THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School Auditorium in said Andover on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, when polls will open at ten o'clock in the forenoon to permit voting in the Presidential Primary, for the election of town officers and delegates to the Constitutional Convention, and to determine whether or not Sweepstakes Tickets shall be sold in this town. The town meeting will open at seven o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
- 2. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray the charges of town government for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same. (Estimate \$7,000)
- 3. To raise and appropriate money for highways and bridges and take any action relating thereto, under the following headings:
 - a. General town road maintenance. (Estimate \$13,000)
 - b. General highway expenses. (Estimate \$4,000)

 - c. Asphalt and patch. (Estimate \$4,500)d. Town Road Aid (\$844.84 to match \$5,632.44 from State)
 - e. Permanent bridge repair. (Estimate \$2,500)
 - f. Street lights. (Estimate \$1,200)
- 4. To raise and appropriate money for the protection of persons and property under the following headings:
 - a. Police department. (Estimate \$1,000)b. Fire departments. (Estimate \$2,200)

 - c. Civil defense. (Estimate \$100)
 - d. White pine Blister rust. (State requests \$98)
- 5. To raise and appropriate money for the payment of insurance premiums of all types. (Estimate \$900)
- 6. To raise and appropriate money for defraying the expenses of the town health department, as follows:
 - a. General expenses, covering dump maintanance, recording vital statistics and miscellaneous. (Estimate \$1,800)

 - b. Nursing service. (\$1,700 was raised in 1963)
 c. Contributions to Franklin and New London Hospitals. (\$150 each in 1963)
- 7. To raise and appropriate money for the use of the Andover Library. (The library trustees request \$1,700)

- 8. To raise and appropriate money for the care of the cemeteries. (Estimate \$500)
- 9. To raise and appropriate money for taking care of the poor, old age assistance and aid to soldiers and their families. (Estimate \$5,000)
- 10. To raise and appropriate money for maintenance and improvements at the Highland Lake bathing beach and take any action relating thereto. (Estimate \$400)
- 11. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$550 for the town's contribution to the Social Security program for its employees.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Region.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 36:1 of the Laws of 1963, which make it legal for the tax collector to accept prepayments on account of property taxes in multiples of not less than \$10.
- 14. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the short section of Route 11 on the east side of the junction of said Route 11 and Route US 4 at the so-called Woodward Corner, now rendered obsolete by the relocation of Route 11 at this point.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Selectmen's Report

To The Town

The year 1963 just ended has seen many changes in Andover, its way of life, its tax structure and its town government. To sum up a few briefly, before going into detail: (1) the High School was discontinued and the students transported to Franklin and New London on a tuition basis, (2) the Town Hall has passed into private hands, (3) the town's largest industry and employer of labor, the Dalphond Bros. sawmill, was destroyed by fire on October 8th, (4) the New England Power Company plant has been placed on a fully automatic basis and its employees transferred elsewhere, (5) necessary and tighter regulations have gone into effect at the town dump, (6) the police department has been re-organized, and (7) all taxable property in Andover has been re-appraised on the basis of 100% of full valuation in compliance with the statutes and in keeping with increasing general practice throughout the state.

The town is in good shape financially, with a net addition of \$3,771.33 to its surplus account at the end of the year. This despite an overdraft or overspending of appropriations of \$4,401.59. The overdrafts occurred mainly in highway and poor relief accounts, with left-over balances in others. Snow removal costs were high in early 1963. Old age assistance, after leveling off for several years, increased substantially again. Unfortunate sickness, unemployment and other factors more than exhausted the money provided for poor relief.

Several resignations of elected and appointed town officials occurred during the year, for a variety of causes; Lawrence Rising and Amy Corkum as library trustees, John Chamberlin from the Planning Board, Richard Marvin as building inspector, and Gerald Walker from the

police force.

Mrs. Cordelia Graves and Mrs. Virginia Ottati are recent appointees to the library committee, to fill vacancies until the town meeting. Mrs. Mary Martin was appointed as an additional trustee for the same period to meet a requirement that library trustees should be numbered in multiples of three. It will be necessary for the town to elect four library trustees; two for a three year term, one for two years and one for one year.

The town meeting falls on March 10th. Candidates for election to town and school offices must file with the respective clerks not later than 6 p. m. on Monday, March 2nd to get their names on the ballots. To meet legal requirements for the presidential primary election the polls will open for voting at 10 a. m. instead of the customary 1:00 p. m. Town meeting will open at 7:00 p. m. as usual.

RE-APPRAISAL OF TAXABLE PROPERTY

For some time your selectmen have felt that a complete re-appraisal of taxable property valuations in Andover was overdue, to correct inequities and bring tax assessments more nearly in proper alignment with true relative values. In their opinion this might best be done by disinterested trained appraisers from outside the town. However, the last town meeting refused to go along with this proposition, tossing the job back on the selectmen.

During the spring and summer every residential property in town was inspected by the board and re-assessed for tax purposes at what it believed to be a fair and reasonable full and true value, without regard for any previous figures carried in prior assessment books. This was not the detailed examination which would have been given each property by trained appraisers, nor did we expect complete tax-payer satisfaction. In this we were not disappointed.

The statutes calling for assessment at full and true value, long ignored, are fast becoming generally observed and will soon be enforced. We regret that some veterans lost the \$1,000 property tax exemption previously enjoyed, but under new legislation passed by the last General Court effective April 1st next some of these will regain their preferred status this year. It must be remembered that when property was assessed at only 50% of full value all veterans have benefited from double the tax exemption to which they have been legally entitled, at the expense of their less fortunate neighbors.

LOSSES IN VALUATION

It is too early to predict what effect the full automation of the New England Power Company plant will have on the tax structure. Certainly it will not be favorable. In any case, we regret the loss of the public-spirited citizens and their families who have been transferred elsewhere.

We believe the loss of the Dalphond sawmill plant will be only temporary and that it will be rebuilt,

SALES AND PURCHASES

In accordance with the vote of the town the Andover Town Hall was advertised and sold at public auction on August 17th to John Jurta Jr. for \$4,800. At the same auction the old Int. T-40 tractor, long obsolete for snow removal purposes, was sold for \$650 to John W. Whitcomb. The small nurses building on the town hall grounds brought \$80 for the nursing association, to which it was given by Mrs. Josephine Hamp many years ago.

After much delay the Boston & Maine Railroad finally deeded the so-called "Common" at East Andover to the town for the agreed price of \$500. Now that this plot is under town control it is hoped that it may eventually be developed into an attractive little spot in the center of the village. The new street broom authorized by the last town meeting was purchased last spring for \$1,135 and used to remove sand from our blacktop roads.

HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES

Town Road Aid was again expended on Taunton Hill. The construction was so nearly completed when the allotment ran out that your selectmen authorized an additional expenditure of \$387.50 to finish the job while men and equipment were on the spot. We now have a new road from the school house corner to the Mountain Brook.

The Class V Road allotment (so-called Duncan money) was spent to rebuild and tar the road along the "Stream" in East Andover village.

Snow removal early in 1963 took a big bite out of the highway appropriation, but during the year Road Agent Jurta and the highway crew were able to carry out some road improvements in addition to the usual maintenance. To sum up the year's accomplishments briefly: (1) one mile of the Switch Road from Alpine was widened, graveled and tarred, (2) Chase Hill road was resealed and partly widened, (3) four other sections of town road were widened and graveled, (4) twelve new culverts were laid for better drainage, and 5) five bridges were repaired and re-planked, one of them requiring extensive work on the abutments. Steel beams are on hand to replace the wooden stringers on the latter. Bridge repairs were delayed temporarily last fall when the Dalphond sawmill burned before the bridge plank on order there could be sawed out, and they had to be located elsewhere. Alterations are being made at No. 9 storehouse to better house some of the road equipment.

Your selectmen and road agent feel that as a long range program a definite sum of money should be appropriated each year to reconstruct one town bridge, with steel girders and asphalted steel floor similar to the one on the river bridge at Andover. Wooden stringers and planks deteriorate so rapidly that in the long run this construction is more expensive than a better bridge, as well as being a continual source of liability and annoyance. Article 3e suggests appropriation

of \$2,500 for this purpose in 1964.

THE TOWN DUMP (alias "The Community Headache!")

Someone has aptly said of a town dump, "You can't get along without one, and it is just about as hard to get along with it." Your selectmen heartily agree.

Under state fire regulations no town is eligible for a permit to burn refuse daily at a public dump and for financial aid in controlling any fire escaping from it UNLESS the dump is kept closed by a locked gate at all times during the fire season when an attendant is not on duty. We cannot afford a recurrence of the Easter Sunday fire of a few years ago, which might be even more serious next time.

Last spring the entire dump area was cleaned up, a gate installed and new regulations drawn up for its use. A wire baffle fence is planned for next spring to better control the blowing papers. The new regulations provided for open hours on three and one-half days each week out of the seven. These hours were set after consultation with the caretaker as to times of maximum and minimum usage, and are far more liberal than those in surrounding towns. Residents of those towns had been previously using the Andover dump, which is now restricted to town residents and property owners.

For a while it seemed to the selectmen that no one was satisfied with the new schedule of "open hours", and if all requests for changes were granted it would have required a full-time caretaker, day and night, seven days a week; obviously a financial impossibility. In general the plan has worked out very well. If a greater degree of service is demanded during the coming year it will be up to the town meeting to provide additional funds to cover it. On the present basis

we are suggesting an appropriation of \$1,800 for the dump.

We take pleasure in commending Gerald Smith and Perley Coutermarsh on an excellent job of keeping the dump clean and safe during an exceedingly dry season.

POLICE RE-ORGANIZATION

For many years Andover has successfully gone along with a minimum of expense and a very modest appropriation for police protection. In these troubled times the picture seems to be changing. This past summer, more than ever before, the townspeople have become increasingly annoyed by the night activities of a few irresponsible, unthinking or uncaring "cowboys" with motor cars, who raced up and down the village streets late at night with squealing tires and screeching brakes. Personnel at Proctor Academy, as well as the group of scientists in summer residence there, have on occasion been subjected to annoyance and insults.

At a meeting calling together all those holding police appointments in the town the group re-organized itself, elected Ernest S. Blake as its Chief and William J. Miller as Deputy Chief, and made recommendations to the selectmen. Among them was a suggestion that one or two officers make unscheduled night patrols to try to curb the existing annoyances. This met with immediate approval from Headmaster Farrell at Proctor, with a promised donation of \$1,000 to supplement the meager town appropriation and put the plan in effect immediately.

Following such occasional night patrols by Officers Blake and Miller we are glad to report that the situation is improved. The contribution from Proctor was forthcoming as promised and one-half the amount was applied to the year ending December 31st. The patrols will be continued as long as it may appear necessary and desirable, and our thanks go to Headmaster Farrell for his cooperation.

In our opinion the town can no longer expect to give its citizens adequate police protection without raising substantially more money for this purpose.

During the summer the interior of the town office and the common entrance hall shared with the library have been repainted to make them more attractive.

In order to better identify the local roads and village streets the Andover Lions' Club plans to provide and erect metal name signs at the principal town road intersections. These will add attractiveness to our highways and be a boon to strangers. Where a road or street has no particular name, or is known by several names, the one most appropriate or more commonly heard will be used.

Your selectmen endorse this and other worthwhile projects for community betterment sponsored by the Lions, and feel sure that the whole community will appreciate them also.

The increasing number of house trailers in Andover has alarmed many of our citizens, who feel that they should be restricted to definite designated locations. This can be accomplished only thru a Zoning Ordinance adopted by the town and would not be retroactive. The Planning Board is not ready to present such an ordinance at the coming town meeting. As this report goes to press its chairman has resigned and another member is away for the winter. The matter has

been under discussion but no definite conclusions or agreement reached.

A favorable vote of the town is necessary under Article 13 in the warrant to make it legal for a town tax collector to accept partial payments on account of property taxes in multiples of not less than \$10. Required by Chapter 36:1 of the Laws of 1963.

We were quite pleased when the judges of the New Hampshire Town Report Contest saw fit to award the 1963 Andover town report first place in the class for towns of 500 to 1,000 population. It later won second place in the New England contest. This is the fourth award received

by the town in the state contest since it began.

Regrettably both the town and school district budgets, printed elsewhere in this report, show substantial increases over the amounts raised and appropriated last year. In the town budget these increases are mainly for police (\$850), the town dump (\$600), highways and bridges (\$1,900), relief (\$1,000), and the library trustees' request for an additional \$550. The net increase approximates \$4,400.

In the school budget the net figure of \$114,273.00 is \$8,729.84 higher

than the amount finally raised and appropriated in 1963.


In our opinion the increase in town spending, if all suggested appropriations are made, may be covered by using not to exceed \$5,000 from

the town's surplus.

We can only recommend that you, as voters and taxpayers, study each proposed expenditure in both budgets carefully, to the end that working together we may hold the line wherever possible. The extent of the tax burden is determined at the two meetings on March 10th, and not by the selectmen at some later date.

Andover Libraries

The trustees of Andover's two public libraries are proud to present the following report:

During the spring the two librarians participated in an Extension Course from the University of New Hampshire on THE LIBRARY AS AN INFORMATION CENTER. As a result of this several books of reference have been purchased for each library and the purchase of more is anticipated.

Three "Story Hours" were held at the William Adams Bachelder Library during the summer by its librarian, Mrs. Shirley Keyser.

The trustees were represented at both the House and Senate hearings on the Library Development Program bill sponsored by the New Hampshire Library Trustees Association, at the annual meeting of that association, and at the Richards Free Library in Newport when it was presented with the \$1,000 Dorothy Canfield Fisher award.

In September the Andover Library was made the official school library thru action of the school board, and two more open hours were added for the benefit of the public. As a result the Andover libraries are now open at some time each week day except Friday.

In October the trustees voted to join a co-operative book-buying group with Bristol, Franklin, Tilton-Northfield, Belmont and Canterbury, resulting in a saving of an additional six percent on most book purchases. In addition to this saving the librarians and trustees feel that there is a distinct advantage in actually seeing a large selection of new books before purchasing, enabling them to judge print, illustrations and bindings.

Improvements in the physical facilities of the Andover Library continue. A more suitable desk has been purchased for the librarian, a newer typewriter has been loaned by the school board, new and improved lighting has been installed, more chairs and tables are being provided, and a storage closet and workroom has been completed.

Weeding and cataloging of the adult fiction is progressing to make more space for new books, and shades for the large windows are being renovated.

A grant from the State of \$150 for adult non-fiction has improved this classification to some degree.

At the William Adams Bachelder Library additional book shelving has been added, with a new book case in the juvenile section. The Mollie Bachelder room has been brightened with new paint and 500 crocus bulbs have been planted on the north bank of the grounds.

The two librarians have performed their work faithfully and well, and are commended for their interest at small compensation. It was

deemed advisable to secure volunteer help for Mrs. Grace George on Thursday afternoons when the school children use the library.

A total of 12,605 books and magazines was circulated in 1963.

The schools of Andover were completely reorganized this year and your school board has tried to do this as efficiently as possible and at the same time maintain high educational standards. The Andover High School was closed and the Andover Elementary School was reorganized.

We were fortunate to secure as principal of the Andover Elementary School Mr. Perley Henderson who we feel has done a fine job this past year. His background in elementary education, and his interest in the welfare of the Andover students have combined to give Andover an administration of which the citizens have a right to be proud. The teachers deserve a great deal of credit for their work as they have been most cooperative in the development of a good program. In addition to the fundamentals we have had teachers in shop, home economics, art and music. We feel this has enriched the curriculum and added much to the elementary program. The musical program put on at Christmas time was most outstanding and we all want to congratulate both Mrs. Pierce and the pupils for a job well done.

Transportation for high school pupils was furnished to both New London and Franklin High Schools. Pupils went from Andover to both of these schools and appear to be making the transition very well.

The trustees of the Andover Library have cooperated with the schools in every way possible. This has been of real assistance to the school system. Anything the town can do to improve the libraries will be of benefit to the young people in our schools.

Mrs. Nelson and her assistants have developed a good school lunch program and most of the school children have participated in the program. The kitchen is now equipped so meals can be served efficiently and should serve both the school and community for many years to come.

We were very sorry to lose the services of Mrs. Klotz as school nurse. She has done an excellent job during the past few years and we sincerely hope the Andover Nursing Association will be able to replace her in the near future.

Some of the parents have contacted the school board when they had school problems and occasionally have come to school board meetings, to get answers to their questions. Your school board would like to encourage this procedure because only as we all work together can we hope to develop a good school.

We would like to express our appreciation to all the citizens and civic organizations which have contributed in so many ways to the welfare of our children, and to furthering the opportunities for educational advancement.

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will authorize the school board to exceed the adopted budget of 1963-64 by an amount not to exceed \$2,000.00 if needed.
- 10. To conduct any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
