To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the fifth day of March, next at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects: (Polls will be open at 10:00 A.M.)

ARTICLE 1. To vote an Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

ARTICLE 1A. To vote by ballot on amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

ARTICLE 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon: Summer Maintenance, extra tar, \$8,000.00. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated or take any other action hereon: Town Officers Expenses, secretarial help \$2,000.00 (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$13,200.00 plus \$8,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new truck with plow and wing for the Highway Department. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for Street Lighting. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$937.00 for the Monadnock Region Association to continue its efforts in areas of solid waste disposal, planning, pesticides, legislation, State Parks, youth work and by other means call attention to the protection of the natural resources of the Town, plus its other advantages, along with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$938.00 in support of the Cheshire Hospital for the year 1974. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount equal to 50 cents per capita, not to exceed \$909.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-

appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Region Humane Association. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to make application for Town Road Aid and raise the sum of \$1,353.63 thereby receiving an additional \$9,024.19 from the State for Town Road Construction. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$41,000.00 for Summer Maintenance of roads, including the \$8,000.00 for extra tar from Revenue Sharing Funds. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,271.60 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the South-Western New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will erect a Memorial for the Korean and Viet Nam Veterans and appropriate \$2,500.00 toward same. The chairman of the board of Selectmen, three members of the American Legion and two citizens appointed by the Moderator to select a Memorial and have charge of the money for same or act thereon. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town of Chesterfield will authorize the Selectmen to establish a nine (9) member committee to study the nursing needs of the town of Chesterfield. A minimum of two Public Hearings will be held by October 1974 with the findings to be presented to the Selectmen submitted for town approval at the March 1975 Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town of Chesterfield will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be utilized by the committee appointed by the Selectmen to study the nursing needs of the Town of Chesterfield for transportation costs, postage, and office supplies. (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the continuation of the Open Space Fund. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint an ad hoc committee of no less than three persons to study the feasibility of incorporating a recycling program into the Town's solid waste disposal plan. Said committee hereinafter to be called the Recycle Feasibility Committee. This committee shall report its findings to the Selectmen on or before June one 1974.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal Disaster Assistance Funds whenever they become available and are of assistance to the Town.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to have the Advisory Planning Committee serve one more year so that they might be able to complete a Master Plan for the Town of Chesterfield.

ARTICLE 26. To see whether or not the Town will vote that any elected or appointed official of the Town of Chesterfield, or any member of any board or committee of this town, shall disqualify himself from debating or voting on any matter in which he has an interest other than his salary as such official, directly or indirectly, greater than any other citizen of the town.

Any violation of this provision will render the decision on the matter null and void.

ARTICLE 27. To see what action the Town wishes to take relative to the operation of Ware's Grove for the summer of 1974 or take any other action related thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to join with other communities to use a particular solid waste disposal facility, with each participating community paying their pro-rata share of the costs of establishing such a facility and the operating costs thereof, as permitted under R.S.A. 53-A.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept a road known as Pine Tree Circle, off of North Shore Road, which provides access to six (6) homes and seven (7) additional individually owned lots in a town approved sub-division. Approximate length of the road is .48 miles.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept a road known as White Birch Drive, off Pinnacle Springs Road, approved by the Selectmen and Road Agent. Escrow account has been established by Mr. Henry Hellus for his subdivision No. 2.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Frank S. Boyce for perpetual care of Sutton Lots in Spofford Village Cemetery to be known as the Frank

S. Boyce Trust Fund with the income of same to be paid to the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$25.00 from Dennis E. and Brenda E. Connor to be added to the Connor Fund for care in the Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Etta S. Mattison for perpetual care of the Ida J. Simonds Lot #39 in Chesterfield West Cemetery to be known as the Ida J. Simonds Trust Fund with income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$75.00 from William R. Mondeau to be added to the Fund for perpetual care in the Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be know as the William R. and Donna R. Mondeau Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Harry and Audrey Ericson to be added to the Harry and Audrey Ericson Trust Fund for perpetual care in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from George Nicols to be added to the Fund for perpetual care in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Wilson Fletcher to be added to the Morris Friedsam Cemetery Fund and to be known as the Wilson and Elsie Fletcher Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Norman E. and Alma S. Moore income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of the Norman E. and Alma S. Moore Lot #45 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Norman E. and Alma S. Moore Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Richard F. Staples to be added to the Cook Lot #122 in Chesterfield West Cemetery income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of said lot and to be known as the Cook-Staples Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Clifford White and Newton E. Darling to be added to the N. H. Darling, E. W. White Trust Fund. Income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of lots 277-278 in Chesterfield

West Cemetery.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Raymond Egan, Sr. and Phyllis Egan to be added to the fund for perpetual care of the Spofford Village Cemetery Annex to be known as the Raymond Sr. and Phillis Egan Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Louise Marrow the income from the same to be paid to the Morris Friedsam Cemetery Fund for perpetual care and to be known as the George and Louise Marrow Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Phyllis B. Henchey income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission for perpetual care in the Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Stephen and Phyllis Henchey Trust Fund.

TOWN MEETING 1973

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 6, 1973.

Meeting called to order at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Virginia Lewis and Ann Knickerbocker took the oath of office as Ballot Instructors before the Town Clerk and Mildred Gauthier took the oath of office as Assistant Clerk before the Moderator. Later Carl A. Johnson took the oath of office as Assistant Moderator before the Moderator.

The Moderator then read the Warrant through Article 1 and 1A and declared the polls open for voting by Ballot for all necessary Town Officers and also on Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

At six-thirty the meeting was again called to order by the Moderator, and with Carl A. Johnson and Mildred Gauthier acting as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk, the Articles of the Warrant were disposed of as follows.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid W. Pearson and supported by H. Claude Mowry to dispense with the reading of the Warrant. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 2 Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan to use the same method of collecting taxes this year as was used last year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by John Hudson to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Donald C. Emery, Chairman, reporting for the Budget Committee, stated that they held several meetings and that the public meeting was well attended. The Budget Committee Report was on page 32 of the Annual Report. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan to accept this report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald C. Emery and supported by George E. Joslin to adopt this Article as read and to raise and appropriate the following

sums as approved by the Budget Committee:

Summer Maintenance, extra tar, \$10,000. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes: Town Officers' Expenses. Secretarial help \$2,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by a show of hands on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by George E. Joslin to accept

this Article as read and appropriate \$28,000.00 for a new loader and authorize withdrawal of \$22,000.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by William Mitchell to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by David Coleman and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appropriate the sum of \$892.00 for the Monadnock Region Association to continue its efforts in areas of solid waste disposal, planning, pesticides, legislation, State Parks, youth work and by other means call attention to the protection of the Natural Resources of the Town, plus its other advantages, along with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Callahan and supported by H. Claude Mowry to amend this Article to read Cheshire Hospital instead of Elliot Community Hospital. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on the Article as amended to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,053.00 in support of the Cheshire Hospital. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to make an application for Town Road Aid and raise the sum of \$1,350.99 thereby receiving an additional \$9,006.58 from the State for Town Road Construction. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by William Mitchell to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise and appropriate the sum of \$43,000.00 for Summer Maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. In the Discussion of this Article it was asked for a show of hands for those in favor of informing the Selectmen to use a policy of maintaining as many gravel roads as pos-

sible and a minimum of black-top roads. This showed an overwhelming number of those in favor of this policy.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Ronald Guyette to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to pass over this Article which was to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continuation of Road Improvement of our Town Highways, and which was not approved by the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Alice Fairbanks and supported by Ely Zimmerman to raise and appropriate an amount equal to 40 cents per capita, not to exceed \$726.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Errol Sowers and supported by Donald Emery to amend the Article to read "to have the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service make a soil survey of the Town and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,000.00 as approved by the Budget Committee to pay the Town's share of the cost, and to authorize the Conservation Commission to apply for and accept and use any advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for this purpose as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any Federal, State or private agency. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on this Article as amended. The Moderator declared the vote carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Marrow and supported by Ronald Guyette to authorize the appropriation of \$120.09 for matching funds necessary to purchase three monitors for the Police Department. These monitors will enable the local officers to cross talk with the State Police Cruisers in the area. The State Police Cruisers are already equipped with monitors on the same frequency as the local Cheshire County units. The total cost of 3 monitors is \$640.44. The Federal share is \$480.33, the State will pay \$40.02, leaving a balance of \$120.09 which is the total

cost to the Town of Chesterfield. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by James Roy and supported by Ronald Guyette to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to finish the addition on the West Chesterfield Fire Station. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Alfred Shiewe to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,258.00 as the Town's share for studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by William Mitchell to pass over this Article which was to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to use as a down payment on purchase of the Ware Grove property on Lake Spofford provided that a reasonable purchase agreement can be arranged with the owner. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by George E. Joslin to adopt the National Fire Protection Association Life Safety Code 101. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Motion made by Jean Jelley and supported by Ruth A. Rilling to adopt the Article as read. Voted on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Joanne Morse to amend the Article to read "To see if the Town will vote to reopen a portion of the so-called Mountain Road from the residence of Charles Rilling to a new residence of same, a distance of 250 yards, this re-opening to take place when Mr. Rilling has fulfilled all the requirements of section H of the Road Construction Standards and Specification of the Zoning Ordinance as passed by the Town Meeting of March 7, 1972." Voted by voice on the amendment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. A voice vote on Article as Amended was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Robert Callahan to amend the Article to read "To see if the Town will vote to accept a road known as White Birch Drive, off Pinnacle Springs Road, approved by the Selectmen and Road Agent, when all the requirements

of Section H of the Road Construction Standards and Specification of the Zoning Ordinances as passed by the Town Meeting of March 7, 1972 have been fulfilled." Vote declared by the moderator to be carried in the affirmative. A vote on the Article as Amended was declared to be carried in the affirmative. Escrow account has been established by Mr. Henry Hellus for his subdivision No. 2.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Joanne Morse that the voters of the Town of Chesterfield shall instruct the Planning Board not to approve, prior to April 1, 1974, any plat, layout or design for any subdivision of any parcel of land located within the Town of Chesterfield if such plat, layout or design would result in the creation of more than one (1) new residential building lot out of the original parcel of land. Following the creation of such single new building lot, neither it nor the parcel of land from which it was subdivided shall be eligible for any further subdivision for any purpose prior to April 1, 1974. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by George Marrow that the Article be amended, "To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a five (5) person committee who will represent the various interests within the Town. This committee shall investigate and evaluate all considerations related to the establishment of additional subdivisions of land, for any purpose, within the Town. Formulate and present to the Planning Board, prior to August 15th 1973 its recommendations regarding such subdivisions, along with its proposals for any new conditions and regulations to govern the establishment of the same plus its proposals for any amendments to the present Zoning and Building Ordinances of the Town." Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and did not pass. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by William Mitchell to adopt the Article as read which was for the Selectmen of the Town of Chesterfield to appoint a committee of nine (9) persons who shall fairly represent the various areas and interests within the Town. The committee shall:

1. Investigate and evaluate all considerations related to the establishment of additional subdivisions of land, for any purpose, within the Town.
2. Formulate and present to the Selectmen, prior to January 1, 1974, its recommendations regarding

such subdivisions, along with its proposals for any new conditions and regulations to govern the establishment of the same plus its proposals for any amendments to the present Zoning and Building Ordinances of the Town of Chesterfield.

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Robert Mills to accept the gift of land from Albert Ricci, and to send a letter of thanks to Mr. Ricci. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by William Mitchell to discontinue the portion of Route 9 from Welcome Hill lying between points 144 and 50 to 179. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 30. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Joseph Cooper to pass over this Article which was to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42.00 to install a street light on the junction of the North Hinsdale Road and Route 63. This Article was not approved by the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative, and the Article passed over.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Mills and supported by Winston Cray that a year round leash law be placed on all dogs in the Town of Chesterfield, to be enforced by the dog officer and town constables. (This would mean that all dogs must be under control at all times. The owner of any dog found running loose would be subjected to penalties). As the moderator could not tell the result by voice vote, he called for a show of hands. This resulted in a vote in the affirmative and the Moderator declared the motion so carried.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin which was supported by Winston Cray to add the word "income" to Articles 35, 36, and 37. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 32. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Mrs. Doris H. Parker to be added to the Trust Fund for perpetual care of the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and to be known as the John B. and Doris H. Parker Trust Fund.

Article 33. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Lyle B. and Beatrice M. Chickering to be added to the Johnson-McQuaid-Chickering Trust Fund. Income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of Lots 247-248 in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 34. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Beatrice M. Chickering for Trust Fund for the Edgar Davenport lots 249-250 in Chesterfield West Cemetery. Income from same to be paid to C. W. C. A. for perpetual care of said lots and to be known as the Edgar and Jennie Davenport Trust Fund.

Article 35. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Guy and Gladys Quinn, the income to be paid to Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of the Guy and Gladys Quinn lot 124 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Guy and Gladys Quinn Trust Fund.

Article 36. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Lester M. and Edythe G. Chickering, the income to be paid to the C. W. C. A. for perpetual care of the Lester M. and Edythe G. Chickering lot 125 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Lester M. and Edythe G. Chickering Trust Fund.

Article 37. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Josephine R. Potter, the income to be paid to the C. W. C. A. for perpetual care of the Percy Rowe lot 165-166 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Percy Rowe Trust Fund.

Article 38. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Chesterfield Cemetery Commission to be added to the Trust Fund for perpetual care of the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and to be known as the Frederick R. and June H. Rawlings Trust Fund.

Article 39. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission. The income from same to be paid to the C. C. C. for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Walter and Catherine Northrup Trust Fund.

Article 40. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Shirley G. Bevis. The income from same to be paid to C. W.

C. A. for perpetual care of the Shirley G. Bevis lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the George W. and Shirley G. Bevis Trust Fund.

Article 41. No other business appearing the meeting was recessed to the call of the Moderator at which time the purchase of Wares Grove would be considered. The Moderator declared the Ballot Box closed and a count of ballots cast under Articles 1 and 1A resulted as follows:

EXCEPTION B: Upon application approval may be granted by the Board of Adjustment to its owner or or to a person having a purchase and sale agreement with the owner for the use of a piece of land, containing not less than 30,000 square feet and having a frontage of no less than 100 feet on a public road, and having prior approval of the N. H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission for sewage disposal, as a site for the construction of a dwelling, provided such piece of land was of legal size as of March 6, 1973.

EXCEPTION C: Any building lot contained in a sub-

(Sub-title 2 shall become sub-title 3, etc.).

7. To amend ARTICLE V by adding section C, as follows: No motor vehicle and machinery junk yard may continue as a non-conforming use more than one year after the effective date of this ordinance, except that a motor vehicle and machinery junk yard may continue as a non-conforming use if within that period it is maintained in accordance with the standards set and enforced by the N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955 Chapter 267. Section 1-4, and also in accordance with the standards required by the Town Board of Selectmen.

The result of this vote was "YES" 339 votes "NO" 35 votes

8. To amend ARTICLE VII by adding Section 1 to read as follows:

I. Any permit for a variance hereto or hereafter granted by the Board of Adjustment, shall be void if work has not been started with six (6) months from the date of the action of the Board and completed within one (1) year from the date of such action, or within such lesser time as prescribed by the Board.

The result of this vote was "YES" 270 votes "NO" 99 votes

9. To amend ARTICLE X, Section C, by striking out "right of way" and substituting "road".

The result of this vote was "YES" 259 votes "NO" 87 votes

10. To amend ARTICLE X, Section E, by striking out the word "not" before the word "secondard" in the second line.

The result of this vote was "YES" 242 votes "NO" 65 votes

Such removal and regrading or covering shall be done within (a) ninety (90) consecutive calendar days after depletion of the deposit or completion of the work for which the deposit was opened and/or developed as a source of supply, or (b) two hundred-fifty (250) consecutive calendar days after the last use of the deposit as a general source of supply. Abandoned entrance roads, or entrances to depleted deposits shall be regraded or otherwise covered, to assure that they are left in a safe and sightly condition, and protected against erosion, by not less than a 2 to 1 slope within a period of ninety (90) consecutive calendar days of abandonment or depletion. Excavating, handling, processing and trucking of such material shall not be allowed between 8:00 P. M. and 7:00 A. M., without written permission from the Selectmen. No excavation shall be made within one hundred (100) feet of any property line or road right-of-way line or natural body of water without written permission from the Selectmen.

11. To amend ARTICLE X, by adding Section F, to read as follows: Commercial business means the buying and selling of goods or services.

1. A treasurer from July 1, 1974 for the ensuing year.

You are hereby further notified to meet at Chesterfield Central Elementary School in said District on March 2, 1974, at 8:00 p.m. to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state or private agency.

REPORT OF THE AUTHORIZED REGIONAL ENROLLMENT AREA (AREA) SCHOOL PLANNING COMMITTEE

ESTABLISHED MARCH 7, 1970

The A.R.E.A. Planning Committee was established as a result of the voting of ARTICLE 5. of the School Warrant for 1970. The moderator named the following to the three member committee: H. Claude Mowry, G. C. Knickerbocker, and James E. O'Neil.

The Committee met first with the Chesterfield School Board on November 18, 1970, in order to better understand the attitudes and needs of the School District. Since then there have been two or more meetings each year with the A.R.E.A. Planning Board which consists of representatives of the following districts: Chesterfield, Harrisville, Keene, Marlborough, Marlow, Nelson, Stoddard and Westmoreland.

The subject before the group for nearly all of the three years concerned districts interested in accepting the provisions of R S A 195-A (as amended), providing for the establishment of an area school in Keene to serve grades seven and eight. Because of the unfavorable vote on building a middle school by the Keene voters, there was not room to take in our pupils.

In the end the following districts voted to establish an area school in Keene to serve grades seven and eight: Harrisville, Marlow, Nelson and Stoddard. An Article has been placed in the Warrant of each of these School Districts for the voters' consideration at this year's school district meetings. This agreement was signed by the participating districts at the committee's last meeting, held on February 6, 1973. This brought an end to this committee.

G. C. Knickerbocker and I have attended nearly all of the meetings held over the past three years.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Chesterfield Central School
Chesterfield, New Hampshire
March 3, 1973

The Moderator called the meeting to order at 3:00 P. M. and the Clerk read the Warrant through Article I. The Moderator, Harry Winn, declared the polls open for balloting for the necessary school district officers.

Prior to the meeting the School Board appointed Jean Hubner and Agness B. Chickering Ballot Clerks. They took the oath of office from the Clerk. A count of the ballots showed 830 ballots.

The Moderator appointed Forrest Hall assistant Clerk and Winston Cray assistant Moderator. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 8:00 P.M. the Moderator again called the meeting to order for the purpose of acting on the remainder of the Warrant. The Clerk read the remainder of the Warrant.

The Moderator recognized James E. O'Neil for the purpose of making a presentation of a plaque of the Seal of the State of New Hampshire to the Chesterfield Central School. It was accepted for the children, parents and teachers of the school by the principal Harold T. Martin.

The Articles were then disposed of as follows:

ARTICLE 2. Arvid Pearson moved that the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen be accepted as printed in the Annual Report. Seconded by Agnes B. Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative on a voice vote.

G. C. Knickerbocker read the report of the A.R.E.A. School Planning Committee, appointed in 1970; Theodora Martin moved that it be approved as read. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington. Motion carried in the affirmative on a voice vote.

ARTICLE 3. Donald Emery moved that the District Authorize the School Board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. Seconded by Lillian L. Lane. Motion carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. Robert Callahan moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,557.00 to install a fire alarm

system as provided by Granite State Alarm, Inc., said alarm system to have State Fire Underwriters approval and to include automatic heat detectors, pull stations, evacuation alarms, building temperature devices, and connections of all warning devices to Southwestern New Hampshire Fire Mutual Aid for twenty-four hour protection. Further, that the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$744.00 for the first annual operating cost of the system. Seconded by Arvid Pearson. On a voice vote the motion carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. Arvid Pearson moved that the Article (By petition) To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to provide a kindergarten, said kindergarten to be part of the public school as prescribed by the New Hampshire State Board of Education through its Minimum Standard for Elementary Schools, and further to see if the District will authorize the School Board to take necessary action to effectuate the purpose of this Article. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.) be passed over. Seconded by Dexter Thomas. After some debate, the second and the motion was withdrawn.

George Marrow moved that action on the Article be delayed until after Consideration of Article 7. Seconded by Sue Butterworth. Motion carried in the affirmative, on a voice vote.

ARTICLE 6. James E. O'Neil moved that the District continue the Facilities Study Committee appointed at the March 1972, District Meeting. Seconded by Agnes B. Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative on a voice vote.

ARTICLE 7. Lillian Lane moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$440,998.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payments of statutory obligations of the district. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington.

Elizabeth Benjamin moved that the motion be amended by striking the sum of \$440,998.00 and inserting the sum of \$450,998.00 to be allocated for a public kindergarten as follows: Account No. 210 Salaries (Instruction) \$7,100; Account No. 230 Teaching Supplies \$1,050; Account No. 610 Salaries — operation of plant — \$400; Account 640 and 645 Heat and Utilities \$515; Account No. 850 Retirement and F.I.C.A. \$598; Account No. 855 Insurance \$337, for a total appropriation of \$10,000. Seconded by Sara Jo Jochums. A paper ballot was taken with the following results: Yes had 71 votes and No had 263 votes. The Moderator declared the motion was lost.

On a voice vote the original motion on the Article was carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. Arvid Pearson moved that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Dexter Thomas. On a voice vote the motion carried in the affirmative.

At 9:15 P.M. the Moderator declared the polls closed.

ARTICLE 8. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Robert Woodman moved that the meeting give James E. O'Neil a rising vote of thanks for his years of service to the Town. This was done.

The Checklist of voters was used in balloting. A count of the Ballots resulted as follows:

Total number of names on the Checklist was 1174.
Number of votes cast 446.

For Moderator for the ensuing year: Errol Sowers had 164 votes, and Harry E. Winn had 271 votes and there were 11 spoiled ballots. The Clerk declared Harry E. Winn elected Moderator for ensuing year. He took the oath of office from the Clerk.

For Clerk for the ensuing year: Suzanne D. Thompson had 342 votes, H. Claude Mowry had 26 write in votes and there were 78 scattered votes. The Moderator declared Suzanne D. Thompson elected Clerk for the ensuing year. She took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For member of the School Board for the ensuing three (3) years: Timothy Butterworth had 170 votes and Henry C. Chickering, Jr. had 275 votes. There was one spoiled ballot. The Moderator declared Henry C. Chickering, Jr. elected a member of the School Board for the ensuing year. He took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Treasurer for the ensuing year: Ann R. Bevis had 416 votes and there were 29 scattered votes. The Moderator declared Ann R. Bevis elected Treasurer for the ensuing year, beginning July 1, 1973. She took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Auditors for the ensuing year: Prudence Mitchell had 385 votes and Ann Knickerbocker had 380 votes and there were a number of blank ballots. The Moderator declared Ann M. Knickerbocker and Prudence S. Mitchell elected Auditors for the ensuing year. They took the oath of office from the Clerk.

All of the elected officers signed the perscribed OATH OF OFFICE.

ADMINISTRATORS' REPORT

January 1974

As your present superintendent retires in June and a new team takes over the administrative and leadership responsibilities, it is a good time for reflection.

In 1967, the State Board of Education decided that Supervisory Union 29 should be enlarged to serve the five other districts adjacent to Keene — Chesterfield, Harrisville, Marlborough, Nelson, Westmoreland. The purpose was to bring districts of similar economic and social interests together into one educational enterprise. There was reluctance on the part of the smaller districts, feeling that their needs would be overlooked. And Keene displayed some resistance too, probably believing that it was big enough to provide the desirable educational services. The few remaining board members, Mrs. Mildred Huber of Nelson, Mr. Alphonse Despres of Marlborough, Mrs. Clara Wellington of Chesterfield, Mrs. Lois Delano of Westmoreland, Mr. Howard Wheelock of Keene, will remember our early problems — finding office space, equipping, staffing, and getting acquainted. After a year or two of suspicion and distrust, the attitude has changed to cooperation and confidence.

We have been joined even more strongly by the formation of two Authorized Regional Enrollment Plans, one for Grades 9—12, the other for Grades 7 and 8. Now, truly Keene High School is our high school, and Keene Junior High School serves most of our secondary children.

In fact we are more frequently asking: Why should geographic boundaries of our communities established in the 18th century determine educational boundaries? The six governmental bodies that manage our schools directly may have outworn their original advantage. Some of us hope that in a few short years, Supervisory Union 29 may become one governmental entity with the single purpose of providing quality education at an equitable cost from its citizens.

Unhappily, we can show no improvement in financing our schools. People sometimes resist desirable improvements because of the great burden on property tax. The State of Maine shares 50% of the local costs of education. Vermont provides over 40%. Our state provides only 4%. Under these circumstances the towns rich in resources find it easy to finance schools, those with many children and few resources find it extremely difficult. A recent publication proves this continuing dilemma. At 100% valuation these towns had these tax rates in 1973: Marlborough, \$36.91; Keene, \$22.20;

Winchester, \$31; Swanzey, \$30.95; Westmoreland, \$28.95; at the other extreme — Stoddard, \$6.84; Roxbury, \$8.64; Harrisville, \$15.34; Nelson, \$17.26; Chesterfield, \$20.60, in between. In other words, Marlborough has to tax itself approximately five times as hard as Stoddard to raise similar relative amounts.

Though it is fair to say that progress has not been spectacular under these circumstances, our communities have moved ahead maintaining good schools. All of our districts have benefited. Chesterfield maintains a fine elementary school. Recently it has added a resource teacher, part time, to assist pupils with learning problems. Your children do well as they continue in Keene High. Your tuition supports one of New Hampshire's finest high schools with its broad program and experienced staff. Soon greater opportunities will be available as the Cheshire Vocational Center becomes a reality. We are pleased to see more physical education and athletics, and we hope that you will build a new gym in the near future. It would do much to provide wholesome activities both for your youth and your adults.

Differences of opinion about having a kindergarten may spur greater cooperation in the future. You have a delightful, rural community that is undergoing growing pains as new building projects are completed.

Inflated costs, especially of oil, gasoline and electricity will require more tax dollars, but unfortunately they will not buy broader education opportunities. We feel sure that you will weigh with fairness the increasing needs of youth and the cost of living of your faculty, as you plan your new budget.

Like people, communities, too, need a purpose, and we trust that you will give your boys and girls high priority.

It has been a pleasure to serve you.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

January 1974

The 1973-74 school year opened on September 6, with an enrollment of 289 students. The current enrollment has leveled off to 291 pupils with a large number of students moving in and out of Chesterfield.

Realizing the great need for special education instruction, the Chesterfield School Board has provided the school with a part-time Resource Teacher for special education. We have a number of children here at Chesterfield who need the type of special attention on an individualized basis which the conventional classroom teacher does not have the classroom time or the special training required. These children have numerous kinds of learning disabilities. We have utilized and expanded the use of the storage room near the first grade rooms to house the Reading Teacher and the new Resource Teacher. There is no doubt that we could do an even better job, if we could employ the special education resource teacher on a full-time basis.

A very special thanks to our Parents and Teachers Association for implementing our Special Education room with a One Hundred Dollar donation for materials and supplies. Much more is needed. The Chesterfield follies was a high success and additional materials including a balance beam will soon be provided.

Intramural and interscholastic sports, introduced last year, have contributed much to the lives and spirit of our students. Soccer has highly successful this year under the direction of Mr. David Dahl, Junior High Science Teacher, and has become a basis for the fall program. Baseball and basketball are also a part of our interscholastic program. This year our girls' cheerleading team have uniforms due to the hard work and contribution of Mrs. Underwood, our new Teacher Aide. The Grange, Jaycees and the American Legion have contributed time and money for uniforms and transportation for our travelling basketball team which plays all of its games "on the road" under the coaching direction of Mr. Martin Mahoney, fifth grade teacher.

We have organized a student council for the student body, consisting of representatives from grades three through eight. The Council has edited monthly editions of the "Chesterfield News" and contributed much to the success of the Chesterfield Follies and Carnival.

Activity programs are on a weekly schedule for boys and girls in the junior high division under the direction of our

teachers. Such programs include art, auto mechanics, photography, dramatics, chess, folk dancing, arts and crafts, sewing, and home economics. The lower elementary grades have similar programs although not as highly sophisticated. We actively participate in the annual National Spelling Bee Contest. During the fall session we provided a choral program and conducted a regularly scheduled French class two days each week. The School for International Living of Vermont provided us with student teachers for this class.

Our athletic field since last summer has been in the process of becoming a first-rate field and when completed will enhance our program immensely. It will be laid out for baseball, soccer, field hockey and softball. The Chesterfield Jaycees, with great contributions from local parents, Boy Scouts and contractors are sponsoring the projects with Mr. John Schlichting, the coordinator. Many, many thanks to all involved.

Our library was extremely well staffed by a group of dedicated trained mothers of our children under the supervision of Mrs. Rita DeVittori. They are to be commended for their additional hard work in accepting new books into our library. The American Legion and the Ladies Auxilliary due to the special efforts of Commander and Mrs. Norman Jelley donated several hundreds of dollars to our library in the form of new books. Our entire staff is deeply grateful for these efforts.

The dental health program sponsored by the Parents and Teachers Association is off to a good start again this year. Mrs. Diane Allen did an excellent job last year assisted by many mothers. Miss Gayle Woodman is coordinating the program for the boys and girls this year. Mrs. Betty Tyler is the dental hygienist and conducts the program at the school in the clinic where our school nurse, Mrs. Doris Tousley, maintains the health standards and supervises physical examinations for all of the children at the Chesterfield School. My thanks to all of these dedicated people.

The Chesterfield School is one of the best kept and most attractive schools in the entire Supervisory Union and continues to be maintained at a high level of efficiency due to the untiring efforts of Mr. Merton Davis, our head custodian.

Again, our Christmas Pageant under the musical direction of Mrs. Suh Ying Lee Chang was a highlight of the winter season. The teachers, aides, and mothers involved in the long hours of practice, the costumes and the program itself, together with Mrs. Chang, are to be highly commended for their efforts.

During the course of the year we have held a number of assembly programs involving Fire Prevention (with Smokey the Bear), T. V. Science, Exchange Students to Other Countries etc., in order that we keep our students abreast of the times and to maintain safety practices. Because We Care!

I wish to express my deep appreciation and thanks to the people of the Chesterfield School District; the individual members of the School Board; Mr. John Day, Superintendent; Dr. Carmelo Sapone, Superintendent Elect; and their entire staff at One Elm Street for their kindness and helpful understanding of the school needs of the Chesterfield School District.

This year with food prices going so high, lunch prices had to be raised from 35c to 45c. Also, the milk price has been changed from last years 4c to 5c now. We serve between 150 to 170 lunches a day.

We give out monthly menus to each child and menus are sent to the Keene newspaper and radio station.

Government surplus foods have been very scarce this year making it difficult to keep within our budget.

HEALTH REPORT

1973 — 1974

The Dental Health Program, sponsored by the PTA, was declared a success by Diana Allen, Chairman. Though started late in the school year, 170 children (including 10 pre-school) had teeth examinations and cleanings by Betty Tyler, dental hygienist. Seven children were referred to dentists for further work.

Because of an outbreak of measles in the State of New Hampshire, an immunization clinic was held in January and 31 children received measles vaccine.

Routine testing for tuberculosis was done to 85 pupils and 9 personnel.

Twenty-five pre-school pupils were examined for hearing and vision through the Public School Vision and Hearing screening program, and the help of parents. One child with a vision problem and three with hearing loss were referred to specialists.

Physical examinations were given 66 pupils by Dr. Houpis. Twelve health problems were found and referred for further tests.

A film on breast cancer was shown to 54 girls and four mothers.
