(\$300.00 Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to aid the Chesterfield Home Health Agency in delivering skilled nursing care to all peoples. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,670.00 for a completely equipped Pontiac Lemans D26 Enforcer Police Cruiser. Cruiser and equipment are State Bid Prices. (\$5,770.00 Approved by the Budget Committee -- without Radar) Also to see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$2,380.00 from the State of New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency as the State's share of reimbursement of the above. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$983.00 in support of the Cheshire Hospital for the year 1976. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,047.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Region Humane Society. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,396.72 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the South-Western New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. (\$900.00 Approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the annual election of the Sexton and authorize the Cemetery Commission to appoint someone to this position. This is to take effect at the March Town Meeting, 1977.

ARTICLE 28. To see whether the Town will vote to elect the members of the Planning Board. Pursuant to RSA 36:4. (Submitted by Petition.)

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to have the Advisory Planning Board continue its work in Town Planning.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town Road the paved road known as Cobliegh Road, located in West Chesterfield. Said Road exceeds all standard town road specifications and has the required number of dwellings. (Submitted by Petition.)

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept Wildwood Road as a Town Road. This road is in the George Joslin subdivision off the North Shore Road. This has the required number of dwellings.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept Split Oak Road which connects Pinnacle Lane and Pinnacle Farm Road, which road layout was approved by the Planning Board, October 2, 1968 and recorded in Plan Book 22 Pg 39 Cheshire Registry. All

Building lots (7) have been sold and five (5) houses have been built to date. (Submitted by Petition.)

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will accept the sum of \$100.00 from Bernice Cobb to be added to the Paul D. & Norman Cobb Trust Fund the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of Lot #40 in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will accept the sum of \$100.00 from the Joel Cherrie Estate for the care of Joel Cherrie Lot #55 in Chesterfield West Cemetery the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of said lot and to be known as Joel Cherrie Trust Fund.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, 1975

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the fourth day of March, 1975.

The meeting was called to order at ten o'clock by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil and Mildred Gauthier was sworn in as Assistant Clerk. Later Carl A. Johnson took the oath of office as Assistant Moderator.

The Moderator then read the Warrant through Article 1 and 1A and declared the polls open for voting for balloting for all necessary Town Officers and on amendments to the Zoning Ordinances.

At six-thirty the meeting was again called to order with Carl A. Johnson and Mildred Gauthier as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk and the Moderator, James E. O'Neil called on Rev. Ann C. Partner for a prayer.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Russell Johnson to dispense with reading the Warrant as it is printed in the Annual Report and the Moderator will read each Article as it is considered. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by George Joslin to use the same method of collecting taxes this year as in the past. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by Robert Woodman to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. The report of the Budget Committee was given by Donald C. Emery, the Chairman. He stated that they had an unusually active year, holding ten meetings and that the report would be found in the Town Report. Vote by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Robert Callahan to accept the report. Vote was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Donald Emery to pass over this Article until after Article 20 has been disposed of. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by H. Claude Mowry to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated: Town Officers' Expenses, Secretarial help, \$2,000.00. Support of the Library, \$1,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Robert Woodman to make application for Town Road Aid and raise the sum of \$1,370.71 thereby receiving an additional \$9,138.04 from the State for Town Road Construction. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,500.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$44,000.00 for Summer Maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Lawrence Thomas to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the Provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated: Summer Maintenance, extra tar, \$6,500.00, included in the \$44,000.00 amount in Article 9. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Winston Cray to pass over this Article concerning raising and appropriating the sum of \$16,000.00 for the purchase of a new cab and chassis for the Highway Department. This was not approved by the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative, and the Article passed over.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by Robert Woodman to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Street Lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by Lawrence Thomas to amend this Article and raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Monadnock Region Association to continue its efforts in areas of solid waste disposal, planning, pesticides, legislation, State Parks, youth work and by other means call attention to the protection of the natural resources of the Town plus its other advantages along with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region. The Moderator declared the vote on the Amendment to be carried in the affirmative. Sue Butterworth asked that someone visit us next year to explain their work. Voted by voice on the motion as amended. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise and appropriate the sum of \$983.00 in support of the Cheshire Hospital for the year 1975. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by Arvid Pearson to amend the Article and raise the sum of \$500.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. Vote declared by the Moderator to be in the Negative and did not pass.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by William Thompson and supported by Sue Butterworth to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,047.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. Vote carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Gail Woodman and supported by Robert Woodman to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to help support the work of the Monadnock Region Humane Society. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Vote by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by William Mitchell to amend the Article and raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 as approved by

the Budget Committee as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the South-Western New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on the Article as amended. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Vote by voice vote on motion made by Terry Wiggin and supported by Richard Wolf to table this Article until our next regular meeting or any Special Meeting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be in the Negative and did not pass.

Voted by voice vote on motion by Robert Woodman and supported by Donald Emery to pass over this Article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by JoAnn Morse to pass over this Article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

George Joslin asked how the voters felt about buying the Post Gravel Bank and using it for a Sanitary Land Fill. The Moderator called for a straw vote on the suggestion which resulted almost unanimous against.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by Robert Woodman to amend #2 and increase Town Officer's Expenses to \$9,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by Voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by Robert Callahan to amend #11 and increase Expense of Town Dump to \$5,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

A motion made by Gerald Knickerbocker and supported by Arvid Pearson to reduce #3, Election and Registration Expenses to \$2,800.00 was withdrawn.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Arvid Pearson to amend #25 and increase Payment to Capital Reserve Fund to \$10,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Judith Johnson and supported by Sue Butterworth to amend #4 and increase Expenses

of Town Hall and other buildings to \$6,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the Negative and did not pass.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by Robert Callahan to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the pro-

visions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated: Visiting Nurse Association, \$2,500.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by George Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be utilized by the Town Historical Committee for the Bi-Centennial Celebration in 1976. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Merrill Yeaw and supported by H. Claude Mowry to pass over this Article concerning appropriating the sum of \$200.00 for the Monadnock Regional Bi-Centennial Committee to enable it to act as a regional coordinator for the celebration of the 1976 Bi-Centennial. The Moderator declared the vote carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Antonio Souza and supported by Wayne Winn to pass over this Article concerning raising and appropriating a sum not to exceed \$30,000.00 to purchase a new fire truck to replace the 1947 Ford truck in the West Chesterfield Station. This was not approved by the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Thomas Allen and supported by George Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,011.02 (the balance of income from Wares Grove) and apply for matching funds. This money to be used for improvements of Wares Grove. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Motion made by Sue Butterworth and supported by Theodora Martin to discontinue the annual election of Town Constables and authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Chief of Police. This to take effect at the March Town Meeting, 1976. Because of an effort by the Constables for better organization, appointing the police officers will help to maintain a more consistent and efficient mode of operation.

Motion to amend this motion was made by Terry Wiggin and supported by Stephen Herman that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Chief of Police. This to take ef-

fect at the March Town Meeting, 1976. Because of an effort by the Constable for better organization to maintain a more consistent and efficient mode of operation. A vote on this Amendment was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the Negative and did not pass.

Motion made by Stephen Herman and supported by Terry Wiggin to Amend this Article to see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Chief of Police each year from the elected Constables. A vote on the Amendment did not pass.

Motion made by George Joslin and supported by Sue Butterworth that the Moderator and Clerk be authorized to reword the Article. A vote on this motion was declared to be carried in the affirmative.

This Article was reworded resulted as follows:
To discontinue the annual election of Town Constables and authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Chief of Police. The Chief of Police will appoint additional Constables with the approval of the Selectmen. Motion as amended carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Tom Moore and supported by Francis Hall to establish a Park and Recreation Commission consisting of five (5) members appointed by the Board of Selectmen. This Commission to be responsible for the operation of Parks and Beaches and any other recreational facility the Town may develop in the future. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Winston Cray to accept the road from Tuttle Road to the Delbert and Ruth T. Meyer property. There are two houses built on the road and there are two other lots laid out along this road. Vote declared by the Moderator as carried in the Negative and did not pass.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Terry Wiggin and supported by Wayne Winn to pass over this Article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 30. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Callahan and supported by JoAnn Morse to extend the Zinn Road 150 feet so that the Highway Equipment can turn around. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by Wayne Winn to change the Capital Reserve Fund to a general fund for Highway Equipment. As it is now, funds are specified for Loader, Grader and Truck. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Motion made by Gerald Knickerbocker and supported by George Joslin to accept Articles 32 to 40 which concern adopting Trust Funds.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin which was supported that the Moderator and Town Clerk should correct Article 38. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote to adopt the motion as amended. Vote declared to be carried in the affirmative.

These Articles as adopted and Amended are as follows:

Article 32. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Margaret, Elizabeth and John Nurse, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care and upkeep of the Nurse Lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Margaret, Elizabeth and John Nurse Trust Fund.

Article 33. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Merrill R. & Linda L. Yeaw the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Ashworth-Yeaw Lot #76 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Ashworth-Yeaw Trust Fund.

Article 34. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Edward D. Westervelt the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the William Kaiser Lot #98 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Kaiser-Westervelt Trust Fund.

Article 35. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from John C. and Cora C. Provenchia the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the John C. & Cora C. Provenchia Lot #91 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the John C. and Cora C. Provenchia Trust Fund.

Article 36. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Henry C. and Betsey C. Chickering and Raymond R. and Julia C. Blan-

chard the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Chickering-Blanchard Lot #41 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Chickering-Blanchard Trust Fund.

Article 37. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Rosamond D. Bothwell the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the B. and M. Davis Lot #14 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Bothwell-Davis Trust Fund.

Article 38. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Martha Richter to be added to the fund for perpetual care of the Spoford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Fritz and Martha Richter Trust Fund.

Article 39. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Frank Dean to be added to the fund for perpetual care of the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and to be known as the Frank and Jeanette Dean Trust Fund.

Article 40. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Herbert F. Butler, Jr. and George Harris to be added to the fund for perpetual care in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and to be known as the Herbert F. Butler, Jr. and George Harris Trust Fund.

Article 41. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Judith Johnson which was supported by Tom Allen that a committee of nine interested Chesterfield Citizens be appointed by the Selectmen to study and make plans for the restoration of our historic Town Hall. They would be charged with preserving as much of the original character of the building while keeping in mind the needs of today's population for use of the building. The Committee is charged to make a report at the next Town Meeting whether it be this meeting continued or the 1976 Annual Meeting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Stephen Herman which was supported that the Members of the Budget Committee and the Selectmen should be seated on the stage with the Moderator and Town Clerk or in front of the stage at Town Meetings. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Harry Winn to retain the nine member Advisory Planning Committee and the nine member Nursing Committee. Vote

declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Sue Butterworth to recess the meeting to the call of the Selectmen. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Wiggin had 73 votes, R. Willard Beebe had 29 votes and there were 6 scattered votes. Robert C. Callahan, David N. Coleman and Donald C. Emery were declared elected.

On the Question "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this Town?", the vote resulted as follows: "YES" had 275 votes and "NO" had 96 votes.

Article 1A. The vote by ballot on Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board resulted as follows:

1. SECTION 1 DISTRICTS

For the purposes of this ordinance the Town of Chesterfield establishes the following additional district:

1.04 Commercial District No.1, (C-1) namely all land described as follows: Starting at the intersection of the Gulf Road and Route No.9, along the Gulf Road for a distance of 4,400 feet, except for a 200-foot wide strip along the Gulf Road. Then to a point on Route No.9 3,150-feet from the intersection of Route No.9 and the Gulf Road. Then across Route No.9 to a private road and continuing along this road to a point 200 feet east from the Connecticut River and continuing along this line -- 200 feet east of the river -- in a southwesterly direction to Route No.9.

SECTION 1-A USE REGULATIONS

1.05 No building, structure or land shall be used or occupied except for the purposes permitted in the Commercial District No.1 as set forth in the accompanying Table of Use Regulations or as provided for elsewhere in this Ordinance.

1.06 A use listed in Section 1.07 is permitted as a right in Commercial District No.1 under which it is denoted by the letter "P" provided that the provisions for sewage disposal meet the standards set by the N.H. Water Supply

and Pollution Control Commission and other restrictions set by law. If designated in the Tables by the letters "SE", Special Exceptions, the use may be permitted as a special exception only if the Board of Adjustment so determines and grants a special exception therefore as provided in section 2.03 and 2.04, subject to such restrictions as said Board may establish. If designated in the Tables by the letters "NP", Not Permitted, no building structure, or land in Commercial District No.1 may be used, erected, or designated to be used, in whole or part, except nonconforming uses which may be continued under the provisions of Section VII. If designated in the Tables by the letters "OR", Other Regulations, special exceptions and permitted uses shall be subject, in addition to use regulations, to the regulations of height, area, yard set-back, lot size and area, lot width, to such provisions for off-street parking, and such other provisions as are specified in other sections hereof.

1.07 TABLE OF USE REGULATIONS (See Posted Copy)

"YES" had 219 votes "NO" had 241 votes

2. SECTION 1-B SITE PLAN REVIEW AUTHORITY

The Planning Board of the Town of Chesterfield, in accordance with the provisions of NHRSA 36:19-a, as amended, is hereby empowered to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses whether or not such development includes a subdivision or re-subdivision of the site. Such sight plan review shall be subject to rules and regulations adopted by the Planning Board.

"YES" had 338 votes "NO" had 130 votes

3. To amend SECTION II, Exceptions, Paragraph 1, by deleting the words "meets the minimum standard in area of a building lot" and substituting instead, the words "is at least one (1) acre in area".

"YES" had 369 votes "NO" had 97 votes

4. To amend SECTION II, Exceptions, Paragraph 2, by deleting the words "of legal size", and substituting instead, the words "twenty thousand (20,000) square feet in area".

"YES" had 335 votes "NO" had 114 votes

5. To amend SECTION II, Article 2.06 to read "Every building, except those specified in Article 2.03 F, of any sort hereafter erected along Route No.9 and Route No.63 in the Town shall be set back from the center of these public roads a distance of one hundred feet (100'), and all buildings hereafter erected along all other roads in the Town shall be set back a distance of seventy-five feet (75') from the center of these roads, except where building lines have been established by the set back of the dwelling(s) on the lot or on adjoining lots. No building shall be located within twenty feet (20') of the side or rear property lines.

"YES" had 365 votes "NO" had 105 votes

6. To amend SECTION II by adding Article 2.09. as follows:
Garage sales, yard sales, tag sales, and auctions are permitted anywhere in the Town on the owner's property for a period up to three (3) days in any one year without getting permission from the Town.

"YES" had 405 votes "NO" had 77 votes

7. To amend SECTION II by adding 2.10, as follows:
Any land or buildings on that land that has been previously used for the production of live stock, poultry, vegetables, or grains may be returned to production of any or all of these without getting permission from the Town.

"YES" had 414 votes "NO" had 78 votes

8. To amend SECTION III by adding Article 3.01A, as follows:
Any person residing within the district outlined in Article 3.01 proposing to install sewage treatment facilities, or to extend, renovate, or repair such existing facility shall secure written plan and installation approval from the Town of Chesterfield Health Department.

"YES" had 298 votes "NO" had 179 votes.

The main objectives are to provide for the care of sick or disabled persons and to rehabilitate such persons to their maximum degree of independence through nursing care and other therapeutic services; and to promote the health of the inhabitants of Chesterfield through such nursing services and through programs of teaching the principles of health, hygiene, sanitation and other subjects.

The Moderator, H. Claude Mowry, called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m. The Clerk, Suzanne D. Thompson, read the warrant through Article I. The Moderator declared the polls open for balloting for the necessary school district officers.

Prior to the meeting the School Board appointed Jean Hubner and Avis Gauthier Ballot Clerks. They took the oath of office from the Moderator. A count of the ballots showed 597.

The Moderator appointed Thomas Allen assistant Moderator and Wayne Winn assistant Clerk. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 8:00 p.m. the Moderator called the meeting to order for the purpose of acting upon the remainder of the Warrant.

Donald Emery moved that the meeting be dedicated to the memory of George E. Cass. Henry C. Chickering, Jr. seconded the motion. It was carried in the affirmative. A moment of silence for George Cass was observed.

The Moderator introduced Richard Champagne, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, H. Charles Larracey, Assistant Superintendent for Special Services and Joseph R. Guilano, Educational Consultant of Supervisory Union #29.

Henry C. Chickering, Jr. moved that the above men be permitted to speak and answer questions at the meeting. The motion was seconded by George Joslin and carried in the affirmative.

The articles were then disposed of as follows:

ARTICLE II: Henry C. Chickering, Jr. moved that the District accept and place on file the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen as printed in the Annual Report. Seconded by Clara Wellington and carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE III. Robert Wormer moved that the district authorize the School Board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of

New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state or private agency. Seconded by Jo-Ann Morse. Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IV: Henry C. Chickering, Jr. moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$588,785 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Seconded by Donald Emery and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V: Clara Wellington moved that the District recognize with gratitude and appreciation the devoted service of George E. Cass, Business Manager, Supervisory Union 29, deceased January 27, 1975. Robert Woodman seconded the motion and it was carried in the affirmative.

Frank Sherman spoke for the American Legion's Child and Youth Committee asking for use of the school facilities for dances. Richard Champagne said that the use of land and buildings was under the legal jurisdiction of the School Board and that the Supervisory Union is currently formulating a policy on building and land use. The School Board took the request under advisement.

John Schlichting, representing the Chesterfield Jaycees, read a report concerning the Chesterfield Community Recreation Field Project. He asked the meeting's support.

Michael Wiggin moved that the meeting recommend to the School Board that the new field being developed at the rear of the school be open to Chesterfield residents more than 50% of the time thereby allowing the possibilities of procurement of federal funds. Robert Heslin seconded the motion and the vote was in the affirmative, following a discussion.

At 9:00 p.m., the Moderator declared the polls closed.

The Checklist of voters was used in balloting. A count of Ballots resulted as follows:

Total number on the Checklist was 1,155.

Number of votes cast was 240 with 120 necessary for choice.

For School Board member for the ensuing three (3) years. Robert A. Wormer had 203 votes. There were 9 votes for Joseph Scrivani and 10 scattered votes. The Moderator declared Robert Wormer School Board member for three years.

For Moderator for the ensuing year. Eleanor Heslin had 165 votes and H. Claude Mowry had 74 votes. The Moderator declared Eleanor Heslin the winner.

For Clerk for the ensuing year. Gail Herman had 219 votes, Suzanne Thompson had 4 write in votes and there were 2 scattered votes. The Moderator declared Gail Herman, Clerk.

For Treasurer for the ensuing year. Ann R. Bevis had 219 votes and there were 2 scattered votes. The Moderator declared Ann R. Bevis Treasurer.

For Auditors for the ensuing year. Ann M. Knickerbocker had 222 votes and Prudence Mitchell had 215 votes. There were 2 scattered votes. They were declared winners by the Moderator.

All of the elected officers took the Oath of Office from the Moderator and signed the prescribed OATH OF OFFICE.

On a motion by William Coleman, duly seconded by Robert Heslin, the meeting adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Your superintendent had the privilege of substituting in the schools of Supervisory Union 29 during the month of September, 1975. I found the educational environment and climate of the school was excellent. The student body was well-mannered and performed in an exemplary manner.

Mr. Holmes continues his involvement in the leadership workshops. He took a course in leadership at Keene State College this fall attempting to provide better administrative performance for his school and community. We are proud of his educational progress and leadership in Chesterfield.

Supervisory Union 29 employed a new member of the administrative team, Mr. Ralph E. Caye, Jr., our new business manager. Mr. Caye replaces the late Mr. Cass who was deeply loved and respected. Mr. Caye brings to the supervisory union a background of experience and he looks forward to working closely with the communities of our union.

Mr. Larracey, our Assistant Superintendent for Administrative and Special Services, with the Staff Development Committee have finalized a staff development plan. We are currently utilizing computerized personnel data forms. Many opportunities for in-service training directly related to staff development are available and have been taken by members of the staff.

The school districts of Supervisory Union 29 in conjunction with the Monadnock Children's Special Services Center have developed procedures to comply with the regulations of P.L. 93-380 (State Plan for the Education of Handicapped Children under Part B of the Education of the Handicapped Act) which became effective July 1, 1975. Each school in Supervisory Union 29 has established evaluation/placement teams to deal with requests from parents for placement or changes in placement of their handicapped child. The procedures ensure that the school districts will comply with 1) due process guarantees, 2) placement of handicapped children in the least restrictive alternative, and 3) non-discriminatory testing and placement procedures.

Title IX of the educational amendments of 1972 prevent discrimination on the basis of sex in the operation of most federally supported educational programs. This regulation became effective September 1, 1975. The impact of this regulation prevents discrimination on the basis of sex in the operation of any interscholastic sport or program offered by any educational institution. This law will have a definite impact on our school budget.

CHESHIRE VOCATIONAL CENTER

The course of study has been completed and counselors are encouraged by the enthusiasm of the students. They are currently meeting with students on an individual basis concerning course selections. Upon invitation, the Vocational Director and the counselors would welcome an opportunity to make presentations concerning any aspect of the new Cheshire Vocational Center to citizens in the communities of the participants.

The administration would like to express its deep appreciation to the many committees involved in the planning of our new vocational facility; to the staff at Keene High School, and other local educational institutions, to the construction workers and to the public at large for their tremendous support of this project.

"Individualized instruction" and "simulation" are the key words for the expanded opportunities in the Business and Office Education Department. One of the most innovative programs to be offered will be Radio-TV Broadcasting, a first in any high school in New England. Students in this program will have an opportunity to learn and work in a complete simulated radio and television station -- WKHS. As part of the data processing portion there will be opportunity for key punching, programming, and other data processing skills in connection with the computer program. The office occupations cluster (secretarial, clerical, and accounting) will offer exploratory simulations in legal, medical and educational secretarial skills, another first for our area. There will also be a word processing unit and a new offering in reprographics where students in the clerical program will learn many means of duplicating materials and will have opportunity to assess for themselves which process they will use for a given job, including a cost analysis to justify their choice. Accounting skills will be enhanced by the use of individual simulations and up-to-date office equipment such as electronic calculators and bookkeeping machines. Distributive Education classes will be expanding their program by operating a full size, college type book store and a mini mall which will house three individual shops.

The Technology Department of the Cheshire Vocational Center includes thirteen course offerings such as masonry, sheet metal, and diesel and hydraulic mechanics. The expansion of the Technology Department is best illustrated by the growth of the Building Trades program. Four years ago one teacher worked in a converted storage closet of 746 square feet. In the Cheshire Vocational Center teachers will have an area of 10,000 square

feet serving the students of Cheshire County in the Building Trades program. Vocational Technology education provides training which develops skill, ability, understanding, appreciation, attitudes, working habits, and imparts knowledge and information needed by workers to enter and progress in employment on a useful and productive basis. Grades nine and ten offer exposure through the regular high school Industrial Arts program. Vocational Technology courses offer "performance," using basic skills required for job entry. A student may choose to participate in the co-op program -- on the job training for those who do not seek to increase knowledge and skills via post-secondary (2 or 4-year programs) education. Offerings in the Technology Department will be approximately 600 instructional hours over a two-year period. The additional 20,000 square feet enables us to offer these additional instructional hours.

The Home Economics Department is planning three new courses and will be expanding the Food Service Program, including the addition of a small dining room for catering experience on special occasions. New programs are Health Occupations, Child Care Services and Careers in Textiles. The health occupations area includes a three-bed hospital ward, a mini testing lab, a small kitchen, classroom and storage areas. Students will receive a general background in basic patient care and in community health problems. Clinical and community experience will be a part of the learning program. The health occupations program will train students to meet job entry qualifications for such positions as orderly, nurse's aide and lab aide. The child care program, provided for those interested in working with children, combines study with observation and hands-on experience in the Day Care Nursery which adjoins the classroom. Working with children in the nursery will help students understand behavioral patterns of children, food and eating habits, learning through play and guidance and discipline. Careers in textiles covers the basics of working with textiles as used for clothing or in home decorating. Students will be exposed to dressmaking, garment alterations, tailoring, slipcovers, draperies, upholstery, chair seating and commercial sewing.

In addition to preparing students for direct entry into many jobs, vocational courses are also the basis for further post-secondary education if a student so desires.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The 1975-1976 school year opened on September 4, 1975 with 284 students enrolled. Currently the enrollment is 291.

In September Mrs. Ericson replaced Mrs. Wade as teacher of the fourth grade. Mrs. Carolee Siebert has replaced Mrs. Penelope Betz as part-time art teacher. Mr. Robert Vreeland was elected as Resource Teacher for grades five through eight with federal funds granted under the Manpower Act.

The school has welcomed five new mother volunteers who perform a variety of helpful tasks for the teachers and the children.

Several grants have been made under Title III to faculty members who applied for supplementary teaching materials or learning aids.

Our nurse, Mrs. Lorraine Johnson, is now on duty five days a week from 9 to 1.

The science classes are developing an ecology area between the primary playground and the new athletic field. Last spring, they developed a pond for aquatic studies and began a tree nursery with 350 saplings obtained from the State by an interested parent. Hopefully, the classes may get a start, in cooperation with civic associations, in developing a 200 acre natural area given to the town a few years ago.

We have had since last spring full use of the new athletic field improved by the J.C.'s, parents, and volunteer help. The boys' soccer team had its most successful season on record with the new facilities. The girls' soccer team played several informal games this fall, hopefully to enter league play next year.

Miss Carolyn Carpenter, a graduate student at Keene State College, has been elected to coach the girls' basketball team in the first year of league play.

The library mothers have been most helpful this year in making the library available to the students until the first lunch period. The program has helped the students choose books with greater selectivity and thoughtfulness.

I again express my appreciation to the children and people of the Chesterfield School District, the members of the school staff, the School Board, and the administration for helping to make the school year a success.

School Lunch Program
1974-1975

The school lunch program opened with hot lunch on the first day of school September 4, 1974. It is now a New Hampshire State Law that hot lunch be served from the very first day until the last of school. Mary Lou Kelly and Carol Riendeau headed the lunch program.

The price of hot lunch remained at 46¢ per lunch. Recess milk, either chocolate or white, was offered to grades one through fifth at 6¢ per half-pint. Noon milk was available to all at the same price. Free and reduced lunch rates were available to any student where applicable.

Monthly menus were given to each child so that they would know what meals for the following week they would care to buy. Friday was the day for collecting lunch money for meals for the following week. Monday was collection day for those who were absent on Friday. Menus were also sent to the Keene Sentinel and the Keene Radio Station.

Government surplus food proved to be a big bonus to our budget as prices were so inflated. They provided us with an abundance of frozen hamburger, cheese, butter and canned beef and chicken.

Mrs. Riendeau and I wish to thank Mrs. Barbara Hall and Mrs. Marilyn Underwood for their help in the lunch room, as we served from 130 to 170 lunches per day.
