## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted matches is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result — escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
2. To **never** discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn—
  - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for **all** debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
  - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on **grass** by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
  - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire **before** you light the match.
4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board and the Citizens of the Barnstead School District: I respectfully submit my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The doors of the Barnstead Elementary School opened this September with six of the seven teachers being new to the Barnstead District. This placed an extra burden upon the principal, who was new, in organizing the staff to function as a unit. At the time of writing this report nearly half the year has gone by, but not without a few difficult times which now appear to have leveled off into a smoothly functioning staff and program.

It became necessary, as a result of Mr. Justice's resignation, to find a replacement in the middle of the year. We were very fortunate to be able to employ Mr. Paul Lynch who now is serving as Principal and also teaching English and social studies in grades six, seven and eight.

It was disappointing to have Mr. Justice resign. He had a philosophy of education that ran into difficulties and it did not become an effective way to operate. Mr. Justice realized the need to better prepare himself in order to fully implement his philosophy, thus he has now made plans to go to England to become more knowledgeable and acquire more experience.

There is still a very important problem existing at the Barnstead School, that is to expect a person to be a full time teacher in three different grades and also be the Principal and have responsibilities for the coordination and supervision of the rest of the teaching staff. Two years ago I indicated the need for better educational opportunities for the Junior High School age student. Last year I expanded on the need to improve the preparation of this age student for entrance into high school. My stand has not changed. Short of tuitioning the seventh and eighth graders to Pittsfield, the Barnstead voters should approve a full time teacher for grade six, a full time teacher for grade seven, and a full time teacher for grade eight. This would result in having a full time teacher for each grade. To accomplish this would require the hiring of one more teacher. This request has been included in the budget and, as your Superintendent, I herein seek your strong support.

Where are teachers' salaries going? Well, there is one thing for sure, if a school district is to keep themselves competitive, the salary is going up. The average starting salary for teachers in 1968-69 was \$5,550.00. This next year clearly indicates starting salaries to be \$6,000.00 or higher. With the increased pressure being placed upon school systems throughout the State, it appears salaries will continue to have an upward trend. The problem appears to be one that needs to be solved in the State Legislature. The local community is carrying an unreasonable burden of taxation on their property. There is a clear need for greater support from the State.

It is the hope of this administration that the strong and able teachers presently on the staff of the Barnstead Elementary School return for another year of teaching. Barnstead cannot continue to have the extensive turn over in staff as it experienced last year. One important aspect of attracting a good teacher to remain is salary. This is an aspect that can directly be effected by you as a voter. By retaining teachers makes it possible to give your students greater continuity in his educational problems.

I want to express sincere appreciation to the parents, business men, citizens, and especially the members of the School Board, for their continued understanding and interest.

## REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

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To the School Board and the citizens of Barnstead, it is my pleasure to submit my second annual report as the Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

Barnstead has continued to improve the up-dating of textbooks with this year's purchase of new reading material. At present an in-depth study of social studies material is being made. It is our desire to adopt new social studies textbooks for the 1969-70 school year. In 1966-67 new science texts were purchased; in 1967-68 new language art texts were purchased; and our long range plans are to purchase new mathe-

matics texts in 1970-71. This purchasing cycle will give us a forecastable budgetary amount in the 215 account as well as replacing textbooks when they are five to six years old which is about the maximum life of this type of material.

The new testing program which was begun this year appears to be very successful. Results from the tests are being used to better understand what concepts should be stressed in the classroom. The results have also been helpful on an individual basis for each student can be studied and the areas in which he is weak can be strengthened through special help.

With the large turn over of teachers last year, the first half of 1968-69 was a more difficult transitional period than usual. The school now has settled down and its operation is going smoothly.

Within the classroom some fine teaching is taking place. Contracts for the next school year will be offered shortly after the district meeting and it is hoped that the strong faculty members will return which would insure continued quality education and a smooth transition into the 1969-70 school year.

It is evident that Barnstead has made a determined effort to offer the youth of the community a good education. The facility is modern and uncrowded, two conditions which are rare in communities of New England. The basic teaching tools are available to the teachers and through textbooks, the school library, and the excellent cooperation of the town librarian, the students, and teachers are able to obtain the necessary printed material to carry on quality education.

Our first concern is to give the youth of Barnstead the kind of education which will allow them to compete successfully at the secondary level and which will be the basis for good citizenship as adults in a Democratic society. We hope that the present educational process is achieving both of these goals.

I wish to express my appreciation for the continued support of education by the citizens of Barnstead. I also wish to thank the School Board for their loyal and determined efforts to represent the people of the town and improve education. Although we have experienced some very real problems during the first half of this school year, we feel that their solution has been found and the remainder of the year should go well.
