TOWN HALL COMMITTEE

The committee elected on Mar. 12, 1912, to repair and remodel the town hall beg leave to report that they have attended to their duty.

The ceiling has been removed from the main hall the height has been increased by six feet and finished with steel. The stage has been widened and raised one foot. Two large ventilators have been installed. The stoves have been removed, a cellar 25x25 feet has been dug under the southwest corner of the building, in which has been placed a large wood furnace. Three toilet rooms connecting with the hall and selectmen's room have been added.

A brick fire-proof vault, 11 x 11 ft., with concrete roof, has been constructed on the rear of and connected with the selectmen's room by a six foot double steel door. New windows have been put in the front of the hall, which has been reclapboarded. The east roof has been shingled and a new tin roof placed on the lobby.

The building has been painted outside and inside with two coats of paint and the inside walls and ceiling tinted.

The electric light wires and lamps have been removed, and a new lighting system connected with a switch board on the stage has been installed.

The work as planned has all been completed with the exception of the concrete floor and shelving for the vault, which can be done at an estimated cost of \$50 and we

believe the town now has a sanitary, well ventilated, up to date hall.

UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the citizens and parents residing in Union school district:

As another financial year is about to close in town and school matters, a brief report of those concerning the district is herein submitted.

During the year there have been three sessions comprising 36 weeks in all, but which, owing to various deductions for holidays, institutes and storms, really amount to only about 35 weeks. It is a question worthy of consideration whether it would not therefore be better to add one more week to the school year in order that the pupils may have the benefit of at least 36 weeks of instruction. Nothing has occurred to disturb the harmony and utility of the schools. Excellent discipline has been maintained, the teachers have labored assiduously to interest, direct and instruct the pupils and the scholars as a whole have been diligent and interested in their school work.

The same excellent corps of teachers has been employed as last year with Miss Clara M. Ingalls in the Primary grade, Miss Mary E. Taylor in Grades 2 and 3, Miss Caroline P. Fowler in Grades 4 and 5, Miss A. Frances Blake in Grades 6 and 7, Miss E. Belle Calley in Grades 8 and 9 and as principal, with Miss Julia M. Swain in the High school, and Mrs. Katherine Crafts instructor in music.

Generally speaking the health of the scholars has been good. The only epidemic has been a mild run of chicken-pox which has not seriously interfered with the attendance and progress of the pupils. The sanitation of the school building has received frequent and thorough attention.

Pursuant to the vote of the district, the committee appointed for the purpose, consisting of Messrs. Albro Wells, Geo. B. Cavis and Chas. S. Collins, has installed the new toilets with flushing and ventilating apparatus and with steam heat therein.

At the opening of the fall term the Board directed the teachers to notify their pupils that all who had not been vaccinated must comply with the law, and furnished the Board of Health with a list of the names of those who had not heretofore complied therewith.

During the early winter, by the initiative of the Pasquaney Snowshoe Club and by the assistance of the Board of Park Commissioners, a large skating rink was constructed opposite the school grounds in Kelley Park which has been in almost daily use by the pupils to their great pleasure and physical benefit, thereby making Kelley Park a valuable asset for the schools as well in winter as in the warmer seasons.

Outside of the expense of the new toilets there have been no extraordinary expenses during the past year.

During the spring term the usual interesting annual exhibit of drawings, manual and artistic work occurred.

Memorial exercises in recognition of Memorial Day will occur as usual in May.

At the close of the spring term in June the public graduating exercises of the sophomore class of the High

school occurred at the town hall, which was beautifully decorated for the occasion.

Parents and friends manifested their interest by a substantial attendance. Although the graduating class was small, yet the exercises were very interesting, the themes were well written and well delivered. An address to the graduates was then made by the Superintendent after which the diplomas were presented by the Chairman of the Board.

Instruction in all grades has been given in hygiene, physiology and physical culture, and in the upper grades in the Constitution of New Hampshire.

The Board will be glad at any time to receive suggestions from friends of the schools making for their improvement.

All parents and friends are urged not only to be present at the public exercises of the schools but to visit them at other times and thus encourage both pupils and teachers.

We may be pardoned if again we call attention to the excellence of our High school and of the importance of the work therein to all of our pupils. No parent or guardian should permit his child to leave school without taking this part of the course, except from the direst necessity or other imperative reason.

The moral status of the scholars is a matter of the utmost importance. The teachers can give instruction and can use their influence to encourage the pupils in the ways of morality and virtue but nevertheless the home influence largely determines the moral conduct of the child. No parent can be indifferent to the moral and spiritual welfare of the children committed to his charge with-

out grave wrong both to them and to the community of which they will become inhabitants.

The Sunday school should supplement the week-day school.

As we have previously said it is the idea of the Board that the training given the scholars in our public schools should tend to the development of the highest and best powers within them, to implant in them a love for knowledge and a firm grasp of the principles of correct thinking to develop their ideals, their emotions, their souls, to enable them as men and women to work more quickly, accurately and intelligently and to enjoy in more noble and varied ways, and ultimately to gain a more complete understanding of themselves and of their Divine Creator.

It is expected that the present winter term will close on March 28 ; that the spring term will open on April 14, and close on June 20.

The present members of the Board are Messrs. Frank N. Gilman, chairman; Albro Wells, secretary; Mrs. Ada B. Cavis, Mrs. Mabel M. Ladd and Messrs. Wm. C. White and Ira A. Chase.
