WARRANT FOR ANNUAL MEETING

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Amherst in the
County of Hillsborough, in said state, qualified
to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in
said Amherst, on Tuesday the twelfth day of March
next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the
following subjects:

1. To choose all the necessary Town Officers for the
ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary
to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make
appropriations for the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to allow the usual
discount on taxes; 3 per cent. to July 1st, and 2 per cent.
to August 1st.
4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen
to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by
the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-
priate a sum of money for moth extermination.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-
priate the sum of \$1000 to complete the re-surfacing and
oiling of the road partially constructed leading from
Amherst to Baboosic Park.
7. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a lower-
ing device for use in burials in Town Cemeteries.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to
to raise and appropriate for making repairs on the
Town Hall roof.
9. To see what action the Town will take in regard
to disposing of the old piano in the Town Hall.
10. To see what action the Town will take in regard
to installing a street light on Foundry Street.
11. To see what action the Town will take in regard
to obtaining some land for the purpose of a dump on
the east side of Lake Baboosic.

12. To see if the Town will vote to buy 500 feet of fire hose and raise and appropriate money for the same.

13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to placing a sign on the Town Hall, reading Amherst Town Hall.

14. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to take up the Hollis road note falling due May 1, 1935.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$919.50, the State to give \$919.50 for State Aid Construction on the Mont Vernon Road.

16. To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1839.00, State to give \$1839.00 for State Aid Construction. Pending in Legislature.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$945.74, State to give \$3782.94 for town road maintenance. State will not co-operate on both articles 16 and 17. A choice is necessary.

18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

19. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing a heating plant in the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.

20. To receive reports of committees.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

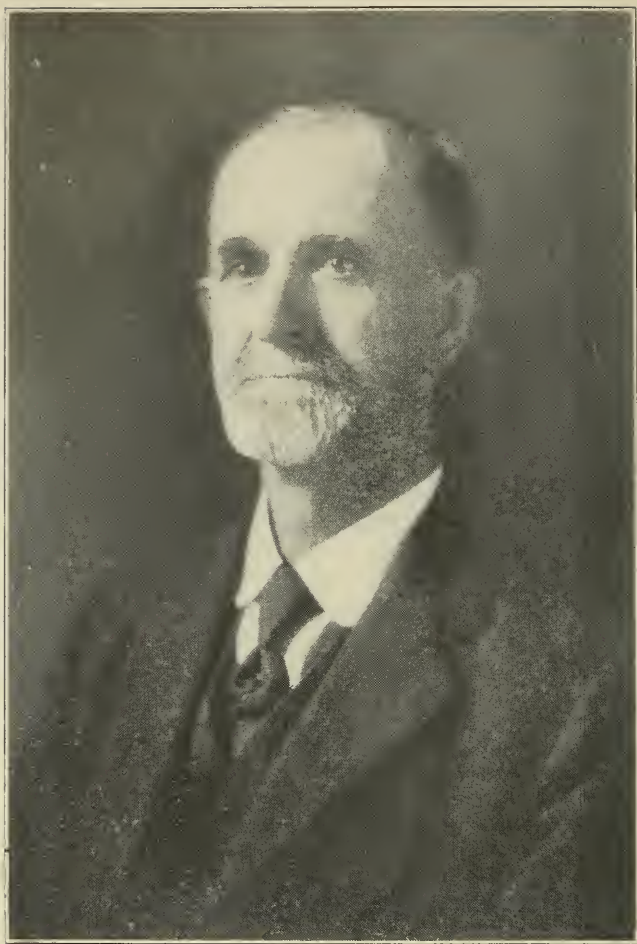

5. To determine and appoint the Salaries of the School Board, and Truent Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
9. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing two years.

10. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for special repairs and alterations of school property, for new equipment; and for new construction or for the purchase of property to be used for school purposes.

11. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for insurance of school property, including insurance on boiler at village building.

12. To see if the District will vote to sell any of its schoolhouses or other school property, or take any other action in relation thereto.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Amherst:

I herewith submit my sixteenth annual report which is the twenty-sixth in the series of such reports.

Union No. 40

The five school districts of Amherst, Brookline, Hollis, Milford and Mont Vernon continue to comprise this supervisory union with organization the same as explained in last year's report.

Teachers

Miss Charlotte Boutelle completed her studies at Keene Normal and has returned to her position in Grades III-IV. Miss Viola Jenkins completed her work in the primary room last June and was replaced by Miss Ruth Forbes, a graduate of Keene Normal and with several years of experience. Other teachers remain the same as last year.

Classes for Adults

The Federal Employment Relief Administration has made it possible to start classes for adults. Funds are provided to pay for the instruction but a place of meeting and incidental expenses are provided locally.

Three classes have been organized, namely, Spanish, English Literature, and Music. Miss Lillian Holt teaches the languages, and Mr. Arthur Dow the singing. The classes are open to all except those who already attend day school.

Buildings and Grounds

Cricket Corner schoolhouse has been further repaired and improved by the installation of a tile well in the cellar, new wax treatment of the floors instead of oil, and other minor repairs. About \$130 was expended.

All other rural schoolhouses have been sold except No. 8 and Border Street. These will deteriorate rapidly, so if not needed in the near future, they should be disposed of while they have a good market value.

At the village there has been installed a complete ventilating system in accordance with the vote of last March when \$500 was raised and appropriated for the purpose together with about \$350 in a savings account. A contract for this work was awarded to Mr. John R. Martin of Milford, but in order to keep within the appropriation some modifications in the plans had to be made. As now installed, each room has a foul air outlet duct extending through the attic and out at the ridgepole. Fresh air intakes are through the windows with glass shields to prevent draughts. It is very gratifying to have this long needed matter of ventilation actually installed and in operation.

Also at the village building a beginning has been made in the way of renovating the floors. The constant application of oil for many years had made the floors very dirty in appearance and quite hard to sweep. First the oil was removed from the floors and then a seal applied to fill the pores. Following this is a surface application of liquid wax. Funds and time both prevented a completion of the treatment—this can and should be finished before next September.

The annex, so-called, is serving very acceptably again for grades five and six. By the annex is meant

the upper room in the church property just north of the school—the room that was the G. A. R. hall.

Needs for the future in the order of importance include:

1. Heating equipment at the brick building. For sometime the sectional boiler has been in need of extensive repairs but has been kept going by more or less temporary repairs. The real answer, of course, is a new boiler of a larger capacity than the present one and a thorough going over and adjustment of the radiation throughout the building.

2. A room clock system with central clock control.

3. Improvement of laboratory equipment including stools, sinks, and tables.

4. New floor in high school main room.

5. Improvement of pupils' desks with perhaps movable type for high school.

Conclusion

Even though a school plant is up-to-date in every respect and equipment complete and ample, yet in the final analysis the most important factor is the teacher, as the following quotation by Mr. Joy Elmer Morgan, editor of the Journal of the National Education Association, shows: "The teacher is a prophet. She lays the foundations of tomorrow. The teacher is an artist. She works with the precious clay of unfolding personality. The teacher is a friend. Her heart responds to the faith and devotion of her students. The teacher is a citizen. She is selected and licensed for the improvement of society. The teacher is an interpreter. Out of her maturer and wider life she seeks to guide the young. The teacher is a builder. She works with the higher and finer values of civilization. The teacher is a culture-bearer. She leads the way toward worthier tastes, saner attitudes, more gracious manners, higher in-

telligence. The teacher is a planner. She sees the young lives before her as a part of a great system which shall grow stronger in the light of truth. The teacher is a pioneer. She is always attempting the impossible and winning out. The teacher is a reformer. She seeks to remove the handicaps that weaken and destroy life. The teacher is a believer. She has abiding faith in the improvability of the race."

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools,
Amherst, N. H.:

I herewith submit my third annual report of health work in Amherst, it being the fifteenth year of this work.

The annual medical inspection was made in October by Dr. Burns, the nurse assisting. A tabulated account of the defects found will be given in the school physician's report. Each year the number of defects reported is decreasing, which shows that

progress is being made in building up the health of our school children.

The school physician vaccinated seven pupils which makes our vaccination record 100% this year.

Through the Child Health Recovery program it was made possible for twelve children to have necessary tonsil corrections.

The eye examinations have been made and ten reported with defective vision. Four of these have already been taken care of through our Child Health Recovery fund. Others need glasses badly and I hope to arrange for further remedial work later, possibly through the Red Cross. Notices of these defects were sent to each parent.

I hope that it will be possible to have another dental clinic here this spring. As "Better Teeth" is one of our major health goals, we want to give every child an opportunity to reach this goal.

Milk is being given each day from a Federal fund to the undernourished children. Others buy it or bring some from home to have at the morning recess.

Last winter the Federal fund furnished hot lunches each noon for nine weeks to sixty-three pupils. This was prepared and served by Mrs. Hare.

The remainder of the cod liver oil allotment has been distributed to the children needing it.

The hearing examinations were made in April and eight found to have defective hearing.

There were many cases of chicken-pox during the spring term. Mumps have been raging this fall and winter. Schools closed a few days early at Christmas when there were the most cases.

Three hundred and seventy-three school room visits have been made this year and home visits as necessary for instructive and corrective work.

In closing I wish to thank the school officials,

teachers, and parents for the splendid cooperation during the past year.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER

To the Members of the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and Citizens of Amherst, New Hampshire:

I hereby submit my third annual report.

School commenced September 5, 1934 with a total enrollment of fifty-two pupils in the high school. The reason for the falling off in the high school enrollment this year is that many pupils failed to return to complete their high school training in our school. Many of them moved out of town and are attending school elsewhere. Since the beginning of the 1934-1935 school year six pupils have left our ranks and one has been admitted. Therefore, at the present time, we have a total membership in the high school of forty-seven pupils; eleven of these being seniors.

We had a membership of twenty-nine pupils, one less than last year, in the seventh and eighth grades at the beginning of the school year. Since then we have lost one, making a total of twenty-eight pupils at the present time. Ten of these are in the eighth grade and eighteen are in the seventh grade.

Our attendance has been very good this year with the exception of about a month when so many were out sick with the mumps. Sickness accounts for practically all of our absences. Our tardinesses have fallen off considerably this year. I want to thank all of the parents for their cooperation in seeing that their children are at school on time. This is greatly appreciated by the faculty.

We have had two outstanding events so far this year which the citizens of Amherst have helped make successful. The first one of these deals with Education Week. Our program this year was about the same as last year, including talks by the teach-

ers, talks by the high school pupils to members of all grades including Cricket Corner, exchange speakers with the Hollis High School, and outside speakers. I should like to thank the Parent Teacher Association for the interest which they showed in the pupils by supplying speakers.

The second was the successful presentation of the play "The Perfect Getaway" on February 8, 1935 by members of the school. The citizens of Amherst should receive commendation for the splendid way in which they support their schools' functions.

Some of the future events of the school will be the high school prize speaking contest, the seventh and eighth grade prize speaking contest, the seventh and eighth grade play, the junior promenade, (possibly a program on the radio similar to the one given last year over Station WFEA, Manchester) and commencement exercises. The public is invited to attend all of these activities.

I have enjoyed the continued cooperation of the teachers. They take a great interest in the school and have for their main objective the welfare of the pupils. Our teachers' meetings are held monthly, the elementary teachers in one group and the high school teachers in another. Topics discussed at these meetings are educational, constructive, and applicable in their respective fields.

We are very fortunate this year again to have clubs in which all of the pupils may participate. One period a week is set aside for this activity. We offered three clubs during the first semester: Dramatics, Literature, and Etiquette. This semester we have organized three clubs: Etiquette and Dancing, Dramatics, and Motor (this club teaches the pupil the automobile laws, important parts of the car, etc., whereby at the end of the course, upon the signature of the headmaster, he may take the state ex-

amination to be held at the schoolhouse, providing five pupils take the examination). These clubs are conducted similar to those we had in 1932-1933. If more information is desired in regard to them, I shall be very glad to furnish it on request. Our Triple Entente Association continues to function with success. This organization has recently bought for its use five dozen song books.

Our music teacher this year, Miss Wheeler, has been very successful with the pupils. I believe they eagerly look forward to the singing period each week. Music is held each Thursday afternoon.

It is our earnest desire to cooperate with the parents whenever possible. Some of the parents have visited school this year but we should like to have others. We are always glad to welcome visitors even though they can stay only a few minutes. In view of this fact, I am presenting the school timetable for your convenience.

8:30 to 9:15. Elementary Science, English IX, Arithmetic VII, Sociology.

9:15 to 10:00. Biology, History VIII, Geography VII.

10:15 to 11:00. Biology Laboratory, Latin II, History VII, Advanced Math.

11:00 to 11:45. Biology Laboratory; English X, U. S. History, Algebra.

1:25 to 2:10. French III, English VII and VIII, Civics, Geometry.

2:15 to 3:00. French I, English XI and XII, Arithmetic VIII.

The two new subjects, Biology and Civics-Occupations, introduced this year, have been very successful. We have a large number enrolled in each class. The pupils' interest has been of the keenest type throughout the year. The pupils in the Civics-Occupations course have had members from

different professions come in and talk to them. They explain the training necessary to engage in the various occupations. The pupils have a chance to ask questions of those who speak to them.

Next year as customary History of Civilization will be offered in place of Civics-Occupations; Chemistry in place of French III; European History in place of United States Constitutional History; and Junior Business Training in place of Biology. We hope to introduce a full year of Sociology for the juniors and a full year of Economics for the seniors, starting this coming year.

The assembly periods (12:45-1:25) for the week are filled as follows:

Monday: Fundamentals (either spelling or geography).

Tuesday: Clubs.

Wednesday: Triple Entente Association meeting (these meetings are held every other week).

Thursday: Music.

Friday: Fundamentals (arithmetic, reading, grammar).

At various times we have outside talent come to either give a talk or present a musical program.

The Triple Entente Association

In 1926, Amherst High School decided to organize one club to carry on all the activities of the school. This newly formed club, the Triple Entente Association, had three purposes—athletics, dramatics, and literature.

This association has four officers chosen each year, president, vice-president, secretary and a treasurer.

The high school students, seventh and eighth graders, and the teachers compose the membership. The students are members from the time they enter

the seventh grade until they graduate or leave the school.

The first constitution, which was formed at the time of organization was superseded by a new one drawn up by the graduates of 1934.

At the beginning of each school year the association decides upon the dues, time of meetings, and any other yearly business such as programs after the business meeting.

All of the meetings are conducted according to the best parliamentary procedure. Two judges well informed on parliamentary law have their benches in the front of the organization room. They advise the organization as to the proper procedure when they need direction.

This association's main object is to give the students a chance to carry on their own activities and to cooperate with their schoolmates and teachers.

Some of the activities of the club are plays and entertainments, dances, school parties, trips and outings, basketball, and a yearly magazine, "The Broadcaster."

The expenses of the graduating class are paid by the association, such as a speaker at the Baccalaureate service and the programs. It does not pay for their personal wants.

This method of conducting school affairs has proved very successful in Amherst High School, as the classes are generally not large enough to carry on their own activities efficiently. Everyone has an equal chance and no partiality is shown for any class. Everything is done in the name of the association and for the good of it.

I recommend this type of organization for any school, especially one that has quite small classes. "United we stand, divided we fall."

We wish to reassure Mr. Hubley of our appreciation of his continued cooperation.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the school officials, teachers, parents, and friends for their hearty cooperation in making the Amherst High School a success.
