## TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenfield, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Greenfield on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at 7:30 P. M. to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Art. 3. To choose a Highway Agent for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To hear reports of Selectmen, Highway Agent, Treasurer, Overseer of the Poor, Library Trustees, and other officials, and take any action relative thereto.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of highways and bridges, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and Appropriate for snow removal, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of Public Library, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85.00 for Memorial Day, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money to pay Town debts, or take any action relative thereto. Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.00 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$546.02 for Class V Roads. The State will contribute \$3,640.16, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Town Poor, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote a discount of 2% on tax bills 30 days from date of tax bills, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Blister Rust control in cooperation with the Forestry and Recreation Commission, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, and transfer the Zephyr Lake Beach appropriation of \$200.00 to a fund for the development of a Recreation area located at Otter Lake, or take any action relative thereto. (Explanation) The sum of \$200 if transferred will be matched with a sum of \$400.00 by the Greenfield Improvement Association. This fund will be placed with the existing War Memorial Fund of \$600.00 to establish and operate a living Memorial Recreation area on present Town lands at Otter Lake.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to oil East Road and Mill Road, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 to paint and make minor repairs on the Tractor building, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 yearly salary for the Fire Chief, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for purchasing and installing emergency lights for Town Hall, or take any action relative thereto. Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for repairs and building new Fire Wells, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for replacing wooden bridges with either cement or metal tiling or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to oil the East Road and continue the black top, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 23. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for chairs ordered in 1953, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 25. To transact any other business that can legally come before this meeting.

Re: Annual Audit of Town Accounts for Calendar Year, 1953. The annual Community Day was held May 9. Projects included foundation planting of the town house, cleaning up the common, levelling and laying drain tile on the school playground, and the edging of sidewalks. The school playground project required a second day's work.

The Greenfield Improvement Association received first prize (\$100.00) in the New Hampshire Roadside Improvement Contest.

Real estate transactions: Hidaway Farm from Frank Rogers to E. Russell Davis; Greenfield Inn ("Long Block") from the Peterborough Cooperative Bank to the Greenfield Industries; Larry Flynn farm to Kenneth Cragin, Jr.; Charles Wheeler (McQuade farm) to Mrs. Hazel Prewitt; Harold Grant building (formerly owned by Mrs. Nellie Schofield) to Thomas Coughlin; the house of David Robertson on the Hancock Road to Walter Creighton, Jr.

The Greenfield Industries moved their work shop from the Carbee farm on East Road to the center of the town, in the "Long Block."

Buildings razed were the house on Parker Hill Road, property of E. H. Mather and one of the town's oldest buildings; the barn of Chester Russell formerly the property of the old Mayfield House. The Mayfield House burned in 1896.

A fire occurred on the second floor of the school house on March 2 due to a defective chimney; the damage was \$700.00.

A group of eight Brownies was organized in January under the leadership of Mrs. Edythe Atherton and Mrs Hazel Cary.

Sheridan Sullivan enlisted in the Marines. Francis Magoon, Jr., was honorably discharged from the Army. Lt. j.g. Francis X. Quinlan completed his tour of active duty in the U. S. Navy and is now assigned to inactive duty in the U. S. Naval Reserves.

The Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center opened February 1. On December 1, 1953 there were 25 patients.

New houses were built by Gunnar Petersen and Robert Murray. Two new apartments were finished on the second floor of the building occupied by Hopkins Bros. & Belcher store.

Wells were drilled by Lincoln Fitts, depth of 210 feet; Gunnar Petersen, depth of 117; Greenfield Industries depth of 208; Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center, depth of 307; and Elwood S. Whitcomb, depth of 148 feet.

Jarvis Adams sold his milk route on January 20, after operating it approximately 20 years. Mrs. Florence Adams resigned as teacher and principal on the 20th of May after ten years of faithful and appreciated service to the community.

The Greenfield Baseball team placed first in the Crotched Mountain League, in which there are eight teams.

The Little League Baseball Team was runner up in the finals. Members of the Greenfield Squad were William Bailey, Maurice Belmore, William Blaha, Randall Borland, Monte Brooks, Robert Boudrieau, David Flynn, Dennis Flynn, Russell Holt, Peter Hopkins, Peter Luitwieler, Lester Rich, Bruce Russell, Dale Russell, Robert Russell, George Shea, Jr., Michael Sullivan, Jr., Richard Sullivan, and Randall Sullivan.

The Town purchased a new fire truck and sold the old pumper.

Town organizations: Greenfield Improvement Association, present adult membership 136; The Fire Department, 28 members; The Grange, 66 members; the Woman's Club, 74 members; the Stitch and Chatter Group, 25 members; the Sportsmen's Club, 125 members.

The Parent-Teachers Club with a membership of 25 purchased a deep freeze for the school lunch program, had a telephone installed in the school, and purchased a duplicating machine.

The activities of the Sportsmen's Club included the planting of 5000 pines (which were furnished by the State) toward the reforestation of the George Proctor Recreational Area, and the building of a rifle range for children.

There are 261 names on the check list.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. 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#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenfield:

I respectfully submit my seventh annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

#### INSTRUCTION

We were exceedingly sorry to lose the services of Mrs. Florence Adams this past year, due to illness. Mrs. Adams served the children and parents well as teacher and principal of the Greenfield School. However, we were very fortunate in obtaining an experienced teacher in the person of Mrs. Isabelle Vezina, to assume the teaching responsibilities in the Primary Room. Mrs. Vezina is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and formerly taught in Milford, N. H. Mr. Fred Wilkinson assumed the duties of Principal of the building and has done an exceptionally fine piece of work, in this capacity.

The large number of pupils in the Primary Room this year made it necessary to split the third grade so as to relieve the teaching load in this room. Consequently, Mr. Wilkinson's Room contained part of Grade 3 and all of grades 4, 5 and 6, making the room totals as follows: Mrs. Vezina Grade 1, 2 and part of 3 for a total of 27 and Mr. Wilkinson having 23. At this writing all of grade three is presently housed in Mr. Wilkinson's room.

Much emphasis has been placed upon the development of good reading habits in all grades. The public library has been most cooperative in assisting us in providing good literature for our pupils. Proper attention is being given to the development of the fundamentals without losing sight of the needs of individual pupils and the development of social values that are an integral part of a good educational program.

The teachers are eager to discuss in detail with parents any area of the educational program offered at the Greenfield School. It is recommended that parents avail themselves of every opportunity to learn how the reading program is developed through the grades; how penmanship and spelling are taught; what makes a good arithmetic program and how our English and language program is developed and integrated with the social studies. This information can be much better obtained by discussion and conference, than by means of a written report.

I feel we are fortunate and honored to have Keene Teachers College petition us to permit a cadet teacher to train in our school. Mr. Robert Shea, Senior at Keene Teachers College in the elementary field will be working with, and training under, the supervision of Mr. Wilkinson until April 9th, at which time he will transfer to Wilton to complete his training in the Junior High School. Miss Ethelyn Edwards, music instructor and supervisor, is continuing to develop, with the assistance of the teachers, a music program for our children that is both informative and enjoyable. The music program in the primary room consists of the development of the singing voice, the feeling for beautiful music and the joy of singing beautiful songs. This is done through the use of a basic text, supplemented by seasonal songs, rhythms, singing games, folk dancing and the use of the rhythm instruments. As much time as possible is devoted in helping the individuals to develop a properly placed singing voice.

In the Upper Room we continue the singing course with emphasis upon two-part singing. The basic music facts are taught with some syllable reading and some folk dancing. The song flutes have proven popular and have assisted greatly in developing in the child an ability to read notes.

Through lack of time and adequate equipment such as a record player and record library, we are not developing the appreciation for good music that we should. Perhaps this could be a project for some interested group.

#### HEALTH SUPERVISION

The health of our school children is constantly being supervised by our School Nurse, Mrs. Florence Merchant. She is a willing worker and provides many services beyond the actual requirements of her position. The annual physical examinations by Dr. Fredrika Moore, has been of great help in revealing to parents, conditions about which they were not aware and providing the teachers with information that is helpful to their understanding of the work that we are trying to do in this area. For the details of Mrs. Merchant's work I refer you to the School Nurse Report.

#### SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Mrs. Paula Wirtz is continuing her fine work in providing meals for our children. Mrs. Ruth Russell is maintaining the books for the program.

We are exceedingly grateful for the splendid help financially and morally, that the Parent Teachers Club has extended to this program. Much equipment has been purchased through activities that they have sponsored. Their interest in school affairs has not been confined to this program but has resulted in the purchase of a liquid process duplicating machine and the installation of a telephone. Both have been a service to the community as well as to the school.

#### BUILDING AND GROUNDS

The School Board with the cooperation of the Community Improvement Society has accomplished a great deal with respect to the playground area. All who have helped with the "work bees" are to be commended for their cooperative spirit and fine work.

The major task facing the School Board this next year is one of providing much needed repairs to the school building. We have had a serious sill condition for several years and the time has come when something should be done about it. The sill is particularly bad on the side of the building adjacent to the playground. This side of the building is dropping and is slowly pulling the walls of the boys' basement area away from the ceiling and outer walls.

Another part of the building that has been neglected for years is the roof over the right entrance to the building. This is rapidly becoming a safety hazard.

The hallway entrance to the auditorium is badly in need of redecorating. It is much more noticeable since the repairs, made necessary by the fire, have been completed.

A serious icing condition, on the steps to the left entrance of the building during the winter months, presents a hazard that could be responsible for a serious injury to one not familiar with the conditions. Proper installation of roof drains in this area would do much toward eliminating this condition.

To take care of all or a few of the above, the School Board is requesting the voters to consider taking some action on Article 10.

#### FINANCE

The School Board's Budget for the school year 1954-55, calls for an appropriation of \$25,504.47, an increase of \$1,564.57 over last year's appropriation. The largest increase is in the area of tuitions, which amounts to \$1,545. The increases noted in the areas of teachers' salaries, retirement and transportation, are largely balanced out by decreases in payments on district indebtedness and capital outlay.

I wish to again extend my appreciation to the Greenfield School Board, the parents and interested friends of the school, for their cooperation.
