FOREST FIRE WARDEN & FOREST RANGER REPORT

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N. H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

MINUTES OF SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

MARCH 9, 1982

The meeting was called to order at 6:05 by Moderator William McNamee

Article 1 was postponed to later in the meeting.

Article 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district. Linda McNamee moved and Polly Wilton seconded that the article be accepted as read. All were in favor.

Article 3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Linda McNamee moved and Joe Sweeney seconded that the article be accepted as read. All were in favor.

Article 4. To choose agents, and/or committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Linda McNamee moved, and Ronnie Houghton seconded that the article be accepted as read. All were in favor.

Article 5. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action of the School District meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year upon conditions outlined in RSA 198:20-b. Bob Atkins explained that in the unlikely event that federal or state or foundation money became available to Windsor, we would need to call a special town meeting to vote on accepting these funds, unless we passed article 5 giving us blanket approval for acceptance of future surprise funds. Patrick Hines moved, and Bob Johnson seconded

that the article be accepted as read. Needless to say, all were in favor of this potential windfall and the article was accepted.

Article 6 To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Mildred Houghton moved that the District raise and appropriate \$32,693.00 for support of the schools. Eric Wilton seconded, and the article was unanimously accepted.

Article 7. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to tuition eligible students to the Hillsboro-Deering kindergarten. Bob Johnson moved, and Eric Wilton seconded, to pass on this motion. Since there were many Windsor residents in favor of the kindergarten who objected to the motion to drop Article 7, Moderator Bill McNamee decided to postpone a vote on Bob Johnson's motion until the article was discussed. There were two main philosophical viewpoints expressed..... first that mothers have a responsibility to provide education and playmates for their children, that it isn't the Town's responsibility to pay for babysitting, that the law provides for compulsory education at the age of 6, not 5; and second that with economic conditions in this country, mothers need to work and cannot provide the educational and socializing for their 5 year olds that mothers could many years ago. With the Hillsboro children attending kindergarten, Windsor children who don't have this opportunity are at an educational disadvantage, with the possible result that Windsor children might need to attend Readiness at twice the cost of kindergarten. Pat Hines pointed out that the issue was of choice..... parents should have the opportunity for kindergarten for their children if they wish. Edith Atkins and Billie McQuire pointed out that there are no kindergarten children in Windsor in any case, but that the town should go on record as saying it will support early childhood education. Stanley Munro spoke eloquently in favor of the kindergarten. He said that something is wrong with a town like Windsor, with such low taxes, if we can't raise enough money for the education of our children. He felt that children who don't get this opportunity are behind the eight ball, that an 8th grade education was sufficient for a person to get along years ago, but that today times have changed and kids need all the education they can get. Joe Sweeney asked a leading question, "Is kindergarten good for children?" Nearly everyone agreed that it is. Stanley Munro asked for a paper ballot, and the vote was taken to decide if the motion to drop article 7 would be passed. The vote of 12 against dropping the motion, 6 in favor of dropping it meant that the article was retained. Then a motion was made by Tom McQuire and seconded by Stanley Munro to pass Article 7

as read. There were ten in favor, 4 against, as the article authorizing the kindergarten passed.

Article 1. To choose by non-partisan ballot the following school district officials:

Moderator for the ensuing year
Clerk and Treasurer for the ensuing year
One member of the School Board for a 3-year term
Auditor for the ensuing year

The checklist was prepared by Bob Atkins, chairperson of Supervisors, and used. There were 44 names on the checklist, and 18 votes cast. Results are as follows:

Moderator Bill McNamee	16 votes
Clerk & Treasurer Susan Herman	16 votes
School Board for 3 years Bob Atkins	17 votes
Auditor Emily Werner	10 votes

Article 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Bob Johnson pointed out that 6 p.m. is an inconvenient time for families to come to the town hall, which might account for the poor showing of voters. He recommended moving the meeting to 6:30 p.m., an idea with universal appeal. Patrick Hines seconded the motion, and it was unanimously accepted.

Ronnie Houghton moved and Patrick Hines seconded to adjourn the meeting. All were in favor, the meeting was adjourned at 7:01 p.m.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT

Since the students from Windsor attend the Hillsboro-Deering Schools, under the AREA Agreement, I am taking the liberty of presenting my report to the citizens of Hillsboro-Deering in this space. I believe this report will be of interest to the citizens of Windsor.

In a September, 1982 Gallup poll 84% of those surveyed indicated that a strong educational system would be the best guarantee of a strong America in the future. The National

Opinion Surveys on Public Confidence now show that education is listed behind only medicine and science as an institution in which people have a great deal of confidence. These are but two of many key signs that the more negative fallout of the Vietnam/Watergate era is losing its hold and that our schools have become more effective in meeting the public's expectations.

One of the most important developments in our local schools has been the significant and continued professional growth and improvement of our whole instructional staff. Their growing skills, sense of accountability, professionalism and responsiveness to the increasing expectations of the School Board and administrators is noticeable and important. The teachers and aides of the Hillsboro-Deering Schools are to be commended for their outstanding contributions in making excellence a standard that is being reached on a more frequent basis than ever before.

The people of Hillsboro and Deering have continually demonstrated their strong and uncompromising support of quality education. Your School Board members have been equally outstanding in their leadership and support they have provided to both administrators and staff in translating the communities' desires into reality.

Significant efforts have been made throughout the budget development process to both maintain the general excellence of our programs and to make every effort possible to restrict the financial demands upon the community.

Within this context, I believe that the efforts of the School Board to encourage proper maintenance of all buildings and grounds and to develop better energy efficiency are areas that deserve the District's continued financial support.

I would also hope that the District would be able to support staff/administrative requests aimed at making art accessible to more high school students; increasing the amount of instructor time available for developmental and remedial reading, providing guidance services at both the elementary and middle school levels, upgrading science equipment, and expanding computer education opportunities.

The following are but a few of the many examples that are available of the successful efforts of staff to wisely use the financial support you provided in the past year.

.....Paula Costello has been instrumental in expanding the Reading is Fundamental program.

.....Nancy Conway and Kathy Donovan have done much to

improve the quality of integrated learning opportunities available for handicapped students.

-Bill Ryan has done an excellent job providing expanded and improved guidance programs.
-Mel Sneed's Middle School social studies programs are representative of many highly creative teaching methods used in our schools.
-Ken Pierce and Larry Restuccia have developed excellent Middle School computer education programs.
-Creative writing activities have been fostered throughout the elementary school.
-Bette Fredrickson has developed an excellent contemporary health issues program.
-The Middle School staff has devoted much effort to the analysis of testing results in order to both make continued program improvements and to provide greater assistance to individual students.
-The Elementary staff has developed an enrichment program for students that is noteworthy.
-Maureen Baptiste has developed creative mathematics activities for students and Grace Jager has instituted highly successful oral language activities in the fourth and fifth grades.
-Marion MacWilliam has implemented a required library skills program for all eighth graders.

In closing, it is my pleasure to indicate that Cathy Furlong, Maureen Baptiste, Jim Boynton, George Dubriel, Stacey Gauthier, Trim Hahn, Jane Hamilton, Helene Kurk, Marion MacWilliam, Sharon Otterson, and Robin Tulloch have received Board commendations through the regular teacher evaluation system as Outstanding Teachers for the 1981-82 school year.

These teachers are representative of all the many teachers of Hillsboro-Deering whose pursuit of excellence has resulted in fine educational opportunities being available to your students.
