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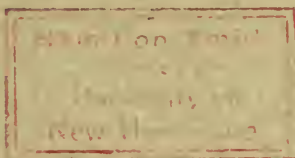
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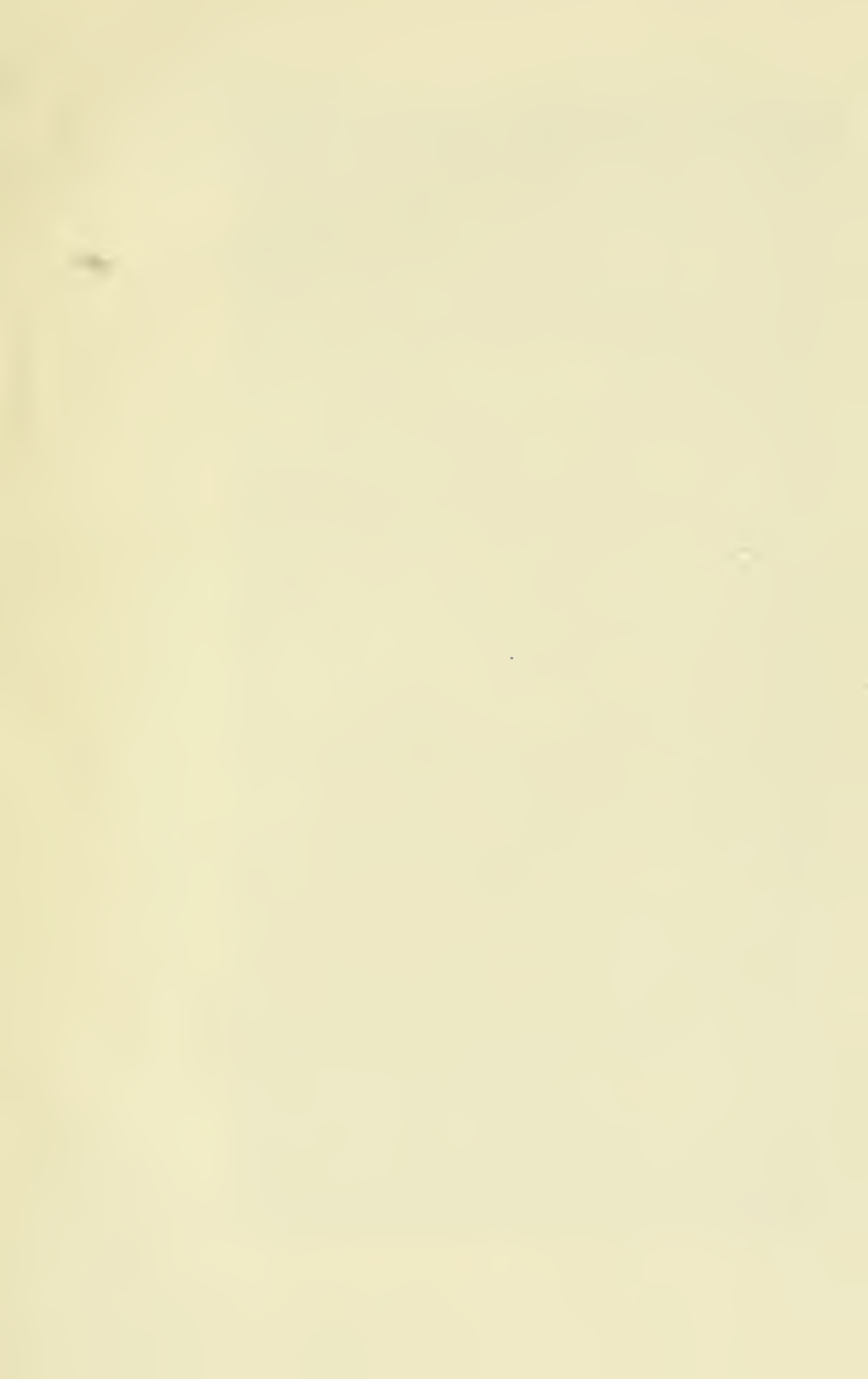

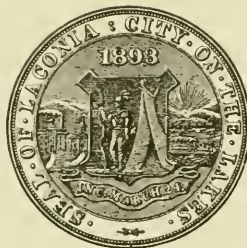

ORGANIZATION

OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT

Tuesday, March 24, 1931.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the city council for the municipal year of 1931, and the members from the previous council, met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

Ladies and gentlemen, last year we reduced the indebtedness of the City of Laconia \$46,250.00 and we must do the same thing this coming year so that the tax-payers of this beautiful city will have courage. MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge; unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock M., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the Council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the City Treasurer.

RESOLUTIONS

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one.

A RESOLUTION authorizing temporary loans to an amount not exceeding Two Hundred Thousand Dollars in anticipation of the taxes of the present Municipal year.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That for the purpose of meeting current expenses of the City, the City Treasurer be and hereby is authorized and empowered to make temporary loans from time to time for the use of said City of sums not exceeding the aggregate amount of \$200,000.00, said loans being in the anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year and hereby expressly made payable therefrom, and to give for such loan subject to the written approval of the Committee on Finance, notes of the City, each note to become due and payable within one year from its date and no such note shall be valid unless authenticated by the certificate of the National Shawmut Bank of Boston, Massachusetts. Said notes shall be signed by the Mayor and City Treasurer and countersigned by the City Clerk, shall be registered in the books kept for that purpose in the offices of the City Treasurer and City Clerk respectively.

This resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

A RESOLUTION raising money by taxation for the year ending February 15, 1932.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That there shall be raised and there is ordered to be raised on the polls and estate liable to be taxed within said City the sum of four hundred twenty-six thousand, eight hundred and four and eighty one hundredths (\$426,804.80) Dollars to defray the necessary expenses and charges of the city for the financial year ending February 15, 1932.

AN ORDINANCE in amendment of Section 10 of Chapter 19 of the revised ordinances of the City of Laconia, entitled, "Salaries of the Board of Health, Board of

Assessors, and other Officers", as amended by ordinance passed and approved June 29, 1920, as amended by an ordinance passed and approved November 26, 1923.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

SECTION 1. Amend Section 10 of said Chapter 19 of said ordinance by striking out the whole of said Section 10 and inserting in place thereof, the following:

Section 10. The Board of Assessors shall be paid in full for the services of its members the sum of Nineteen Hundred (\$1900) Dollars per annum, payable semi-annually, the Chairman of said Board of Assessors shall receive Seven Hundred (700) Dollars per annum. The services of the members of said Board of Assessors shall include the assessment of taxes, and taking the enrollment.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the regulation of parking on Union Avenue.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

SECTION 1. No vehicle shall stop or stand on Union Avenue between Main Street and Gilford Avenue for more

than one hour at a time between the hours of nine o'clock in the morning and five o'clock in the afternoon on week days, except Saturdays, when the time shall be from nine o'clock in the morning until eight o'clock in the evening.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be effective only during the months of June, July, August and September.

SECTION 3. Penalty. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five dollars.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

AN ORDINANCE in amendment of an ordinance relating to the regulation of street traffic as passed and approved July 2, 1923.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

Amend said ordinance by adding at the end thereof the following new section, Section 13, Section 14, Section 15; so that Section 13, Section 14, and Section 15 shall read as follows:

SECTION 13. No motor vehicle shall be parked on a public street to remain continuously so parked during the period from midnight to sunrise except in case of an emergency.

SECTION 14. Any person violating the provisions of said ordinance as amended shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars.

SECTION 15. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the regulation of parking on Beacon Street.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

SECTION 1. No vehicle shall park on the westerly side of Beacon Street for more than ten minutes at a time.

SECTION 2. Penalty. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than five dollars for each and every offense.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

LEGISLATIVE ACT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one.

AN ACT relating to the salary of the city clerk of the City of Laconia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1. Salary, City Clerk of Laconia. Amend section 17, chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893, as amended by chapter 316 of the Laws of 1917, and chapter 271 of the Laws of 1921, by striking out the words "fifteen hundred" and inserting in place thereof the words, three thousand, and by adding at the end of said section the words, All fees received by the city clerk shall be turned over by said clerk to the city treasurer for the use of the city of Laconia, so that said section as amended shall read as follows: Sect. 17. The Mayor and council shall, at their first meeting May 3, 1893, and thereafter annually, on the fourth Tuesday of March, meet for the purpose of taking their respective oaths, and shall elect a city clerk, who shall be clerk of the city council and have a salary of three thousand dollars per annum. All fees received by the city clerk shall be turned over by said clerk to the city treasurer for the use of the city of Laconia.

2. Takes Effect. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:—

Sometime in December 1931 the Mayor and City Council requested the School Board to recommend how the crowded conditions at the High School could be relieved. After several meetings of the Board it was unanimously agreed that a new building ought to be erected on the property that was purchased from Mr. Thomas J. McIntyre several years ago. This ought to be a two story brick building without a basement, approximately 125 ft. in length and 85 ft. in width. It was thought that the Mechanic Arts Department in this new building would use the entire first floor. The second floor would be devoted to a gymnasium for boys, locker rooms, shower baths, etc. The present gymnasium does not meet the needs of both boys and girls. This building would of course relieve the crowded conditions for a considerable length of time. The capacity of the high school building is 750 pupils. There are at the present time (January) in the high school building 815 or 65 above capacity. In the elementary schools there are now (January) 909 or a total of 1724 in the public schools of Laconia. It possible would be wise to have this new building used for a Junior High instead of what was suggested by the Board. However, I do not believe that any of the members really expected we would have the building, but we gave our answer to the Mayor and City Council as requested.

As to using the old High School Building on Academy Street, for Junior High, in 1923 the last year the building was used for a high school there were 309 students and the building was badly over-crowded. At the present writing (January) there are enrolled 337 pupils in the Junior High School. On the face of the figures it can be seen that the old High School building can not be used. Further

there would be a duplication of teachers; that is, some teachers in the Junior High teach in the High School, and also a duplication of equipment. All things considered I believe it would be impossible to have a Junior High School at the old High School building on Academy Street. We will allow for the moment that it could be done, then what would you do with 230 students now in the building. The Bowman street building was condemned by the State of New Hampshire or at least it was stated that if the building was again used the lighting, ventilating and sanitary systems would have to be entirely made over. The capacity of that building was 140 children, so that if used it would have to be enlarged to take care of 90 more children. It is understood from many authorities that the 6-6 system, so called, six years in the elementary schools and six years in the high school, is the most economical, considering the number of students we now have.

To relieve the condition I stated existed at the High School the following was done: There are students that cannot have what is called a home room, and after their recitation work is completed several times during the week they have to go to the auditorium for study the remaining period in the afternoon. During two of these periods or twice a week I understand the High School Orchestra use the room, and of course study for the pupils that are in the auditorium would be impossible. To relieve that condition we have excused the students that are in the auditorium to study, that is they may go home when their work is completed or the last period. I believe that is plan is working out in a satisfactory way.

The School Board as stated in other reports will cooperate in every way possible to save money. They all realize the conditions that now exist, and will act accordingly wherever possible.

I refer you to the report of the Superintendent which, I believe, if you give careful attention to it, will be of great interest to you.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Laconia:

I herewith present my fifteenth annual report as superintendent of schools of Laconia.

The following statistics were taken from the annual report for the school year ending June 30, 1931.

Comparison of these statistics with corresponding ones for the previous year shows an increase in the enrollment in the elementary schools last year of 21; a decrease in the junior high school pupils of 11; an increase in the senior high school enrollment of 63; a decrease in the evening school enrollment of 42. The total enrollment for all schools was larger by 31 last year than during the year ending June 30, 1930.

The average membership during the year was 53 larger. There was considerable decrease in the number of tardinesses, especially in the high school.

The registers show that many more parents visited schools last year than in the year previous. It would be helpful to the teachers if more parents would show their interest in the work of the schools and in many cases there would be a decided benefit for the boys and girls if there could be a mutual co-operation and understanding on the part of the teachers and parents.

The record for promotion was better than a year ago with the exception of the first grades, where as in other years it

was necessary for a considerable number to repeat the first grade work because of immaturity and failure to get a good start. It seems best to recommend that the rule requiring a child to be six years of age or six before the first of the following January before he can be admitted to school be enforced in all cases.

This table shows that in ten years the average membership for the elementary schools, grades 1 to 8 inclusive, has increased 23%. That the increase in the high school membership has been 49%; and that the increase in the total membership of the public schools in this ten-year period has been approximately 30%.

Since the re-organization of the school system in 1923, the greatest increase has come in the high school, which is a very strong argument in favor of the 6-6 plan.

The following table shows the total registration and the average membership in the high school, and the average membership for grades 7 and 8, and for grades 9 to 12.

The enrollment in the elementary schools one year ago was 897. At the present time it is 909.

On January 9, 1931, the enrollment in the high school was 718. This year it is 815.

The capacity of the high school building was estimated at 750. Last year the building was comfortably filled with a total enrollment of 755, and an average membership through the year of 709.

This year the building is crowded owing to the increase of approximately 100 pupils.

Conditions promise to be worse next year as in all probability there will be 900 pupils.

REPAIRS

Only necessary repairs were made during the summer vacation. Two rooms at the Washington Street School were repainted and considerable work was done on the windows and window frames in that building. The windows in two rooms were weather stripped as they were very loose and noisy.

The wood trim at the Academy Street building was in very bad shape and it was necessary to paint it to protect it from the weather. Several leaks in the roofs at the different elementary buildings were attended to.

During the next summer vacation the wood trim at Washington Street, Batchelder Street, and Mechanic Street buildings should be thoroughly painted. This will not be a very expensive job and should be done to protect the wood. There is also need of considerable redecorating of class rooms in the elementary buildings.

Last fall while visiting a new three-quarters of a million dollar high school building in a city in a neighboring state, the superintendent called to our attention the fact that there were no parapet walls on the building with the remark, "You will notice that there are no parapet walls on this building as we have had sad experiences with parapet walls

on the school houses in our city." Parapet walls, to give height to the buildings and to hide the ventilators, were designed for buildings that were built a decade or so ago, and they brought "sad experiences" to many cities.

The parapet wall on the new high school building caused considerable difficulty from the first and several methods were tried to remedy the condition. About \$3500.00 had been spent up to last summer. The work done on the walls in 1929 lasted until the storms of last spring, when it became apparent that conditions must be remedied at once.

We wish to emphasize right here that the roof itself never gave any trouble, as some people may have been led to believe, but the whole trouble came from the brick walls above the roof.

The School Board decided that changes of a permanent nature should be made on the parapet walls and at a meeting of the Board early in July it was voted to submit for bids plans prepared by Goodwin & Doe. On July 20, it was voted to award the contract to W. M. Bisson, whose bid was the lowest, and to have the work done under the supervision of Goodwin & Doe. The total cost of the work was \$5,729.12, of which \$5,404.83 was paid W. M. Bisson for the work, and \$324.29 to Goodwin & Doe for plans and supervision.

The work was satisfactorily completed in time for some redecorating to be done in the rooms on the second floor. There is no possibility of a recurrence of the trouble.

TEACHERS

Eight teachers gave up teaching at the end of the year to be married. None left to go to other systems.

We were all saddened by the death of Miss Grace Wilson early in the fall term. Miss Wilson had prepared herself well for her chosen work and had made a favorable impression upon all who knew her.

The return of Mr. Olsen as an instructor in cabinet making was welcomed by those in charge and by the boys of his classes. Among the new teachers in the high school Miss Lundell and Miss Davison had had two years' experience while Miss McLean and Miss Colby were recent graduates of Plymouth and Keene.

During the summer it became necessary to engage two additional teachers because of the increased numbers that were enrolling. Miss Marston and Miss Thompson, teachers of experience, were secured for positions in History and Commerce.

In the elementary schools Miss Agrafiotis, with two years' experience, came to Academy Street and Miss Twombly, Miss Atwood and Miss McCullough, graduates of Normal School last June came to Mechanic Street and Washington Street.

Our teachers as a whole are conscientious and are working for the best interests of our boys and girls. They are to be commended for giving one per cent. of their salaries for aid of children of needy families.

SCHOOL WORK

The work of the schools has been of a high grade. The graduates, many of whom are going to post-secondary institutions, each year, are bringing credit to the high school.

In extra curricular activities the high school has had a good record. Perhaps the number of victories in athletics has not been as large as many would like, yet there has been maintained a high standard of sportsmanship.

In debating, scholarship contests, and music contests, the school has done well.

Standard tests have been given in the elementary schools as well as in the high school. The results show that our schools rank well.

In the report of 1920 the late Fletcher Hale, as chairman of the School Board, said, "Your Board of Education aims to have the best schools in the State of New Hampshire, without extravagance, but with that measure of reasonable expense, which, we believe, is the best economy and a wise and most profitable investment. We can see no reason why Laconia should have schools inferior to those of any other place in the State."

Mr. Hale was very much interested in the schools and gave many years of faithful service to the improvement of them.

We have tried to maintain a high standard in the schools, as economically as possible, and we invite the co-operation of the public in our endeavors.

We acknowledge with thanks the services and gifts of many individuals and organizations in behalf of the boys and girls.

The past year has been a satisfactory year in the amount and character of service rendered. While the actual number of admissions does not quite equal that of last year, this has been to our advantage, as due to prevailing conditions, it did not seem feasible to carry out recommendations

of a year ago, to enlarge the hospital. Owing to the crowded conditions this past year, our doctors have had to wait or take such accommodations as were available for their patients.

There were four Nose and Throat Clinics conducted during the year. This Fall, we have provided accommodations for a N. H. State Board of Health Prenatal Clinic, conducted by the division of Maternity, Infancy and Child Hygiene.

A group of Girl Scouts have been given instruction and demonstrations in bed making, baths, and bandaging, by one of our Supervisors.

Miss Mabel Locke, who graduated in 1927, and for the past year in charge of the "Maternity Department", last winter, took a three months Post-Graduate course at the "Boston Lying-In Hospital", to better qualify herself for her position.

In May, Miss Laura Hutchinson, graduate of New England Deaconess Hospital, 1929, assumed charge of the Operating Rooms and is rendering efficient service.

Our new Instructress of Nurses, Miss Esther E. Cass, came to us September First. Miss Cass had two years at Boston University prior to graduating from New England Deaconess Hospital, 1930. Miss Hutchinson and Miss Cass are competent stenographers, and their services in this capacity has made a decided improvement in the records of patients. Miss E. Jane Mason, a graduate of Brightlook Hospital of St. Johnsbury, Vt., is our Night Supervisor, coming to us in September.

Training School: January 1st, 1931, there were twenty-four student nurses. During the year, two graduated—one left training—two were dismissed—two suspended and three married. March 1st a class of six students entered training, and the same number in October. Upon advice one of the latter class discontinued the course. At the present time, we have twenty-five students in the school.

This year, we have added to our lecture course, four lectures on Ear, Nose and Throat by one of the doctors on the Staff. Two lectures on Venereal Diseases by Dr. C. A. Weaver of Manchester, State Epidermiologist. Dr. B. W. Baker gave an afternoon to our students, explaining by subjects at State School, types of defected mentality. A very interesting lecture was given by Miss Clare De Ceu, Assistant Superintendent in Nurse Corps, U. S. Navy Bureau, explaining the possibilities for Nurses in that particular branch of Nursing.

An incentive for higher marks was a gift of \$5.00 from The Woman's Auxiliary of Belknap County Medical Society for the two students attaining the highest average during the year. This was merited by Second Year Students; their average being 95.4 and 94.3.

The Nurses have had their usual parties and enjoyed greatly the illustrated lecture on Jamaica and Panama by Attorney Theo Jewett, his son operating the lantern.

The new "Majestic" Radio purchased this fall, for the Nurses Home, is giving much pleasure to the students.

A decided asset to the Class Room, was the purchase of a life-size dissectable Torso Model by the Hospital Aid. Another gift from the same source was four white enamel bedside tables for the Maternity Ward. These are but a few of the many things provided by this organization. The various bands and those assuming the up-keep of privately furnished rooms, have most generously met our requirements.

Camp Kuwiyan purchased an Infant Resuscitation Outfit which already has proven its worth with new born. Other camps made financial donations as given in Treasurer's Report. To all these and the many who remembered us "Donation Week" and throughout the year we wish to express our appreciation.

Repairs: It was necessary to replace gas-ranges in the kitchen, and recondition the gas-oven. The Men's Ward, two-bed rooms and Delivery Room required painting. At Nurses Home, because of cracked condition of the walls, three rooms were replastered and on first and second floors, the ceiling of all rooms and corridors were panelled and painted. The wooden trimmings on the outside of the Home and Laundry were also painted.

While we regret that the approach to the Hospital has not been improved, we are pleased that the Hospital Aid Society, provided the planting of shrubs about the entrance to the Nurses Home, which will add much to the attractiveness of the grounds.

One recommendation for this year, would be an assistant in the business office, for with the many phone calls, and other demands of the office, to try to combine this with bookkeeping, is an injustice to anyone holding such a position.

I would acknowledge with gratitude the privilege of attending the Hospital Association meeting at Toronto. Aside from helpful suggestions gathered, these conventions are a source of encouragement to a Superintendent to "carry on."

Without the loyal support of our doctors, nurses, and employees, the accomplishments of the past year would have been impossible. To these and the President of Board and other officers, who have given much of their time for interest of the Hospital, I wish to express my hearty appreciation.

The year 1931 passed with about the usual number of cases of contagious diseases. One case of smallpox developed and it was learned that this man had been exposed to

a case in another state. It is interesting to note that he had never been vaccinated, and his brother, who had not been vaccinated, caught the disease from him. Both of these patients were adults.

An outbreak of diphtheria occurred in the fall and by the end of the year thirty-one cases appeared, with one death. With only one or two exceptions all of these cases were in children who attended the same school. In an attempt to wipe out the disease the Toxin-antitoxin treatment to prevent Diphtheria was offered to all children who wished it. It was given at cost and many who could not afford to pay received it free of charge. Approximately 2000 received the complete treatment consisting of three doses. It was given under the direction of the Board of Health, assisted by several nurses and prominent club women, and these women deserve the thanks of the entire community for their tireless help. A few cases have broken out since the treatments were given but practically all of them have been in children who did not take the Toxin-antitoxin. In three cases it happened that the child who got Diphtheria was one of a family of four or five children and that he was the only one who had not been inoculated. The others did not contract the disease.

The public health and tuberculosis work has been carried along very efficiently by Miss Leavitt and Miss Garland, and Miss Nelson has done excellent work with the school children. It is hoped that later in the year Clinics can be held for the undernourished and poorly developed school children.

The milk supply continues to be good, but it needs constant checking-up, as was shown by some surprise tests done late in December by our milk inspector, Forrest Smith, who also did the inspecting last summer most satisfactorily. It should be said in all fairness to the producers that practically all of them try constantly to produce clean

milk. The Board of Health still continues to recommend pasteurized milk as the safest milk, and it probably will be sold in Laconia before many months.

The usual number of complaints was received and as usual it was found that most of them are the result of a personal quarrel with a neighbor, and with the loser wanting to get even by complaining to someone higher up.

REPORT OF THE MILK INSPECTOR

A guarantee that all milk for sale in Laconia will be pure milk is what is desired, and the milk inspection for the year 1931 progressed toward that goal. Good clean milk of standard quality can be insured to the consumer if the producers will co-operate with the health officials, otherwise pasteurization of milk is the only answer. In general, the producers are anxious to have good milk in order to protect

their own market. Competition is keen here owing to the fact that many small producers have appeared in the past year.

Farm and dairy conditions in general are better here than in most localities. During the past year some trouble was encountered with milk below State standards as regards butter fat and bacteria, but these troubles were traced and remedied.

Several new regulations were issued by the State last summer. Among them was one requiring that mechanical bottle cappers be used by persons bottling milk, and this rule will be enforced by the local Board of Health beginning July 1, 1932. It is an excellent rule as it prevents the caps from being touched by hands that are not always clean.

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

Laconia, N. H., February 13, 1932.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We hereby submit the twenty-second annual report of the Board of Public Works, together with the detailed report and recommendations of the City Engineer and Superintendent of Streets and Sewers.

The routine maintenance work of the Department has been attended to during the past year, as far as possible with appropriations provided, and such special work as has been authorized, as will appear from the appended reports showing in detail all expenditures.

In past years it has been our custom to offer recommendations at this season of the year for specific additions to our municipal system of improved streets, sidewalks and sewers. This year economic conditions are such that many cities are finding it a wise policy to postpone for the time being, at least, any substantial construction projects which mean the immediate outlay of a large sum of money.

In selecting means by which taxes can be reduced, or at least kept within present limits, which is without question what our people generally desire to see accomplished, we would suggest that there is a sharp distinction between proposed expenditures for extensions and expenditures for maintenance: the first can wait and be postponed, but the latter can not.

The City of Laconia has a large amount of money invested in improved streets and sidewalks; the result of years of consistent planning and construction. Experience has shown that it is absolutely necessary to maintain the streets

and sidewalks, both to protect the original investment and to give the public the benefit of their constant use in good condition.

The amount necessary to provide for this maintenance is practically a fixed charge and, in our opinion, should not be reduced; to allow the street surfaces to disintegrate and the sidewalks become rough and broken is not economy and we earnestly urge that proper and adequate appropriation be made for maintenance as recommended.

Chapter 221, Laws of 1931 provides for the appropriation of \$7,5000.00 by the State for the year 1931 and the same amount for the year 1932, provided the City of Laconia raises like amounts, for the improvement of the road from the junction of the Daniel Webster highway, near The Weirs bridge, toward Route 11 near Gilford Railroad Station. The Town of Gilford built last year a considerable section of this road under the provisions of this law and it is expected they will complete the work this year to the Gilford-Laconia Town Line. Although it might be suggested that this is construction work and, as such, could be postponed, here is a proposition wherein the City is getting two dollars worth of work for one dollar; the State contribution being one to one, whereas if this Special Appropriation is allowed to lapse and the road constructed subsequently under the regular State Aid Law the City would be obliged to contribute two dollars for each one dollar furnished by the State. Under these conditions we believe efforts should be made to provide the funds to build the road this coming season. In our opinion, the City should not pass up the favorable terms of this Special Legislation but should proceed this year, furnishing some relief to the local unemployment situation and building a section of road which is heavily traveled and expensive to maintain in its present condition.

BRIDGES

The city's bridges are generally in good condition with the exception of the Weirs bridge on the Daniel Webster Highway which remains in the same condition as last reported.

Plans and studies are being made by the State Highway Department to determine the cost of a new bridge at this point.

DRAINS

No surface water drains were built with the exception of new cross drains on Lakeside Avenue at the Weirs and the inclosing of the brook at the junction of Stark Street and Union Avenue in a reinforced concrete pipe three feet in diameter.

Drains are needed on Franklin, Bell, Washington and School streets in Ward 6 and on Endicott Street at the Weirs.

GRAVELLING STREETS AND ROADS

Seven thousand dollars was appropriated for this purpose and was expended in making much needed repairs to the Meredith Center Road, the Parade Road, the White Oaks Road, the Marsh Hill and Cotton Hill Roads and many other streets and roads scattered over the city.

Much more work of this nature is needed and would be appreciated by the travelling public.

PAVEMENTS

No new pavement was laid during the year. Repairs and maintenance was attended to.

SANITARY SEWERS

The system was carefully maintained and is in good condition. No serious blockages occurred.

SIDEWALKS

3,152 sq. yds. of sidewalks were recovered and 176 sq. yds. of new sidewalk was built on Tower Street.

OILING STREETS

95,183 gallons of asphaltic road oil were applied to streets and outside roads. Oil application not only lays the dust but helps to preserve the road surfaces and gradually builds up a surface or crust on roads to which it is applied.

On such roads as the Meredith Center and the Parade a heavier oil or tar should be used to withstand the truck and auto traffic to which they are subjected. Such an application as is needed would cost about \$1,000.00 per mile of road.

PLUMBING

This department issued permits and tested 74 plumbing jobs for the year ending February 15, 1932.

GENERAL

All work provided for by appropriations was completed together with such work, in addition, as was authorized by the Council.

\$3,500.00 was allotted by the State of New Hampshire through the State Highway Department for unemployment relief. This sum was expended on state roads as directed by the department.

The expenditure for plowing and care of snow and ice was more than usual but the money used was a considerable relief to the unemployed.

CITY SOLICITOR'S REPORT

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

I am pleased to submit my report.

This year has been notably free from the making of City Ordinances. I have maintained throughout my three years of public service as your Solicitor that Ordinances should not be passed unless the need was urgent, and that once they have been passed they should be rigidly enforced. The City Reports every year since the revised ordinances of 1918 have been full of laws, many of them unnecessarily made, at times making it difficult to determine just what the rules of the City Government are in regard to many questions that arise for my determination. The City Ordinances should be revised and if I am elected to serve the people for the ensuing year this task shall receive my whole-hearted attention.

The Water Rate question was given very careful consideration by myself and also by Frank P. Tilton, Esq. employed as associate council in the matter, and after a careful study of the problem from all angles we submitted our report which you are familiar with.

There are now pending for trial or adjustment on the docket of the Superior Court, three cases, as follows: Rebecca Houle vs Laconia; Joseph Bolduc vs Laconia; and Laconia vs County of Belknap. The first two cases are appeals from the layout of highways and assessment of damages. I am convinced that they can be adjusted in the near future without the necessity of trial. The third case is an action for the recovery of approximately \$2400. from the County for money spent by the City for the support

of a poor family from the year 1922 to 1927, under a mistake of fact and law as to their settlement. This case, no doubt, will be heard at the March Term of Superior Court. The cases of Thompson vs Laconia and G. H. Tilton & Son vs. Laconia, which have been on the docket since the October Term, 1917, have been dismissed.

All legal matters have been carefully attended to and the legal questions which almost daily arise concerning the settlements of poor persons seeking aid, have received proper consideration and rulings.

I have attended Municipal Court regularly and have prosecuted all criminal cases properly coming within my jurisdiction.

REPORT OF PROBATION OFFICER

To the Hon. Harry E. Trapp, Justice of the Municipal Court :

As my first year of service as Probation Officer for the City of Laconia draws to a close I desire to render a brief report as to what is being done in this department. Of course in such a work as this, covering as it does a wide field in nearly every circumstance and condition of life, it is difficult to point out definite accomplishments in such a brief space of time as one year. Nevertheless, I do feel that certain visible steps have been made in the fulfillment of our objects, and rather than to dwell too much on statistics, which in this work, at the present time, are not indicative, I will spend most of my time on the kind and quality of the work which we are doing.

In the first place I might simply say that during the past year the Probation Officer has come intimately into contact with over 100 boys, and a few girls. A proportion of these cases were for minor misdemeanors and were disposed of by slight disciplinary measures, but others were of varying degrees of seriousness and required considerable work and time on the part of the Probation Officer as well as of the Court himself. In two cases the offenders were placed in the Industrial School at Manchester, but only after all attempts at correction had proved futile.

Enough for statistics. The policy of this department, and our main purpose is to attempt to change, influence, educate, or treat, if you will, the young individual so that he may live happily in his environment without making others unhappy. We have no desire to punish anyone. In so far as it is possible within a period of one year to accomplish this I feel that we have. If during the year we

can fulfill our purpose in just one case, if we can straighten out just one child, I feel that we have justified our work; and this past year we certainly have done that.

The department has not been content in all cases to wait until the juvenile has been brought into court before we commence our work, although our jurisdiction usually comes by way of an order of the court. But in several instances juveniles have been kept out of court and satisfactorily adjusted to conditions with no court order.

The Department has become a member of the National Probation Association, and is very closely associated with the State Welfare Association; and with Dr. Samuel W. Hartwell of the Worcester Child Guidance Clinic.

I wish to thank Mr. John S. Gilman, Supt. of Schools in Laconia for his very earnest and efficient help in dealing with these children. Also I wish to thank the various fraternal organizations in the City for the opportunity of explaining to them some aspects of Probation work; and the citizens of Laconia for their aid in understanding the children. Lastly I wish to thank Your Honor for his tireless work with me in helping these boys; and to say that I greatly admire the efficient way you have conducted the juvenile court in an attempt to understand each individual with whom you have come in contact, and to avoid any uniform procedure.

I would recommend that some time in the not too far distant that funds be set aside so that the Probation Officer may have the assistance of medical examination in cases were he deems it beneficial.

I hope, and fully expect that during the coming year the general public will better appreciate the existence and purpose of the Probation Department, and will continue to give it the cooperation which has been extended to it this past year that we may continue to make Laconia the desirable place it now is in which to live.

We trust our citizens and taxpayers will read their report as well as the report of the instructors at the Leavitt Park and the suggestions made by the Commission.

Every Wednesday was Dinner Day and a large number of children brought their lunches with them on this day.

The attendance was very large. During the morning sessions the number of children present varied between 125 and 150. In the afternoon the attendance increased to 175-225. These are conservative figures. Hot days would see 250-300 present during the swimming hour in the afternoon.

A vote of thanks should be given to Mr. Albert Dutrizac for the use of his rowboat during the summer.

The intra-park activities consisted of baseball games, volley ball, touch football, teniquoit, horseshoes, checkers, tennis track and field events, sewing and craft work.

Contests were held with Leavitt Park and the South End playground in baseball and volley ball.

Baseball, tennis, volley ball swimming and teniquoit were the most popular sports enjoyed by the children.

The children were very enthusiastic about learning individual skills of the various games and many of them showed a very marked improvement as the summer progressed.

The Leavitt Playground completed one of its most successful seasons the past summer under the leadership of Mr. Peterson and Miss Gertrude Sullivan, Girls Athletic Instructor at Laconia High School.

Because of business conditions and lack of work for older children, the playground had the largest attendance in its history.

No outstanding improvements were made, or equipment bought, but all pieces were repainted, repaired and tested before the season opened. The tennis courts were resurfaced.

The usual mid-summer carnival was well advertised and supported and the Park Commission are again indebted and appreciative of the work of the loyal members of this community in their continued efforts in the behalf of the children of Lakeport.

This winter the usual skating rink has been in operation whenever weather permitted and in addition we have built a hockey rink one hundred sixty feet by sixty with a permanent two foot wall around it.

This has left the big rink available at all times to the smaller children and has provided great enjoyment to all concerned.

The South End Playground under the leadership of Miss Esma Ford had a most successful season, with a larger attendance than any previous season.

Once more the Commission desire to call your attention to the need of a suitable building on this playground as well as suitable toilet facilities at Opechee Park.

It was not deemed advisable to repair the Grand Stand this year but this will have to be attended to in the near future.

The Commission and the Instructors wish to extend their thanks to the Mayor and Council for their appropriation and to the public for their hearty cooperation.

Your Commission suggest the usual appropriation be made for Playground purposes.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

February 24, 1932

To the Honorable Charles E. Carroll, Mayor, and the City Council, Laconia, N. H.:

Gentlemen:—

Pursuant of my duties as City Auditor, I have audited the financial accounts of the City of Laconia for the fiscal year ended February 15, 1932.

I present herewith the following statements showing the financial condition of the City as at February 15, 1932, the appropriation accounts and the Excess and Deficiency, credits and debits during the year:

Exhibit I—Appropriation Accounts year ending February 15, 1932.

Exhibit II—Excess and Deficiency Account.

Exhibit III—Balance Sheet as at February 15, 1932.

Exhibit IV—Serial Debt as at Feb. 15, 1932.

The following items appearing in the balance sheet are commented upon as follows:

ASSETS

<i>Cash</i>	\$14,076.32
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The cash balance was verified by the various bank statements and compared with the City Clerk's ledger.

<i>Accounts Receivable—Taxes</i>	\$31,078.11
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The Collector's records of unpaid taxes were examined and lists were drawn therefrom and compared with the controlling account in the City Clerk's ledger. The commitment of taxes for 1931 and additional taxes for 1931 and prior years were examined. All abatements of taxes

were supported by properly approved vouchers from the Assessors.

Property Sold City For Taxes \$3,671.48

The amount was in agreement with the controlling accounts in the City Clerk's ledger.

A substantial amount of unpaid taxes for prior years were collected during the year.

It was noted that all taxes are collected for prior years up to 1929.

Balance Deficits \$4,670.49

This deficit was largely due to the over drafts of Highways and Bridges of \$6,380.22, Police of \$3,452.06 and School of \$1,391.07 departments also abatements of taxes of \$9,816.47.

LIABILITIES

Motor Vehicle Fees—1932 \$1,332.40

This was found to be in agreement with the City Treasurer. The total amount collected for the year also agreed with the records of the City Treasurer.

Leavitt Fund Receipts \$2,077.47

The disbursements were fully vouched for. It showed an increase of \$524.38 over the balance at Feb. 15, 1931.

Miscellaneous Liabilities \$671.37

This amount consists of various items due for damage claims.

Unexpended Appropriations \$4,202.08

Appropriations made during the year under review were verified with the records of the City Council. All payments made during the year were properly approved on the Treasury Warrants.

Approval for all transfers was voted for by the Mayor and City Council.

School Department

The records of this department were compared with the City Clerk's ledger.

Excess of Current Liabilities over Current Assets \$4,670.49

This was due chiefly to over drafts and abatements as stated under balance deficits.

Exhibit II of this report shows the credits that accrued and the debits arising from the account for the year under consideration.

Serial Debt

The Serial Debt outstanding at Feb. 15, 1932 is detailed in Exhibit IV, showing a net decrease of \$46,250. The Serial payments and Bonds were examined covering the debt matured during the year.
