THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Piermont in the (L. S.) County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Piermont Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges.
 - 4. To raise and appropriate money for Town Road Aid.
 - 5. To raise and appropriate money for Care of Cemeteries.
- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to have three street lights added.
- 7. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Street Lights.
- 8. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.
- 9. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Fire Department.
- 10. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.
- 11. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committees for same.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 13. To raise and appropriate to the White Mountain Region Association, for its program of advertising, etc. as a part of

the Cooperative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to 10¢ per \$1000 of the assessed valuation of the town for 1949.

- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's Deeds or otherwise.
- 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase an adding machine for use of all Town Officers and raise money for same.
- 18. To raise and appropriate money for Pine Blister Rust Control, with State Aid. The State asks for \$400.00.
- · 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to remodel the community building for better lighting in the library and more school room.
- 20. To see if the Town wishes to purchase New Road, Equipment and dispose of the present equipment, if so, raise and appropriate money for same.
- 21. To see if the Town wishes to remodel the kitchen and dining room of the Town Hall and to raise and appropriate money for same.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

During the past year the library has been greatly improved. All the books have been looked over by Mr. Ralph D. Riley, a State librarian, and many have been weeded out. Mr. Riley spent five days here and did a thorough job. We are grateful to him for his interest. This work was paid for by the state.

In November, the library was redecorated, extra shelves were added and the library desk and book stacks were re-arranged to give more room for the children's section.

In spite of the torn up roads, the circulation of books increased by 487 over that of last year; the Church reading group, under the leadership of Mrs. F. R. Dixon, is larger; pupils from the first primary grade are now permitted to take out books and some books are circulated among the kindergarten and primary groups in Sunday school.

Working together, the teachers and librarian encourage the school children to read the books selected for required reading.

Angela DeCosta was awarded the library prize this year, as she stood highest in literature in the comprehensive tests given by Supt. Bennett.

On August 5th, the librarian, Mrs. Harry R. Deal handed in her resignation at a meeting of the Library Trustees, but was asked to take a vacation of a year, instead, to reconsider, with Mrs. Burgess Metcalf acting as librarian. This plan was adopted with Mrs. Deal filling Mrs. Metcalf's place as substitute librarian.

Our friends have been good to us, as usual, and for their gifts of books and magazines we thank them.



The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the school district in the town of Piermont qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby noified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March, 1953, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payments of statutory obligation of the district; the school board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of a School Lunch Program for the ensuing year.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The 1952-1953 school year started at the Piermont Village School on September 3rd. There were enrolled 76 elementary pupils. Also registered were 31 secondary pupils; 9 at Haverhill Academy and 22 at Bradford Academy, Bradford, Vermont.

The system was fortunate in having no change in its staff. Any good system is strengthened by little or no change in its personnel.

The School Board continued its excellent method of continuous upkeep of the physical plant. The main building, as well as the primary room, was painted, work tables hinged to walls, new curtains hung for visual education films, and a more adequate hot water heater purchased. The latter improvement also made possible the transfer of the smaller heater to the primary room which makes a much more sanitary situation for the little folk.

The school census shows an increase in enrollment again for the second consecutive year. Seven eighth graders will leave in June, while approximately 16 will enter first grade in September. This will make an estimated number of 33 in the primary room, 25 in the intermediate room, and 23 in the upper grade room. This over-crowded condition will exist for only a year, however, as the next five years will have an average of only eight entering pupils each year, as indicated by census figures.

It is only by the concerted efforts of school personnel, parents, and citizens that we enjoy, and point with pride, to the well-organized, economically operated, and efficiently taught public schools. Expressing my appreciation for the above cooperation is an annual pleasure.

W. E. Givens, Executive Secretary of the N. E. A., has stated that "the educational programs of our schools have developed in response to the needs of the individuals and the communities they serve."

Our early schools were largely influenced by a concept that education was MEMORIZATION. A person may be well stuffed with information and still be very poorly educated. Education for tomorrow includes thinking as well as knowing.

The vision tests were completed in all grades. Whenever symptoms of defects were found, written notice was sent home to the parent or guardian.

The 1st grade children were given the audiometric hearing test.

One of the recommendations of the Director of School Health Services was Physical Examinations for the 1st, 4th, and 8th grades. In this way, each pupil would receive three complete physical check-ups during his grade school years.

I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Bennett, to the teachers, and to the parents for the kind cooperation which I have received in carrying out the School Health Program.
