

NEIL G. REID

1904 - 1967

Neil G. Reid was born Jan. 5, 1904 in Battle Creek, Michigan. He was the son of Charles A. and Lillian N. (Adams) Reid.

In 1915 the Reids came to Epsom and the farm on Locke's Hill where Mr. Reid lived for over fifty years. He attended the New Orchard Road School; Pittsfield High; and U. N. H. from which he graduated with honors in 1928. Neil Reid and Rachael Bartlett were united in marriage on March 11, 1937.

He was a farmer and carpenter. He served the Town of Epsom as Selectman for fifteen years. He was dedicated to his duties to the Town until his death on December 17, 1967.

He was a member of the Epsom Baptist Church and had sung in both the choir there and in the New Rye Church. He had been active in Boy Scout work for several years.

Neil is going to be greatly missed in Epsom.

WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Business Meeting — 7:30 p. m.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see what action the Town will take upon the budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$931.25 for the maintenance, construction, or reconstruction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$6,208.34 as provided in Chapter 83 Laws of 1953.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. Pursuant to the Provisions of the Laws as revised, Chapter 292, Section 7, 1949. The following Article is submitted: Shall the Provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town?
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$579.00 for the Concord Hospital to help offset the estimated operating deficit for the year 1967.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to increase the Health and Hospitals appropriations for donation to Barnstead Ambulance Service.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to be used in the White Pine Blister Rust Control Program.

(Recommended in the Budget)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the Salary of the Tax Collector from \$500.00 to \$700.00 per year.

(Not entered in the recommended Budget)

- 10. To see if the Town will accept an offer by the Women's Club of Epsom, the Epsom Garden Club and such other organizations as wish to contribute, to remodel the northwestern ell of the Town Hall, formerly used as a woodshed, into an equipped kitchenette.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Trust Funds, the interest only, to be used for the care of family lots in Epsom Cemeteries:

Thomas D. Trebeck Fund (\$80.00), Everett B. Mosher Fund (\$100.00), Julia Riley Fund (\$50.00), Catherine L. Berry Fund (\$100.00), Flora Hall Sullivan Fund (\$150.00).

12. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

The Epsom Library has been on the upgrade for the past year in adhering to the State Library recommendations to the best of our abilities in building up the collection for the public's best interest. Bookmobile service is readily used and many books secured from the State Library for research work of the high school children and patrons wishing specialized material in various lines throughout the past year.

Story hours have been held regularly throughout the year with excellent attendance. Many specialities have been added to the story hours, such as sketching story read, re-enacting story read to them, songs and dances, which has helped with interest of children. Thanks is given to all that have helped make the story hours available.

The town histories and genealogies have been used to great advantage by out-of-towners and out-of-staters. The Epsom Historical Association has asked permission that records be kept together in the library and permission granted by the trustees.

A reading contest was held during the summer with many participants, and a party and awards were given at the close of the contest.

The 4-H clubs were donors of labor and flowers that were planted in front of the library last summer.

Throughout the year, collection of books have been on display at Town meeting, and organization meetings. This proved well worth the effort and many learned of the services that the library can offer.

The Friends of the library have been very active throughout the year with food sales, book sales and jointly sponsoring the Arts and Crafts show during the summer, with the Womans Club. All proceeds from this was turned over to the Community Improvement fund. The Friends have purchased a typewriter for the library, twelve juvenile folding chairs, two dozen metal book ends. The most spectacular event the Friends offer is the Shut-in service to persons unable to get to the library. Books go out monthly to approximately ten families — small bookmobile service, they have selection to pick from. Many thanks to Mrs. Ellen Eppelsheimer who heads this service.

The Librarian has completed a course in Publc Library Techniques I, at the UNH; four or five interested persons have attended the books selection meetings regular as held in Concord, workshops have been attended several times this year and new ideas brought back to Epsom.

Qualifications for affiliated libraries as adopted by State Library Commission, September 7, 1966 are as follows: hours open, 15 hours weekly with hours two nights per week and not less than two hours at a time: personnel, newly appointed chief librarians, unless they have a professional library degree, have completed or be enrolled in, or state intent of enrolling in, the course in "Public Library Techniques" sponsored by the University of New Hampshire, or its equivalent; physical facilities, in communities of 1000 population or more, running water (hot and cold), toilet facilites, and telephone. These same facilities also recommended for smaller libraries.

These recommendations are to be met by 1972, July 1. Also a written statement of policy on basic rules governing personnel and other internal rules of the library and book selection policy are to be submitted by July 1, 1968. Consequently, The Epsom Public Library has a long ways to go before meeting the requirements.

All in all, the library has had a very thriving year and services rendered have shown a decided incline as to better education for the children using the library. It is

hoped in the next few years we might be able to meet the state recommendations and stay in the affiliation, as at this point, we are not endowed large enough to travel on our own power, with the added amount of reference requests handled through the town library.

Many beautiful books have been given as gifts and many gift subscriptions to the much used magazines have been received throughout the year.

There has been much activity in the police department during the past twelve months. Due to the growth of the town, and the increase of police work, it was necessary to appoint one more regular officer to the force. Robert M. Reeves received this appointment.

The department has again provided 24 hour telephone service, and prompt dispatch of officers on complaints and accidents. REPORT OF EPSOM FIRE DEPARTMENT

There were forty odd calls for the Fire Department in 1967.

There was much work done on the equipment, trucks and station. Due to lack of funds, most of this was labor.

There is money needed for labor and material in and around the station. Also for Trucks No. 212 and No. 213 (tank truck and Engine No. 2).

There should be money available for men's time on fires and training.

Forest fires should be separate from Fire Department. There should be a sum set aside (in Warden's Account) for forest fires only.

Be certain you have the Red Phone number by your phone and know how to use it. 4622 — it can and should be used for any emergency.

The Barnstead ambulance is on call 24 hours a day. We have Radio contact with them 24 hours a day with very few exceptions. The Red Phone operators have the ambulance number. So in any emergency — Dial 4622; if no emergency (non hurry) dial 4732 and they will be called.

Look up your 1965 Town Reports; if you have not torn out page 69, and posted it by your phone — DO IT NOW!

Again in September, Epsom enjoyed a minimum change in staff. Miss Deborah Lacy replaced Mrs. Doris Philbrick in grade 5. Your school board deserves much credit for their realistic approach towards retaining a strong staff of teachers.

The last 5 years have shown an emergence of a new militancy on the part of school teachers in the United States. Our daily newspapers feature front page headlines reporting teacher strikes or sanctions across the nation.

Direct negotiations in education with school boards is becoming more and more popular in New Hampshire. By collective negotiation is meant a process whereby the teachers choose an organization to represent them. This organization meets together with the school board. The two together and jointly, set and determine the salaries and working conditions of the teachers in that school district. This is a bilateral decision making process as opposed to a unilateral decision making process. The agreements that are reached in negotiations are put in a form of a written document signed by both parties. The New Hampshire Association of School Administrators has adopted a legal form to be used in New Hampshire.

The reason for the above description of collective negotiation is to make the general public aware of what they may face in the future, for example that as of this writing, some of the immediate goals of the NHEA are as follows: a base starting salary of \$5,600, inproved working conditions, increased sick leave, partial payment of group, life and health insurance, a signed professional negotiations agreement, etc.

In closing we would like to express our appreciation for the cooperation from the School Board, teachers, children, and citizens of the community given to this office in the past year. We will need your continued cooperation for the best interest of the boys and girls in your schools.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

1967-1968

Enrollment on the first day of the 1967-1968 school year was 252 students. Last year, our beginning enrollment was 251; we gained 16 students and lost 14 during the course of the year, for a net gain of two.

The following teachers have successfully completed professional improvement courses at the University of New Hampshire since the last report: Mrs. Fife, Mrs. Crosbie, Mrs. Cote, Mrs. Walker, Miss Lacy, Mrs. Stimmell, Mrs. Omand, and Mr. Fortier.

The following courses of instruction were added to our curriculum for the upper four grades this year: Art, Dramatics, Introduction to French, and Beginning Typing. These courses are offered on an elective basis; a study period is provided for those students who do not select any of the other courses.

Another innovation this year is the operation of the School Library. PTO volunteers are staffing the library between 1:00 and 3:00 p. m. daily. This has been a highly successful program, and we are very grateful to the PTO for the assistance that has made it possible.

Other co-curricular and extra-curricular activities include: Newspaper Club, Chess Club, Dramatics Club, Glee Club, Basketball, Baseball, and Cheerleaders' Club.

Plans are being formulated for conducting a summer session in Reading during the coming summer, under the provisions of TITLE I of the National Defense Education Act. Courses will be held in the morning, and will last six weeks.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the people of Epsom for their continued support and encouragement.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The school health services in Barrington, Epsom, Northwood, Nottingham and Strafford included a routine health inspection of each child by the Nurse. The parents were informed whenever defects were found, and most of the children were seen or treated by their family physician. The success of the health program depends largely upon such cooperation as the parents of these communities have shown.

In addition to the above, various clinics were arranged for the benefit of the children. Measles vaccine was given to 78 children in Barrington and to 49 in Strafford. Epsom joined with Chichester in having a measles clinic and a combined total of 22 children received this protection.

A series of three immunization clinics was held in both Northwood and Nottingham. In Northwood 42 measles vaccinations, 18 smallpox vaccinations, 105 triple toxoid boosters and 24 oral polio immunizations were given; while in Nottingham 142 children received triple toxoid, 22 were vaccinated for smallpox, 55 for measles, and 134 for polio (both series and boosters).

Dental clinics were held in three towns — Barrington, Epsom and Northwood. The former participated in the Matching Funds Program only. Dental repair work was provided for 11 children. Epsom and Northwood also had this program and a total of 35 children were treated. These two towns also have a continuing dental program for cleaning the teeth and applying topical fluoride solution which is very beneficial in reducing dental decay. 199 children took advantage of this program in Epsom and 144 in Northwood.

Regarding clinics, it should be remembered that all immunization clinics are co-sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Public Health and a local organization. The dental clinics are also co-sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Public Health and one or more local sponsors. The local groups deserve a special word of commendation, since a great deal of time and effort is essential to the smooth operation of any clinic.

Through the N. H. Tuberculosis Association, the Heaf test for tuberculosis was administered to 239 students and faculty members at Epsom Central School, and 6 people received X-ray examinations. It is planned in the future to administer the Heaf test annually to children in first grade only. This will be done in all five towns in the fall of 1968.

During the school year of 1966-67, the N. H. Sight Conservation Program provided vision examinations and glasses for 3 students, and the Concord chapter of the Lions Club took care of an equal number.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you who helped in making the school health service so successful.
