Records of County Delegation

MEETING OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY DELEGATION HELD AT THE COUNTY HOME, **MARCH 20, 1940

The morning was spent in an inspection of the County Home sewerage system.

At 12:30 the Delegation sat down to dinner, during the course of which Commissioner Howard Putnam presented Representative Hall of Langdon a suitable gift and a birthday cake in honor of his ninetieth birthday anniversary.

After dinner the Delegation adjourned to the auditorium. Called to order by Chairman Hutchins of Charlestown the following delegates answered the roll call: Hutchins of Charlestown, Babcock, Converse, Etsler, Holt, Hutchins of Claremont; Officer, Putnam, Russell, Kempton, Donovan, Rowell, Whitney, Hall, Barton, Callum, Hastings, Osborne, and Witherill.

Commissioner Howard Putnam explained in detail the proposed budget for 1940. Commissioners Kiely and Howland spoke of the work done in 1939.

The Delegation then went into executive session. Moved by Officer that the vote of the Delegation on June 14, 1939 whereby \$200,000.00 was appropriated for the year 1940 be rescinded. Carried unanimously.

Voted to instruct the Chairman to appoint a committee of three to confer with the State Health Authorities in regard to a Septic Tank at the County Home and to act with the County Commissioners in the installation of the same. The Chairman appointed Etsler, Osborne, and Kempton.

Under the title Salaries in the proposed budget, it was voted to pass over item g.

Voted to instruct the Commissioners to sell the Jail House property at Newport for not less than \$1,000.00.

Motion made and carried unanimously that the County raise the sum of \$154,000.00 (one hundred fifty-four thousand dollars) for the year 1940 by taxation for the expense of the County.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

The County Delegation respectfully requests the County Commissioners to prepare profit and loss statements of the poultry, swine, and dairy operations at the County Home for the year 1940 for the Delegation. Said report to be given to the Delegation not later than February 15, 1941 so that if desirable it may be printed as part of the 1940 County report if so ordered by the Delegation.

SPECIAL MEETING OF COUNTY CONVENTION

May 21, 1940 1:30 P. M.

Meeting called to order by Chairman Hutchins. Secretary being absent, C. B. Etsler moved that Perl Hutchins be voted temporary clerk of the Convention and the motion was second by C. B. Officer and carried.

The following answered to Roll Call:

C. S. Hutchins, Charlestown; Oney Russell, Clarence Etsler, Sydney Converse, Perl Hutchins, Charles Officer, Claremont; Herbert Barton, Croydon; William Hall, Langdon; Leon Kempton, Edward Maley, Irving Rowell, Newport; John Whitney, Plainfield; Leo Osborne, Sunapee; Arthor Davison, Washington.

Meeting called for legalizing sale of Jail property in Newport. The call of the meeting was read by Chairman Hutchins:

In conformity with the request of the County Commissioners on the date May 10, 1940, in accordance with Chapter 120, Section 3 of the Laws of 1933, I am hereby calling a special

meeting of the Sullivan County Convention for Tuesday, May 21, 1940, at 1:30 P. M. in the County Commissioners' Office, Dickinson Block, Claremont, New Hampshire, for the purpose of transacting business relative to the sale of the County Jail Property situated in Newport, New Hampshire.

Remarks made by Chairman Putnam of the Board of County Commissioners on sale of Jail Property in Newport. Following motion was made by Leon Kempton and seconded by Clarence Etsler:

The County Commissioners are hereby authorized to sell the real estate known as the Jail House Property in Newport for a sum not less than one thousand dollars and to convey the same by executing and delivering in the name of the County a warranty deed of the premises to the purchaser.

The motion was voted unanimously by the fourteen members present.

Clarence Etsler reported for the Committee on investigation of the Sewerage system at the County Home. The following motion was made by Clarence Etsler and seconded by Charles Officer:

The County Commissioners be authorized to contract with a competent engineer for the construction and installation of an adequate septic tank for the disposal of the sewage at the Sullivan County Home and that the Commissioners be further authorized to apply for a Federal WPA Project for the completion of the Sewerage System, which is to include a dosing tank and filter beds.

Motion carried unanimously.

Leo Osborne moved that the Committee of Investigation of the Sewerage System at the Sullivan County Home be discharged. So voted.

Charles Officer moved that the Convention be adjourned.

Commissioner's Report

In accordance with the Public Law of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Sullivan County, herewith present the annual report of the County Commissioners, the County Home and House of Correction, Treasurer, Auditors, Solicitor, Clerk of Court, Sheriff, Chaplain, and the Physician of the County Home for the year ending December 31, 1940.

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

It is with pleasure that we submit our annual report for the year 1940, inasmuch as we have been able to conduct the business of the county within the limits of our budget and still have a substantial savings. We are confident that the high standards in county government have not been curtailed by the large savings made in the past two years, and that all of the functions of this branch of your government have been improved rather than kept at a standstill.

At this time we wish to thank you for your generous cooperation and understanding as we have come in contact with you, the citizens of Sullivan County in the past year.

We also wish to express our appreciation for the conscientious and faithful services of the Chaplain, Physician, and all connected with the Home.

To Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Grout, Superintendent and Matron, we express our appreciation for their very excellent care and supervision rendered at the Sullivan County Home.

COUNTY HOME

One major improvement was started at the Home by constructing a septic tank adequate to handle the sewage of the institution. This septic tank has been completed and is the first step of a modern sewerage system which has been needed for a great many years and without doubt a dosage tank and filter beds can be constructed in the near future thus making a complete sewerage system. The septic tank was built at a relatively small cost to the taxpayers of the county as the labor and part of the materials were furnished by WPA.

After careful consideration your commissioners thought it best to introduce a different breed of cattle at the county farm. Inasmuch as we slaughter the greater part of our own beef for the institution, we believed it to be wise to change part of our Holstein herd to a milk and beef type, therefore we purchased 4 bred Shorthorn heifers and a bull. We were able to pay for these Shorthorns by the sale of young Holstein bulls on the farm. We were also careful to purchase Shorthorns that would be satisfac-

tory for breeding purposes for herds owned by farmers in Sullivan County. We believe in the near future that an adequate beef supply can be had by the county at a less cost, for we all know that three Shorthorns can be kept as cheaply as two Holsteins.

As time goes on we more than realize that the County Home is becoming a Hospital instead of a Home. This is due to the fact that in the past few years there have been several federal and state laws passed which have enabled people to support themselves in their own or private homes. Some of these laws are Aid to Needy Blind, Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children, Old Age and Survivors Insurance and Unemployment Compensation. In the past, many of the recipients of these benefits were unable to take care of themselves other than at a public institution, therefore today a great many of them do not enter our institution until they become ill. Thus following in the light of the above facts, it has become necessary to hire more work done whereas in the past much of the work was done by able-bodied inmates. In the last few years we have found a shortage of House of Correction labor due to policies followed by the Courts in our county of sentencing habitual offenders of the law out of town. We are heartily in accord with the Courts policies, but nevertheless, :t has created a serious problem for us in maintaining the functions of our institution without an ever increasing payroll of private workers.

There are several recommendations for improvements at the institution that we would like to make at this time. First: To build two cottage houses or one two-family house to serve as living quarters for some of the major personnel at the institution. We believe that the county can secure better and more permanent help by being able to give private living quarters to married men in the more responsible positions at the Home. We are proposing a method of accomplishing these quarters in our present budget by asking for the transfer of the money received by the sale of the County Jail Property in Newport to pay the cost of this proposed idea.

Secondly: We believe that some change should be made in the jail quarters in order to provide better accommodations for the prisoners as well as better protection to those in charge of them. At the present time we have a cell block that accommodates eight jail prisoners—jail prisoners being those waiting for trial and not being permitted to work in or out of the institution. There is a small walkway in front of the cells which is the only room supposed to be allowed to these men for exercise. This cell block, located on the north side of the building, is below the ground and is very

dark and dingy at all times, also very damp which we find is injurious to the health of anyone remaining confined for any length of time. To correct this situation in the past, we have allowed the jail prisoners the freedom of the House of Corrections during the hours that the House of Correction prisoners were out to work on the farm. Experience has taught us that there is a great deal of communication between the House of Correction men and the Jail Prisoners. The House of Correction prisoners have great access to many dangerous articles that they are able to smuggle in to the Jail prisoners. If the turnkey had not kept a constant vigilence over the cell blocks and removed these articles they would have permitted serious disturbances or breaks. Therefore, we recommend a sizeable room to be built by excavation next to the cell block which would permit ample room for exercising and sufficient light and ventilation, thus enabling the turnkey to care for both the House of Correction and Jail Prisoners without allowing contact between the two.

Thirdly: We recommend the moving of the present laundry which is situated in the basement of the alms house under the women's section of the building to some other part of the institution, because during the hours that the laundry is running it is very annoying and sets up a rumble throughout the building. We realize that its present position is ideal as far as the receiving and dispensing of the laundry is concerned, but we believe that it would give us additional room which has been so seriously needed in the alms house. It would also do away with disturbances of noise and rumbling which is very tiring to seriously sick patients. We believe this can be accomplished without any additional increase in the budget.

WELFARE AND RELIEF

The relief problem in the county has reached a point where the majority of our cases are of a chronic nature and in which there will be no sizable change at any one time. We are carrying on personal investigations of all cases. It has been a great pleasure to do this investigating while we were in a position to provide jobs for able-bodied people in order that they might be self-supporting. We believe that some reduction can be made in the coming year in relief by children who have secured jobs that pay wages in excess of their living expenses thus making them able to contribute towards the support of their parents who are now recipients of public relief.

CHILDREN

We have been able to reduce the cost of board and care of children this year for the first time since 1934. At the present time we have 73 children boarding in private homes or institutions. These children are about equally divided under the supervision of the State Board of Welfare and the New Hampshire Children's Aid and Protective Society. It seems improbable to us to cut this item due to the amount of cases under investigation at this time. We do believe that thorough study of neglected children shows that it becomes more serious during a depression than when there is a business boom, because parents earning larger wages are undoubtedly providing better home conditions for their children. Child welfare investigations are the most heart-rending cases that we have to deal with.

OLD AGE ASSISTANCE

We have participated in the federal and state program of Old Age Assistance by paying 25% of the grants. At this time we wish to express our appreciation for the excellent cooperation and understanding given to our board on Old Age Assistance by Mrs. Bertha S. Rice and Miss Luceba J. Sherman, field workers for the New Hampshire State Board of Public Welfare in this section.

FINANCES

We are proud to be able to say that we closed the year of 1940 with all bills paid that were presented with a much larger balance than was anticipated at the time the revision of the budget was made in the early part of the year. This saving was not accomplished in large sums but by saving small sums in many ways. We have been able to continue borrowing money to operate on in anticipation of taxes at low rates similar to those enjoyed by the county in the past few years because of our high rating in the financial markets due to our continuous balanced budget.

The Commissioners want to thank the public in general for their confidence, all those who are in the employ of the county, officials of the towns, and of the state, and to Miss Alice G. Kendall, field worker of the New Hampshire Children's Aid and Protective Society, and all others who have given such splendid cooperation in assisting us in county affairs and have interested themselves in the welfare of our county dependents. We are sincerely grateful.

Superintendent's Report

1940

To The Honorable Board of Commissioners of Sullivan County:

As our resignation was tendered to take effect the first day of January we had not anticipated this report. However, we were urged by many of the business men of Claremont to reconsider and we finally agreed to remain for another year.

During the past year the usual amount of renovating has been done in the main building.

It was found necessary to do a great deal of repairing in the cow-barn. New flooring and timbers were placed in part of the building. What was formerly used as a grain-room has been remodeled for use as a milk-room.

We have finished one room over the garage, using pine which was sawed and finished in the Farm carpenter-shop and without outside labor. An adjoining room is under construction.

In compliance with an order from the State Board of Health a septic-tank was constructed at a cost of more than six hundred dollars.

At present our population averages about one hundred and fifty, with about fifty patients in the hospital. Our hospital per sonnel is very small and it is going to be necessary to increase it in order to give the patients adequate care.

Our main problem is the matter of sufficient help and it looks as though conditions will grow worse. During the past few years the available help among the inmates has constantly grown less until now we have very few who are able to do much outside work. We have not had nearly so many prisoners during the past year and at times there are only three or four who are able to do farm work. The situation is really so serious that we fear it may be necessary to curtail production on the farm.

During the past fifteen years we have given our best to the work here and we have always had the interests of the County Home at heart. We appreciate the confidence that has been placed in us and we wish to assure all that we will continue to carry on to the best of our ability.

The County Commissioners have been most co-operative and helpful in the administration of the affairs of the Home and we wish to express our appreciation to them. We are grateful to our co-workers for their assistance and loyalty.

We thank the Junior Red Cross for their attractive gifts at Thanksgiving and Christmas and also all other groups for their gifts and magazines which were much appreciated by our people.

Gentlemen:

Our work has continued along a similar line as last year. Services are usually held alternate Sunday afternoons at three o'clock, except during August. A few of the old, familiar hymns are used, an appropriate story is told, and a short talk is given—all intended to nourish the religious impulse and strengthen moral purposes.

Through the summer and fall the chaplain's wife met with a small but worthy group of young people for religious instruction, at the close of the chapel hour.

Our further effort is rewarded in our calling on the sick, the shut-ins, and the infirm.

At Charistmas time the chapel was beautifully decorated by a large tree covered with lights, tinsels, and colored streamers.

I have officiated at three funeral services.

The chaplain's work has been facilitated by the kindly cooperation of the Superintendent and Matron ,and others concerned in the welfare of the home and those who live there.

Physician's Report

Claremont, N. H., January 1, 1941

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County,

Gentlemen:

There were five births and thirty-two deaths at the Sullivan County Home during the year 1940.

The number of inmates of the County Home who are unable to go to the dining rooms has increased in the past year. When the new Home was opened in 1931 only ten inmates required tray service while now fifty require it. This increase indicates the need for the employment of more nurses to care for the bed patients at the present time. I recommend the employment of two more nurses.

I also recommend the purchase of a diathermy apparatus, a violet ray lamp and an oxygen tent.
