TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kensington in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Kensington on Tuesday, the 5th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the foillowing subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To choose two Delegates to the N.H. Constitutional Convention.
3. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance by substituting for Article 12 the following (Amendment No. 1)
Building lots must meet the following requirements based on all soil conditions:
 1. All septic systems must meet the minimum standards imposed by the N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission.
 2. All test pits and percolation tests shall be performed in the presence of a qualified test pit inspector approved by the Selectmen. A fee will be charged, returnable to the inspector, and shall constitute payment in full for his services. After installation the septic system must also be approved by the same official before it is covered over.
 3. The bottom of the tile in a proposed leaching bed or trench and the floor of a leaching cesspole or leaching bed shall be a minimum of four (4) feet above the seasonal high water table. Fill may not be added to meet this requirement.
 4. The bottom of the tile in a proposed leaching bed or trench, and the floor of a leaching cesspool or leaching bed shall be a minimum of eight (8) feet above the top of any hardpan or impervious layer. Fill may be added to meet this requirement.
 5. No building of any kind shall be placed on soil which has a seasonal high water table at the natural ground surface or within two feet of the natural ground surface, as judged by the approved inspector as specified in (2). Fill may not be added to meet this requirement.
 6. Any soil with a percolation rate of over 30 minutes per inch shall not be used for the disposal of septic tank effluent. Fill may not be added to meet this requirement.

4. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance by adding to Article 14 thereof the following (Amendment No. 2)

Kennels and veterinary hospitals are permitted subject to the above requirements: however, the boarding, breeding, training or treatment of racing dogs shall not be permitted.

5. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance by substituting for Article 2 the following (Amendment No. 3)

The lot area of any dwelling or residence or other buildings requiring a septic system shall not be less than two (2) acres, and shall have a minimum frontage of two hundred (200) feet abutting upon a public street or road. One such building may be located on a lot of at least one acre with a minimum frontage of 150 feet provided this lot has been duly recorded in the County Registry of Deeds on or before March 5, 1974. One such building may be located on a lot of less than one acre provided this lot was duly recorded in the County Registry of Deeds on or before May 12, 1959.

6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The Selectmen's estimate of expenditures for the ensuing year is \$62,581.14

7. To see if the Town wishes to allow a discount on taxes paid within 30 or 60 days after presentation of tax bills.

8. To vote on the basis of payment and the amount thereof to be paid to the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes.

9. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

10. By petition of Hubert H. Schweizer, Jr., and others: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase of a new water tanker Fire Engine and necessary equipment, said engine to meet specifications as drawn by the Board of Fire Engineers, and for this purpose to raise a sum not exceeding Twenty Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$28,500.00)

11. By petition of John W. York and others: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of a sum of money to construct and

equip an addition to the Kensington Social Library; and for this purpose to raise a sum not exceeding Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) by issue of serial notes of the Town, under and in accordance with, the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act) of N.H. Revised Statutes annotated as amended, the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, interest rate of discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said notes to be delegated to the Selectmen.

12. By petition of Herbert L. Eastman and others: To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to help defray expenses of the celebration of the 200th Anniversary of the birth of the Nation, said monies to be used by the Bi-Centennial Committee.

13. To see if the Town of Kensington will vote to join the Strafford-Rockingham Regional Council and authorize the town's representation to the Southeastern N.H. Planning Commission to act as delegates to that Council.

14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and allocate Five Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty Five Dollars, (\$5,825.00) for a sum towards a Town Tax Map and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Estimate cost of Town Tax Map is \$12,000.00.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept and expend aid from the Federal and State governments in the event a declared disaster occurs within the Town; the authority herein granted to remain in effect until changed by future Town vote.

16 To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Business meeting starts at 7:00 P.M. Polls will close at the end of the business meeting.

RECORD OF 1973 TOWN MEETING
Kensington, N.H., March 6, 1973

Kensington Town Meeting was called to order at 10 o'clock in the morning by the Moderator, John W. York, who read the warrant.

Supervisors took oath there were 660 names on the checklist of those qualified to vote in town affairs. They also certified to the posting of the checklist.

Ballots were counted and 608 town and 609 for zoning were found to be the number received. Polls were declared opened at 10:05.

Clark Jacobs made a motion to close the polls at the end of business meeting. Hildred Smith seconded the motion.

At 7 P.M., the Moderator called the business meeting to order. As the articles of the warrant were in the town report, he did not read the warrant. Rev. John E. Akehurst offered prayer, then the flag was saluted by the assembly.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

This article was voted on by ballot and the results will follow the minutes of the business meeting.

Article 2-3-4-5-6-7-8

The articles and the vote is as follows:

Article 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Under no circumstances shall the subdivision of land result in a remaining lot of less than the minimum size required for its existing use.

YES 235 NO 135

Article 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

The space beneath all structures used as dwellings shall be completely enclosed by solid peripheral foundations of cement, brick,

stone, or other acceptable masonry which conforms with accepted building practices. The foundation plans must be approved on an official permit issued by the building inspector before construction begins. Additionally, before any mobile or modular home is moved into the Town of Kensington the completed foundation must be approved on an official permit issued by the building inspector. The wheels must be removed from the mobile homes when being set on their foundations. A mobile home which is at present non-conforming may not be moved to another site without first complying with this ordinance. A mobile home which is at present non-conforming may not be replaced for any reason with another mobile home without first complying with this ordinance.

YES 242 NO 142

Article 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Petitioners under this ordinance will be responsible for the expenses of advertising, legal and engineering fees, and any specially-called public hearings before permits will be issued.

YES 218 NO 155

Article 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

(Pertaining to regulating the excavation or grading, filling, or removal of gravel or other earth products.)

YES 208 NO 164

Article 6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by petition of the Voters of this Town.

(Changing lot size from one (1) acre with one hundred fifty (150) feet frontage to two (2) acres with two hundred (200) feet frontage.)

YES 145 NO 246

Article 7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by petition of the voters of this Town.

(Mobile homes shall not be permitted to be moved into the Town of Kensington for the purpose of establishment a dwelling or residence.)

The Planning Board disapproves of this amendment.

YES 116 NO 273

Article 8. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by petition of the voters of this Town.

(Requiring all commercial sub-divisions, resubdivisions, and multiple dwellings of two or more dwelling units to pay the Town a sum of money at least three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) per unit to restrict an excessive expenditure of public funds.)

The Planning Board disapproves of this amendment.

YES 154 NO 222

Article 9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The Selectmen's estimate of expenditures for the ensuing year is \$49,249.16.

Charles R. Eastman moved to raise \$49,349.16 including \$100.00 raise for the Town Treasurer. Harold W. Bodwell seconded the motion. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 10. To see if the Town wishes to allow a discount on taxes paid within 30 or 60 days after presentation of tax bills.

Gordon Swift moved to pass over the article. It was seconded by Charles Matthews. It was voted in the affirmative.

Article 11. To vote on the basis of payment and the amount thereof to be paid the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes.

Harold W. Bodwell moved to pay the Tax Collector $\frac{3}{4}$ percent from 1 percent. Discussion ensued. It was defeated. It was voted to pay the Tax Collector 1 percent the same as 1972.

Article 12. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

It was moved by Charles R. Eastman to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$100,000 in anticipation of taxes. It was seconded by Frank W. Rosencrantz. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to close and discontinue the following Class VI Roads and/or ways used as Class VI Roads or the designated portions thereof:

Hog Pen Lane (so called) A road leading from Rte. 150 by the Grange Hall to Stumpfield Road by the present Hubert Schweizer home.

Green Dow Road (so called) A road leading from Rte. 150 near the

former Lord's home (Felch) to where it joins Hog Pen Lane (so called) through the Town Park area.

Ward Road A road beginning at Rte. 107 approximately 500 Feet West of the home of Jerry Easson and proceeding in a northerly direction and crossing Cottage Road near the home of Percy Dunn and further proceeding to Pevear Lane at a point near Rte. 150.

Ward Walton Road A road beginning at Rte. 107 above the slate roof house (Gagne) proceeding northerly to Cottage Road near the home of Norman Head.

Tilton South Hampton Road A road beginning at the driveway near Abernathy's barn and then proceeding in a southerly direction to the South Hampton line.

Hodgdon Stumpfield Road A road beginning on Moulton Ridge Road at the present home of Carrie and Vera Eastman and proceeding in a southerly direction to Stumpfield Road near the foot of Gove's Hill.

Fogg Road A road beginning on Osgood Road near the Yardley home proceeding Southwesterly to a point on Rte. 150 near the Grange Hall.

Nudd's Hill Road A road leading from a point near the Colwell's driveway on Moulton Ridge Road North Westerly to Rte. 108

Tilton Road A road beginning at Rte. 150 at Jacob's Farm (Smith) to the former Colby Home on Drinkwater Road.

Paul W. Kimball moved to adopt the article subject to gates and bars. It was seconded by Charles R. Eastman. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the following Class V1 roads and/or ways used as Class V1 roads or the designated portions thereof:

Pevear Lane (so called) A road beginning at Cottage Road and proceeding to Rte. 150 by the Morgan home.

William Thorndike moved to adopt the article. It was seconded by Paul Estabrook. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the following Class V1 roads and/or ways used as Class V1 roads or the designated portions thereof:

West School Road, A road beginning at the Comfort's driveway proceeding to Stumpfield Road.

Paul W. Kimball moved to adopt the article. Donald Ilisley seconded the motion. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 16. On Petition of Donald A. McLean and fifteen others to see if the Town will vote to close the road known as the Bartlett Road in the Town of Kensington beyond the Property of Kenneth Wilbur, subject to gates and bars.

Donald A. McLean moved to adopt the article. It was seconded by several. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money not exceeding Twenty five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to rebuild the so called Bartlett Road, by issue of serial notes of the Town, under and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act) of New Hampshire revised Statutes Annotated as amended, the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, interest rate or discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said notes to be delegated to the Selectmen.

Frank W. Rosencrantz made a motion to pass over the article. It was seconded by several. It was a vote to pass over the article.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Fifty Four Hundred Dollars (\$5,400.00) as capital improvement for drainage and lot development at the Village Cemetery and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Howard A. Blake moved the adoption of this article to raise Fifty Four Hundred Dollars (\$5,400.00) for drainage and lot development. It was seconded by Charles R. Eastman. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 19. On petition of Henry C. Dillenbeck and twenty-two others to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars. (\$5,000.00) toward the cost of a new addition to the Kensington Social and Public Library building, the addition to be approximately 15 feet by 25 feet to be attached to the present building in the rear or east side of the building.

Voted to adjourn action on this article to the second Tuesday in May, 1973, Tuesday, May 8, 1973. The meeting was called to order at 7 P.M., by the Moderator, John W. York. Susan N. Evans, deputy Town Clerk, took the minutes of the meeting. Henry C. Dillenbeck made a motion to raise and appropriate the Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00)

toward the cost of a new addition. Dorothy Jacobs seconded the motion. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to create a special committee to be known as the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee consisting of three persons appointed by the Moderator.

Frank W. Rosencrantz moved to adopt the article. It was seconded by several. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 21. On petition of Paul S. Estabrook and nine others to vote to see if the Selectmen shall deposit in a capital reserve fund any money paid to the Town by subdividers, resubdividers or multiple dwelling owners as proposed by Citizens Petition Three. The funds shall be spent only upon capital improvements and only upon vote of the Town at any future Town Meeting.

Paul S. Estabrook moved to accept the article. It was seconded by Buddy Harris. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 22. To see if the Town will authorize the purchase of a police Cruiser and Equipment, the purchase price not to exceed (\$4,215.00) Four Thousand Two Hundred Fifteen Dollars, the Town to raise and appropriate (\$2,529.00) Two Thousand Five Hundred Twenty-nine Dollars, the Federal Government's share (\$1,686.00) One Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-six dollars, the Selectmen to make all arrangements for the purchase of the cruiser.

Mary Gamelin moved to accept the article. It was seconded by Carl F. Kenerson. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Business meeting starts at 7:00 P.M. Polls will close at the end of business meeting.

William Wadleigh made a motion to pay the Police twelve cents a mile. It was seconded by several. It was a vote in the affirmative.

Charles R. Eastman made a motion to adjourn. It was seconded by several. It was a vote to adjourn. The Moderator closed the polls at 9:30 P.M.

The circulation figures showing a small increase over 1972 figures indicate that the Kensington Library continues to be a busy place, but circulation figures only show a part of library activity. Besides the circulation of books which is the most important function, there are many other services and activities that are preformed at the Library. A great deal of time is given over to helping both students and the adult patrons in the answering of reference questions. We answer many telephone questions each day on community questions--particularly new residents in town call to find out the names of town officials. Time is spent preparing for story hours and telling stories to the children. There are also the hours spent in preparing book orders, processing new books, mending damaged books, tracking down over-due books and many other time consuming tasks that most of the public take for granted.

129 books were added to the library collection during 1973. The cost of books has risen during the past year as much as 50% for most books and 75% for reference books so that the book budget purchased fewer books. We also had to pay the State Library a rather large bill for lost books. We received a number of gift and Memorial books but fewer than some years. Rev. and Mrs. John Bodycomb sent us three very fine books on Austrailia. A book, "Dried Flowers", was given in the memory of Catherine Shaw. "America's Inland Waterways" was given in memory of Priscilla Perry and "American Mountain People" given in memory of Josephine Crowell and Alice Wilbur. These were both National Geographic books. Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Schweizer, Jr. gave the library four National Geographic books--"Those Inventive Americans", "In the Footsteps of Lewis and Clark", "The Mighty Mississippi", and "The American Cowboy". Other gift books were given by Mary Cole, Rachel Smith, Marian Welch, Lyndel and Murray Akehurst, Leslie Frank and the Dillenbecks.

The increase in school enrollment at the Elementary School has made for problems in servicing the school children but we have tried to do the best we can under rather crowded conditions at times. We are having problems with too many over-due books from the school children.

The Friends of the Library have continued to be of help to the library giving both financial and moral help to us. Marian Welch is the Chairman with Martha Bernier as Vice-Chairman, Illona Johnson as Secretary and Jean Mertinooke serving as Treasurer. Their help and support is much appreciated. Marian Welch has given many hours in volunteerservice to the library.

Library hours were slightly changed in an effort to conserve energy. We are open the same number of hours but open and close one hour earlier to make maximum use of daylight hours. On Tuesday and Thursday we are open from 1:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. and on Wednesday and Saturday from 1:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M.

The following people assisted in the annual inventory, cleaning and reorganizing of the Library before school opening: Edna Wardwell, June Armstrong, Vanessa Iliffe, Cary Mead, Betty Willoughby, Carol Willoughby, Sally Head, Allen, Stephen and David Head, Betty Bodwell, Susan Bodwell, Marian Welch, Ann Akehurst, Julie, Kathleen and Karen Engel, Sharon and Jeanie Kaler. The help given by these volunteers was greatly appreciated.

The over-crowded conditions at the Library have made it difficult to keep a neat and orderly building. The need for more space is becoming daily more urgent.

June Armstrong continues to act as Assistant Librarian. She will complete her Public Library Techniques Course at UNH this coming summer.

I wish to thank all of the Trustees, Friends of the Library and other persons who have helped at the library during the past year.

**REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN
and DISTRICT CHIEF**

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city and unorganized place in our state by the Forest Fire Warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service

Fire prevention was again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

REPORT OF KENSINGTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Kensington Conservation Commission has been meeting regularly throughout the year. In addition, some of us have been attending informational meetings in the area concerning such matters as the proposed oil refinery and power plant which will have important local effects. I have also attended some of the Planning Board meetings to see what they are doing that will affect the Conservation Commission work.

A major concern of ours from the beginning has been the necessity for the preservation of the town's wet lands, both for their own intrinsic values and because of the problems which would accompany their development. We believe that the Planning Board's proposed restrictions on development of the high water table areas to be the best solution to this problem and strongly urge the townspeople to adopt them.

This past summer the Southeastern Regional Planning Commission prepared for us a series of large scale maps depicting the aquifers, wet lands, open lands and wet soils of the town. They are prepared to make more if we ask for them.

The Conservation Commission will continue to meet on the third Thursday of each month. If anyone is interested in attending, he is welcome. Contact one of the members to find out where the meeting will be held.

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association is a Community Health Service providing skilled nursing care on an intermittent basis and physical therapy to patients in their home. Service is provided by registered professional nurses and a registered physical therapist experienced in public health. Care is provided through orders from each patient's physician. Kensington has participated in this program since 1968.

The nurse gives treatments such as changing surgical dressings, hypodermic injections, etc. She assists with the rehabilitation of persons (of all ages) handicapped by arthritis, heart trouble, diabetes, cancer, stroke, mental illness, accidents, and similar conditions. The nurse instructs designated persons to give needed care between nursing visits, and teaches families and individuals good nutrition and understanding of special diets; she advises new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies; provides tuberculosis and psychiatric follow-up and refers, when appropriate, to other agencies. The physical therapist evaluates, establishes, and supervises, and/or carries out a program to return the patient to his maximum abilities.

The Association provides the services of a Home Health Coordinator to the Exeter Hospital, who assists in planning for the necessary care required for the patient to return to his home.

A Well Child Clinic, sponsored by the Association and the Division of Public Health, is held monthly, and provides physicals, immunizations, and well child care to eligible children.

As of October 31, 1973, a total of 88 nursing and therapy visits were made to 20 individuals in Kensington. Four families (seven children) attended the Well Child Clinic.

A new Homemaker/Home Health Aide Service will soon be available which would assist families with light housekeeping, child care, errands and similar services.

REPORT OF BI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

The Committee decided to observe this event in October rather than on the actual date in December on account of the usual cold New England weather in December. We are planning to enter a float in the parade at New Castle when the State Committee observes the event on October 12, 1974.

On June 15, 1975 we plan to observe the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill which took place June 17, 1775 with a Church service at the Universalist Church, a baseball game at the town park, dedicate a memorial at said park in honor of the Soldiers of the Revolution, also other events.

For July 4, 1976 which was the actual date of the signing of the Declaration of Independence we are planning a parade with various bands, Militia Companies, floats and marching units followed by a patriotic address by a prominent speaker also games and events at the park with a Bean Hole supper or a Barbecue, also other events, yet to be planned.

The Boy Scouts under the supervision of James Russell are presently preparing suitable markers to be placed at Historical Sites and Homes that existed during the Colonial period. Mrs. Martha Briggs and Mrs. Marion Kimball have the 4-H Clubs interested also Donald Upton will

lead the Parent Teachers and School Children.

We invite all town residents and organizations to meet with us and plan to take an active part in this celebration which will not occur again during any of our lifetimes.

REPORT OF THE KENSINGTON SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE
1973

During the past year the Kensington Solid Waste Committee participated in the meeting of the Eastern Rockingham Solid Waste Planning Board. The Planning Board consisted of Committees from Seabrook, Hampton Falls, South Hampton, Kensington, and Mr. Otis E. Perry of the Southeastern N.H. Regional Planning Commission, serving as Technical Advisor. An observer from East Kingston participated regularly and on one occasion representatives from Kingston and Brentwood discussed their communities' long-range solid waste disposal plans.

The purpose of the Planning Board was to explore the potential advantages, or dis-advantages, of several communities joining together for the disposal of solid waste—a long-term, regional approach, as opposed to the present individual community "dumps".

The **Report on Solid Waste—Volume No. 8** of the S.E.N.H Regional Planning Commission, as amended, served as the springboard for our discussions.

In conjunction with our meetings, Mr. Otis E. Perry and his staff prepared a detailed report on the options available to member towns. This **Report on Solid Waste Disposal** for Eastern Rockingham Regional Solid Waste Disposal Planning Board is available from the Regional Planning Commission Office in Exeter.

The Kensington Committee met with the Board of Selectmen and explored the options covered in the report. Basically, the question boiled down to whether Kensington would elect to participate in a Regional Sanitary Land Fill or "go it alone".

After considerable discussion the members of the Board of Selectmen and the Solid Waste Committee stated their positions individually. It was the unanimous decision of the Selectmen and the Committee not to participate in the proposed Regional Sanitary Land Fill. This decision was conveyed to the Eastern Rockingham Solid Waste Planning Board in November. At that meeting, the Hampton Falls Committee expressed similar reservations and also declined to participate.

Recommendation:

It is possible that a more attractive Regional Proposal could be reached with our neighboring communities. In the interim, we recognize the limited life expectancy of our present dump and suggest that an alternative site be obtained by the Town without delay.

During 1973 as in past years the Planning Board was occupied with the supervision of new subdivisions and with the framing of ordinances which appear desirable for guiding further growth of the town.

As population pressure mounts and the density of building lots steadily increases, the Board has become concerned that new dwellings be put on land fully capable of providing water and at the same time supporting the necessary septic systems, not only now but over the decades ahead.

The major ordinance offered to the voters in March 1974 was aimed at this goal.

During 1973 the Board continued to hold public meeting in the Town Hall on the first Thursday of each month at 7:30 P.M., and it plans to do so during 1974. All interested citizens are urged to come and express their views.

DOG LAWS AND LICENSING

Each owner of a dog 3 months old or over must register the dog with the Town Clerk, before May 1st. Each dog over 3 months must have received a "rabies vaccination" certificate of vaccination to be presented to the Town Clerk at time of licensing. Each dog must wear a collar around it's neck; attached to said collar, a metal tag distinctly marked with it's registration number.

Residents are reminded that dog licensing is for their own protection. When a dog is hurt, or picked up, it is possible for authorities to notify the owner if the dog is licensed.

Dogs picked up that are not licensed are held for 10 days and then disposed of.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Jerome F. Melvin

Several significant changes occurred at the Kensington Elementary School during the past year.

Mr. Ronald Nickerson, formerly an elementary teacher in Bucksport, Maine, and a graduate of the University of Maine, replaces Miss Robin Whittemore, who has served as teaching principal during the past four years.

Other new staff members include Mrs. Betsy Taylor, sixth grade; Mrs. Kemis Rogers, art; and Mr. Arthur Wiggin, custodian. Due to an overcrowded third grade, Mrs. Ann Smith was hired as an assistant teacher.

As Principal Nickerson had indicated in his annual report, a levels approach has been introduced in reading and mathematics to enable each child to progress at his own learning pace. Likewise, a new rank card has been introduced in order to reflect the levels approach to reading and mathematics.

Mr. Nickerson was most appreciative of the dedicated parents who assisted the staff as aides during the past year in their effort to

provide quality education for our boys and girls.

The financial frustrations of attempting to provide quality education in a state which ranks last among all fifty states as regards state aid to local communities continues to plague us. One cannot but be impressed by the sacrifices of our local citizens who assume the burden of supporting their local schools almost entirely through property tax dollars.

As in the past, our average per pupil costs for both the AREA Junior High School and the AREA Senior High School compare most favorably with other New Hampshire secondary schools. The tuition rate for 1974-75 as announced by the Exeter School Board and approved by the State Department of Education:

AREA Junior High School

Estimated per pupil costs for 1973-74 \$ 821.18

Rental charges 42.82

Tuition for 74-75 — JHS \$ 864.00

AREA Senior High School

Estimated per pupil cost for 1974-75	\$ 963.42
Rental charges	43.58
Tuition for 74-75—SHS	\$1007.00

These estimated per pupil costs for 1973-74, in accordance with the AREA contract, are the basis for determining tuition rates for the 1974-75 school year. A rental charge is added to complete the tuition cost.

The latest New Hampshire junior and senior high school average per pupil costs, based on the 1972-73 school year, are \$857.00 and \$931.00, respectively. Thus, the comparative state costs are two years behind the AREA tuition figures for the 1974-75 school year.

In November 1973, the Exeter School Board requested a month's delay from the State Board of Education so that a plan for the establishment of the Exeter School District as a single supervisory union could be presented at the December meeting of the State Board. This request was denied.

Consequently, at the Supervisory Union 16 joint boards' annual financial meeting in December, board members from the six school districts voted to form two committees. One committee would study the possibility of adding an additional administrator to the central office staff while the second committee would be charged with developing a plan for the reorganization of Supervisory Union 16. Since that time, the joint boards have employed Mr. Jason Boynton, from the New Hampshire School Boards Association, as a planning consultant.

Regardless of any recommendations that might be made and any possible future actions, I believe that the joint boards have acted wisely in collectively trying to solve their mutual problems. Hopefully, such recommendations will prove beneficial to all six school districts and result in improved central office operating efficiency.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR

It is not surprising that we often feel the significance of change since, as someone once said, "change is all around us." In reviewing various reports printed in the 1973 School District Report, I noted with interest the number of administrators and board members who mentioned the many changes which had occurred during the previous year. I would like to mention two or three of the newer developments in our system.

Facilities

The students and staff of the Brentwood School District, upon their return to school in September, were pleased to find the new addition to the Swasey School ready for their occupancy. The new facility consists of six classrooms and a large resource center. It is electrically heated and boasts carpeting throughout. It is a most attractive and functional facility and one in which the town's citizens can take extreme pride. Noteworthy too is the fact that the total cost ran under \$18 per square foot which was the lowest per square foot cost for schools in the state for 1973.

In June, the offices of Supervisory Union #16 were relocated to the Main Street School Annex in Exeter. Our new location offers the Union staff an enlarged facility with ample room for equipment and storage of supplies and administrative records.

In August, the voters of Exeter approved the purchase of 36 acres of land located just south of the Junior-Senior High site. This acreage is flat, relatively dry land and will be developed for athletic fields. At present, a committee is at work formulating recommendations for presentation to the Exeter School Board

Economy

This report would not be complete without a word about the dramatic changes in our economy and its impact on our schools. Recent months have brought rapid increases in costs of many materials and supplies used in the operation of our schools. Most noteworthy in this category are fuel oil and school paper. Prices for certain types of both commodities have more than doubled over the past year. This not

only makes budget forecasting extremely difficult, but it places extreme and unpredictable pressure on current budgets. All of us, I am sure, share the same hope that the rapid escalation in prices of essential goods will level off and, hopefully, decline.

Personnel

In conclusion, I would like to mention something that does not change, and that is the efficiency and dedication of our support personnel. I fear at times, we tend to overlook the contribution of these individuals as they continue to perform their important duties in a quiet and efficient manner. Therefore, I would like to thank them all publicly for their dedicated service to their respective school districts and Supervisory Union #16.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TEACHER CONSULTANT

A new reading program for the primary grades is well underway. Carol Graves, the reading consultant, has done much toward the smooth success of its implementation. We look forward to seeing the complete program in all six grades in the near future.

Perhaps the most significant change in our elementary school system is the change to more emphasis on individual needs and the adoption of a "levels" approach in our reading and mathematics. This, of course, resulted in a new reporting system to parents. The levels approach allows for more variations in the instructional program. These affect what the student learns, how rapidly he learns, and how he goes about learning.

Much of the Fall has been spent in working with the staff in making changes which will result in more attention to the individual child, more careful planning of what is to be taught, and a more thorough job of assessing how well the student is grasping the skills taught. There is much yet to be done. At this writing only the primary grades have made the necessary transition to the "levels" approach.

I am convinced that, with our new reading program, levels approach, better accounting for student learning, we are well on the road to fulfilling education's ultimate goal - that of helping each child to achieve his full potential. I feel this concentration of effort in the elementary years will pay us many future dividends by giving us a better prepared student with a more positive attitude in the secondary school. We still need to find ways of dealing with the immature first grader and students who have a learning disability which holds up their normal progress through the grades. Perhaps we can concentrate on these two areas in 1974-75.

One of the exciting things about working in education is that one is constantly seeking newer and better ways to reach more children.

After twelve years in S.U. 16, I can say that we have made many changes and yet I can see that there is much to do, much that can be improved, and I look to the day when I can honestly say we are doing the very best we can for every child who goes through the public schools of this community.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES
KENSINGTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

To the Superintendent of Schools:

During the past year the School Health Services have provided vision and hearing screening for students. After thorough discussion with the school physician and the School Board, it was decided that physical examinations previously offered to Fourth Grade students will not be done in school this year. Lack of adequate space and facilities to do thorough examinations prompted this change in policy. Instead, reminders are being sent home to parents that, if their child has not had a recent physical, this might be a good time to have a checkup with the family doctor.

Perhaps the biggest advance for the Health Services over the past year has been the development of a formal Health Education Curriculum for elementary schools. As a result of meetings of the Union 16 Health Education Curriculum Committee, it was decided to initiate the Scott Foresman Health and Growth series in grades 1 through 6. This particular program emphasizes hygiene, dental care, nutrition, and safety, all areas of importance to elementary school children.

I would like to express my thanks to those volunteers who have helped with the School Health Program in the past. I hope that I will have their continued support. I would like to express my appreciation to the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Principal Ronald Nickerson, members of the staff, and Dr. John Tuthill, school pediatrician, for their help and cooperation this year.

**RECORD OF THE 1973 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
KENSINGTON, N.H. - March 3, 1973**

The annual School District Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Horace M. Gourley at 7:30 P.M. in the town hall. The warrant was read by Mr. Gourley. Rev. John Akehurst offered an appropriate prayer which was followed by the salute to the flag.

Article 1: To see if the District will vote to raise Eighty Thousand, Nine Hundred and Sixty-One Dollars (\$80,961.00) for land acquisition and construction cost in connection with an addition to the Kensington Elementary School; such sum to be raised by issuance of serial notes or bonds of the District under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. RSA 33) and any amendments thereto, and to authorize the School Board to issue and negotiate such notes or bonds, the discretion of fixing the dates, maturities, denominations, the interest or discount rate, and of providing for the sales thereof to be delegated to the School Board as shall be in the best interest of the District, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Donald Upton moved that we accept Article 1; the motion was seconded by Doris Swift.

Donald Upton gave a short summary of the work of the Building Committee and thanked the members for their work.

Article 1 was voted on by written ballot and the polls were open for two hours. The motion was defeated. Yes votes 78. No votes 128.

Article 2: To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the School District.

Gordon Swift moved that salaries remain the same. The motion was seconded by Charles H. Bickford. The vote was in the affirmative.

Article 3: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relative thereto.

As there were no reports the Moderator passed over Article 3.

Article 4: To see what sum of money the School District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payments of salaries for School District officials and agents and for the statutory obligations of the District.

Donald McLean moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$268,857.00 for the support of schools. The motion was seconded by Richard Drew and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 5: To choose Agents and/or Committees in relation to any subject embraced by this warrant.

Donalt Upton moved and Lillian Plourde seconded a motion to hold Article 5 open until after the ballots were counted on the vote for the proposed addition to the Elementary School. The vote was affirmative.

Following the ballot count the Moderator re-opened Article 5.

John Sargent moved that we pass over Article 5. Herbert Eastman seconded the motion and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 6: To transact any other buisness that may legally come before the meeting.

Alan Pardy moved that a new building committee be appointed. The motion was seconded by Joan Engel. The vote was in the negative.

John Sargent moved that the meeting be adjourned. The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

INFORMATION FOR KENSINGTON RESIDENTS

DISPOSAL AREA REGULATIONS

The operating days and hours of Kensington Town Dump are from 8 A.M. to 6 P.M., Saturday and 8 A.M. to 12 P.M. Sunday. The Dump is for Kensington residents only. Dead animals or fowl must not be brought to the Dump. No fires will be set at the Dump by anyone but the custodian of the Dump. Anyone setting fires other than the custodian will be dealt with severely.

JUNK CAR REGULATIONS

A recent New Hampshire Statute requires anyone with two or more unregistered or old cars no longer intended or in condition for legal use on highways or used auto parts equal in bulk to two vehicles must obtain a license or be subject to a \$10 a day fine and a mandatory injunction to end the violation by the selectmen or city council. New and used car dealers registered as such are not considered auto junk dealers but must remove any junk cars from their premises within 160 days.
