REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Nottingham :

This is my fifth annual report to you. During these five years there has been a striking increase in the number of pupils attending Nottingham schools.

Average membership, year ending June 30, 1929	56.75

The above table shows a steady growth, amounting to 37%. The tide of population seems to be flowing back into the country just at present. Our two school buildings are full and must be enlarged in the near future if this expansion continues. The buildings have been improved by the installation of screens at the Center and the building of an ample and much-needed closet at Gebig. Durable and permanent playground apparatus should be provided for both schools as soon as means permit. This would be a splendid project for private generosity or community service by some public-spirited organization. A substantial work bench was made by the agricultural students of Austin-Cate Academy and given to the Center school.

As a result of her examination, the school nurse, Miss Margaret MacDonald, found 107 physical defects requiring attention. These were reported to the parents. Thirty-nine children were treated in the dental clinic. The nurse has also co-operated with the selectmen, county commissioners, Red Cross, State Board of Public Welfare, etc., in measures of investigation and relief.

Our school expenditures have not increased as fast as our enrollment. The per pupil cost of elementary schools (including administration, fixed charges, and per capita pro-rated) was \$77.13 for the district, as compared with \$82.11 for the median in the State, or 16% less, for the last fiscal year. Our expense of administration has been especially low. Nottingham pays its district officers the sum of \$90, while the average of the five other neighboring towns in the Union is \$176.66.

May I conclude my report with a quotation from President Herbert Hoover at a national conference on "The Crisis in Education," held in January at Washington:

"Our nation faces the acute responsibility of providing a right-of-way for the American child. In spite of our economic, social, and governmental difficulties, our future citizens must be built up now. We may delay other problems, but we cannot delay the day-to-day care and instruction of our children."
