TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby instructed to meet at the Veterans' Memorial Building, in said Town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon Eastern War Time, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Library Trustees, Trustees of the Trust Funds, Auditors and all other necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.

2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, for building and repairing bridges, for the suppression of moths, for the police department and municipal court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of town officials, for the Board of Health, for the expense of the Town halls, for the support of libraries, for State and County taxes, for the observance of Memorial Day, for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, for playground purposes, for co-operating with the State and Federal governments in control of insect pests and white pine blister and for all other necessary charges arising in said Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the Town will accept State aid for construction of the Class 2 road known as the Windham Road leading from Shute's Corner to Windham Junction and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said

purpose, the sum of \$1920 00; or will accept State aid for construction of Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose, the sum of \$1039.06. and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will direct the Collector of Taxes to allow a discount to all persons paying their taxes within such period as the Town shall limit, to fix the rate of such discount, and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the taxes for the year 1942 on the negotiable notes of the Town, said loans to be repaid from 1942 taxes collected, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. On petition of Henry A. Spaulding and nine others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for free public band concerts in the Town during the summer of 1942, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. On petition of J. C. Larmondra and eleven others, to see if the Town will vote to omit the printing of vital statistics from the annual report, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. On petition of J. C. Larmondra and eleven others, to see what action the Town will take about considering or adopting Chapter 69 of the Laws of 1929, known as the Town Manager Act, and raise and appropriate any money necessary thereunder, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. On petition of J. C. Larmondra and eleven others, to see what action the Town will take upon the following resolution, viz: Resolved by the citizens of Derry in Town Meeting assembled that after this date the Selectmen shall call for sealed, competitive bids on all pur-

chases and contracts by all departments, the cost of which would exceed at any one time, or within any one month, the sum of \$100.00, and that all proposals be advertised in a newspaper having general circulation in the Town of Derry at least ten days before bids are opened, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. On petition of J. C. Larmondra and ten others, to see if the Town will vote to pay our Selectmen not to exceed the sum of \$1200.00 per year for their services in operating the business of the Town of Derry, and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. On petition of Albert Dion and eleven others, to see what action the Town will take relative to the following proposition, viz: We desire one Park Commissioner, George H. Lambert, at the same salary as the instructors received.

12. On petition of Gertrude L. Howard and numerous others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the construction of a hard surface road along the Northwest shore of Big Island Pond in the District of East Derry during the spring and summer of 1942, said road to be carried as far as the entrance to the settlement known as Collette's Grove, and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. By request of the Town Defense Committee, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$1,000.00 for the following purposes, viz: To provide for additional fire protection, additional police protection and for the use of Town health officials and Board of Health due to War emergency, and pass any vote relating thereto.

14. To see what action the Town will take relative to improving Rollins Street and Fenway Street, in said Town, to raise and appropriate money for the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of Chapter 111 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire relative to sidewalks and sewers in said Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to construct a sewage disposal plant and sewerage system to care for Derry Depot Village and Derry Village, or any portions thereof, the cost of the same to be financed by sewer rentals or sewer assessments, or both, to raise and appropriate any money necessary for preliminary investigation and engineering, and pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to issue serial bonds of the Town in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 72, Revised Laws, referred to as the "Municipal Bonds Statute," in an amount not exceeding Three Hundred Thousand (\$300,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of carrying into effect any action which may be taken under the preceding article; to fix the kind and denomination of such bonds, the time and place of payment, the rate of interest and the manner of payment; and to provide that the cost of said sewage disposal and sewerage system shall be paid by sewer rentals or sewer assessments, or both, as provided by the statutes of New Hampshire, and pass any vote relating thereto.

18. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

19. To appoint any necessary committee on any article embraced in this warrant.

20. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before such meeting.

DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY

Annual Report of the Trustees

The work of the Library has progressed smoothly during the past year. While there has been some increase in the juvenile circulation, a decrease is noted in the adult use; no doubt due to greater employment in industry.

At a meeting of the Trustees held February 9, 1942, Miss Edith Hall was re-appointed librarian for the ensuing year, and Mrs. Joseph Edwards was appointed assistant-librarian to take the place of Miss Elaine Peart, who resigned to take a better position with the Manchester Public Library.

We feel honored that our Librarian has been made chairman of the Exhibit Exchange of the New Hampshire Library Association; she also deserves due praise for being the first librarian in the State to have her defense material available and in use.

The reports of the Librarian and Treasurer show in detail the work of the library and are herewith submitted.

To the Trustees of the Derry Public Library

The 37th annual report is herewith presented:

The work of the library has continued much as usual, but with a little lower circulation than last year. There has been a gradual drop in our circulation since 1936. This seems to be general in many places. People

have had more work and of course that means more money for recreation and pleasure, and less time for reading.

Our purchases for the year has included books from the Church Reading List, Vocational training and the usual amount of fiction and non-fiction for adults and juveniles. We have added to our shelves much material on Home Defense and Industrial Training as the demand seemed to call for in this type of work.

We know that the Public Library as a community reading center should be the source of general information for all defense work. Many more books must be added to meet our demand for material on Airplanes and Automobile mechanics, Radio and Blue print reading.

Every effort has been made to fit the book to the reader. There are many who depend entirely upon the librarian's judgment. Some refuse to take a book unless it is hand picked for them.

The idea of reading for mental stimulation has been accepted by many of our regular patrons. We receive many requests such as, "I have picked out what I want but will you give me something that you think I should read".

Book Week was a grand success. The usual number of new books were displayed. As a special feature we were able to borrow the "Dickens' Village" for the week. This scene was received with enthusiasm by all who saw it. "Patron's Day" was observed by an "Open House" program in the evening. Mr. Peart gave us an interesting informal talk on the "London of Dickens' time". Music was furnished by a group of girls from the Pinkerton Glee Club.

The usual line of exhibits has been displayed from time to time. An outstanding one was "Freedom of American Democracy." This exhibit was shown at the

New Hampshire Library Association Meeting in Sept. and the Nov. meeting of the Derry Parent Teachers.

Your librarian was asked to speak at the New Hampshire Library Association meeting on "The House that Derry built". This was the topic chosen to illustrate how the public could help in the building up of an interesting exhibit without much cost to the library.

The librarian and her assistant was in attendance for two days at the National Library Association meeting held in Boston. We traveled by bus each day.

The Neighborhood meeting was held here in Derry May 26. We had a very good attendance from surrounding towns. New books were on display and Mr. Addison gave us one of his fine book talks. Mr. Erickson was the morning speaker. His topic was "relationship between the library and the school".

It was with regret that Miss Peart's resignation was accepted. But we realized she was stepping into a much better position. Mrs. Edwards was appointed to finish Miss Peart's year of service.

School boxes have been placed in four of the rooms of the Floyd School. These books are for the use of the bus children. So many of the children are unable to come to the library that this seemed an easy way to serve them.

There has been a much closer co-operation between the library and the teachers this past year. We are glad to serve our schools in every way possible. A survey of the schools showed us that there was actually 100% registration in all classes from the 2nd grade to the first year high school.

Instruction on the use of the library was given the Junior High students. The same method was used as that of last year.

Your librarian has attended all Air raid warden and first aid classes and has qualified for air warden for the library.

The Public Library has organized its committee for the Victory Drive for books. We have set the figures 1000 books as our goal for the drive.

We wish to take this time to thank the Newspapers for their fine co-operation in giving the library publicity in all its activities of the year.

To the School Board of Derry:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools of Derry.

The purpose of these reports has been to present statistics and a brief review of the progress of the schools. It has been my objective to incorporate in these pages information of public interest and, at the same

time, to imply that credit for any accomplishments attained should be given the school board. The members have not worked for personal credit but have done everything possible leading to the furtherance of the aims of education.

ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment through January 31, 1942 was 765 as compared with 772 for the same period last year, 803 two years ago, and 778 three years previous.

PROGRAM AND TEACHER CHANGES

Steps were taken with the opening of school in September to convert the Oak Street School, Grades Seven and Eight, from an elementary to a state approved junior high school. Being approved meant: first, that the school was recognized as a secondary school with the teachers, program, and physical plant being thus identified; secondly, that the institution would thus be listed on the state department reports; and third, that the school would be entitled to the privilege of inspections by the agents of the state department.

All departments had been improved during the past few years so, with minor adjustments in the program, the change to a secondary set-up was not difficult. However, it was necessary to make further additions and changes to the foods section of the domestic arts department. During the fall additional equipment was purchased and installed in that room. Another sink, an electric range, and an electric refrigerator were provided. Other changes were made to the arrangement of the room and the operation of the department.

At the present time the term Derry Junior High School may well be applied and the citizens should be proud that this forward step has been taken by the school board.

In order to stimulate the work being done in the various schools it seemed best to effect transfers of some teachers who, although performing in a creditable manner, seemed better fitted for other situations. As a result, a comparison of this year's list of teachers with that of a year previous will show certain changes were made. All transfers were made in the interest of instructional efficiency.

New teachers were hired to replace Miss Martha Ross, who resigned to be married, and Mr. Ralph V.

Matthews now teaching in Michigan. Miss Margaret Tracy of Berlin, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College, was elected as teacher of the first grade in the Oak Street School. Miss Tracy has had previous experience in Errol and Lancaster. Miss Myrtle Lewis of Auburndale, Massachusetts, is now supervisor of music in the Derry Schools. Miss Lewis is a graduate of Lowell Teachers' College and has done graduate work at Boston University. Her previous experience was obtained at Jamestown, R. I., and Dover-Foxcroft, Maine.

The following teachers attended summer school during 1941: Ruth DeVarney, Marjorie Frost, Carlotta Lupien, Katherine Lyons, Joseph P. McCormack, Etta Merrill, Martha Moore, Effie Plante, Margaret Tracy, Bertha Wiggins, George Zoulias.

MUSIC

Heretofore the music teachers' duties were divided among the various towns of the union and Pinkerton Academy. Through a mutual understanding with the headmaster of the academy it was arranged that Pinkerton would hire its own music teacher. As a result it has been possible to have all the Derry Town Schools under the direction of Miss Lewis, with Miss Marquis working in the other school districts and assisting in Derry.

The music program of previous years has been expanded to include music theory in all grades and an opportunity for the pupils of grades four through eight to enjoy instruction in instrumental music. Various additional instruments and equipment were purchased by the school board. Up to fifty boys and girls have availed themselves of the training thus provided and it is hoped that more will benefit as the program develops.

The third annual public presentation of the music department was given on Friday, April 18, 1941, at the

Adams Memorial Building. "Skyward Ho!" was prepared by the pupils and teachers under the direction of music supervisors. Nearly two hundred pupils participated with all schools and grades being represented.

INSTRUCTION

A perusal of the reports of other years will prove that much improvement has been accomplished in all phases of the school program. Certain accomplishments have been discussed in other sections of this report.

Although discussed in last year's report it might well be emphasized that one of the most practical and worth-while courses in our junior high school is the shop work taught, most efficiently, by Mr. Joseph P. McCormack. The organization and equipment, according to state industrial arts supervisors, is quite satisfactory. Constant attention should be focused on this department in order to maintain it in the same condition.

Woodworking is featured for the seventh grade pupils, whereas general shop, with its sub-divisions of: woodworking, forging, metal work, electricity, plastics, and drawing is included for the eighth grade boys.

The pupils construct bulletin boards, tables, benches, shelves, besides other items as needed in the schools and also make many fine projects for their own personal use. The type of work completed reflects credit upon the teacher.

It is regrettable that the program offered in the junior high school is not followed by a suitable course, of a similar nature, in high school.

In the matter of text books we have continued to increase upon the amount and quality used in all grades. Emphasis has been continued in order to provide adequate texts and materials for the fundamental subjects of reading. A basic system is now well established in all schools.

Additional books to provide for replacements and larger enrollment in some grades have been purchased in all subjects. A new fifth grade history series has been adopted. New music books were secured for the junior high school and the sixth grade.

The social science texts which had been used in the seventh grade, besides being obsolete, have been regarded as too difficult for the grade level. Therefore, a new social science program has been adopted for the grade with the necessary books being furnished.

Other texts obtained include; literature for the junior high school, additional dictionaries in all grades, supplementary science books for the junior high school, and supplementary readers.

The only important book need which should next be given attention is the eighth grade social science offering. The series introduced in the seventh grade during the current year should be extended through the next grade.

We have continued classes in lip-reading for certain pupils who were hard of hearing. Several pupils who were afflicted with speech defects have also been given training by the same teacher. Another pupil who is physically unable to attend school has been given the benefit of home instruction. This work is being done according to the provisions of Public Laws of 1939, Chapter 156.

DECLAMATION

The first annual declamation contest was held on Friday, May 2, 1941 at the Adams Memorial Building. This project was sponsored by the school board for the purpose of stimulating achievement in oral English. The contest was arranged with the assistance of Milton Knowlen, and Miss Marjorie Frost.

Each pupil of the eighth grade English classes prepared an oral recitation and presented it in an audience situation. Preliminary and semi-final eliminations were held and six girls and the same number of boys were selected for the public performance.

Those who took part in the final contest were: Nathalie Chadwick, Claire Dion, Elizabeth Griffin, Elaine Latulippe, Verna O'Brien, Patricia Senter, Frederick Ball, Sherman Brickett, Robert Johnson, Carroll Spafford, Henry Spaulding, and Frederick Tupper. First prize awards went to Elaine Latulippe and Robert Johnson. Second prizes were awarded to Claire Dion and Frederick Ball. The judges were: Ivah Hackler of Derry Village, Eileen McQuaid of Candia, and Rachel Hartford of Salem.

This project was enthusiastically received and proven worth-while enough to be continued each year.

REPAIRS, 1941

As usual, all schools were given proper attention during the summer vacation. Regular cleaning and minor

repair jobs were completed. Much work is done each year by the janitors who are always willing to work in the interest of the Derry schools. The district is very fortunate indeed to have three men who are so capable and efficient in the performance of their various duties.

Work done in the schools include:

Floyd School

Painting exterior white trim.

Painting sash and trim.

Work on boiler.

Interior painting of walls.

Painting of basement and toilet floors.

Rebuilding of door to boy's entrance.

Repairs to toilets.

Oak Street School

Boiler and plumbing repairs.

Installation of sink in shop.

Repairs of forge shop leak.

Repairs to floor.

New metal bicycle rack installed.

Installation of new drinking fountains.

Improvements in domestic arts room.

Rebuilding chimney.

West Side School

Installation of new floors, grades four and six.

Repair of upstairs corridor floors.

Rebuilding of front and side entrances.

Boiler repairs.

Painting of toilet floors.

Repair roof.

During the summer vacation it was possible, through the industry of the janitors, to provide fences at all schools. The playground, purchased at the West Side School since the last annual report, was completely fenced. Fences were also constructed at the Floyd and Oak Street Schools to separate the school lot with adjoining property.

No major job is contemplated under the regular budget item for maintenance. Therefore, it has been possible to reduce the figure, slightly, in the budget for the coming year. With the amount requested it should be possible to continue our policy of maintaining the school plants in good condition.

Both wooden buildings, the Oak Street and West Side Schools, are very much in need of exterior painting. Neither school has been painted since about eight years ago. A special article is included in the warrant for the voters to decide whether it is their wish to have the work done at this time.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

During the year football, basketball, and baseball are the major sports for the boys of the junior high school. The girls engage in softball and basketball. However, these sports are but phases of the whole program. All pupils of the school are included in various activities according to the season. Out-door exercises are featured when the weather allows while during the winter the Veterans' Memorial Hall is rented for indoor work. Then, too, class work in health is included.

The boys have been capably supervised by Mr. George Zoulias, while the girls have been enjoying the benefits of the course through the leadership of Miss Ruth DeVarney, assisted by Miss Mabel Plante.

Health education should be a fundamental aim of all schooling. The health of the individual is more and more vital to the preservation of the race and the defence of the nation. Health needs cannot be neglected in our schools, especially during these times. The program of health and physical activities may well be expanded, not only in the junior high school, but even throughout the grades. More adequate facilities, equipment, and personnel should be provided in order to promote the health interests of the boys and girls.

INSURANCE

Some consideration should be given the purchase of additional fire insurance for the three town buildings. The total protection to date follows: Floyd School \$18,000, Oak Street School \$15,400 plus \$1500 on contents, and the West Side School \$13,596.50 and \$500 on contents.

Reasonable coverage on each building should be provided. In terms of modern school construction the replacement value of each structure would amount to several times the actual amount of insurance carried.

During the year our insurance schedule has been reconstructed. Our premiums are so arranged that we can now budget \$300 annually to pay for policies carried, plus boiler insurance and office supplies which are already included.

It might be well to increase the amount budgetted each year to gradually raise the amount carried on each building to a minimum figure of \$20,000 and at the same time to more adequately insure the furnishings of all schools.

THE BUDGET

The total appropriation which the budget for 1942-1943 suggests is \$758.00 more than the amount voted for the current year. Attempts have been made to reduce or maintain the various items in the budget in spite of a general rise in prices.

If it was not for the fact that our estimated income for the next year will be much less it would have been possible to substantially lower the total figure. This reduced income is due to two main factors: (1) the reorganization of the music department and the resulting loss in income toward the salary of the teacher, (2) the renovation of the domestic arts department which was necessary in order to meet satisfactory standards.

These items in the proposed budget have been reduced: text books, maintenance, superintendent's excess salary, and per capita tax. No undue loss of efficiency, should result because of these reductions.

The items for teachers' and janitors' salaries have been increased to include certain automatic salary raises. The increase of \$200.00 for scholars' supplies is necessary in order to meet the general price increase for the different purchases under this item. A special item has been added to promote the annual public musical and declamatory programs which have been introduced in late years. It has been necessary to raise the amount allotted for administration in order to include the expenses incurred by the installation of telephones in all buildings. This step seemed essential under the present emergency.

The budget item for high school tuition remains the same as for this year. However, if most of the graduates of the junior high school should enter secondary school in September we are likely to have about 245 pupils enrolled, which would cause a deficit to exist next year.

The per pupil cost of the Derry elementary schools for 1939-1940 was \$67.72 as compared with a state median of \$81.85. It is interesting to note that the per pupil cost for 1940-1941 was \$67.87, and the state median \$84.61.

CONCLUSION

May I recommend to your consideration and careful study extracts from a recent report of the American Youth Commission. "Educational agencies," the report reveals, "provide a service which is pre-eminent-ly one with long-time objectives. Some of the benefits are immediate, but most of them are realized over long period of years. Because this is the case, there is

sometimes a tendency during a period of emergency to postpone education to a later period. Pressure in this direction becomes especially acute if the emergency places large financial demands upon the government.

In general the only sensible educational policy for a program of total war is to maintain educational services unimpaired.

The program of education in the values and practices of democracy must be revitalized. Above all, young people must be prepared for the obligations of citizenship in a democracy.

Because the school has the longest intimate contact with young people during their most impressionable years, its responsibility for citizenship training is proportionately greater than that of other persons or agencies. It is in the school and classroom that students acquire many of their permanent habits, attitudes, and ideals. Upon these acquisitions depend the kind of citizens they will be and, consequently, the kind of government which will prevail."

As I conclude my duties as your superintendent, words cannot express my gratitude to the members of the Derry School Board. Their loyalty, honesty, and general helpfulness to me in our work is something I can never forget.

Also, I wish to thank those teachers and other assistants who have cooperated in all endeavors. Pupils, parents, and the citizens of Derry who have extended many kindnesses to my family and me will always cause us to remember the happy term of service we enjoyed in your town.

Various improvements have been made in the school building since the last annual report. The walls and ceilings of the classrooms, corridors, and toilets were refinished under the special appropriation voted last March. Bulletin boards were installed in each classroom. The heating system was examined and necessary minor repairs were completed. Although a few planks were replaced it seems desirable that the front porch be rebuilt during the spring.

Through the generosity of Miss Lillian Poore, who has always been intensely interested in the welfare of our pupils, a fine slide was added to the equipment used on the playground. Miss Poore's gift has been enjoyed by the pupils of the primary room.

The swings have been repaired by the replacement of new parts and are used, chiefly, by the older pupils.

Book purchases which have been completed for the current year include; primary grade reading work-books, social science readers for the lower grades, basic readers for grade six, geographies for grade five, and a set of modern elementary reference books.

During the past few years it has been our policy to install ample materials and text books for the use of teachers and pupils. Needless to say, with the fine attitude displayed by the members of the school board, it is not too much to expect other than that this same plan will be continued.

The budget, as proposed for 1942-43, is substantially lower than the amount voted at the last annual meeting. The decrease is in excess of eight hundred dollars, while over a two-year period a reduction of nearly fifteen hundred dollars has been made. The majority of the items in the proposed budget remain essentially the same. The lesser amount needed is due to the fact that next year there will be a smaller high school enrollment as well as a surplus which will exist at the end of the present year.

It is with regret that I complete my duties as your superintendent. It has been very pleasant to have been associated with the people of Derry Village. One could not hope for a finer school board, two more loyal and efficient teachers, or nicer boys and girls. I am grateful to have had the opportunity to serve under such excellent conditions.

In closing may I call your attention to extracts from an article which appears in the February, 1942, issue of "The Nation's Schools." It reads, in part, as follows: "Success in the present world-wide conflict is even more contingent upon the psychological factor of attitude and spirit than it was a generation ago.

Public education must continue to play an important part in the creation and maintenance of a high popular

morale. The school has wide responsibility for building morale among children and youths and a currently more restricted responsibility for developing faith in adults. Probably the best way of developing morale in the immature is the teaching of dynamic democracy as a desirable way of life and the cultivation in those children of the basic qualities of tolerance, fair play, love of freedom, and a willingness to make sacrifices."
