STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Newfields on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next, at two o'clock in the afternoon to eight of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on taxes paid in full on or before August 15th, discount to be two per cent.

4. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$6,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Tax Collector the usual two per cent for collecting taxes.

6. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or

acquired by the Town on account of purchases at tax sales.

7. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of report by Town Officers, as printed in Town Reports.

8. To see if the Town will vote to pass the following Ordinance:

All vehicles on Pleasant Street, approaching the intersection of Pleasant and Swamscott Streets from either direction, shall come to a complete stop before crossing or entering Swamscott St., and authorizing the Selectmen to erect approved warning signs.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plans showing new streets or the widening thereof or parks, and upon adoption of this Article it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Rockingham, a certificate or note showing that the said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of authorization, as provided in Sections 19-29 inclusive, Chapter 53 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire as inserted in Section 1, Chapter 138 of the Laws of 1949.

10. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 1 Section 2, (f) of the Building and Safety Ordinance, Town of Newfields, New Hampshire, adopted March 11, 1952, by striking out the words 'cess-pool, sanitary chemical closet, or closed vault' in the second line, and by adding after the words 'septic tank' in the second line the words 'with adequate drainage facilities' so that said paragraph as amended shall read as follows: (f) Sewage: All dwellings and buildings in private and public use shall be equipped with septic tank with adequate drainage facilities.

11. On petition of Harold W. Higgins and fifteen others to see if, (because of new and expanding industries, the Jet Bomber Base, increasing population), the Town will join with other Towns in the area instructing its representatives to the General Court to call for a State Water Pollution Commission study program within the Piscataqua River Basin.

12. To see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for a new dump in addition to funds already in hand for that purpose.

13. To see what action the voters will take toward the acceptance of the report and recommendations of the Water Committee.

14. To see if the Town will vote that it is expedient to enlarge the existing water system in the event that a building for industrial purposes is constructed on the lot of land, known as the Dump Lot, conveyed by the Town of Newfields to Herbert A. Grant, by extending the system down Swamscott Street from Main Street to the crossing of the Boston and Maine Railroad; and vote to raise a sum not to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, and to issue its bonds or notes therefor, for the purpose of defraying the cost of the extension of mains, erection of facilities and in such other manner as is necessary to provide an adequate water supply and system along said Swamscott Street from Main Street to the said railroad crossing; said bonds or notes to be issued at the time the building is under construction on said lot.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Newfields, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year 1954-1955 started with the following personnel:

- Mrs. Gladys Chick, teacher of Grades 3-6
- Mrs. Ruth Goffe, teacher of Grades 1-3
- Mrs. Eleanor Henry, teacher of Music
- Miss Mary Shea, School Nurse

There is one change in the staff this year. Mrs. Ruth Goffe replaced Mrs. Gladys Clements as teacher of the lower grades. Mrs. Goffe is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College and has her Master's Degree from New York University. She has had several years of teaching experience in New Hampshire communities.

This staff is working diligently to provide good training for the boys and girls.

The Newfields School District has received \$1,678.46 State Aid for the last school year, 1953-1954, and the district has been in receipt of \$1,865.28 from Federal Aid for that period. Application has been made for Federal Aid for this present school year. The law has been changed so that from now on the amount of Federal Aid which a district will receive is based on the number of parents of public school children who worked on federal property during the preceding year. This will enable a district to know in advance the amount of money which it will receive for any given year.

The Parent-Teacher Association continues to work for the welfare of the school program.

I believe it is time for the school district to start making plans for an addition to the school building. If a

definite plan could be formulated in the near future, then there would be a minimum of inconvenient delay when and if an impact is felt due to the Air Base or any other cause.

This year, as school opened, there was an unequal distribution of pupils by grades in the two classrooms to the extent that it seemed necessary to move about half of the third grade pupils into Mrs. Chick's room which gave her twenty six students. By this measure, the number of pupils in Mrs. Goffe's room was reduced to twenty nine. This makes it possible to give each student in the beginning grades more of the individual instruction which is so necessary at that level.

The disadvantage of this arrangement is that Mrs. Chick has four grades instead of the usual three. This can be continued for a year or two as a tentative measure without too much harm but it should not be thought of as a permanent procedure.

The installation of flourescent lights has greatly improved the quantity as well as the quality of artificial light in the classrooms. These lights along with the redecoration of the rooms with the green chalkboards leave the installation of movable furniture about the only item left in order to have most of the features of a modern school classroom.

I would like to mention a few of the many bills dealing with education which are being presented to this session of the state legislature for action.

One bill would reimburse each school district about fifty per cent of the cost of school transportation for all students up to sixteen years of age. Another bill deals with school building construction and would refund to any district which finds it necessary to build about twenty five per cent of the cost of the construction. This is similar to laws which Vermont and Maine now have.

Other bills would provide increased amounts of equal-

ization State Aid as well as a flat grant aid which would pay to each district so much for each pupil enrolled in school.

The above bills are all plans to reduce the burden on the property tax payer.

I call your attention to the reports of the school nurse and the music teacher, also to the tables which follow.

I again wish to thank the citizens, the members of the School Board, and the teachers for their continued cooperation and support.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The past year was a comparatively healthy one for the school children of Newfields. In spite of the usual cases of communicable disease there were no major outbreaks.

The School Board is to be thanked for their interest in the health of the youngsters. Their recommendation that a doctor be obtained to give physical examinations to all children whose parents consent will help in the discovery of conditions that might be corrected if diagnosed at an early stage. Although this has not gone into effect as yet, negotiations have been made and more than likely it will be a part of the 1955-1956 health program.

The new lighting system has helped tremendously in lessening eye strain in the children.

Over 90% of the children in school had a Patch Test for T.B. and I am happy to report that all of these were negative.

The cooperation I have received from both teachers and parents has been most helpful. Parents have been quick to accept recommendations, especially those regarding eye check-ups by a specialist. Many children have now received help for their vision difficulties and are doing better work in school. We still need more den-

tal work, but on the whole this too has had better attention this year.

I want to extend my thanks to the School Board, the teachers, and the community as a whole for their cooperation and my hope that this present school year will prove even a healthier one for all of us.
