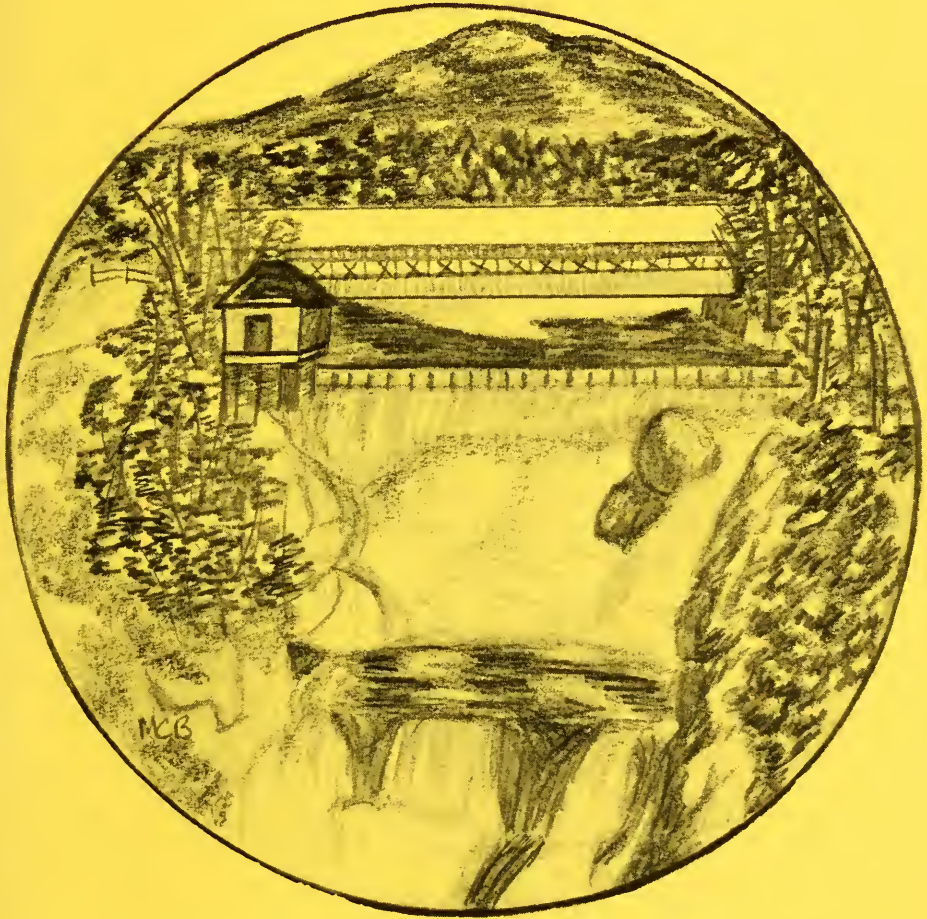

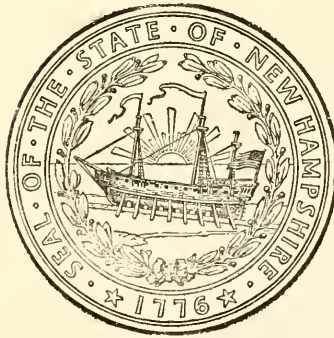

On behalf of all past and present citizens of the Town of Bartlett, the Selectmen are pleased to dedicate the year's Town Report to Linus Howard, who faithfully served this town for thirty-three consecutive years as a Selectman.

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March 1978, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot, and the polls shall open for balloting at ten o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six thirty o'clock in the evening. The remaining articles of the warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum not exceeding in the aggregate \$250,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, said to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett.

Article 6. To see if the voters will vote to condemn the 3 story unoccupied fire hazard right in the center of town on Church Street. The owner of this I.O.O.F. building will be required to remove this fire hazard within 90 days of an affirmative vote. Non-performance to be subject to a fine of up to \$50 per day starting on the 91st day. Agreeable to a petition signed by Dora Hayes and others.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and revert to the abutting owner, that portion of the old abandoned Route 302 which takes off northerly from Birchview Drive and runs parallel to existing Route 302 for approximately 150 feet, before it merges with existing Route 302. Agreeable to a petition signed by Hermann Pfeuti and others.

Article 8. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Birchview by the Saco, Inc., for a strip or parcel of land sixty-six (66) feet in width and approximately twenty-four hundred (2400) ft. long for highway and utility purposes. Said parcel is shown as a portion of Covered Bridge Lane, all of White's Ledge Lane, and a portion of Hemlock Drive on a plan entitled "Birchview by the Saco, Bartlett, N. H., Division II, Phase I, surveyed 1975 and 1976 by Douglas C. Burnell, Conway, N. H., said plan recorded Carroll County Registry of Deeds in Plan Book 38, Page 30. Said strip or parcel is to begin at the Southeast corner of Lot No. 235 on Covered Bridge Lane and end at the Southeast corner of Lot No. 82 at the intersection of Hemlock

Drive and Oak Ridge Road. Said strip or parcel also includes a spur road approximately 300 ft. long running North from Hemlock Drive and ending in a cul-de-sac near land of Glenwood, Inc. Acceptance of the deed is contingent upon construction of a road agreeable to standards established by the Town and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charlotte Teele and others.

Article 9. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Birchview by the Saco, Inc. for a strip or parcel of land sixty-six (66) feet in width and approximately two thousand (2000) ft. long for highway and utility purposes. Said parcel is shown as a portion of Covered Bridge Lane, and a portion of Hemlock Drive on a plan entitled "Birchview by the Saco," Bartlett, N. H., Division II, Phase II, surveyed 1975 and 1976 by Douglas C. Burnell, Conway, N. H., said Plan recorded Carroll County Registry of Deeds, in Plan Book 38, Page 30. Said strip or parcel is to begin at the Southeast corner of Lot No. 204 and end at the Northeast corner of Lot No. 244. Said strip also includes a spur road approximately 280 ft. long running West from the intersection of Covered Bridge Lane and Hemlock Drive and ending in a cul-de-sac near land of the White Mt. National Forest. Acceptance of the deed is contingent upon construction of a road agreeable to standards established by the Town and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by John C. Holmes and others.

Article 10. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Linderhof Resorts and/or Mr. Ron Doyle for a certain parcel of roadway intended for public use. Said parcel being approximately 66' (sixty-six feet) wide and approximately 5,000 feet long and shown on a certain plan entitled Linderhof Resort Area, Drawing number three, Plan Book 18, Page 19 dated September 28, 1970. These public roadways to be completed satisfactory to the Selectmen at the time of acceptance. Agreeable to a petition signed by William Kuhlman, Jr. and others.

Article 11. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Glenwood, Inc. for land sixty-six (66) feet in width for highway and utility purposes as shown on plan recorded November 23, 1976, Carroll County Records, Plan Book 35, Page 07, and the Town office, and being Littlefield Road, approximately 900 feet, Mt. Stanton Road, approximately 1,400 feet, and Pickering Road, approximately 1,000 feet. Also Glenwood Avenue Extension to Route 302, about 750 feet, provided the Selectmen find that said highways have been constructed to meet Town standards at the time of acceptance. Agreeable to a petition signed by Arnold Bennett and others.

Article 12. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Attitash Development Corporation for a certain parcel of land located on Attitash Mtn. in Bartlett, intended for public use for a road or street and other public utilities; said parcel being 66' wide and approximately 2700' long, located off Cowhill Road and shown on a certain plan entitled: Property of Attitash Development Corporation Phase I of Subdivision, Thaddeus Thorne Surveys, dated 1973, plan 73-112. Acceptance of the deed is contingent upon construction of a road to standards established by the Town and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert B. Kantack and others.

Article 13. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Attitash Enterprises for a certain parcel of land located on Attitash Mountain in Bartlett, intended for public use for a road or street and other public utilities; said parcel being 66' wide

and approximately 1460' long, located off Route 302 between an existing town road and Attitash Development Corporation, and shown on a certain plan entitled "Property of Attitash Enterprises, Inc.," Phase I of Subdivision, Thaddeus Thorne Surveys, construction of a road to standards established by the Town and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph L. Berry and others.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to terminate the Industrial Fund in the amount of \$650.00 and return the sum appropriated to the General fund.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to help defray the costs of the Bartlett Summer Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Betsey N. Pfeuti and others.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1500.00 to support the Bartlett Athletic and Recreation Association.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000.00 for expenses of the Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council, operating as a regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board under Chapter 53-B of NHRSA, for the purpose of entering into an engineering service contract with Environmental Engineers, Inc., of Concord, N. H., for a feasibility study for solid waste disposal in the Mt. Washington Valley Area.

Article 18. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 to finish cleaning up the remains of the Choo-Choo Inn.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1531.00 to become a member of the North Country Council, Inc.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to support the White Mountains Region Association.

Article 21. To see if the voters of the Town of Bartlett will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for support of the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Pursuant to a petition signed by Robert J. Murphy and others.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) in support of the Senior Meals and Wheels program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Katherine Ryan and others.

Article 23 To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$498.00 towards the support of the North Conway Children and Youth Project (C&Y Project). This sum to be used as rent and office space. Agreeable to a petition signed by Susan Gaudette and others.

Article 24. To see if the Town of Bartlett will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,596.05 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. (formerly the Home Health Agency of the Memorial Hospital, Inc.) The said sum being equal to \$1.35 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Howard C. Nichols and others.

Article 25. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$961.50 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc., 1978. Agreeable to a petition signed by Betty A. Brown and others.

Article 26. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the Center of

Hope for Developmental Disabilities, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Elizabeth M. Whitman and others.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,000.00 for the purchase of a new front end loader and to authorize the withdrawal of \$34,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing fund to pay for said loader.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 to build a new roof and new bay at the town fire station in Bartlett Village.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$2000.00 from the Revenue Sharing fund to be used toward the cost of a new town truck.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$5000.00 from the Goodrich Falls Account and establish a Highway Equipment Capital Reserve fund in the same amount.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$5000.00 from the Goodrich Falls Account into the Building Capital Reserve fund.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$5000.00 from the Goodrich Falls Account and establish a Bridge Capital Reserve fund in the same amount.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$40,000.00 from the Goodrich Falls Account to the Dump Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use of \$3600.00 in Anti Recession funds to pay, in part, the cost of ambulance service.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to apply any additional Anti Recession money toward the survey costs incurred by the Town.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8000.00 for an engineering service to contract with Environmental Engineers, Inc., of Concord, N. H., for achieving an acceptable temporary means for disposal of Bartlett's solid waste.

Article 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Selectmen are most pleased to present the citizens of Bartlett with their yearly report which will try to outline the past years business and highlight some of the upcoming years concerns.

Once again the tax rate has been lowered, this year from \$16.20 to \$15.60 per thousand dollars valuation. This means the tax rate has been lowered \$.90 over the past two years. The Town Hall note and the re-evaluation note have been paid off, leaving only three long term notes still owed by the Town. Due to an extra payment this year on the Bridge note, the principal on notes for 1978 will be \$10,281.00 as compared to last year's payment of \$49,546.00; a sizeable decrease which will help the 1978 tax rate. All interest payments this year will be considerably less than in past years, which is an enviable position for the Town.

As featured on the cover of our town report, Goodrich Falls was sold at Public Auction, and along with the proceeds for the sale of the Hill Lot \$52,068 was deposited in a special account, which has been collecting sizeable amounts of interest during the past few months. The Selectmen are pleased with the outcome of this venture, as Bartlett has helped in a small way to ease the energy crisis, and at the same time received a substantial amount of money which will be put to very good use in future years.

The Selectmen are recommending that the Town vote to use this money to either add to, or establish, new capital reserve funds. Once these capital reserve funds have been established and added to over the years, interest costs on borrowing money can be greatly reduced because the town will have substantial amounts of money on hand for certain projects. The Selectmen's recommendation for the capital reserve funds will be presented as articles in this year's warrant, to be voted at town meeting.

The road crew was very busy this past year, not only fighting one of our toughest winters in some time, but with the repairing and rebuilding of our town road system. Forest Avenue in the village, was completely rebuilt and will be surfaced this summer. The first portion of Rolling Ridge Road was reconstructed making much better and safer approaches to the Railroad crossing. Many gallons of tar were applied to existing roads in an effort to keep these roads in as good a shape as possible.

All of the town trucks have been equipped with 2-way radios which has improved communication greatly. The town crew can save many needless trips and they are important in case of breakdown, accident or to report a fire or other emergencies.

This coming year the Road crew will be applying even more tar which should bring our road sealing schedule back on a more even plane where so much tar will not be needed each year. The remainder of Rolling Ridge is scheduled for a complete refurbishing, as is Foster Street and the extension to Foster Street. The Town is once again participating with the National Forest on a bridge project. The bridge in question is the small one on Town Hall Road which is in a bad state of disrepair at the present time. Rather than build a new span, it appears that a multi plate culvert will do the job adequately and the White Mountain National Forest has agreed to purchase the multi plate culvert if the town will install it.

This is a very good deal for the town and it is expected this project will be completed by early summer, with the result being safe passage over that particular spot, for school busses, and heavy equipment alike.

The state project for West Side Road did not progress very far past the survey stage during 1977, but the state has informed the Town the project is still alive and will commence this coming year. Many residents of Bartlett have commented to both the Selectmen and the State Highway Department about this project so the end result should be a good equitable solution for all concerned.

The Grange is busy making improvements in the downstairs area of the Town Hall and it should make for a much better kitchen and dining area for the functions that go on at the Town Hall. The Selectmen plan to tie the Town Hall water system into the well at the Town Garage, thus providing a long needed supply of good water. The new oil burner has been installed in the Town Hall and it is planned that some type of zoned system will be incorporated into the present system, which should provide a better balance of heat and also have in fuel costs.

The Fire Department communication system underwent a substantial change, in that Bartlett and Jackson have their own fire frequency, no longer shared with the town crew. The Fire Department is still able to call and talk with the town crew if they are needed for plowing, sanding, etc. Bartlett's first dry hydrant was installed last fall at the Linderhof Pond and this should prove to be very useful in the event of fire in that area. Another dry hydrant is planned for the Glen area this coming summer. The town recently received a complete survey of all water and possible dry hydrant locations throughout the town. This survey was completed by the Soil Conservation Service and will be a big help in planning Bartlett's future needs with regard to dry hydrant sites and pond sites which are most important in a rural area such as ours. Through many meetings and training sessions, both the Glen and Bartlett Village departments have greatly improved their fire fighting capabilities to a point where the town can be very proud of its volunteer departments.

As is the case with most towns in New Hampshire, good effective government is established through the participation of its citizens who are willing to serve the Town in some capacity. The Selectmen would like to thank all the town officers and volunteers who gave their time during the past year in making our government work. We would also like to give special mention to a few individuals who have given many years of dedicated service to the people of Bartlett, and for one reason or another, have seen fit to retire from their active roles in our town government. Paul Taylor resigned his position as Town Treasurer after ten years of distinguished service, and his position was filled by Maxine Patch. Donald Howard has finished a long term of duty as bookkeeper for the Selectmen and Marcia Dolley has been hired to fill her position. Hilda Howard served as a library trustee for over 25 years and gave many hours as a friend of the library and as bookkeeper for the Trustees. Elwood Dinsmore served for around 30 years in the important position of State Fire Warden, and his position has been filled by George Marcoux. Catherine Peinert is retiring her position as Auditor for the town, and her bookkeeping hints and timely reports will be missed. Owen Jefferson is not seeking re-election as Trustee of Trust Funds after serving many years in that post.

The Selectmen would like to once again thank these people for their years of service and hope you, the townspeople, will show your appreciation by thanking them individually.

The Town dump will be a big project during 1978 as we are about

at the end of line with regard to continued burning at our present location. The Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council is asking for \$3,000.00 from Bartlett as its share of the cost of a study which would incorporate the Towns of Bartlett, Jackson, Conway, Albany and Eaton into a solid waste disposal district. More details of this project will be found under the Council's heading in the report. Public hearings, news articles and the Selectmen's informational hearing will try to further explain the details of the dump problem.

The Selectmen would like to thank the citizens of Bartlett, the town employees and town officials, all of whom contributed in making Bartlett a good town in which to live.

State Highway Aid is available to Bartlett during 1978 in these categories:

Town Road Aid, Apportionment A Funds

Chapter 241, Section 2 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, provides for Class IV and V Construction, Reconstruction or Betterment Aid.

If aid is desired under Apportionment A, the town must raise \$584.63 and the State will contribute \$3,897.53.

Highway Subsidy

Chapter 241, Section 14 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, provides a highway subsidy for maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class IV and V highways in towns and cities.

Your highway subsidy for 1978 will be \$9,552.31.

Additional Highway Subsidy

Chapter 241, Section 15 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, provides an additional highway subsidy which shall be used only for construction or reconstruction of Class IV and V highways and shall be used to increase the highway appropriation of the municipality as of 1977.

Your additional subsidy for 1978 is estimated to be \$5,507.67.

Highway subsidy payments are made quarterly in January, April, July and October. Accurate records of expenditures must be maintained. Audited reports will be required on a state fiscal year basis, July 1 to June 30, and intermediate reports may also be necessary.

BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT, 1977

The Bartlett Public Library circulated 9,804 books in 1977. Approximately 250 books were added to the circulation. The bookmobile visited the library three times and left 1,002 books.

The Bartlett School District appropriated a sum of money which was used to purchase filmstrips and cassettes. As the audio-visual collection builds up it will greatly improve the library resources for research in many areas. The audio-visual materials will also be beneficial to the non-reader and the child that has difficulties with reading.

In the spring of the year the library conducted a weekly story hour for the pre-school child. During the summer the library sponsored the "4000 Footer Reading Club" for the tenth year. At the end of the summer the reading club members climbed Mount Eisenhower. This is the first time the reading club actually climbed one of New Hampshire's four thousand footers. The library also conducted the Monday night film programs for ten weeks during the summer. These programs were well attended. A used book sale was held in August.

A memorial book fund totaling \$572.00 has been established in memory of Lucille Garland. The interest will be used for children's books.

The scrap book of reproductions of old Bartlett pictures has been enjoyed by many. This was a bi-centennial project. However, the library would like to keep adding to it. If you have any old snapshots of Bartlett that we could borrow to have reproduced, please call the librarian or one of the trustees. Also the librarian is still looking for old town reports.

REPORT OF MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY PUBLIC SERVICE COUNCIL

In 1974, the Towns of Albany, Bartlett, Conway, Eaton, Hart's Location and Jackson created the Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council to operate as a regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board as authorized by the New Hampshire General Court. The specific purpose as chartered by the member towns was to determine the advantages, if any, of the member towns joining in a regional Solid Waste Disposal System.

As each year progressed, pressure proportionally increased for the simple reason that every town must comply with Federal and State air pollution regulations by July 1, 1979. If all the member towns are not complying by July 1, 1979, each is subject to mandatory penalties of up to \$25,000 per day.

Each member town has its own unique problem, but the simple fact of the matter is that open dumps and open-dump burning will not be allowed after July 1, 1979, and, furthermore, any such burning now is in violation but either being allowed by special grant, which will cease on July 1, 1979, or the town is operating under appeal from a cease-and-desist order. Even in Conway's case, its incinerator is a stop-gap measure which will be forced to close on July 1, 1979.

Therefore, within the next year and one-half, each member town will be required to expend money and take physical action either in the form of a land-fill project, an approved incinerator, or such other means as to comply with the State and Federal regulations. Each town has a choice of taking this action by itself or in concert with its neighbors. Obviously, that solution which calls for the least expenditure of money for the member towns, as balanced by our needs in the future, is the most desirable.

The Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council has selected Environmental Engineers, Inc., an affiliate of the Weston Group, to professionally analyze the Mt. Washington Valley area and determine the feasibility of a regional solid waste disposal system. If a regional solid waste disposal system is the most feasible, this meeting is the last opportunity for towns to initiate the necessary professional study to make that determination, and then authorize and form a solid waste disposal district and complete construction, if any, by the cut-off date of July 1, 1979, and forego any mandatory fines.

If each town approves its share of the study, it will be completed within three months. The study will also be completed prior to any town committing itself to forming a solid waste disposal district under R.S.A. 53-B. Only after the completion of the study, will a member town know if it is best to go it alone or join with its neighbors.

For these reasons, your Counsel highly recommends each town to authorize the funding of its share of the expenses of its Counsel to perform the feasibility study.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING, MARCH 8, 1977

Meeting called to order by Moderator Paine at 7:05 P.M.

Colors presented by Girl Scouts.

Moderator recalled history of Town Meeting 100 years ago.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Results of balloting. Selectman, 3 years, Gene G. Chandler, 281. Norman J. Head, Jr., 103. John E. Parker, Jr., 21. Others, 5. Auditor 1 year, Catherine M. Peinert, 373. Other 1. Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years, William K. Goodwin, 368. Library Trustee for 3 years, Hilda M. Howard, 379; other 3.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Budget explained by Chairman Chandler. Hospital \$2000, Ambulance \$3832.96, Rescue \$2000, Town Poor, Donald Howard 1st, Gene Chandler 2nd, \$1000 — ok. Cemeteries 100 abandoned cemeteries. Richard Patch—salary, Blue Cross for chief. Allen \$00 & Blue Cross. Taylor moved, Gerling 2nd. Budget ok. Total budget, \$280,688.00.

Article 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum not exceeding in the aggregate \$250,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes thereof, said to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

Taylor 1st, Hoffman 2nd. OK.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction.

Hoffman 1st, George 2nd OK.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett.

Clippenger 1st, Billings 2nd OK.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to abandon and deed to the abutting owners, a twelve foot wide road leading from Route 16A to the Comb's property. Said road commonly known as Burdette Road.

Moved G. Chandler, 2nd Hoffman. Accept article as read. Article explained by Chandler. Owners offered said art. Approved as read.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for support of the Eastern Slope Regional Airport.

Moved D. Mark, 2nd Gale article be accepted. W. Houghton gave resume of Airport activities. Article approved.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,000.00 for the purchase of a new truck and authorize the

withdrawal of this sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

Moved by Chandler, 2nd by Hoffman article be approved as read. So voted. Judy Smith moved reconsideration of Art. 33, 2nd Mr. MacInnis. Motion lost.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund and transfer to the Town Mapping Account \$4,432.50 to cover the 1977 payment to the mapping contractor.

Mr. Taylor Moved and Mr. Billings 2nd. accept as read. Mr. Billings, when maps will be available, Mr. Taylor, next year. Article voted.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for a Dump Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of \$8,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund for this purpose.

Mr. Hoffman moved, R. Glines 2nd, Article be accepted. Chandler and Taylor explained article. Article voted.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Building Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

Hoffman moved, Chandler 2nd, article accepted as read. So voted.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for renovations and heating system changes in the town hall, and a new gas pump for the police department, and further authorize the withdrawal of said sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

Clippinger moved, 2nd Glines, article accepted as read. So voted.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the sum of \$25,000.00 as the Town's share in a state aid reconstruction project for the improvement of the West Side Road; and raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,500.00 as this year's share of said project and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said \$12,500.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

D. Chandler moved, Haley, Parker 2nd. Article be accepted. Discussion and explanation. Article approved.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to support the White Mountains Region Association.

Glines moved, M. Cook 2nd, pass over article. Motion lost. Moved by Plusch and 2nd Howard. Discussion. Plusch, Haley, G. Paine, P. Taylor, Parker, P. Tay. Decision vote, yes 62. No 53.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the assets of the Bartlett Village Precinct that pertain to fire equipment and related buildings. All present liabilities shall remain payable by the precinct and all future liabilities of the fire department will be borne by the Town. Any equipment or building presently under mortgage agreement shall be leased by the Town for one dollar per year until the discharge of that mortgage, at which time such equipment and buildings shall be conveyed to the Town of Bartlett.

J. Howard moved, W. Ainsworth 2nd accept as read. Glines asks explanation. G. Marcoux spoke to motion. Discussion, Taylor, Chandler, Wilson, C. Young, R. Patch. Several amendments offered and withdrawn. Article laid on table so that Art. 17 may be taken up at this time. Article taken from table. Clippenger moved, Haley 2nd, George 2nd, article accepted as read. So voted.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 for equipment purchase and operating expenses of

the Bartlett Village Fire Department for 1977.

George moved, Hoffman 2nd, article accepted as read. So voted.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to establish a board of fire commissioners to act in an advisory capacity to the selectmen. The Board shall consist of two men elected from each the Glen and Bartlett Village Fire Departments and one member of the Board of Selectmen.

Haley moved, Marcoux 2nd accept article. Pettingill moved, Glines 2nd, amend by changing advisory to supervisory, questioned by Plusch. Pettingill explained reason for amendment. Then withdrew motion. J. Howard, Jr. moved, 2nd B. Howard the following amendment: To see if the Town will vote to establish a board of fire commissioners to have the responsibility for the operation of the fire department, subject to the approval of the Selectmen. Discussion. J. Howard, Jr., Moulton, Taylor, Roden, Glines, Patch, MacInnis. Amendment accepted. Plusch asks if commission will develop policy. J. Smith offered following amendment: Board shall be responsible to present a master plan for entire town. Said plan presented at next Town Meeting. 2nd Plusch. Voice vote questioned. Division yes 55. No 48. Article as amended accepted.

Article 18. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Attitash Development Corporation for a certain parcel of land located on Attitash Mtn. in Bartlett, intended for public use for a road or street and other public utilities; said parcel being 66' wide and approximately 4,300' long, located off Route 302 and shown on a certain plan entitled: Property of Attitash Development Corporation Phase I of Subdivision, Thaddeus Thorne Surveys, dated 1973, Plan 73-112. Acceptance of the deed is contingent upon construction of a road to standards established by the Town and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joe Berry and others.

Berry moved, Bannon 2nd. Article accepted as read. Discussion and questions: Glines, Parker, Patch, Gale, Plusch, B. Howard, Berry, Belle-rose, J. Howard, Chandler and Taylor answered questions. Berry offered following amendment: Delete 1200 ft., accept from Town Road to Blueberry Village. No Second. Haley moved previous question. 0 yes. Loud **no**.

Article 19. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Attitash Enterprises for a certain parcel of land located on Attitash Mountain in Bartlett, intended for public use for a road or street and other public utilities; said parcel being 66' wide and approximately 400' long, located off Route 302 between an existing town road and Attitash Development Corp., and shown on a certain plan entitled "Property of Attitash Enterprises, Inc. Phase I of Subdivision, Thaddeus Thorne Surveys, dated May, 1969" Plan 73-112. Acceptance of the deed is contingent upon construction of a road to standards established by the Town and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joe Berry and others.

Glines moved, Murphy seconded pass over article, motion carried.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$951.66 for the support of the Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc.

Clemons moved, Clippinger 2nd, article accepted as read, so voted.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$504.00 for the support of the North Conway Children and Youth Project (CCY). This sum to be used as rent for clinic and office space. Agreeable to a petition signed by Susan Gaudette and others. Moved S. Gaudette, 2nd Glines article be accepted as read. So voted.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction the real estate deeded to the Town by the New Hampshire Electric Cooperative and known as the Goodrich Falls.

Murphy moved, Gerling 2nd not to accept. Discussion, vote, division. Yes 49, No 25.

March 9, 1977. Gene Chandler asked to reconsider Art. 22. Use of property discussed by Glines, Kelley, Plusch, Gerling and Taylor. Mr. Murphy not present at this session. Benson Howard brought this to attention of meeting. Mr. Murphy arrived at 7:20, agreed to reconsideration of article.

Article amended by adding "To be used as a hydroelectric power producing station or kept in its natural state with no industry other than electrical." Amended by Gerling and Fuller. Judy Smith noted that no conservation member was present to discuss motion.

Glines moved, 2nd by Kelley. Vote on article, 48 yes, no 4.

Article 23. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Glen Acres, Inc., for a certain parcel of land located in Glen Acres Subdivision and intended for public use for a road or street and other public utilities. Said parcel being 66' wide and approximately 970' long beginning off Glen Ledge Road and running to a Cul De Sac between Lots 5-6-7 in Glen Acres. Also, a section 66' wide and approximately 400' long running off above mentioned road to a Cul De Sac between lots 12 and 13. Master Plan—Glen Acres, drawn October, 1973 is on file in the Town Office, acceptance of the deed to be contingent upon construction of the roads agreeable to standards established by the Town and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jeannie Poliquin and others.

Richard Plusch moved. 2nd by A. Bellerose. Accepted as read.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Owen Jefferson, for a certain parcel of land located in Glen. This deed will describe public roadways which meet the geometric standards set by the Bartlett Planning Board. These public roadways being a continuation of Glen Ledge Road (4600 ft.); South Ledge Road (600 ft.); and Forest Ledge Road (300 ft.) to the intersection of Glen Acres Road. Said roadways to be completed satisfactory to the Selectmen at the time of acceptance. Agreeable to a petition signed by Owen Jefferson and others.

Helen Kelley moved. A. Bennett 2nd. Accepted as read.

Article 25. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Glenwood, Inc. for land sixty-six feet in width for highway and utility purposes as shown on plan recorded November 23, 1976, Carroll County Records Plan Book 35, Page 07, and in the Town Office, and being Glenwood Avenue, (approximately 1,200 feet), Littlefield Road to the intersection of Mt. Stanton Road (approximately 1,400 feet), Popple Hill Drive, (approximately 1,950 feet), provided that the Selectmen find that said highways have been constructed and meet town standards at the time of acceptance. Agreeable to a petition signed by James R. Illsley, Jr. and others.

R. Plusch moved. R. Glines 2nd. Accepted as read.

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Bartlett, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in Bartlett, in said district on the 8th day of March, 1978 at eight o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to contract with a qualified independent auditing firm or the Department of Revenue Administration for the fiscal year financial audit, in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire (R.S.A. 197:16, revised). Said authorization to remain in effect until such time as the District votes to elect local auditors as provided by State Statutes.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

by

Robert B. Kautz and David Stickney

It is a pleasure to provide this brief report concerning activities in the Supervisory Union, and more specifically, in your school. As everyone is aware, a great deal of construction is occurring within the Supervisory Union. We are happy to report that construction at the high school will begin on or about April 1, 1978 and the anticipated date of completion is April 1, 1979. Therefore, everyone can be confident that double sessions will be ended in time for the full 1979-1980 school year. Besides this physical work, a great deal of time and effort is being spent by teachers throughout the Union in an attempt to provide accountability and improved curricula.

Vital educational growth has been undertaken this year which is evidenced by all the Union's teachers involved in activities to improve the curriculum and educational services to all children in Supervisory Union No. 9. Report Card Revision, Teacher Evaluation, Language Arts and Mathematic Curriculum Committees, Health Education and a Music curriculum are some of the varied activities being accomplished this year.

In addition to basic educational services being improved, each school board has adopted a plan for educating handicapped children. Additional staff and program offerings have been provided to establish appropriate educational offerings for those children experiencing educational handicaps.

We are very fortunate to have received a grant in cooperation with Carroll County Mental Health from the National Institute of Mental Health. This grant allows us to hire personnel for two years who will be helpful in providing the necessary services indicated by federal and state laws. These people will be working in all schools in the Supervisory Union, including your own.

We are pleased to provide the following report prepared by your Principal which speaks more specifically to current activities within your school.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

by Donald R. Lange

1977-78 has been an active year for the students and staff at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School.

A new reading series has been implemented in grades 1 and 2 and will be in grade 3 next year. Teachers in the primary grades are working on next year's reading program. The reading program will be ungraded for grades 1, 2 and 3 next year. Levels rather than grade placement will be used. This program should do away with any duplication of groups and will offer the students more levels of reading. On a smaller scale, team teaching and departmentalization will be implemented in the primary grades next year. Susan Janowicz, the fifth grade teacher, left in January for family reasons. Karen Anderson has been hired to replace Susan for the remainder of the year.

The junior high program has undergone several revisions this year. The schedule was changed to allow for more periods in the day. Class assignments for staff were revised to allow for more specialization. A home economics program was instituted for grades 5, 6, 7 and 8. The French program was expanded with the hiring of a French teacher and the purchase of audio visual material for the conversational aspects of French. Science equipment and supplies were purchased to allow for the expansion of lab work in the science program. The junior high staff will be working on co-ordinating the curriculum in the subject areas during the next few months. The junior high is also developing a program to self-contain the sixth grade next year. It is felt the 40 minute periods are too short for these students and changing teachers each period creates a problem. The program as planned will have the sixth grade students spend the morning with one teacher for reading and math. Services will be rearranged with the idea of providing the teacher with some tutorial aid during the morning. The afternoon session will either be with one teacher or the students will switch for two classes. Reading and math are the areas that the staff wants to concentrate on with the self-contained program.

A resource room was constructed this summer in the junior high wing. Susan Wirka was hired as the resource room coordinator. She offers the children a variety of perceptual and enrichment activities. Susan works with approximately 20 children who are referred by their teachers.

The Bartlett Student Council has been very active this year. They

have staged fund raising activities during the year. The Student Council is working on activities to boost school morale. The Bartlett "B" is one such idea. A student may earn a B by being involved in school activities and by earning points for participation in activities such as drama, band, chorus, sports, class officers, etc. Points are also given for academic achievement. After scoring the required number of points, a student is awarded an 8 inch block B. The Student Council also developed the idea of enrichment day for the junior high. On January 20, regular classes were suspended and a variety of activities were offered to the students. Local artisans visited the school to demonstrate their skills. The junior high staff offered courses such as History of Bartlett, Red Cross, Calculator games, French Luncheon and Broom. Student response to this idea was great.

School activities have boosted the student morale in the junior high this year. The athletic teams are doing well. The cheerleaders have been a great addition at the games. The yearbook committee is hard at work. The band and chorus performed well at the Christmas concert and who can forget the fantastic drama production, "Yankee Doodle" in the fall.

Staff members at the Bartlett School have served on the following Supervisory Union No. 9 committees - Language Arts, Report Cards, Child Neglect and Abuse, Health Education, Teacher Evaluation, Math, and the Early Assessment, with Bartlett teachers chairing three of these committees. The teachers put a great deal of time and effort into their spaghetti supper for the benefit of the elementary ski program. The elementary staff has submitted a grant for federal funding for a reading and language arts program this summer.

The students and staff are most appreciative of the community support for the school. Your support has allowed the school to expand programs and activities in order to make school a more valuable and happier learning experience. You have been a great encouragement to all of the staff. Once again, we are most appreciative of this support.
