DISTRICT WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE —
ROCKINGHAM, SS.

To the Inhabitants of Little Boar's Head District, a village district in the Town of North Hampton, organized under provisions of Chapter 196, Session Laws of 1905, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Union Chapel, on Willow Avenue in said District, on the first Tuesday of September next (the 3rd day of the month) at half past seven o'clock in the evening (7:30 P.M.) Daylight Saving Time, for the following purposes:

1. To elect a Moderator, a Clerk, three Commissioners, a Treasurer, and an Auditor for the ensuing year.
2. To hear the reports of the Clerk, Treasurer, Commissioners, Board of Zoning Inspectors and other officers of said District, and to take such action as may be desired in regard to same.
3. To take such action as you may desire in regard to giving the Treasurer of the District authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the District will vote to accept in whole or in part the Budget as submitted by the Municipal Budget Committee.
5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be needed for the purposes included in the budget, including (under the caption of "Miscellaneous" if not otherwise therein

referred to) the extinguishment of fires, the lighting of streets, the planting and care for shade and ornamental trees, the supply of water for domestic and fire purposes, the construction and maintenance of sidewalks and main drains or common sewers, the construction, maintenance, and care of parks or commons, the maintenance of activities for recreational promotion, the control of pollen, insects and pests, the appointing and employing of watchmen and police officers, the enacting and enforcing of zoning regulations, and all other District expenses for the ensuing year.

6. To transact such other business as may legally come before said meeting.

Commissioners' Report

1973 - 1974

1. Our Village District. When Little Boar's Head District was first created under special legislative act in 1905, it was with the object of providing services that were not then furnished by the Town of North Hampton. Among these were hydrant service (with the attendant public water supply) from the newly organized Hampton Water Works Company, street lights and sidewalks.

Much later, when the Town began installing street lights, and then hydrant service (with public water lines) throughout the Town, it took over first this District's street lights, and then our hydrants. Lifeguard service, also, was initiated by our village district, and is now shared with the Town.

But the Town has never built public sidewalks, as we have here. Mosquito sprays and the picking up of litter on our beaches and highways are other services undertaken for many years by the District, though not by the Town.

In the important field of zoning, our District was also a pioneer. Our Zoning Ordinance was passed on September 7, 1937; and it was not until 1946, nine years later, that the Town of North Hampton adopted a zoning ordinance. Our restrictions were at first more stringent than the Town's; but now the Town's ordinance has been upgraded.

During the 37 years that we have had a District Zoning Ordinance, 41 cases have been brought before our Board of Adjustment. Of these, 9 have concerned the business now known as Pope's Ice Cream Stand, and 6 that now styled the Sand Dollar Sandwich Shoppe. One of the most hotly contested issues to come before our Board of Adjustment was that of building a large hotel and convention hall on Fifield Island. Incidentally, the New Hampshire Supreme Court in 1958 upheld the validity of conditional variances under our Zoning Ordinance, when applied to land, though not to individuals, in limiting the expansion of non-conforming uses, in the case of *Vlahos Realty Co., Inc. vs. Little Boar's Head District* (101 N.H. 460).

In our opinion, a strong and carefully worded zoning law (apart from its effect in preserving property values) has been one of the major factors contributing to the stability of Little Boar's Head. Our Zoning Ordinance is administered by a Board of Zoning Inspectors and by a Board of Adjustment, all

of whom, like our other District officers, live in Little Boar's Head and serve without pay.

From the District's relatively few legal voters during its early years, Little Boar's Head has now grown to include over 100 resident voters; and as long as we have people living here who are able and willing to devote time and effort to keeping this community an attractive residential area, the village district will, in our opinion, be maintained to assure effective local control over matters of vital interest to us all.

2. **Sidewalks.** This past year we have made extensive replacements of cement walks on Atlantic Avenue and Sea Road, where the old walk had been badly worn out or cracked. This was in addition to our normal maintenance work, including the boardwalk along the crest of Bass Beach. This work was financed out of our general appropriation. Our Capital Reserve Fund of over \$2,000.00 is being maintained for further sidewalk replacement and to meet any unforeseen storm damage on our waterfront.

3. **Parks and Commons.** Under this caption we have been sharing with the Rye Beach-Little Boar's Head Garden Club the cost of maintaining the roadside garden east of the Fish Houses and, in addition, the District has maintained regular picking up of litter on our beach and roadsides.

4. **Mosquitoes.** As a result of a policy of having mosquito sprays only when most needed, we have had only one Pyrenone spray this year to date.

5. **District Officers.** Last September, Burrell M. Mitchell was appointed to a three-year term on our Board of Zoning Inspectors; Henry F. Bedford was appointed for a five-year term on our Board of Adjustment; and Kennetha M. Bedford was appointed Deputy Clerk for one year.

6. **Annual Meeting.** Property owners and voters of the District are cordially invited to attend our annual meeting, to be held this year at 7:30 P.M. on Tuesday, September 3, 1974, at the Union Chapel, for the use of which the District is indebted to the courtesy of the Chapel Trustees.

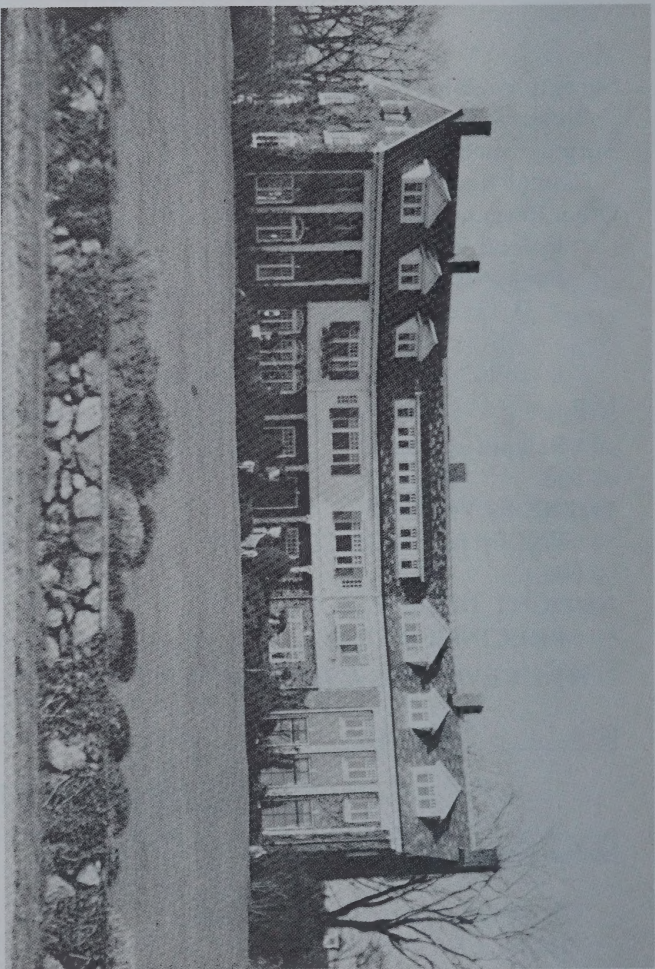
