MINUTES OF 1961 TOWN MEETING

Hampton Falls Town Meeting was called to order at 3 o'clock by the Moderator Russell Merrill, Jr. who read the warrant. Ballots were counted and 595 were found to be the number to be used. Polls were declared open.

Meeting was called to order at 7:30 with the salute to the flag. As the warrant had been read in its entirety at 3 o'clock it was not read again.

Moderator ruled "Once an article taken up in the Budget or Warrant is finished, no further action may be taken on it, with the exception of one reconsideration, in case of error or misunderstanding." Also a limit of two amendments to any article.

ARTICLE 2. Motion was made by Edward Pevear, Seconded by George Vigneau, the sum of \$2,000.00 be raised and appropriated for Town Officers Salaries. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, Seconded by George Pond, the sum of \$1,200.00 be raised and appropriated for Town Officers Expenses. Carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by Winthrop Story to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for Election and Registration Expenses. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Donald Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Expense of Town Hall and Other Town Buildings. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond. Seconded by Russell Merrill, Sr. to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65.00 for Employees' Retirement and Social Security. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Clara Brown, the sum of \$400.00 be raised and appropriated for Police Department. Motion was made

by George Pond, Seconded by Donald Janvrin to amend the motion by substituting the sum of \$700.00 in place of \$400.00. Motion by Russell Merrill, Sr., Seconded by George Pond to vote by "yes or no" ballot. Carried. 28 no, 32 yes. Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to vote on the motion as amended by "yes or no" ballot. Carried 40 no. 28 yes. Motion did not carry. Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Police Department. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Edward Pevear to pass over Fire Department and Care of Trees until taken up in Warrant. Carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire, Seconded by Cynthia Trumbull to raise and appropriate the sum of \$675.00 for Insurance. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Damages and Legal Expenses. Carried.

Brush Removal was passed over to be taken up under Article 12 in the Warrant.

Motion was made by Edward Bond, Seconded by Gordon Janvrin the sum of \$20.00 be raised and appropriated for Health Department. Carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 for Vital Statistics. Carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire, Seconded by Arnold Rasmussen the sum of \$130.00 be raised and appropriated for Traffic Beacon Lights. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire, the sum of \$700.00 be raised and appropriated for Town Dump and Garbage Removal. Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Edward Pevear, to amend the motion by striking out the

words "and Garbage Removal" Carried. Motion as amended carried.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Town Maintenance, Summer. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Town Maintenance, Winter. Motion was made by John Starvish, Seconded by Harold Bowley to amend the motion by striking the figure \$3,000.00 and inserting \$2,000.00. Motion to amend was withdrawn by Mr. Starvish and Mr. Bowley. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire, Seconded by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for Street Lighting. Carried.

Motion was made by George Merrill, Seconded by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Tarvia. Mr. James Thurlow assumed the position of Moderator and Russell Merrill Jr. explained the surplus last year was due mainly to early frost. Motion carried.

Mr. George Vigneau requested a vote of the meeting as to whether or not the Library should continue to be open Tuesday nights, through the school year. It was so voted. Mr. Vigneau made the motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for Libraries, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire, Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Donald Janvrin the sum of \$500.00 be raised and appropriated for Town Poor. This motion was withdrawn by Mr. Pond and Mr. Janvrin. Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Town Poor. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Donald Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Old Age Assistance. Carried.

Motion was made by Edward Pevear, Seconded by

Donald Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165.00 for Memorial Day and Veteran's Association. Carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire, Seconded by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Parks and Playgrounds. Carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Interest on Temporary Loans. Carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Edward Pevear to raise and appropriate the sum of \$265.00 for Cemeteries. Carried.

Advertising and Regional Association to be taken up in the Warrant.

Motion was made by Edward Pevear, Seconded by Donald Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the Care of the Town Clock. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Donald Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for County Taxes. Carried.

ARTICLE 3. Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate \$264.80 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$1,765.32. Carried.

ARTICLE 4. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to adopt the article as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 5. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Louis Janvrin to adopt the article as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 6. Motion was made by Russell Merrill, Sr., Seconded by John Starvish to postpone this article indefinitely. Motion did not carry. Motion was made Mark Kelly, Seconded by Emmons Sanborn to adopt the article as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 7. Motion was made by Mark Kelly,

Seconded by George Pond to adopt the article as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 8. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by George Pond to adopt this article. Motion by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Louis Janvrin the voting on this article be at an adjourned meeting, May 9, at 7:30 p.m. that an interim committee of nine members be appointed by the Moderator to study the proposal and present the results at the meeting. Carried.

ARTICLE 9. Motion was made by Cynthia Trumbull, Seconded by Robert Weaver to pass over this article. Carried Motion was made by Edward Bond, Seconded by Carolyn Brown the polls be closed at 10:20. Carried.

ARTICLE 10. Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Andrew Melville to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the improvement of Brown's Lane. Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Edward Pevear to amend the motion to include "the road be improved if width 10 feet of land is given by all owners to extend the full length of road" Carried. Motion as amended carried.

ARTICLE 11. Motion was made by Edward Pevear, Seconded by Cynthia Trumbull to pass over this article. Did not carry. Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Emmons Sanborn to adopt this article as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 12. Motion was made by Cynthia Trumbull, Seconded by Arthur Huddell to adopt this article as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 13. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn to amend the article by striking the word "Control" and inserting the word "removal" and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 toward the removal of infected trees. Seconded by Harold Bowley. Carried.

ARTICLE 14. Motion was made by Louis Janvrin to amend this article to include "Auditor receiving the

largest number of votes in 1962 be elected for three years, next highest number of votes for two years and the lowest number of votes for one year and to adopt as amended. Seconded by G. Winthrop Story. Motion as amended carried.

At this time Governor Powell entered the hall with members of his Council whom he introduced.

ARTICLE 15. Motion was made by George Merrill, Seconded by Edward Pevear to adopt the article as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 16. Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, Seconded by George Merrill to amend the article to read as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 to reconstruct Andrew's Bridge on Kensington Road. The State to contribute 75% to cover the estimated cost. Payable \$1665.00 this year Borrow \$5,500.00. Payable \$1,500.00 a year for three years and interest, and \$1,000.00 the last year and interest. Amendment carried.

Motion was made by Russell Merrill, Sr., Seconded by Edward Pevear to adopt the article as amended. Carried.

ARTICLE 17. Motion was made by Gordon, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to adopt as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 18. Motion made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Edward Pevear to adopt as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 19. Motion was made by Cynthia Trumbull, Seconded by Jeanie Edgerly that Arthur and Jeannie Huddell be nominated for the office of Hog Reeves for the ensuing year. Carried. Nominations were declared closed. Clerk cast one ballot for Arthur and Jeanie Huddell and they were declared elected and took the oath of office in open meeting.

and that an interim committee of nine (9) members be appointed by the Moderator to study the proposal and present the results at the meeting.

The Interim Committee appointed by the Moderator: Marjorie Davies, Chairman, Robert Walker, Arthur Huddell, Jr., Alphonse Lemire, Rosemary Bohm, John Shillaber, Gordon Janvrin, Pearl Marston, George Rollins.

The method of action presenting Article 8 in the Warrant was questioned and after much discussion the Moderator ruled the Selectmen have the right to insert any article in the Warrant not prohibited by law.

Arthur Huddell, Jr. read the Budget Law. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Edward Pevear, further consideration on this article be postponed indefinitely. Motion and second withdrawn.

The Committee answered all questions on the article before the voting. Voting was unanimous against the adoption of Article 8.

Motion made by Alphonse Lemire, Seconded by George Rollins to dissolve the meeting at 8:50 P.M. Carried.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at three of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$263.39 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$1,755.93.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,884.94 in payment for services to the Town by the Hampton Falls Volunteer Fire Department. Signed by twelve legal voters.

5. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following Amendment to the Building Regulations as Authorized by RSA: 156, by adding the following:

Section V.

1. **OCCUPANCY.** A building may not be used for dwelling purposes until the building permit has been signed by both the Building Inspector and the Health Officer certifying that the construction has been completed in accordance with the building and health regulations of the Town.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 to cover the cost of printing a

pamphlet containing the Zoning Ordinance, Building Regulations and Sub-division Regulations.

7. To raise and appropriate, for economic advancement of the Town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in co-operation with other communities, the sum of \$160.00.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Brush and/or Poison Ivy removal.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 toward removal of infected trees.

10. To see if the Town wishes to continue to rescind the Social Security Plan as adopted in the 1956 Town Meeting.

11. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell any property acquired by tax sale.

12. To see if the Town will vote the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the Town will vote to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Polls will not close before Eight O'clock P.M.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To: School Board Members and Citizens
of Supervisory Union No. 21

The writer, in this, his first report to citizens of Supervisory Union No. 21 is providing information about this Union with the hope that it will be of interest to citizens and add generally to the understanding of educational organization within our state.

There are seven elementary school districts and one Cooperative School District in this Supervisory Union.

In September of 1961 there were 2,688 elementary pupils in grades 1-8 inclusive in the towns of Hampton, Hampton Falls, New Castle, North Hampton, Rye, Seabrook, and South Hampton and 661 secondary students attending Winnacunnet High School, Cooperative School District No. 6, from the towns of Hampton, Hampton Falls, North Hampton, and Seabrook. It is of interest to note that the total of 3,349 pupils exceeds the total population of each of the several towns within the union except Hampton.

The organization of school districts into supervisory unions is required by action of the State Legislature to provide educational supervision and to ensure compliance with State Laws. The statutes require school board members within a supervisory union to meet between April 1 and June 1, annually, to choose a chairman, secretary, and treasurer of the supervisory union. Also at this meeting the joint board nominates a superintendent, if a vacancy exists, determines the superintendent's salary, and conducts such other business as may be necessary.

Before January 1 the supervisory union board adopts a budget for the next fiscal year, which budget includes

items necessary for the operation of the union. The budget is apportioned to the several participating districts according to a formula prescribed in the statutes. Each district is required to raise the apportioned amount at the next annual meeting of the district.

Supervisory Union No. 21 provides supervisory and administrative services for 178 professional staff members, 14 secretaries, 18 custodians, and 20 cafeteria workers. Bookkeeping services are provided for transactions amounting to \$1,791,126.00 as budgeted for the 1961-1962 school year.

The staff of your supervisory union office includes: a teacher consultant, an executive assistant to the superintendent, a bookkeeper and two secretaries. This staff is exceptionally competent, and indeed it must be to provide the administrative services required for a union of this size.

Miss Leota R. Whitcomb, Teacher Consultant of Supervisory Union No. 21 is a very able person. Her responsibilities are principally educational in nature. She works with individual teachers to improve instruction at the elementary level and assists the superintendent in many matters of educational significance. Curriculum (what we teach) and instruction (how we teach) are constant concerns of any school system. The why, when, where, and who also come under scrutiny, but the first two—content and method—are more subject to change as well as subject to demands for change by splinter groups. If change is to result in better education there must be a study of all factors involved.

During the school year 1960-61 a science curriculum guide for grades 7, 8, and 9 was completed and an arithmetic guide for grades 1 through 6 entered the final editing stage. Both of these projects, begun under the leadership of Superintendent of Schools, C. M. Green, were carried on over a two-year period by committees

of teachers, working with Teacher Consultant Whitcomb, and members of the State Department of Education. Each curriculum guide represents a thorough study of methods, materials, subject matter, and research, and each guide attempts to present the best thinking of those participating in the study.

It is a function of the supervisory union office to encourage study which will promote change and improvement in our curriculum, but to the committee of teachers who devoted much outside time and effort to this work much credit is due.

Because of these many changes in curriculum and instruction, it is important that we keep abreast of the best educational thinking. To this end the Teacher Consultant participates in many meetings, both within and without the Union. She frequently arranges for meetings of various staff groups, sometimes to share ideas within the group and sometimes to bring in new ideas. Many consultants have been invited to our schools in the past year—reading specialists, consultants in mathematics, science, foreign languages, guidance, testing, and others.

Through courses arranged by the Union Office, teachers have had opportunities to learn more about elementary school science, social studies, and mathematics, and about guidance, team learning, and audio-visual aids. With a large number of teachers enrolling in these courses our school system keeps alert and informed of latest methods and materials, and choosing the best from these, better education is offered to the boys and girls.

Miss Edith Hammond has served this union as Executive Assistant to the Superintendent for eight years. School Board members are well acquainted with the high quality of her work and the many hours required

to attend to the business affairs of the eight school districts. She has received national recognition and is presently serving her second year as President of the National Association of Educational Secretaries, a Department of the National Education Association. Above and beyond the planning and correspondence involved with such a position, she has traveled from one side of the United States to the other twice within the past year. She attended the NAES Convention and Institute in Oregon in July, and the National Regional Meeting in California in November. As President she is frequently called upon as speaker at local and state meetings of Educational Secretaries, particularly in the Northeast area of the country; attends NEA Conventions as a delegate from her Association; and participates in the annual meeting of Presidents and Executive Secretaries of NEA Departments which is held in Washington, D. C. Her term as President will close with the annual convention in July to be held in Emporia, Kansas.

Miss Marjorie Lord competently prepares payroll manifests totaling approximately \$1,026,300.00 annually as well as other transactions for the eight school districts.

Two secretaries, Mrs. Jean Lovejoy and Mrs. Judy Batchelder effectively handle the volume of correspondence, reports, and general office routine, that one finds in a busy office. The secretarial work of a union office is quite different from most other offices and the training and experience these staff members have acquired is of considerable value to the supervisory union.

It may interest the reader to study for a moment the chart provided below which depicts the growth of the several communities within this school union. Please notice the comparative figures for the year 1950 and the year 1960.

The total population of Supervisory Union No. 21 increased from 9,247 to 14,893—a percent increase of 61.1—while the school population increased from 1,580 pupils to 3,395—a per cent increase of 114.9. The total population increase is conspicuous, but one may also note that pupils attending public schools make up a significantly greater per cent of the total population in 1960 than did the pupils in 1950. Nearly one in every four of the total population is a public school pupil in 1960.

The citizens of these several towns should indeed be complimented for having provided the additional classrooms, staff and materials required by such rapid growth. Additional pupils is one reason for increased cost for education.

It is relatively an easy matter to show population growth, but the matter of improved quality of instruction is far more difficult to treat objectively. One thing is certain—there has been lively activity in the “pur-

suit of excellence" during recent years and there is every indication that such activity should continue.

The key to quality instruction is, as it always has been, a quality staff. One of the most important functions of the supervisory union office is the recruitment and selection of competent teachers. Personnel practices must facilitate the retention of able staff members and provide for the removal of ineffective personnel.

Much progress has and is being made toward improved quality of instruction. Television is being used to make superior teachers available to many pupils, improved audio-visual aids are used to liven teacher presentations, team teaching is being tried as a promising new method of instruction, large group instruction and team learning are being used experimentally in some schools, and increased guidance services to assist students in the selection of courses appropriate to their capabilities.

The writer wishes to acknowledge the cooperation which Superintendent C. M. Green provided during the transfer of administrative responsibility. It is to his credit that the Supervisory Union is well organized and that the transfer of responsibilities presented no unusual difficulties.

In the report an attempt has been made to acquaint citizens with the structure, functions, and staff of the supervisory union office. The reader will find information relative to developments within the particular school district in the Principal's report.

The writer is sincerely appreciative of the many kindnesses extended to him and he pledges his best efforts to the responsibilities and duties of this office.
