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WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stewartstown, in the County of Coos in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town of Stewartstown on Tuesday, the 4th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for support of libraries.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for care of cemeteries.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for street lighting.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the following departments:
 - (a) Police Department
 - (b) Fire Department
 - (c) Sewer Department
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for winter roads.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for summer roads.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to that required by law for the town maintenance.
10. To see if the town will vote to raise one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Patriotic purposes.
11. To see if the town will vote to raise one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Recreation.

12. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget made up by the Selectmen and to raise money for the same. If not, to see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year as follows:

- (a) Town Officers' Salaries
- (b) Town Officers' Expenses
- (c) Election & Registration
- (d) Town Hall, Office and other buildings
- (e) Damage and Legal Expenses
- (f) Health Department
- (g) Town Dump Expenses
- (h) Vital Statistics
- (i) General Expense of Highway Department
- (j) Civil Defense
- (k) Interest on Temporary Loans

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State & Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

- (a) Police Department —\$ 2,000.00
- (b) Fire Department 1,700.00
- (c) Town Dump 2,000.00
- (d) Cemeteries 400.00

14. To see if the town will vote to re-classify the road known as the Delisle Road from a summer residence road to a year round residence road; and that this portion of the road be maintained year round so as to accommodate Mr. & Mrs. Alfred E. Delisle, both retired and allow them to make Stewartstown their permanent residence. (By Petition) (Non Ballot).

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, the necessary amount to affect suitable repairs to our existing Town Office and that the Selectmen be authorized to hire those persons capable of making the repairs.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000.00) for the

purpose of investigating the matter of town refuse disposal such investigation may include joining with neighboring towns in the making of such an investigation.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000.00) as the town's share of the cost for final sewerage disposal plan design in the cooperative effort with Canaan, Vermont such appropriation being made contingent upon the New Hampshire and Vermont legislatures passing proper enabling and authorization statute so as to properly legalize the cooperative effort aforesaid.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE, INC.

REPORT OF SERVICE TO THE
TOWN OF STEWARTSTOWN - 1974

Over the past four years, Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc. has provided a wide range of services to the people of our valley towns. Overall community response to the agency has increased and we have an average of 16 new admissions each month. This year, counseling and treatment programs were of benefit to 266 individuals and their families in the area we serve, including fifteen from Stewartstown.

Mental health staff members work with school personnel in developing flexible programs for assisting students with problems. Working jointly with parents, teachers and other helping people, such as the school nurses, students are offered counseling as well as other psychological services. We have recently hired the area's first full-time psychologist and will be better able to handle the schools' requests for testing and evaluation.

Again this year, admissions of area residents to New Hampshire Hospital have been minimal since we have been able to treat most potential inpatients at the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital or in their own homes.

Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service is near the people it is meant to serve. Our office is open 9 to 5, with evening appointments available if that is the only time a client can be seen. Staff is available through the hospital switchboard for psychiatric emergencies. Since the agency is locally based, people can get help quickly, with the result that very few residents need leave the area for assistance.

Stewartstown's contribution to Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service is important to our continued service. Contributions help in obtaining matching funds from State and other sources, and it helps us provide staff for help when it is needed. Costs are kept low as possible without impairing the quality of care. Per capita costs for our area are far below those of other rural mental health programs.

Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service meets all State and professional standards for such programs, and is a full member of the New Hampshire Association of Community

Mental Health Agencies.

**CONNECTICUT VALLEY EFFORT
TO SERVE THE CONFINED EFFECTIVELY
CONVALESCE**

**Report of Services Rendered
in the Town of Stewartstown**

CONVALESCE is one of the forty New Hampshire community health agencies whose purpose it is to provide health services to people in their homes, and to help both sick and well people to attain and maintain health.

One of the advantages of a locally controlled health agency is that its services can be developed in response to local needs. Our Board of Trustees is made up of your friends and neighbors, and they are willing to listen to and act upon your suggestions and comments.

Last year our home visiting program served about 25 new patients monthly. A total of 135 home visits, providing nursing, physical therapy, personal care, homemaking, and health and welfare information, were done in the town of Stewartstown.

Community-wide services included expectant parent's classes which touched the lives of about forty families. These sessions are held in the fall and in the spring, and are open to anyone who is interested.

This spring, immunization clinics will be held for all pre-school children from the age of two months up. We hope to eventually hold these clinics on a monthly basis, and to expand the services offered within this program to include various health screening tests and informational services.

Family planning services are also being planned for, to be available in the spring.

Community services are generally free. Home visiting services are often covered by Medicare, Medicaid, or special state and federal grants, and sometimes by private insurance. Those not covered by these are charged on a sliding fee basis geared to the financial capabilities of each patient. These free or partial fee services result in our dependence on the towns we serve for financial aid. Contributions this year are especially important, as they will help us obtain matching funds to continue and expand homemaker/home health aide services, as well as our maternal and child health services (immunizations program, expectant parent's classes and family planning).

AMBULANCE DISTRICT A-1 REPORT TO THE TOWNS

The Ambulance District A-1 continues to cover 1200 square miles of northern New Hampshire and Vermont with volunteer ambulance corps stationed in North Stratford, New Hampshire; Colebrook, New Hampshire and Pittsburg, New Hampshire.

All ambulance attendants take call on a volunteer basis and are compensated only for time spent on ambulance sorties. Many of the volunteers donate their earnings to their respective ambulance corps for improvement in both training and equipment. All ambulance drivers are trained either with advanced Red Cross training or as Emergency Medical Technicians at their own time and expense.

An ambulance anywhere in the area can be dispatched through a new 24 hour per day central dispatching service in Colebrook, New Hampshire, telephone 237-4971. The ambulance is dispatched for emergency calls approximately two out of every three days with an average response from the time of the initial call until the ambulance is on the road of less than six minutes in 80% of the calls. This is unsurpassed by any ambulance district in the state. The average length of ambulance sortie one way is 9.6 miles for local calls and 84.6 miles for transfers to hospitals outside the district. Approximately one out of every six families in the area will require use of the ambulance within the next year. Nearly 50% of the families in the area will have a family member involved in a serious automobile accident within the next five years.

This year the ambulance district was proud to have Fred Harrigan voted as the first state wide Emergency Medical Technician of the month by the Department of Emergency Medical Services in Concord, New Hampshire. The first Advanced Emergency Medical Technician course to be given in either New Hampshire or Vermont was conducted in Colebrook in the fall of 1974.

With the help of the \$.92 per person appropriated in 1974, the ambulance district was able to have a balanced budget and retire its debt.

In the next year we hope to station another ambulance within the district as well as to improve communications facilities to prevent "dead spots" within the district. This can be done if approximately \$1.00 per person is raised for matching with Federal and State Funds.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The Stewartstown School District is to be commended for the renovations made the past year at both the Hollow and West Side Schools. Two major projects completed at the Hollow School were the hot topping of a substantial portion of the driveway and playground area and the installation of insulation materials resulting in a substantial savings in fuel costs. The 7th and 8th grade room at the West Side School was renovated with new windows being installed and the ceiling lowered also resulting in the saving of heat. Carpeting was installed in the library room and the boy's lavatory was renovated. It is planned that the 3rd and 4th grade room will be renovated during the 1975-76 school year thereby completing the installation of new windows and ceilings for the classrooms.

Although pupil enrollment projections show a decline in school enrollment in the years ahead, the current tuition enrollment of Stewartstown pupils in the surrounding high schools will remain large for the next few years. This will result in a larger tuition payment obligation due to the increase in pupils but this too is expected to drop within 3 or 4 years.

Presently, the school board, staff and administration are engaged in developing a local accountability program. The program will become effective during the 1975-76 school year. Under this program, voters will be informed annually of the degree to which the district has achieved its stated educational goals and objectives for the preceeding year. Also involved will be a state testing program which will help assess educational programs in local school districts.

A special thanks is extended to Mr. Wayne Ladd, Mr. Keith Haynes, and Mr. Ray Bryant for the volunteer work they have done for the Stewartstown School District at the West Side School. A result of the giving of their time has been a number of building improvements which have added greatly to the appearance of the school.

GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

Last fall, I administered Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests to eighth graders in the public schools of Supervisory Union #7. Early in January I administered the Differential Aptitude Test Battery to the same students. In May, I talked with each eighth grader concerning the results of his tests and the importance of the results to him. On the basis of these tests and the course offerings available at Colebrook Academy and Pittsburg High School, a course of study was developed for each student for Freshman year. A letter indicating the courses chosen was sent to parents for their review and signature. Where there were questions raised, I met with the parents concerning them. Also in May, arrangements were made for Stewartstown eighth graders to visit Colebrook Academy and Pittsburg High School - attending classes and touring the facilities. During the year, I met with Stewartstown eighth graders as regularly as possible and worked with them on matters of attitudes, values and career development.

In November, the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery was given to all Freshmen. The results of these tests were discussed with each Freshman in January and then used again in April when I was talking with them concerning their courses for the 1974-75 school year and their plans for the future.

During December, I discussed with each Sophomore his progress and plans. I met with each one again in April to construct a course of study for the 1974-75 school year.

In January, I talked with each Junior about his progress and plans. In the case of Juniors who had taken the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests, results were explained to them. Where applicable, individual Juniors were encouraged and advised to take the College Board Examinations and the Achievement Tests. Each Junior met with me again in May to formulate a course of study for the 1974-75 school year.

In April, a statewide Career Interest Inventory was administered to all upperclassmen.

During April and May, Stanford Achievement Tests were given for the purpose of measuring the progress of each student in the second, fourth and sixth grades within the District. I personally corrected the tests for Pittsburg and Stewartstown during the Spring Vacation at considerable savings to these districts. The results of these tests were reviewed with the teachers concerned and are available to interested parents.

During the summer a considerable amount of work was done on individual student records and on planning for the 1974-75 school year.

Since the opening of school this fall on September 4, I have been working with each Senior on concrete procedures to implement his plans whether job, Service or further schooling. I have tried a new idea this fall of talking with each Freshman early in the year about his adjustment to high school and his progress. I have also for the first time oriented them to the use of the Guidance Room. All of this hopefully will prevent future problems.

Thus far this year, Murphy-Durrell Reading Readiness Tests have been administered to all first graders and the results discussed with the appropriate teachers. I have administered Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests to eighth graders and the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests to those Juniors planning to attend a school of some type after high school. Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests either are being, or have been, given to all second graders.

In addition to the above, much of my time is consumed with the following:

1. Transfer of records when a student moves to another school or a new student arrives to our school.
2. Meeting with college admission representatives, Armed Service Recruiters, representatives of Talent Search, Vermont Student Assistance Corporation, Citizen's Scholarship Association, ROTC, etc.
3. Providing information for teachers concerning their students.
4. Problems of individual students as they develop.
5. Helping students locate information concerning specific schools or occupations.

I have checked on virtually all of last year's Seniors and find that in Pittsburg, out of a class of 17, this is what they are doing:

Living at Home	- 2
Job	- 8½ (one is attending night school also)
School	- 2½ (same person as above, working and attending night school)
Married	.2
Armed Services	- 2

This indicates that about 12% are attending school. However, 4 were admitted to college which is 23% of the class.

The Colebrook Class of 1974 is presently performing as follows:

Job	- 26
Living at Home	- 5
School	- 13
Married	- 2
Armed Services	- 2

This indicates that about 27% went on to further education.

I am pleased to say that in talking with Seniors this year, there has been a distinct upsurge in the number expressing an intent of going on to school.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

The school health program has been set up this year with two nurses to perform the necessary functions and requirements of the state and to maintain and promote good health to all the pupils in our schools under Supervisory Union #7.

Each year the following services are performed:

Checking heights, weights and teeth; testing hearing and vision; physical examinations for those participating in athletics as well as grades 4, 8, and 11; TB skin tests as needed for students and annually for all personnel working in the union; immunizations as needed; urine tests for grades 4, 8, and 11; home visits; phone calls and letter contacts for follow through health care as deemed necessary; promotion of good mental health; first aid and emergency care; health teaching and counseling and continuous supervision of general health.

We have acquired school physicians this year — Dr. Gifford and Dr. Parsons who provide professional medical advice and care required to maintain health services for the pupils.

The matching Dental Fund Program sponsored by the state and local towns was utilized again this year providing care to needy students as far as the funding would extend.

A Cardiac film was provided to pupils grades 7 through 12 and the public for awareness and concern of heart disease.

The pre-school hearing and vision clinic will be sponsored in May by the N.H. Division of Public Health for early detection of defects.

The Sight Conservation Program presented by the State of N.H. is still being utilized by those needing to do so.

The Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center is available to our area by mobile unit for evaluation of students failing hearing tests.

Crippled Children's Services has provided orthopedic exams and clinic treatments.

Again this year, the N.H. Bureau of Dental Health has presented the dental prevention program to fourth graders, with daily brushing and flossing of teeth and weekly food coloring tablets used to detect plaque under supervision of their classroom teacher. The objectives of this program are to eliminate dental plaque and help the student develop daily habits necessary for effective oral hygiene and thereby reduce dental diseases.

North Country Education Services again provided speech therapy for all students in the union requiring help.

Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services are available as needed and we now have a **psychologist** in the area working directly in the schools.

A reminder to all parents of **children** entering first grade: The State Department of Education requires each youngster to meet the following requirements prior to school entry:

1. Physical examination
2. T.B. test within one year
3. Complete Diptheria, Pertussis and Tetanus Vaccine Series (5 in all)
4. Complete oral Polio Vaccine Series (5 in all)
5. Rubella Vaccine (german measles)
6. Rubeola Vaccine (measles)

All parents are urged to take advantage of the pre-school clinics available in their area to prepare their youngsters for meeting the above requirements for entering school.

Every year everyone involved in our schools strive to improve the health program for all. With everyone working together, I hope this will be achieved.
