



TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day and make appropriation for the same.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, more than the law requires, for the town library for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for electric street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year.
 - 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,281.50, the state to give \$1,710.75, for State Aid Construction for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$5,058.77, the state to give \$7,588.15, for Trunk Line Maintenance for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for support of highways, bridges and sidewalks, more than the law requires, for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to recommend to the selectmen the expenditure of the state aid money on the road leading from Frank Knowlton's Corner towards the Springfield town line.
- 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for preservation of shade trees in public highways in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 89 of the Laws of 1925.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.) to buy the tractor and snowplow.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.), the same to be used toward the support of an out-of-doors fair under the auspices of the New London Grange.
- 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow fences.
- 18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for hydrant service.
 - 19. To see how much money the town will vote to raise

and appropriate for fire apparatus to add to the present equipment.

- 20. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to remove the rubbish from the roadside on the secalled Bog Road and provide a suitable place for a town dump and raise and appropriate Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.) for the purpose.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.) to extend the road about fifteen rods to the Boys' Camp on the south side of Little Sunapee.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to raise Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.) to advertise Lake Sunapee, the Selectmen to co-operate with the Lake Sunapee Board of Trade in expending same and to co-operate with the towns of Sunapee and Newbury if said towns raise like amounts; and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to accept the deed of Mrs. Sarah J. Elkins of a 16½ foot walkway leading from the state highway at Elkins to Pleasant Lake.
- 24. To see if the town will vote to dispose of the horse-drawn and Ford Chemicals and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 25. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

Librarian's Report

The Tracy Memorial Building, now containing within its walls the New London Public Library, was dedicated on Sunday afternoon, October 3rd, with a fitting and impressive service, which was attended by a large number of interested people.

The library in the school building was closed during October, but, owing to the delay in the arrival of the steel bookcases for the two floors of the fireproof stackroom, it was impossible to move all the books to the new library during that month. It was only during the month of January that the removal of all the books was completed.

Since November 1st, the library hours have been more general than heretofore: 2-5 and 7-9 o'clock every week day, except Monday, when the building is closed for cleaning purposes; the Children's Room is open Tuesday and Saturday afternoons, also Thursday evening; the Reading Room is open on Sunday afternoon, for reading only, from 3-5 o'clock. The Colby Academy students come on certain days, the girls on Wednesday and Friday afternoons, the boys on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday afternoons. The children who come and go on the school teams come to the library during the afternoon recesses. On Saturday afternoon the children play games, do puzzles, guess riddles and do handwork of various kinds, aside from reading their books and magazines. Occasionally illustrated talks and story hours are arranged.

Friends of the library have made valued gifts to the book collection during the past four months. Mr. Henry A. Barker, Mrs. Rose Cederholm, Mr. Alexander Macomber, Mr. Elwin L. Page, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Tracy, Jr., Mrs.

Mary B. Macomber, the New London Post American Legion, No. 40, Mr. George S. Bryan, and the New London Woman's Club have remembered the library with gifts of books. Magazine subscriptions have been given by Miss Ida Mae Gibson, Mrs. Allie Sargent, and Mr. Herbert J. Peaslee. "The Dearborn Independent" is received weekly, with the compliments of Mr. Henry J. Ford. Dr. G. W. Gardner has given a banjo clock, in memory of his aunt, Miss Emma Bartlett, who served New London as librarian for several years. Miss Letitia Robinson has given a reed fernery for the reading room. The Burpee Hill School Library and a picture of the poet Longfellow have been given to the Children's Room.

Several pleasant social affairs have been held in the Tracy Memorial Building, chief of which have been a Children's Party, a Hallowe'en Party, an Academy Sing for the Students, an illuminated Community Christmas Tree on the grounds of the building, with Carol Singing about the tree on Christmas Eve; Open House on New Year's Day, and community singing on several Sunday afternoons.

Many organizations find it convenient and pleasant to meet either in the Club Room or the Assembly Hall of the building. Those meeting thus far have been the Selectmen, the Firemen, the Farm Bureau, the Woman's Club, the Reading Club, the Junior Christian Endeavor, and the American Legion.

A number of lectures have been given in the Assembly Hall. Headmaster H. Leslie Sawyer of Colby Academy gave two fine, illustrated talks on Astronomy and Chemistry; Prof. Henry J. Hall, of Whitman, Mass., gave his well-illustrated lecture on "Why We See Things So." Lieut. Alcide A. Touchette, of the Byrd Arctic Expedition of 1926, gave a talk on "The Flight to the Pole" before an audience of 220 in the Town Hall, but under the auspices of the Tracy Memorial Building, illustrating his remarks with many stereoptican slides and two reels of moving pictures.

The safety deposit boxes in the fireproof vault have been for rent since January 1st, and several people have taken advantage of the opportunity thus afforded for protection of valuable papers, etc.

It is pleasant to have the continued services of Mrs. Allie J. Sargent, who has been connected with the library during the past few years. The excellent care given to the Tracy Memorial Building is due to the interested and dependable work of Mr. George C. Lovering.

The librarian appreciates the co-operation of trustees and townspeople and bespeaks their continued support in the community activities which will take place at the Tracy Memorial Building in the days to come.

Patients admitted, 112; operations, 32; births, 28; deaths, 11 Additions to furnishings and equipment include storm windows, filing cabinet, bassinets for babies, sterilizing outfit and X-ray equipment. Hospital day in August and donation day in November showed a hearty co-operation, and a generous response from townspeople and summer visitors. Both these were efficiently managed by the hospital Aid Association, which has worked faithfully throughout the year and relieved the executive board in many ways. The generous gifts of canned goods, vegetables, groceries, etc., are a great help and are especially appreciated by the workers in the hospital.

To all who have helped in any way, the board would say a hearty "thank you."

To the School Board of New London:

I present herewith my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools in New London. It will deal with survey of statistics, buildings and equipment, organization and instruction, and health supervision.

Compared with my report of last year these statistics show a reduction of 40 percent in the average number of days lost by bad weather, holidays, institutes, etc. This represents by schools an actual gain of \$85.28 of teachers' salaries applied to classroom instruction. The good record of last year in the reduction of tardinesses was even im-

proved this year. Averages in attendance and promotion were slightly below the very high averages of the previous year.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

No extensive alteration of buildings has been required. Cleaning and minor repairs have been attended to promptly and efficiently.

Very soon the heating equipment in the Colby Hill building must be extensively repaired or replaced by another system. Since new parts can no longer be obtained for the stack furnaces, it would seem desirable that these be replaced by a steam boiler of sufficient heating capacity to provide direct radiation in all rooms, corridors and basements, while the indirect ventilation of classrooms is retained by steam coils located in the present convection shafts.

In the room formerly occupied by the public library and now in use for a school lunch room a white enameled sink, running water and ample dish racks have been installed. There have also been provided four long tables and settees graded in height to accommodate all children who remain at school for their noon lunch.

Organization and Instruction

At the close of the year in June three valuable members resigned from the staff of teachers. After their re-election at increased salaries Miss Hazel A. French, principal of the Colby Hill school, resigned to accept a departmental position in the junior high school of Barrington, R. I., and Miss Emma I. Stanley of the Elkins school accepted a position in the New London hospital. Miss Dorothy V. Bixby of the Low Plain school decided to enter training for secretarial work.

The principalship of the Colby Hill school was filled by the election of Mrs. Etta M. Crawford of Houlton, Maine. Mrs. Crawford is a graduate of the Provincial Normal School, Frederickton, N. B., and brings to her work in New London six years successful experience as a graded school teacher in the Houlton system.

Miss Doris I. Huntoon, for four years teacher of the

Dyers school in Andover, and an attendant during four summer sessions at normal school, was elected teacher of the school at Elkins.

You were fortunate in securing the return of Mrs. Sadie A. Shepard to teach the Low Plain school, and in retaining the experienced services of Mrs. Theresa Davis Hayes and Miss Hattie M. Boswell in the Colby Hill school.

Courses of instruction with all grades in physiology and hygiene have been made more practical by the introduction of the project textbook, "Health Habits." This emphasizes problems requiring observation and judgment in the study of personal, home and community health rather than the mere memorizing of technical names of the various parts of the human anatomy. At the same time this avoids the fault of presenting a mere collection of interesting health stories.

Textbooks, "Modern Mathematics" by Schorling and Clark, are used by the pupils of the two upper grades. This course provides for the constant repetition and rapid drill of the fundamental processes taught in the fifth and sixth grades. The shorter methods of calculation, frequently found in commercial arithmetics, are emphasized. Within the same course sufficient concrete algebra and geometry are presented to enable the eighth grade pupil to pursue high school mathematics without the traditional break in type of work.

A required course in fire prevention as authorized by the School Board at its last meeting is in process of organization.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

You are fortunate in again securing the services of Miss Della V. Carr, R. N., as your school nurse. The majority of the pupils now know Miss Carr and appreciate the value of her work with them. By having her own means of conveyance she is able this year to do the follow-up work more efficiently. By special arrangement with a neighboring

Union her three months of service in this Union come during the season of open roads. The following Table represents her activities in New London during September and October. She will return to this Union in May to complete the third month of her contract.

In connection with the health supervision I must mention the interest taken and the assistance rendered by the New London Woman's Club, teachers, parents and others who have so generously given of their time, materials and equipment for the serving of a hot supplementary lunch to pupils who remain during the noon intermission. On each school day since the Thanksgiving recess about fifty pupils have been served. As a rule either hot cocoa, a beef stew or a vegetable stew has been provided. Under the supervision of the teachers the work of preparing and serving the lunch and of caring for the equipment has been largely done by the pupils. For this they are given credit towards junior school work.

Miss Helen Pressey, in addition to her duties as storyhour and play leader of a group of primary pupils, has rendered valuable assistance by supervising and assisting the preparation of these lunches.

It is to be hoped that next year this lunch service may be extended for a longer term in both the Colby Hill and Low Plain schools.

Conclusion

I wish to take this opportunity to point out the necessity of sending the most promising of your local girls to normal school. To be assured of trained teachers there should be at least one girl from New London entering normal school each year with the understanding that she will, if needed, teach in her home town for at least two years after graduation. Your Grange renders a great service to students attending our State University. Why not render a similar service to those attending our state normal schools?

To the School Board I wish to commend the good work accomplished by your teachers and the splendidly co-operative spirit manifested by your community. I thank the members of the Board for the progressive interest and counsel by which they have assisted me in administrative duties.
