You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, 1981 at 10:00 a.m. for the choice of Town Officers elected by official ballot.

The polls will open on said date at 10:00 a.m. and will close not earlier than 6:00 p.m. in the evening.

You are hereby notified that the second session of the annual meeting of the Town of Francestown will be held at the Town Hall on Saturday the fourteenth day of March, 1981 at 10:00 a.m. in the morning to act on those matters not to be voted on by official ballot.

Article 1.

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing terms.

Article 2.

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 4.

BUDGET AND ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT

To the Town of Francestown:

The Committee met several times during the year prior to the regular series of meetings usually held toward the latter part of the year concerning department budgets. Several meetings were held at the request of the Selectwoman and Selectmen. Discussed at these sessions were the proceedures to be followed in the supervision of the newly authorized fire house, disbursement of the monies approved for this purpose, contract agreements and the means of financing the balance in the least costly method. One of these meetings involved the considerable cost to the Town. perhaps as high as \$12,000, for nursing home care for one of the Town residents. The Committee advised the Town to litigate for the retrieval of these costs. More specific details of the problem are not mentioned in this report for fear of prejudicing the Town's case in the courts. Another meeting involved the request of the Road Agent for authority to prepare a surplus Army truck, already owned by the Town, for immediate operation and a second as a standby vehicle for future use. If, after examination by a qualified mechanic and evaluation of all the essential components of these two trucks and if, in the judgment of the Road Agent and an expert, the expenditure of an estimated \$2,000 was justified, the committee recommended that this work be done. The Road Agent proposed the purchased of a sander on a leasepurchase agreement. The committee recommended that a firm rental agreement with purchase option be entered into, subject only to approval by the Town Meeting regarding buying it. Other meetings with the Selectwoman and Selectmen involved the upcoming budget.

The subject of one of our other meetings was the formulation of advice to the Selectmen regarding the amount and distribution of monies for capital improvements which should be incorporated in the Master Plan. In the past, approximately four to five per cent of the Town Budget has been set aside for this purpose. That sum has been inadequate. The Committee recommended that, as a start, ten percent of the Town budget be set aside and designated by Town vote as to individual beneficiaries.

1981 BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS

The budget has been produced by the Selectwoman, Selectmen, and the Budget Committee. Most of the line items reflect increases over the 1980 appropriations which are unavoidable. Some are due to inflation and energy costs and others reflect the growth of certain departments. The new fire station has been partly responsible for several line item increases such as expenses of Town buildings, fire department budget, long term notes & bonds, interest and insurance. Several of the department & committee budgets were reduced from those submitted by their representatives. The reductions from the original requests were not made without careful consideration as to the needs of the respective departments, the ability of the Town to underwrite the costs and the reasonableness of those requests. We recomment the passage of the budget as it appears in the Town Report.

RECOMMENDATIONS ON WARRANT ARTICLED INVOLVING CAPTIAL OUTLAYS

We recommend passage of all the warrant articles involving the raising of monies except the two which at this writing have been submitted by the highway department. One involves the raising of \$14,000 to be used exclusively for the sealing of blacktop roads. The Committee and Selectmen's Office both feel that it can and should be financed out of the highway budget as part of a regular program pro-rated over the years. The other article, although not a money raising article, would strip the selectmen of their budgetary watchdog function and give carte blanche authority over to the Road Agent and/or a committee in the matter of the spending of \$10,000 (up to) for the purpose of buying certain equipment. It seems unwieldy and precedent setting.

OTHER

The Road Agent, Kris Stewart, has indicated that he may not run for re-election. We would like to commend him on the fine report he submitted to this committee in which he detailed the work done last year. Kris has demonstrated during the past year that the Town does not need a three man working crew. He never characterized himself as a full time employee, he charged the town for his time only when he felt he was needed to supplement the regular two man crew. Perhaps, with this in mind, the distinct possibility exists that the Town could get along very nicely with a working foreman and a one man crew. Because of Kris's policy of working only when the need existed the Highway Department operated essentially with 2% men. Most of the roads in town have been greatly improved and a head start of sorts has been effected thanks to Kris's diligence as Road Agent. We think the Town should experiment with the notion that two full time men can take care of the work to be done and, rather than have a third man on the payroll, contract out privately when the need really existed. We doubt that the size of the work force on the highway department is necessarily an item to be dealth with by the Town Meeting, rather, it is within the purview of the selecmen to decide. The possibility that no one will run for Road Agent would afford the opportunity to carry out this suggestion. The selectmen, we feel, can also insist that the Road Agent work full time along with one other man.

TRANSMITTAL AND COMMENTARY LETTER

Members of the Board:

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Francestown for the year ended December 31, 1980 and have issued our report thereon, dated January 15, 1981. As part of our examination, we reviewed and tested the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of this evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance when determining the nature, timing and extent of other such auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements. Our study and evaluation disclosed no weaknessess that we consider to be material. However, we offer the following comments to assist the Town in improving their financial operations.

Fixed Asset Records and Capitalization Policy

At the date of our last report the Town was in the process of establishing historical cost fixed asset records. It is our understanding that the project has since been abandoned because it strained the resources of the Town. We fully recognize that the costs of any control system should not outweigh the benefits and that the establishment of fixed asset accounting records is a major undertaki We therefore offer the following suggestions as an alternative method of fixed asset control.

- Maintain the fixed asset inventory at a central location under control of the Selectmen.
- Establish a program for periodically verifying the inventory and adopt formal procedures to delete items.

- . Adopt a capitalization policy.
- . Establish fixed asset accounting records for all new acquisitions.

Other

We noted that the Town recently strengthened its purchasing procedures and revised its cemetery commission accounting practises.

Publication Requirement

The provisions of R.S.A. 71-A:1 require that only this letter be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We recommend that you also publish the accompanying financial statements, footnote disclosures and auditor's opinion in their entirety in your next report. If you decide to publish the accompanying financial statements, you must include both footnote disclosures and our auditor's opinion as part of the Town report. In addition, the auditor's report may not be published without the accompanying financial statements and footnotes.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Francestown for their assistance during the course of our audit.

Keene State College during the Fall.

Connie Varnum works in the Library two days a week. Wednesday morning is Pre-School storytime when approximately nine children arrive at 10:45 A.M. until 11:30 A.M. Several Volunteers have read to the children at this time. Friday is a very busy day when films are shown and books selected by the Pre-School and Elementary Students. Library Trustees' Report

We began 1980 at the Library with regret and with some uncertainty as Inge Anderson, our devoted Librarian for

18 years, retired.

Obviously, time and great good luck would be needed to replace Inge, but, in the interim, the Library was splendidly served by Jill Leonard and Connie Varnum. With all running well in their capable hands, the Trustees could concentrate on the search for a permanent Librarian.

A number of applications were received and studied, but when, to our delight, one was received from a Francestonian eminently qualified for the position, our decision was quickly made - and Joan Hanchett started in May to make

this special Town position her own.

Library Week had been delayed until early May to celebrate in one festive week Inge's birthday and honor her retirement to warmer climes, to thank Jill, and to welcome Joan to her new home away from home. The timing was also planned to show the just completed new look at the Library - fresh paint and paper, and beautiful stencilling, and the complete redecoration under Eleanor Kiblin's fine hand of the Historical Rooms by the Francestown Improvement and Historical Society. The festivities continued with a splendidly funny clown performance for the school children, and ended on the annual, and much appreciated, high-note of Allan Block and Nancy MacDowell's musical evening at the Library.

The Library began another new service in May - the monthly printing of a Francestown calendar sheet, distributed the first of each month at the Library and Vadney's store. Putting it together each month is a fascinating effort, giveing an overview of the multiplicity of Francestown events. But it is an effort in other ways, though the financial burden has been eased by Conservation Commission generosity. Nagging town organizations for their coming events is the worst of it, so please call in your plans and dates by the 25th of the

preceding month.

In June, as local gardening reached its peak, Joan showed the delightful film, "Ruth Stout's Garden, " at the Library to an enthusiastic audience - and caused an all-time rush on

mulch hav!

Summer came only too quickly, bringing the school children who use the library weekly during the term, back to us for the Library Summer Program. This year, we concentrated on Francestown itself, with field trips to explore each aspect of our village - history, a farm, a great pond, the forest, and, at the Library, a Francestown friend, Holly MacAdam, puppeteering to begin the program, and, to end it, a happy (and messy) crew of children churning their own ice cream out back. This "best Summer Program ever" was made possible by our volunteer experts: Bill Riley, historian; Frank Hanchett and the Lord family at the farm; Jo Staub and Phil Browne, pond experts; and Bill MacAdam, forester. David Blair of the Harris Center spent much voluntary time with us planning the program and charming the children in the forest and at the pond with his imaginative approach to nature studies.

Some of the children were also charmed to participate in the Library Labor Day float, the first in years. We may not have won, but we had a lot of fun, and thought, considering library statistics, that reading was truly a top choice of "Yankee Pastimes." As ever, it was a few "best friends" of the Library that made the fun possible, and we fondly thank them all.

After the children returned to school in September, Joan and Connie held a "Welcome" coffee at the Library, where villagers could meet and greet the many newcomers to Francestown. Some 70 Townsfolk came by for coffee and doughnuts, and, happily, many new names were added to the Library's volunteer list.

That list became crucial in the autumn when we again held a fund-raising chowder supper and dance in the Town Hall on October 10. A few extra-hard-working Library friends carried much of the load - some decorating, others calling on all the town for contributions of salads, bread, and desserts, while our faithful "Smorgasbord stalwarts" simmered soups in the kitchen and ran the dining room, assisted by a cheery crew of the town's young people. The generous response of all "food donors," and, especially, the generous musical contribution of Bruce Larsen and the Middle Road Society Jazz Band made the evening a great success (tickets again courtesy of Bob Behrsing) to the tune of \$431.63 should allow us to continue our refurbishing into the now shabby children's rooms - as last year's supper paid for our new plaster, paint, and paper on the main floor.

As ever, the Library hosted the meetings of many Town organizations, and entertained, and hopefully enlightened, the school children on the usual regular basis. The pre-schoolers came too, as did an even younger group for the Wednesday morning Story Time - tales told by yet more good friends of the Library.

Another "good friend," Barbara Thulander, taught an enthusiasiastically received course in "cut-and-pierced" lamp-

shade making at the Library in the autumn.

Our freshly-painted new look has been a pleasure - our imaginative displays have been even better! The same talented devotees; Honorary Trustee Diane Schott with Historian Eleanor Kiblin, and children's room specialist Betsy Wiederhold, also and Honorary Trustee; have assisted Joan and Connie upstairs and down in the creation of seasonal and topical decorations.

Seasonal decorations were most notable at Christmas when the Library and Historical Rooms again held a joint Open House in early December. A sizeable crowd enjoyed the holly and the ivy, the punch and the cookies, and the carols of the junior

choir.

You will earlier have noted frequent mention of Library "friends." So much of what we do is made possible by these enthusiasts - generous with their time, efforts, and donations. If space allowed, we would expressly thank each of you by name for each kindness, but, though the space <u>is</u> limited, our

gratitude is not.

While counting our blessings, let us note the Library year's most important one - the installation of Joan Hanchett as Librarian. Joan has mastered the job quickly and professionally and has shown great initiative as well. We are all most gratified, as we're sure you are, and confident that Inge is the most pleased of us all in the knowledge that the Library is in such good hands. Connie Varnum has, as always, worked

with dedication and devotion for the children, Volunteer Chairman Pat Cloutier has continued her prized assistance to

the Library.

Involvement and participation continue in State and regional Library programs that augment our own facilities. The Book-mobile still comes like Santa, and we purchase our own books at good discounts through a regional co-op.

Books are the point, after all - and thousands of <u>your</u> books are waiting for you at the Library. We look forward to seeing you there, checking them out.

WILLIAM USINGER DENISE LORANGER RICHARD LEAVITT Forest Fire Prevention: YOUR BUSINESS, OUR BUSINESS, GOOD BUSINESS. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

During the past year the V.F.D. answered these calls: 6 Structures, 5 Brush Fires, 24 Rescues, 9 Mutual Aid to other towns, 8 Chimney Fires, 9 Broken Power Lines, 1 False Alarm, 2 Vehicle Fires, 1 Smoke Investigation, 1 Fire Alarm Malfunction, 18 Stove & Chimney Inspections. The number of man-hours put in by the members of the Department were as follows: Fire & Rescue - 1330, Work Detail - 1070, Fire Drills - 204, Training School - 184,

CPR Training - 24.

The Fire Department wishes to extend its thanks to the residents for their support in the need for a new Fire Station. There is now room to house equipment which has been out of service through the winter months. As always, the Fire Dept. is grateful to all who contributed so generously during the Labor Day Drive. The money received is being used to finish the work on the new station. We plan to have our equipment in by the 10th of February, 1981. Much appreciation goes to Chairman Bill Fluhr and the building committee for the many hours spent upon the plans for the new station.

The 4500 gal. water tanker which had been on loan to the Fire Dept. by Robert Foote, has now been donated to the Fire Dept. and is in service. The Fire Prevention Program for the school children was in charge of Safety Officer Norman Stewart, with members of the Women's Auxiliary serving refreshments. The fire fighters wish to thank the Ladies for their gifts and continuing

The year 1980 represented quite a change in the Road Agent's position in many ways. We tried to operate in a manner which would give the most accurate reflection of where the money should be spent and where it was spent. More items were included under the heading of General Expenses for example, therefore making more money available within the maintenance part of the budget where it is badly needed. We also included in the summer part of the budget, graveling, that was done within the winter months because we felt that it is a summer maintenance item. In the past it has been categorized as a winter item only because it was done within the so-called winter months. Thus, this did not reflect a true picture of what was actually spent on the roads for real winter maintenance which is plowing, sanding, and salting.

The TRA money for this year was spent on the last leg of the

The TRA money for this year was spent on the last leg of the Turnpike from the Town Garage up to the Common. After much controversy, the road was excavated, adequate drainage put in; scarified, and the subgrade brought up; and finally the road was mixed-in-place. We sealed last year's TRA stretch and next year the stretch we did will be sealed. A different type of sand, called coarse sand, was used on all of our sealing projects. It is a very strong and uniform aggregate which proved to develop a good skid resistant-hard wearing surface. The coarse sand is also being used in mixing with the salt in the winter months to cut down consumption of salt and also for it's obvious value as a wearing surface. We used the Duncan Fund money and some funds from the Highway Subsidy for this project because of the extensive drainage costs. It is my opinion that the TRA should jump down to the lower section of the Turnpike by Morse's Bridge, in 1981 to continue the rebuilding process.

A new program of cutting back the shoulders and opening the ditches on the tar roads was instigated. It helped greatly, for it allows the water to roll off the tar and shoulders rather then sit at, and get under the edges and lift the pavement. We cleaned culverts through most of the Town and put up culvert markers.

We scraped three times and raked four times which seemed to

We scraped three times and raked four times which seemed to work well on the surfaces of the dirt roads. Ditching, and laying back of the ever-infringing sides of the road proved to be unsightly, but very necessary to insure proper drainage. A total of 220 feet of 18 inch culvert; 330 feet of 15 inch culvert; and 488 feet of 12 inch culvert was installed by us including TRA, Additional Highway Subsidy, and the Catch Basin Project in 1980.

Extensive shimming with cold patch was done on all tar roads, filling in the hollows and patching the rough places. In some places, rocks were dug out of the surface and then patch put in afterwards. A total of five miles of tar road was sealed including one mile of Red House Road, two miles of Quarry Road, one mile of the Mountain Road, one half mile of the Turnpike, and one half mile nick-in-place on the Turnpike; all using the coarse sand as the aggregate involved. This represents a little less than one third of our total tar roads and I strongly advise sealing a strong one third next year, before the price of tar and oil goes out of sight and the emulsified asphalt hits the scene.

A small amount of brush cutting was done and all the tar roads were mowed back with a cutter bar mower. Some of the worst

dirt roads were also mowed back.

We tried to help as many people as we could to get out of the never-ending mud saga. It seems foolish in 1980 to be wading through mud and ruts, carring bundles or children, in the dark possibly, to say nothing of the constant and increasing threat of fire and not being able to get the fire trucks to the scene because of mud. Spot-graveling was done wherever mud seemed to be in the Spring but it is never ending.

The Additional Subsidy money was spent on some constant

trouble areas and main arteries. The following were done:

We also did a number of special projects. The Town turnaround catch basin job was done by the highway department. Another project which we accomplished was the lengthening of the existing culvert at the entrance to the Tavern Farm Road and the paving of the beginning of this same road. This was a very narrow and hazardous spot so the State of New Hampshire recommended that we add to the culvert and pave the entrance to gain roadway width and they, in turn, installed guard rails at their cost. Also done by the highway department were two Sub-division allotments for road repair projects. We excavated, graveled and drained, .2 miles on Candlewood Hill for Kibrick's Subdivision; and graveled and ditched .3 miles on Journey's End Road for Noble's Sub-division.

For the Winter months we obtained an surplus military five ton truck which has become our main plow-sand truck. It is now outfitted with a plow and a rented-new sander which should become the Town's main-stay in combatting snow and ice. The Town really needs a sander of their own and will benefit greatly from it's presence.

To conclude, I have a few recommendations:

- 1. The abolishment of the 55-45 summer & winter method of alloting of the funds except for summer-winter classification of labor which could stay under this method
- 2. The better use of the General Expenses part of the budget, thus increasing the funds from the Highway Maintenance Budget that can be spent on the roads, where you will see the direct results.
- 3. A separate (from the Maintenance Budget) amount of money appropriated each year to be spent only on the sealing of the black-top roads. Therefore we will be quaranteed that some roads will get sealed each year before we lose them all and have to reconstruct totally.
- 4. A special fund to be set up within the Road Agent's budget that allows him to purchase used equipment, rent equipment, or purchase new equipment for the Towns' use without waiting for

Town Meeting. The Amount of the Fund would be up to Ten Thousand Dollars.

They say this job is a "thankless" one, but it doesn't need to be if more people would have some understanding of other's feelings and of the job that the Road Agent must do so that everyone can drive on our roads.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

In 1980, the Police Department added Brian Leavitt to the force. He has been a welcome addition to the department.

Also this past year, the five officers and myself attended the New Hampshire Standards and Training Council's Part Time Officer Course held in Goffstown. We all passed with above average grades and are now cerified police officers. It is now mandatory that all police officers in New Hampshire be certified by January 1, 1982, by state law.

In 1980, the department handled more calls than any year on record. Our in-coming phone calls were up by 30%, our response calls were up by 25%. With the addition of pagers, we are more readily available for calls. I was paged over 750 times and the other officers were paged over 200 times combined.

The Department made more motor vehicle arrests than any year in the past, and twice the DWI arrests of any previous year. Investigations for breaking and entering, and theft of building materials were up this year, but with the help of Officer Jones' pictures and some help form the State Police, we have solved all but 3 breaks. Arrests for crimes other than motor vehicle related, were up by more than 50% over any other year.

Because of the increase in calls and the increase patrol time, the department overspent its budget by a large sum, due mostly to gas for the cruiser and labor for myself and the officers. I think the record shows there is a need for more patrols and so I am asking for a budget for 1981 of \$20,500.00. We spent almost that this year but we had some expenses for Officer Leavitt that are one-shot deals. The money we spent last year on him should offset inflation so we should be set with that amount.

I hope the department has lived up to everyone's expectations. We all have tried our best. I would like to also remind everyone to be sure and use the 547-6620 number. With the addition of

pagers it is more important than ever.

The reasons for this increase in per capita assessment follow:

- Increased demand for services; number of visits rose 19% over last year.
- 2. Increased numbers of children from all towns registered for our well child clinics; numbers have increased from 51 to 118, 131% and we have a waiting list. Our goal is to care for needy children who would not otherwise have well child care. Federal grant funds terminate 6/30/81.
- Coverage for weekens appears to be necessary. Nurses are making necessary visits on weekends without reimbursement in money or time.
- 4. Grant for homemaker/home health aide services expires March 31, 1981. Grant money will be severely curtailed next year. This service enables elderly patients to remain at home and still receive indispensable health care in the least costly and most satisfactory way.

Dear Selectmen:

Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service requests your support for the continuation of our Peterborough District office. During the past year, the agency has expanded its services in outlying areas and has been able to offer improved services to special groups, such as the elderly and children. This makes it increasingly important that we maintain support from all local sources. We hope that your support will continue.

We are aware that local towns face on-going budgeting problems, therefore we are not increasing our request for support. For the seventh year we are using the base formula of 50¢ per capita. This will be based on population figures from the 1980 census. For the town of Francestown the amount is \$412.50. Last year approximately 14 people from Francestown were served by the mental health center.

Financing from towns in your area is used to support the Peterborough District office. During the past year, that office provided direct service to over 690 people.

In addition to the District Office program, many other services are available to your residents. They include 24-hour emergency service, day treatment and in-patient service provided in cooperation with Cheshire Hospital, specialized service to the elderly, youth and patients returning from long term hospitalization, as well as consultation and education servies. These services are primarily supported with state and federal monies which, combined with local support and fees, make it possible for the agency to provide comprehensive mental health services to southwestern New Hampshire.

We have enclosed additional information about Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. Please do not hesitate to contact us if you have any questions.

WASTE DISPOSAL AND RECYCLING COMMISSION

Again the recycling operation at the Town Dump was not profitable from an income producing viewpoint. We shipped out 10.63 tons of newspaper and 15 tons of glass for which we recieved \$369. Expenses for removal of recyclable material were \$138. Had the materials been shipped to our landfill operation, estimated cost for extra container pick-ups would be more than \$500.

Transportation of non-recycled materials to our landfill in Bennington is still the most costly operation, with a 12½% increase in costs for 1981. Several towns in the area are using large compactors at dump areas, requiring fewer pickups yearly. Estimated trucking of compacted waste to the landfill would cost \$3,750 yearly versus \$7,000 under the present method with the 1981 price increase included. The compactor rental for one year is \$6,500 and we will have to provide a solid concrete slab plus electricity. We are currently exploring with the Selectmen the

best way for Francestown to go.

As the market for recyclable materials fluctuates almost weekly, we may have to change our method of collecting bottles, paper, and cardboard. Our bottle bins are not large enough for ease of unloading into transfer containers and the volume is insufficient as of now to make our returns profitable. The storage of paper and cardboard is inadequate and because we must bundle newspaper and cardboard by hand, we can't realize the true scrap value that hydraulically compressed paper would bring. A hydraulic baler would allow us to move the material more quickly off the ground and into more profitable bundles.

We hope that more people will become interested in recycling on a voluntary basis, so that our volume will become more practical to collect. At the risk of being repetative, we ask that all newspapers and magazines be tied in convenient bundles, that cardboard boxes be knocked down into flat pieces, and that bottles be separated into three major colors- white, brown, & green. This will save Bill Grube time in placing them in the proper containers and avoid paper blowing all over the dump area. This is a voluntary effort on your part, but to improve our operation it might have to be made compulsory.

Connie and Leighton Bicknell have left Francestown and I wish to express my appreciation to them for their many years as members of our Waste Disposal Committee and their interest and effort toward our recycling operation. I sincerely hope we can continue and expand this method of energy saving and resources

recovery.

FRANCESTOWN HIGHWAY SAFETY COMMITTEE

The Committee hopes you will take the time to read this report. We welcome and will consider any suggestions made by the motoring public concerning ways to improve conditions along our

village highways.

Early in 1980 the Committee began an energetic drive to correct the hazardous condition that existed on Route 47 at the exit to Tory Pines. The culvert under the highway was extended, affording a wider entrance into School House Road. Substantial guard rails were erected on either side, making the entrance much safer and also more attractive than the old entrance. We have worked on this project for the past 2 years.

The Committee makes periodic checks on existing traffic con-

trol signs and frequently replaces or install new ones.

We are suggesting the installation of 2 Cattle Crossing Signs on Mountain Road at Kenyon Farm.

SIGNS: How many and where? We receive requests for signs, many of which, we consider unnecessary. Most requests seem to come after an accident. For example, after a recent icy spell, an accident occurred on the S shaped hilly curve on Route 136, just west of the old Foote farm. We received several requests for additional warning signs in this area. When icy, this section of highway is dangerous and several accidents have occurred there. This area is clearly marked with the standard S shaped signs. The best way to avoid an accident in that area is to be alert and reduce speed. Additional signs will not help much if the driver of a car is unwilling to change his driving techniques to fit the conditions of the road.

The following paragraphs are taken from page 23 of the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices published by the State of

New Hampshire, Dept. of Public Works and Highways.

UNWARRANTED SIGNS:

Often state and local agencies are requested to solve insolvable "traffic problems" by the erection of highway signs. Good examples are the SLOW CHILDREN and BLIND DRIVEWAY signs. Neither of these are manufactured or used by the $\overline{\rm N.H.}$ Department of Public Works & Highways. Most agencies will not erect these signs. It is not that these agencies are insensible to the safety of

children or driveway users. On the contrary it is the result of these concerns. These signs are ineffective as a warning to the driver and gives the parent or driver a false sense of security. They, in essence, are "sugar pills" which may pacify the user but do not treat the "disease."

They, in essence, are "sugar pills" which may pacify the user but do not treat the "disease."

In the case of the CHILDREN sign, if it was adopted for general use, a sign would be required at EVERY location where children might be present and the absence of the sign would indicate the absence of children. This, at first glance, may appear farfetched but rigidly and FAIRLY applied it would create a proliferation of signs that would be monumental. This would be detrimental to the effectiveness of the whole system.

In essence, a little "worry" on the part of parent and driver

is the best defense available.

As of December 19, 1980, there were 186 fatalities and 8405 injuries. According to N.H. Highway Safety Agency statistics, 50.5% of all N.H. Highway deaths were alcohol related in 1979. This was an increase of 2% over 1978. These are frightening statistics.

Vincent L. Tofany, President of the National Safety Council said that by motivating people to be safer drivers, the present driver error factor of 80% of all traffic accidents can be

reduced.

Your Safety Committee hopes that every citizen who operates a car will become a better and safer driver.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Following the 1980 Annual Town Meeting, the Planning Board met March 18, 1980 to reorganize the Board following the election of two new members, Lois Leavitt and Richard Mikula. Cutter became the Selectman ex officio member. Joseph Ludwig was elected Board Chairman and Charles Onasch was elected Secretary.

Also, at this meeting, the Board decided to have two alternate members. Willis Fluhr and Herbert Benedict were nominated as Alternates. Benedict declined to serve.

The Planning Board presented proposed Site Plan Review regulations at a Public Hearing May 9, 1980 and adopted them, with changes at the May 20, 1980 regular meeting.

In June of 1980, a new edition of the Francestown Zoning Ordinances and Subdivision Regulations was published which incorporated, in a single volume, all changes and revisions

that had been made to this date.

At the June 27, 1980 meeting, Bart Hardwick submitted his resignation as a member of the Board. It was accepted with regret and the Chairman directed that a letter of appreciation be sent to Bart thanking him for his dedicated service to the Board and the Town. Willis Fluhr was appointed by the Board to

fill this vacancy until the next Town Meeting.
A Public Hearing was held July 15, 1980 for the removal of trees along a section of the Turnpike in the vicinity of the Post Office to allow for the reconstruction of the road and culverts. Since the Turnpike is designated as a scenic road, this hearing was necessary. The Planning Board voted approval for this work because of pedestrian safety and safe auto travel considerations.

At the August 5, 1980 regular meeting, the Board voted to appoint Janet Munson as an alternate. She will serve with

John Oppenhimer in this capacity.

The Master Plan Committee presented the final draft of the proposed Master Plan to the Planning Board at the January 20,1980 meeting. The Board will study this lengthy document and meet with the Master Plan Committee to review and dicuss the Committee's recomendations and to finalize the Master Plan so it may be presented to the Town at a public Meeting. The Planning Board thanks Bill Hansen, Chairman and all those who have participated in the development of the proposed Plan for all the many hours they gave so willingly and for their spirit and cooperation.

Since the 1980 Town Meeting, the Planning Board has held 26 regular meeting, exclusive of public hearings, and has approved six subdivisions creating 15 new lots and granted one excavation

permit for a gravel pit.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

A Committee appointed to study the feasability of consolidating Town Offices in one building or location

To the Town of Francestown:

Meetings were held with interested Town Officers to ascertain the need for a central Town Offices Building or location. Plans dating back to the 1960's delineating Town Offices in the basement of the Town Hall, inspection of the cellar area and discussion with Bill Fluhr, who chaired the committee empowered with the dual role of the new fire station and Town Offices location the previous year, resulted in our discarding the idea of expansion within the Town Hall as a viable solution to the The availability of the old fire station, its location, size, adaptability to these needs and relatively easy conversion to another use has convinced us that, if Town Offices should be centralized, it (the old fire station) is the answer. We visited the New Boston Offices at the suggestion of the Town Clerk and Tax Collector. They felt that the conversion of the old fire station in that town was what Francestown ought to consider as an ideal layout or floor plan. Robert Caskie is currently working up some drawings which will enable us to abstract estimates on conversion costs.

Thus far the Committee has formulated the following recommendations:

1. Ultimate use and conversion of two bays into Town Clerk and Tax Collector's Office, Selectmen's Office & meeting room, bookeeping room with central records storage.

2. Preservation of the Bradbury Room essentially for what it is currently used for, i.e., Planning Board, Board of Adjustment and other Town meetings.

3. Alteration of the front of the building so that it blends in with the traditional architectural style of the village district.

4. The third bay (the extreme right) could be retained for expansion or put to other Town use. Chief Flood has indicated an interest in this area for Police Department purposes.

We will have more detailed recommendations for resolution by the Town meeting in 1982. Meanwhile we are suggesting that the Selectmen use their discretion in allowing temporary use of the vacated area.

One of our first activities involved a public information meeting during which reports were given on; hazardous waste dumping in New England, the cause and results of acid rain, the affects on New Hampshire of a decrease in patable water supplies in Massachusetts and various

other topics.

Shortly after the informational meeting came the annual Town Meeting. The Conservation Commission had sponsored two bills. One bill, to prevent the storage and/or disposal of hazardous waste in the Town of Francestown, passed easily. The second, which attempting to obtain Town monies for a biannual testing for harmful bacteria and phosphorus in the great ponds in Town, was narrowly defeated. But, feeling the importance of this testing none the less, the Conservation Commission has decided to make available some of its own funds to support this testing over the next few years.

The spring, summer and fall months were filled with the normal share of dredge and fill permits, Town forest, scenic road and wetland monitoring as well as assistance to the Recreation Committee for the Library in a pond education day

for area children.

With winter came the completion of a long but worth while project that the Conservation Commission has been involved with for several years, the Francestown Master Plan. The Conservation Commission still has \$1,000.00 Dollars pledge to be used by the Master Plan Committee for this worthwhile venture.

We would like to thank the Town for its continuing support and invite you all to become involved in matters of environmental conservation and direction in the Town.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

This has been a year for meetings! The Town Meeting in March was adjourned until June and then a Special Meeting was called

in August.

The Master Plan Committee heard plans for future development of the ski area and golf course at public meetings attended by a large crowd of enthusiastic townspeople to whom the heavy commercial development of the town was obviously unpopular.

Mrs. Ingie Anderson retired after 18 years as our librarian.

Her duties have been taken over by Joan Hanchett.

Oak Hill Grange honored Dr. Louis Wiederhold for his years of

service to the community.

Nathan and Natalie Sanderson celebrated the opening of their 13th season at Kingsbury Hill Riding Camp with an Open House and Reunion in June.

The Historical Rooms were closed during the winter and spring for redecoration, new lighting and improved display areas. One of the rooms includes stenciling done by Mary Flippo of New Boston using Moses Eaton patterns, many of which may be found in the older houses in town. This was a project of the Improvement & Historical Society.

New lights were installed in front of the Old Meeting House and shrubs planted. About 1,000 spring bulbs have been planted

on the common and on the F.H. Colburn Park.

Rehabilitation of the Little League Ballfield was begun. New base paths and pitchers mound and drainage improvements in the outfield were done by Kris Stewart and "friends." On November 15, the field was dedicated to John Underhill, resident, friend and benefactor. It will now be known as Underhill Field.

Money was set aside by the Society for resurfacing of the tennis courts. Money for all these projects is provided by the annual Labor Day celebration. Theme of our 63rd parade was

A new Francestown Cookbook was published by the Women's Guild of the Community Church . It made its appearance at the annual May International luncheon. It contains the favorite recipes of Francestown friends.

John Maes gave his resignation as minister of the Community Church after four years of service which terminated in October.

The summer concert series of Monadnock Music continues to radiate from the home of its director James Bolle, with two concerts at the Community Church included in their schedule. Monadnock Music is now 15 years old. Mr. Bolle more recently organized the New Hampshire Symphony Orchestra which he also conducts.

Old County Road South Historic District has been listed in the National Register of Historic Places in Washington, D.C. This small area, which contains 9 houses of historic significance includes Old County Road South from the ballfield to Kunhardt's, Birdsall Road from Old County Road to John Taylor's and Pratt Road.
