouraged to contact the local fire department for more information. Safe open burning requires your diligence and responsibility. Catherine Callegari Library Director www.troylibrary.us 2020 is a year most won't forget. Troy Highway was fortunate enough to be spared from any type of exposure to Covid -19 and therefore O days were missed because of it.

Last winter seemed to last forever. We used more salt than ever before, but we can proudly say that we had zero weather related motor vehicle accidents again. All of our equipment that we use for snow removal held up fairly well. Apart from normal wear and tear items, such as plow cutting edges, we only had nuisance issues. Light bulbs and a broken wire or 2 to name a couple. Both small trucks now run the stainless steel spreaders and are much better suited for what we do.

Spring eventually arrived and we were busy from the get go. We swept a lot more this year as the State of N.H. didn't. A few big rain storms forced us to do unscheduled repairs on both Prospect St. and Quarry Road, the only roads in Town that aren't paved. A lot of time was spent doing tree work and ditching on 2 roads that were scheduled for resurfacing. The last section from the intersection of Tolman Rd. and West Hill to the blueberry farm and the section of South St. from approximately #262 to the Fitzwilliam town line were overlaid by Arlington Paving of Keene. This company's bid came in \$25,000 lower than the next highest bidder and they gave us a quality job while doing so. Phil's Tree Service spent 2 days taking down large trees on Prospect St. This allowed more sunlight to hit the pavement and has greatly cut down on the amount of ice buildup common to that area.

Most all of the Town equipment is holding up relatively well. There were a few big ticket repairs that we were unable to do in-house. Any emissions and/or computer related repairs have to go to the dealer. We also had an issue with the backhoe that had to be repaired by the dealer. The loader just required routine maintenance (oil change, light bulbs, etc.) and should be good for awhile.

One very noticeable change this year to the Highway Department was an additional worker was hired at the recommendation of the Selectboard. In the late Fall, we hired a young fellow by the name of John Pike. John's position is part-time, staying around 24 hours a week. John has proven to be a great addition to the Highway Dept and has allowed us to get a lot more work done than with just 2 Fulltime employees. We threw John right into the Trackless sidewalk machine and he took no time to become comfortable with it. The ability to work the sidewalks through the duration of the storm has proven effective at minimal cost to the Town. John is not afraid of hard work and will continue to increase his value to the Town the longer he is here. Cudos to the Troy Selectboard for allowing us to bring John on board.

Our plans for 2021 work includes reclaiming, grading, and repaving Quarry Road. This is hinged on voter approval at Town meeting. The proposed work\$ will not come from taxation this year but from the 2020 Highway Block Grant carryover\$, the 2021 Highway Block Grant, and the Highway and Roads Trust Fund. The project cost is expected to be approximately \$100,000. We also hoping for voter approval for \$25,000 for paver shim on Bigelow Hill Road. This amount would come from taxation but will go a long ways towards stabilizing Bigelow Hill Rd. Most of the ditching is done on Quarry Rd. A couple culverts need replacing. Tree work needs to be done as well. This work would be done prior to resurfacing project. Major ditching and some tree work is needed on Bigelow Hill Rd. as well.

As always, I would like to recognize Gary LeBlanc, Mike Janttii, and now John Pike for jobs well done throughout the year.

Troy Recycling Center 2020 Report

As with every aspect of everyone's lives, the Troy Recycling Center has been greatly impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. A lot of Townspeople noticed changes in operations at the Center. We had a couple employees that were considered "high risk" and had to stay home at the onset of the crisis. We came up with a plan to keep all as safe as possible. This plan involved less handling of certain materials, i.e. mixed papers and newspapers etc. Based on recommendations, we were not sorting papers and still are not. When the crisis lessens, we will be back to "normal" operations again.

We have had changes in staffing throughout the year as well. CJ Hall moved on, leaving Stephen Labrake to run the facility. We hired Jesse Harkins to take Stephen's vacant spot only to have Stephen retire during the summer. Fortunately, Jesse was with us long enough to learn the ins and outs of the Recycling Center and has done very well getting the facility cleaned out and running smoothly and efficiently. In addition to CJ and Stephen, Susan has moved away as well. We brought on Keith Spano and Devin Lady to join our team.

We had to upgrade the lighting in the building as the old style lights weren't working very well. Given that the dangerous compactors and balers were being operated during near darkness conditions, it made sense to make it so our employees could work in lighted, safer conditions. LED lights were utilized because they are much brighter, last longer, and are more energy efficient. This project was paid out of the normal operating budget.

Another change forced upon us was our glass procedures. Previously, we would throw bottles into a shredder and store the glass chips in 55 gallon drums which Highway would then take to the Keene Facility. After getting numerous contaminated loads (NOT from Troy) Keene decided not to take crushed glass. They would only take whole bottles from then on. Troy had to rent a 30 yard covered roll off dumpster to handle the space taking whole glass. This has increased handling of the glass and therefore more labor intensive (it now takes 2 employees to dispose of glass.) Again, this is another expense that we had to incur without warning this year.

We appreciate the patience of the Townspeople of Troy in these confusing times. We have had to make adaptations for a crisis no one has ever experienced before and have done it as smoothly as possible with no additional expenses to the Town. We came in well under budget despite the added costs directly related to Covid and the additional trickle down effects as well as much needed facility improvements.

Thank you to our great crew of Jesse, Keith, Devin, Dan and Mike.

In the year 2020 the Troy Water and Sewer Department stayed busy with day-to-day operations.

On the wastewater side we upgraded the heating system to reduce out energy usage and save money as part of an energy audit we took part in back in 2018. We also have been working on mapping both our collections system and distribution system and putting it in a digital format using ArcGIS. It not only makes it easier to locate assets, but it makes it easier to start an asset management program. To qualify for grant money an asset management program is one of the qualifying factors with NHDES and the USDA. Also, our office manager Rhonda Sheats received her grade II wastewater treatment license, which is crucial in the event that we lose our primary operator there will be a back up.

On the water side it was a fairly quiet year as the wastewater took up most of our time except for normal maintenance. We made sure we stayed in compliance with our water quality. In November we tested all 5 wells for PFOAs and had no detects at all 5 sites. Lastly Nick Huntoon received his Grade 1 Water Distribution.

The Water and Sewer Commissioner's Meet on the second Wednesday of each month at 5:00 P.M. unless otherwise posted. Troy Budget Committee Year-In-Review

The voters of the town of Troy adopted NH RSA 32:14 and therefor established Troy as having an Official Budget Committee, placing the duty to prepare the budget and hold public budget hearings with the Budget Committee, not the Select Board. The Budget Committee is governed by NH RSA 32 Municipal Budget Law.

2020 brought with it another change within town administration, this being the 4th Assistant to the Selectmen/Town Administrator in as many years. This lack of consistency in Town Hall personnel has presented challenges for preparing budgets for not only the Budget Committee but department heads and the Select Board as well.

Over the course of the budget season the committee reviewed and made recommendations on all 36 individual budgets that make up the overall town budget you see presented in the Annual Report and then held the Public Hearing on the town budget the month before Town Meeting.

The members of the Budget Committee would like to thank the residents of Troy for entrusting us with the oversight of departmental budgets; we take seriously our responsibility to put forth recommended budgets for each department and to recommend or not recommend individual spending warrant articles at Town Meeting. We would also like to thank the department heads/commissioners/trustees in town for working with us on their department budgets, the Select Board and Town Administrator Mary Guild for their efforts, Town Treasurer Janet McCullough for her expertise, and Library Director Catherine Callegari at the Gay-Kimball Library for the meeting space.

If you are looking for a way to become more involved with the town, joining the Budget Committee is a great way to have input across all departments and committees in town to help keep Troy a great place to live. Conservation Commission

For many years the Town of Troy had an active Conservation Commission, currently we have no one involved or expressing an interest in the Conservation Commission. Maintaining an active and engaged Conservation Commission will be critical as we have a more active redevelopment program at the Troy Blanket Mill. If you or someone you know would like to help rejuvenate this critical entity, please contact the Office of the Select Board.

Below is the underlying legislation that defines the purpose and intent of towns having Conservation Commissions.

36-A:2 Conservation Commission. A city or town which accepts the provisions of this chapter may establish a conservation commission, hereinafter called the commission, for the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources of said city or town. Such commission shall conduct researches into its local land and water areas and shall seek to coordinate the activities of unofficial bodies organized for similar purposes, and may advertise, prepare, print and distribute books, maps, charts, plans and pamphlets which in its judgment it deems necessary for its work. It shall keep an index of all open space and natural, aesthetic or ecological areas within the city or town, as the case may be, with the plan of obtaining information pertinent to proper utilization of such areas, including lands owned by the state or lands owned by a town or city. It shall keep an index of all marshlands, swamps and all other wet lands in a like manner, and may recommend to the city council or selectmen or to the department of resources and economic development a program for the protection, development or better utilization of all such areas...

36-A:3 Composition of Commission. The commission shall consist of not less than 3 nor more than 7 members. In a town which has a planning board, one member of the commission may also be on the planning board. In a city which has a planning board, one member of the commission may be on the planning board. In cities, the members of the commission shall be appointed by the mayor subject to the provisions of the city charter, and in towns the members of the commission shall be appointed by the selectmen....

36-A:4 Powers. I. Said commission may receive gifts of money, personal property, real property, and water rights, either within or outside the boundaries of the municipality, by gift, grant, bequest, or devise, subject to the approval of the local governing body, such gifts to be managed and controlled by the commission for the purposes of this section. Said commission may acquire in the name of the city or town, subject to the approval of the local governing body, by purchase, the fee in such land or water rights within the boundaries of the municipality, or any lesser interest, development right, easement, covenant, or other contractual right including conveyances with conditions, limitations, or reversions, as may be necessary to acquire, maintain, improve, protect, or limit the future use of or otherwise conserve and properly utilize open spaces and other land and water areas within their city or town, and shall manage and control the same, but the city or town or commission shall not have the right to condemn property for these purposes...

Heritage Commission

Under the leadership of Marion Austin, the Town of Troy had an active Heritage Commission for many years. In 1993 the town voted to create a Historical Society. In 1994 the town voted to create a Heritage Commission. Previously the Select Board had intended to merge the two however the Historical Society objected which leaves us with no one involved or expressing an interest in this Commission which will be critical as we have a more active redevelopment program at the Troy Blanket Mill. We would point out that if you read the legislation surrounding Heritage Commissions, they play a potential critical role in any redevelopment and large-scale planning projects. If you or someone you know would like to help rejuvenate this critical entity, please contact the Office of the Select Board. Below are the details as well as the underlying legislation:

Article #31 voted at the March 10, 1993 Town Meeting:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to set up a Historical Society for Town of Troy. (Anyone interested in sitting on this committee should call the Town Hall and a meeting will be set up). Passed as Presented.

Article #33 voted at the March 9, 1994 Town Meeting:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint 3-7 citizens members of the Heritage Commission pursuant to the provisions of RSA 673-4-a and RSA 673:5, and to appoint not more than 5 additional citizens as alternate members pursuant to the provisions of RSA 673:6, or take any other action relating thereto. Passed as Presented.

The Heritage Commission was established according to State RSA.s. The Historical Society was only a committee, (like Fall Festival Committee), which is why for many years they maintained a 501c3 status, committees like the Historical Society can receive town funds but can neither accept nor expend funds without approval of the Select Board.

The purpose of a Heritage Commission

*RSA 673:1(II), 674:44-b *A heritage commission does for historical resources much what a conservation commission does for natural resources. The establishment of a heritage commission at all is purely optional. Some communities choose to have a heritage commission that is only advisory, while others want their commission to take a much more active role with educational and technical responsibilities. In communities that already have a regulatory historic district, or may be contemplating one, the community may decide to have the heritage commission assume the responsibilities of a historic district commission. (Please note: Not every historic district is regulatory. A National Register historic district is not regulatory, but a locally designated historic district and a neighborhood heritage district are regulatory. For more information on these different types of districts, see the section on historic districts in the Preservation Planning Tools, as well as the chapter on Locally Designated Historic Districts.)

673:4-a Heritage Commissions. -

I. The heritage commission shall consist of not less than 3 members and no more than 7 members who shall be appointed in a manner as prescribed by the local legislative body.

II. Each heritage commission member shall be a resident of the city or town which establishes the commission. One commission member shall be a member of the local governing body. One commission member may be a member of the planning board. Not more than 5 alternate members may be appointed. When an alternate sits in absence or disqualification of a regular member, the alternate shall have full voting powers. If there is a historic district commission, one member of this commission shall be an ex officio member of the heritage commission. In determining each member's qualifications, the appointing authority shall take into consideration the appointee's demonstrated interest and ability to understand, appreciate and promote the purpose of the heritage commission.

Troy Historical Society

The Troy Historical Society's year began in March. At our first meeting of 2020, Kim Chaffee was elected as our chairperson and Kathy Marrotte was elected as the secretary and treasurer. Lynn Smith is our media person.

Fortunately, we were able to hold some of our planned events. We had a successful Antique Appraisal in March. Dan Yelin, owner of Colony Antiques, was kept busy during our open hours of the museum.

We did need to cancel our annual Craft Fair/Flea Market in July because of the pandemic. We are making plans to have the Craft Fair this year, July 16th and 17th. Another event canceled was our appreciation dinner for our donors of the Kimball Hall siding. We will have a plaque made, listing the names of the donors, and have it on display at Kimball Hall.

Although we did not have the Curie & Ives Cookie Tour in December of 2020, we did put together a cookbook with many of the recipes used in past years. Lynn Smith did a beautiful job assembling the book, which also includes pictures from past tours. Our goal was to have the cookbook ready for the October Fall Festival which was held on the Common. We joined the Rec. Department for a very successful and fun filled day. This year's Cookie Tour is scheduled for December 11th.

Other things that were accomplished this year was the vinyl siding on the north side of Kimball Hall and the installation of the upstairs twelve replacement windows. Our goal for 2021 is to complete the outside work on the building.

A wonderful military exhibit was on display for several months to honor our veterans. The exhibit was arranged by Lynn Smith and included a CD of her photos of past Memorial Days and Troy military events.

Despite the pandemic, we did receive many donated items. Kristin Tilton donated a 9' long railroad rake which is at the Depot. Lynn Smith donated 2 Community Center wine glasses and a Troy robe was donated by Warren Dunham-Aldrich. Elsie Breen donated several items that had belonged to Peter. There were several newspaper clippings, books on Troy's history and photos. She also donated a photo album of a working Troy Mills. A very important piece added to our Mill collection.

Thank you for your help in "Preserving the Past for Tomorrow."

Industrial Development Authority

In 1998 the town voted to create an Industrial Development Authority, currently we have no one involved or expressing an interest. An active and properly functioning IDA opens doors to both grants and development opportunities that otherwise simply pass us by. Neighboring towns, (Swanzey, Winchester & Keene), have had significant success by being actively engaged in the development process. Below is the 1998 Article as well as the underlying legislation:

"Article 6 - 1998 To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 162-G, entitled "Acquisition, Development, and Disposal of Industrial Land and Facilities", and to establish and Industrial Development Authority under the provisions of RSA 162-G:15-a, with a nine (9) member board appointed by the Selectmen. Passed as presented. "

<u>NH RSA 162</u>

Section 162-G:1 Adoption. I. Any city or town that adopts the provisions of this chapter shall have all of the authority, powers, duties and responsibilities set forth in this chapter. II. Adoption in a town with a town meeting shall be by a majority vote of all of the registered voters present and voting at a regular town meeting or at a special town meeting duly warned for the purpose, after a public hearing before the planning board, or selectmen where there is no planning board, of which hearing notice has been given as provided in RSA 21:32. Upon the petition of 25 voters for the adoption of the provisions of this chapter, a hearing shall be held as provided above and the question of adoption shall be placed before the voters at a regular or duly warned special town meeting in the same manner and subject to the same requirements as set forth above.

III. Adoption in a town with a town council shall be by a majority vote of all of the members of the town council after a public hearing before the council. Notice of such hearing shall be given as provided in RSA 21:32.

IV. Adoption in a city shall be by a majority vote of all of the members of the city council or the board of mayor and aldermen after a public hearing before the council or board of which hearing notice has been given as provided in RSA 21:32. **Source.** 1972, 57:1. 1975, 481:17. 1994, 331:3, eff. Aug. 7, 1994.

Section 162-G:2 Declaration of Need and Purpose. – It is hereby declared that there is a need for the development and preservation of business and industry within the state in order to alleviate and prevent unemployment, to insure the continued growth and prosperity of the state, and of the cities and towns within the state and to promote the general welfare of all its citizens. It is the purpose of this chapter to authorize the cities and towns of the state to foster and encourage the development of business and industrial facilities within or without their respective boundaries, acting directly or through a business and industrial development authority or a voluntary, nonprofit corporation, alone or in concert with one or more other governmental units, by acquiring, developing, expanding, leasing, and disposing of such facilities, where such development is more appropriate under this chapter than under RSA 162-A, as determined by the governing body. It is further declared that the acquisition of title to such facilities, either directly or through a business and industrial development authority or a voluntary, nonprofit corporation, and the lease or sale of such facilities as provided hereunder is a public purpose and shall be regarded as performing an essential governmental function in carrying out the provisions of this chapter. However, competition among communities in this state merely for the purpose of seeking relocation of business and industrial facilities located in this state is contrary to the policy of this chapter. Source. 1972, 57:1. 1975, 481:1. 1994, 331:4. 2000, 161:1, eff. July 22. 2000.

Planning Board

The Planning Board's regulatory duties, based on NH RSA 673, include the review and approval of subdivisions, lot line adjustments, and site plan review applications. The seven-member board is also charged with maintaining a Master Plan (last revised in 2007) and other ordinances and policies that purposefully guide land use in Town.

Membership of the Planning Board during 2020 included Steven Sawyer (Chair), Jon Collins, (Vice Chair), Henry Underwood (Secretary), Curtis Hopkins (Selectmen's Representative), Tristan Hopkins, Matthew Meacham and Kyle Smith.
