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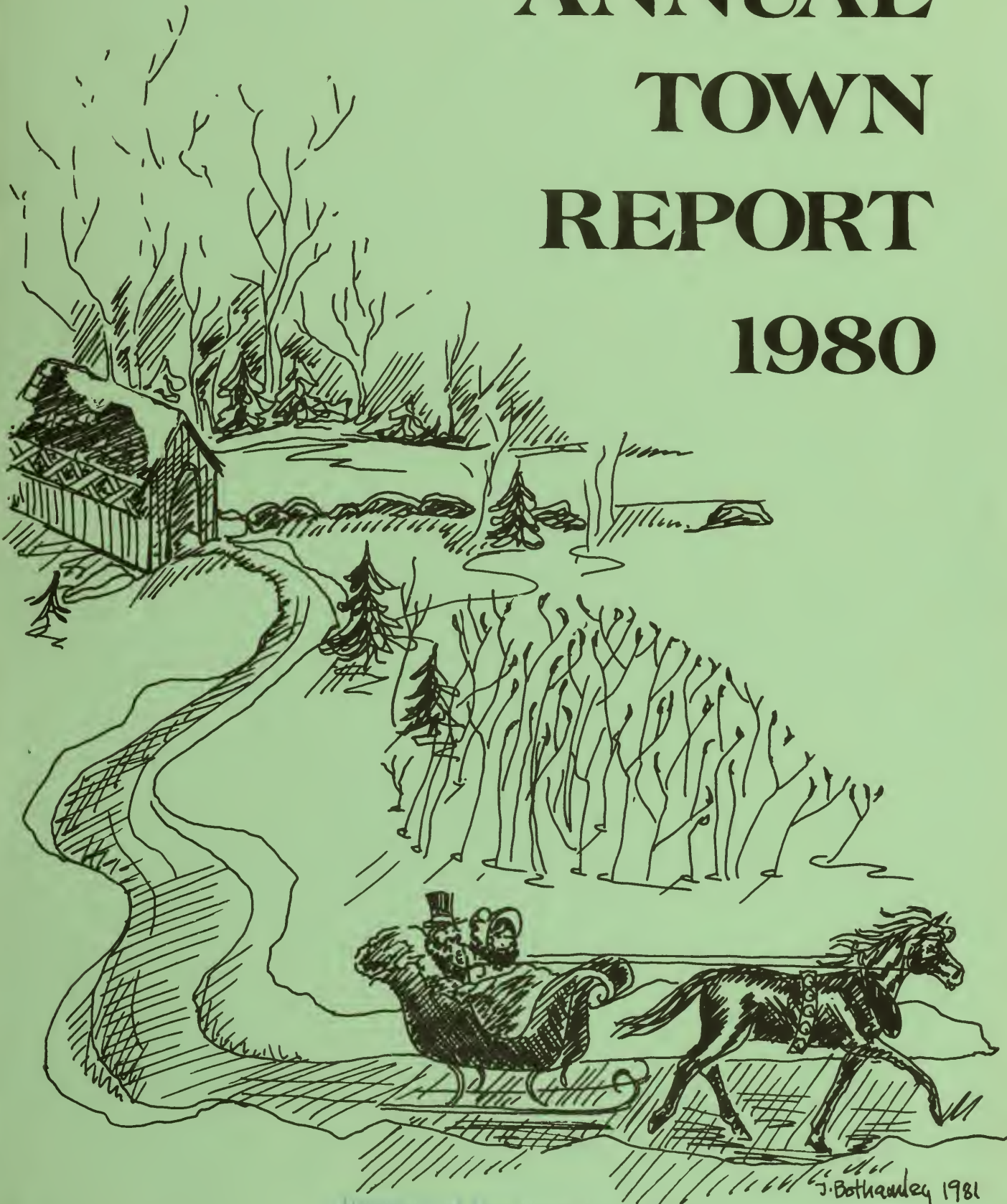

To the Inhabitants of the Town of HOPKINTON in the State,
qualified to vote in Towns Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said HOP-
KINTON on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at 8:01 o'clock in the
forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- II. To see what action the Town will take with respect to rescinding the recently approved dog leash law by voting by ballot upon the follow-
ing question:

“Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 466:30-a, which makes it
unlawful for an owner of any dog licensed or unlicensed to allow
said dog to run at large, except when accompanied by the owner or
custodian, and when used for hunting, herding, supervised by compe-
tion and exhibition or training for such?”

- III. To see if the meeting will vote to recess its further business pro-
ceedings under the Warrant to reconvene on Wednesday, March 11,
1981, at 7:30 P.M. at Hopkinton High School; the polls, however,
to continue open under Article I as declared by the Moderator.

- IV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of

(The Budget Committee recommends \$653,052.00 of said appropriation and does not recommend the remaining \$51,645.00 of same.)

- V. To see if the Town will vote to close SUBJECT TO GATES AND BARS that section of BARTON'S CORNER ROAD starting at the east bound of the Grant Milner property proceeding in an easterly direction to the U. S. Government property line.
- VI. To see if the Town will vote to rescind action on Article XV of the 1980 Annual Town Meeting relative to closing a section of Garrison Lane and in place thereof to ABANDON the entire CROSS ROAD located on the east side of the Patenaude residence, lying between Jewett Road and I-89.
- VII. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Capital Reserve Account established in 1953 for a new grader and attachments and place any monies in said account into the Capital Reserve Highway Equipment Fund.
- VIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,982.00 for Town Road Aid. (State to contribute \$12,158.75; Town to Raise \$1,823.25)

- IX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,000.00 as the final payment for the Tyler Bridge Project, authorizing the Selectmen to withdraw \$20,000.00 from Revenue Sharing funds; Town to raise \$14,000.00.
- X. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing or replacing highway equipment. (Not recommended by Budget Committee)
- IX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for New Construction of Highways. (\$26,252.00 to be reimbursed by Additional Highway Subsidy from the State; Town to raise \$3,748.00)
- XII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000.00 for the purchase of a new Fire Truck, authorizing the withdrawal of \$5,000.00 from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund towards the purchase of same and also, authorizing the Board to borrow not more than \$60,000.00 in the name of the Town for this purpose and to execute and issue evidence of such indebtedness notes or bonds of the Town of Hopkinton pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and any other applicable laws of the State of New Hampshire.
- XIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$59,000.00 for the purpose of property assessment re-evaluation by the State of New Hampshire, Property Appraisal Division and to authorize the withdrawal of \$45,000.00 from the Re-evaluation Capital Reserve Account towards the payment of same; Town to raise \$14,000.00.
- XIV. To see if the town will vote to sell James Schoch for the price of \$1.00, the old Rescue Squad Building as it sits on his property in consideration for his many years of allowing the Town to use his land for placement of this building.
- XV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000.00 for the purchase of a new one-ton dump truck, authorizing the withdrawal of \$14,000.00 from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of same.
- XVI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 for the purchase of new plow wings, authorizing the

withdrawal of \$2,600.00 from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of same.

XVII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for costs to enforce the dog leash law per RSA 466:30-a, provided that this article is not rescinded by ballot vote at Town Meeting. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee)

XVIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$83,167.00, payable to W. L. Roberts, Sr., for the purchase of land which is to be the future site of the Sewage Treatment Facility off Maple Street; authorizing the Board to borrow not more than \$40,000.00 in the name of the Town for this purpose and to execute and issue evidence of such indebtedness notes or bonds of the Town of Hopkinton pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and any other applicable laws of the State of New Hampshire.

XIX. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$20,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act for use as a set-off against the following debt service:

Tyler Bridge Project \$20,000.00
Note & Interest

XX. To see if the Town will vote to rescind Article I of the 1977 Special Town Meeting, approving the raising and appropriating of \$194,000.00 through the issuance of bonds for the Tyler Bridge Project.

XXI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,737.00 for necessary repairs to the Rowell Bridge in West Hopkinton and to discontinue the existing Capital Reserve Recycling Facility Fund and appropriate the funds therein towards the repairs pairs on Rowell Bridge. (Funds totalling approx. \$5,000.00)

XXII. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the state or any city, town or other governmental unit of the state to five percent.” (Submitted by petition.)

- XXIII. To see if the Town will vote to designate the following Town-owned woodlots, known as the Foote Lot, the Townes Lot, the Salt Shed Lot (excepting the area currently used in part as a stump dump and in part for salt and sand storage), and the Flanders Lot as shown on the map displayed at the Town Hall and Town Clerk's Office, as Town Forests, shall not be rented, leased or sold in whole or in part, for private development or private use, unless such use is in accordance with proper forest management and conservation as directed by the Hopkinton Conservation Commission under RSA 31:111.
- XXIV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised, sealed bids, the real estate formerly owned by Mr. & Mrs. Nile E. Faust located on the east side of Putney Hill Road and conveyed to the Town by deed of Sue B. Strickford, Tax Collector, dated November 8, 1978, and recorded in the Merrimack County Registry of Deeds, Book 1335, Page 26; and to further authorize the Selectmen to establish a minimum amount for which the property is to be sold and the terms and conditions of the sale in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:42.
- XXV. To see if the Town will vote to sell to Mrs. Edith Krzyzaniak of Hopkinton Road in Contoocook for the price of \$1.00 that parcel of land abutting hers, previously conveyed to the Town by deed of Sue B. Strickford, Tax Collector, dated November 16, 1976, and recorded in Merrimack County Registry of Deeds, Book 1286, Page 005 from Mrs. Joanne Breen as was the apparent intent of the voters at Town Meeting in March 1980.
- XXVI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the purpose of installing a heat alarm system in the Hopkinton Fire Station, Hopkinton Community Center and the Hopkinton Town Hall.
- XXVII. To see if the Town will vote to change the course of Sugar Hill Road by laying out a Class V Highway along the following course: Beginning at a point approximately 50' feet south of the intersection of Sugar Hill Road and Stumpfield Road; thence in a southerly direction along an arc a distance of 1500' feet to a point on the easterly side of Sugar Hill Road which is 90' feet south of the existing Benedict Driveway, the maximum degree of eastward relocation of the center line of Sugar Hill Road to be 120' feet. (Submitted by Petition) (Submitted without recommendation of the Selectmen).
- XXVIII. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Cemetery Trust

Trust Funds, the income to be used as directed, subject to such provisions as may be applicable thereto:

1. The sum of \$100.00 from Earl Geer, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 5, Section D, Plots 3 & 4 in the new section of the Old Hopkinton Cemetery.
2. The sum of \$400.00 from Richard Corliss, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 11, Plots 1, 2, 3, & 4 and Lot 12, Plots 1, 2, 3, & 4, Section E in the Contoocook Cemetery.
3. The sum of \$200.00 from Richard H. & Maude M. Kimball, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 1, Section A, Plots 1, 2, 3, & 4 in the Blackwater Cemetery.
4. The sum of \$50.00 from Alice M. Lessard, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 14, Section E, Plot 1 in the Blackwater Cemetery.
5. The sum of \$100.00 from George T. & Roseanna M. Dempsey, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 12, Section E, Plots 3 & 4 in the Blackwater Cemetery.
6. The sum of \$200.00 from Gordon B. & Rosalind P. Hanson, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 18, Section D, Plots 1, 2, 3, & 4 in the new section of the Old Hopkinton Cemetery.
7. The sum of \$100.00 from Alton C. & Margaret A. Kimball, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 3B, Section D., Plots 3 & 4 in the New Hopkinton Cemetery.
8. The sum of \$100 from the Estate of Shirley Kinniburgh plus interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 12A Section A, Plots 3 & 4 in the Contoocook Cemetery.
9. The sum of \$50.00 from Louis E. Ham, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 176, Section E, Plot 1 in the Contoocook Cemetery.
10. The sum of \$100.00 from Kenneth A. & Rilla F. Reid, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 31A, Section E, Plots 1 & 2 in the Contoocook Cemetery.
11. The sum of \$200.00 from Roderic A. & Virginia C. Call, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 41B, Section E, Plots 1, 2, 3, & 4 in the Contoocook Cemetery.
12. The sum of \$200.00 from Robert W. & Virginia C. Burke, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 11, Section A, Plots 1, 2, 3, & 4 in the Blackwater Cemetery.

XXIX. To see if the Town will vote to expend the income, during the current year, from the G. Everett Kelly Fund, one-half for the benefit of the Hopkinton Village Library and one-half for the benefit of Bates Library.

XXX. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$95.00 to be added to the principal of the Glenn M. Haselton Memorial Fund in 1980.

XXXI. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$35.00 to be added to the principal of the Katherine Eaton Semple Memorial Fund in 1980.

XXXII. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the 1980 tax levy.

XXXIII. To act on reports of Town Officers, Trustees and Committees for the year 1980.

XXXIV. To hear and transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE HOPKINTON BOARD OF SELECTMEN

1980, like previous years, presented the Board with a variety of difficult problems. Most were dealt with successfully, primarily due to the cooperation exhibited by the Town Officials, Employees and Citizens of Hopkinton.

The increasing cost of operating the Town has been of great concern to the Board. As you are well aware, property taxes increased by over 20% in 1980. \$.65 of the \$4.19 per \$100.00 paid in taxes is utilized to operate your municipality. We the Selectmen are faced with the task of continuing to provide necessary services at a time of rapidly rising costs. This problem was accentuated by the 5% budget reduction voted on at last year's Town Meeting. In order to enact this reduction, we were forced to postpone the purchase of equipment much needed by the Highway, Fire and Police Departments.

The Board has been vigorously exploring areas in which savings can be made without interrupting Town services. Town insurance policies for 1981 were put out to bid. Operation of the Sanitary Landfill will be bidden out for 1982. Selectmen are currently looking into other major expenses for which bids can be made. For the first time, all Town employees including department heads, are being evaluated to justify continued employment and salary increases. The Selectmen have thoroughly reviewed every single budget request prior to presentation to the Budget Committee. This review resulted in the deletion of various items requested by the Departments, Committees and Boards in order to keep the proposed budget as low as realistically possible. Additionally, the Board has altered the budget preparation process in a manner which will allow it to identify the true operating cost of each Town entity. It is hoped that the municipal budget presented to the voters in March will be one that the public can accept and at the same time will allow the Selectmen to effectively manage the Town. Should the budget be reduced at Town Meeting, the Board will find it necessary to request the voters to specify what services are to be effected.

A major emphasis of the Selectmen in 1980 has been to strengthen and control the Town's personnel policies. Based on recommendations of a Salary Study Committee, which met last summer, we have formally adopted a salary schedule for Town employees as well as a variety of personnel policies. This has served to standardize Town personnel management, to give the Selectmen greater control over the personnel process and to increase the accountability of Department Heads to the Board and the Board to you, the public.

As usual, Town business flourished in 1980. To better meet the needs of the public, the Board hired a part-time secretary. The Board continued to meet every Wednesday night and in November and December, met on Saturday mornings also to work on budgets.

In October, the Board regretfully accepted the resignation of one of its members—Wayne Woodard. Our appreciation is given to Wayne for the service he gave to the Town during his tenure as Selectman. To fill Wayne's position, we appointed Lloyd Peterson to serve until the March election.

As we enter 1981, we will continue to face difficult issues. We have outgrown our space in the Town Hall and must do something to alleviate this problem. The Board is presently investigating possible locations within existing Town buildings to rectify this situation while keeping cost at a minimum. We have an increasing work load that one full-time Secretary simply cannot handle. We have a municipal budget close to one million dollars, which must be managed effectively and efficiently. We believe that a part-time Board of Selectmen can resolve these problems but success will require the continued cooperation of the citizens of Hopkinton.

We would like to express our appreciation to Dale Wormhood, David Story, Chief Jordan and Chief Krzyzaniak the other Town employees and officials, the members of the Town's Committees and Boards who serve without compensation, and especially to the public for your assistance in helping us to manage Hopkinton. It is this cooperation which, in the end, makes it all worthwhile.

HOPKINTON PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ASSOCIATION NURSE'S REPORT

Because of the increasing costs of hospitalization, home health care has become readily accepted as the economical alternative.

The Home Health Care team involves the patient and his family, the doctor and nurse. The setting is the patient's own home, or that of a family member, utilizing equipment available in the home. (Some hospital supplies i.e. beds, walkers, commodes etc. are available for loan from the Hopkinton Fire Department.

The doctor, after diagnosing the problem, orders medications and treatments to be carried out by the remaining members of the Health Team.

The nurse may assist in the actual physical care and will teach the family to provide the necessary care between visits.

The family carries out the continuity of care, filling in the gaps between nursing or doctor's visits, and reports changes in the patient's condition to the remaining members of the team. The ultimate goal is to promote the health of the patient to maximum rehabilitation.

In Hopkinton, one full-time R.N. is employed. There is no fee for nursing services. Financial support comes from tax dollars, donations and Medicare payments for homebound patients needing skilled nursing care. Donations exceeded \$300, Medicare exceeding \$3,000 in 1980.

A Blood Pressure Clinic, open to all residents of Hopkinton, is being provided every other month at the Community Center. Please refer to "Along the Merrimack" section of the *Concord Monitor* for times and dates in this area.

The nurse is available Monday through Friday, 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. Telephone 746-3213; if no answer 746-4141. My thanks again this year to Kathy Schoch, Hopkinton Police Dispatcher, for answering my phone and taking messages.

1980 POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

1980 has seen changes within the Police Department. Officer Clifford Phelps, Jr. joined the force in April, to replace Bruce Price. Officer Phelps is a graduate of Hopkinton High School and a life long resident of our community. State law requires that all full time police officers be certified by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council. Certification requires attendance at the Council's Police Academy for six weeks of intensive training. Officer Phelps graduated from the Academy on October 31, 1980, with an outstanding record.

A recently passed state law requires that all part-time police officers become certified also. All part-time officers of this department have or are attending classes to fulfill the prerequisites for certification.

National figures show a drastic increase in juvenile drug involvement. This problem is here in Hopkinton. As much as all of us would like to think our children are not affected, they are. The School and the Police Department have initiated programs for both young people and parents. We feel a better understanding of drug abuse and the warning signs of drug use may prevent some of our young people from becoming statistics. Parents must assist the School and the Police Department in controlling the drug problem. I want parents to realize that the Police Department is not out to arrest every juvenile involved with drugs. I feel that we should be flexible enough to render assistance to the youth and council the parents in understanding how and why their child has become involved and how to help prevent further involvement.

The functions of a Police Department are many and varied. I am sure everyone realizes that crime investigation and prevention are major functions. The enforcement of traffic laws takes a great deal of time; but are the citizens of Hopkinton aware of all the services rendered by their Police Department. The daughter who calls from out-of-state because she cannot reach her mother who is elderly and lives alone understands when she is contacted with the information that it was just the phone out of order and her mother is well. Have you ever been out at one in the morning and seen the police cruiser parked in Contoocook Village and no officer in sight. If you had waited, you would see him emerge from behind one building or another. He has been checking doors and windows. Every business establishment is checked by the Department at least once every day, 365 days a year. Vacation checks are another service offered by the Department. People leaving for a day, a week, or for the winter can call and have their homes put on check. During 1978, when not only this community but the entire state saw a drastic increase in burglaries, not one of the homes on vacation check was "hit." We feel that the services rendered to the community are just as important as our enforcement activities.

On November 4, 1980, the Town of Hopkinton voted in the Dog Leash Law. How this law is enforced is up to the community. The stricter the enforcement the more money will be spent. The options open to the community include the hiring of a dog officer and the purchasing of a van or cage setup to transport

the animals and the building and maintaining of a dog pound. This option would cost the community in the area of \$5,000 per year without including the cost of building a shelter which must comply with state regulations. Another option, to allow the Police Department to continue its current enforcement. The current policy is to handle every dog complaint but not to go after every loose dog seen, unless it is causing a disturbance.

Everyone likes to hear a little praise for a job well done, so here I would like to give mine to the members of my department, members of the Fire Department and members of the Highway Department. Also a thank-you for continued support by the Selectmen.

HOPKINTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

Just as everything else seems to be on the increase, so are our calls. The fire apparatus made 177 runs, an increase of 26 over last year, and correspondingly the ambulance made 268 runs, an increase of 11—both an all time high, breaking the record set last year.

The manufacturing plants in town have allowed us to preplan their facilities and conduct drills which involves laying and charging of lines and playing streams around the structures. Many of these have involved mutual aid towns who respond with men, equipment, pumpers and tankers.

Astles Lumber Company gave us their old mill and storage building for live training, again this involved mutual aid towns and very valuable lessons were learned. The Breen house was not immediately disposed of, as it was used for many hours of valuable air pack training, not only by this Department but also the surrounding towns.

The first year of Central Dispatch has worked very well, with the new Beech Hill antenna giving a stronger signal to all parts of our town, as well as Webster.

The opening of the new Tyler Bridge has cut the response time to the Blackwater District, especially the heavy equipment which had to go around via Duston Road.

The men have been building a new tank truck. Starting with a military 6 x 6 (2½ ton truck), they built and installed a 1300 gallon tank with a 8" quick-dump valve, that when used in a tanker shuttle can dump its load in 90 seconds. A portable pump has been mounted temporarily beside the tank until funds can be earned for a permanent mounting. This truck has been built at no expense to the Town, as the \$900.00 invested has come from the firefighter's own treasury, which is earned through fund raising projects. This piece of apparatus is replacing a 1947 Chevrolet truck.

Severe winter storms and a dry summer have taxed your Department such as on August 1st, when we responded to 6 alarms in 68 minutes from the Concord to Warner lines.

With everyone trying to beat the energy crunch with the installation of wood burning equipment, chimney fires have increased from 17 last year to 25 this past year. Discarded hot ashes started 2 brush fires and burned a hole through a barn floor. Ashes should be placed in a covered metal container outside, preferably on a sandy surface well away from buildings and other combustibles.

**REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND
STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE**

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

The year 1980 saw three (3) road projects completed, (1) the 4,000 feet of Briar Hill Road started in 1979, (2) the 1,500 feet of Penacock leading to the new Tyler Bridge and (3) the new bridge itself. The Tyler bridge is a great asset to the Town of Hopkinton, especially when considering that the cost to the Town was minimal compared to the overall cost of the bridge.

Work has also progressed on the gravel roads in Town, trying to upgrade them so that the maintenance cost and labor will be minimal. However, available monies and man-hours limit the amount of work that can be done on any of the Town roads.

There are approximately 60 miles of tarred Town roads in Hopkinton. In order to keep them upgraded in any way we should be sealing at least 25% or 25 miles of road per year. However, the cost of asphalt has increased approximately 300% in the last five years; therefore we now seal on-the-average of four miles per year. At this present rate, some roads will not be sealed or treated for ten to fifteen years. Lack of proper care will cause greater cracking and create more pot-holes which will eventually cost the Town a larger amount of money for re-building and repairing.

For budget consideration, it should be noted that most materials used by the Highway Dept. are oil related and have increased in price at least 100% over the past 4 years alone.

The 1980 Highway Department budget, after budget cuts levied at Town Meeting, was reduced to the same budget appropriation as fiscal 1979. With the inflation rate presently at 15% and rising, the only way in which the Highway department can stay within its budget is to cut down on the use of materials, i.e.; tar, cold-patch, etc. We have already cut the use of salt by approximately 30% per storm. The result of using less salt of course is that some ice and snow will remain on the roads longer, however with reasonable caution and driving speeds, there should be no problem.

In 1981, we are planning a major road improvement project at the Briar Hill entrance to Broad Cove Road, eliminating the dangerous intersection at the approach to Broad Cove Road. This project will require the majority of the New Construction and T. R. A. monies received from the State.

It should also be noted that in the last five years the Town has accepted four new roads and has extended four old roads for various reasons. If roads are to be added, there will have to be equipment and monies for other materials to grade, plow and otherwise maintain these roads.

In 1980, a maintenance program was initiated for the recreational facilities in Hopkinton. Although I feel that there is still a great deal of room for improvement, there was indeed a noticeable difference in the condition of the park and field areas, especially George's Park. George's Park was completed mainly through federal grant monies with very little cost being born by the Town. Most of the maintenance costs of the parks were absorbed by the Highway Depart-

ment this year and efforts have proved rewarding to all those who use these facilities.

I would like to thank the citizens of Hopkinton for their patience. Most residents appreciate the fact that money and time dictate how much can be accomplished in any given year and their understanding means a great deal.

TOWN POLICY FOR WINTER MAINTENANCE

1. SNOW PLOWING: The Town vehicles begin plowing when the snow has accumulated 2 to 3 inches. After roads are clear, sanding and salting will begin.

2. WINTER FREEZING RAIN STORM: It is important to note that *salt* or *sand* is wasted if applied before rain stops. There is nothing the highway department can do during a freezing rain storm. However, as soon as the rain stops, salt and sand will be applied to the roads.

3. CLEAN ROAD POLICY: The Town of Hopkinton, like most communities and cities, does not have a clean road policy. In other words, all roads and streets will not be kept completely clear of snow and therefore only caution can be advised for winter driving. Salt will be applied to all tar roads, however where the shaded areas are found, there will be some snow or ice spots. The amount of salt is limited and will be used sparingly. Dirt roads will be sanded, but a build-up of ice cannot be helped so re-sanding is necessary; but with ice under the sand, it still makes instant stops impossible.

4. PLOW ROUTES: Each plow route is approximately 15 miles long and takes 3 to 4 hours to cover. So, if plowing is started with two inches of snow, by the time the vehicle finishes the route 3 or 4 hours later, there could be up to 6 inches of snow on the first part of his route. Therefore, during a heavy snow-storm, at times, there will be snow on the roads.

The Committee met and agreed to initially prepare a five year projection of capital expenditures and major replacements and repairs. The Committee then requested the Selectmen, the School Board, the Precinct Commissioners and various department heads to submit estimates of their needs over the next five years. What follows is a summary of the responses we received. The Committee has not passed judgement on the list but expects to hold public hearings in 1981, prior to adjusting the list.

HOPKINTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During 1980 the Commission held eleven regular monthly meetings and in addition several workshops. We published a newsletter for the first time which was distributed with the Town Report.

Our Commission's secretary, William Fuller, resigned in March and together with his wife Joyce, entered The Peace Corps for two years. They are living in Belize City, Central America. The Selectmen appointed Ronald Klemarczyk as his replacement.

We continued our educational program and sponsored a high school student, Kathy Orsborne, to the New Hampshire Youth Conservation Camp. Also, we have a favorable response in our effort to integrate conservation education in the first and third grade science studies.

The 1980 Town Meeting authorized the management of Town Forests to the Conservation Commission. This resulted in much effort being made by the Commission to place Town Forests and Town owned woodlots under proper forest management planning. This program seeks to utilize the forests full potential through sustained yield and multiple-use.

The definite location and boundaries of two town forest lots and three town owned woodlots totalling 210 acres were determined. Further research is now being done in several other lots. Boundary surveys were completed on the Salt Shed Lot and the Gould Forest Reservation and 2600 feet of boundary line blazed and painted. Two boundary line discrepancies were resolved with the aid of the abutting landowners. The discovery of three past timber cutting encroachments on two Town lots exemplifies the need for properly marked and

maintained boundaries. The Towne Lot and the Foote Lot are scheduled for surveys and all other surveyed boundaries are to be blazed and painted.

Forest inventories were conducted on the Gould Forest Reservation and the Salt Shed Lot by the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development, Division of Forests and Lands. The inventories provided a forest type map, timber volume estimates, and forest management plans that included recommendations involving timber, wildlife, education, and recreation. Both lots showed high timber potential and many other management opportunities. Inventories of other lots will be scheduled when their boundary maps are finished.

Last spring the Commission sponsored a workshop for landowners interested in applying for Current Use under the Forest Land category. The effort proved beneficial to those involved and will be repeated in 1981.

Upon the request of the Selectmen, the Commission has assisted in reviewing both new and renewal applications for Current Use. We make recommendations as to the proper Current Use category and compliance with the designated criteria

CIVIL DEFENSE

This year has been a very busy one for the Civil Defense Department as we took on two major projects. These projects involved the completion of our campaign to obtain the "Jaws of Life" rescue tool and moving and erecting our new Rescue Building.

In the spring a building donated by the Merrimack Valley Telephone Company, and located on their property was dismantled by Rescue Squad members and moved to its present location at the westerly end of the Fire Department's parking lot. Throughout the summer the members of the Rescue Squad gave up many weekends to furnish their time and effort to insure that the project would be completed. We are pleased to report that the Civil Defense Department and Rescue Squad have now moved into their new quarters. We would like to take this opportunity to thank those individuals and firms who donated time, services, materials, and technical assistance to this project. Without their assistance the job would have been much more difficult, if not impossible.

The "Jaws of Life" project was completed in July upon receiving the Hurst Power Rescue Tool. At that time a three-hour course on the operation of the tool was conducted by its Distributor. Since that time, along with working on the new building, many hours of training have been completed so that all Rescue Squad personnel would be proficient in its use. This project culminated after two years of effort and was made possible through the donations of many organizations and individuals for this specific purpose. Also, the receipts from the Rescue Squad's annual auctions for the past two years were ear-marked for this purpose. Another major contributing factor to the success of this project was our stove raffle. This phase of our campaign was made possible by the donation of the antique stove by Mr. & Mrs. James Beatner, formerly of Hopkinton. Again, we would like to thank those individuals and organizations who so graciously contributed directly to the project as well as those who supported us through their participation in the raffle and annual auctions. During the ensuing year, other than completing minor detail work on the new building, we are contemplating no major projects. We are, however, planning to accelerate our training so that we may be even more proficient in the tasks that we may be called upon to perform.

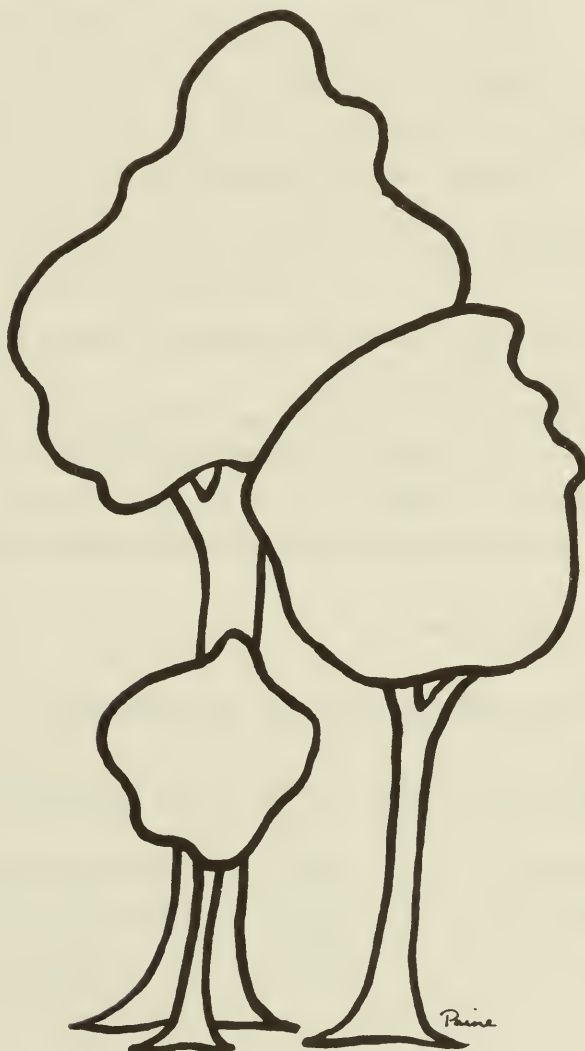

Meeting reconvened on Wednesday evening, March 12, 1980 at 7:30 P.M.

Rev. Robert B. Daggett gave the invocation.

The Girl Scouts presented a short program with the Color Guards leading in the flag salute and the singing of "America the Beautiful."

The Moderator asked for a moment of silence as a tribute to Angus P. Derry, a long time resident and for many years served as Surveyor of Wood and Lumber.

The Moderator gave the results of the voting and stated that it had been announced Tuesday at the end of the balloting and declared the Officers elected.

The Warrant had been read by the Moderator as required by the Statute at the opening of the meeting Tuesday and the Articles would be properly presented.

Selectman Wayne Woodard paid tribute to Thomas Johnson, Jr. for his 14 years of service and dedication as a member of the Board of Selectmen. A Resolution was also read by Wayne and seconded by Selectman Janet Krzyzaniak. Janet also stated that the Town Report was dedicated to him. The Moderator presented Tom with a clock and desk set in behalf of the Selectmen. Tom responded.

Article V: The following resolution offered by David Packard and moved its adoption, seconded by Janet Krzyzaniak:

Resolved by the Town of Hopkinton, in Town Meeting convened, that the sum of \$651,900.00, as enumerated in the Town Warrant and printed in the Town Report, be and is hereby raised and appropriated for general government operation. (The Budget Committee recommends \$649,900.00 of said appropriation and does not recommend the remaining \$2,000.00 of same.)

Warren Hedden moved to amend the article by deleting the lifeguards salary from the operating budget. No second. Not actionable.

Edward Leadbeater proposed an amendment that the amount appropriated under Article 5 be the sum of \$617,500.00 which is approximately a reduction of 5% of the amount that has been recommended by the Budget Committee. Mr. Leadbeater offered that as an amendment. Seconded by Richard A. Hampe.

Mr. Leadbeater continued, if this is not the sense of the meeting to make a reduction of about this amount, I think we had better get on with the business and adopt the whole thing.

The Moderator recognized a gentleman who inquired if it was the sense of Mr. Leadbeater's amendment that if it were passed in the amount of \$617,500.00, would the Budget Committee have to go back and apportion it out again—in other words, if Mr. Leadbeater's proposed reduction passes, how would it be apportioned? The Moderator clarified that, as he understood Mr. Leadbeater's amendment, it would reduce the overall appropriation by 5 percent. It would then be up to the Selectmen to cut the total budget by 5 percent in whatever area they saw fit. The Moderator then called the question on the amendment. He stated the amendment was open to further amendment and discussion. No amendment or discussion being offered, the Moderator called for the vote and declared the amendment adopted. The Moderator then declared the question was on the amended Article 5, to raise and appropriate \$617,500.00 for Town General Expenses. The Moderator declared the article was open to further amendment and discussion. The Moderator then recognized Mr. Johnson (Chairman of the Board of Selectmen) who spoke to what the reduction in the budget could mean to the Town, but not necessarily what it would mean to the Town. Mr. Johnson commented, amongst other things, that there has to be some happy medium or we are going to be back at a special meeting trying to consider a way to operate the rest of the year. He offered that as a comment to the amended article. The Moderator called for any further action on the article. Mr. Degnan called the previous question and the moderator called for the vote.

The Moderator declared the article as amended, was adopted in the affirmative by a voice vote.

Article VI: The following resolution offered by David Packard and moved its adoption, seconded by Wayne Woodard:

Resolved by the Town of Hopkinton, in town meeting convened, that the sum of \$5,000.00 be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new gravel pit. (This item submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)

(This item submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)

Article failed.

Article XIII: The following resolution offered by David Packard and moved its adoption, seconded by Janet Krzyzaniak:

Resolved by the Town of Hopkinton, in town meeting convened, that the sum of \$14,074.00 be and is hereby raised and appropriated for town road aid (the State to contribute \$12,238.00.)

If the income from the Town forests exceeds \$3,000.00 in any fiscal year, the Conservation Commission shall recommend to the Selectmen whether such excess is necessary for maintenance of the Town forests, and the Selectmen shall determine whether such excess shall be expended for maintenance of the Town forests or whether such excess shall be returned to the General Fund. The Commission shall prepare an annual report describing their activities and making recommendations for the forthcoming year.

Resolved by the Town of Hopkinton, in town meeting convened, to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised, sealed bids, the real estate formerly owned by Mrs. Joanne Breen, located at the southside of Route 103 in Hopkinton and conveyed to the Town by deed of Sue B. HOPKINTON VILLAGE PRECINCT

1980 was uneventful until late September when the main pump and the reserve pump at the Water Department well both failed. The failure of both pumps necessitated the emergency rental of two smaller pumps to provide water to the water customers. The time consuming legal process finally resulted in a Special Precinct Meeting, which was held on December 10, 1980, and at which the Precinct voted to authorize the Precinct Commissioners and the Water Department to spend up to \$9,500 to meet the expenses already incurred and to provide permanent and reserve pumping capability. The mid December authorization meant that any permanent changes at the pumping station would be postponed until warmer Spring weather. The Water Department will make a complete report at the Annual Precinct Meeting in March.

The pump failures highlighted two particular needs of the water system. The Water Department needs a large enough repair reserve fund to enable it to act quickly when it is faced with an emergency. This would save the Water Department and the water customers the unnecessary expenses that are incurred with temporary measures. Secondly, the totally pumped nature of the water system, i.e. no elevated storage reservoir, means that when there is no electricity or when there is a pump failure, there is no water. There are several areas in the system where bleeders are necessary during the winter and a failure during that time of the year could result in problems with frozen water mains and individual services. We do not have elevated storage now because we have not been able to afford it, however, the pressure tank at the water works has nearly met its life expectancy and may have to be repaired or replaced in the near future. This is the time to investigate the alternatives and the costs and benefits that are associated with each choice. This is a matter which should be discussed at the Annual Meeting.

The Precinct Building was painted in 1980 and it certainly is a tremendous improvement. The painters who were on the roof to paint the hose tower felt that the shingles should be replaced. The roof was patched several years ago, so this report is no great surprise. The Precinct Commissioners will budget for this item and will ask for bids for the job.

We look forward to seeing all of the Precinct residents at the Annual Meeting in March. Your continued involvement and interest in Precinct affairs can only be a benefit to the community.

CONTOOCCOOK FIRE PRECINCT

In the course of routine maintenance and emergency repair work this year, it was found that a few gate valves could not be fully closed, thus making it necessary in some instances to suspend service throughout the entire Precinct in order to perform the necessary repairs. By correcting this difficulty, it should, in the event of a water main break or other malfunction, be possible to isolate the problem area without inconvenience to a large number of consumers. The year has also brought an increased burden resulting from water sampling, testing and reporting requirements in connection with Federal and State safe drinking water statutes. In this regard, Commissioner and Superintendent Norman E. Greenly has obtained his license as a certified waterworks operator in accordance with legislation enacted during the 1979 session of the General Court.

The Preliminary Engineering Study of the water supply system prepared in response to a directive from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission to all communities using surface water supplies and relying on chlorination as the only means of treatment, has been approved by the state, and it is anticipated that the final report will be delivered to the Precinct Commissioners prior to the annual meeting in March. Copies of the report will be placed in the Bates Library for use by interested persons. Since the issues raised by this study are of great importance to the Precinct, it is suggested that a committee be established to review the report and present its recommendations as to an appropriate course of action at the 1982 annual Precinct meeting.

We are pleased to note that during the past summer, in contrast to previous years, there were only a few occasions when outside water consumption drew the reservoir down to dangerously low levels. The Precinct Commissioners take this opportunity to thank the consumers for heeding the restrictions on outside water use we find necessary to insure adequate fire protection.

In June of 1980, Mr. Warren F. Kimball passed away at the age of 91. Over the years, Mr. Kimball devoted extraordinary amounts of time and effort to Precinct affairs, without compensation, working to improve the water system. His interest in the Precinct never waned, and in 1978, he authored a brief history of the origin and subsequent development of the water supply and distribution system—quite an accomplishment since, through time, many of the old records have been either misplaced or destroyed. For his continued concern as well as his generous contributions of knowledge and effort, the residents of Contoocook owe a great debt of gratitude to Mr. Warren F. Kimball.

BONUSES

This account was inserted this year based on discussions with citizens of Hopkinton during the Public Budget Hearing and the annual School Board Meeting held last year. Questions arose as to why we should not pay bonuses to staff who have shown exceptional dedication throughout the year.

NEW EQUIPMENT

Included in this account is an office copier valued at \$3,300.00 for the Maple Street School, folding chairs for the gym \$1,000.00, file cabinets \$480.00, planer for the shop \$6,284.00, calculators for the Math Departemnt \$400.00 and new equipment for the Science and Social Studies Department for \$890.00.

REPLACEMENT EQUIPMENT

AUDITORS' REPORT

Members of the Board:

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Hopkinton School District for the year ended June 30, 1980 and have issued our report thereon, dated October 31, 1980. As part of our examination, we reviewed and tested the District's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing and extent of other such auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements.

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgement by management.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgement, carelessness or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by management with respect to the estimates and judgements required in the preparation of financial statements. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation of the District's system of internal accounting control for the year ended June 30, 1980 would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system. Such study and evaluation disclosed the following conditions that we believe to be material weaknesses.

RECEIPTS

The receipts of the District are not recorded on a timely basis at the District office. We feel receipts should be recorded when received by the office in order to have a current record of receipts and for comparison with estimated revenues. When the District adopts a double-entry system this weakness must be resolved or the system will not function.

FIDELITY BONDING

We noted that the custodian of the Student Activities Fund is not bonded. All District employees with access to cash should be covered by a fidelity bond. District officials have stated that this situation has been rectified.

Several other areas while not material weaknesses in internal accounting control, merit your attention.

1) INVENTORY OF FIXED ASSETS

As is the practice with many N. H. School Districts, the District has not maintained a record of its fixed assets. As part of their long-term policies, District officials should initiate fixed asset records. Cost or consideration given is the generally accepted method for valuing fixed assets, and should be recorded for all new acquisitions. Where adequate documentation of cost is unavailable for existing fixed assets, an estimate of original cost is an acceptable standard under accounting principles for governmental entities. The existence of fixed asset records will not only aid District officials in the control of these assets, but should be an invaluable tool in long-range planning. Although each school has an inventory of fixed assets at market value for insurance purposes, an inventory of fixed assets at cost should be integrated into the accounting system at the School District office.

2) SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS BUDGET

Both the Food Services Fund and Federal Projects Fund should adopt a detailed budget of revenues and expenditures, and integrate the budget information into the accounting system. Budgeting revenues and expenditures in total does not offer an adequate measurement of budget and actual comparisons during the year, or afford District officials an adequate method for control. Adopting a realistic budget in the Food Service Fund should help eliminate the deficit which has occurred for two consecutive fiscal years.

3) ATHLETICS

Currently, most of the athletic receipts and disbursements are through the Student Activity Fund. We recommend that all the receipts and disbursements be through the General Fund of the School District in order to maintain control.

4) ACCOUNTING SYSTEM

The School District is currently using an automated record of cash disbursements. The *N.H. Financial Accounting Handbook* requires the use of a double-entry accrual basis of accounting. Due to software problems with a new computer system, the District has not converted to a double-entry system. However, the District does have the capability to use such a system and we recommend they do so as soon as is practicable.

5) SCHOOL LUNCH SALES

Adequate controls do not exist over school lunch sales receipts. We recommend that the District investigate the feasibility of implementing control mechanisms at the point of sale.

PUBLICATION REQUIREMENT

The provisions of R.S.A. 71A:21 require that only this letter be published in the next annual report of the School District.

However, we suggest that you consider the publication of the entire report which includes auditor's opinion, financial statements and notes to financial statements. No portion of either the auditor's opinion, financial statements or notes to financial statements may be published separately.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Hopkinton School District for their assistance during the course of our audit.

In reply to your transmittal and commentary letter of October 31, 1980, the Hopkinton School District presents the following:

I. RECEIPTS

There is proper recording of all receipts in meeting State of New Hampshire requirements by the District School Treasurer. When proper programming is completed for our Computer located at the Supervisory Administrative Unit office improvement will be shown for recording of receipts on a more timely basis. This will also afford the district the opportunity to adopt a double entry accounting system. This system is planned for implementation before the end of fiscal year 1981.

II. FIDELITY BONDING

The custodian of the student activities fund was added to the fidelity bond.

III. INVENTORY OF FIXED ASSETS

An inventory of Fixed Assets is currently maintained at each school building by the School administration. A copy was not maintained at the School Administrative Unit No. 24 office as the inventory is voluminous in nature. To comply with this request we plan to copy the inventory and forward to School Administrative Unit No. 24 office. Acquisitions and/or deletions to this inventory will be maintained by both offices in the future.

IV. SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS BUDGET

Beginning with the budget of July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981 control of Special Revenue Funds budget was transferred to the School Administrative Unit No. 24 office. Acceptance and implementation of this recommendation was accomplished by this transfer.

V. ATHLETIC FUND

Control of the Athletic Fund will be transferred with the 1981-1982 budget to the School Administrative Unit No. 24 office. This action will conform to your recommendation for this account.

VI. ACCOUNTING SYSTEM

As mentioned in Item No. I the district intends to implement a double entry bookkeeping system as soon as the Computer located in School Administrative Unit office is programmed therefore.

VII. SCHOOL LUNCH SALES

A committee has been formed to study school lunch sales and implement any improvements that deems necessary for control of lunch receipts. A report from this committee will be required prior to the new fiscal year. Implementation of their suggestions during the upcoming fiscal year will conform to your recommendations.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD – 1980

The Hopkinton School Board is pleased to report to the town that the educational system in Hopkinton is continually being studied, revised, improved, and implemented. We, the school board, have been privileged to be closely involved in these procedures.

Throughout the past year, various staff members, team leaders, and department heads, have presented an over-view of their curriculum speciality to the Board. This has been invaluable to us in keeping updated on the academic direction of individual courses as well as maintaining a comprehensive profile of our public school education.

Along this line, the Accountability Project has proceeded toward the ultimate goal of a K-12 co-ordinated curriculum. Work was done this summer involving twelve staff members. This summer curricula schedule focused on the areas of music, industrial arts, physical education, health, social studies, and science.

In the fall a workshop was presented to the Hopkinton teachers to share work that was completed in the summer and, also, to continue efforts toward further curriculum development and implementation. Judith Hessler co-ordinated the summer work as well as the fall workshop. The Board has commended Ms. Hessler for her capable leadership in this area, and the staff for their dedication to this project.

In late April of 1980, it was discovered that the septic system at Hopkinton High School was in critical condition and in need of immediate attention. S. Wilson Excavating, Inc. was hired to repair the system. The work was completed during the April school vacation so that classes at the high school were not interrupted. The entire 1980-1981 budgeted contingency fund was expended for these necessary repairs.

In the early fall of 1980, the public school transportation contract was transferred from C. Kimball to Valley Transportation. This action was taken at Mr. Kimball's request, and, with his assistance, was made smoothly and without any interruption of service.

We, the school board, have conscientiously worked to fulfill our obligations and responsibilities to the students, residents, and taxpayers of Hopkinton. At this time, we wish to thank them as well as the administration and professional staff for their co-operation and support during the past year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISORY ADMINISTRATIVE STUDY COMMITTEE

January 2, 1981

By action by the Town Meeting, a Supervisory Administrative Study Committee was formed and charged to determine the desirability of forming a separate Supervisory Unit serving only the Hopkinton schools. Hopkinton schools presently fall under the jurisdiction of Supervisory Administrative Unit 24 with offices presently in Henniker. The Town of Hopkinton pays a prorated share of the expenses of the Supervisory Administrative Unit. In 1980-81, Hopkinton's share will be approximately \$100,000. It is estimated this will increase to approximately \$150,000 in 1983-84.

Hopkinton receives certain administrative, instructional and academic support services from the Supervisory Unit. These services include supervision and evaluation, curriculum development staff, development coordinator of Federal programs, special student needs and assignment, and guidance and psychological services. Additionally, the following administrative services are provided: budget preparation and control, purchasing, accounting, recruiting, public relations, State, Federal and local recordkeeping, health services, transportation planning, administration and enforcement of policies and regulations. A separate Supervisory Administrative Unit for Hopkinton Schools would have to provide all of the services mentioned above and must be staffed in accordance with specific State regulations.

A school district wishing to initiate withdrawal from an existing Supervisory Administrative Unit may initiate such action by a majority vote of the school board resulting in a petition article placed in the district warrant. The State Board of Education will review, investigate and act upon a petition within 90 days of its submission. In its consideration of such petition, the State Board will consider the geographic proximity of districts to be included in the unit, as well as the student population in the proposed unit. The State considers that 2,000 students in general, represent a minimum economic unit for a free-standing supervisory administrative unit. Additionally, the State Board considers carefully the effect on the remaining districts in a supervisory unit when a proposal for withdrawal is submitted.

The committee concludes that the formation of a Supervisory Administrative Unit serving only the schools in the Town of Hopkinton would result in benefits to the Town resulting from the full time attention and dedication of the supervisory and administrative personnel. The Town would benefit additionally from a greater degree of self-determination and control. The cost to create and establish such a supervisory unit for the Town, both initially and on an on-going basis, would be equal to and most probably greater than that now paid as its share of the operating cost of SAU-24. The student population is substantially below what the State considers critical mass and the effect of the withdrawal of Hopkinton on the remainder of SAU-24 would be considerable.

If the Town deems the advantages of having its own supervisory adminis-

trative unit outweigh the increase in costs, the committee makes the following recommendation:

That the Town employ, for a period of one year on a contractual basis, an individual qualified to assume the role of superintendent.

That during the course of that year, the individual prepare the proper documentation and gather the required data to meet State requirements to petition for the formation of a new unit.

That upon approval by the State of such a plan, that individual assume the role of superintendent and, conversely, if the petition is denied, the individual's employment be terminated in accordance with the one year consulting contract.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL MESSAGE

To the Citizens of the Hopkinton School District

Way back in 1647 when public education was born in this nation, schools were basically asked to teach the traditional three R's; Readin', 'Ritin' and 'Rithmetic. Wilson Riles, state superintendent of schools in California, put it well when he said that today schools are being asked to do what people used to ask God to do. When I look at the myriad of tasks we have, I don't think he's far from wrong.

Exactly what is public education being asked to accomplish? Whether through State or Federal laws or through local directive, today's schools are being asked to feed students breakfast, lunch and snack; check students' vision, hearing and teeth; show students how to brush their teeth; teach young people good nutrition; provide special services for the gifted and the handicapped; provide recreation; teach students to respect others and to respect themselves; show young people how to ride their bikes safely and how to drive cars; and convince young people not to use drugs.

All of these are great challenges, but where does it stop? Education has accepted them because they must be done. A hungry child can't learn. A disrespectful, disruptive child can't learn. In the past the family or other agencies handled these responsibilities. But today they fall upon our public schools. Even with these additional, time-consuming tasks, local public education is achieving many successes. The following is a sampling:

- Discipline has improved. Firm but fair administration of discipline by teachers and principals have been responded to by the over 90 percent of our student body who cause no significant disciplinary problems.
- 76% of last year's Seniors went on to further education.
- Participation by our students in the Concord Area Vocational School is expanding thereby providing expanded program opportunities for our Juniors and Seniors that could not be available locally without excessive cost.
- Quality services, as required by law, are being provided for 50 handicapped students.
- A Unit-wide Community Education Program has been re-activated under the able direction of Jolene Schillinger and is functioning on a financially self-sufficient basis.
- Accountability Programs and programs for Gifted and Talented students are being developed.
- The First Annual School Boards Awards Program provided recognition to the following teachers for their teaching excellence in 1979-80: Sharon Baker, Thomas Nerbone, Andre Dusseault, Augustine Moynihan, Francis Muzzey, Wendy Wetterer, Linda Allen and Judith Hessler.
- Six high school students received regional and national awards in the area of Music.
- Student, teacher and community drug education workshops were de-

veloped and implemented.

- Andy Dusseault received a Federal Grant for implementing an innovative social science program at the high school level.
- Science teacher, Bill Kulbacki, was one of a select few to participate in the National Science Superior's Association Summer Leadership Conference.
- A new Science program is being introduced in grades 1-4.
- Dick Blood received a 1980 Creative Recognition Award for English Teaching from the National Association for Creative Children and Adults.
- Gwennie Peters has had a leadership role in the Unit-wide effort to develop Gifted and Talented programs.
- A new Social Studies program is being implemented in the upper elementary school grades.
- An accelerated grouping has begun in Grades 7 and 8, to provide expanded learning opportunities for better students.
- Computer education has been introduced to students in the eighth grade.

These, and many other positive developments have been achieved thru the hard work and commitment of the whole school community. While more remains to be accomplished, I am sure your continued support and cooperation will result in continued advances.

HOPKINTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

The two elementary schools in Hopkinton continue to have a combined enrollment of 450+ pupils, distributed among 16 classes, grades kindergarten through sixth. Class size varies from small classes of 15 pupils in the afternoon kindergarten and the readiness classes to a high of 31 in each of the three fourth grade classes.

We have registered 18 new students since September 4, while 15 have transferred from the District.

Elementary staff members new to Hopkinton in 1980 are: Wendy Tulloch, kindergarten, Maple Street School; Grace Jager, grade 5, replacing Wendy Wetterer, who is on a year's leave of absence; Marianne Maconi, Art Teacher, replacing Christine Bell, who also has a one year leave of absence; Elaine Loiselle, Learning Abilities, Harold Martin School.

Elementary school staff have "scratched and scraped" to hold the line on instructional budgets in spite of inflation. I feel we have been successful in this effort, and still managed to update curriculum as we had scheduled on our five year curriculum plan.

The American Book Reading series has been continued through grade 5, we have adopted a new science series grades 1-6, and replaced the outdated social studies program with a current, more conventional textbook.

A Mathematics Study Committee is currently looking at a number of math texts with intentions of making a recommendation to the School Board for a replacement of the 1972 math series. We have money in the 1981 budget to commence this replacement.

A special request is being made, Supervisory Union-wide, for District monies to fund a proposal on behalf of talented and gifted children in Hopkinton schools. This request, and that of a copy machine for the elementary schools are the sum total of any money which does not represent program maintenance or needed replacement.

We have made no request for new positions this budget year, although an elementary counselor is still needed, and the art program, taught by one teacher, grades 1-12, is below standard.

Adequate monies must be requested on a yearly basis to keep our school plants in good operating condition. The same applies to items which either wear out or get broken and cannot be repaired.

All of us at the elementary level are very conscious, both of the sagging economy and inflation. We have done our best to make budget requests which are conservative, yet adequate to offer a respectable education to children in Hopkinton schools.

HOPKINTON HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Hopkinton High School enjoyed a beautiful day on June, 1980 for its 76th commencement. The Class of 1980 consisted of fifty-five graduates. Sixty-one percent went on to a four year college and eleven percent to a two year school. The remaining percent entered the military service and/or directly into the world of work.

At the beginning of the current school year, the enrollment by grades was: Grade 7, 76; Grade 8, 70; Grade 9, 71; Grade 10, 66; Grade 11, 70; Grade 12, 77. The actual enrollment for the next decade appears to remain stable. This is an advantage especially for the organization and planning of instruction.

The Administration, during the 79/80 school year, reviewed conditions in the high school in an effort to identify, assess and prepare goals in harmony with the demands of the new decade upon us.

A wide range survey was designed and distributed to all staff members and members of the Student Council. The tabulated results yielded those conditions which planning ought to consider as desirable goals to achieve.

The goals presently being studied in a joint effort by the Administration, Department Heads, Faculty and Student Council are:

1. Accelerated Grouping—monitor, evaluate and adjust
2. Final Evaluation, Midyears
3. Vocational Education Program in Concord
4. Financial Aid Booklet
5. Homework (establish school policy)
6. Drug Education Program
7. The curriculum offering of Practical Arts, Music, Art in 7th & 8th Grades
8. 7th and 8th Grade Faculty, Facilities, and Intramurals
9. Grading (establish school policy and procedures)
- 10.. Physical Education; implication on scheduling and overall curriculum
11. Scheduling Time Table prepared
12. Accountability Committee
13. Analysis of Days in and out of school
14. Detention
15. Grade reporting

This is a very ambitious task. It is the kind of challenge the Hopkinton High School staff wants to accomplish.

In addition, there are four specific areas being studied by individual committees. They are: The Organization and structure of the English Curriculum, Science Program for 7th and 8th grade students, Building Maintenance; assignments and procedures, and a study of the Hot Lunch Program.

In an effort to gain parent/community input, we will hold informal sessions starting the first week of February, 1981. Each of the five departments will also host separate open house meetings on five different evenings. The scope and sequence of the curriculum will be described as well as the overall teaching

methods and techniques used in the classroom. The meeting dates are: Math - 12/3; Social Studies - 1/14; Practical Arts - 2/4; Science - 5/20; English - 3/1981.

The students at the high school continue to be an active group with a very high participation rate in a variety of activities.

The National Honor Society at last year's formal induction was proud to have Mr. William H. Milne, former Principal as the guest speaker. This year the group has a total of 20 members. During the traditional candlelight induction ceremony, Mr. Philip S. Dunlap was the guest speaker. In May, 1981 the National Honor Society will host a Bloodmobile for the Town of Hopkinton.

This is the year for the German Exchange Program to travel to Germany. The French Exchange Program plans to initiate their exchange trips next year. We are also engaged in a Teacher Exchange Program this year. Miss Kathleen Perry is teaching Math in Northern Ireland while Mr. David Wright is teaching here in Hopkinton.

The many students participating in the music program under the direction of Mr. Thomas Nerbonne presented an excellent Christmas Concert for the school and community.

In general, there is an increase of student involvement in all aspects of school affairs. This has provided us with another source to assist in the decision-making process.

As this year matures, we find the school a place where a diverse number of events and activities are happening.

We need your continuing support and participation as we strive to meet our goals to insure educational excellence.

REPORT OF ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING HOPKINTON SCHOOL DISTRICT

March 26, 1980

At the duly appointed time and place, Moderator Gary B. Richardson read the warrant of the Hopkinton School District calling for the election of school district officers. The Moderator then declared the polls opened at 8:00 A.M., to remain open until 6:00 P.M.

In accordance with the duly posted warrant of the Hopkinton School District, the School District Moderator Gary B. Richardson called the annual meeting of said district to order at 7:00 P.M., March 26, 1980 at the Hopkinton High School Gymnasium.

The Moderator read the Warrant.

The Moderator recognized School Board Chairman, Mr. Desmond, for the purpose of making a motion, seconded by Mrs. Wilder:

I move that the District vote to suspend the rules and move immediately to take up articles 2 and 3 as presented in the posted warrant.

The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE II

The Moderator recognized Mr. Desmond who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mr. MacDonald:

I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,187,500.00 for the purpose of building, furnishing, equipping and renovating additions to existing High School Building within the Hopkinton School District in accordance with plans developed by the Hopkinton School Board, said sum to be raised by the issuance of bonds or notes of the District pursuant to the terms and conditions of RSA 33, the Municipal Finance Act, upon terms and conditions as may be deemed in the best interest of the District by the School Board.

The Moderator recognized Mr. Patz, Chairman of Hopkinton School Building Committee. Mr. Patz reviewed in detail the proposed additions and renovations to Hopkinton High School. Upon completion of Mr. Patz's presentation, the Moderator recognized Mr. Charles George, Chairman Hopkinton Budget Committee. Mr. George spoke in opposition to Article 2. Upon completion of Mr. George's statement, Moderator opened the meeting to questions and answers. There being no questions, the Moderator opened the polls to a Yes/No ballot vote using the check list at 8:35 P.M. for a period of 1 hour and 5 minutes. At 9:40 P.M. polls closed, ballots counted, the Article was defeated as follows:

The Moderator then recognized Mrs. Clark for the purpose of amending Article 3, seconded by Mr. Satter:

Mrs. Clark moved to amend Article 3 which reads \$674,700.00 to read \$390,000.00 and to proceed with the energy section of this Article only.

The Moderator recognized Mr. Charles George, Chairman of the Hopkinton Budget Committee. Mr. George spoke in opposition to the original Article and the amended version.

The amendment was put to a voice vote and was defeated.

The Moderator then recognized Mr. Marden for the purpose of making a Motion.

Mr. Marden moved that Article 3 be indefinitely postponed.

Amendment was seconded by Dr. David Berliner.

The motion to indefinitely postpone was put to a voice vote and passed.

A request was made to have the motion voted to a Yes/No standing vote. The result of the standing vote on the Motion to postpone passed and Article 3 was indefinitely postponed.

ARTICLE I

The Moderator recognized Mr. Desmond who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mr. MacDonald:

I move that the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees and Officers be accepted as printed in the Annual Report.

The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE IV

The Moderator recognized Mr. Desmond who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mrs. Wilder:

I move that the School Board be authorized to choose Agents, Auditors or Committees as they may feel appropriate to school basis.

The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE V

The Moderator recognized Mr. Desmond who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mrs. Wilder.

I move that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million, nine hundred and forty-nine thousand, six hundred and fifty-five dollars (\$1,949,655.00) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

The Moderator recognized Mr. Turcotte for the purpose of amending Article 5 of \$1,949,655.00 to read \$1,958,010.00, which represents an increase of \$8,355.00 for the purpose of securing a new dishwasher, oven and refrigerator for the kitchen in Hopkinton High School.

The Motion was seconded by Mr. Hoyt. Motion was defeated on a voice vote.

The Moderator recognized Mr. Gay for the purpose of amending Article 5. I move that the School Board be instructed to repair and insulate the roof at Maple Street School, repair or purchase a new oil burner at Maple Street School. Said expense to be included in the posted operation budget figure of \$1,949,655.00.

Amendment was duly seconded.

Discussion ensued concerning adopting this motion which meant considerable additional expense with no increase in the original budget figure.

The Motion was put to a standing Yes/No vote and was defeated as follows:

Yes 239 No 256

The Moderator then recognized Dr. Berliner for the purpose of amending Article 5.

Dr. Berliner moved to amend Article 5 which reads \$1,949,655.00 by \$97,482.00 to a figure of \$2,047,137.00.

Seconded by Mr. Allen. This amendment was put to a voice vote and was defeated.

Mr. Cornette then moved the question which was duly seconded. Motion passed in the affirmative by a voice vote.

The Moderator then proceeded to read Article 5 as originally written. Article 5 was put to a Yes/No ballot vote and passed as follows:

ARTICLE VI

The Moderator recognized Mr. Desmond who offered the following Motion,

seconded by Mr. MacDonald:

I move that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) as a contingency fund.

The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE VII

The Moderator recognized Mr. Desmond who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mr. MacDonald:

I move that the District vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District any and all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government or from the State of New Hampshire for the school year 1980-81 and to appropriate any funds received from said grants to the payment of obligations of the District for which said funds constitute reimbursement.

The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE VIII

The Moderator recognized Mr. MacDonald who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mr. Desmond:

I move that the District vote to authorize the School Board on its behalf to enter into and bind the District to any requisite agreements with the District of Concord and the State Board of Education, so that the District will be enabled to participate in the Regional Vocational Center Program conducted in the Concord School District serving Region II, this authorization to be limited to the 1980-81 school year.

The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE IX

The Moderator recognized Mr. Desmond who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mr. MacDonald:

I move that the District vote to change the title of the office of Financial Coordinator for the School Administrative Unit #24 to Business Administrator, School Administrative Unit #24. Further, to ratify the appointment of David Hill as Business Administrator with the authority to perform the functions of the office in accordance with the laws of New Hampshire. The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE X

The Moderator recognized Mrs. Tuxill who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mrs. Brown:

I move that the District instruct the School Board to study the feasibility of establishing its own School Administrative Unit within the confines of the New Hampshire Statutes. This study shall encompass the educational, finan-

cial and special education aspects; as well as any other necessary areas. The School Board shall appoint a committee of five citizens to assist in the conducting of this study and will report back to the District at the next Annual School District Meeting.

The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

The Moderator then proceeded to address the Meeting and announce the amount of money raised by this Meeting as follows:

The sum of \$1,949,655.00 under Article V for the support of the schools for the upcoming year.

The sum of \$5,000.00 under Article VI as a contingency fund.

Moderator Richardson announced to the Meeting the results of the 1980 election of School District Officers. Total of 873 votes were cast, seven (7) which were absentee votes.

The Moderator then stated the following elected: School Board (3 years) Susan R. McKinney, Treasurer (1 year) Douglas H. Brown, Clerk (1 year) Kenneth MacDonald, Moderator (1 year) Gary B. Richardson.

Mr. Kenneth MacDonald chose not to accept the office of Clerk and the Moderator declared this office vacant.

There being no further business to come before this Meeting, upon motion of Mr. Desmond, the Meeting was adjourned at 10:52 P.M., whereupon duly elected officials of the District were administered their oaths of office by Moderator Richardson, with Mr. Richardson being administered his oath of office by Clerk MacDonald.
