THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Piermont in the (L. S.) County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are herby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges.

4. To raise and appropriate money for Town Road Aid.

5. To raise and appropriate money for Care of Cemeteries.

6. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Street Lights.

7. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.

8. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Fire Department.

9. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.

10. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committees for same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

12. To raise and appropriate to the White Moun-

tains Region Association, for its program of advertising, etc., as a part of the Cooperative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to 10c per \$1,000 of the assessed valuation of the town for 1949.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's Deeds or otherwise.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to replace the stained glass window with three plain windows in the school room of the Community Building.

17. To see if the Town wishes to purchase New Road Equipment and dispose of the Present Equipment, if so to raise and appropriate money for same.

18. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate \$1,800.00 to finish paying the Simpson Bridge Note.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the school district in the town of Piermont qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March, 1952, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass and vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payments of statutory obligations of the district; the school board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be rasied by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of a School Lunch Program for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to apply to unanticipated expenses.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Piermont Village school opened on Sept. 5, 1951, with an enrollment of 68 pupils. There were 30 secondary pupils in high schools.

The primary room is in charge of Mrs. Esther LaPierre, who holds a B. Ed. degree from Keene Teachers College, and has had several years of successful teaching experience in both Vermont and New Hampshire schools. Miss Lavoie and Mrs. Bowles continue with their excellent work in the elementary building. Mrs. Christie Ritchie has returned as music instructor replacing Miss Emery. Mrs. Muriel LaMott of Haverhill has replaced Miss Latulippe, who resigned last May, as District Nurse.

The conscientious planning and personal interest in the schools, by the school board, have caused excellent working conditions for the teachers as well as attrative and healthy living conditions for the pupils. Major improvements for the year consist of interior painting, which has improved lighting conditions greatly, the installation of hot water in the primary room lavatory, a new floor covering in the lunch kitchen, and new composition tile treads on the stairs replacing the hazardous wooden treads. A new roof was laid on the main building and additional windows and astorm shelter were built on the primary room. The physical condition of the plant and the quality of instruction being given, merit the whole-hearted support of the community.

The hot lunch program continues to fill its important place in the school's program of developing the whole child, which includes its health, of which nutrition is a part. This year the program is being efficiently carried on by Mrs. Charlotte Seibert who has replaced Mrs. Robbins as lunch supervisor. Mrs. Hartwell continues as helper.

The secondary school costs now being charged to tuition paying districts are more nearly reaching actual instructional and operational cost levels, where previously only cost of instruction was charged. This change makes the advisability of a cooperative secondary school, which was so strongly recommended three years ago, even more pertinent, both in terms of a more economical tuition cost basis and in terms of value received for dollars spent. Piermont's share of the estimated cost of building such a school building would amount to approximately 63 cents per week for an owner of taxable property assessed at \$5,000. Can the District afford not to work toward such a school to accommodate grades VII through XII? May I strongly recommend that a planning committee be appointed at the annual school district meeting to make further study of the project.

For this public support, for the diligence of the individual members of the school board, and for the integrity and loyalty of the teaching staff, I am most grateful and herewith express my appreciation and thanks.
