**NOTICE TO
PROPERTY OWNERS**

A new law effective April 1, 1978 imposes a penalty for failure to file a fully completed inventory form.

“RSA 74:7 – a Penalty for Failure to File. Any person who fails to file a fully completed inventory form on or before April 15, unless granted an extension under RSA 74:8, shall pay a penalty of one percent of the property tax for which he is liable. In no case, however, shall the penalty be less than \$10 or more than \$50. Any person who fails to file an inventory form and who becomes liable to pay the penalty specified in this section shall lose his right to appeal any matter pertaining to the property tax for which he is liable or exemptions to which he may be entitled. This penalty has all the force of taxation and shall be treated as incident to the tax.”

Inventory blanks are mailed before March 25 as required under RSA 74:5, but if for any reason you fail to receive one, you should contact the Selectmen to obtain one and complete it as required above.

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Whitefield in the County of Coos and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs. You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at half past seven o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects. The polls shall open for voting at ten o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the afternoon.

3. To see if the Town will vote to grant to the American Legion, Lions Club, Morrison Hospital Association Auxiliary, Mount Washington Grange, Chamber of Commerce, and all church and other resident non-profit organizations for public purposes, the free use of the Town Hall.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money by temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by tax collector's deed by public auction, or advertised sealed bid, or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require, in accordance with RSA 80:42.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize prepayment of resident taxes and to authorize the tax collector to accept prepayments as provided by RSA 80:1-a.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed of a certain roadway known as Holly Heights Development, extending from Elm Street eighteen hundred (1800) feet along said roadway. Said roadway having been approved in construction by the road agent and being constructed in accord with requirements of the Town's sub-division regulations.

9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as a highway, and the maintenance thereof, the roadway running from Route 3 past the former Elmer Black property, now the property of Roland and Alma Beaulieu.

10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as a highway, and the maintenance thereof, the roadway formerly part of Route 116 adjacent to the property owned by Russell Briggs.

11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as a highway, and the maintenance thereof, the roadway running from the South Whitefield Road into the property belonging to Thom and Joanne Richardson.

12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as a highway, and the maintenance thereof, the roadway running from the Jefferson Road to the property owned by Glenn and Caroline Lunn.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to the White Mountains Center for the Arts at Bretton Woods, in order to provide tickets to the Town through its Recreation Department for a special Sunday afternoon Children's Series.

14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Anti-Recession Fiscal Assistance Fund the sum of nine thousand two hundred and fifty-nine dollars (\$9,259) for use as set-off against budgeted appropriation for Town Officers' Expenses.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand (\$3,000) as the Town's contribution to the Morrison Hospital Association.

16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate two thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,400) for the Whitefield Senior Citizens Club and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for continuance of reconstruction work on Parker Road and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate six thousand five hundred dollars (\$6,500) for a Police Cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to repair the retaining wall on Brown Street and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to up-grade the town streets and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to continue necessary work on South Whitefield Road and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for furnaces for the town garage and town hall and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

23. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for shed and storage bins at the town landfill and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the Children's Community Center and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. *By Petition*

25. To see if the Town will vote to accept White Mt. Lakeside Cottage Road, Forest Lake, as a town road and to maintain it. *By Petition*

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) as Whitefield's contribution to the Weeks Memorial Hospital. *By Petition*

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) for the Littleton Hospital to use to purchase capital medical equipment essential to continuing the quality of health care delivered to hospital patients. Report of equipment purchased is to be made to the town by the hospital administration. *By Petition*

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) for the purpose of insuring the continued operation of the Weathervane Theatre Players, Inc. *By Petition*

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-seven hundred dollars (\$3,700) to continue Public Health Nursing Service in Whitefield. *By Petition*

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand three hundred twenty-one dollars and twenty-five cents (\$2,321.25) as contribution to White Mountain Mental Health Center. *By Petition*

31. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before said meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of our examination of the financial statements of the Town of Whitefield, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1979. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of this report.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

A balance sheet disclosing the financial condition of the general fund is presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the unreserved fund balance amounted to \$138,979 at December 31, 1979. A statement of the changes in fund balance is shown in Exhibit A-2.

Statements of estimated and actual revenues, appropriations, expenditures and encumbrances are included in Exhibits A-3 and A-4, respectively. Revenues in excess of estimates amounted to \$21,472, while appropriations exceeded expenditures and encumbrances by \$85,436, resulting in a 1979 budget surplus of \$106,908.

GENERAL COMMENTS

In a management letter submitted to the Board of Selectmen on February 13, 1979, we made many suggestions for improving the Town's bookkeeping system and to correct weaknesses in the internal control which existed. We hope the Selectmen will review these suggestions and attempt to implement as many as possible to upgrade the bookkeeping system of the Town.

Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Funds (ARFA)


As part of our compliance audit of the Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Funds (ARFA), we checked to see if all of the ARFA Funds had been appropriated or obligated within six (6) months of receipt, according to the regulations. We found that \$11,296.15 of ARFA funds received in 1976 and 1977 had not been appropriated or obligated as of January 1, 1979; upon further examination of the Town records in 1979, we found that \$4,800

of ARFA funds were appropriated for School Crossing Guards in 1979, but only \$2,361.59 was expended. With the addition of interest earned of \$324.67 in 1979, the unappropriated ARFA fund balance as of December 31, 1979, amounted to \$9,259.23 as computed below.

1978 was a "boom" year for the library; unfortunately in 1979 circulation and accessions slackened off. Inflation has hit the library very hard this year. The average price for a hard-cover novel is now \$10.95, compared to \$8.95 last year and \$5.95 before that. Children's books have gone up so that an average picture book is now \$7.95! (Library books are particularly expensive because of the heavy-duty bindings we require.) Our budget for books has simply not kept up with the inflation rate.

The inflation rate has fortunately not had a negative effect on the generous donations of our patrons. We even received a monetary gift to help pay for maintenance of the building. This gift, compliments of the Women's Study Club, helped to put a fresh coat of paint on the library walls this fall. Our heartfelt thanks to all friends who have helped us again this year.

The CETA program provided us with a part-time employee this spring. Having extra help gave us time to weed our fiction collection and update our card catalog.

Our annual Book Sale was held Labor Day weekend, and as usual was a resounding success with hundreds of unusable books sold.

Another summer Story Hour program was conducted at the library. The stories were combined with pertinent arts and crafts projects for an educational as well as enjoyable hour. Our thanks to Mrs. Eileen Kennedy for the many hours she devoted to this program.

Local librarians met this fall and started the North Country Library Cooperative. (NCLC) The co-op hopes to promote the use of libraries and has received funding from the N.H. Commission on the Arts. The NCLC sponsored performances by the "Two-Headed Cow" Puppet Theatre at the Littleton and Franconia libraries

in November, with future programs to be held in Whitefield.

At the close of another year I would again like to thank my trusted assistants, Liz Matott and Jonna Robinson for their help and for “being there” when needed. I also urge townspeople to make use of your library; we’re more than happy to help provide answers to lots of questions, both in business and in personal areas.

The estimated completion date to the March of 1980. This project satisfies a long term life safety code deficiency mandated by the Federal government.

Another major project was undertaken by resurfacing most of the roof which was in need of much repair.

WHITEFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT

The year 1979 was a very active year for the Whitefield Police Department. We received and investigated a total of 1,627 complaints this year compared to 1,453 last year. The calls for police aid, other than complaints totaled 1,046 this year compared to 969 last year.

Last year I recorded a total of \$30,000.00 worth of items stolen in Whitefield. We were able to recover about \$26,010.00. During 1978, many items stolen were valuable antiques. This year almost anything that would sell fast was stolen. We recorded a total of \$45,822.00 worth on property stolen. The recovered amount was \$13,120.00

The problems with juvenile crime, which I had hoped was on the decrease, made a turn for the worse. Last year we had only a few troubled youths in court. This year it was necessary to take fifteen children into court. The involvement with alcohol and the young adults seems to be getting higher. Let us hope that the age requirement for possessing alcohol now being 20, will help.

This department investigated a total of 52 motor vehicle accidents which resulted in over \$300.00 damage. I deeply regret having to report that on October 26, 1979, the north country was shocked when three teenagers were killed in Whitefield. The tragic accident claimed the lives of Jorge de Villafane 18, Whitefield. Teresa Graves 14, Whitefield and Michael Hilliard 16, Lancaster. I can only say that I was greatly disturbed with this and will do anything in my power to prevent this from happening in the future, a goal I am not quite sure how to achieve.

Thanks to the generosity of the public, the Whitefield Police Association has been able to purchase some needed equipment, one item is a new 35 MM camera. This fits our needs perfectly. We have been able to preserve evidence that otherwise would not be available when needed. We are also checking into the possibility of purchasing a base radio for the police station. This would greatly increase the area we can communicate over. This is an expensive item, but we hope to be able to get it without using tax dollars. Also I have been in contact with the New Hampshire Crime Commission for some federal funding. This would enable us to purchase equipment at 50% of the listed cost. A savings worth checking into. Several other items have also been listed as things needed. We will be checking for the best place to purchase these.

The Whitefield Police Department was issued a grant from the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency. This grant was funds for the hiring of a summer cadet. Ellen Smith of Whitefield was chosen to serve the town under this title. Hopefully, she will now get involved in some type of law enforcement field. Ellen's service to Whitefield was commendable.

I would like to take this time to thank you for your support and cooperation.

WHITEFIELD LIFE SQUAD

The year 1979 was an active and productive one for the Whitefield Life Squad. Much progress has been made in the areas of communications, equipment acquisition and ongoing training.

The Life Squad now has the facilities to be called out with a paging system which is activated through the Highway Office in Lancaster, by dialing **837-9901** or **788-4641**. This system has reduced the response time to a call by approximately 50%. The communications equipment, valued at \$2,000.00 was acquired by the Squad through a Federal Grant in 1978.

The nucleus of the Life Squad is composed of eleven members who are all certified in C.P.R. and are either E.M.T.'s or Advanced First Aiders. Each member has had a minimum of seventy-two hours of emergency medical training and C.P.R. with continuous training being given at our regular meetings each month. The meetings are held twice monthly at the old Fire Station and are open to all interested parties.

During 1979 the Life Squad responded to fifty-six calls. A summary of those calls are listed below.

CHILDREN'S COMMUNITY CENTER

1979 was another successful year for the Children's Community Center. The day care services it provides are presently being used by fifty-five families from Whitefield and surrounding area. Quality child care for working parents has become a necessary part of every community and the Center works hard to maintain its standard of excellence. The Center is open from 6:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., five days a week. Children using the Center range in age from 18 months to five years, with some older children coming in after school. There is also a pre-school program in the morning.

Licensed by the New Hampshire Division of Welfare, the Children's Community Center has a staff of nine, led by Director Ann Fogg. As a day care center, the children enjoy two snacks, a hot lunch at noontime, and many have a hot breakfast as well. Parents pay a rate of 80 cents per hour for one child, 90 cents per hour for two children, and \$1.00 per hour for three children or more, with a maximum weekly charge of \$27.00, \$33.00, and \$40.00 respectively. This provides the primary source of funds necessary to run the organization.

As a tax exempt, non-profit corporation, a fifteen member Board of Directors is elected from the community to work with the staff on its activities and policies. q The Children's Community Center is grateful to its friends within the community and hopes to continue providing quality day care services for Whitefield residents.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full-time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

TOWN REPORT

from the North Country Council to the Town of Whitefield

In Whitefield, North Country Council provided technical assistance to the Planning Board regarding subdivision regulations and the proposed master plan. Coordinating efforts regarding the Whitefield Airport Master Plan by providing information and assistance to the town and consultants and adjacent towns. Identified major capital improvements program in town.

This past year of 1979 saw a mixture of planning and action for the North Country Council, Inc. Major contributions were made in rural and economic development, local planning, and transportation.

In rural development, the Council assisted approximately twenty-five communities in taking positive steps on such concerns as housing, downtown revitalization, water supply and solid waste. The council has helped communities obtain needed housing resources. Working with appropriate state and federal agencies, the Council assisted targeted communities by preparing applications and by providing information so decisions can be made. In economic development, the Council assisted two communities with steps toward the creation of parks which will provide a necessary place for additional jobs. Energy development activities have encouraged the development of indigenous resources such as wood and hydro power. NCC has also been active in helping local companies with loan applications and business counseling, and in assisting a targeted community with a revolving loan fund. Additional business development services will be provided during the coming year to encourage existing area and other in-state businesses to expand or locate so that more jobs can be provided in the North Country. An industrial brochure has been published which promotes the quality of life in the region and the resources available for small companies.

Local planning assistance, such as master planning, subdivision regulations, zoning, review of development proposals continues to be a major function of the Council. This activity will take on greater significance with the NH Supreme Court's emphasis on local master planning as a basis for local regulations.

Technical reports have been prepared on Mt. Washington Valley's Seasonal Population and on wetland evaluation and management. Brief and informative fact sheets on community investment strategies, land capability and wetlands are also available.

To advocate North Country transportation needs at the state and federal level, a Transportation Committee has been organized with representatives from different communities and transportation sectors.

The Council acts as a "regional spokesman" with membership on the Governor's Advisory Committee on Growth, the N.H. Environmental Law Clinic, and the State's Forestry Resources Committee. By sponsoring forums and conferences on growth in the forest industry, agricultural development, and regional land use, the Council

has brought together people, ideas, and resources to generate appropriate solutions.

We believe that the Council has a program that can assist its rural communities in meeting the challenges and opportunities of the 1980s. The Board of Directors, the staff and the entire Council greatly appreciate the support your Town has provided in 1979 and over the last few years. Please call us at 823-8108 if the Council can be of service to your town.
