



TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon in the County of Sullivan and State of New Hampshire:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles:

- ART. I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (The polls will be open for balloting from ten o'clock in the forenoon to three o'clock in the afternoon.)
- ART. II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- ART. III. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of highways and bridges for summer.
- ART. IV. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of highways and bridges for winter.
- ART. V. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$312.18 and apply for Class V Highway assistance (T. R. A. so called), the State to furnish \$1,248.73.
- ART. VI. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to reduce the covered bridge repair notes.
- ART. VII. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to reduce the Bates Bridge Construction notes.
- ART. VIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- ART. IX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for observance of Memorial Day.
- $\mbox{\rm ART.}\ \mbox{\rm X.}\ \mbox{\rm To see}$ if the Town will vote to accept all Trust Funds received for the perpetual care of cemetery lots.
- ART. XI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 for the Town Library.
- ART. XII. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the Non-Partisan Ballot System. (Inserted by request.)
- ART. XIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be paid to the Town of Alstead for the use by the residents of the Town of Langdon for one year of the dump now operated and maintained by said Town of Alstead. (Inserted by request.)

ART. XIV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

ART. XV. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

ART, XVI. To allow accounts.

FOREST FIRES-OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- 1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- 2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

The year of 1949 was a lucky one for the town since no serious fires occurred. Lucky is the proper word, for no one knows when a disastrous fire will strike. It is wise to be prepared for the worst.

On May 18th, the Langdon department was called to assist at the second day of a fire in Acworth. Ten Langdon men went on this project. From their hard earned experience on the stubborn Walpole fire of 1948, these men were able to render competent assistance in holding this fire from further breaks.

In August, the Town bought a Pacific Marine portable pump and 350 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose. Later a thousand more footage was acquired. An appropriate amount of hose for our need is about 2000 feet.

During the fall, sixteen fire drills were held at various places about the Town. More drills are planned when the weather is such that the equipment will not be iced up. But some sort of organization should be set up to make the fire drill procedure more universally effective.

Only five men in town attended eight or more drills. This is not enough. Skillful handling of the equipment when a real fire occurs can only be accomplished by frequent and steady practice. There should be at least a dozen men who would, by force of habit, be able to put out accurate and speedy service when the chips are down. When a building fire strikes in rural districts, excitement and confusion is always present; and only those who have practiced faithfully can be expected to do a smooth and workmanlike job. Everybody is more than willing to do all they can at such a time, but unless they are thoroughly familiar with the apparatus, costly mistakes will be made.

You as a citizen can give your own property more than fire insurance protection by helping to man your own apparatus. It will be the future policy to hold drills at times convenient for you. Please give this some serious thought.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Langdon qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fourteenth day of March, 1950, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the school district will authorize the school board to use \$650 of unanticipated income, in addition to the original appropriation of 1949-1950, to defray unexpected additional expenses.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1949-1950, a sum of \$1,357.05 to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1950, in order to meet unanticipated obligations caused by emergency repairs, additional tuition and transportation cost, and an old scholars' supply bill.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to transfer the amount of \$100 previously appropriated for lunch program furniture, to be spent for general expense of the school year, 1950-1951.
- 12. To see if the school district will authorize the school board to make contracts for the transportation of pupils for a period not exceeding three years, upon terms and conditions to be determined by the school board.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT

American education has undergone many changes in the past half century. Public education now is an accepted part of our complex society, and its importance to the democratic form of government is recognized by all thinking people. The effectiveness with which the isms of foreign lands have been drilled into the minds of youth is proof, if we need any, of the importance of education in our country to sustain and bring to realization the ideals of democracy.

At the beginning of the century, it was the rare boy or girl who had either the inclination or opportunity to complete high school or college. In 1950, the great majority begin high school, a large percentage finish, and a fair proportion of these complete college. Elementary education is compulsory for all.

Progress is being made towards educational equality.

Changes have been made and more must come in curricula. Training in the three R's and academic work is just as important and methods have improved. As the public school is our society's instrument for continuance and improvement, schools have added training in the vocational, cultural and citizenship aspects of our living. The school plant becomes a real community where youth learns to work and play together for the most formative years of their character development, and a center of local activities in which all citizens take pride.

Many problems face the citizens of Supervisory Union No. 5 in their efforts to support and improve their school systems. I am presenting a summation

under the three headings: educational, building, financial.

Educational

Increased enrollments and building capacity limits are causing over-crowded conditions which make good teaching difficult. Twenty-five to thirty pupils in a single grade should be the maximum. Where several grades must be placed in one classroom, the total number should not exceed twenty-five. We have many situations where the teachers frankly admit inability to teach effectively because of too many pupils and too little time. Poor lighting, ventilation, lack of sanitation, and no room for special activities limit educational efficiency in too many towns in this Union.

School Boards are aware of the need for having good tools of learning—books, maps, supplies, practical arts materials, and even athletic equipment. They are attempting to include sufficient funds in budgets to provide for classroom needs. With so many costs fixed by law or conditions, it is natural to look to this area for reductions. In many schools, materials have not been adequate. It is unwise to attempt savings here beyond limits of reasonable economy because these are basic needs and would effect little reduction in the

total budget.

It is our good fortune to have a large number of competent and experienced teachers. Many of our teachers are married and make their homes in our communities. They are interested in the welfare of the town as well as the school. The requirements for certification to teach in New Hampshire have become more stringent. Many "permit" teachers are taking extension courses and summer courses to meet these requirements. Salaries have increased. They must continue to do so until the supply of teachers is greater and until

teaching as a profession at least keeps up with the economic returns from other There is a national and state-wide shortage, expecially of elementary teachers. Better retirement systems, higher pay and lower educational requirements continues to drain New Hampshire of some of its finest. Teachers are human beings who like to be commended, who like good homes, pleasant surroundings and friends. The great majority in the profession place service to children above monetary returns.

As our concern is more with the progress that each child makes than with his present standing, we are undertaking a testing program in every school. Standardized tests to measure mental ability and attainment in nine areas of learning will be given and records made of results. This will become a yearly procedure so that we can chart progress made against what normally could be expected. We can try harder and devote more time to those areas where weaknesses become evident.

Building Problems

All except one of the eight towns have pressing building needs. Nearly all buildings are very old and provide inadequate housing for increased enrollments. Efforts have been made and are being made to plan and to build. It is not a problem of easy solution. I am sure that the people of our communities want bigger and better buildings with running water, modern plumbing and controlled heat.

It is discouraging to spend money patching up and repairing to "get by another year" when we would like to see these dollars go into a permanent im-

provement.

More towns are setting up capital reserve accounts as a long-term means of getting new buildings. It is my recommendation that every town should set aside at least a few hundred dollars and increase it year by year. A committee in one town of the Union is attempting to raise money by other means

than taxation. They should be congratulated.

Some small towns in New Hampshire have given up waiting for financial assistance from state or federal government. The satisfaction they must have with their new buildings and the benefits to their children must be ample rewards for the sacrifice. A new school is a living memorial to the faith we have in our boys and girls.

Financial Problems

Real economy means wise spending and not parsimony. The cut in State Aid to education from two million to four hundred thousand certainly is not economy. It costs money to provide even average schools. Actual expenditures for schools have not been reduced by this move. The result has been to thrust back upon communities practically the total burden. Rea estate taxes have increased greatly and will go higher if additional support is

Our Union is made up of small communities with a small proportion of income-producing property. Several thousand dollars of income was taken away. Even those towns whose allotment was not reduced feel the pinch as tuition and transportation costs increase sharply. Other states have increased their financial support to towns and have provided a sound tax basis for doing

Transportation will continue to be an expensive problem. A large proportion of our pupils have to be transported long distances over both good and The geography of some of the towns, and the remote location of some of the homes, make transportation costs soar, often beyond reasonable expectations. Tuition to outside schools is advancing rapidly due to increasing enrollments and higher charges for tuition. All receiving towns are increasing tuition charges for next year, some sharply, a reflection of their greater costs. Large deficits of some towns in the union are attributable to these two factors which your School Boards cannot control.

Your school officials are some of our most respected citizens who give freely of their time, and who are very much aware of their responsibility to youth and town. They cannot be justly accused of waste. The average cost per pupil in New Hampshire for 1948-1949 was \$229.49. The schools in your towns are being operated at considerably less. It is inevitable that school expenses should increase along with every other commodity and service. education cannot wait for a more convenient time. There is a need for greater public understanding of school problems. We are encouraging adult groups to organize to study their schools, to ask questions and to assist in activities.

The difficulties are so many and so varied, and their solution so important, that I am humble before the task. Your support and good will, expressed to me in many ways, is especially gratifying. All of us working earnestly together with courage, persistence and vision, often forgetting ourselves in service to our communities, should evolve a majority of the right answers.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The routine health inspection and check-up of the school children has continued in the usual manner . . . the nurse checks the general appearance of each pupil. The hair, skin, throat, teeth, the posture and feet. In addition the child's vision is checked by means of Snellen's chart. Twice yearly the school children are weighed and measured and recorded on the individual's health record.

This year through the dental fund care of the teeth was available to the pupils in grades 2, 4, 6 and 8. By appointments and the consent of the parents the pupils were taken in small groups to the office of Dr. Buck for all necessary dental care. While the children were away from school for this purpose they were supervised by the school nurse.

This year there were fewer cases of communicable diseases. The parents have helped to keep the infectious diseases from spreading by keeping children at home when they were not in their usual good health.
