5. To see if the Town will vote by ballot to determine if they are in favor of a three-year term for the Town Clerk to be voted in by ballot at the next annual meeting.
6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Planning Board Committee and the proposed ordinance.
7. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the repair and reconstruction of bridges in Town of Barnstead.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,427.15 for Town Road Aid, to match contribution of \$9,514.31 by the State of N.H.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to make and erect signs for all Town roads. (By petition, not recommended by Budget Committee).

10. To see if the Town will vote to give the old Town Jail to the Boy Scouts for their equipment. (By petition).

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$225.00 for 15 pair of boots for the Center Barnstead Fire Dept. (By petition, not recommended by the Budget Committee).

12. To see if the Town will vote to give more land on both sides of the fire house for the new Center Barnstead Fire Dept. Building to be built in the future.

**REPORT OF
OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY**

The most recent library statistics compiled annually by the N.H. State Library show an increase over the previous report in the number of volumes on the shelves of the Barnstead library and an increase in the number of books circulated. As a member of Affiliated Libraries, the Barnstead library enjoys certain privileges not the least of which is the right to purchase books at advantageous discount rates.

What neither the statistics nor the cost advantage points up is an intangible which we might identify here as reader interest. This interest has been evidenced by the growing amount of research work that was done this past year and is currently being done by many of the patrons, most notably by the students of the Barnstead School, and on frequent occasions by pupils attending other schools. For so small a library, Barnstead can pride itself on having an outstanding collection of reference material not only in number of volumes but in diversification and in quality. Reference work is done extensively by our student body. Two grades of the school come to the library each week, one on Monday, one on Wednesday, each grade accompanied by its respective teacher.

In addition to this supervised activity there is a decided increase of students who do independent research and of adults who come to the library for reference material. It is interesting to note that the library patrons here as elsewhere are following the general trend of showing less interest in works of fiction and increasing interest in such subjects as: history, current events, world affairs, science, hobbies — in short the non-fiction category. Though the library has many and representative titles of fiction it is in the non-fiction category, so much in demand, that it excels.

But were the Barnstead library the best equipped of its size in the state it would be of little use were it not for the dedicated services of its librarian, Ellen Grau, and of the many volunteers who unselfishly donate hours of their time — on pleasant summer evenings or bitter cold ones — to serve their townspeople.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and the Citizens of the Barnstead School District: I respectfully submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The Barnstead Elementary School has a fine staff of teachers, working under the able leadership of Mr. McCarthy, Principal. New concepts have been introduced and improvements have been achieved in many areas. The problem, however, has not been solved. Two concerns need to be expressed in order to inform you, the voting public, of the areas needing attention at your school.

Education for an elementary student needs to give the individual the necessary foundation upon which he can build his future. He needs to achieve in reading, writing, arithmetic, spelling, English, science, social studies, art and music. These areas will give the student the traditional preparation needed to further his education.

What is Barnstead doing for the Junior High School age student? As a result of some volunteer parental help, some students are receiving art lessons. An attempt has been made to provide some limited physical education. Nothing is being done in a formal educational way to provide your students with industrial arts experiences. Nothing is being done to give them an opportunity to experience home economics. Very little is provided in the way of guidance, to better prepare them for high school and the selection of courses. The one ray of light this year has been in the limited remedial reading program being provided through Federal Funds.

The solution to the problem of providing a complete and adequate educational program for the 7th and 8th graders is not an easy one. For Barnstead to provide this type of program would be too costly. The choice then becomes one of tuitioning the student to a location where he can receive these necessary educational experiences. If this step is not taken then the hiring of an additional teacher would help, but not solve the dilemma. The least that can be done is to engage a full time teacher aide in order to give the teacher an opportunity to instruct a class of students without having twenty other students trying to study in the same classroom. As was indicated in last year's report, the present facilities are adequate for the first six grades, but there are serious limitations as to meeting the needs of the Junior High student.

The second concern centers around the teaching staff. As has been mentioned, you now have a fine staff, but there are indications that many of the present staff will not be returning next year. Teacher salaries in New Hampshire are going to be taking a real jump this next year. From all of the present indications, teachers graduating from college will be offered starting salaries of \$5500.00 to \$5600.00 on the average. Some districts already have accepted a beginning salary of \$6000.00. The present average salary for Barnstead teachers is less than \$5400.00, yet all of the staff members are experienced. In order to attract teachers to Barnstead, it is necessary to provide them with an adequate salary. With the present shortage that exists in the number of teachers available, it becomes necessary to have a competitive salary. Other factors also need to be considered in order to attract teachers to teach in Barnstead, such as fringe benefits, the teaching load, living conditions, recreational and religious opportunities, and the community's total educational climate.

These two concerns, Junior High educational offerings and competitive teacher salaries need serious consideration in order to maintain and improve the education being offered your youth. Without the proper educational foundation, provided by competent teachers, your students are going to be met with some serious problems along the highway of success.

I want to express sincere appreciation to the parents, business men, citizens, and all other agencies for their continued interest and support.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Barnstead, it is with great pleasure that I submit my first annual report as your Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

I have found the Barnstead School System a receptive one in which to work. The facilities are excellent, and the community demonstrates great interest in their school.

In the area of curriculum Barnstead has up-to-date textbooks with very good supporting material in mathematics, science, and language arts. For the 1968-69 school year we are planning to initiate a new reading program. New texts, workshops, clinics, and visiting instructors will be used to best implement the new series. This will leave only social studies as the last major academic area to be adopted.

Another new program which is now under study and which will be implemented in the 1968-1969 school year is that of a uniform testing program. In this manner the teachers will be able to discover learning problems early and take appropriate action rather than allow the problem to become critical as has sometimes happened in the past.

It is regrettable that Barnstead has not retained teachers longer. It will be one of our goals to employ personnel of a high caliber who will remain in the system for an extended length of time. It is the veteran teacher who builds loyalties to a community, understands the community characteristics, and is often willing to do more than the minimum requirements of the profession. It is for these reasons that every attempt will be made to retain our good teachers and to replace weak teachers with mature and competent professionals.

The administration realizes the great burden that the expanding demands of education have placed upon the local property owner. It is with this in mind that recommendations for programs which are essential have been brought forth. We have, however, attempted to avoid the desirable items which add value to the education of students but which cannot be termed as an essential in the learning process.

I believe that the tax structures of New Hampshire will begin to change within the near future. When the property tax becomes more realistic, it is hoped that many of the desirable items may be added to the Barnstead School.

It is my personal goal to become much more involved in the educational programs of Barnstead. During the first seven months that I have spent in this position I have spent much time researching what has been done before me. I now hope that I may be able to better help both student and teacher in the educational process.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

School opened on September 6th with a student enrollment of 147 in grades 1-8 and three new teachers; Mrs. John Forsyth, grade 1; Mrs. Henry Stapleton, grade 2; and Miss Maureen Black, grade 4. Mrs. John Staples returned to teach grade 3, Mrs. Eric Johanson to grade 5, Paul R. Aldrich to grades 6-8 in science and mathematics, and Robert R. McCarthy to grades 6-8 in language arts and social studies. In cooperation with the Pittsfield School System and with the use of Title III funds, George Radcliffe became Barnstead's first part-time remedial reading specialist. Mrs. David Sweeney began her duties as school nurse.

The Barnstead Library program initiated last year continues this year through the efforts of Mrs. Helen Grau, town librarian. All students in grades 2-8 visit the library about once a month. Mrs. Grau has been instrumental in borrowing many fine films from the State Library for student viewing.

The addition of a second television set at school has allowed students in grades 1-5 greater use of Channel 11's educational programs in reading, science, and music.

The PTA has continued its sponsorship of the ski program here at school for the third year and has formed a parent-teacher committee to investigate, report on, and make recommendations regarding the adoption of a sex education program for the school.

National Education Week was observed this past November with individual parent conferences held at school Monday through Thursday. The appointment-type schedule allowed for 82 parent-teacher conferences representing better than 60% of the total student population.

An effort to provide more individualized instruction to junior high students was initiated using local townspeople as supervisors. Local volunteers included the following: Mrs. Herman Dame, Mrs. Maurice Duhaime, Mrs. Arthur Gosse, Mrs. Arthur Riel, Mrs. Ivan Rutherford, Mrs. Helene Sullivan, Mrs. Ernest Tiede, and Mrs. John Vorel. Morning volunteers supervised study periods, and the afternoon volunteers supervised a large "study-work" area with one of the teachers. This enabled the "free" teacher to work more closely with individuals, small, or large groups as needs arose. Group guidance sessions, independent study groups in language arts and science, special help sessions, project work groups, and enthusiasm project groups were

established. The program met with several successes and several difficulties and continued into December when it was decided in conference with the Superintendents that a third teacher was needed, and the program was discontinued.

Mrs. Benjamin Young worked as a volunteer to provide piano accompaniment for the school's Christmas concert.

Mrs. William Parent has continued as volunteer art instructor to interested junior high students, meeting with them on a once a week basis.

Under the aegis and watchful eye of Mr. Aldrich, a junior high rocket club, "The Reckless Rockets", has provided much entertainment as well as valuable learning experiences to all of the students. Rocket launchings and recoveries have become common playground practice.

Mr. McCarthy attended the New England Reading Conference in Boston in September. In every school, reading is the most stressed subject, and the largest problem area for many students. Junior high students who have reading problems at Barnstead were tested by Mr. Radcliffe and Mr. McCarthy in September and the grade level at which they could successfully read was determined. These students, aside from their weekly meetings with Mr. Radcliffe, work as helpers with the lower grade teachers who give them individualized instruction at their appropriate levels. Although the reading problem at Barnstead is far from being eliminated, it is felt that this program has benefited many students.

The basketball backstops and swings which arrived this past fall will be installed on the playground this spring when the ground thaws.

The faculty wishes to thank those parents and interested townspeople who have contributed many hours of their time and effort towards the betterment of the Barnstead School.

**VI. TENTATIVE SCHOOL WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Barnstead qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the eighth day of March, 1968, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.
9. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and receive in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any Federal or State Agency.
10. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$850 to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year.
11. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.
