THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Campton on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriation for the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Campton Cemetery, also to clean up and fence other cemeteries in town.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$ 300.00 for white pine blister rust control.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise money to pay notes and interest on account of Hollow Bridge.

9. Is it expedient to revise the Constitution.

10. To see if the Town will approve the acquisi-

tion by the United States Government of approximately 6,210 acres of land situated in the town, forming additional purchase units of the White Mountain National Forest and fully described in the recommendations of the Land Use Board to the Governor and Council, dated January 30, 1937, a copy of which description is given in the Town Report of Campton for the year ending January 31, 1937. 11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire.

12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Peg Wood Hill road from the intersection of the old road leading south easterly by the Ozias Page farm, to the site of the Henry Abbott buildings.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of Agents and Officers heretofore chosen.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Starting on the Campton-Sandwich town line at the height of land between Mad River drainage and Beebe River drainage, which is also a point in the 1929 proclaimed Forest Boundary;

Thence southerly along the Campton-Sandwich town line to the height of land between Beebe River drainage and Squam Lake drainage;

Thence southerwesterly along the height of land between Beebe River and Squam Lake to Mt. Morgan;

Thence northwesterly along the height of land between Spencer Brook and Perch Pond Brook (tributaries of Beebe River), to the east line of Lot 58 Division 1;

Thence northerly along the east line of Lot 58 Division 1 to the southeast corner of Lot 57 Division 1;

Thence westerly along the south line of Lot 57 Division 1 to Beebe River;

Thence northerly, following Beebe River to the south line of lot 56 Division 1;

Thence westerly along the south line of Lot 56 Division 1 to the southwest corner of said Lot, and which is also a point in the east line of Lot 48 Division 1;

Thence southerly along the east line of Lot 48 Division 1 to the southeast corner of said Lot;

Thence westerly along the south line of Lot 48 Division 1 to the southwest corner of said Lot;

Thence northerly along the west lines of Lots 48, 73, and 72 Division 1 to the southeast corner of Lot 36 Division 1;

Thence westerly along the south line of Lot 36 Division 1 to a point midway between the southeast and southwest corners of said Lot;

Thence northerly on the same bearing as the east line of Lot 36 Division 1 to a point midway between the northeast and northwest corners of said Lot;

Thence easterly along the north line of Lot 36 Division 1 to the southwest corner of Lot 49 Division 1; Thence northerly along the west lines of Lots, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, and 54, Division 1 to the old road on the east side of Mad River;

Thence southwesterly along the old road to its intersection with the proclaimed Forest Boundary;

Thence northerly, following the proclaimed Forest Boundary, to the Campton-Thornton town line;

Thence easterly along the Campton-Thornton town line to the northeast corner of Lot 27, Division 3, which is also a point in the proclaimed Forest Boundary;

Thence southerly, westerly, and easterly, following the proclaimed Forest Boundary to the point of beginning;

Containing 6,209 acres, more or less.

Also, starting at corner No. 5 of U. S. Tract, No. 50i, which is also a point in the proclaimed Forest Boundary, and is located in the east right of way line of the road on the west bank of Mad River and approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ rods above the center of the northwest abutment of the concrete arch highway bridge and near the south end of the village of Campton;

Thence easterly following the highway road and crossing the arch highway bridge, to the junction of said highway road and the town road running northerly from the east end of the arch highway bridge;

Thence northerly following the town road up the east side of Mad River to its intersection with the proclaimed Forest Boundary at a point approximately 2 rods west of corner No. 7 of U. S. Tract No. 50i;

Thence westerly and southerly following the proclaimed Forest Boundary to the point of beginning;

Containing 1 acre, more or less."

The foregoing is suggested as a suitable article for warrant for town meeting. Please advise this Board of action taken in regard to the above.

The net assessment must contain this amount in addition to funds raised for high school maintenance and other statutory requirements. School Board and Citizens of the School District of Campton:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I hereby submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The statistical tables for the year 1935-1936 follow this report.

Mrs. Maude A. Gray is teaching at the Livermore Falls school this year. Otherwise, the teachers are the same as last year. The rooms at Campton Village with enrollments of approximately 40 each are now at their capacity. The teachers are handling the situation well, in my opinion, and although the teaching loads are heavy, I believe that in general a child that does not progress well here would not do much better in any school. If the enrollment increases very much in the fall, some combination may have to be made with Beebe River where there are at present only 14 in the grammar room and 22 in the primary room. This would give the district a year to see how permanent the increase becomes and consider the advisability of enlarging the school at Campton Village.

During the summer, the Village, Beebe River, Livermore Falls, Center, Blair and West Campton Schools have been painted. A new stove has been installed in the latter school.

The policy of the Board in keeping up the school properties is commendable. With rising prices the same repairs would in all probability cost considerable more in a few years. The thousands of people in the district during the summer invariably form a most favorable impression of a community which keeps its school buildings in good repair and appearance.

The Board had sufficient funds before closing the books in June to take up the last note of \$ 1,000.00

on the Beebe River project although it did not become due until December. The debt on the Village School is now \$ 3,500.00. The finances of the District are prudently handled. The per pupil cost of elementary schools exclusive of debt and new equipment was \$64.85 which compares favorably with the State medium of \$77.93. The tuition of pupils in high schools is beyond the control of the Board and probably will not decrease in the near future.
