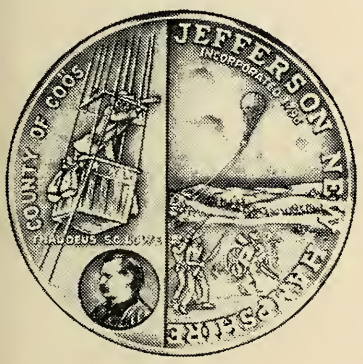

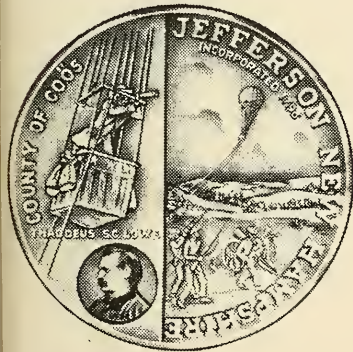

Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jefferson in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Jefferson on Tuesday, the seventh day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$369.15 and receive the sum of \$2461.00 from the State of New Hampshire, for Town Road Aid.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$479.04 for the White Mountains Regional Association.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money, up to \$500.00 for the Beatrice D. Weeks Memorial Hospital.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money up to \$714.00 for the White Mountains Community Services, Inc.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money up to \$500.00 for snow removal and maintenance of the Whitefield Regional Airport.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$19,500 which represents one half of the Towns cost of constructing a new bridge on Rt. 115A at Meadows.
9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$19,500 for 10 yrs. at 4% interest.
10. To see if the Town will vote to take the sense of the qualified voters as to whether the Amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court, shall be approved.

11. To see if the Town will vote to give up the right of way known as Waumbeck St., and extending between U.S. Rte. 2 and Rte. 115A in an east-west direction, and turn over ownership of same to the owner of the Waumbek.
12. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired through Tax Collector Deeds.
13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

LEST WE FORGET – IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar-holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand — a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them dead out when leaving.
4. Most important — Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

During the year of 1971, we put our new Police Radio into service and I have found it to be a most valuable article of equipment. Because of the use of the radio I was able to spend more time in my car crusing and cover the roads in town more often, and at the same time be available for any special call that might come in.

I began my summer duty patrol on July 2, 1971 and attended it through September 6, 1971, and during this period of time I accumulated 482 hours on duty and drove my car 2355 miles.

During my summer patrol duty, I issued 125 warnings for traffic violations, 12 defective equipment warnings, assisted State Police three time on radar speed checks, gave aid and assistance to 85 motorist, investigated or assisted State Police in investigating 12 traffic accidents, investigated or assisted on 4 breaking and entering complaints, answered 2 disturbance at a public place calls, investigated and called in State Police for assistance on an attempted arson complaint, arrested one subject for defrauding an innkeeper, subject was later turned over to Sheriffs Dept. of Reno, Nev. after serving sentence in N. H., made three arrest for larceny of items of less than \$100 value and obtained conviction on all, during the remainder of the year I have answered some twenty domestic disturbance calls.

At any and all time I have received the very best of co-operation from our State Police Officers and I have benefited greatly from their advise, guidance and assistance, this also applies to all other law enforcement agencies such as other municipal Police Depts. and the Sheriff Dept. It is indeed a pleasure to have this fine spirit of co-operation between the branches of law enforcement in the north country.

In closing this report I would like to state that I feel we are fast approaching a time, when small as we are, we must expand our Police Dept. to keep pace with the ever rising crime rate. No town today, regardless of size, is exempt from any form of crime. Sound security is our best insurance against crime in this area.
