#### SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

This has been a Year of change at the George B. White School. A change in administration occurred with the resignation of the principal, Miss Dagmar Franke, during the summer. Miss Franke instituted new programs into the curriculum for which the Board thanks her and wishes her success in her new position.

There wasn't time to obtain a new principal before the first day of school so the Board appointed Romona Stevens as Acting Principal and Ann Ryan as Assistant Principal. Both did an outstanding job. Mr. Peter Sweet, our new principal, joined us near the end of October. The Board would like to express it's thanks to the members of the selection committee: teachers Romona Stevens and Ann Ryan and PTO members Maxine Arnold, Susan LaPointe, and Mary County.

Approximately one-third of the teaching staff is new this year. This has added to the principal's burden but he has done a fine job of administering all needs at the school.

The staff is working hard this year to develop curriculum guides for the entire school. These will be bery beneficial in the future.

Another change this year occurred withing the Hot Lunch Program. Judy Stevens resigned from the program last spring and Karen Wilkins resigned during the summer. The Board thanks them for their dedicated service to the school over the years. Nor-

ma Laro was hired as a new Food Service Director and has instituted changes in the Hot Lunch Program as directed by the School Board. Many improvements have been noted this year.

The proposed budget for 80-81 shows a substantial increase, primarily due to inflation and the high cost of fuel. Tuition, special education, and decreased revenues have added to the increase. The Board feels the increase is merited and in no way frivolous. There are studies under way to help curb the rising energy costs A four day week and/or a modified school year schedule are possibilities that are being investigated.

The Board also has a growth committee that is investigating future building requirements, high schools, and other related areas. The Board wishes to thank the members of the committee for their concerns and efforts.

During the winter, suffered a heart attack and was unable to take part in School Board activities for a while. His efforts were missed, especially during budget preparation. Recently, Joe submitted his resignation from the School Board effective on voting day. His services will be greatly missed.

In closing, the Board thanks the professional and supportive staff, parents, volunteers, and all who have made this year meaningful, and beneficial.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

In spite of the extreme strain on the town budget caused by a year of rampant inflation, 1979 was a year of progress for Deerfield in a number of areas.

The Board of Selectmen has proceeded to implement a number of recommendations contained in Deerfield's Master Plan, as adopted by the Planning Board in April, 1979. A capital reserve fund was established to provide for the purchase of land for the town as future demands may require. A committee worked during the year to determine a system for numbering all the buildings in town, as recommended by the Master Plan, to facilitate police and fire protection. An article appears in the Warrant regarding this project. Also in the Warrant, as recommended in the Plan, are articles concerning the purchase of a new fire engine, and the construction of a fire department substation.

The architectural historian's report on the Town Hall, funded in part by a grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation, was published in serial form in the local newspapers. The report contains recommendations for the restoration of certain features of the building. Related to future restoration efforts, the town's application to have the Town Hall placed on the National Register of Historic Places has been approved at the state level, and the application is pending in Washington. National Register status will make the Town Hall eligible for federal historic preservation grants.

The conservation of fuel has been a major consideration for everyone during the past year. The Selectmen's efforts in this area have involved the insulation of the Town Hall, which should produce a considerable savings, and the installation of a 4,000 gallon storage capacity of diesel fuel. The town has already realized a 25% savings by purchasing this fuel in bulk.

The grant application to the National Historical Publications and Records Commission for the microfilming of town records has been approved enthusiastically at the state level, and is awaiting final federal approval. The project is scheduled to start in May.

The Board of Selectmen has continued to pursue a policy of steadily improving municipal government and services, despite inflation, without placing an undue burden on the taxpayers of Deerfield. As evidence of the success of this policy, the Town of Deerfield enjoys a tax rate lower than 83% of the municipalities in New Hampshire, and lower than 90% of the cities and towns in Rockingham County, according to figures contained in the 1978 Equalized Values and Tax Rates issued by the State Department of Revenue Administration.

The Board would like to take this opportunity to thank the many individuals and members of committees who freely invested their time and energies in the conduct of local government during the past year.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Board of Adjustment held hearings on ten requests for variance or Special Exception during 1979 plus one re-hearing. One was denied, three were granted with several stipulations and the re-hearing re-affirmed the Board's previous decision.

A new application form was adopted in July raising the fee to \$25.00 and requiring the applicant to pay for the required certified mail - return receipt notification of all abuttors (and Applicant). This has resulted in most of the costs being born by the applicant in each case. The new form also requires the signature of the Board or Town Official who denied the applicant.

New By-laws were adopted by the Board after review by legal council to update our procedure to reflect court decisions in the Zoning area over the last few years. This was completed in July.

Public Hearings are scheduled for the fourth Tuesday of the month. The posting and publication requirements are such that the Board must have the completed application with fees fifteen days before.

#### MUNICIPAL BUDGET COMMITTEE Annual Report - 1979

1979 was a year in which we all experienced higher prices in many areas due to inflation. We are fortunate that the cost of school and town services in Deerfield in 1979 did not keep pace with the rate of inflation. Our tax rate increase in 1979 was under two percent and this followed a tax rate increase in 1978 of approximately five per cent.

For 1980, while the School and Town budgets have not been finalized at this writing, it is very apparent, based on the budgetary requests of the Selectmen and School Board that inflation has raised the cost of these services in Deerfield. The likelihood is strong that the increase in our tax rate in 1980 will exceed the modest increases of recent years.

This committee has been very concerned with trying to hold the tax line in a time when the pressure of inflation is steadily increasing. The MBC has put considerable effort and much thought into establishing guidelines for school and town expenditures in an attempt to limit taxes to a reasonable increase. We have not been able to formulate such guidelines as yet.

We offer the following recommendations towards improved financial planning in Deerfield;

To the Board of Selectmen:

The cost of maintaining Deerfield's roads consumes the greatest portion, approximately one third, of our town budget. Currently the general condition of our roads is deteriorating apparently at a rate faster than we can rebuild and repair. We recommend that the Board of Selectmen develop a positive and realistic 3-5 year road program which would reverse this trend and and enable Deerfield to "stay on top" with respect to road maintenance.

To the Board of Selectmen and School Board:

We recommend that a Long Term Capital Plan be prepared covering buildings, equipment, land, repairs, roads, recreation areas, personnel, etc., to be updated annually and included in the budget requests.

To the Citizens of Deerfield:

Your Municipal Budget Committee needs to hear from you. In these difficult economic times the committee feels more than ever the need of public input in decision making and a strong sense of direction from the taxpayer. This committee meets 10-12 times during the year and all meetings are open to the public. We request your attendance at these meetings as well as at the Annual Open Hearings concerning the Town and School budgets in February.

#### REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is pruchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

#### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Deerfield Planning Board has been busy this year. We held 23 final hearings for subdivisions; 21 of these were approved (one of them was a major subdivision of 12 lots). There were 2 denials (one of them was a major subdivision of 6 lots). The land involved in these subdivisions was 1,118 acres and 65 lots.

Starting in June, the Planning Board and a group of residents of the town met 15 times to work on the Master Plan proposed amendments for zoning. There were three informational meetings and one public hearing; the second public hearing will be held the end of January.

In accordance with RSA 36:23 passed by the legislature this year, all preliminary subdivisions and subsequent hearings on same must have abutters notified by certified mail sent out by the Board. Therefore, anyone having business with the Board must have an appointment.

#### RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL, INC.

During the past year the Rural District Health Council has continued to provide Home Health Care for the sick, and preventive medicine to the youth of today who will be healthier laeders tomorrow.

The Rural District Health Council contines to qualify as a certified Home Health Agency implementing procedures to continue to provide quality care.

The care of the sick program has provided 4,989 combined visits to its member towns from January, 1979-October 31, 1979.

The agency's staff also conducts Elderly Health Screening Programs on Wednesday. Adults from the member towns are welcome to attend any of these screenings. They are held on Wednesdays. The first and third Wednesdays it is held in Farmington and the second in Northwood, while the fourth is in Milton. This program is provided with no charge to the patient and includes blood pressure checks, diabetes and anemia screenings, nutrition counseling for special diets and weight control. The program has provided services to 601 patients with 77 new patients enrolled and 41 referrals made.

The Child Health Program is an active program with 821 children enrolled. Arlene Thorne, R.N., coordinator of the program, and Paula Davis, R.N., clinic nurse have conducted 54 clinics from January 1979 - October, 1979. This program is offered to all children from any of the member towns, and includes physical examinations, immunizations, teaching and counseling for ages 0 - 6 years.

A Dental program is held for children ages 3-6 years which includes cleaning and flouride treatments twice a year with referrals to local Dentists for follow-up care when needed. It is funded by the Division of Public Health, Bureau of Pre-School Dental services. The program provided service to 420 children.

The Child Health Program has provided 126 visits to new born babies, and 891 home visits to assure continuity of care. School children are always welcomed for immunization. The program is funded in part by the U.S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare, N.H. Division of Public Health, Bureau of Maternal and Child Health grant, and the Rural District Health Council.

A space within the Rural District Health Council office is provided for the distribution of vouchers from the Supplemental Food and Nutrition Education Program for Women, Infants, and Children. (WIC) in conjunction with the Strafford County Prenatal Family Planning Program, Inc. The program provided service to 216 children from ages 0 - 5 years. The foods supplied are formula, dairy products, fruit juices and cereals.

The Rural District Health Council with the cooperation of Frisbie Memorial Hospital provides a discharge referral coordinator who assists the Social Service Dept. at the hospital and the patients physician to continue care when needed from the hospital to the patient's home. The hospital funds this program in part with the Council. 175 referrals have been made.

The Agency this past year has experienced a decrease in the full payment visit. Because of this the service fee income has shown a marked decline and has placed the agency in a financial bind. In order for the Council to continue to provide these many services to its member towns it will be necessary to increase the per capita to \$3.20.

During the past year the Council has made for your town 303 skilled nursing visits, 196 home heath aide visits, 119 therapy visits, 54 child health home visits, and 66 children have attended the Child Health Program.

In the short decade since the Town Conservation Commissions have been in existence in New Hampshire, most, including Deerfield, have kept to that goal. Rather than just planning trees in the Common or trying to turn their towns into one vast greenbelt, they are working to preserve those qualities that made their town a nice place to live in. This means working with the Selectmen and other town organizations, most of whom are citizen-volunteers like themselves, to achieve this goal.

Preserving natural and historic resources that could easily be lost forever in an area such as Rockingham County that is one of the fastest growing regions in the United States is a formidable task. All of us have to work together if we are to preserve our community heritage.

What are those areas of prime concern to the Conservation Commission? They are along our rivers and wetlands, the steep slopes of our mountains, buildings of historic value, our lakes and other areas that should be set aside for the multiple-use of the town. A good example of this multiple-use area is the Lindsay Woods, across from the Geo. B. White School. Close to the road is an excellent athletic field. Immediately beyond is the nature trail and outdoor living laboratory; and further in is an area devoted to wildlife and a more natural environment. The McNeil Woods are in a more remote area of town and has been managed to improve the forest and wildlife potential.

There are three basic ways to set aside land for use by the town, whether for education, recreation, service or conservation. They are: donation outright to the town, purchase of land by the town (using matching funds wherever possible to stretch our local tax dollars) and a third method. This involves the Conservation Agreement whereby the land is retained in private ownership, but development rights are curtailed to preserve an area such as along a river or to insure some open space is saved. In Deerfield, there is a fourth method that requires a major developer to give a percent of the developed land to the town under the direction of the Planning Board. The Conservation Commission has been working more closely with the Planning Board and Parks and Recreation Department in this area. The town is also in the midst of formulating a master plan for growth.

The Conservation Commission is tasked, by the enabling statute, to inventory and update the natural and historic areas in the town, including open space areas. Incidentally, the open space areas can include farmland which should remain in private ownership. We are also required to examine and report on applications for dredge and fill within the town. Over twelve of these applications were processed last year.

Any intelligent approach to conservation requires that the people affected be well-informed on the issues and facts. In this regard, the Conservation Commission is sponsoring, along with other agencies to keep our costs down, a series of seminars and open discussion forums on property rights, land use and other facets of conservation. We are also hoping to sponsor with locally interested groups, a student and a teacher from our school system to one of the Conservation Workshops of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. We are additionally the recipient of several Federal and State publications and bulletins which will be indexed and turned over to the Town Library. As members of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions, we are kept informed on what is happening throughout the state and those resources available to the towns in the conservation area.

Working together, we can preserve the quality of life in our community.

#### REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

A total of 27 sewage disposal systems were installed and approved in 1978, two of which were approved by State inspectors at my request. Of the systems installed, 20 were for new homes, one was for a new private school, and five were replacement sewage systems. A total of 47 plans were received for sewage systems proposed for construction.

Seven complaints were received and investigated. These ranged from dead farm animals to odors on Northwood Lake. Two of the complaints required the issuance of orders for their correction.

At the direction of the Selectmen, I obtained warrants to further investigate two complaints. The first was regarding a mobile home being used as a dwelling without proper sanitary facilities. The second was for the inspection of a house which was alleged to be unfit for human habitation. Both of these cases have been taken over by Town Counsel.

As requested by the Town Counsel, I appeared in Rockingham Superior Court and Auburn District Court to testify in two separate cases.

As previously mentioned, one complaint involved odors from Northwood Lake. In early July, there were reports of offensive odors originating from the Lake. At first, it was thought that this was due to swamp gas, an occasional occurance in some portions of the Lake. However, when investigated, the odors appeared to be prevalent in a large area. When a sample of the water was analysed by both the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission and the water lab at UNH, it was found that the odor was caused by a rare form of algae. This algae originated in a private used by exotic birds. This pond, located in Northwood, drained directly into the Lake. In July and again in August the water was treated by the State with copper sulfate. This action significantly reduced the algae problem. Fortunately, Pleasant Lake was unaffected.

The Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission has ordered the owner of the duck pond to stop discharging the effluent into Northwood Lake.

Other activities I was involved in were: discussions with the Dept. of Public Welfare; meetings with the N.H.W.S. & P.C.C. officials; consultation with the Deerfield and Northwood Conservation Commissions; collecting water samples for analysis by the State lab; inspection of homes requesting foster children; consultation with the Selectmen regarding the operation of the sanitary landfill; and meetings with the Board of Selectmen regarding various problems.

Last but by no means least, the Selectmen appointed Philip Bilodeau assistant health officer. Phil is well qualified, being a sanitary engineer with the State, and I am sure he will serve the Town well.

Members of a CETA project built cement steps leading from the parking lot down to the field. This has become a valuable addition to our complex.

The local well drillers dug and donated a well which has in excess of 10 gallons per minutes. Finally the foundation was poured for the shed and this along with hooking up the water and electricity will be finished the first thing in the Spring.

The Senior baseball field will be open to all users in the Spring with the school soccor team beginning to utilize the field in the Fall.

Now that the Community Field is being used the Parks and Recreation committee asks all parents and people who use the complex to please cooperate by using the steps and not the bank in going down to the field and also please park all cars in the parking lot not along Rt. 107 or the access road to the field.

Veasey Park under the direction of chairman Charles Osborn, Jolene Smith and Jeff Southmayd had another outstanding year. Summer swimming instruction was given to over 90 youngsters. To Jeff Southmayd sincere thanks go for keeping the entire park clean.

In closing, on behalf of the Parks and Recreation committee, we thank all those people who came to our assistance last year with labor and materials. Thanks to these people and all those who have assisted in the past, we now have a completed project. It has been a long hard struggle but we have succeeded. We dedicate this field to the people of Deerfield. Take pride in it and keep it in prime shape for your use and for the use of future generations as well.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I would like to commend the staff members for the efforts they have made in the area of staff development and in-service training. In November 1977, the Supervisory Union # Staff Development Master Plan was evaluated by a State Department of Education team. The evaluation report that the Staff Development Committee received from the team was quite positive. The recommendations that the State Department of Education team made were considered as the Staff Development Committee prepared the Supervisory Union Staff Development Master Plan that will cover the years 1978-1981. A great deal of credit should be given to the various staff members who have served on the Staff Development Committee during the last three years, and I would like to give special thanks to Virginia Sanborn and Elsie Fife. As I have reviewed the in-service training work of the various staff members, I have been very impressed with the many worthwhile activities in which they have participated.

The staff evaluation system that we are presently utilizing is also oriented toward professional improvement. As 1 have received the work that has been done by the principals and the staff members with whom they work 1 have been very impressed by the efforts that have been made to develop new and better methods of instruction. I have been even more impressed by the concern that has been demonstrated for the welfare of the individual student.

Central New Hampshire Educational Services, Inc. continues to provide essential diagnostic services to the pupil placement teams as they carry out their efforts to develop individual programs for students. We have been fortunate in that a major share of the revenue required to fund the services provided by Central New Hampshire has been provided by the state and federal government.

In closing, I would like to thank the School Board, School Staff and citizens of Deerfield for all that they have done for the students.

#### DEERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL MEETING Saturday March 10, 1979; Deerfield Town Hall

Moderator called meeting or order at 2:00 p.m. (Moderator is James A. McIntyre)

Moderator listed rules for the meeting: Robert's Rules, as modified by the Moderator; no smoking except in designated areas; no more than two amendments allowed per warrant article, except for Article 7. On motions, when discussion is begun, the Maker will speak first, then others will raise hands and wait to be recognized. Speakers allowed three minutes. Please use microphones and state name before beginning to speak.

Moderator ruled that teachers who are not residents may speak to issues but will not vote. Unanimous show of hands in support.

Moderator introduced the following persons: Wayne Baron, Business Manager of Supervisory Union #53; Dagmar Franke, George B. White School Principal; Jonathan Winslow, Judith Bush and Joseph Stone, members of the Deerfield School Board; Frances Wright, Clerk of the School District; and Shirley Winslow, Assistant Clerk.

Moderator annunced certain corrections to be made on pages 3 and 8 of the School District Budget handout.

Moderator announced that annual Election of School District Officers will take place Tuesday, March 13, 1979 with polls open from 10 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Moderator proceeded to read the Warrant:

ARTICLE 1. Motion made by Joseph Stone to accept the motion as read. Seconded by Nancy Guyette. It was a voice vote in the affirmative and motion declared carried.

ARTICLE 2. Motion made by Joseph Stone to accept the article as read. Seconded by Wadsworth Winslow. It was explained by Mr. Stone and affirmed by MBC Chairman Berglund that this was a washout item having to do with kitchen alteration, school lunch program and special education. It was a voice vote in the affirmative and motion declared carried.

ARTICLE 3. Motion made by Joseph Stone to accept the article as read. Seconded by Nancy Guyette. Mr. Stone explained that these were Federal funds having to do with Special Education and Energy Conservation. Voice vote in the affirmative and motion declared carried.

ARTICLE 4. Joseph Stone moved to accept the article as read. Wadsworth Winslow seconded. Mr. Stone explained that this article would allow School District to apply for funds as they became available during the year. Erick Berglund moved that the article be amended by striking the word "expend" and substituting the word "receive" so that the article would read "to apply for and receive on behalf . . ." Seconded by John Williams. Mr. Berglund said the reason for his amendment is that the district cannot expend monies unless the Town and the MBC act on it. Voice vote taken on the amendment and declared in the affirmative.

It was a voice vote in the affirmative on Article 4 as amended, and motion declared carried.

ARTICLE 5. Motion made by Joseph Stone to accept this article as read, and he noted that this was a petitioned article submitted by a minimum of ten voters. Motion seconded by Nancy Guyette. Mr. Stone gave some background information and answered several questions. George Menard moved to amend the article by inserting the words "Deerfield School Board and the" between "prior approval of the" and "superintendent" in the last sentence of the article. Warren Billings seconded. Mr. Menard stated that his reason for this amendment was to protect against abuse. Voice vote taken and declared in the affirmative. Further discussion. Penny McGarry moved that the article be amended further to add the words "and receive a grade of B or higher". Donald Fisher seconded. After several were speakers were heard, a vote was taken on this second amendment to Article 5. Voice vote in the affirmative, and amendment declared passed.

Discussion continued on Article 5. as amended. Mr. Stone explained that the policy of the School Board was that teachers and courses would first be recommended by the Principal; also that such teachers would be required to return to Deerfield in the fall to qualify for reimbursement. Vote taken on Article 5 as amended; last sentence of article reads "In order to be eligible for payment the staff member must have the prior approval of the Deerfield School Board and the superintendent and the course in question must be related to the subject or subjects being taught by the staff member and receive a grade of B or higher for the course." Voice vote not definite— Moderator asked for show of hands to be counted. Ayes 90 and Noes 57. Vote in the affirmative and Article 5 as amended declared carried.

ARTICLE 6. Mr. Stone moved to accept this article as read. Wadsworth Winslow seconded. Mr. Stone explained that accepting this article would mean a vote of confidence for the School Board's 2-year package agreement with the teachers. Mr. Berglund stated that the MBC had approved the arrangement. Discussion. Mr. Stone stated that the teachers' contracts were a verbal commitment by both parties. Win Hutchinson moved that Article 6 be tabled indefinitely. Donald Smith seconded. Moderator explained an aye vote on motion means it is tabled; vote no and main motion is kept open. Vote by show of hands -ayes 51 and noes 63. The motion to table does not carry and discussion continues on Article 6.

Several more persons spoke to the article. Robert DeBurro, a non-resident teacher, affirmed Mr. Stone's statement, saying the verbal contract is good, and will be honored, showing good faith between the Board and all teachers. Voice vote in the affirmative. Article 6 declared passed.

Moderator declared short recess. Meeting recovened at 4:00 p.m.

Willis Robbins proposed informally that the MBC Chairman and Ass't Chairman be invited to sit at the podium. Action in the affirmative, and Erick Berglund and John Williams moved to the front of hall.

ARTICLE 7. Erick Berglund moved that Article 7, in the total amount of \$711,070.83 (which includes Article 5 just carried) be adopted. William Sanborn seconded. Mr. Berglund stated that budget shows about a 10% increase over last year's budget. Moderator stated that this article will be taken up by section, as shown in handouts.

Mrs. Rollins spoke to the subject; at this time Moderator stated that personal attacks would be called out of order since a School Board hearing would be held on Monday March 12, 1979 to deal with issues concerning performance, and that we were voting on salary for a position, not an individual person. After much discussion the amendment was voted upon. The result in the affirmative, the Moderator declared amendment, reducing line 210.00 by \$750.00, carried.

Win Hutchinson moved to amend line 210.31 Regular Teachers (Salaries) to read \$187,820.00" instead of "\$194,170.00". Jolene Smith seconded. Many people spoke to the amendment. When voice vote taken, it was in the Negative, and line item 210.31 stands, as declared by Moderator.

You are hereby notified to meet at Deerfield Town Hall in said Deerfield on Saturday, the fifteenth day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,335.90 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$8.905.97.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500 for the purpose of having a well drilled to facilitate the highway/police building, and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for the purpose of repairing the Town Hall roof, and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 as its share toward the reconstruction of Bridge No. 144/109 on Route 107, known locally as the Freeses Pond Dam Bridge, to match State and Federal funds and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow this amount and to issue notes or bonds as necessary.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000 for the purpose of purchasing a fire truck, and authorize the withdrawal of \$28,000 from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 and to further authorize the withdrawal of the other \$32,000 from the Police/Fire Automotive Equipment Fund.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the purpose of constructing a Fire Sub Station, (in the vicinity of South Road and Birch Road) and authorize the withdrawal of \$25,500 from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of rebuilding James City Road.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the purpose of implementing the numbering system.

#### NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

The Newmarket Regional Health Center has made great strides in 1979 towards improving services for the residents of Deerfield. The number of people utilizing the services offered by the Center continues to grow at a rapid rate. Over 20,000 rides were provided by the Senior Citizen Transportation Service in 1979, an increase of 5,000 rides over the previous year. Following our move to a new and expanded facility, our utilization of medical services has increased 38% over the 1978 utilization level. In addition to the medical services provided by the Center, there has also been a significant increase in preventive and community health services.

The Center's medical services are provided by Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Mr. Michael, Lewis, a Registered Physician's Assistant, and Ann Morgan, a Nurse Practitioner. The medical team also includes a nurse and a Health Aide who performs the bulk of laboratory procedures at the Center, both of whom assist the physician and physician's assistant. The Center's Community Health Workers work closely with the Medical Staff to ensure the appropriate continuity of care for its diverse patient population. In addition, they coordinate preventive screening clinics to detect

potential health hazards, hold information workshops open to the public, and act as a liason between the medical provider and the patient. To make a medical appointment, call the Center at 659-3106 or toll-free at 1-800-582-7279.

The Senior Citizen Transportation Service provides regularly scheduled bus service for the elderly of Deerfield and other area communities. Transportation to medical and dental care, social services, food and clothes shopping, and day-long excursions to social events are but a few of the many activities available to seniors.
