

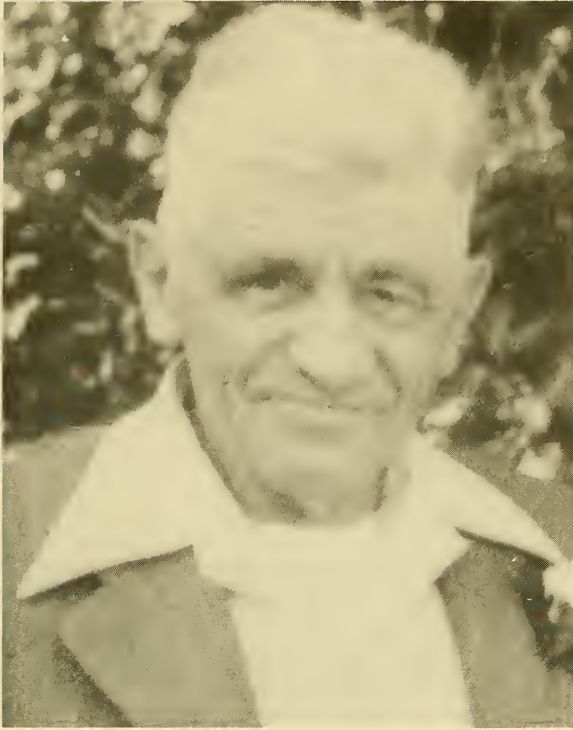

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 9th of March next at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, (polls not to close earlier than 6 o'clock in the afternoon) to act upon the following subjects:

ART. 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Road Agent for one year, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, two Auditors for one year, and all such officers and agents as may be necessary for transaction of Town's business for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and vote to raise and appropriate \$558.60 for same, the State to contribute \$3,723.98.

ART. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer and winter maintenance for roads.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the General Expense for the Highway Department.

ART. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Dump.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the upkeep of cemeteries.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting brush.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Newport Hospital.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Street Lights and Town Buildings.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Social Security on Town Employees for the ensuing year.

ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for use during the year in anticipation of taxes.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Insurance.

ART. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the cost of the Library, including librarian's salary, heat, etc. Librarian's salary to be paid directly by the Town.

ART. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Newport Area Home Health Agency.

ART. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Newport Ambulance Service.

ART. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.

ART. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Capital Reserve Fund for New Equipment.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Croydon Volunteer Fire Department.

ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,246.47 to secure the repayment of current land use taxes on Blue Mt. Forest Association.

ART. 21. To see if the Town of Croydon will vote to authorize the Selectmen to authorize the Road Agent to winter maintain the road leading from Cash Street to the south end of Rocky Bound Pond at any time when there are year round residents using said road. (Submitted by petition.)

ART. 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to withdraw a sum not to exceed \$4,500.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund to purchase a plain paper copier for the use of the Town.

ART. 23. Shall the Town of Croydon accept the provisions of Section 1 to 10 inclusive of Chapter 53-B of the revised statutes annotated providing for the establishment of a regional refuse disposal district, together with the Towns of Acworth, Charlestown, Cornish, Goshen, Grantham, Langdon, Lempster, Newport, Plainfield, Springfield, Sunapee, Unity and Washington, and the City of Claremont, and the construction, maintenance, and operation of a regional refuse disposal facility by said district in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen, and shall the Town enter into said agreement as an interlocal agreement pursuant to RSA 53-A for said purpose?

ART. 24. To see what sum of money the Town wishes to raise and appropriate for the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Region Association.

ART. 25. To see what sum of money the Town wishes to raise and appropriate for the planning board.

ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a bridge fund to be used for repair and reconstruction of Town Bridges and instruct the Selectmen to transfer the road reserve fund so called into this special fund.

ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to change the system of once a year property tax billing to twice a year billing.

ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) for the revaluation of the Town and authorize the withdrawal of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund, the balance if any to be raised by taxation.

ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) for repair or reconstruction of Town bridges and authorize the withdrawal of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ART. 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Thanks to the 1979 Legislature, senior citizens get a break on dog license fees. If the owner of a dog is 65 or older, the license fee for one dog (and one only) is now \$2.00, effective January 1980. If such owner has more dogs to license, the fees shall be the same as the regular fees stated above.

Remember to take your rabies certificate with you as well as any proof of the dog having been altered. This must of course be signed by whomever performed the operation.

Owning a dog (or any pet) is indeed a responsibility. It is your responsibility to pay your license fees during the month of April, keep the animal in good health, and be responsible for the behavior of your dog. You, as the owner, are responsible for any damage to property.

SUMMARY

NH/VT SOLID WASTE PROJECT

The NH/VT Solid Waste Project has concentrated on three major tasks since March 1981 town meetings. First and foremost has been the drafting of the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal District Agreement. Following votes last year, the moderator in each town appointed three representatives to the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board. This Board, authorized by RSA Chapter 53-B worked through the summer and fall on the wording of the Agreement. The voters in each town will be asked to vote by printed ballot on accepting the Agreement at town meeting. The City Council of Claremont must also act on the question of accepting the Agreement. Each town in which a majority of the voters vote in favor of the Agreement becomes a member of the District. The District then has one year to complete plans for a regional disposal facility. At March 1983 town meetings any town may vote to withdraw from the District with no restrictions. If enough towns remain in the District, then the District will begin financing and construction of a solid waste disposal facility.

Voters in Southern Windsor County, Vermont will also be voting on forming a similar district. Should the production of energy from the incineration of solid waste be selected as the alternative, the two districts can cooperatively develop the facility. An Interstate Solid Waste Compact has been adopted in both state legislatures and is now being acted upon by the United States Congress.

A long-term contract for the sale of energy is the important first step in the development of an incinerator. Therefore, the second major task of the Project this past year has been negotiation for the sale of electricity with Central Vermont Public Service (CVPS). Representatives from CVPS have met with the Project's engineering consultant on a number of occasions. CVPS has proposed purchasing electricity for 30 years at 15 cents per kilowatt. However, we are now negotiating to increase the proposed purchase price, based on CVPS projections of future electricity costs. Should the Project be successful, incineration to produce electricity could be competitive with landfilling. Negotiations should be completed by late Spring and a decision made at that time on electricity production or landfilling.

Landfilling remains a potential option and is necessary for ash disposal even if an incinerator is constructed. Therefore, the third major task has been to locate suitable landfill sites. Wright-Pierce Engineers identified over 150 potential sites and have now narrowed those down to about 7 best sites. The towns must now select the best site for detailed hydrogeologic analysis. Two sites near the Newport/Claremont border appear most promising at this time.

Should the towns vote to adopt the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal District Agreement, the District will become a legal entity and will join with the Vermont District to take the place of the existing NH/VT Solid Waste Planning Committee. Work will then concentrate during the next year on: (1) completion of negotiations with CVPS; (2) continued work on a regional landfill site; (3) a search for a private owner/operator for an incineration facility; and (4) preparation of necessary environmental impact statements and permit applications.

United States Environmental Protection Agency funding will end in October 1982. However, local funds appropriated at last years town meetings should be sufficient to carry the Project through to March 1983. At March 1983 town meetings the final plan for the disposal system will be presented, together with the financing program, and the towns will have a final chance to vote on staying in the District.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

During the past year your Planning Board has met at least once a month and the special subcommittee for the Master Plan has also met frequently. Numerous items of business have been processed.

The Board expresses its thanks to you, the townspeople, to David Shackett, William Walsh and James Grenier, whose terms on the Board ended last March. New members of the Board are: Harry Newcomb (ex-officio, Chairman of the Selectmen), Robert O'Brien, and alternates Gerald Gross and Janet Pellerin.

Carried over from 1980 was an application for sub-division by the Atkinson-Davis Corporation, known as "The Watering Trough Sub-division". This application was disapproved by the Board due principally to a failure to arrive at a satisfactory protection for the water flow into the watering trough on Route 10, a facility used frequently by the public.

A proposal by Mr. Bailey to re-subdivide one large lot in his previously approved "Ryder Corner, Old Springfield Road Sub-division" was not approved by the Board. Principal factors in the decision to disapprove were that such further subdivision represented premature development of a remote area and that the condition of the road was not good enough to provide safe and reliable access. The disapproval was appealed by the applicant. At a hearing in Superior Court the disapproval by the Board was upheld as valid. This activity created considerable expense to the Town.

Approval was granted to Mr. Bailey for the subdivision of 104 acres, known as the "Pine Hill Subdivision", into 5 lots, with certain restrictions.

An application by the Estate of Guy Dodge, Jr., to subdivide land on Camel Hump Road was considered at several meetings and was withdrawn by the applicant.

The Master Plan for the Town was completed after a public hearing and consultation with the Upper Valley Council. The Plan was officially adopted by the Board on December 7, 1981, after nearly 2 years of study. This represents an important step forward in the systematic organization of policy for the Town.

1981 REPORT OF THE NEWPORT AREA HOME HEALTH AGENCY

In 1981 there were some shifts in Home Health Care Service provided to area towns by the Newport Area Home Health Agency. These shifts were caused by changes in staffing, government policies and individual town utilization and need of service.

Skilled Nursing Home visits, the Agency's core service remained stable as did physical therapy visits and service to mothers and children in the Agency's Well Child Program. There was a decrease in occupational therapy and office visits and an increase in Home Health Aide Service.

The Agency's clinics remained well attended—an Adult Screening Clinic for Blood Pressure, Diabetes and Enemia held in Grantham was highly successful. The Agency will hold such a clinic in other small towns that desire this service.

Newport Area Home Health Agency participated in the Dartmouth Medical School program that orients prospective doctors to community medicine. Newport Area Home Health Agency staff worked with the professional staff of the Counseling Center of Sullivan County to gain mental health counseling skills. These activities as well as staff attendance at educational workshops added knowledge and skills to help area citizens with health problems.

The Agency continued its Child Abuse and Neglect Program with funding from the United Way. Newport Area Home Health Agency appreciates the support of the towns and will continue to provide high quality service to all those who need home health care.

It was moved, seconded and passed without dissent on a voice vote that the School Reports be accepted as printed in the Town Report.

A motion was made to raise and appropriate the sum of \$179,322.00 for the payment of salaries, support of schools and payment of statutory obligations of the District. It was passed and taken up by line item by the Moderator. A question on the appropriation for handicapped services arose through Jim Grenier. Mr. Sokul answered that although the amount was high, it is our obligation and responsibility to raise it. He explained that \$11,350 will be returned to the District if monies from the State are available, but feels this figure is doubtful. Mr. Grenier stated he didn't believe such an amount was fair to the townspeople, that there must be another way. Sanford Speer asked if it would be cheaper to have a cooperative school within the District. The expense would be prohibitive. David Shackett suggested a letter to the Legislature.

Harry Newcomb suggested the feeder route monies be eliminated because it hasn't been used for 10 years.

Harry asked the School Board to look into the possibility of buying our own bus.

Sanford Speer asked to amend the original amount to exclude the feeder bus route. This amount being \$177,882.00. It was seconded and passed without dissent.

David Shackett made the motion that the School Board send a letter to the State Department of Education and Legislature supporting bills which would require the State to reimburse Towns

for financial obligations for handicapped and other special education problems. Jules Pellerin added "And to further redefine the perimeter of the term handicapped so that only those which are educable will be covered by the law."

Mr. Shackett reminded the Board that in 1976 the District Meeting voted to have all material, reports, etc. except for the Warrant and Budget for the School District turned in to the printer by Nov. 1. He would like the School Board to oversee this operation.

Mr. Shackett asked a committee to be formed to look into buying a bus. Members of this committee will be Harry Newcomb, Fred Bocko, and Sanford Speer. Mr. Sokul brought up the fact that the lease terminated before the next March meeting. Hopefully there will be time at the next District Meeting or a Special Meeting will be called.

Mr. Grenier expressed concern for funding Special Ed.

Mr. Gross moved the meeting be adjourned.

Mrs. Rosemary Aldrich continues to serve effectively as teacher with Mrs. Donna Leslie as school lunch manager and instructional aide.

Stuart Sandreuter retired as school custodian after about 15 years of faithful service. We certainly wish him well in his retirement. He was replaced by Frederick Bocko who had previously resigned as School Board member to accept a full time position with the Newport Schools.

The School Board appointed Mrs. Cynthia Ballou to fill the unexpired term of Frederick Bocko as School Board member until the March elections.

It should be noted that the financial aid which Croydon has been receiving from state and federal sources is being substantially reduced. Sweepstakes aid has been reduced and plans have been expressed to reduce it drastically next year. AREA aid has been abolished. Aid for special education has been seriously reduced for Croydon. This means, of course that the citizens will have to raise additional taxes to make up these reductions.

We were sorry to lose Mr. Douglas McDonald, Assistant Superintendent of Schools who resigned on January 4 to become Superintendent of Schools in Moultonboro, N. H. He served Croydon well during the time he was with our office.

The Croydon School continues to operate efficiently and effectively and I want to thank everyone for their splendid cooperation.
