## NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

### Chapter 150, Laws of New Hampshire

Section 6—Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually on or before April 30 cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year from the first day of the ensuing May in the office of the clerk of the city or town wherein said dog is kept and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar distinctly marked with its owner's name and bearing attached to said collar a metal tag distinctly marked with its registered number. Said tag shall be furnished by the clerk at the expense of the city or town from the amount received from dog license fees.

Section 18—The mayor of each city and the selectmen of each town shall annually within ten days from May first issue a warrant to one or more police officers or constables directing them to proceed forthwith either to kill or cause to be killed all dogs within such city or town not licensed and collared according to the provisions of this chapter, and to enter complaint against the owners or keepers thereof; and any person may, and every police officer and constable shall kill or cause to be killed all such dogs, whenever and wherever found.

# TOWN WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Cornish in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Cornish Town Hall in said Cornish on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, and to close at 5:00 o'clock p. m. to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. 1 selectman for 3 years, 1 Sexton for 1 year, 1 trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years Library Trustee for 3 years.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of Highways and Bridges.

4. To see what action the town will take regarding the observance of Memorial Day and raising the money for such observance.

5. To see what action the town will vote to take in making up the deficiency in the Mercer Fund and raise or appropriate money therefor.

6. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

7. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or otherwise administer on property acquired through tax sales.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of town poor, Old Age Assistance, and Soldiers' Aid.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of One Hundred (\$100.) for the street lights on Cornish Flat for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair and upkeep of town cemeteries.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Eighty Five Dollars and fifty one cents (\$785.51) and receive Three Thousand One Hundred Forty Two Dollars and five cents (3,142.05) from the State to used on Class Five Roads.



13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be used as the fourth payment on the long term note on the new town garage.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to pay the second payment on long term note for Power Grader.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Three Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$325.00) to pay interest on notes for the ensuing year.

16. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of One Thousand \$1,000.00 to add to the Sinking Fund for the purpose of purchasing new highway equipment when it becomes available.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for repair of highway equipment, any balance not used to be turned into sinking fund.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Five Hundred and Twenty-five Dollars (\$525.00) for the support of the George H. Stowell Free Library.

19. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Sexton to care for the Baptist Church Park and raise the sum of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) to pay for same. The town cemetery equipment is to be used for such care.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) to be used to insure Town Employees against accident.

21-a. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Three Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$350.00) for medical service, to be used at the discretion of the Selectmen.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) to be used for sanding icy roads.

23. To see if the town will vote to continue the Town Dump on the same basis as last year.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one per cent (1/100 of 1 percent) of the assessed valuation for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, the sum of \$

25. To see if the town will vote to pay the Selectmen on an annual salary.

26. To see if the town will vote to discontinue plowing of driveways so individuals can contract for this work. Vote by ballot.

27. To see if the town will vote to elect nine members - at - large on the budget committee. The majority to be property taxpayers and selected by election by a majority vote. One-third of members to hold office for one year, one-third for two years, one-third for three years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. Vote by ballot.

28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the maintenance of the Town Fire Department.

29. To see what action town will take to provide better office facilities for the selectmen and other town officers by building an addition to the new town building or having a better heating plant for the present office and raise money therefore.

30. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for the care and upkeep of the lots of Levi Ayers and Benjamin Ayers families in Edminister Cemetery and any income remaining and not used for the care of these lots be used for general upkeep of the Cemetery Etta True, donor.

30. To hear reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.

32. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## FOREST FIRE WARDENS REPORT

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90 percent of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Cornish which was made by the Division acting under authorization of th Chapter 32, Section 27, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, which provides in part as follows:

"Audit on Motion of Commission. The commissio nmay cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such audit."

This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, and the period from January 1st to October 22nd, 1948. Exhibits are hereafter listed included as part of the report which is made up in three sections as follows:

Section I — Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1947

Section II — Period January 1st to October 22nd, 1948

Section III—Statistical Tables Covering Ten Year Period

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, Trustees of Trust Funds and Stowell Free Library.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

##### COMPARATIVE BALANCE SHEETS Dec. 31, 1946 - 1947 (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1946 and December 31, 1947, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the Net Debt of the town increased by \$318.20 during the year..

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

COMPARATIVE STATEMENTS OF APPROPRIATIONS AND  
EXPENDITURES — ESTIMATED AND ACTUAL REVENUES:  
(Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, are presented in Exhibit A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$714.61, less a net revenue deficit of \$588.85, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$125.76. Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit A-5)

A statement of Long Term Indebtedness as off December 31, 1947, showing annual maturities of principal and interest, is included in Exhibit A-5.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of October 21, 1948, is indicated in Exhibit H.

## AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

## GENERAL COMMENTS

Expenditures from Capital Reserve Funds:

When expenditures are to be made from Capital Reserve Funds the amount to be expended should be turned over by the Trustees of Trust Funds to the Town Treasurer. It should be recorded as a receipt and classified as "Withdrawal from Capital Reserve Fund". Regular town orders and checks should then be issued for all expenditures made therefrom and such expenditures classified according to the purpose for which made, i. e.,

new equipment, lands and buildings, highway construction, etc.

**Invoices Filed with Vouchers:**

Original bills and invoices should be attached to and filed with the vouchers which are issued in payment thereof.

**Orders Used as Checks:**

At present the Treasurer issues a separate check for each Selectmen's order. The practise which is employed by most towns and which is recommended, is for the Treasurer to countersign the Selectmen's orders thereby converting the orders into negotiable checks. It is also necessary to have the name and number of the depository bank printed on the orders when this practise is followed. Orders and checks will be in the same numerical sequence and the possibility of a difference occurring between the amount of the order and the amount of the check will be eliminated.

**Single Order and Check for Tax Sale:**

A separate order and check has been issued to the Tax Collector for each tax lien bought by the town at the annual tax sale. It is only necessary to issue one order and check to the Collector Covering the total amount of taxes bought by the town, plus interest to date of sale and costs of advertising and selling.

It was also noted that in many instances several orders and and checks were issued at one time to the same party. This is unnecessary as one order and check may cover several items such as town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, bounties, etc. The proper classifications should of course be designated on the voucher.

**Road Agent:**

It has been the practise for the Road Agent to retain all funds collected by him for outside work performed and to make expenditures therefrom, taking an accounting for the receipt and expenditure of such funds at the close of the year.

Chapter 59, Section 24, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire provides in part as follows:

"The town treasurer shall have the custody of all moneys belonging to the town, and shall pay out the same only upon orders of the selectmen.

In accordance with this provision of the law the Road Agent should remit all funds received by him to the Treasurer and all expenditures for highways should be made through the issuance of regular town orders and checks. Inasmuch, however, as the expense of private work done by the the Road Agent will be charged to the highway appropriation, any funds received from this source should likewise be credited to the highway appropriation.

The Road Agent's payrolls should include only items of labor and rental of equipment. Bills for materials and supplies should first be approved by the Road Agent and then submitted to the Selectmen for payment by regular town orders.

### Town Clerk:

The Town Clerk should maintain the regular form of cash book in which motor vehicle permits and dog licenses are recorded. Funds received from these sources should not be deposited in personal checking account.

This year the Town Clerk has deducted from remittances to the Treasurer on account of motor vehicle permits, the fee allowed for the issuances of such permits. In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 116, Section 22, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, as quoted herewith the Town Clerk should remit all funds received from the issuance of motor vehicle permits to the treasurer and be paid the fees allowed by regular town orders and checks.

"Each designated city official and town clerk shall keep an account of the money received by him for said permits and deposit the same in the city or town treasury on the last Saturday of each month, to be used for the general purposes of the city or town. Failure to deposit shall be cause for immediate removal from office. Town clerks shall be paid on orders drawn on the town treasurer by the selectmen fifty cents for each permit issued."

### Printed Town Report:

In the printed town report each order paid during the year is listed in numerical sequence. This method of reporting fails to classify expenditures by purpose. It is recommended, therefore, that orders be listed in the printed reports under the proper classification headings so that all expenditures on account of "town officers' salaries", "town officers' expenses", "town hall", etc., will be properly segregated.

### Conclusion:

The accounts of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure, with exceptions as herein noted, conformed to the uniform methods prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Cornish for their assistance during the course of the audit.

## SCHOOL WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in district affairs:

Yoy are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fifth day of March, 1949, at two o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To Choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the Federal Works Agency, or other U. S. Government or State Agencies.
10. To see if the district will authorize the School Building Committee to select and take option of a proper site for a new central school and to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum for this purpose or take any other action necessary thereto.
11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$2500 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund.

12. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction and equipping of any new school building, and or the acquisition of any real estate which may be necessary for any such purpose, and whether the District will vote to authorize the issue of serial notes or bonds of the District for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated, and if so for what terms and conditions, and whether the authority to fix the time and place of payment of principal and interest of said notes or bonds, the interest rate and the negotiation and sale of same shall be delegated to the School Board.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Cornish School Board:

I herewith submit my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The schools have continued to give the best education possible under the present conditions to the youngsters of Cornish through the efforts of a staff of loyal, hardworking teachers. Much credit should be given to this group of hard working people. Many examples of the best in rural teaching are to be found in the Cornish schools.

The outstanding accomplishment of the past year has been the successful launching of the health program planned a year ago. Very few towns have as complete a program as yours. The dental clinic was so effective that Dr. H. Shirley Dwyer of the State Board of Health found, when in Cornish in connection with the flourine treatment, the condition of the Children's mouths was as good as anywhere in the state.

Some thought should be given to the formulation of a plan to continue the flourine treatment as this preventive work will save from 45 to 50 per cent of any possible future tooth decay.

Mrs. Hasham tells me that the physical examination given by Dr. Comstock was one of the most thorough it has been her privilege to witness. She has been making great strides in following up the Dr.'s findings. The cooperation of the parents and of various agencies in caring for these defects has been very heartening. Next year, and each year thereafter, an examination of the pupils in grades 1, 3, 5 and 8 plus any pupils new to the system should be sufficient.

The hot lunch program is continuing under the sponsorship of the Parent Teachers' Association. Thanks to the help of the surplus foods donated by the U. S. D. A. and especially to the unselfishness and cooperation of many townspeople, the program is improving all the time.

There have been several developments in the past year that have brought even more sharply into focus the need for a central school. The problems involved in organizing and carrying out the expanded health program could never have been met if it were not for the determination of your school nurse that it should be carried to a successful climax. Mrs. Hasham deserve a great deal of praise for her effort and accomplishment. I feel, however, that it is a great imposition to expect her to furnish transportation as well as extra time in carrying out this work.

The bill for minor repairs has again gone over the estimate made on the budget. It is inevitable that this item should continue to increase if our present schools are to be kept anywhere near their peak of efficiency.

Reference books, encyclopediae, maps, globes, etc. are still every expensive items and the school budget would have to be expanded considerably if we were to supply each school with even the minimum needs. The amount of money required could be cut considerably if all pupils were housed in the same building.

The fact that we have six schools rather than one has made the planning and administration of the hot lunch program very difficult. If the same time and effort were devoted to providing the same number of meals to pupils in a central school, it would be one of the best programs in the state.

A study of the defects found by the doctor shows that there were 72 cases of defective posture. This represents 50 percent of our school population. Much of this could be remedied by providing an adequate physical education program. However, to do this, we should have one of the teachers who was trained or could be trained in this work. We would also need an activity room and equipment too expensive to be erected at each of the



six schools. Supervised exercise would remedy much of the difficulty and equip our children with well shaped, healthy bodies.

Although our schools are gaining a great deal from our music program, a supervisor could become much more effective if half of her time were not consumed in travel. There are many pupils interested in playing musical instruments. If they were in a central place, I am very sure we would have enough talent to boast a very presentable orchestra.

I am sure we all look forward to the combined graduation in June. Very few people realize the problems involved in planning, coordinating and rehearsing this event.

Although building costs are still high, they are beginning to level off and some items have even dropped a little. Last March it was estimated that a building such as would be needed in Cornish would cost \$120,000. The estimate, based on actual construction costs of buildings under contract, places the cost around \$90,000.

The prospect of Federal Aid for the construction of school houses now looks very good. There are two bills at present before Congress. From our point of view, there is very little difference between them. Both would provide about 50 percent aid for construction in New Hampshire.

"The Committee" has worked diligently to prepare plans for a building that would meet the educational needs of the pupils in Cornish and I feel that the building they have helped plan is excellent. Everyone interested in the welfare of the youth of Cornish and in the future voters of Cornish should get behind this project wholeheartedly and push it to a successful finish.

Although Cornish cannot afford to carry this project alone, every possible step should be taken to be sure that the district will be in a position to accept Federal funds if and when they become available. To be in such a position, the district might take one of two alternatives.

First: They could vote a bond issue at the March meeting sufficiently large to cover the amount needed to match Federal funds. The bond would not have to be floated until matching funds became available, or

Second: The necessary articles could be included in the annual warrant but, before action was taken on them, the meeting could be adjourned to some later date. If the situation in Washington had not cleared by that time, another adjournment could be voted.

Either of these plans would eliminate the necessity of obtaining permission from the Superior Court to hold a special meeting. It is doubtful if a town could work fast enough in getting permission to hold the special meeting and voting the bond issue to qualify for Federal Aid.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my personal appreciation for the fine cooperation of the school board, teachers, and parents during the past year. With your continued support we can keep on improving the Cornish school system. The school board has been especially considerate and has given me a great deal of courage.
