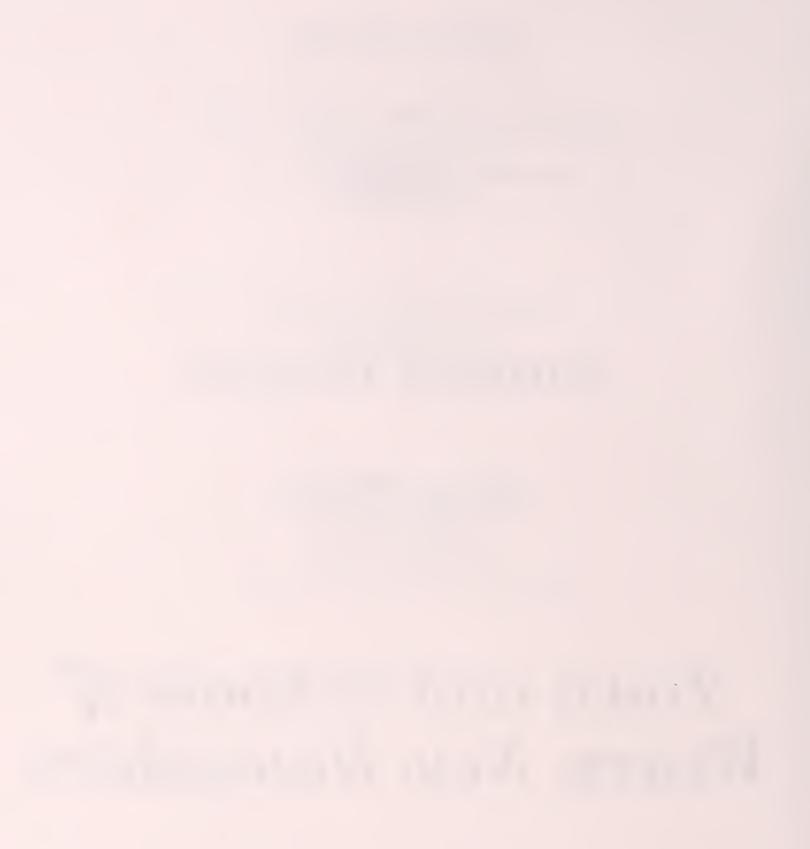

IN MEMORIAM

Gordon M. Tiffany

December 13, 1912 - July 20, 1999

Gordon M. Tiffany of 197 Tiffany Hill Rd. died on July 20, 1999, and with his passing Weare lost one of its most honored and distinguished citizens.

A former Town Moderator and Town Counsel, Mr. Tiffany was a Navy veteran of World War II. A practicing attorney, he served as Concord City Solicitor, as an Assistant Attorney General, and was appointed New Hampshire Attorney General by Gov. Sherwin Adams. He was appointed the first staff director for the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights by President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Mr. Tiffany worked tirelessly for several charitable organizations and was known and respected for his devotion to his family and his church. His memory is memorialized in his official painting of the Town Seal which hangs in the Selectmen's Conference Room in the Weare Town Office.

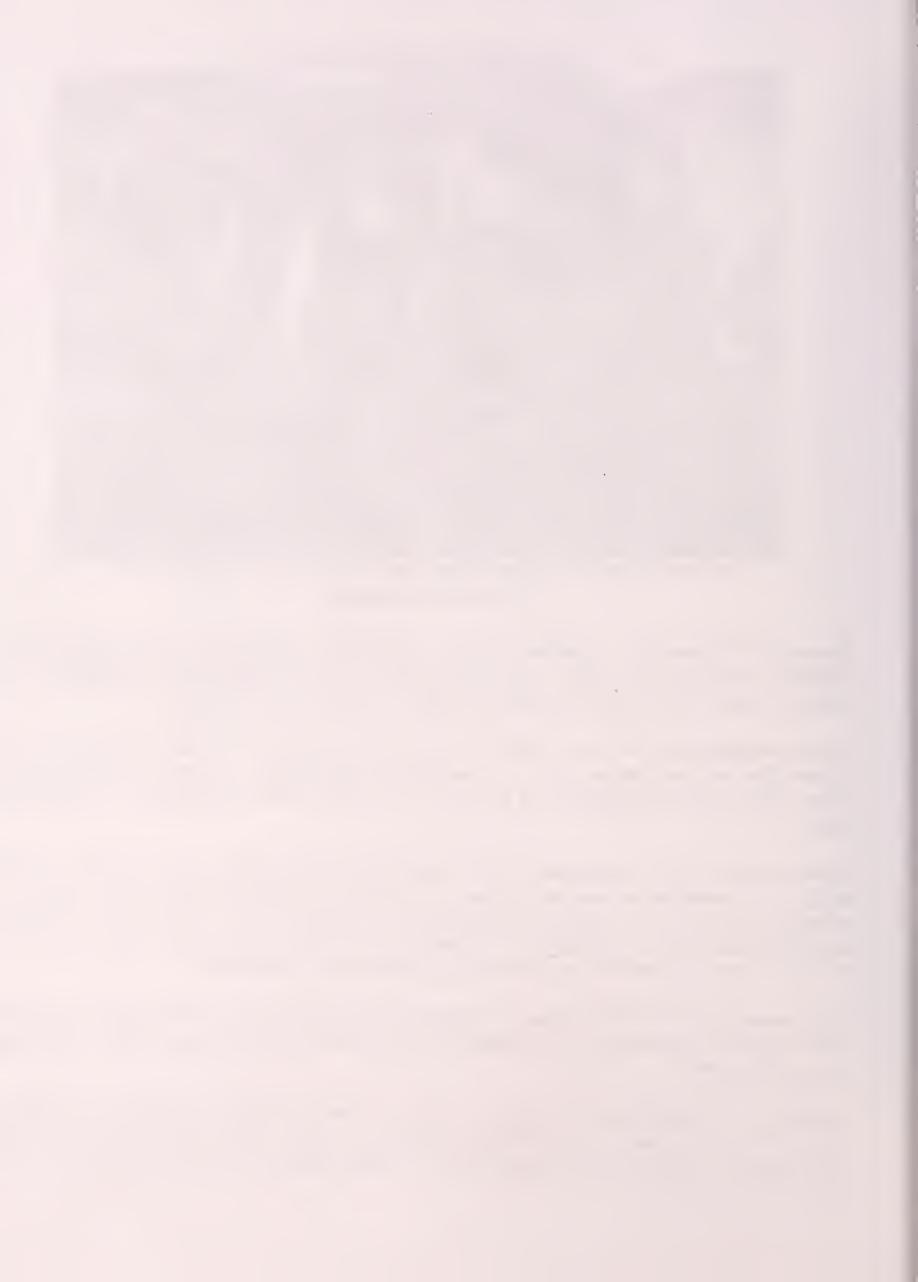

ARTICLE 7

Shall The Town amend the Zoning Map as follows:

To amend the Town of Weare Zoning Map by modifying of a portion containing approximately 110 acres of the zoning of Tax Map 409 Lot 4, said lot being located on River Road, to change the portion from Rural Agricultural (RA) to Commercial (C)?

(By Petition.) (Recommended by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE 8

Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$3,071,639.00? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$2,764,964.00 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13,X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

(Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 15,000.00 for cemetery improvements. This sum to be withdrawn from Cemetery Trust Funds as provided by RSA 31:22a (cy pres), and to designate the Board of Cemetery Trustees as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto. The balance of \$39,300.00 is to be raised by taxation. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

ARTICLE 20

ARTICLE 21

(Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Shall the Town establish a non-lapsing, non-transferable Capital Reserve Fund, under the provisions of RSA 35:1, to be known as the Howard Ineson Memorial Field Playground Fund, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 10,000.00 to be placed in the Fund, and to designate the Board of Selectman as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .03

ARTICLE 23

Shall the Town establish a non-lapsing, non-transferable Capital Reserve Fund, under the provisions of RSA 35:1, to be known as the Tennis Court Resurfacing Fund, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 6,000.00 to be placed in the Fund, and to designate the Board of Selectman as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .02

ARTICLE 24

Shall the Town establish a non-lapsing, non-transferable Capital Reserve Fund, under the provisions of RSA 35:1, to be known as the Town Office Complex Fund, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 25,000.00 to be placed in the Fund, and to designate the Board of Selectman as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .08

ARTICLE 25

Shall the Town establish a non-lapsing, non-transferable Capital Reserve Fund, under the provisions of RSA 35;1, to be known as the Town Center Sidewalk Fund, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 39,500.00 to be placed in the Fund, and to designate the Board of Selectman as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Shall the Town establish a non-lapsing, non-transferable non-Capital Reserve Fund, under the provisions of RSA 35:1-c, to be known as the Finance Committee Mailer Fund, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 2,000.00 to be placed in the Fund, and to designate the Board of Selectman as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .01

ARTICLE 27

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the non-transferable sum of \$ 38,000.00 for the purpose of recruiting, hiring, and equipping a full time Planner for the Town to work. under the Planning Board, through the Code Enforcement/Building Office? (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .12

ARTICLE 28

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the non-transferable sum of \$ 6,250.00 for the purpose of purchasing a second automated ballot counting machine, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .02

ARTICLE 29

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the non-transferable sum of \$ 50,000.00 for the purpose of renovating the Town Hall Building, or take any other action in relation thereto? (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .15

ARTICLE 30

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the non-transferable sum of \$ 16,146.00 for the purpose of hiring a part time person to work under the direct supervision of the Weare Cable Committee, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the non-transferable sum of \$ 11,900.00 for the purpose of contributing to the 2000 Patriotic Celebration, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (By Petition) (Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .04

ARTICLE 32

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 3,000.00 to cover the costs of the Town's participation in a local Household Hazardous Waste Collection in the year 2000. Of the sum of \$ 3,000.00, the sum of \$ 1,689.00 would be provided by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, Waste Management Division, on a per capita basis, as an after the completion offset to the costs of the project, and the sum of \$1,311.00 to be raised by taxation; or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .00

ARTICLE 33

Shall the government of the Police Department of the Town of Weare be entrusted to a Police Commission?

If so, shall such Police Commission be chosen by:

a: Popular election at Town election, or

b: Appointment of the Governor with consent of council?

ARTICLE 34

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 4,933.00 for the purpose of general maintenance and upkeep of the Town Forests, and to authorize the Board of Selectman to withdraw the amount of \$ 4,933.00 for this purpose from the Town Forest Account, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

To see if the Town will vote to deposit 50% of the revenues of all future payments collected pursuant to RSA 79-A:7 (the land use change tax) in the conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5, III as authorized by RSA 79-A:25, II; or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Anticipated tax impact = .03

ARTICLE 36

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 (fifty thousand dollars) for the purpose of hiring, outfitting and furnishing needed supplies for two full-time state certified firefighter's/EMT's for service with the Weare Fire Department; or to take any other action thereto? (Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee)

Anticipated tax impact = .15

ARTICLE 37

Shall the Town send the following resolution to the New Hampshire General Court: Resolved, New Hampshire's natural, cultural, and historic resources in this town and throughout the state are worthy of protection and, therefore, the State of New Hampshire should establish and fund a permanent public/private partnership for the voluntary conservation of these important resources, or to take any other action in relation thereto?

ARTICLE 38

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 32,000.00 for the purpose of having the Town tar and finish Lawrence Road as requested; or to take any other action thereto. (By Petition)(Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee.)

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 to replace one of the leachfield's used in connection with the Town's municipal sewage system; or to take any other action thereto. (Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee)

Anticipated tax impact = .10

ARTICLE 41

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for the purpose of installing a new roof on the horse/carriage sheds and related work; or to take any other action thereto. (By Petition) (Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Not Recommended by the Finance Committee)

Anticipated tax impact = .02

ARTICLE 42

To see if the Town will vote to reduce the Finance Committee to twelve (12) members and these members shall be elected by the people. Members shall serve a three year term, with four (4) members being elected each year. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 43

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a gift of real estate located on River Road containing approximately 45 (forty-five) acres. Said real estate being a portion of Lot 67 as shown on Assessors Map 406, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 44

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing and installing a Vault Storage System for the vault adjoining the Town Clerk's/Tax Collector's Office; or to take any other action thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Committee)

Anticipated tax impact = .03

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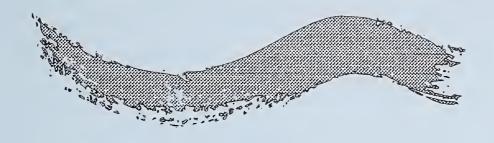

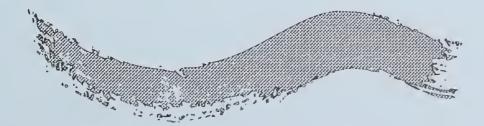

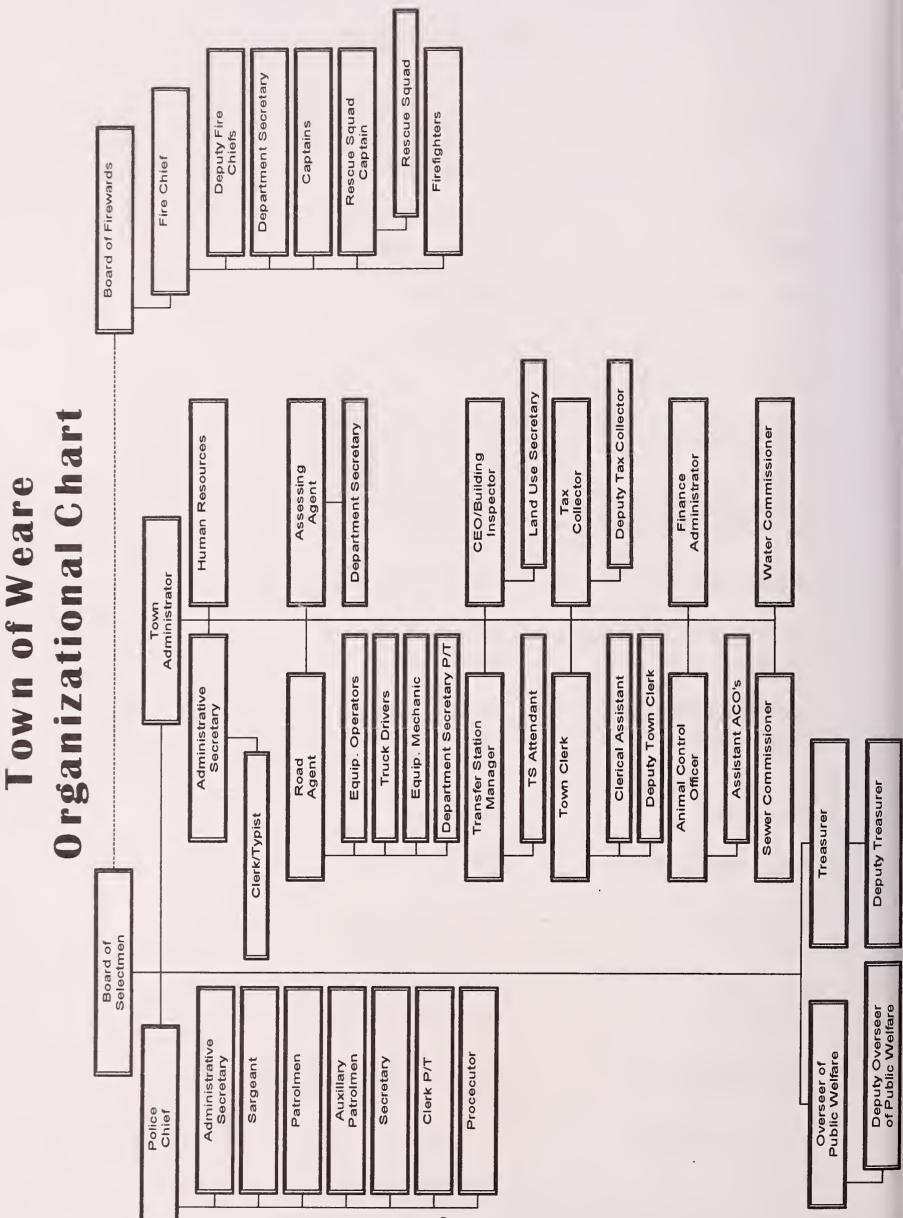

To the Citizens of Weare, NH

We are pleased to provide the Town's 1999 Annual Report for the fiscal year which ended December 31, 1999. The Annual Report is again the product of a joint effort by the Weare and John Stark School Committees and this Board, and is intended to provide our citizens with one comprehensive source of important information on our schools and town government.

Our community enjoyed another year of prosperity, marked by historically high levels of employment and the feelings of confidence and well being which accompany good economic times. Your municipal government too enjoyed good times, accomplishing many worthwhile objectives during the past year. For example, while the Town benefited enormously as a donee community with the implementation of the State's new apportionment of educational aid, a major reassessment project resulted in fairer, more equitable assessments for nearly all of the properties within the Town. TOWN OF WEARE DELIBERATIVE SESSION 1999

Record of the first session of the Annual Town Meeting under RSA 40:13 was called to order by our Town Moderator, Neal Kurk, on January 30, 1999 at 10:10 a.m. in the Center Woods Elementary School. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Donald Rogers.

The meeting was asked to rise and remain standing to hear the reading by the Town Clerk, of the residents who have died during the past year. The reading was followed by a moment of silence in their memory.

The Moderator told the voters that there would be no vendors providing lunch or snacks and said we would have to move right along with the meeting so we would be out early. He stated the rules for today's meeting would be Garfield Jone's Parliamentary Procedures at a Glance as interpreted by the Chair. The Moderator then read eleven additional rules to be followed by this meeting. Mr. Kurk informed the voters to request a vote by secret ballot vote, the request must be in writing and signed by five voters and presented to the Chair.

The Moderator then went on to introduce the people in the front of the room. They were as follows: at the sound system is Doug Clegg; Ed Barrett, Town Administrator; Linda Connell, Legal Counsel; Craig Slattum, Selectman; Doug Hatch, Selectman; Leon Methot, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen; Evelyn Connor, Town Clerk. We have three Supervisors of the Checklist, Margo Mcleod, Debra Cote and Carol Finch. Our cable crew consists of Will Ottery, Bernie Bastian and Steve Bastian.

Mr. Kurk then introduced Frank Campana, chairman of the Finance Committee. Mr. Campana introduced his committee, Kevin Winship, Renauld Dubriel, Donna Cox, Richard Butt and Denise Dorey.

At this time, in accordance with the sense of the 1994 meeting (Article 38), the Chair offers the privilege of addressing the meeting when called upon to do so, to two non-residents, Town Administrator Edward Barrett and Town Counsel Linda Connell unless there is a motion to deny them the privilege. No motion was made to deny. Mr. Barrett and Ms. Connell were granted the privilege of addressing the meeting when called upon to do so.

Leon Methot, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen was recognized to give the State of the Town Address. Mr. Methot spoke about the budget and the time and effort spent to come up with a no frills budget. He spent a great deal of his time explaining the budget and the reasons the Selectmen felt it necessary to include these items in this year's budget.

The Moderator stated we would take a five minute break while the Finance Committee takes a revote on the articles in the budget. It was explained that a quorum was not present at the original vote.

The meeting resumed at 10:50 a.m.

The Moderator asked if no objection, the reading of the Warrant in it's entirety at this time be waived and that each Article be read as it is taken up. There being no objection, the Chair ruled in the affirmative.

Articles one (1) through (23) being set by statute are not subject to discussion by this body - we will proceed with Article 24.

Douglas Cook asked that the meeting suspend the rules and take up Article 51 at this time. The Moderator advised that this request will take a two thirds vote. The Moderator asked for a standing vote. Yes - 35 and No - 9. The vote passed to suspend the rules. We began with Article 51.

Article 51: To see if the Town will amend the Finance Committee Ordinance as follows:

To delete the following: Any member of the Finance Committee who seeks a local elected office shall be disqualified from serving on the Finance Committee during the duration of that year's budget discussions. The moderator shall be empowered to appoint a temporary replacement for that member during that time.

To add the following: Any member of the Finance Committee who becomes employed by the Town or School Districts, or is elected to a local public office shall resign his or her Finance Committee position effective immediately.

The vote of this Town Meeting shall supersede prior recorded votes establishing the Finance Committee and its duties from the 1929, 1938, 1945, 1950, 1952, 1976, 1978, 1979, 1990, 1991, and 1994 Town Meetings. (By Petition)

Doug Cook moved the article as read. The motion was seconded. Mr. Cook spoke to his motion. Several people spoke on this issue. Leon Methot motioned to amend the article to read:

To add the following: Any member of the Finance Committee who becomes employed by the Town or School Districts, or is elected to a local public office shall resign his or her Finance Committee position effective immediately.

The vote of this Town Meeting shall supersede prior recorded votes establishing the Finance Committee and its duties from the 1929, 1938, 1945, 1950, 1952, 1976, 1978, 1979, 1990, 1991, and 1994 Town Meetings.

The motion was seconded. Mr. Methot spoke to his motion. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 51 will appear on the ballot as amended. Motion was made to Restrict Reconsideration. Motion was seconded. Vote in the affirmative. Article 51 was restricted.

<u>Article 24:</u> Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 45,600.00 for the purpose of hiring two (2) additional full time officers to provide for twenty four (24) hour police

coverage. The sum of \$ 34,320.00 shall be received in the form of a COPS GRANT for the two new, full-time Police Officers, with the balance of \$11,340.00 to be raised by taxation? (By Petition)

Frank Campana moved Article 24 as read. Motion was seconded. Mr. Campana spoke to his motion. Thomas Reynolds, Vice Chairman of the Finance committee had no recommendation on this article. The Moderator asked the Finance Committee to take a five (5) minute break and vote on this article. Mr. Reynolds reported that the Finance Committee would not support this article. Much discussion both pro and con were brought out by Article 24.

The Moderator stated we are under the obligation to produce an article for the ballot. Something must appear in it's place. Discussion continued. Mr. Slattum motioned to amend this article to read: Shall the Town thank the Police for their efforts to provide additional service when needed on an overtime basis? Motion was seconded. Mr. Slattum spoke to his motion. Mr. Methot requested a secret ballot vote and had the appropriate five required signatures. The vote was taken. Yes - 40 and No - 26. Article 24 amendment passed. Voters support motion made by Craig Slattum. Mr. Kurk then requested a voice vote to adopt this amendment for the ballot. The vote was in the affirmative. This amendment was adopted. Motion to restrict reconsideration was made and seconded. The vote in the affirmative. Reconsideration was restricted.

Article 25: Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$3,051,380.00? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$2,817,060.00 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only?

Douglas Hatch motioned to move Article 32 as read. The motion was seconded. Mr. Hatch spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 32 as read. No discussion on this article. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 32 adopted. A motion to restrict reconsideration was made and seconded. The vote in the affirmative. Article 32 restricted.

<u>Article 33</u>: Shall the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 5,750.00 to cover the costs of the Town's participation in a local Household Hazardous Waste Collection in 1999. Of the sum of \$ 5,750.00, the sum of \$ 1,689.00 would be provided by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, Waste Management Division, on a per capita of 25 cents, as an after the completion offset to the costs of the project, or to take any other action in relation thereto?

Doug Hatch moved Article 33 as written. The motion was seconded. Mr. Hatch spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 33 as written. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 33 adopted. A motion was made and seconded to restrict reconsideration. The vote in the affirmative. Article 33 restricted.

<u>Article 34</u>: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 6,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing two new Defribulator Units, to be carried by the on duty Police Vehicles, or to take any other action in relation thereto?

Ed Tuttle, Chief of Police motioned to move Article 34. The motion was seconded. Chief Tuthill spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 34 as read. Questions about the Town's liability and how the equipment functions were asked. It was also asked what kind of liability we would have.

The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 34 adopted. A motion was made and seconded to restrict reconsideration. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 34 restricted.

<u>Article 35</u>: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 8,000.00 for the purpose of obtaining a G. I. S. preliminary needs study, or to take any other action in relation thereto?

Everett Stone, Building Inspector, motioned to move Article 34 as written. The motion was seconded. Mr. Stone spoke to his motion with further explanation from Mr. Hatch and Susan Drake. The Finance Committee did not recommend Article 35. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 35 adopted. A motion was made and seconded to restrict reconsideration. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 35 restricted.

<u>Article 36</u>: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 11,196.00 (Eleven Thousand, One Hundred Ninety-Six Dollars) for the purpose of hiring a part time Operations Manager for the Weare Cable Community Access Television, Channel 48 facilities, to work under the direction of the Weare Cable Committee, or to take any other action in relation thereto?

Linda Ottery, member of the Cable Committee, motioned to move Article 36 as written. The motion was seconded. Mrs. Ottery spoke to her motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 36 as written. Questions were asked as to why this was not in the operating budget. Mr. Methot said it was requested by the Department Head. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 36 adopted. A motion was made and seconded to restrict reconsideration. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 36 restricted.

<u>Article 37</u>: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 5,000.00 (Five Thousand Dollars) for the purpose of hiring and supplying a part time seasonal Parks and Recreation Director, to work under the guidance of the Parks and Recreation Committee, or to take any other action in relation thereto?

Kevin Winship motioned to move Article 37 as written. The motion was seconded. Mr. Winship spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 37 as read. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 37 adopted. A motion was made and seconded to restrict reconsideration. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 37 restricted.

<u>Article 38</u>: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 6,500.00 (Six Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars) for the purpose of purchasing and installing an Automatic Standby Generator System at the Weare Public Library, or to take any other action in relation thereto?

Bessie Myhr, Librarian, motioned to move Article 38 as written. The motion was seconded. Mrs. Myhr spoke to her motion. The Finance Committee did not recommend Article 38. There was discussion as to the need for this piece of equipment. It was explained that the basement has had major water problems and we have already replaced rugs and books because of the water problem.

The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 38 adopted. A motion was made and seconded to restrict reconsideration. The vote in the affirmative. Article 38 restricted.

<u>Article 39</u>: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 11,900.00 (Eleven Thousand, Nine Hundred Dollars) for the purpose of funding the 1999 Patriotic Celebration, or to take any other action in relation thereto?

Laura Petrain, Fourth of July Committee Chairperson, moved the article as read. The motion was seconded. Ms. Petrain spoke to her motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 39 as read. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 39 adopted. A motion was made and seconded to restrict reconsideration. The vote in the affirmative. Article 39 restricted.

<u>Article 40</u>: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 8,032.00 for the purpose of general maintenance and upkeep of the Town Forests, and to authorize the Board of Selectman to withdraw the amount of \$ 8,032.00 for this purpose from the Town Forest Account, or to take any other action in relation thereto?

Leon Methot moved Article 40 as written. The motion was seconded. Mr. Methot spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee recommends Article 40 as written. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 40 adopted.

Article 41: Shall the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict the revenues from ambulance charges to expenditures for the purpose of new vehicle replacement? Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Weare Fire Department Vehicle Replacement Fund, separate from the General Fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the general fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund.

William Tiffany moved Article 41 as written. The motion was seconded. Mr. Tiffany spoke to his motion. The Finance Committee had no recommendation on this article as this is not a money article. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 41 adopted.

<u>Article 42</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the <u>Town of Weare Earth Products</u> <u>Ordinance</u> as follows: To amend the first sentence of Section 3, Article E, subsection (1a) regarding exemptions from permit requirements, adding the underlined language to say:

"Excavation of 5,000 cubic yards or less that is exclusively incidental to the lawful construction or alteration of a building or structure or the construction or alteration of a parking lot or way including a driveway on a portion of the premises where the removal occurs: provided, however, that no such excavation shall be commenced without a permit under this Ordinance unless all state and local permits required for the construction or alteration or alteration of the building, structure, parking lot, or way have been issued." (By Petition)

Susan Drake motioned to move Article 42. The motion was seconded. Ms. Drake spoke to her motion. Several questions were asked of Ms. Drake. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 42 was adopted.

The Moderator suggested we take Articles 43 through 50 as a block vote as they all pertain to the Earth Products Ordinance. A motion was made and seconded to do so. The vote in the affirmative. After getting further into the Articles, it was decided that this was not going to work. Mr. Kurk asked Ms. Petrain to withdraw her motion. Also Joanna Gareri had seconded and she withdrew her seconded. We then moved to take each article as it came up.

<u>Article 43</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the <u>Town of Weare Earth Products</u> <u>Ordinance</u> as follows:

To add a new Article I to Section 2, *DEFINITIONS*, defining the word "incidental as follows: "Incidental" means occurring as a minor, concurrent part of the overall effort or activity. (By Petition)

Susan Drake motioned to move Article 43 as written. The motion was seconded. Ms. Drake spoke to her motion. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 43 adopted.

<u>Article 44</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the <u>Town of Weare Earth Products</u> <u>Ordinance</u> as follows:

To add the following sentence to Article 6.A, Operational Standards: "The final, average elevation of the excavation area shall not be below the graduated line that connects the road level of the adjacent public road(s) with the naturally-occurring low point of the excavation area." (By Petition)

Susan Drake moved Article 44 as: To add the following sentence to Article 6.A, Operational Standards: "For the purpose of ensuring finished excavation areas are in keeping with the landscape of the surrounding area, the final average profile of the excavation area shall not be below the graduated slope line that connects the road level of the adjacent public road(s) with the naturally occurring low point of the excavation area." The motion was seconded. Ms. Drake spoke to her motion. Questions were asked about how this would affect current projects or renewals. Mr. Methot stated when applying for renewal they must abide by the new rules.

The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 44 was adopted.

<u>Article 45</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the <u>Town of Weare Earth Products</u> <u>Ordinance</u> as follows:

To amend Article 6.D, Operational Standards, to read as follows (deletions are underlined, additions are bold):

"No excavation shall be permitted within <u>seventy -five (75)</u> one hundred fifty (150) feet of any great pond, navigable river, or any other standing body of water <u>ten (10)</u> five (5) acres or more in area or within <u>twenty-five (25)</u> fifty (50) feet of any other stream, river, or brook which normally flows throughout the year, or any naturally occurring standing body of water less than <u>ten (10)</u> five (5) acres, prime wetland as designated in accordance with RSA 482-A:15,I or any wetland greater than five (5) acres, in area as defined by the Wetlands Board." (By Petition)

Susan Drake motioned Article 45 as read. The motion was seconded. The Moderator called for vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 45 adopted.

<u>Article 46</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the <u>Town of Weare Earth Products</u> <u>Ordinance</u> as follows:

To add the following sentence to Article 6.J, Operational Standards, with regards to the permitted storage of fuels, etc. on excavation sites:

"For the purpose of preventing any hazardous material release to the soil or groundwater, any such materials shall be stored on impervious surfaces with spill containment features (buried liners not acceptable), and transfer of such materials shall occur entirely within impervious areas (such as on concrete or paved surfaces) with spill containment features (buried liners not acceptable). New underground, or partially underground, storage of hazardous materials shall be prohibited. Additionally, any fuel storage containers greater than 300 gallons shall not be exempt from state and federal Aboveground Storage Tank regulations." (By Petition)

Susan Drake read Article 46 as follows: "For the purpose of preventing any hazardous materials released to the soil or groundwater, any such materials shall be stored on impervious surfaces with spill containment features (buried liners not acceptable), and transfer of such materials shall occur entirely within impervious areas (such as on concrete or paved surfaces) with spill containment features (buried liners not acceptable). New underground or partially underground storage of hazardous materials shall be prohibited. Additionally, any excavator using fuel storage containers greater than 300 gallons must demonstrate to the Regulator that the containers meet the standards of the current state and federal Aboveground Storage Tank Regulations, even if the tanks are otherwise exempt from those regulations.: (By Petition)

The motion was seconded. Ms. Drake spoke to her motion. Several questions were asked of Ms. Drake. The moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 46 adopted.

<u>Article 47</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the <u>Town of Weare Earth Products</u> <u>Ordinance</u> as follows:

To add the following sentence to Article 6.0, Operational Standards:

"No new excavation areas will be permitted within 5,280 feet of the Center of the Town of Weare. The Center of Town shall mean the intersection of Flanders Memorial Drive, East Street, and Route 114." (By Petition)

Susan Drake motioned to move Article 47 as: "For the purpose of preserving its scenic characteristics, and to prevent a significant increase in the noise and in heavy truck traffic around the Town Center, no new excavation areas shall be permitted within one mile (5,280 feet) of the Center of the Town of Weare. The Center of Town shall mean the intersection of Flanders Memorial Drive, East Street and Route 114.

The motion was seconded as read by Ms. Drake. Ms. Drake spoke to her motion. The moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 47 adopted.

<u>Article 48</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the <u>Town of Weare Earth Products</u> <u>Ordinance</u> as follows:

To amend Section 4.A(7), regarding permit applications (additions are underlined):

"The Regulator reserves the right to conduct a traffic study, <u>an environmental impact</u> <u>study</u>, and a noise impact study at the applicant's expense to ensure that public safety, neighborhood compatibility, <u>environmental issues</u>, and road capacity and condition have been properly considered and addressed in the <u>permit application and</u> hauling plan." (By Petition)

Susan Drake motioned to move Article 48 as read. The motion was seconded. Ms. Drake spoke to her motion. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 48 adopted.

<u>Article 49</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the <u>Town of Weare Earth Products</u> <u>Ordinance</u> as follows:

To amend Section 4.A(4)(m), regarding necessary parts of the Excavation Plan. (deletions are underlined, additions are bold):

"For the purpose of groundwater protection, a <u>lot</u> log of borings or test pits that extend to either the seasonal high water table, ledge, or a minimum of <u>four (4)</u> ten (10) feet below the maximum proposed excavation depth, including location and soils data. One boring or test pit shall be performed per every three acres of proposed excavation area, with at least three borings or test pits performed per excavation site. A qualified soils person, recognized as such by the Regulator, shall provide a written report as to any indication of the presence of a seasonal high groundwater mark within four (4) ten (10) feet below the desired depth of excavation." (By Petition)

Susan Drake motioned to move Article 49 as written. The motion was seconded. Ms. Drake spoke to her motion. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote in the affirmative. Article 49 adopted.

<u>Article 50</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the <u>Town of Weare Earth Products</u> <u>Ordinance</u> as follows:

To amend Article 13.B in its entirety to read as follows:

"The Regulator may renew any existing permit. The renewal shall be accompanied by a new application, which adheres to all of the regulations defined in this ordinance in effect at the time of said application. In the event the applicant can prove the existing plan has not changed, and that the original proposed excavation area has not been exceeded, the Regulator may issue a renewal upon receipt of a signed statement from a licensed surveyor or licensed engineer stating so." (By Petition)

Susan Drake motioned to move Article 50. The motion was seconded. Ms. Drake spoke to her motion. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 50 adopted.

We voted to suspend the rules and take Article 51 at the beginning of the meeting. We moved to Article 52.

<u>Article 52</u>: To see if the Town will vote to designate as a Scenic Road the entire length of Duck Pond Road from Route 114 to Flanders Memorial Drive, pursuant to RSA 231:157, Scenic Roads; Designation. (By Petition)

Susan Drake motioned to move Article 52. The motion was seconded. Ms. Drake spoke to her motion. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote was in the affirmative. Article 52 adopted.

<u>Article 53</u>: Shall the Town of Weare, New Hampshire vote to rename the town athletic field currently known as the "Quaker Street Ballfield" with a new name to include in it's title the name Howard Ineson, Sr.? (By Petition)

Bernard Bastian moved Article 53 as read. The motion was seconded. Mr. Bastian spoke to his motion. Mr. Methot explained that this was something that the Selectmen had already planned to do. They were trying to decide on a name. The Moderator called for a vote. The vote in the unanimously affirmative. Article 53 adopted.

The Moderator asked if there was any other business to come before this meeting. Mr. Bastian asked why the salaries and insurance were not separate articles as previously voted. Legal Counsel said that was not legally binding but advisory to the Board.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn. Meeting adjourned at 3:55 p.m.

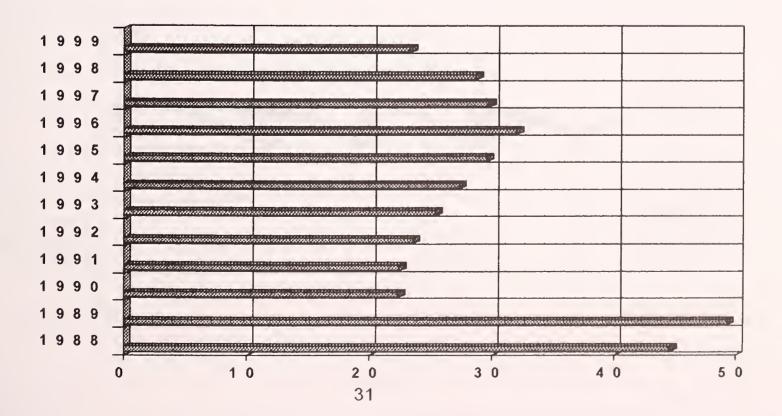

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

It has been quite a year. The preparation for Y2K was a major issue for all of us and at the same time the Motor Vehicles department released the new passenger plates. The plate issue didn't go as well as Y2K. The Department of Motor Vehicles had some unforeseen problems. The DMV is running out of numbers and is now in the process of making seven digit plates. A million new plates have already been issued. The next step will be trailers and motorcycles which is not expected to be issued until 2001.

As a Municipal Agent of the State we collect a \$2.50 fee for processing the state portion of the registration. This service has increased our revenue by better than \$20,0000.00. Many of you have also taken advantage of processing your renewals by mail. This has been a very successful undertaking and I hope more of you will take advantage of this service. Please take the time to read the notice and check your vehicle information. There were many new vehicles purchased this year which has increased that revenue to over \$900,000.00.

I want to publicly thank Margo McLeod for helping me sort and catalog most of the old records of our town. The record restoration has been an ongoing project started by my predecessor, Beverly Herman. There is much more to be accomplished but before we can move forward we need to create more space in the vault.

The Town Clerk is charged with keeping the records of the town. That means all Board Meeting Minutes, Election Records, Vital Records, Tax Records, Trustee, Bookkeeper and Treasurer records as well as Town Maps and License Plates are in this space. The History of our Town is kept here. The space needs to be utilized differently but it will involve your tax dollars. I have proposed a warrant article that will help solve the space issue for a few more years. The shelf units will be able to be moved when we do build a new Town Office Building. I hope you will vote for the purchase of the rolling shelf units.

Our Dog Licensing program has been very effective. We have better than 2,000 licensed dogs. A puppy needs to be licensed as soon as it receives the rabies shot. The fee for the license is \$6.50. The fee is the same as for a spayed or neutered animal; if they are not fixed the fee is \$9.00. A fine of \$25.00 is applied if the dog is not licensed on time.

We held a very successful Rabies Clinic with the help of Dr. Dutton and several volunteers. This clinic is usually held at the end of March or the beginning of April on a Wednesday Evening. The Clerk's Office is open to renew licenses at that time also. All dogs need to be licensed by April 30th.

I recently completed my third year at the New England Municipal Clerks Institute and graduated as a Certified Municipal Clerk in August. This learning experience is difficult to describe. It is referred to, by the students, as the "Salve Experience". The program is very intense as we are only there for one week. The classes started on Sunday evening and ended on Friday afternoon, So much is packed into these few days. This educational opportunity was granted through the International Clerks Scholarship program. In this as in most fields Education is an on going process. When I became your Clerk, my predecessor told me I would learn something new every day and she certainly was right. I was one of four New Hampshire Clerks to graduate in 1999 and we were the 25th class to graduate from the Institute.

We have a wonderful team in the office and we are here to help in any way we can. There are some new laws on the books which are there for your protection but has made helping you a little more difficult. Please understand that the Privacy Act does not allow us to give out information. You must bring your registration or your renewal notice with you so that we may process your registration.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT

The Building Department had a busy year with building permits at a five year high, inspections, code enforcement, fire inspections, zoning violations, E-911, and health complaints.

A reminder to all residents that the Town has a Street Number Ordinance requiring all homes and businesses to post their street numbers; minimum size 2" wide x 3" high.

Fire inspections were made at places of assembly, daycare, schools, commercial buildings, and foster homes. The office handles daily questions on building codes, zoning, fire codes, tax maps, street numbers, planning and many others.

John made all the arrangements for his videographers, stage manager and audio crew.

We also broadcast what are referred to as "Bicycle Tapes" from other community access television studios.

Weare receives a franchise fee from Media One (collected as a fee charged each cable user) which in 1999 was over \$20,000. Our budget has been running about \$6,500. We find ourselves with a very well-equipped studio but with a shortage of volunteers. With the growth of our facilities, we now require a part-time manager, to be paid from funds received in the fee paid to the Town by Media One. Without a part-time manger, the studio will not be able to continue the production and running of programming. CATV has become a vital means of communication within our town. This accomplishment has not been easy. It has involved the investment of thousands of hours of volunteer time on the part of a few committed citizens who are running out of steam. The facilities and equipment are there; now it needs someone to manage it. The income is there to hire that part-time manager; now it needs the Town's support. Weare CATV has been there for you over the past four years. Please be there for it when you vote in March.

2000 GAT of \$122,938 and Net Budget of \$4,487,621 = Tipping Fee of \$36.50 per ton.

We are happy to report to all member communities that 1999 marked the tenth complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest follow:

The 2000 Budget maintains the current tipping fee of \$36.50 per ton. This is the sixth consecutive year the Cooperative has been able to either lower or maintain the tipping fee.

The waste delivered to the Wheelabrator facility this year was 132,851 tons. That represents an increase of 4,834 tons over 1998, or a 3.78% increase. The amount of trash delivered continues to rise as predicted.

A total of 65,152 tons of ash were delivered to the Franklin ash monofill for disposal. The Ashfill continues to operate very well. Phase III Stage III is being filled at this time. The most recent expansion (1996) will provide disposal capacity for the next six years.

The air retrofit project at the plant has started. The project is on schedule and will be completed by January 2001. The retrofit will enable the plant to meet the most recent EPA and DES regulations.

The Cooperative purchased approximately 300 acres this past year for possible usse as either an ash landfill or waste landfill in the future. The purchase will provide the Cooperative disposal capacity well into the future.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (CRVNA) continues to offer comprehensive health services to the residents of Weare. The following is a description of these services:

<u>Home Care Services</u> respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and para-professional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting. Patients who receive services range from children who have a complex medical condition to frail elders who require supportive assistance to stay in their own homes.

<u>Hospice Services</u> provide professional and para-professional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphases is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

CRVNA's <u>Hospice House</u> provides residential care to terminally ill patients who have no primary caregiver or need a supported residential setting. Often times patients are transferred into the Hospice House when a caregiver is exhausted and unable to care for them at home any longer. To date, this house has provided a home to approximately 500 terminally ill residents.

<u>Community Health Services</u> include health education, health maintenance and preventive health services. The program includes preventive care, adult and senior health, child health, Baby's First Homecoming, immunizations for all ages, supportive services to school districts parent education and support, health education and nutritional counseling.

Community Health includes health promotion services which focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families and individuals through early intervention and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, adult screening, and immunizations. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior health services are provided at congregate housing sites.

Over the past two years Senior Health Clinics have expanded to reach out to seniors who may require a monthly check by a nurse of their blood sugar, blood pressure, and/or diabetes management. The expansion of these services was in response to the decrease in Medicare services to seniors. Professional and para-professional hourly home services are provided on a private feefor-service basis. Health education and instruction are part of each visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Weare may request service; patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. The nurse who completes an assessment will coordinate with the patient's physician a plan of care to meet the patient's specific needs. If the patient does not have a physician the nurse will assist the patient to identify one and schedule a visit. The agency has developed a program with the NH-Dartmouth Family Practice Residency Program to coordinate a house call visit by a resident to a frail elder's home who is unable to leave his/her home.

A call to Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (1-800-924-8620) is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. The CRVNA office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. A nurse is on call twenty-four hours a day. The On-Call Nurse can be reached by calling 1-800-924-8620.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for the individual without health insurance and/or who is unable to pay the full charge. However, to fee scale, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. The community health services are provided to residents often times free of charge. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of New Hampshire, accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of HealthCare Organizations (JCAHO) with commendation and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In 1999 Conservation Commission members have been involved in various activities, some of which are monitoring conservation easements, investigating wetland violations and gravel operation complaints.

The Conservation Commission is a panel of six volunteer Weare residents and one Selectman who acts as Ex-Officio. Members upgrade their knowledge and skills by attending workshops, conferences and the annual State Conservation Convention.

Much more needs to be done including educating the public about the importance of conservation and it's value to the environment and to future generations. Hopefully in the year 2000, with the support of the voters, the Commission will be financially able to obtain conservation easements or land to be developed for various types of activities for public use.

- Promoted existing businesses in Town by the Weare Chamber of Commerce.
- Continued its efforts to attract additional service businesses into Town.
- Responded to inquiries about the Town generated by the "Virtual Tour" on the Weare web site.
- Installed two new "Welcome to Weare" signs to help foster a sense of pride and community.
- Offered business seminars on E-Commerce and Y2K.

Plans for the year 2000 include:

- Organize a Weare Center Beautification effort.
- Enhance the "Virtual Tour" on the Weare web site.
- Survey the business community on ways to help their businesses grow and prosper.
- Conduct additional business seminars.
- Organize business to business networking meetings.
- Research the feasibility of a business incubator project.

WEARE FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Weare Finance Committee was first established in 1929 by vote of Town Meeting.

"Upon motion of Frank H. Peaslee, voted that a committee of twelve be appointed by the moderator to act as a Finance Committee. The following committee was appointed: Frank H. Peaslee, Frank Tucker, Charles A. Drewry, Asa E. Felch, Fred C. Jones, C. Ernest Leeds, Leon W. Watt, Forrest Dearborn, Charles F. Eastman, John F. Kerney, Frank N. Sawyer and Maurice J. Grant.

Frank A. Sawyer offered an amendment that the committee act without pay and the amendment carried."

Over the years, the group and its responsibilities may have changed but its primary function has remained the same. The Finance Committee is an independent committee of volunteers who participates in the budget development process so the People of Weare may feel more confident about the process and the Warrant Articles presented for their consideration.

This year the Finance Committee met in mid October to share our philosophical views and approaches regarding the municipal and school budgets. Resulting from these very productive discussions and with other input from the community, as this years chairperson I have identified the following goals for the 2000 budget session:

- 1. Committee members shall have a clear understanding of the factors contributing to the dramatic changes in the 1999 tax rate resulting from he State Adequate Education Funding.
- 2. The Finance Committee shall enhance the budget process by implementing a two phased system of participation in budget development.
 - a. The first phase is one of fact finding, where Finance Committee Members gather information by casually observing the respective Boards as they create their budgets.
 - b. The second phase is where the Finance Committee's work really begins. During this evaluation phase the Finance Committee will meet as an independent group in order to analyze and critique the final budgets and warrant articles as presented by the respective Boards.
- 3. Committee Members shall continue our commitment to providing the citizen's of Weare with an unbiased balance of information based on the facts provided us by the respective boards as well as other pertinent information.

In 1929, the Town of Weare created the Weare Finance Committee as a second set of eyes and ears in the budget process and twelve men volunteered to serve the people of Weare in a spirit of community, fellowship, and sincere caring for the people and place they called home.

Seventy years later, the Town of Weare still benefits from the wisdom of our heritage and the people of Weare are still fortunate to have among us similar men and women with the same spirit and dedication to family, friends, and community.

WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the 1999 year, the Fire Department/Rescue Squad responded to 476 emergency calls. This figure represents an approximate increase of 12.6% over 1998 figures.

<u>EQUIPMENT</u>: The following is a list of some of the equipment purchased by the Fire Department in 1999:

Due to an imposed spending freeze in the early part of the year, we had to forego purchasing other necessary equipment.

EMERGENCY REPAIRS: During the 1999 year, the Fire Department experienced a couple of unexpected expenses for equipment failure. The first, and most costly, was for Engine 4, which required a new pump. At press time, the estimated cost for replacement of this equipment was running between fifteen thousand and nineteen thousand dollars. The repairs are expected to take approximately six to eight weeks, leaving the Fire Department short one Engine. The second unexpected expense was for the purchase and installation of a new pump for the old well. After installation of a new town well, it was noted that the old well, used by the Fire Department to fill tankers, was not pumping at full capacity. Personnel noted that there was a flow of approximately three gallons per minute, causing a major tie up in refilling the tankers. The new pump will allow for quicker filling and recovery of same. The estimated cost at press time is roughly two thousand dollars for the completion.

<u>VEHICLE MAINTENANCE</u>: All vehicles received bi-weekly inspections and oil changes. Engine Three was retired due to its age (1961) and costs to improve and/or repair problems with this truck were too great to justify keeping the truck on line as an emergency piece of apparatus. <u>REPEATER SYSTEM</u>: A new repeater system was installed and the old frequencies used by the Fire Department were changed. This new system was funded by a Capital Improvement fund previously established. The new system will allow for better transmission and receiving of all radio communications.

<u>SMOKEY THE BEAR/FIRE DANGER</u>: As most may have noticed, the Fire Department has a new fixture in the front of the building. A carving of Smokey the Bear, created by Tom Worcester, has been erected with a fire danger sign by his side to alert all residents of the current fire danger levels. This project as funded with donations received in memory of Chief "Punky" Rhodenizer. Anyone knowing Chief Rhodenizer would have to agree this was a fitting tribute to a man who gave so much of this time to the Fire service and the Town. The fire danger sign was built and erected by Captain Dave Hewey and all level signs were painted by Kate Rhodenizer. Our sincere thanks and appreciation to all who donated their time to this worthwhile project.

<u>DONATED EQUIPMENT</u>: The following equipment was donated to the Weare Fire Department by the Weare Firefighters Association:

One Portable Foam Proportioner Below Grade Rescue Equipment (ropes and harnesses) One Portable Radio

These items were purchased with funds donated to the Firefighters Association in memory of Chief "Punky" Rhodenizer, Firefighters "Bunny" Phelps and Firefighter Harold Hall.

<u>NEW AMBULANCE PURCHASE</u>: With approval of Town Meeting this year, we saw the purchase of a brand new ambulance to replace the ten year old ambulance being used. Funding for this came from a capital improvement fund previously established. The new ambulance is a 1999 Ford and a bit larger than the old one. This larger size allows for more equipment necessary to assist our personnel with life threatening situations including Basic Life Support and Advanced Life Support Systems.

<u>NEW FIREFIGHTER/EMT'S</u>: Ten new members joined the Department this year. They are Firefighter/EMT Joshua Guay, EMT Cynthia Mahoney, Firefighter Keith Pepper, Firefighter Rodney Johnson, Paramedic Anne Gaucher, Firefighter/EMT Michael Lafluer, EMT Matthew Bolton, Firefighter Greg Buxton, Firefighter Richard Morgan and EMT Jeanne Thibeault. We are pleased to have these willing and able people join us in providing the best possible service to the Town of Weare.

<u>COMMUNITY SERVICE</u>: Members again assisted with traffic control and parking for John Stark graduation in June and also with the Open House sponsored by Knoxland Farms.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 277-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. During the 1999 season Forest Rangers were busy assisting communities with suppression of difficult and remote multi-day fires. Forest Rangers have also investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each Town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The 1999 fire season was a challenging bur safe year for wildland firefighters in New Hampshire. The severe drought conditions throughout the Spring and Summer months combined with residual effects of 1998 ice storms resulted in a dramatic increase in wildland fires. In addition to burning in excess of 452 acres, 35 structures were also impacted by wildfire. Wildland fires in the urban interface is a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their structures by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

Please contact your local Fire Department before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Remember - Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires!

WEARE FOURTH OF JULY COMMITTEE

When the petitioned warrant article which the Committee had placed on the ballot in 1999 failed by a vote of 753 in favor and 793 opposed, the Committee had a very difficult decision to make. After much discussion, the 1999 Patriotic Celebration was canceled due to the lack of funds available and the short amount of time in which to raise funds. Not a single member of the Committee took this decision lightly and were all disappointed with having to cancel.

Plans for a 2000 Celebration have been discussed and the Committee once again has a petitioned warrant article on the ballot (Article 31). This article is requesting the amount of \$11,900 to apply toward the total cost of the celebration which normally runs between \$25,000 and \$28,000. The Committee raises the remainder of the money needed for the celebration. This amount represents what has been received from the Town in past years but which was reduced to \$1,900 in 1998 due to the Default Budget situation and not received at all in 1998 due to the warrant article failing. The Committee would appreciate your support by voting yes on Article 31.

The theme for the 2000 parade is "Y2K and Beyond, Weare Will We Be". If you are interested in participating in the parade, please call Naomi Bolton at 529-1399. Anyone interested in reserving a spot on the green for concessions may call Laura Petrain at 529-4685.

As a Committee, we are always looking for new members and welcome any suggestions for future programs. HEALTH OFFICER

The Health Officer for the Town of Weare is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and appointed by the Director of the State of New Hampshire Office of Community and Public Health for a term of three years.

The role of the Health Officer is to enforce the New Hampshire public health rules and laws as well as the local ordinances and regulations. The Health Officer also serves as a liaison between state officials and the local community on issues concerning local public health.

Questions and problems regarding septic, wells, unhealthful living conditions, noise, pollution and trash may be directed to the Health Officer through the Code Enforcement Department located in the Town Office Building. In addition, rental properties must provide adequate heat, electricity and potable drinking water under current New Hampshire state law.

During the past year, the Weare Health Officer attended the Annual State Meeting of New Hampshire Health Officers and two additional seminars. In March of this year, the Town Health Department and the Center Woods Elementary School nurse sponsored the first annual Weare Health Fair at which over 30 health care providers exhibited and approximately 300 people attended.

It is the 2000 goal of the Health Officer to work closely with the Town of Weare's Community Wellness Team to promote healthy behaviors and lifestyles through educational events, exercise classes and a second annual health fair.

WEARE HIGHWAY DEPARMENT

1999 was another successful year for the Highway Department. January, February and March proved to be very icy requiring much overtime and high salt usage.

We rebuilt the entire length of Old Town Road and brought it up to base pavement grade. We also reclaimed 7,000 feet of Reservoir Drive. We also re-ditched, added gravel and guardrails as well as repaying with base pavement. We also reconstructed Upper Craney Hill Road and paved it up to Emery Lane. The Twin Bridge Road Bridge was completed and we finished paving Twin Bridge Road to the New Boston Town line.

We also spent a lot of time doing road maintenance such as ditching, adding gravel, removing large rocks from roads, brush trimming, shimming and patching pot holes. Our shop keeps very busy doing all the maintenance on all the Town vehicles.

Thanks to the voters of Weare we put our new 10 wheeler to work in October. It has already proven to be very useful this fall in many aspects as well as replacing two trucks.

In September, the Highway Department said good-bye and good luck to long time employee Bill Tiffany. Bill retired from the Highway Department after 20 years of dedicated service to the Town of Weare.

With good weather this fall, we were able to complete 90% of the drainage on High Street and at the Town Office Building.

In 2000 we will be asking to replace a 22-year-old grader. We again appreciate the great support of the Weare voters.

Major projects will include reclaiming the remaining portion of Reservoir Drive to the Deering Town Line and repaying. We also plan to topcoat Old Town Road and the last several feet of Twin Bridge. We also have plans to ditch and replace gravel on numerous dirt roads.

We are looking forward to another successful year.

WEARE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

"The purpose of the Society shall be to collect and preserve records and artifacts relating to the Town of Weare, New Hampshire, to provide assistance in protecting historical sites in the town, and to encourage the study and appreciation of local history." - Article II By-Laws and Constitution.

With the above statement in mind, the Society has been exploring ways in which it can help to preserve our historical structures.

The Town Hall and horse sheds at Weare Center need repair, the Clinton Grove Academy building needs repair, the Osborne Memorial Hall in South Weare is another building, thought not town owned, which should be given serious consideration.

These are historic structures which have played an important part in the lives of Weare residents over the past one hundred fifty years. We need to preserve, protect, and make use of them!

We have voted to pay for tarpaulins to cover the horse sheds in the back of Weare Town Hall to protect the roof until funds can be raised to repair it. The Town Hall itself is in need of major repairs. We have voted to contribute \$4,500. to the Town to help in the restoration of the hall. A campaign to <u>Save the Buildings</u> is underway.

We urge you to support efforts to save our landmarks.

This year the Society has sponsored a number of programs including an interesting and informative video and lecture on <u>Maple Syrup Making</u> by Robin IIsley, a history of <u>The Town Meeting</u> by Prof. Jere Danielle of Dartmouth, and <u>Blacksmithing in Weare</u> by Michael Schuirmann. Prof. Danielle's talk was made possible by a grant from the NH Humanities Council. Robin and Michael are Weare residents, experts in their respective fields, who shared their knowledge with us in a most interesting and informative manner. Video tapes of the program were made by Channel 6, shown on the Weare Channel, and are available at the Weare Public Library.

Fund raisers for the Society were an <u>Antiques Appraisal Day</u> in April, the <u>Town Wide</u> <u>Yard Sale</u> in May, and the <u>Bring and Buy Sale</u> in September.

Pictorial Histories Vol. III and Vol. IV, A to Z Books, commemorative coins, and 1888 maps of Weare are available for sale. The maps are a great help in using the <u>History of Weare, NH 1735-1888</u> by William Little.

The Stone Memorial Building in Weare Center has been open one day a month June through October and numerous other times by appointment. If you have not seen the collection of Weare memorabilia housed there we urge you to come and learn more of Weare's remarkable history.

PLANNING BOARD

Nineteen Ninety Nine was another busy year for the Planning Board. The Board is made up of residents who volunteer their time to administer the Subdivision and Site Plan Regulations, update the Town's Master Plan, recommend changes in the Zoning Ordinance, and oversee the Capital Improvement Program.

The Planning Board is scheduled to meet the second and fourth Thursday of each month. The first meeting is devoted to Public Hearings (subdivisions, site plan reviews, lot line adjustments, voluntary mergers, conceptual hearings). In 1999, the Board approved 12 new subdivision lots, 12 lot line adjustments, 6 site plans and 14 voluntary mergers. The second meeting is a scheduled work session that allows the Board to work on Subdivision changes, the Capital Improvement Program and proposed zoning amendments. On many occasions, submitted plans were continued to our work session in an effort to expedite the process for the applicants.

After many months of discussion, extra work sessions, and a Public Hearing, the Town of Weare's Subdivision Regulations were revised to bring the Town into compliance with State Statutes. The Board had several meetings with the Board of Firewards in an effort to propose changes to the current Fire Suppression Ordinance, enacted in 1986. Both Boards agreed on a fee of \$1500.00 per building permit for all new homes and commercial buildings in the Town. The Planning Board is currently meeting with the Zoning Board of Adjustment, the Economic Development Committee and the Conservation Commission to determine if there is a need to revise the current Zoning Map or the Zoning Ordinance to help preserve the rural nature of our Town. These Boards are anticipating holding a Public Meeting in the near future to hear input from the citizens of Weare as to the direction you wish to see our Town proceed in.

The Planning Board is requesting the Public's support this year in our effort to hire a Planner for the Town. Southern New Hampshire Commission predicts a population growth of 65% for our Town by the year 2015. Now is the time to begin to prepare for that growth. This would provide the Town with a professional capable of working with the applicants and all Boards in our efforts to manage growth in an equitable and orderly manner.

I would like to thank the members of the Board: Brad Macauley, Secretary; Douglas Hatch, Ex-Officio; Jeanette Boisvert; Paul Smith; Tom Egan; Sally Watson; as well as other residents who volunteered their time to the Board during 1999.

The Planning Board is expecting that the year 2000 will be another busy, productive year. Anyone who is interested in volunteering for the Planning Board should contact the Town Office. New members are always welcome.

WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT 1999 ANNUAL REPORT

With the closing of the year 1999 and entering into the new millenium, the Police Department has seen many changes. The first change was the retirement of the Chief of Police, Edward Tuthill. Chief Tuthill served the Town of Weare with four dedicated years of service to the community. After 28 years in Law Enforcement, Chief Tuthill is now enjoying his well deserved retirement.

Two patrolmen left the Police Department during the year. Officer Morley left to start a new career with the Bedford Police Department and Officer Biron is now working with the Manchester Police Department. We wish them both the best of luck.

With the resignations of Officer Morley and Officer Biron, two new vacancies were created. These positions were filled by Officer Mark Morrison, a long time resident of Weare, and Officer Mark Bodanza. After successfully completing the New Hampshire Police Academy, they were put into the duty rotation.

The Board of Selectmen approached the State Police to request assistance in managing the Police Department while they searched for a new Chief of Police. This has been a great service to the Town and has been provided at no cost. The Board of Selectmen established a screening committee to aide in the search of a Chief of Police. The Committee reviewed thirty applications from all over New England in their search for a qualified candidate. After reviewing the applications and conducting interviews, the field was narrowed down to five candidates which were referred to the Board of Selectmen for further consideration.

Statistically the Police Department has been extremely busy with investigating a wide variety of crimes and calls for service. A couple of the high profile crimes consisted of an attempted murder, the stabbing of two adults and the explosion of a homemade bomb at a Weare residence which resulted in serious injury. These investigations have made an exhaustive drain on resources and has forced Police personnel to work long hours due to the lack of manpower.

The Police Department has used some creative scheduling to maintain twenty-four hour coverage for the Town of Weare. This scheduling has cut the overtime down considerably and eliminated the on call time. With the availability of having an officer on duty 24 hour a day, it has allowed the department to focus its efforts on a wide range of Law Enforcement areas. The first is traffic enforcement. The Officers have taken a very proactive approach to traffic enforcement which serves to deter crime. This approach has significantly decreased the number of traffic accidents along with the number of motor vehicle complaints. Other areas of focus have been the active patrol of the secondary roads within the Town and frequent business checks. These patrol tactics serve to enhance public awareness that their officers are out on patrol to provide service to the community when needed. Weare continues to be one of the most active communities with the highest number of calls for service in the immediate geographic area. The volume of calls for service has put a strain on the officers and resources of the Police Department to provide the highest degree of Law Enforcement service to the community. The daily workload justifies, without question, an increase in the number of Police Officers for the Town. The Town should closely consider the tremendous benefit with having their own full-time Police Department and should provide them with the necessary personnel to so the job at hand.

The Police Department faces new challenges for the new millenium. The wide use and availability of computers has seen a dramatic increase in white collar computer crimes. This will force the Officers to receive training in the investigation of these crimes to keep current with the trend. Additionally, with the volume of people moving into town due to the geographic proximity to Concord and Manchester will increase the volume of traffic on our town roads. This population increase to our community will require that the Police Department to remain current with equipment and training in order to meet the needs and demands of the Town.

WEARE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Throughout 1999, the library added patrons who came for recreational or reference reading. Library activity cannot be measured by our annual circulation figure alone, which was approximately 35,500. This number indicates books, magazines, audiocassettes and videos signed out. It doesn't represent the many other library services provided, from answers to reference questions, to assistance to patrons doing research on our public Internet access, to presenting programs or just helping someone choose a book.

The Children's Room experienced a fruitful and fun 1999. A day in the life of our space included many young patrons learning to love reading and others discovering answers to their questions. Story Time was scheduled during the day, twice a month. Programs were a combination of stories, rhymes and crafts. Some included special guests performing music along with the stories. This year we had 22 Story Times with a total attendance of 675 children between the ages of 3 and 5. After school our stacks were busy with students doing homework or special reports.

Summer provided the opportunity for schoolchildren to maintain reading skills through our Summer Reading Club. In 1999, 83 participants read a total of 3084 books. Volunteers presented two special programs during the five-week reading club, and the UNH-based theater group *Little Red Wagon* performed at the final celebration. Other programs included a Cub Scout visit and a music program during spring vacation.

On the main floor, the biggest change occurred in October, when Director Bessie Myhr retired after twenty years' service. A reception in the Emma Sawyer Room at the library gave well-wishers an opportunity to say good-bye. Christine Hague was appointed Director. Her former position as Assistant Librarian was filled by Dino Quimby of Weare. The year also saw Barbara Lutz replace Anita Straw on the evening shift.

Many of you have purchased books weeded from the collection and sold in our lobby. Weeding books on the shelves continues in preparation for conversion to an automated circulation system. The conversion process has been slow, coming at a time when the library is short-staffed due to budget limitations. During the day, our staff is often called upon to attend to a variety of other very immediate responsibilities. However, our target date for a complete conversion is the end of 2000.

The library sponsored Weare Writers' Group meets the second and fourth Monday evenings of each month. In its sixth year, the group has a reputation among New Hampshire writers for being open, fair-minded, and capable of constructive literary critiques. Meetings are informal and open to the public.

Thanks go to the stalwart volunteers in the Friends of the Weare Public Library, who once again sponsored a successful used book drive, and a book and bake sale held in the town hall on September 11. Proceeds from this event have been pledged toward equipment for the library. The Friends also sponsored a spring book discussion series. Thanks also to all of our library volunteers, and to you, the public, for your valued support. Please visit the library if you haven't already. We would like to meet you, and to share the resources we are privileged to have here. You provided them - come in and use them!

SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has a wide range of services and resources available to help the dues-paying members deal with a variety of municipal issues. Technical assistance is provided by a professional staff whose expertise is, when necessary, supplemented by consultants who are selected for their specialized skills or services. Each year, with the approval of your appointed representatives, the Commission staff designs and carries out programs of area-wide significance that are mandated under New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations, as well as local or site-specific projects which would pertain more exclusively to your community.

Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner by staff at the request of your Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen. The Commission conducts planning studies and carries out projects that are of common interest and benefit to all member communities, keeps your officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulation, and offers training workshops for Planning and Zoning Board members on an annual basis.

Services that were performed for the Town of Weare during the past year are as follows:

- 1. Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture series. These meetings were attended by Weare officials.
- 2. Conducted traffic counts at twelve locations in the Town of Weare. Data was forwarded to the Chair of the Planning Board.
- 3. Provided a copy of the "Land Use Plan 2015 for the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission Sub-region." A copy of that document was also sent to the Weare Public Library.
- 4. Provided a video entitled "Access Management and Land Use and Transportation" for the use of the Planning Board.
- 5. Provided a handbook on "Stormwater Management for New Hampshire Communities" prepared by the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission, and a handbook on "The Law (RSA 155-E) Governing Earth Excavations," prepared by the Southwest Region Planning Commission.
- 6. Prepared the town's composite tax map.
- 7. With the help of GPS (Global Positioning System), determined the locations of firefighting cisterns and ponds. These locations were plotted on a town road base map. A copy has been forwarded to the Fire Chief.

- 8. Prepared the zoning map for the Town of Weare. This was done by digitizing the zoning district boundaries and superimposing them on the composite tax map.
 - 9. Continued necessary work for preparing a GIS (Geographic Information System) coverage for the Town of Weare.
 - 10. Provided a copy of "Impact Fee Development, a Handbook for New Hampshire Communities," prepared by the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission.

This land is a beautiful piece of Weare, giving contemplation and inspiration to those who seek out its magnificence. 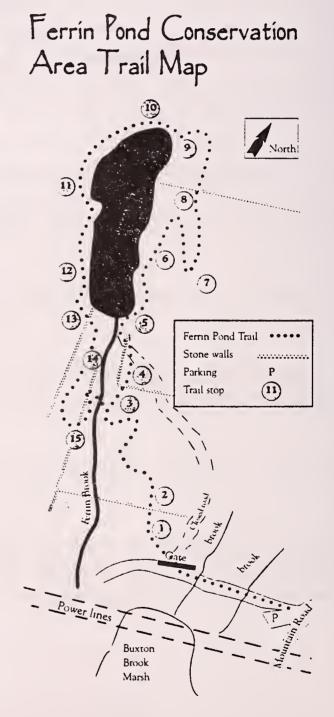
Ferrin Pond Trail: This 2.6-mile long scenic trail will take you upward along a grand ridge to Ferrin Pond. The trail loops around the pond through portions of the 278-acre Ferrin Pond forest. Follow the yellow trail markers, which begin just beyond the boulder gate.

HISTORY

A great force of glacial ice created Ferrin Pond during the Pleistocene Epoch. This time period spans the last million years, but only within the last 10,000 - 15,000 years did the last ice sheet disappear from this part of the world. Results of the gouging and flooding forces from moving mountains of ice (over a mile thick in much of the area) can still be seen in many places. During the Pleistocene Epoch, four glacial stages occurred. The last event, called the Wisconsin glacial stage, created Ferrin Pond.

Ferrin Pond was named after Enos Ferrin, who lived in the area during the mid - to late 1700's. Local records show he served in the Revolutionary War. The pastures surrounding the pond are believed to be his.

Over the decades, Enos Ferrin's pastures grew into forests and the Ferrin Pond area became home to many plants and animals. However, during the 1980's the land around Ferrin Pond was often vandalized by careless people. In 1988, the town of Weare and the PWA banded together to clean up the trash that littered Ferrin Pond's shores. After years of negotiation with landowners, and through the efforts of the town of Weare and the PWA, the entire Ferrin Pond Conservation Area was protected as a natural area for wildlife and as a recreational area for the public.

Weare School Board Report

To the Citizens of Weare,

The staff of the Weare School District has diligently worked to provide the children of Weare with the best possible education, while answering the call of the voters to reduce spending. This has often been a difficult task as both children and staff alike have had to learn to live with less. Our teachers, aides and nursing staff have twice been disappointed by the community's failure to ratify a contract, which both School Board members and teacher negotiators felt was both fair and equitable to the community and the staff. We have lost a number of very dedicated staff members to school districts that could offer them employment security. This has taken a tremendous toll on our teaching community as these individuals represented a wealth of knowledge in their teaching areas and a great deal of long-term understanding regarding our children and their needs.

Despite these setbacks, those dedicated individuals who have remained have once again given 110% of themselves to our community. Center Woods Elementary School School Nurse Report

This was a busy year for the Center Woods Elementary School Health Office. The health office continued to have approximately 60 student visits a day and some staff. The visits were for illness, injury, or medications and dealt with as appropriate. Referrals for further care or follow up was made as needed. The primary focus of the health office remains to be the health and well being of the children.

Each interaction with a child is seen as an opportunity to teach health care and self-care. In the classroom or in the Health Office, topics taught ranged from: Asthma; proper handwashing; disease transmission; basic first aid – taking care of minor cuts and bruises; nutrition; body and oral hygiene; and pediculosis (head lice).

Pediculosis screenings were done during the first month of school and as needed throughout the school year. Like the rest of the country, head lice were persistent here. Thanks to the diligence of everyone- (parents, students, teachers, and staff) we were able to keep the number of cases small. Head checking time became an instructional period as we discussed the life cycle of the louse, how to get rid of them, and prevention.

Classroom presentations included:

- Car safety proper use of seat belts.
- Ready Fox 911 presentation for 1st and 2nd grades
- Heimlich Hugs Program by Optima Health Community Education
- Presented to 3rd grade classes instruction in the prevention of choking, what to do when you or someone else is choking, and calling 911.
- 911 Presentation to all 4th grade classes by Jack O'Conner, a representative of the NH 911 system.

Immunization surveys and health records of all new students were completed in order to comply with the NH State law. A follow up letter was sent home to the parents or guardians of those students who were not in compliance with state immunization requirements.

Hearing and vision screenings were done on all incoming first graders and upon request for other students with concerns. Referrals for follow up care was made as needed. I conferred daily with parents and teachers about students. This contact is helpful for medication monitoring or deciding what may be causing physical symptoms of a student who is frequently visiting the health office. I also participated in Parent-Teacher conferences as needed or requested.

Newsletters were sent home monthly regarding health concerns at school and health awareness issues. Parents and Guardians were reminded to call the school when their child is out and to keep the Health Office updated on any illness, injury, or immunization. This allows student health records to be updated or temporary changes made to a child's school day while recovering from an injury or illness.

It was my pleasure to work with town Health Officer, Donna Meuse, in organizing the first "Weare Health Fair." The purpose of the fair was to promote health and wellness education in the community. There were 22 exhibitors set up in the Center Woods Multi Purpose room, covering a variety of health topics. I would like to thank community organizations such as the Weare Rescue Squad, Lions Club, Susan Couhie of Riverside Taekwondo, and Pastor Christensen of Christ Community Church for participating and supporting this event. Thanks also to Mr Augello and staff for their encouragement, support, and helping hands in this endeavor. Thanks to Linda Ford and crew for the great food!

Response to the fair was very positive from visitors and exhibitors. Plans are set for another Health Fair March 11, 2000 at the Center Woods School. Hopefully it will not snow this time.

It was a very busy year and I met more people from the Weare community. Thank you to all who helped with the many different activities (holiday food baskets and the Angel tree) and concerns in the health office. I appreciate your support, cooperation, and understanding. Working together we can prepare our children for a bright, productive, and healthy future. Healthy children do learn better.

Weare Middle School School Nurse Report

As student population continues to grow, so do student visits to the health office. Illness, injury and other health related and/or personal issues are addressed on a daily basis. The majority of students are assessed and treated in the health office and are able to return to their classes. Students more seriously ill or injured are referred to the appropriate medical personnel for treatment or sent home with their parents. Our health office is also open to staff, parents and their families at all dimes during the school year as a source for obtaining information on health related issues, as well as individual monitoring, health counseling and general first aid. All student visits to the health office are documented on a daily basis and reviewed with parents when necessary. The nurse's office is open during regular school hours.

A newly automated telephone system has been installed allowing for voice messaging for general use. For specific needs or emergencies do not rely on voice mail but be certain to revert to the main office to make a confirmed contact.

Height, weight, vision, hearing and scoliosis screenings are on-going throughout the year with referrals coming from parents and staff. Students with questionable results to any of these screenings are referred to their parents for follow-up by their family physician for diagnosis and treatment. At the beginning of each year, a system of keeping, administering and recording medication is implemented and reviewed regularly throughout the year. Pediculosis checks are done at random during the year or whenever we are alerted to a possible problem. Parent letters are sent home on a regular basis with regard to health concerns at school and health awareness issues.

In the area of preventative care, immunization records were reviewed during the school year and notices sent to parents of those students needing additional immunizations and/or boosters to complete their immunization schedule. A large number of 7th grade students were found to be in need of their second MMR immunization. Letters were also mailed to parents of the present sixth grade class to remind them that this immunization is mandatory to all students entering the seventh grade. All students were compliant with NH State Immunization Schedule or in the process of becoming compliant by the end of the school year.

This year, the majority of students have been seen for symptoms of upper respiratory infections, "flu-like" complaints, headache and upset stomach. Stress and stress-related complaints/symptoms continues to be a growing concern. Students often come by to talk about problems that are Such things as tests and grades, parental stressful in their lives. expectations, peer pressure, career decisions, social demands and building relationships are, to name a few, conditions that can be very stressful to a student. During a discussion, issues may resolve themselves or may be separated into smaller issues that are easier to deal with. Students may also be referred to our guidance counselor if there is a need. Any information given to the student is done so in a positive manner that encourages them to deal with their problems in a positive way. Each contact with a child is an opportunity for health teaching. It is important for students to know that stress is a natural and normal part of life that accompanies our efforts to adapt to almost any form of change. By teaching them how to manage stress, we teach them how to be responsible and in control of their own situations, rather than giving it up to others or to the environment.

It continues to be a privilege to serve the Weare School District and, as always I thank the parents for their support and cooperation. I thank the administration, School Board, staff, students and residents of Weare, as well as all the community groups I've had the pleasure of working with this past year. I look forward to the opportunity of working with you and your children in the coming year.

SAU Study Committee Report

The Weare SAU Study Committee was formed to investigate the feasibility of the Weare School District withdrawing from SAU #24, a multi-district school administrative unit comprised of Weare, John Stark, Henniker, and Stoddard school districts, and creating a new administrative unit that would solely serve the Weare School District. The two major reasons cited for considering withdrawal from SAU #24 were acquiring 100% onsite dedicated services of a superintendent for the Weare School District, and legislative autonomy regarding SAU budgeting, expenditures and philosophical direction.

Weare School District students (grades 1-8) currently represent 47% of the total students served by SAU #24, or nearly double any other single school district (Henniker: 23%, John Stark: 27%, Stoddard: 2%). The SAU #24 offices and personnel are physically located in Henniker NH. As a member of SAU #24, Weare receives the shared services of a Superintendent, Pupil Personnel Director, Business Administrator, and support staff. Additionally, Weare receives the services of an Assistant Superintendent dedicated to the Weare School District two days a week.

This year marked the third consecutive year that the Weare SAU Study Committee has met to investigate this issue. Last year, the committee finalized a plan for a traditional SAU structure consisting of a full time Superintendent, Pupil Personnel Director, Business Administrator and various support staff. This year, the committee investigated a non-traditional SAU structure that would transfer a majority of the Superintendent's responsibilities to the existing principals of the schools and essentially remove the position of an official Superintendent of Schools for the district. During the discussions, it became clear that the current administrative staff would not be sufficient to perform the existing job requirements, in addition to new superintendent job duties, and that a minimum of another full-time Assistant Principal position would have to be added. Additionally, the committee became aware that certain statutory regulations required the signature of a Superintendent and that a Principal acting in that role would not be able to sign certain legal documents necessary for the running of a school district.

Various members of the committee noted that one of the major financial obstacles preventing Weare from forming its own SAU is the current structure of the John Stark School District. John Stark is a high school shared by both Weare and Henniker students, governed by a separate school board, and is a separate legal entity. The committee noted that even if the Weare School District formed its own SAU, the taxpayers in Weare would still have to contribute tax dollars to SAU #24 for Weare's share of students represented at John Stark High School. Based upon the projected budget for SAU #24, if the Weare School District withdrew from it, the yearly cost for the Weare portion of the John Stark SAU #24 budget would be a negligible increase. Combining this cost with the budget necessary for a running a separate Weare SAU resulted in a cost (\$344,754) that the committee felt was not justifiable.

Upon a motion, second, and recorded vote, the committee voted to reject a nontraditional SAU structure for the Weare School District and recommended that Weare remain in the existing SAU #24 for the present time. Although a withdrawal from SAU #24 is not recommended at this time, the committee did identify some issues for both the town and the Weare School Board to consider in future discussions.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL STRUCTURE BASED ON AN AUDIT OF GENERAL PURPOSE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

To the School Board Weare, New Hampshire School District

We have audited the general purpose financial statements of the Weare, New Hampshire School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1999, and have issued our report thereon dated October 4, 1999.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement.

The management of the Weare, New Hampshire School District is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the Weare, New Hampshire School District for the year ended June 30, 1999, we obtained an understanding of the internal control structure. With respect to the internal control structure, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control structure. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Weare School District - Auditor's Report continued

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the general purpose financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

However, we noted certain matters involving the internal control structure and its operations that we have reported to the management of the Weare, New Hampshire School District in a separate letter dated October 4, 1999.

This report is intended for the information of management and the School Board. However, this report is a matter of public record, and its distribution is not limited.

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Deliberative Session February 2, 1999

Ray Kelly, School Moderator, called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m. Mr. Kelly welcome everyone and informed them that the purpose of this session is to consider the 1999 Schoo Warrant. Mr. Kelly read the following:

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Weare qualified to vote in Distric affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Center Woods Multipurpose Room Tuesday February 2, 1999 at 7:00 p.m. to act on the following subjects. Ballot voting will be hele on Tuesday, March 9, 1999 at Center Woods Elementary School with polls open at 7:00 a.m. and closing at 7:00 p.m.

Article 1

Shall the District receive the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers chosen as printed in the Annual Report, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (Majority vote required.)

Lynne Crevoiserat spoke to the article stating that it is a housekeeping measure. There is no money attached to this article.

Frank Campana, Chairman of the Finance Committee said the Committee recommended the article as read and went on to introduce the Finance Committee members in attendance.

Mr. Kelly asked for any discussion. There was none. Mr. Kelly took a vote on Article 1 Article 1 passed.

Article 2

Shall the District vote to set the salaries of the School Board and the compensation for any other officers of the District as printed in the 1999-2000 Budget, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (THIS WARRANT ARTICLE IS SUPPORTED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD) (Majority vote required)

Lynne Crevoiserat spoke to this article. Mrs. Crevoiserat said that the 1999/2000 amount for this article is included in Article 5, the operating budget. The School Board Members earn \$500 per year and this article simply allows them to get paid.

Frank Campana said there is no recommendation from the Finance Committee since the article has no money amount attached to it. Mr. Campana said that he stands corrected

on Article 1, that the Finance Committee has no recommendation since that too had no money amount attached to it.

Mr. Kelly asked for any discussion. There was none. Mr. Kelly took a vote on Article 2. Article 2 passed.

Article 3

Shall the District vote to approve the cost item included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Weare School Board and the Weare Education Association, which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of \$136,349 for the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. (THIS WARRANT ARTICLE IS SUPPORTED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD) This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article #5, the operating budget (Majority vote required)

Joe MacAllister spoke to the article. Mr. MacAllister said that after the negotiated agreement was rejected last year they went back to the negotiating table. This article represents a two-year agreement, 1998/1999 and 1999/2000. This year, the only change is a 2% increase for Aides only. Mr. MacAllister said that when the process begins for the following school year, they will go back to last years salaries as far as teachers are concerned. There will be 8 instead of 6 non-instructional days. The teachers will be paid per diem for those days which will be 1.07% of the contract. Teachers and Aides will also receive a 3% pay increase. Mr. MacAllister said that the first year includes salary & FICA for Aides and the second year includes salary & FICA for Aides and Teachers. There is no change in the benefits pool.

Frank Campana said the Finance Committee recommended the article as read.

Mr. Kelly asked for questions or comments.

<u>Kevin Winship</u> - Mr. Winship spoke and said that the yellow handout from the Finance Committee explains why or why not the Committee recommends each article. Mr. Winship said that the Finance Committee does look at all the components of the tax impact on the sides of the Town, Weare Schools and John Stark. All of this is taken into consideration when the recommendations are voted on.

<u>Bernie Bastian</u> - Mr. Bastian said that last year he asked the School Board to talk to the teachers about merit pay and a high absentee rate. It is Mr. Bastian's opinion that neither one was addressed. Mr. Bastian feels the absentee rate is much too high. Mr. Bastian said that in a recent survey of metropolitan job rates, only twenty professions made more

money than teachers. Mr. Bastian feels students grades are poor and he is not sure the teachers should be paid this amount of money.

Mr. Kelly called for a vote on Article 3. Article 3 passed.

Article 4

Shall the Weare School District, if Article 3 is defeated, authorize the governing body to call one special meeting, at its option, to address article 3 cost items only? (THIS WARRANT ARTICLE IS SUPPORTED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD) (Majority vote required.)

Joe MacAllister spoke to the article. Mr. MacAllister said the origin of this article was recommended by the SAU and said that a lot of districts are placing this language in the warrant this year. This addresses an issue that has had a lot of Superior Court action this year. It basically says if the portion of the budget which represents salary discussions is not passed, and a new agreement is reached prior to next March, does the Town approve of the School Board holding a special meeting to go over the contract with the public. Mr. MacAllister said that Teachers have been working this year without a contract and if Article 3 does not pass, they will be working an additional year without a contract. Mr. MacAllister said there will be expenses involved with holding an additional meeting since they would have to have a public hearing and ballot vote.

Frank Campana said there was no recommendation from the Finance Committee since there was no money involved.

Mr. Kelly asked for comments or questions.

<u>Doug Clegg</u> - Mr. Clegg asked if the special meeting would be such as tonight and was told yes.

Mr. Kelly called for a vote on Article 4. Article 4 passed

Article 5

Shall the District raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special or separate warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$6,718,058 (six million, seven hundred eighteen thousand, fifty-eight dollars)? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$6,540,331 (six million five hundred forty thousand three hundred thirty-one dollars), which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the District by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13. X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (THIS WARRANT ARTICLE IS SUPPORTED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD) (Majority vote required)

Lynne Crevoiserat addressed the article. Mrs. Crevoiserat said the Board and Schools focused on what the greatest need was for all the children. The greatest need right now is teachers. Mrs. Crevoiserat said there are many classrooms with an incredibly high number of students in them. Mrs. Crevoiserat read several items which were denied by the Board and said that administration cut back line items in order to include additional teachers.

Frank Campana said the Finance Committee had voted on the article with the original default figure, which was \$70,000 higher than the one read tonight. Mr. Campana said that the Finance Committee did not recommend this article based on the previous default budget figure and that they take no position on the new item.

Mr. Kelly asked for comments or questions.

<u>Kevin Winship</u> - Mr. Winship said the Finance Committee did not recommend with this article with the previous default budget figure but feels that the \$70,000 difference may swing the vote. Mr. Winship again asked that everyone refer to the Committee's reasons behind their recommendations. Mr. Winship believes that the default budget amount, in addition to the teacher contract, was an acceptable increase.

<u>Frank Campana</u> - Mr. Campana asked Jim Crane if the change in the default budget is a result from changes in the revenue. Mr. Crane said no and said the change is due to the fact that the Board had cut two positions for Inclusion Facilitators. These positions were in the default budget since it would have been a legal obligation. Once the positions were eliminated, the figure needed to be deducted from the default budget.

<u>Bernie Bastian</u> - Mr. Bastian read from a technical assistance book put out by DRA about default budgets. Mr. Bastian said that he has heard there are one time expenses in the default budget and wanted counsel's opinion on that. Mr. Bastian does not believe that there is a law that can make him pay for something that the schools do not have an obligation for. Atty. Barry said that it is his opinion the default budget does contain one time amounts and that the technical assistance book not law but DRA's interpretation of the law.

<u>Denise Dorey</u> - Mrs. Dorey said that she feels the operating budget was done well and asked where the \$237,000 surplus in 1998 came from. Lynne Crevoiserat said the surplus was mostly due to the fact that expenses such as snow plowing and sanding were lower than expected due to the mild beginning to winter. There were also two special education students, that were high expense students, who moved out of the district during the year. Mrs. Crevoiserat said that when you start out with \$6 million, \$237,000 is really not that much money to have left over.

<u>Frank Campana</u> - Mr. Campana said he did not recommend the operating budget because of the amount of surplus last year . Mr. Campana feels that with the amount of foundation aid expected, a default budget should not be a burden to work with.

Mr. Kelly called for a vote on Article 5. Article 5 passed.

Article 6

Shall the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300,000 (three hundred thousand dollars) for the purpose of renovations to the Weare Middle School (a) cafeteria reconfiguration, enlargement and tables (b) window/door replacement (c) classroom renovations (ceilings, flooring and walls); (d) gymnasium renovations; (e) Middle School landscaping; and (f) carpet replacement at the Center Woods School, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (THIS WARRANT ARTICLE IS SUPPORTED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD) This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article #5, the operating budget. (Majority vote required)

John Lawton spoke to the article. Mr. Lawton gave some history on the warrant article and noted that there were handouts on the table as well as drawings showing what they are attempting to accomplish with this article. The School Board felt that with the additional foundation aid they should continue to upgrade the buildings. The white school needs much work. Work proposed is a continuation of what has been done in the past. Mr. Lawton went over the handout ending with a request for support for this article.

Mr. Kelly asked for comments and questions.

<u>Don Rogers</u> - Mr. Rogers asked if the Board if they have any intentions of moving off that site soon. Mr. Lawton said that with the most recent population projections, they don't plan on moving off that site anytime soon. Right now there is a bubble in the fourth grade and the Board feels they can stay in that facility for another 5-10 years. Mr. Rogers asked how many windows were to be replaced and was told 69. Mr. Rogers would like the Board to investigate how well the windows operated after 2-3 years before choosing. Mr. Lawton thanked Mr. Rogers for his suggestion.

<u>Bernie Bastian</u> - Mr. Bastian asked if Honeywell had made recommendations on the windows. Mr. Lawton said they did recommend the thermo pane windows. Mr. Bastian wanted to know why the windows were not done at that time. Mr. Lawton said it was the due to the cost involved.

Frank Campana said the Finance Committee recommends the article as read.

<u>Kevin Winship</u> - Mr. Winship pointed out that the Finance Committee is very much in support of this article and went over some of the figures at the bottom of the FC handout. Mr. Winship said the Committee approved the article because it is a one time expense to do repairs that are badly needed.

<u>Frank Campana</u> - Mr. Campana would like the Board to seek some kind of information to make sure the window project will not come back to bite them. Mr. Campana said that if the building is too tight once the windows are put in, more money will be needed for air exchange.

Mr. Kelly called for a vote on Article 6. Article 6 passed

Article 7

Shall the District vote to accept the report of the Planning Committee selected to consider organization, reorganization, or withdrawal from SAU #24 which recommendation is that the District receive the interim report from the Committee and continue the report for another year to complete its task and to issue a final report prior to the Annual Meeting of 2000, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (THIS WARRANT ARTICLE IS SUPPORTED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD) (Majority vote required)

Chuck Bolton addressed this article. Mr. Bolton said the Committee has met for two years and have recommended to the Board that they not separate. The Committee would like to spend another year to study having the current administration do the work of a SAU. This article is to either reject or accept this proposal.

Mr. Kelly asked for any comments or questions.

<u>Tom Reynolds</u> - Mr. Reynolds asked what they hope to gain from withdrawing from the SAU. Mr. Bolton said they would gain a greater element of control of their own district. Mr. Bolton said that Weare doesn't always agree with decisions made by the other Boards who are members of the SAU. Right now SAU #24 is made up of four school districts with Weare being 50% of the district.

Mr. Kelly called for a vote on Article 7. Article 7 passed

Article 8

Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 (one hundred thousand dollars) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund as established in March 1994, pursuant to the provisions of RSA 35 for the purpose of providing for any future expansion of the school facilities, including feasibility, design and all related costs, to include building renovations, or to take any other action in relation thereto? (THIS WARRANT ARTICLE IS SUPPORTED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD) This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article #5, the operating budget. (Majority vote required)

Jon Wallace made a motion to increase the article by \$50,000. The motion was seconded by Doug Clegg. Mr. Wallace said that this Capital Reserve Fund is for renovations and building projects which occur. Right now there is approximately \$80,000 in the fund and the Board wanted to increase that with extended foundation aid. The Board wants to anticipate the building's needs. Mr. Wallace said there are no enrollment predictions in grades 1-8 that suggest building additions are needed but this fund is not only for classroom space. Technical space is an issue right now. Center Woods would like a computer lab. Mr. Wallace said that three years ago, Center Woods and Weare Middle School lead the region in having a web site. Three years ago, none of the schools had labs now John Stark has 76 computers plus lab space. Center Woods has none and Weare Middle has a classroom they use which is not a dedicated lab. Mr. Wallace said that in three years the Weare Schools have gone from a technology leader to falling behind. Mr. Wallace again stressed that money in the capital reserve fund is not only for classroom space. Mr. Wallace asked for support of this article.

Mr. Kelly asked for questions or comments.

<u>Bernie Bastian</u> - Mr. Bastian asked what the original amount of this article before cuts were made. Mr. Wallace said it was originally for \$334,000. Mr. Bastian wanted to amend the article to the original amount but was told he had to wait until the motion was voted on.

Frank Campana said the Finance Committee had based their recommendation on the original amount of \$100,000 and do not have a recommendation on the amendment.

<u>Richard Butt</u> - Mr. Butt said one of the concerns of the Finance Committee is that this money is set aside for a non-specific use. Mr. Butt said the Weare School District did not submit anything to the Planning Board for the CIP. He feels this article is vague as to what the money will be used for. Mr. Wallace said the Capital Reserve Fund was set up that way so that the money can be used for multiple things. This way the money in the fund will allow renovations to be done without raising large sums of money. Mr. Butt asked if this article is only being considered because of the additional foundation aid and was told yes.

<u>Kevin Winship</u> - Mr. Winship said the Finance Committee did not recommend the \$100,000 and asked everyone to read through the handout. The Committee feels that some residents may want a portion of the foundation aid to be applied toward the tax rate and not all used on different projects.

<u>Frank Campana</u> - Mr. Campana said he is opposed to the amendment. Mr. Campana feels that committing to the \$300,000 for building renovations was enough for this year. Mr. Campana said that with an increase in foundation aid there may be some "wiggle" room to defray this article until next year.

<u>Chuck Bolton</u> - Mr. Bolton said the School Board's recommendation is on the original \$100,000. The School Board was asked by the John Stark Board and the Board of Selectmen to work together to use this foundation aid to keep the budgets level. Mr. Bolton said the goal was to get all three budgets to pass and if they passed in their entirety, it would not create a tax increase. The Weare School Board's wish was to have some additional revenues for John Stark and the Town to spend. Mr. Bolton said everyone should consider these facts when voting on the additional \$50,000.

Mr. Wallace said that reducing the amount from \$334,000 down to \$150,000 is a good faith effort that they have listened to the other Boards. The schools can keep waiting and continue to fall behind. Mr. Wallace said that in three years Weare is still in the same place it was before and the surrounding towns are going forward. Mr. Wallace feels the meeting should let the voters decide if they want to support technology.

<u>Don Rogers</u> - Mr. Rogers said he is not sure if he is in favor of the amendment or not. Although, he is in favor of distributing the money between the Boards. Mr. Rogers said there is nothing in this article about technology and he doesn't feel the voters will know what it is for. Mr. Rogers would like to see a lesser amount placed in the fund and have the Board come back next year with a solid plan for the computer labs. Mr. Wallace said that he was using the tech labs as an example and that this is not strictly for technology labs.

<u>John Lawton</u> - Mr. Lawton said at the meeting of the three Board's, it was decided that they all needed to come down approximately \$58,000 to keep the tax rate level. Mr. Lawton said this increase of \$50,000 will throw the School Boards figures off. Kevin Winship spoke to this issue briefly explaining that by increasing this article, it would increase the amount John Stark would have to reduce or increase the tax rate.

Mr. Kelly called for a vote on the amendment to Article 8. To amend from \$100,000 to \$150,000. The amendment to Article 8 failed.

Mr. Kelly returned to the original Article 8.

Frank Campana said the Finance Committee did not recommend Article 8.

Mr. Kelly asked for any questions or comments.

<u>Bernie Bastian</u> - Mr. Bastian said it may be silly for him to try to amend the article to \$334,000. Mr. Bastian feels the voters should be able to choose on where they want to spend the foundation aid money.

<u>Paul Dosher</u> - Mr. Dosher, who serves on John Stark Board, recommends the \$100,000 and briefly discussed foundation aid. Mr. Dosher feels there is no question the Town will get more aid in the future and urged the voters to support the \$100,000.

Mr. Kelly called for a vote on Article 8. Article 8 passed.

Article 9

Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$0.00 (zero dollars) and direct the School Board to support the adoption of legislation that would allow parental choice of public and private schools, if such legislation would permit local option? (This would allow school districts to vote to reimburse parents for public, non-public, and home school tuition and expenses) (THIS IS A PETITIONED WARRANT ARTICLE) (Majority vote required)

Mr. Kelly said this is an advisory article to the School Board and is not mandatory in any way.

Bernie Bastian spoke to the article. Mr. Bastian said this article will also appear on the John Stark ballot as well. Mr. Bastian feels the voucher system will create competition for the schools and feels if the schools have competition, then perhaps the service would be better.

There were no comments on Article 9.

Mr. Kelly called for a vote on Article 9. Article 9 was defeated.

Mr. Kelly explained that Article 9 will still be on the ballot but the sense of the meeting is that it is not supported.

Mr. Kelly asked if there is any further business to come before the Board. There was none.

A Motion and second was made to adjourn the Deliberative Session at 8:44 p.m.

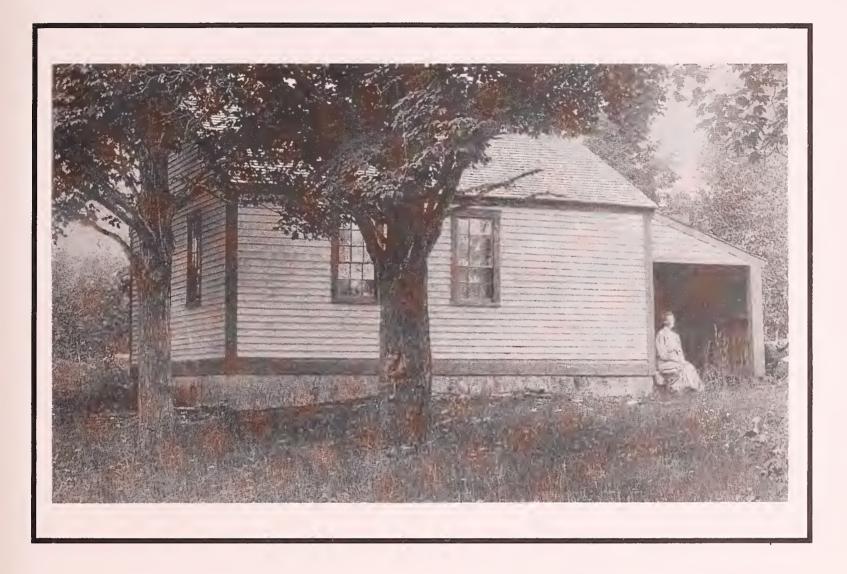

#### School Board Report

The 1998/1999-year at John Stark witnessed some real substantive, positive changes that will impact the opportunities for students and staff alike. During this school year we have welcomed a new principal, Mr. Arthur Aaronson, passed a major operating budget in a special school district vote, negotiated and passed a multi-year teachers contract, continued to expand our excellent pre-engineering curriculum with Project-Lead-The-Way, and initiated fund raising, planning and organizing for the construction of our new Technology Center.

Our new principal came to us from Southern Vermont with a wealth of experience from literally around the globe having taught and administered schools on foreign soil. His depth of experience, love of learning, and deep appreciation of young people has really prepared him to enter into our school with vigor to continue and expand our reputation for excellence.

The funding for our school has been a major concern over the past three years. During this year, at the special June meeting, we were able to, with substantial public support, achieve our goal of passing a reasonable, responsible budget. This budget will give us the ability to move forward with programs that are necessary to continue our accreditation and expand opportunities for <u>all</u> our students.

The teaching staff at our school has always, and continues to be, our most valuable resource. They continually exhibit enthusiasm in the face of challenge, professionalism in the face of conflict, and flexibility in the face of change. The swift negotiation and passage of their multi-year contract is a tribute to their efforts and the members of the school board involved in the process.

The implementation of more sections in the Project-Lead-The-Way curriculum opened up more opportunities for all our students to participate in this nationally recognized pre-engineering/technical program. We are excited about the progress that our students are making and the broad range of post secondary opportunities that this program is opening up to them for their continued success. The chance for our students to be exposed to this level of technical training will have a major impact on their ability to make informed decisions regarding their continued education at either a two or four year technical school or engineering college or university. The Technology Center received substantial financial and public support during this year. The fund raising committee achieved their goals and created the necessary public discussion surrounding the importance of technical education to promote this important addition to our school. As we move into the future the wisdom of this decision will become more apparent as our students are challenged to meet higher levels of technical knowledge in higher education and the workplace.

The challenges that we are faced with in the future revolve around our critical need for space. The issues remain the same, more students are coming to us from the sending districts, increased needs to expand our curriculum to give our students the tools to compete, and creating a school as the center of our communities. We are currently 20% over capacity as evidenced by our accreditation status, which has us on warning for space considerations. Creating additional space for teaching, science labs, cafeteria, media, industrial arts, home economics and general circulation is of critical importance. In the coming year will we be formulating a plan to meet these needs, inform the public of them, and supporting the passage of a responsible bond issue to solve the problem.

We have met the challenges of the past and we are confident that with continued, sustained, and steady support from our communities we will forge a future for our children that we can be proud of.

#### **Principal's Report**

The faculty and staff at John Stark Regional High School continued to strive for excellence in educating the 738 students enrolled at the school. Through workshops, inservice and professional conferences, the faculty sought new ways to teach and inspire students. Advances were made in all areas of the curriculum as well as efforts to educate students in good citizenship and community service.

With regard to curriculum development, three teachers developed and implemented a two-year curriculum called the Academy in the fall of 1998 for a group of 9th graders. The Academy is a pilot program, which begins in the 9th grade and continues to the end of the 10th grade. The goal of the program is to provide students with a curriculum that integrates English, Physical Science, Biology, Geopolitical Studies, World History, Art and Technology. A similar two-year program called the Lyceum has also been implemented in the fall of 1999 by a different team of teachers for another group of 9th grade students. The programs are being evaluated to determine if this inter-disciplinary concept should be extended to all 9th and 10th grade students.

During the summer of 1998, two committees of teachers met to develop "menus" of academic expectations for students in the Upper House (grades 11 and 12) and in the Lower House (grades 9 and 10). In September 1998, freshmen students received competencies. A team of Lower House teachers continued to discuss the competencies during the school year, along with principals from the two feeder middle schools. During the summer of 1999, a committee of teachers met to discuss ways to implement these competencies.

John Stark implemented the pre-engineering curriculum called "Project Lead the Way." The program is coordinated by the Head of the Math Department, Donna Scribner. Fifty-eight students are enrolled in courses that include Introduction to engineering Design and Digital Electronics. An additional college preparation course, Advanced Placement Calculus was also offered to upperclassmen as part of the Math curriculum.

Significant improvements were made in the area of technology. Internet access has been expanded throughout the building via a new network. Some of the basic software in the high school has been upgraded and brought into compliance with appropriate licensing. The school also acquired a network administration software package that allows the technology coordinator to monitor, manage and provide security for any computer on the school's network. Student academic accomplishments were highlighted by the announcement that three students qualified as Commended Scholars in the National Merit Scholarship program. These students ranked in the top five percent of the more than one million students who took the exam. Equally impressive was the \$30,000 in local scholarships that seniors received at the school-wide Awards Night. More than twothirds of the senior class planned to attend college or technical school.

Community Service is an integral component of the education students receive at John Stark. The program allows students to understand the importance of service to their community while learning skills such as communication, teamwork and leadership. In May of 1999, every student participated in a school-wide community service event. Students volunteered for projects such as cleaning local parks, assisting local volunteer organizations, helping at churches and picking up litter on major roads. Students were also involved in "City Year", which is a full day of volunteering in Boston with thousands of other young people from across New England. In addition, student members participated in many other community service projects sponsored by the school's "Leo Club."

In athletics, sports teams excelled in many areas as 319 John Stark students were involved in Cross Country, Soccer, Golf, Alpine Skiing, Cheerleading, Basketball, Softball, Track and Field, and Club Lacrosse. Our athletes make us proud and always exhibit the best characteristics of good sportsmanship during their competitions.

In the area of Music, students presented several concerts at the school as well as performed at the All New England Choral Festival and the Toronto Musical Festival. In Fine Arts, students received silver and honorable mention awards from the prestigious Scholastic Arts award program as well as recognition in the 2nd Congressional District Art Contest. The Drama department staged "Rockn' Roll Midsummer Night's dream" and a serious drama called "Diviner." Drama teacher, Nancy Brennan, was honored for her extraordinary work with students by being named New Hampshire's 1999 Teacher of the Year.

As the enrollment of the school is projected to reach 1,000 within the next five years, new efforts will be required to maintain the quality education that students have received during the past twelve years. Plans for additional space and new teaching strategies must be implemented to provide the superior education that John Stark students will need in the next century.

#### School Nurse Report

The 1998-1999 school year again saw an increase in colds and illnesses. As the school grows and crowding becomes a bigger issue the incidents of illness also increase. Students need to play an active role in the prevention of illness by making sure that they use basic hygiene to prevent germ spread. Good hand washing is the key to preventing spread of illness. Students should wash their hands prior to lunch and whenever they use the bathroom. Students should also cover their mouths when they sneeze or cough and if possible wash their hands after disposing tissues. Hand washing is the first defense against germ spread. It would also be helpful if students would stop sharing drinks and water bottles. This is very important especially when students have sore throats and colds. With a little effort on each student's part we could decrease the amount of illness at John Stark.

Another concern at John Stark has been head lice. Our students have forgotten the rule "do not share combs and hairbrushes". All the incidents this year have been traced to students sharing hair care products. Please remember that hats, helmets, hairbrushes, combs and scrunchies should not be shared. Head lice is becoming a bigger problem in this country because the lice are becoming resistant to the products used to treat head lice. Whenever possible, students should blow-dry their hair daily (the heat can kill the louse) and wear their hair pulled back or up. Students should also respect other students' personal space. I know this is hard to do in the crowded halls but lice do not jump and it is close personal contact that can aid in the spread of lice.

Another concern that has to do with crowding is students are not taking time to eat lunch. For many students lunch is their first meal of the day and now I am finding students say that they "do not have time to eat because the lines in the cafeteria are too long" and there is "not always a place to sit and eat". Students have said that they would rather wait to go home and have lunch than face the crowds in the café. One wonders if the missing meals are causing the increase in afternoon headaches. Please talk with your student about the importance of eating breakfast. Studies have shown that students who skip breakfast tend to have problems with weight issues since they make up for the missed meals by eating more food later in the day. Other studies have shown that students who skip breakfast do not test as well as other students who eat breakfast.

I want to thank all the parents who sent an updated copy of their student's immunization record to the school after their student received Tetanus and Hepatitis B vaccines. It really helps to keep your student's immunization record current so that in the case of emergency we can determine if your student needs to have a Tetanus booster. Also, having current records on file helps the annual state audit go smoother.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding your student please call me. I look forward to hearing from you. Once again it has been a pleasure serving the John Stark Community as the school nurse.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL STRUCTURE BASED ON AN AUDIT OF GENERAL PURPOSE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

To the School Board John Stark Regional School District

We have audited the general purpose financial statements of the John Stark Regional School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1999, and have issued our report thereon dated October 4, 1999.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement.

The management of the John Stark Regional School District is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the John Stark Regional School District for the year ended June 30, 1999, we obtained an understanding of the internal control structure. With respect to the internal control structure, we obtained and understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control structure. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the general purpose financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

This report is intended for the information of management and the School Board. However, this report is a matter of public record, and its distribution is not limited.

### **Budget Review Committee**

The Budget Review Committee met with members of the SAU staff and School Board to review the proposed 2000-2001 budget for John Stark Regional High School. Our report is based on the budget proposal as of December 15, 1999.

The operating budget reviewed totaled \$6,424,812 and represents a 4.97% increase over the 1999-2000 budget. The projected student enrollment is expected to increase from 716 to 752 students, an increase of 5.03%. The budget reflects an increase in the regular education accounts of 1.5% and an increase of 10.77% in the special education accounts. The special education increase results primarily from additional required out-of-district placements.

Accordingly, the regular education spending has been held at a level below expected inflation rates and well below student population growth. The budget, as amended on December 15, 1999 includes funding for additional sports offerings, including freshmen soccer and basketball, upgrading some current club sports and adding some new sports. The committee supports expanded sports offerings generally but believes that before budget dollars are committed to new sports offerings the hockey program should receive some funding.

Final warrant articles had not been finalized at the time of our meetings, however, the need for certain repairs and modifications to the building were discussed. The committee endorsed proposals designed to maintain the current building, acknowledging that deferring necessary maintenance can be much more costly in the long run.

The committee unanimously endorsed the December 15, 1999 budget proposal as submitted.

(THIS ARTICLE IS SUPPORTED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD.) (Majority vote required.) (No amount will be raised by taxation for this purpose.) It was moved and seconded to discuss this Article. Lisa Hustis explained the purpose of this Article.

At 10:26 p.m. - It was moved and seconded to adjourn the Deliberative Session. The motion passed and Moderator Jones declared the Deliberative Session adjourned at 10:27 p.m.

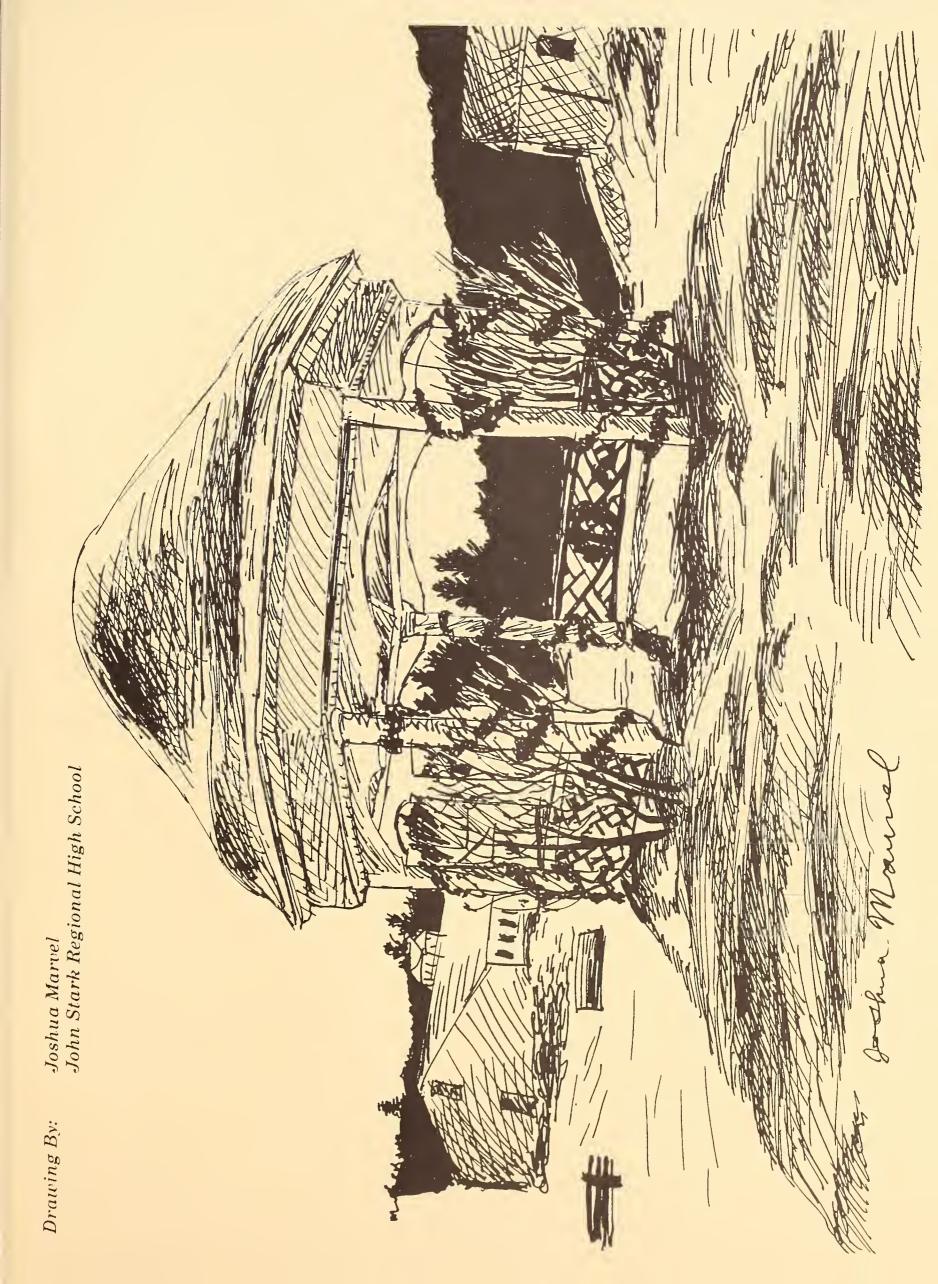
