MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING - MARCH 10, 1981**

ARTICLE 1 - The Annual Town Meeting was called to order at 10 A.M. by the Moderator, Richard L. Russman, for the balloting for Town Officers, Officers of the Sanborn Regional School District, as well as balloting on Articles 35 and 36. It was voted that the meeting be adjourned after the close of the counting of ballots until March 11, 1981 at 7 P.M., at the Swasey Gymnasium.

The Town Clerk, Bettie C. Ouellette, broke the seal on all boxes of ballots. The Moderator inspected the Voting Booths and checked the ballot boxes. The Moderator also announced that the absentee ballots would be processed at 3 P.M. The Assistant Moderator was Leonard F. Sanborn. Ballot Clerks were Mrs. Rochelle Ingersoll, Mrs. Esther N. Greenwood, Mrs. Mae L. Federhen, Mrs. Gloria F. Bogannam and Miss Holly Ouellette. Nicholas W. Sarcione and Robert L. Stevenson were the Police Officers. Extra counters at night were: Mrs. Judith C. Smith, Bernard E. Robie, David G. Conant and George H. Harmon. Selectmen were John J. Reinfuss and Ralph E. Southwick.

The following results of the balloting were announced by the Moderator: Total votes cast 1084 including 62 absentees. Total on Check List 2289.

RESULTS OF SPECIAL QUESTIONS

(Voted by Written Ballot)

ARTICLE 35: Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the Zoning and Building Code of the Town of Kingston, NH, as proposed by petition of Donald H. Nason and 65 other voters for this Town?

Amend Article V, Section 5.11 by striking out the entire section and substituting the following:

Every building lot shall have a minimum frontage of two hundred (200) feet and shall contain a minimum area of one (1) acre.

(The Kingston Planning Board unanimously disapproves the adoption of this amendment.)

ARTICLE 36: Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the Zoning and Building Code of the Town of Kingston, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board?

Amend Article IV, Section 4.15, by adding:

3. Kingston Historic District Sign Ordinance

a. Goals and Standards

The goals and standards of the Kingston Historic District Commission, in reviewing and approving applications for signs, as well as in considering requests for exceptions in special cases under Article IX shall be:

- 1) to insure that the visual impact of all signs shall be consistent with the historical and architectural qualities of the Historic Districts as a whole;
- 2) to promote the general visual attractiveness of the Historic Districts;
- 3) to encourage signs with names of businesses, business owners or proprietors rather than trade marks and product names;
- 4) to follow all other goals and standards consistent with RSA 31:89 f.

b. Sign Application Procedure

All signs erected within the Historic Districts shall require a certificate of approval from the Historic District Commission.

c. Specific Provisions

1) Size and location

- A) All signs must meet requirements for size and location as stated in the Zoning and Building Codes of the Town of Kingston.
- B) A parallel sign can project no more than ten (10) inches from the building surface.
- C) No sign may project from a building surface more than three (3) feet.
- D) Free-standing signs on permanent posts will be allowed.

2) Materials

Materials used in construction of these signs shall be consistent with the character of the Historic Districts.

3) Lettering

Lettering shall be appropriate to the character of the Historic Districts.

4) Illumination

Signs shall be externally illuminated only by steady, stationary, shielded light sources directed solely at

the sign without causing glare for motorists, pedestrians, or neighboring premises.

5) Animated, moving and trailer-type portable electric temporary signs shall be prohibited.

6) Permanent window signs may not take up more than ten (10) percent of the window area.

d. Maintenance

Signs within the Historic Districts shall be reasonably maintained, and repaired within 90 days from the date of request from the Historic District Commission.

e. Existing signs

All signs lawfully in existence at the time of adoption of this ordinance may continue in existence and may be maintained, but shall not be replaced, altered, or moved unless they be made to comply with the provisions of this ordinance.

**MINUTES OF CONTINUED TOWN MEETING
AT SWASEY GYMNASIUM, March 11, 1981**

Meeting was called to order at 7 P.M. by the Moderator, Richard L. Russman. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Anne Webb, St. Christopher's Episcopal Church. The Moderator introduced the Town Clerk, Mrs. Bettie C. Ouellette and the three Selectmen, Michael R. Priore, John J. Reinfuss and Ralph E. Southwick. The Moderator welcomed everyone and asked first-time voters to stand to be recognized. There was only one. He also explained that non-voters cannot vote at the meeting. He read the results of yesterday's balloting and then appointed the following to the Finance Committee: Donald E. Day, Richard Dever, David G. Conant and Edward Howard, Jr. He thanked Jean Bourgelais, Arad Philpott, Moses Tucker and Eleanor Clarke for serving their 3 year terms. This committee meets once a year and makes recommendations on money articles.

ARTICLE 2 - A motion was made to raise and appropriate \$728,537.03 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, whereupon an amendment was made by Charles Hannagan and seconded, to reduce the budget by \$22,000.00 designated as follows:

Civil Defense	\$1,000.00
Recreation Commission	1,000.00
Debt Service	10,000.00
Public Welfare	10,000.00

This amendment was NOT passed on a standing vote.

YES 55 NO 78

Tellers appointed by the Moderator were David G. Conant, Iradj Khalkhali, Sheila Briggs and Richard Dever. (All other votes were voice votes unless specified otherwise.)

Then another amendment was made by David Welch and seconded, that \$1,000.00 be cut from the Civil Defense budget and \$2,000.00 be cut from the Planning Board budget. After discussion, it was voted (on a motion by Leonard Sanborn) to divide the question and vote separately on the two items. A

motion, made by William S. Bartlett, Jr. to move the question, was passed and it was then voted to reduce the Planning Board budget by \$2,000.00 followed by an affirmative vote to reduce the Civil Defense budget by \$1,000.00.

After more discussion on the original motion, as amended, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$725,537.03 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. This vote was taken after a motion, made by William S. Bartlett, Jr. to move the question, was passed.

ARTICLE 3 - It was voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow such sums of money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and to issue in the name of the Town negotiable notes, the aforesaid notes to be paid during the current year from taxes collected during the year.

ARTICLE 4 - It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year to be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money.

The Selectmen shall hold a prior public hearing on the action to be taken and such action shall not require the expenditure of other town funds and shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies.

ARTICLE 5 - It was voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$30,000.00 for the renovation of the basement of the Town Hall for Town Offices. The approval of this article was contingent upon the town appropriating and authorizing the withdrawal of the sum of \$30,000.00 from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to be applied to the Police Department budget as an offset. This vote came after it was voted (on a motion by David Conant) to move the question.

ARTICLE 6 - It was voted to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$3,500.00 from Federal Revenue

Sharing Funds as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for purchase and installation of storm windows for the Town Hall.

ARTICLE 7 - It was voted to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$10,528.80 from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for purchase of Safety Gear for the Fire Department.

ARTICLE 8 - A motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,126.66 as a 7.5% cost of living increase in salaries of all elected officials of the Town of Kingston. It was then voted to table this Article until Article 9 was dealt with.

ARTICLE 9 - It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to increase the salary of the part-time Tax Collector from \$3,000.00 to \$4,500.00, plus statutory fees. Vote was taken after a motion by Richard Dever to move the question was passed.

ARTICLE 8 - This Article was then brought from the table and it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,901.66 as a 7.5% cost of living increase in salaries of all elected officials of the Town of Kingston. (This excluded the Tax Collector which was dealt with in Article 9)

A motion was made and then withdrawn to table the next four Articles.

ARTICLE 10 - It was voted, as amended, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$665.00 as an increase in the salary of the Treasurer, making the annual salary \$2,600.00 or \$50.00 per week.

ARTICLE 11, 12, 13 - It was voted to table these 3 Articles.

ARTICLE 14 - It was voted to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of \$5,289.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the replacement of the 1979 cruiser,

to include one electronic siren (Whelan) at a cost of \$350.00 and to further authorize withdrawal of \$2,211.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund established in 1979, said monies to be applied to the purchase price of the new cruiser. An amendment made by Freeman Nason to increase the amount by \$1,100.00 to buy a Checker was NOT passed.

ARTICLE 15 - It was voted to table this Article.

ARTICLE 16 - It was voted to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of \$11,700.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the replacement of the Highway Dept. 1977 Ford Truck. Such replacement to be a conventional four-wheel drive vehicle not less than 9995 lbs., GVW, equipped with dump body and plow. The 1977 Ford to be traded toward purchase.

ARTICLE 17 - It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,110.00 for liability insurance for the public officials, board members, law enforcement officers, ambulance attendants and drivers, with inclusion of firemen. This vote was taken after a motion by Norman Bower to move the question was passed.

ARTICLE 18 - It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend a sum of \$10,000.00 for radar patrol if available or awarded under the State of New Hampshire Highway Safety Radar Program as one hundred percent (100%) State-funded grant.

ARTICLE 19 - It was voted to allow the Selectmen to place all monies received for the Police Department (accident reports, Firearm permit fees and sale of the old cruiser) into a Capital Reserve Fund for the future replacement of cruisers and radio equipment. RSA 35:1b Supp, 35:3 Supp, 35:11b and Chapter 35 generally.

ARTICLE 20 - It was voted to approve the transfer of the remaining money in the Conservation Commission budget to the Conservation Fund as established under RSA 36-A:5.

ARTICLE 21 - It was voted to authorize the Conservation Commission to place all proceeds accruing from the management of town-owned land in a Town Forest Fund to be managed by said Commission and utilized solely for management of the town-owned land. Expenditures for the town-owned land will be drawn from the Town Forest Fund based on an annual work plan submitted to the Selectmen. The balance in the Town Forest Fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year; such balance not to exceed 1% of the previous year's town budget.

ARTICLE 22 - It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 to reimburse Leonard F. Sanborn for preparing house and lot numbers for the entire town which has been completed without remuneration. If approved, owners will be advised of their numbers by mail and may purchase and install their numbers at their own discretion. The vote was taken after it was voted to move the question on a motion by William S. Bartlett, Jr.

ARTICLE 23 - It was voted, as amended, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of installing street signs.

ARTICLE 24 - It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$728.61 and the State will contribute \$4,857.40 for Class IV and Class V Highways under the provisions of Town Road Aid.

ARTICLE 25 - It was voted to accept the following Gravel Pit Ordinance adopted by the Board of Selectmen on June 28, 1978, hereby amended to read as follows:

2. "No excavation shall take place closer than 30 feet from the top of bank to any boundary line and no closer in depth than six feet from the highest seasonal water table. The highest seasonal water table elevation shall be determined, at the property owner's expense, using acceptable method or methods as approved by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service and approved by the Kingston Conservation Commission, provided however, that no excavation shall be deeper than the level of road abutting, surrounding or passing through the property upon which the excavation is located."

ARTICLE 26 - Charles Hannagan made a motion to discuss the next 5 Articles together. It was seconded, but was NOT passed. Then, after discussion, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$924.00 to assist Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. These funds requested, in this instance being \$924.00, are to be used for current operating expenses to enable Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. to continue providing services to residents of the Town of Kingston at no cost to said residents.

ARTICLE 27 - It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,489.00 to assist Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private non-profit organization. The amount of this request is based on services rendered to 53 residents of the Town of Kingston during the period July 1, 1979 through June 30, 1980, inclusive. These residents used \$4,497.50 worth of service, however, only \$1,489.00 could be billed according to their ability to pay. We therefore request the minimum amount needed from the Town, in this instance being \$1,489.00. These funds to be used for current operating expenses to enable Rockingham Child and Family Services to continue providing individual and family counseling for residents of the Town of Kingston whether or not said residents are able to pay.

ARTICLE 28 - It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 in support of the services of the Newmarket Health Center, Inc.

ARTICLE 29 - This Article relative to \$2,000.00 for the support of the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center, Inc., located in Portsmouth, N.H., was NOT passed.

ARTICLE 30 - It was voted as amended to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of entering into a placement agreement with the Exeter Area Youth Group Home. Said amount will provide unlimited use of the program from 4/1/81 to March 1982, provided there is an existing contract and that \$3,000.00 be the maximum amount charged.

ARTICLE 31 - The Local Civil Defense Ordinance for Kingston, was NOT passed.

ARTICLE 32 - It was voted, as amended, on a motion by William S. Bartlett, Jr. to dispense the monies received from the sale of the 1956 Ford Tank fire truck, by placing the balance in the Fire Dept. Capital Reserve account for the future replacement of fire equipment.

This vote came after the following amendment made by Thomas Buttrick, was NOT passed: "Delete the words 'as a reimbursement to it for the money that it extended to the Town of Kingston for the new 1980 Ford Tank fire truck', leaving Section A to read, "\$1,190.00 to the Kingston Firemens' Association". This vote came after a motion, made by David Welch to move the question, was passed.

ARTICLE 33 - It was voted to allow the Fire Wards to place unexpended funds from current year's appropriations in a Capital Reserve Fund for the future replacement of fire equipment as needed. RSA 35:1 (b) (Supp) & 35:3 (Supp) & 35:11 & Chapter 35 generally.

ARTICLE 34 - It was voted to allow the Fire Wards to place all monies received from the ambulance into a Capital Reserve Fund for the future replacement of the ambulance. RSA 35:1 (b) (Supp) & 35:3 (Supp) & 35:11 and 35 generally.

ARTICLE 35 - Voted on written ballot March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 36 - Voted on written ballot March 10, 1981.

ARTICLE 37 - It was voted, as amended, on a motion by David Welch, to give the Selectmen authority to sell Town land at Great Pond Park to abutting owners at the price of \$1.00. Purchaser of such lots to use same to increase lot size of abutting lots and so record these lots as not being separate lots. All costs involving surveying, marking, transferring and recording to be borne by the purchaser. No lot involving access to water rights shall be sold.

ARTICLE 38 - It was voted, as amended, on a motion by David

Mayhew, to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax deeded property at Public Auction.

ARTICLE 39 - It was voted to authorize the prepayment of taxes and to authorize the Collector of Taxes to accept payments as prepayment of taxes according to RSA 80:52a.

ARTICLE 40 - This Article regarding deeding land to Mrs. Amelia Rudis was NOT passed.

ARTICLE 41 - It was voted to authorize the present Selectmen to execute a confirmatory deed for the purpose of validating a conveyance of property consisting of Lots 2 and 3 of Section L as shown on the plan of Building Lots at Great Pond Park in Kingston, New Hampshire, for W. S. Lavin, which was made by the Selectmen acting on behalf of the Town in 1948, to Edward H. Pelkey on the tenth day of May, 1948.

ARTICLE 42 - It was voted to pass over this Article regarding raising and appropriating \$7,500.00 to finish Dolliver Lane by extending the tarred surface from Church Street, at Daigneault's corner to Brown's corner.

ARTICLE 43 - This Article to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the state or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent, was NOT passed.

ARTICLE 44 - This Article relative to the withdrawal of \$92.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund for the purchase of 100 feet of air compressor hose for the Highway Department, was NOT passed.

ARTICLE 45 - It was voted to accept the Auditors Report and the Town Report as printed.

ARTICLE 46 - It was voted, on a motion by Gail Wozniak, that

the Bakie School P.T.A. be included in the category of small, non-profit, youth oriented organizations that do not have to pay for the use of the Town Hall.

Robert England commended the Moderator for his patience and the fine manner in which he handled the meeting.

It was voted to adjourn at 11:00 P.M.

MINUTES OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING June 3, 1981

Christie and abutted on the north by land of the Town of Brentwood and Robert E. Barrett; on the west by land of Hazel M. Hanson, heirs; Tom and Jane Varley; Charles and Kathryn V. Ethier; Brookhaven Three Realty Trust; Robert E. and Shirley Nordstrom and Robert W. and Sandra L. Cook; on the south by land of Clarence H. Gifford, Douglas W. and Doreen B. Winslade, Robert W. and Margaret E. Blackburn, Gary R. and Diane M. Bean, Ruth M. Dinsmore and Carol L. Connolly.

Kellogg-American, Inc. will enter into an agreement with the Town of Kingston to:

1. Locate its corporate headquarters and manufacturing facility as proposed on the overall Site Plan.

2. (a) Retain the natural area on the east side (Route 125) of the parcel 150 feet from its lot line west subject to reasonable forest management procedures and subject to any clearing that may be required by local, state or federal authorities and allowing for necessary roadways/driveways for the facility.

- (b) Retain a natural area on the westerly side of 100 feet from its lot line easterly subject to reasonable forest management procedures and subject to any clearing that may be required by local, state or federal authorities and allowing for any necessary roadway/driveway access from Route 107.

- (c) Retain a natural area on the southerly side of 150 feet

from its lot line north along Route 107 (Marshall Road) subject to reasonable forest management procedures and subject to any clearing that may be required by local, state or federal authorities and allowing for any necessary roadway/driveway access from Route 107.

(d) Retain a natural area of 50 feet from the remaining lot lines on the easterly and southerly sides to Route 125 subject to reasonable forest management procedures and subject to any clearing that may be required by local, state and federal authorities and allowing for any necessary roadway/driveway access from Route 107.

The original motion was made by Selectman John Reinfuss, and the amendment was made by William S. Bartlett, Jr. The vote was taken, by secret ballot, after a motion by Stephan Morrissey "to move the question" was passed. The Town Clerk was assisted by Margaret Wentzell, Holly Ouellette and Adele Russman, in counting the ballots. The balloting was closed at 8:50 P.M. ARTICLE 2: It was voted, by voice vote, to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a municipal data processing contract for the purpose of preparing computer tax printouts for the Town in accordance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 8-C:11. The motion was made by Michael Priore. The voice vote was taken after a motion by John Flanders "to move the question" was passed.

Selectman Ralph E. Southwick thanked the people for their confidence in the Board of Selectmen, in accepting the proposal for the industrial development. William Bartlett, Jr., Realtor, then introduced Mr. P. J. Cunningham, President of Kellogg-American, Inc. Mr. Cunningham thanked the citizens of Kingston and re-affirmed that "we will be good neighbors".

The meeting adjourned at 9:10 P.M.

The books have been audited by Roberta Mantone and Gertrude Semple.

The year 1981 shows another increase of \$11,710.00 in vehicle permit fees. A total of 614 dogs and 11 kennels were licensed and special thanks to Dick and Brenda Samoisette for their splendid cooperation.

The following vital statistics were recorded in 1981: 47 Births, 62 Marriages and 29 Deaths showing increases of 10, 18 and 2, respectively.

During 1981, 148 Voter Registrations were accepted, as well as 63 re-registrations, 3 name changes and 12 changes of party. The three Supervisors continue to show full cooperation and I appreciate that. There were two elections - the regular Town Meeting in March and the Special State Senatorial Primary in December. We are looking forward to four Elections in 1982 as follows: Special State Senatorial Election - January 19th; Town Meeting - March 9th; State Primary - Sept. 14th and State General Election - November 2nd. Absentee ballots issued for March totalled 64 and for

December, 53. My thanks to the Moderator and to all the ballot clerks and counters who help me in all elections.

I am sorry to report that we can no longer offer the convenient service of the Mobile Sub-station of the N.H. Motor Vehicle Department because the State ran out of money for this unit in May. You can mail your registrations to Concord or go to the Sub-stations in Epping, Salem or Portsmouth. You have the whole month to do this, but I would advise you to do it early as the last few days are always a horrible rush and sometimes it involves a long wait at the Motor Vehicle. All plate prices increased by 40¢ per month at the State level as of July 6, 1981. A new 15 millage rate was inserted on the Town Tax Charts for Vehicles, effective July 1, 1981. This means the vehicles are now figured on 18, 15, 12, 9, 6, and 3 mills according to the factory list price when the vehicle was new.

I have attended all the Executive Board Meetings of the N.H. City and Town Clerks' Association which are held in Concord once a month. I was pleased to be elected President of that State Association at the Annual Convention which was held at the Mt. Washington Hotel, Bretton Woods, in August. Many thanks to all the people who donated door prizes. Of all the N.H. Cities and Towns, Kingston was again the best represented. I also attended Fall Regional Meetings in Lebanon, Meredith, Greenville and Kingston, representing the State Association. The biggest news of the year was moving into our beautiful new office on July 21st. A lot of planning went into making the space convenient and useful and we really appreciate these new facilities. We invite everyone to come to see it.

Again, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the Selectmen, Treasurer and all other Town Officers for their splendid cooperation during the year. Special thanks to my part time Deputy Rochelle Ingersoll, who was out sick for about 9 weeks and I was happy to have her return to help me. I also want to again thank my daughter, Holly, part time Office Clerk, who acts as my "right arm". Both are fully trained and ready to help you in case of my illness or absence. My sincere thanks and deep appreciation to everyone for your support.

The following poem is the one which I wrote for the Regional meetings and I would like to share it with the citizens.

TOWN CLERKS

Each day of the year, we try to help.
We license dogs that sometimes yelp.
We register cars, one after the other
It might be for sister or even for brother.

We title the cars for ten years back

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Kingston on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow such sums of money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and to issue in the name of the Town, negotiable notes, the aforesaid notes to be paid during the current year from taxes collected during the year.

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments to the Zoning and Building Code of the Town of Kingston, New Hampshire, as adopted at the annual Town Meeting held on March 14, 1978 and amended March 13, 1979 and March 11, 1980, as proposed by the Planning Board; .

I. Amend Article III, Section 3.10 by adding:

5. Wetlands Conservation District

II. Amend Article IV by adding:

4.60 Wetlands Conservation District

4.61 Purpose

In the interest of public health, convenience, safety and welfare, this ordinance is intended to guide the use of wetland areas which are identified and delineated as poorly and very poorly drained soils.

a. To maintain the quality and level of the ground-water table and water re-charge areas for existing or potential water supplies.

b. To insure uses that can be safely and appropriately located in wetlands areas in order to prevent pollu-

tion of surface and groundwaters necessary to supply domestic water needs.

- c. To prevent the Town from incurring unnecessary and excessive expenses to provide and maintain essential services and utilities which arise because of unwise use of wetlands.
- d. To protect persons and property against the hazards of flood water inundation by assuring the continuation of the natural flow pattern of streams and other water courses within the Town and by preserving natural flood water storage.
- e. To protect presently existing natural wetland wildlife habitats.

4.62 Definition

- a. The Wetlands Conservation District of Kingston shall consist of those areas within the Town which contain fresh water marshes, ponds and lakes, perennial streams and soils classified as poorly and very poorly drained as defined by the National Cooperative Soil Survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service for the Town of Kingston through field mapping surveys completed in 1977 and published in the "Soil Survey Report of the Town of Kingston".
- b. Where the Wetlands Conservation District is superimposed over another zoning district in the Town of Kingston, that district which is more restrictive shall govern.

4.63 Wetlands Conservation District Map

The Wetlands Conservation District as herein defined is shown on a map designated as "Town of Kingston Wetlands Conservation District" and is a supplement to the zoning map of the town. Wetland boundaries indicated on the zoning map supplement shall be determined from soil survey field sheets which show the results of the soil survey referenced in Section 4.62, and from the on-site soils investigation of a qualified soils scientist* when required. Soil survey field sheets are available from the U.S. Soil Conservation Service in Exeter, NH, and are on file with the Planning Board, Town Clerk

and Conservation Commission. The results of any on-site soils investigation will be on file with the Planning Board and Conservation Commission.

4.64 Appeal

In the event that an area is alleged to be incorrectly designated on the soil survey/field sheets, any person aggrieved by such a designation may present adequate evidence of such to the Planning Board. Adequate evidence shall include a written report of on-site soils investigation and analysis conducted by a qualified soils scientist*.

4.65 Permitted Uses

In designated wetland areas permitted uses are those which are compatible with the purposes specified in Section 4.61 of this ordinance and do not involve significant alteration of the wetland. Such uses include:

- a. Forestry - tree farming
- b. Agriculture
- c. Water impoundments and well supplies
- d. Maintenance of existing drainage ways-streams, creeks or other paths of normal water runoff
- e. Wildlife refuge
- f. Parks and such recreational uses which are consistent with the purpose and intent of Section 4.61
- g. Conservation areas and nature trails
- h. Open space as permitted by subdivision regulations and other sections of this ordinance.

4.66 Uses Permitted Subject to Review

a. Easements and Rights of Way

Streets, roads and other access ways and utility rights of way or easements may be permitted provided that evidence of the following be accepted by the appropriate Board:

- 1) The street, road, access way or utility right-of-way or easements are essential to the productive use of land not zoned under the provisions of this ordinance.
- 2) The street, road, access way or utility right-of-way or easement is so located and

constructed as to minimize any detrimental impact of such uses upon the wetland.

- 3) Such location and construction be compatible with the intents and purposes of this ordinance.

b. Underlying Districts

In cases where the Wetlands Conservation District overlays another zoning district, the proposed use shall be permitted (providing said use is allowed in the underlying district) subject to review by the appropriate Board providing that:

- 1) Uses are consistent with the purpose and intent in Section 4.61.
- 2) The appropriate procedure for review as delineated in Section 4.67 be followed.

4.67 Procedure for Review

a. Building Permits for Individual Lots

Upon receiving a request for a building permit within the Wetlands Conservation District, the Board of Selectmen shall notify the Planning Board and Conservation Commission of said request. The Planning Board and Conservation Commission may submit a written report. If the Board of Selectmen determines from these reports that the proposed activity may have a significant negative impact on the wetlands as described in Section 4.61, they may request the applicant to submit a drainage report and calculations describing the extent of that impact.

b. Subdivisions

Any person who desires to subdivide land within the Wetlands Conservation District shall submit to the Planning Board, in addition to all other requirements stipulated in the Subdivision Regulations, five (5) copies (copies are given to the Board of Selectmen, Conservation Commission, Town Engineer, and two retained by the Planning Board) of a drainage report and calculations prepared by a Registered Professional Engineer describing the extent of impact on the wetlands. The topographic map

should include soil typing according to Section 4.62 of this ordinance. The Board of Selectmen and Conservation Commission may submit a written report for consideration.

c. Issuance of Conditions

If after review of all submitted data the appropriate Board determines that the area on which the proposed work is to be done is in conflict with Section 4.61 of this ordinance, the Board shall:

- 1) Grant preliminary approval subject to an order of conditions it deems necessary for compliance and subsequent final approval, or
- 2) deny the request and give the reason thereto.

d. The appropriate Board shall be entitled to review and regulate development proposals within one hundred (100) feet of a wetland when it is determined that such development may have a significant negative impact on the wetland not consistent with the purposes and intent of Section 4.61.

4.68 Special Exceptions

Special exceptions for the undertaking of a use not otherwise permitted in the Wetlands Conservation District, which may include erection of a structure, dredging, filling, draining, or otherwise altering the surface configuration of the land, may be granted by the Board of Adjustment, if it can be shown that such proposed use will not conflict with the purpose and intent of Section 4.61. Proper evidence to this effect shall be submitted in writing to the Board of Adjustment and may be accompanied by the findings of a review of the Rockingham County Conservation District of the environmental effects of such proposed use upon the wetlands in question.

*Qualified Soil Scientist is a person qualified in soil classification who is recommended or approved by the Rockingham County Conservation District Board of Supervisors.

III. Amend Article II, Section 2.20: 12 by deleting the existing definition and inserting:

Wetlands. Freshwater marshes, ponds and lakes, streams, and soils classified as poorly and very poorly drained as defined by the National Cooperative Soil Survey, U.S.D.A., Town of Kingston, 1977.

5. Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the Zoning and Building Code of the Town of Kingston, New Hampshire as adopted at the annual Town Meeting held on March 14, 1978 and amended March 13, 1979 and March 11, 1980 as proposed by the Planning Board by adding:

Article XV Site Plan Review

15.10 To ensure that development of tracts for non-residential uses, or for multi-family dwelling units other than one and two-family dwellings, whether of not such development includes a subdivision or re-subdivision of the site, become a positive addition to the community, the Planning Board may adopt and administer site plan review regulations pursuant to RSA 36:19a.

6. Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the Zoning and Building Code of the Town of Kingston, New Hampshire, as adopted at the annual Town Meeting held on March 14, 1978 and amended March 13, 1979 and March 11, 1980, as proposed by the Planning Board:

Amend Article IV, Section 4.15 by changing the numbering of sub-section "3" to "5". (Editorial change)

Said Article To Be Voted By Written Ballot

7. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a NH resident for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000 and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence." This would be become effective April 1, 1982.

Said Article To Be Voted By Written Ballot

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$3,000.00 to cover the cost of a salary increase of \$1,000.00 per Selectmen. The present salary is \$2,150.00 annually.

9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$3,500.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Said money to be used for purchase and installation of a hung ceiling, insulation and lighting fixtures in the Town Hall Auditorium.

10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$4,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the purpose of replacing the rear furnace in the Town Hall with one of sufficient capacity to provide even and adequate heat to all areas.

11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$930.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the purchase of inside storm windows to be installed in the Town Hall downstairs.

12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$2,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Said money to be used for the purchase and installation of electric door openers at the Central and South Fire Stations.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year to be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money.

The Selectmen shall hold a prior public hearing on the action to be taken and such action shall not require the expenditure of other town funds and shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 and authorize the Selectmen to engage the services of an independent assessing firm for the purpose of reassessing all land and buildings in the Town.

15. On petition of the Kingston Fire Wards, Earl S. Carter, John A. Merrill and Donald W. Briggs, Sr and ten others on behalf of the Kingston Fire Department: "To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize withdrawal of \$6,000.00 from Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to do necessary body work and restore rust on Fire Engine #2-a 1968 Chev. and Engine #3-a 1973 Ford."

16. On petition of Neil R. Parker and nine (9) others: "To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$6,000.00 (six thousand dollars) from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for purchase of engineering costs for the proposed Police Station and planning thereof, so as to be able to go to the Federal Government with plans for the purpose of Funding."

17. On petition of the Kingston Fire Wards, Earl S. Carter, John A Merrill and Donald W. Briggs, Sr and 10 others on behalf of the Kingston Fire Department - "To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 to do necessary body work and restore rust on Fire Engine #2, a 1968 Chev. and Engine #3, a 1973 Ford."

18. On petition of Neil R. Parker and ten (10) other on behalf of the Kingston Police Department: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, \$8,500.00 (eight thousand five hundred dollars) for the replacement of the 1980 cruiser."

19. On petition of Neil R. Parker and eleven (11) others on behalf of the Kingston Police Department: "To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend a sum of \$10,000 (ten thousand dollars) for radar patrol if available or awarded under the State of New Hampshire Highway Safety Radar Program as one hundred percent (100%) state funded."

20. To see if the Town will allow the Fire Wards to place unexpended funds from current years' appropriations in a Capital Reserve Fund for the future replacement of fire equipment as needed, RSA 35:1 (B) (Supp) & 35:3 (Supp) & 35:11 & Chapter 35 generally.

21. To see if the Town will allow the Fire Wards to place all monies received from the ambulance into a Capital Reserve Fund for the future replacement of the ambulance. RSA 35:1

(b) (Supp) & 35:3 (Supp) & 35:11 & Chapter 35 generally.

22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$689.00 (Six hundred eighty-nine dollars) for the purchase of a postage meter mailing machine, Model 5705 Touchmatic.

23. On petition of Neil Parker and eleven (11) others: "To vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$1,600 (one thousand six hundred dollars) on State bid list to replace the thirteen year old radio now in use every day. This amount to be withdrawn from the Police Department capital reserve fund established in 1979."

24. On petition of Neil R. Parker and eleven (11) others: "To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 (one thousand three hundred dollars) for a copy machine for the Police Station, or allow the Selectmen and the Chief of Police to enter into a buy-lease agreement with a suitable firm, not to exceed \$1,400.00."

25. On petition of Neil R. Parker and nine (9) others - "To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600 (sixteen hundred dollars) for a cost of living increase for the Chief of Police." The present salary is \$14,613.93.

26. On petition of Richard D. Senter and twelve (12) others: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 as a cost of living increase for the Road Agent. The present annual salary of \$14,613.93. includes two (2) weeks vacation and is appropriated as part of the regular budget."

27. On petition of Bettie C. Ouellette and seventeen (17) others: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$146.20 as an 8% increase in the salary of the part-time Town Clerk, making the annual salary \$1,973.70, plus statutory fees."

28. On petition of Bettie C. Ouellette and seventeen (17) others: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$360.00 as an 8% increase in the salary of the part-time Tax Collector, making the annual salary \$4,860.00, plus statutory fees."

29. On petition of Neil R. Parker and nine (9) others: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to allow three (3) weeks vacation, after ten (10) years service to the Town of Kingston, N.H."

30. On petition of Neil R. Parker and eleven (11) others: "To see if the Town will allow the Selectmen to place all monies received for the Police Department (accident reports, firearms

permits, fees and the sale of the old cruiser) into a Capital Reserve Fund for the future replacement of cruisers and radio equipment. RSA 265:19 (Supp) Generally 35.”

31. On petition of Richard A. Samoisette and ten (10) others: “To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$1,000 from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for adequate winter housing at the Kingston dog pound.”

32. On petition of Brenda Beede and twelve (12) others: “To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to grant a cable television franchise upon such lawful conditions as they may require, to erect, install and maintain in, under or over streets, highways and public ways of the town, wires, cable and other electrical impulses all in accordance with and as allowed by New Hampshire RSA 53-C (Supp. 1977).”

33. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$7,500.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the purchase and installation of lighting equipment, consisting of 6 (six) ellipsoi-dal spotlights with lamps and wiring, 2 (two) portable dimmer modules, 6 (six) 2400-watt solid state dimmers and 1 (one) twenty-four channel, two scene pre-set remote controller, for the Town Hall.

34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$6,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the purchase of lighting equipment, consisting of two portable dimmer modules, six 2400 watt solid state dimmers, and one 24-channel, two-scene, pre-set remote controller, for the Town Hall.

35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,203.00 to assist Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. These funds requested, in this instance being \$1,203.00, are to be used for current operating expenses to enable Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. to continue providing services to residents of the Town of Kingston at no cost to said residents.

36. To see if the Town will budget the sum of \$1,367.00 to assist Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private, non-profit organization. The amount of this request is based on services rendered to 31 residents of the Town of Kingston, during the period July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981, inclusive. These residents used \$3,740.00 worth of service, however, only \$1,367.00 could be billed according to their ability to pay. We therefore request the minimum amount needed from the Town, in this instance being \$1,367.00. These funds to be used for current operating expenses to enable Rockingham Child and Family Services to continue providing individual and family counseling for residents of the Town of Kingston whether or not said residents are able to pay.

37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (one thousand dollars) in support of the services of the Newmarket Health Center, Inc.

38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$819.79 for Class IV and Class V Highways under the provisions of Town Road Aid. The State will contribute \$5,465.25.

39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax dedeed property at Public Auction.

40. To see if the Town will restrict the sale of cemetery lots to residents, former residents and their relatives, or as otherwise approved by the Selectmen.

41. On petition of Virginia Morse and nine (9) others: "To see if the Town will approve the transfer of the remaining money in the Conservation Commission budget to the Conservation Fund as established under RSA 36-A:5."

42. On petition of Gertrude W. Semple and nine (9) others: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to complete the Historic Architectural Survey."

43. On petition of Leonard Hawkins and 12 others, all registered voters - "To see if the Town of Kingston will vote to discontinue 17th Street from the northeasterly boundary of Lot 7 section K and Lot 93 section J, southeasterly to its end; and further:

To see if the Town will give the Selectmen authority to sell or transfer that portion of 17th Street in Great Pond Park described above, which is unimproved, to said Leonard Hawkins for the purpose of joining his two properties described on tax map U4 232 and U4 237 containing lots #88,

89, 90, 91, 93, 94, 95 and 82 in section J and lots # 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 in section K, into one deeded parcel. All costs involving surveying, marking, transferring and recording to be the burden of the purchaser.”

44. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following ordinance:

ORDINANCE

Adopted March 27, 1981

Pursuant to the provisions of RSA 31:39, 1979 Supplement; the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Kingston passes effective March 27, 1981 an ordinance pertaining to the appointment of a plumbing inspector and an electrical inspector and requiring permits for all electrical and plumbing work in the Town of Kingston.

This ordinance is passed for the purpose of regulating the prudential affairs of the Town, advancing public health, safety, morals, conserving private property values, encouraging appropriate land use and preserving of general attractiveness and welfare of the Town.

Permits must be filed with the Board of Selectmen for all electrical and plumbing work in all units of construction. A \$10.00 fee will be charged for each permit and such monies be used to pay the inspectors which will be appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

45. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following ordinance:

ORDINANCE

Adopted June 12, 1981

Pursuant to the provisions of RSA 31:39, 1979 Supplement; the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Kingston passes, effective June 12, 1981, an ordinance pertaining to the establishing of a fee schedule for permits for industrial buildings.

Fees will be five cents (.05) per square foot for buildings; the fees for electrical permits will be three cents (.03) per square foot and fees for plumbing permits will be two cents (.02) per square foot.

This ordinance is passed for the purpose of regulating the prudential affairs of the Town, advancing public health, safety, morals, conserving private property values, encouraging appropriate land use and preserving of general attractiveness and welfare of the town.

46. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Auditors Report and Town Report as printed.

47. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS REPORT

In May 1981, the sudden death of David F. Dutton was a great loss to the Trustees. He had served continuously since 1963 and was re-elected in March to a term expiring in 1984. Walter S. Clark, Sr., was appointed to fill the vacancy. We were saddened again in November by the death of Rodney M. Wilson who had completed 27 years on the Board in 1980.

A summary of trust fund accounts and listing of new funds is given on the following pages. The full report is on file with the Selectmen and the Trustees and may be seen on request.

TRUST FUNDS

During 1981, as cemetery fund investments matured they were re-invested at the higher prevailing interest rates, mainly for 30-month terms. Reserve funds of the Ambulance, Police and Fire Depts. were also re-invested in six-month certificates at improved interest rates. Proposed withdrawals will need up to six months advance notice to avoid penalties for withdrawals before maturity.

CEMETERIES

For the second year, the Trustees request no increase in the Town budget item for cemetery maintenance - \$7,000. Wage rates and total costs have increased but these are largely offset by increased trust fund earnings.

Improvements in 1981 have included road construction in Greenwood, seeding and fencing of the new area at Pine Grove and additional planting of evergreens.

Lot sales included 6 in Greenwood, 6 in the Plains and 7 in Pine Grove. No more lots are available in the Plains.

Maintenance work in South Kingston was in charge of George W. Leate, elsewhere by John C. Tilton and Charles F. Geary, Jr. Some trimming on the Plains was provided by the income from the Grace Daley Trust Fund.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

Enjoying a full membership for most of the year, the Kingston Conservation Commission had an active and productive year.

Two on-site inspections were conducted. Three dredge and fill applications and three dredge and fill complaints were inspected and recommendations were submitted to the State Wetlands Board.

A water-quality assurance program was developed with the Commission, Kellogg-American Manufacturing Company and Peck Environmental Laboratories as a result of concerns about locating such a large industry near Little River.

A great deal of time and thought was put into the Wetland Zoning proposal as the Commission worked with the Planning Board and State and Regional Commissions to develop the best possible wetland protection for Kingston.

An exciting beginning to our Town Forest Management Plan was realized in December as the first timber cuts took place and some money was put into the Town Forest Management Fund for further management of town owned land. The donation of a piece of land by Tom Gibson was finalized adding an important piece of wetland to an adjacent parcel of town owned land.

After years of hard work, the Commission proudly reports that all gravel pits have proper topographical plans and are up to date on inspections, test pits and permits.

Members have kept current on information from the many aspects of conservationism by attending the Municipal Law Lecture Series, the annual State Conservation Commission meeting, water quality meetings and joint workshops on town forestry with neighboring towns.

My thanks go to all the members for the time taken from their private lives to donate to the town through the work of the Commission. Thanks also to Rick Jones, our chairman throughout most of the year, who did a fine job with the challenges of the position.

The Conservation Commission meets on the first and third Wednesdays of the month in the Grace Daley House or Town Office. All meetings are open to the public.

KINGSTON CIVIL DEFENSE AGENCY

In July of 1980, I took the Oath of Office as Director/Coordinator of the Kingston Civil Defense. Since that time I have updated and expanded the Basic Emergency Management Plan for the town, as well as completed several functional annexes to supplement the Basic Plan.

I have also completed a warning systems survey of the town, instituted an Emergency Preparedness Information Program, increased the congregate care shelter capabilities by over 900 spaces, increased the number of qualified Radiological Monitors from 5 to 11 people, and added 3 new radiological defense monitoring kits.

In addition I have furthered my own knowledge regarding Civil Defense by completing courses in Civil Defense Director/Coordinator (a basic course regarding duties and responsibilities of the Director/Coordinator), Civil Defense U.S.A. (a course describing the responsibilities of Civil Defense as an agency) & a Basic Radiological Monitoring course. I have also attended an Emergency Planning workshop and a Basic Management workshop.

Care is family centered and consideration is given to the total needs of the patient and family for health promotion and disease prevention and rehabilitation as well as care and support during the dying process. The service area was divided into districts this year with specific nurses providing care in their district. An answering device has been put into use this year making services more available. A marked increase in weekend visits has become apparent due largely to earlier hospital discharge.

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH. Visits are made to new or expectant mothers to provide information and instruction in the care of themselves and their babies. Well Child Clinics are held two to three times a month and provide the following services: Physical exams by a local physician, immunizations, hearing and vision screening, blood and urine tests, instruction in growth and development. The clinics are for infants and preschool children. This program has been reorganized this year and the number of clinics increased to accommodate increased numbers of eligible children. The Exeter clinics are now held at the VNA office and a new developmental screening has been added. These changes were made to increase cost effectiveness as well as the quality of service.

ADULT HEALTH SCREENING. Clinics are held each month to check blood pressure and provide diet and medication counseling, and general health instruction. The High Blood Pressure Program was expanded during the last half of the year to include the young and middle-age adult population. Diabetes screenings are held through the area, and tuberculosis testing is also done.

FLU CLINICS. 12 Clinics are held each Fall (1 in each town) to immunize hi-risk (65 yrs. and over, or chronic disease) persons against influenza.

THERE IS NO CHARGE FOR ANY CLINIC SERVICE

CONTINUING CARE. An Agency nurse is in the local hospital part of each day to assist in planning, coordinating and arranging for care at home so that a person can move from hospital to home and continue to receive the required care he/she needs.

10,959 units of service were provided to residents of the service area between January 1, 1981 and December 31, 1981. (Individual town statistics are sent to the selectmen of each town).

The Agency works closely with other health and social agencies to ensure the most comprehensive care possible to the residents of the participating towns. The Agency continues to maintain its Medicare and Medicaid certification and is a member of the Community Health Care Association of New Hampshire.

The Association relies upon many valuable volunteers who work at the clinics and in the office in addition to regular staff.
