### **TOWN WARRANT**

### State of New Hampshire

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY, County of Carroll, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Kennett High School Auditorium at Conway, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, 1983, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. Voting on Articles 1, 2 and 3 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order and declares a quorum present. The remaining articles of the Warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keep the polls open to a later hour.

### ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2. To see whether or not the Town will vote to approve zoning ordinance amendment No. 1 of the Town's zoning ordinance as recommended by the Planning Board, to be acted on under official ballot of the Town.

ARTICLE 3. To see whether or not the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 466:30-a which makes it unlawful for any dog to run at large, except when accompanied by the owner or custodian, and when used for hunting, herding, supervised competition and exhibition or training for such, as proposed and recommended by the Conway Police Department to be acted on under official ballot of the Town.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), to be repaid in equal installments over five years starting in 1984, as matching funds on a 1 to 2 basis (Town -1, State -2) for reconstruction of EAST CONWAY ROAD, said road to be assumed and totally maintained by the State of New Hampshire after two years. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amounts indicated for

the following specific purposes:

Capital Reserve Fund for the long term solution to solid waste disposal	\$80,000
Capital Reserve Fund for Mt. Washington Valley Incinerator	20,000
RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE	\$100,000

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for a WELDING SHOP at the Town Garage and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Thirty Thousand Dollars (30,000.00) to be used as part of the EXPANSION PROJECT FOR THE CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY and authorize the withdrawal of that amount from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) to be used to establish a Capital Reserve Fund toward the future construction of a Municipal Center. This has been identified as a high priority need for the Town in the revised Master Plan. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of the Cassie Davidson Property in Center Conway, N.H., Map 49, Parcel 10; and the Thomas Sawyer Property in Conway, N.H., Map 28, Parcel 7, in a manner the Selectmen deem to be most advantageous to the Town.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for the support of the COMMUNITY ACTION OUTREACH PROGRAM. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jackie Smith and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand (\$38,000.00) to assist the CONWAY VILLAGE RECREATION COMMISSION and the NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER; \$19,000.00 to the Conway Village Recreation Commission and \$19,000.00 to the North Conway Community Center. Said sums to be allocated to the Conway Village Recreation Commission and the Board of Directors, North Conway Community Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard L. VanDyne and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$2,100.00) to help defray the expenses of the WATER SAFETY PROGRAM as carried out by the Conway Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kathryn A. Burnell and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) to be divided equally between the CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF CONWAY and the MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, with \$2,000.00 going to the Conway Chamber of Commerce and \$2,000.00 to the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert J. Murphy and others. RECOMMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$9,500.00) for the CENTER OF HOPE, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jean H. Whitehead and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) for administrative expenses for the GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Glenna Mori and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Seventy Four Dollars and Forty Cents (\$11,574.40) for the VISITING NURSE SERVICES OF NORTHERN CARROLL COUNTY, INC., said sum being equal

to \$1.60 per person in the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Miles C. Waltz and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,350.00) in support of the NORTH COUNTRY SENIOR MEALS PROGRAM. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mary Whitcomb and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty One Dollars (\$4,231.00) for the support of the CHILDREN & YOUTH PROJECT OF MT. WASHINTON VALLEY (C&Y). Agreeable to a petition signed by Karen A. MacDonald and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the 1983 Capital Budget of the MEMORIAL HOSPITAL, North Conway, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gary R. Poquette and others. RECOMMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) for the NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER. Agreeable to a petition signed by Sr. Marjorie Moon, S.A., and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) for the construction and/or maintenance of DRY HYDRANTS within the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by John Pandora and others. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Nine Hundred Thirty Two Dollars (\$6,932.00) for the general expense of the REDSTONE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert L. Parrish, Jr. and others. NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to assist in defraying operating and maintenance expenses at the EASTERN SLOPE REGIONAL AIRPORT. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph E. Sullivan and others. NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Thirty Nine Dollars (\$7,039.00)

to assist the CARROLL COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kate Hofstetter and others. NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to assist the NORTHERN CARROLL COUNTY FAMILY PLANNING PROGRAM. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joan E. See and others. NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) to assist BIRTHRIGHT, INC., a New Hampshire all volunteer, non-profit organization dedicated to helping needy pregnant women plan and care for their children by assisting with prenatal, parenting, and adoption needs. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ruth M. Seaver and others. NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town Road the road presently known as Wylie Court, Windsock Estates, together with an easement and reverter clause, pertaining to that portion of Wylie Court extending from Rte. 16 eastward across airport property, said easement having an improved roadway, versus existing road adjacent to Mt. Washington Valley Motor Lodge. Said road to be maintained as a Town Road. Agreeable to a petition signed by Wylie L. Apte and others.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Conway and to the health and welfare of the people of New Hampsire.

These actions shall include:

- Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.
- 2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. Agreeable to a petition signed by Thomas S. Deans and others.

ARTICLE 30. Shall the citizens of Conway ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U. S. Congress to: Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production,

and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries. Agreeable to a petition signed by James P. McAlpine and others.

ARTICLE 31. Are you in favor of authorizing the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of Resident Taxes prior to issuance of the Resident Tax Warrant, such payments not to be received before April 1st of any given year, in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 80:1a.

ARTICLE 32. Are you in favor of authorizing the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of property taxes prior to issuance of the Tax Warrant, such payments not to be received before April 1st of any given year, in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 80:52a.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town such sums of money as may be needed, such sums not to exceed the combined school, town and county tax budgets, in anticipation for town, county and school purposes.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in behalf of the Town of Conway, N. H. to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Conway, N. H. applied for, and to receive and expend them in accordance with the purposes thereof.

ARTICLE 35. To see whether or not the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw Capital Reserve Funds established by the Town from time to time and disburse the same in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were created respectively.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, at their discretion, at public auction, any real estate in the Town to which the Town has title by Collector's Deed; except when it is being sold back to the former owner, or to a party who has succeeded to the title of the former owner, in which case private sale may be utilized; any such real estate to be sold and conveyed on or before the next annual Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 37. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Town of Conway is growing, and the forces influencing growth are both social and economic. Many matters come before the Selectmen in questioning or active phases such as welfare, general finances, transportation, real estate developments, waste disposal and, in fact, a whole possible range of concerns from private and individual to those of public interest.

Throughout Conway's history agriculture has played an important role in its economy because of its situation in a broad and fertile valley. Likewise, rich forest land gave rise to important lumbering interests, and the surrounding mountains to the important quarrying of granite. In varying degree these still remain. However, in recent years tourism and both summer and winter recreational activities have greatly increased, bringing in their wake a rapid proliferation of second homes, water and septage needs, traffic, police services, motels, dining, fast foods, and merchandizing establishments, all of which have made significant changes in the nature and extent of growth.

We are fortunate, therefore, to have the working tools of zoning and site plan review of prospective businesses to guide the growth and change. Much importance is placed on the participation of Townspeople in the development of a new and updated Master Plan. With this civic interest and participation guiding the phases of change, we are assured there will be positive controls on the quality and nature of the Town's development while still maintaining the desired agricultural-residential characteristics. This is an appropriate place to mention the Town's appreciation to the citizens who give voluntary or appointed services on these boards and committees. No one not closely associated with them can fully realize the dedication of time and thought that goes into their work for the good of the Town. A sincere "thank you" to them.

Arthur Seavey retired this year, completing fifteen years of faithful and effective service as Town Manager. Following Arthur's retirement several months of investigation, in cooperation with the New Hampshire Municipal Association, resulted in the Selectmen's appointment of Curtis H. Lunt as the new Town Manager. He is well qualified, both by education (only a few credits short of a Master's Degree in Municipal Management, which he is pursuing) and seven years of professional experience supported by excellent references. To the time of preparing this report he has handled himself with dispatch and competence and has justified the confidence placed in him by the appointing Selectmen.

The five-year contract for ambulance service for the Towns of Conway, Albany, Eaton, Bartlett and Jackson expired this year. New five-year contracts have been established involving only Conway, Albany and Eaton. The contracts assure residents of these three towns of ambulance service around the clock, with an equitable proration of subsidy expenses borne by the three towns.

Solid waste management continues to be a major problem and ex-Here also Albany and Eaton use our facilities and share expenses, having this year entered into an "Agreement for Formation of Mt. Washington Valley Regional Solid Waste Disposal Cooperative." The purposes of this Agreement are to provide for the efficient and economic disposal of solid waste generated within the territories of the three towns. The New Hampshire Air Resources Commission refused our request to operate the open pit solid waste burner at the dump on an intermittent and experimental basis designed to make changes which would meet current State and Federal air pollution standards - the project to be under the design and construction supervision of the Department of Mechanical Engineering at the University of New Hampshire. An appeal of this refusal decision is being made. There is valid engineering reason to believe that our burner could be modified and improved to meet standard requirements and, therefore, we are hopeful of implementing the test next fall. If the request is granted and the test successful, the cost of solid waste disposal will be substantially reduced and the life of our landfill at the dump will be greatly extended.

All of us at Town Hall have felt honored to have had Selectman Paul Ashnault elected last November as a State Representative from this district. In his dual capacity of Selectan and Representative he will be able to serve and respond to Town and State needs more effectively and without neglect to either.

For personal reasons, Selectman William J. Hounsell found it necessary to resign last summer after having been overwhelmingly re-elected in March to a second term. He served the Town with intelligence, concern for its best interests and future direction, and compassionate interest in the problems of individuals. Charles H. Pinkham, III, better known as Peter, was appointed by the Selectmen to serve in Bill Hounsell's place until Town Meeting in March, 1983. Paul Ashnault and I have the highest respect for the thoughtful quickness of Peter's grasping of and dealing with the Town's problems. He has been an excellent Selectman.

Our Assistant Town Manager, John Walsh, earned a special commendation for his able handling of administrative problems during the time between Arthur Seavey's retirement and the phasing in period of Curtis Lunt's administration.

My comments are purposely not including the details that more properly are handled this year for the first time by the Town Manager. His report and those from other Town Boards and Commissions are found elsewhere in this booklet. The Selectmen have a special interest in the meetings of these organizations and attend as many of them as possible. By agreement, one of the three is delegated to be the Selectmen's representative ex officio to the meetings of the vital Planning Board, the Budget Committee, and the Conservation Commission.

There is a very real dedication to their responsibilities continually shown by all Town employees. 'Esprit de corps' such as this is yet another indication of the character and quality of our Townspeople.

#### TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Conway

After assuming the position of Town Manager in September, I couldn't help but note that the Town was in excellent financial condition, with quality employees. Our local economy is not immune to recession impacts. We have lost jobs in the past year, and we saw a doubling in welfare cases and costs. However, we have every reason to be optimistic about our future.

The Selectmen and Town administration have faced a number of difficult problems in the past year, varying from sign ordinance enforcement to toxic waste contamination. We have faced those issues squarely with systematic enforcement of the new sign regulations on the one hand, and cooperation between the Selectmen and the Conway Village Precinct Commissioners, on the other, in paying for the test drilling by the state at the former Kearsarge Metallurgical site. The Selectmen also wrestled with the problems of road betterment petitions from Cranmore Shores and Rockhouse Mountain Association for much of the year before reluctantly denying both.

The Town is still growing and this has an impact on demand for services. Directly affected by this growth and demand are our land-fill and septage lagoon system. In attempting to address the landfill problem, where our lifespan is severely limited, we have applied for a permit to experiment with the open pit incinerator. This has failed at this date, and we will have to begin again to look at more expensive disposal methods, including incineration. Our cardboard recycling operation has helped by reducing the volume to be covered by about 15%, and we have hired a surveyor to help us estimate landfill life. This is the most difficult and expensive problem the Town will face in the near future.

To address our administrative capacity to respond to new regulations and services demands caused by growth, we are proposing consulting staff for the Planning Board, and engineering assistance for the Town, as well as a new computer. We hope that adoption of a master plan for the Town, completed in 1982, will provide needed long term guidance to the Town.

The Town highway department completed a number of projects in 1982, highlighted by 8,000 feet of reconstruction of Stark Road, and paving of Artist Falls Road, part of Washington Street, Grove Street and South Conway Road, along with sealing of Quint and Prospect Street, Duprey Road, West Main Street Extension, and Jack Frost Lane.

The department also worked with Maine Central Railroad to reconstruct railroad corssings at Grove, Seavey, Kearsarge and Mechanic Streets.

I would like to thank the Selectmen, employees, and citizens of the Town for the patience and good will extended during my first months on the job. I would especially like to thank retiring Town Manager, Arthur Seavey, for making my job easier by working so hard and selflessly for 15 years.

Despite the increasing complexity of modern government and the inevitable frustrations of policy making, your continued involvement and attention is the only way to insure an open and responsive government. The Selectmen's meetings on Mondays at 1:00 p.m. are open to the public, and Minutes of those meetings are available at the Town Hall and Conway Public Library.

#### ASSESSOR'S REPORT

The Town continued to grow at a moderate pace in 1982. We issued 255 building permits, amounting to \$4,727,000 in value if all are completed.

One of the duties of this office in past years was the mailing and receipt of Inventory of Taxable Property Forms. The Legislature made this optional in 1982 and Conway chose not to send them. This relieved us of applying the penalty for not filing which was such a bone of contention in the past.

The single largest step for 1983 will be semi-annual tax billing. For the first time in Conway a tax bill will be sent prior to June 1st representing 50% of the previous tax bill. The one difference being those properties which were vacant and have new structures by April 1st as well as those that have undergone changes due to additions, remodeling, etc., or conversely damaged, such as fire damage. This being the first time through, I'm sure we will have some problems, but we anticipate only minor ones.

The indications are that the real estate market is picking up and we will be very busy in the coming year.

On an upnote, we are pleased to report that three native sons have been promoted in rank within the department during the year. John Roberts is now a Sergeant, while Eric Porter has advanced to Patrolman and O. Jon Saxby is a Special Officer. It is always a pleasure to promote from our own local resources.

It was with great regret that the Commissioners accepted the early retirement of Lt. Minard E. Anthony. This being as a direct result of an on-duty accident which occurred in 1979. Mike has served the Town of Conway in a professional manner. His dedication will continue to show as a result of his tireless efforts in various community safety programs.

Another advancement within the department was the promotion of William R. Scaletti to the rank of Lieutenant. His past experience and knowledge of law enforcement, along with his ability to lead, is certainly a positive note for the Conway Police Department.

Maurice Frechette is ending his term as a Police Commissioner and has decided not to seek re-election. His efforts and dedication to the people of Conway and to the Police Department have certainly been appreciated. He has served in this capacity for nearly ten years, and has been the Chairman of the Commission in each of his three full terms. Thank-you, "Mo".

It is hoped that the Conway Police Department will enjoy the continued support of the townspeople in 1983. The Conway Police Department is a most professional department - available to you 24 hours a day. The expansion of events offered to the visitors in our valley and the increase in our traffic volume strains the manpower and funds. We, as Commissioners, will give you the most porfessional law enforcement at a responsible cost to the taxpayer.

#### REPORT FROM THE CHIEF OF POLICE

Providing law enforcement services to our community is a very challenging task. Our community consists of 85 square miles and has 114.9 miles of state and local highways. A 1979 study conducted by the North Country Council reported that we then had 52 establishments providing overnight accommodations, 743 campsites (50% of those in the entire Valley) and 13 of the Valley's 19 ski clubs.

Population figures reported in the study indicated an average monthly population of 11,972 with a low of 9,447 in November to

a high of 15,988 in July and August.

Annually the Federal Bureau of Investigation publishes a report of crime statistics entitled "Crime in the United States". The categories of murder/negligent homicide, rape, robbery, assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft and arson are used to create a Crime Index to measure crime trends. The 1981 Crime Index totals show Conway had 622 index crimes which exceeded the communities of Londonderry with 464, Hudson with 437, Merrimack with 427, and Berlin with 242. The 1982 F.B.I. statistics will not be available until September of 1983, but I am presenting a listing of the Index Crimes and other calls that the Conway Police Department responded to during 1982 (see Crime Statistics 1982, pages sixty-six and sixty-seven.

The F.B.I. publication also reports the number of law enforcement personnel employed by the communities I listed above; Conway with 22, Londonderry with 31, Hudson with 26, Merrimack with 33, and Berlin with 29. It is clear that Conway has between 4 and 11 police employees below the levels of the other communities. It is also clear that Conway has a significantly larger incident of Index Crimes.

The 1983 Police Department Budget contains a request for two additional police officers. I am requesting that voters support this addition to the Department based on our need. I have included an Appendix to explain our need.

The Appendix will show the organizational structure of the Department (Appendix #1), the daily schedule (Appendix #2), the average available man hours for one patrol officer (Appendix #3), the present patrol coverage (Appendix #4), and the future patrol coverage (Appendix #5). I hope that the explanation contained herein will help voters determine that the two additional patrol officers I seek are necessary to provide adequate coverage to a very busy community.







### REPORT OF THE CONWAY MUNICIPAL BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Budget Committee held its first meeting on October 18 of 1982. This organizational meeting was attended by 11 of the 18 members. The Town Treasurer presented a status report on the financial situation of the Town.

At this meeting three major items were discussed and approved:

- A special budget form would be sent to all groups requesting town support. This would help make things more uniform and for better understanding.
- 2. Due to the high unemployment rate and the decline in the cost of living, the Budget Committee went on record requesting all groups to keep their request for funds within a 5% increase over last year's approved budget. This did not mean that there would be an automatic increase up to 5%.
- 3. Three subcommittees were appointed to work with the Town, Police and School administrators.

On November 3rd a second meeting was held with Curt Lunt, Town Manager; John Stevens, Tax Collector; Don Lance, Police Chief; and the Police Commissioners, presenting a report on their financial status.

On November 22nd the School Administration presented the Budget Committee with a report of the financial status of their budget.

The Police Commissioners decided not to work with the budget subcommittee as the Town and School administrators had. As a result, the Police Department budget was presented with an 18% increase, Town with a 4.9% increase and the School with a 2.5% increase (with wages still to be negotiated).

With the exception of Northern Carroll County Family Planning, Carroll County Mental Health, Eastern Slope Regional Airport and Redstone Volunteer Fire Department, all other special articles were recommended by the Budget Committee. The Budget Committee supports the above four groups at the level of a 5% increase over their previous budget, but not at a level of a 59% increase in the case of one example, 66.6% in another, and 1000% in a third. Two new special articles this year were the Community Action Outreach Program, which was supported at the recommended level, and Birthright, Inc. which the Budget Committee could not recommend.

On January 24 the Budget Committee was presented with the unem-

ployment figures from January through November, 1982, for the Town of Conway. They are presented here for your information,

### PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Despite the downturn in the economy and the related slow down of development and construction, the Planning Board has had a very busy year in 1982. The Board met on the first and third Thursday of each month to consider subdivisions and site plans and held work sessions on the second and fourth Thursday of the month. The Board also held several Tuesday meetings for the purpose of Public Hearings on Site Plan Review and Zoning Changes.

The ConWay Committee (Master Plan Citizen's Advisory Board) met monthly through October, refining the Goals and Objectives promulgated by each of the Natural, Human, and Community Resource Subcommittees, as well as the Future Land Use Plan and Capital Improvements Program proposed by North Country Council. During the remainder of the year, the Planning Board reviewed all this material, and final modifications were worked out in a joint meeting with the ConWay Committee in January. A summary booklet of the Master Plan will be formulated by North Country Council for general distribution by Town Meeting. The supporting documents and detailed components will be collated in volumes to be retained at several public facilities.

The Planning Board adopted a Site Plan Review Regulation in September to finalize the authority given the Board at last year's Town Meeting.

Several Zoning changes were worked on and proposed by the Board this year. They were mostly of the clarification type with the single exception being the proposed Special Exception to allow nursing homes in the Residential/Agricultural Zone. The clarifications to the sign regulations were made to help the Board of Adjustment and the Selectmen with administration of this part of the Zoning Ordinance.

The 1982 appropriation for the Planning Board was \$16,450. Of this amount, \$6,000 was a direct expense to North Country Council for the Master Plan. Expenditures for the year were \$14,495, leaving a surplus of \$1,955 returned to the general fund. Income received during the year was \$3,610.

An important change in the Planning Board Budget this year is a request for \$8,000 to hire a consulting engineering firm to provide the Board with technical assistance. The planning process is becoming more complex especially since the implementation of Site Plan Review. The technical consultant will give the Board advice on such topics as drainage, traffic, topography, soils, site suitability and sewage disposal. It is also envisioned that the consultant can conduct inspections to insure that Site Plan provisions are carried out as part of the approved Site Plan.

The Board appreciates the cooperation and assistance we have received from Town Officials and other Boards and Committees over the past year. The ConWay Committee deserves special thanks for its efforts on the Master Plan, and we would also like to express our gratitude to North Country Council for its expert guidance on this project. We appreciate the interest of every citizen who has participated in the planning process.

### REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Activities at the Conway Public Library increased again in 1982. Circulation rose from 38,398 to 39,278, an increase of 2%, and reference questions answered show a significant increase, from 2,224 to 2,643, an increase of 18%.

The library was chosen as one of three in the state to receive a special collection of books on health, known as the Community Health Collection. This pilot project was developed by the Dana Biomedical Library at the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center, and was funded by the Library Service and Construction Act, Title III. There are 150 books in this collection.

Because the town of Eaton does not have a library, arrangements were made for its residents to use the Conway Library upon the payment of a fee of \$100 by the town, rather than each resident of Eaton paying \$5.00 a year for a non-resident card.

Realizing that the activities at the library had outgrown the building, the trustees decided, after long and serious deliberation, to engage an architect to present preliminary plans to renovate the basement and provide an entrance from the parking lot. After these plans were studied the trustees decided to launch a major fund-raising drive, known as Project READ (Renew, Expand and Develop), for \$250,000. Chester Lucy kindly agreed to serve as Campaign Chairman, and many dedicated volunteers have joined the campaign. It is our hope that construction can start in 1984.

General Revenue Sharing funds were allocated to the library for the purchase of new shelving to replace the stacks which were manufactured in 1893. The new stacks are wood, and allow better access for patrons and provide more work space, thus making the library operations more efficient. These stacks are very attractive, and fit into our future renovation plans.

The Town Old Records Committee spend many hours reproducing a complete file of the first one hundred years' town records (1773 - 1870) so they would be available to the general public. The original records are now stored in a locked file in the Henney Room and the copies are in the history nook of the library. The Committee performed a service of significant historical value to the town.

A flag of the United States was presented to the library by the Anna Stickney Chapter of DAR.

The library continues to be used for meetings by such civic organizations as the Arts Council, the American Association of University Women, the School for Lifelong Learning, the Domestic Violence Committee, the North Country Council and the Historical Society. Blood pressure clinics were held at the library by the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County.

Volunteers play an important part in the activities of the library, contributing 488 hours during 1982. Members of the Kiwanis Club carried books from the attic for the book sale; the Conway Woman's Club helped with the sale, and in addition decorated the Christmas tree in the lobby.

Without the support of the many townspeople who are involved in the library, and the fine staff, the library could not continue as it has in the past to meet the growing needs of the community. The trustees are most appreciative of this support.

### REPORT OF THE CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION

A major project nearly completed is a parcel of land (170.8 acres) identified as East Conway Common land. This land owned by the Town of Conway has been surveyed with all boundary lines and monuments marked with yellow paint. Survey plan has been recorded at the registry of deeds in Ossipee.

Additional ski trails have been developed in Whitaker Woods. Doug Broomhall of the Eastern Mt. Ski Club was granted approval to extend the trail system into the northern section of property. For safety reasons, signs have been approved for each trail in Whitaker Woods showing trail difficulty and direction of travel.

Roadway into Pudding Pond Property is still being worked on by the Town. This year a culvert was put in and additional fill moved into the area. Hopefully this project might be completed in 1983.

The Conservation Commission is always interested in hearing from town residents on use of town owned land. We can always use volunteer help in cutting brush at scenic areas and maintaining trails through the Town Property. Please contact any commission member.

### 1982 WATER SAFETY REPORT

In 1982 the American Red Cross introduced a new swimming text containing a broad range of new information, including changes in the contents and final tests in all of the swimming courses. This is one way the Red Cross seeks to keep our instructors up to date with the latest in learning and teaching methodologies.

Although the weather wasn't 100% cooperative this past summer, we were able to teach something of value even on cold and windy days. Dry land instruction can be used quite effectively. Also, of particular value to all age groups were the safety discussions, including the demonstration and practice of artificial respiration. And the children really paid attention because they were't distracted by the desire to go into the water - it was just too cold! With our short season we need every minute of water time possible, and so we urge all participants to attend every day, unless there is a thunderstorm or downpour.

All the swimming facilities at Echo Lake State Park, including the raft, were once again made available to us, and it was a pleasure to teach in an atmosphere of welcome.

240 children, from 3 years of age on up, attended lessons. They were taught by Roxanne Cloutier and Tracy Gardner in two separate four-week sessions at Conway Lake. In one four-week session at Echo Lake two positions were held by Pamela Nagy and Kathryn Burnell. and two other positions there were shared by four people - Jack Butler. Verlene Kendrick, Sheryl Lowd and Maggie Duncan. Of particular help were Robert Chaplin and Andy Fickett who volunteered to assist wth the classes at Echo Lake. A special thank you goes to Water Safety Instructor, Carol Christopher, who volunteered at Conway Lake.

### REPORT OF TOWN OF CONWAY OLD RECORDS COMMITTEE

During the past two years, the Town of Conway Old Records Committee finished folding, reading, and filing in acid-free folders the first hundred years of the town's records, approximately seven thousand pieces of paper. We received a grant from the Northeast Document Center in Andover, Massachusetts, enabling us to have a conservation survey of the documents. The library, town hall, and town vault were also inspected. The Center provided us with an excellent report on the proper preservation, maintenance, and use of the records. The records were catalogued and then placed in acid-free envelopes. They were made available to the public under the supervision of William Marvel at the Conway Public Library. The amount of usage helped determine the ultimate recommendations for the documents' disposition. An Exhibit for the library, including a photo album of one hundred and forty typical samples of the material studied, was prepared by Mr. Henney.

At the conclusion of this phase of the work, the Committee voted to recommend to the selectmen, with the concurrence of the library trustees, that all the records from 1773-1870 be photo copied and placed in the history alcove of the Conway Public Library. The selectmen and Board of Trustees of the library accepted this recommendation. These records have now been copied and are available to the public. The original records dated 1773-1870 are to remain in the Henney room of the library in a locked cabinet.

### NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC. ANNUAL REPORT

In 1982 in the Town of Conway, North Country Council completed the town Master Plan; assisted the Planning Board in amending subdivision regulations and zoning ordinance, and in drafting site plan review regulations; worked with Town and area officials to determine solid waste disposal options and needs; and provided the Conway Area Business Development Corporation with an updated economic fact sheet and fact sheets on available industrial space in Conway, and continued assistiance to CABDC's marketing effort.

In addition to providing specific assistance to your town, the Council works on activities that benefit several towns and the entire North Country. In economic development, the Council has provided direct local assistance to several communities in their local development programs and has continued to seek approval from the Economic Development Administration for a revolving loan fund to assist small and medium-sized businesses in eight communities. As a member of the Small Business Development Program for Northern New Hampshire, NCC has provided information to prospective businesses on the available training and financial programs. The Economic Development Committee has met on issues such as trends in the wood products industry, the future of the North Country railroad system and small business development and financing.

One of the major efforts for towns is community planning. The Council staff met throughout the year with numerous planning boards, selectmen, and master plan committees to discuss community issues and provide solutions such as zoning, subdivision regulations, site plan review, sign, parking, septic system and mobile home regulations, recreation planning, business and traffic surveys, and more. The Council organizaed a subdivision workshop in the spring for planning board members, coordinated the Municipal Law Lectures in the fall, and provided information to towns on HUD's Small Cities Community Development Block Grant and Urban Development Action Grant programs. In an effort to maintain essential planning assistance to our towns given the somewhat smaller budget, our Community Planning Committee established a clear policy on membership services. This is described in a brochure we recently mailed to you entitled "North Country Council, Inc: What's In It For Your Town?"

In transportation, the Council's Transportation Committee assisted the NH Department of Public Works and Highways with the Annual Highway Action Plan Meeting. This meeting is usually very productive as it is the major way that the public can participate in identifying and supporting needed highway improvements. NCC is assisting the state, the new rail operator, and rail users in marketing the Concord-to-Lincoln rail line to make the line more economically viable and eventually self-sufficient. In the Mt. Washington Valley, NCC surveyed businesses to determine the potential for utilizing a truck/rail terminal. We are also following the proposed New England rail reorganization and its impact on our region. The Council continues to work with the Whitefield Regional Airport in an on-going effort to secure commuter air service.

The Council is providing planning recommendations and some technical assistance to towns in anticipation of the solid waste district planning scheduled to occur in late 1983 and 1984. We had a voice in amending the state's solid waste law to make it more flexible in local situations. Sharing of ideas and coordination in this field is aided by staff member Fred Moody's position as a director of the NH Resource Recovery Association.

To assist town government with administrative and financial tasks (e.g., tax billing, accounting, etc.), NCC has acquired a mini-computer with programs to accomplish these functions. At this time, we developed our tax billing services and look forward to offering additional services in the future.

The Council has also conducted historic buildings inventory in a few towns and will be serving as a clearinghouse on historic preservation planning and activities.

The Council closely followed the proceedings for the Quebec Hydro powerline in 1982 and presented our position before the Site Evaluation Committee in March. We recommended construction of the line in Vermont which provided the most economical, direct, and least environmentally-damaging route. As of early 1983, it appears the powerline will follow the Vermont route and will come into NH in Littleton. NCC also testified before the NH House and Senate in support of the Pontook hydroelectric facility in Dummer.

For the last year and a half, the Council has published NEWS FOR SELECTMEN, an informative report on local, regional, state and federal activities and trends. The Council is active on the state and national level through the NH Association of Regional Planning Commissions and the National Association of Regional Councils. We were very fortunate to have our former President and Jackson representative, Oliver Nelson serve as the Chairman of the National Advisory Committee on Rural Development. This past summer, the Committee

prepared a rural development strategy. The Council set up one of two in-state meetings to solicit views from the public on rural needs and practical solutions.

As in the past, the Council's major emphasis will continue to be technical assistance and information on matters of concern to local governments. The Council staff is always available to meet with local officials to discuss projects and needs of the towns.

On behalf of the Council and its Board of Directors, we thank you for your support during the past year and hope that the Town will continue to use the services of NCC during 1983. Please feel free to contact either one of us or the Council staff in Franconia at 823-8108 or 823-5566.


