TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Center Harbor in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at at the Town House in said Center Harbor on Tuesday, the four-teenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3 To bring in your vote for the election of your Representative to the General Court.
- 4 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Highways and Bridges.
- 5 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money for Town purposes in anticipation of taxes.
- 6 To see of the Town will vote to raise money to defray expenses of Memorial Day, and if so how much.

- 7 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$905.50 to defray expenses of street lights in Center Harbor Village.
- 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise money for aid to Laconia Hospital, and if so, how much.
- 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2000, for welfare work.
- 10 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1000. for maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 11 To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Assistance for Class V roads, the town to raise \$205.80, the State to contribute \$823.19.
- 12 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. which is 1/100 of 1 percent of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association, for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural resources of the Town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 13 To see if the Town will vote to raise money for Band Concerts, and if so, how much.
- 14 To see if the Town will vote to raise money for oil to be applied to the roads, and if so, how much.
- 15 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150. for the maintenance of the Town Dump.
- 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100. for cleaning and care of the sidewalks and roadsides.
- 17 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300. for maintenance of the wharf and fountain.

- 18 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100. for eradication of White Pine Blister Rust in conjunction with the State Blister Rust Plan.
- 19 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400. for New Equipment.
- 20 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300, for revising the Town tax map.
- 21 To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$419.16, left over from the Hawkins Bridge Appropriation, to the general fund, to be used to reduce taxes.
- 22 To see if the Town will vote to rescind the Australian Ballot System of voting and adopt the Non-Partisan system for the election of Town Officers as provided in the revised laws of New Hampshire.
- 23 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, by public auction, property acquired by tax sale.
- 24 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100. to be used, together with contributions from the Quinnibaug Outing Club and the Red Cross, for the purpose of hiring a full-time Life Guard at the Town wharf during the summer of 1950. (by petition)
- 25 To see if the Town will vote to terminate the lease of land, now occupied by a wooden garage at the so-called Town Wharf or landing; if so voted, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate money to establish this area as a Town Park. (by petition)
- 26 To see if the Town will choose an agent or agents to care for the Fountain at Center Harbor Village.

- 27 To see if the Town will choose a committee to take care of the wharf and make regulations for same.
- 28 To see if the Town will choose an agent or agents to care for the Cemeteries throughout the Town.
- 29 To choose agents or committees in relation to any article in the Warrant and hear any reports of any heretofore chosen.
- 30 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest Fires — Our Most Shameful Waste

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PRE-VENTION....fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY IF YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.


- 2. Securing the written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said District on the 14th day of March, 1950, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- Sa To choose a Member of the School Board for one year.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the District.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see how much money the district will raise and appropriate to provide modern toilet facilities at the Village School.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The total of \$19,098.00 in the second column was voted at the 1949 annual meeting, with the understanding that we would probably need to open the Town House school. When it became evident that it would not be necessary to do this, the School Board deducted \$2955.00 from the appropriation as voted, before certifying the school assessment to the Selectmen. The actual budget then, for 1949-50 is \$16,143.00 instead of \$19,098.00.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

School Marks and Promotions

About fifty years ago in the rural schools of America, each pupil learned at his own rate. Children were not designated as first graders, third graders, eighth graders, etc. Nine years were generally allowed for the courses in the elementary grades; but with the short terms of school at that time, many attended more than nine years.

In the city schools, pupils generally were grouped according to grade. Text books were written for the first grade, for the third grade, etc. Gradually this practice spread into the rural schools also, so pupils were enrolled in the register as being classified by grades. Promotions from grade to grade used to be based upon marks in various subjects. The length of the elementary school course was shortened to eight years.

For a long time teachers have realized that each pupil is different from every other pupil and that any group of pupils in one grade shows wide variations in achievement, attitude and maturity. Giving all school marks on a percentage basis assumes that they are alike and that the difference is in effort. Since this is a false assumption, we have often questioned whether or not marks should ever have been given and whether our present system of grading and promotion is at all justifiable.

This year we are making a start in the direction of eliminating marks and promotions. For the present, this change affects only the primary grades. The proposal is to have each pupil progress at his own rate through work hitherto covered in the first three grades.

Most pupils may be able to complete this work in three years; some may take four; occasionally a child can complete it in two. Parents can be kept informed by letters and through conferences with the teacher as to the progress which their children are making. It is hoped that this plan will contribute toward more natural growth for each child and that it will eliminate many tearful occasions caused by non-promotion or by comparing one pupil's work with another's. Whether or not it is practical to continue this new plan through the entire elementary years is a question. If it proves to be successful on the primary level after two or three years of trial, it may be desirable to continue the plan through the sixth grade at that time.

School Building Improvement

After many years of carrying water to our school in pails each day, running water has been made available there. Through an agreement with W. Irving Brown, we have made connection with his artesian well supply.

Oil-burning heaters of the floor furnace type have been installed in each classroom. The continuous even heat contributes much to the comfort of the children.

Now that we have continuous heat and running water, it will be possible at last for us to install modern toilet facilities. This matter will be brought before the district meeting under a special article in the warrant.

Improvement of Teachers in Service

It is definitely recommended that every five years each teacher shall devote one summer to advanced study in connection with her work, or shall complete an equivalent number of extension courses. The state board has also encouraged teachers to devote time during the year to improvement of their methods by stating that schools may be closed for this purpose for not more than eight days during any school year. In April of 1949, schools in this supervisory union were closed for one week and all teachers were privileged to attend a workshop on the subject of conservation education. This workshop was held in Meredith and was guided by members of the faculty of Plymouth Teachers College, members of the state department of education, and a number of capable experts in the fields of soil conservation, forestry and water resources. The purpose of these sessions was to emphasize to the teachers the necessity on the part of all citizens to guard our nation's bank account of natural resources so the future generations will not find the soil, forests and water supply insufficient. The teachers who attended seemed very enthusiastic as to the practical nature of this course in this week's workshop. Plans formulated from this workshop are being carried out in the schools, both in the elementary grades and on the high school level.

School Boards of the union have indicated their approval of the workshop plan and voted to continue this type of teacher training in the future.

High School Tuition Pupils

Most of Center Harbor's pupils are attending high school in Meredith as tuition pupils. The crowded condition of Meredith schools makes it imperative that more room be provided in the near future for classes there. Among other proposals, it has been suggested that Meredith close its doors to all tuition pupils in view of the crowded situation. If such a radical step were taken, where could Center Harbor pupils go?

One plan by which such a situation could be avoided would be for Meredith and Center Harbor to unite

as a cooperative district. Such a plan of fiscal cooperation is permitted under present state law. Under this plan, Center Harbor and Meredith would become one school district, as far as high school education is concerned. Center Harbor would no longer pay tuition to Meredith, but would share in the cost of buildings, maintenance and instruction, as well as having representatives on the school board to employ the teachers and administer the school.

I believe a much better solution to the problem can be found if Meredith and Ashland can combine their financial resources, together with Center Harbor and other nearby districts, to establish a new cooperative high school. Committees in Meredith and Ashland are still studying the possibility of this plan. If such an institution could become a reality it would go far toward providing the services that should meet the needs of our pupils ten or twenty years hence. The trend throughout the nation today is away from the small high schools that served us so well in the horse and buggy days. In New York State and in the Middle West, where the experiment of the larger district has been tried, people are well pleased with the results. Certainly some means should be found so children might have as good an opportunity for an education in New Hampshire as in other parts of our country.
