## NH GUBERNATORIAL RACE CLOSE, MOST VOTERS HAVE NOT DEFINITELY DECIDED ON VOTE

DURHAM, NH – Executive Councilors Chris Sununu and Colin Van Ostern are statistically tied in the New Hampshire gubernatorial election. Only one-third of voters say they have definitely decided whom they will vote for.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,\* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred and seven (907) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between October 11 and October 17, 2016. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.3 percent. Included were seven hundred and seventy (770) likely 2016 general election voters (MSE = +/- 3.5%).

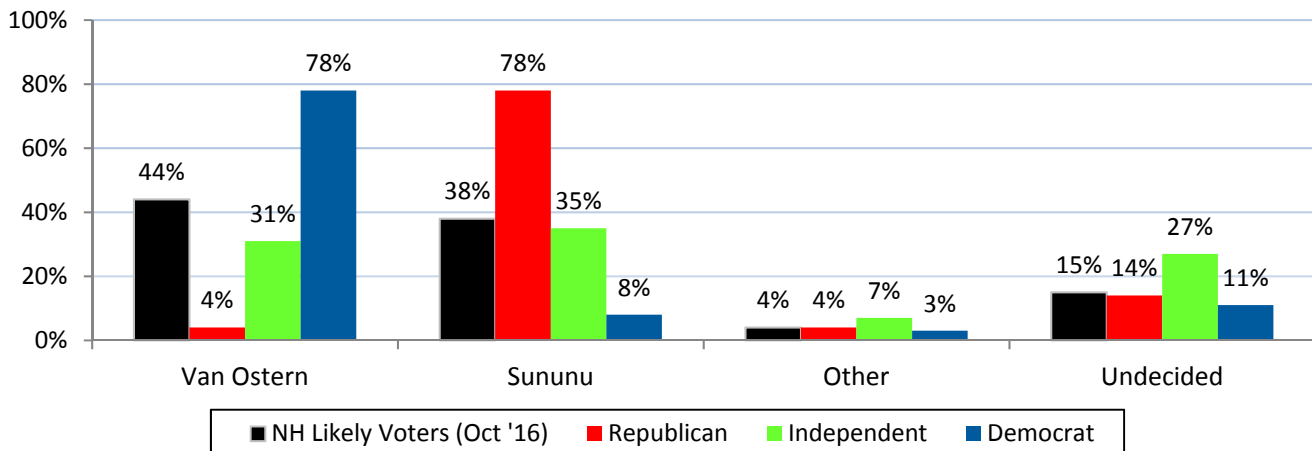
### NH Gubernatorial Election

With less than three weeks remaining until the election, only one-third (33%) of New Hampshire likely voters say they have definitely decided whom they will vote for in the gubernatorial election, 13% are leaning toward someone, and 54% are still trying to decide.

If the election was held today, 41% of New Hampshire likely voters would vote for Van Ostern, 35% would vote for Sununu, 4% would vote for someone else, and 21% are undecided.

When undecided voters are asked which way they are leaning, the percentages become 44% for Van Ostern, 38% for Sununu, 4% for someone else, and 15% remain undecided. Sununu and Van Ostern are both receiving the support of 78% of voters within their own party, while Sununu holds a slight edge among Independents (35%-31%).

Includes Undecided But Leaning Voters

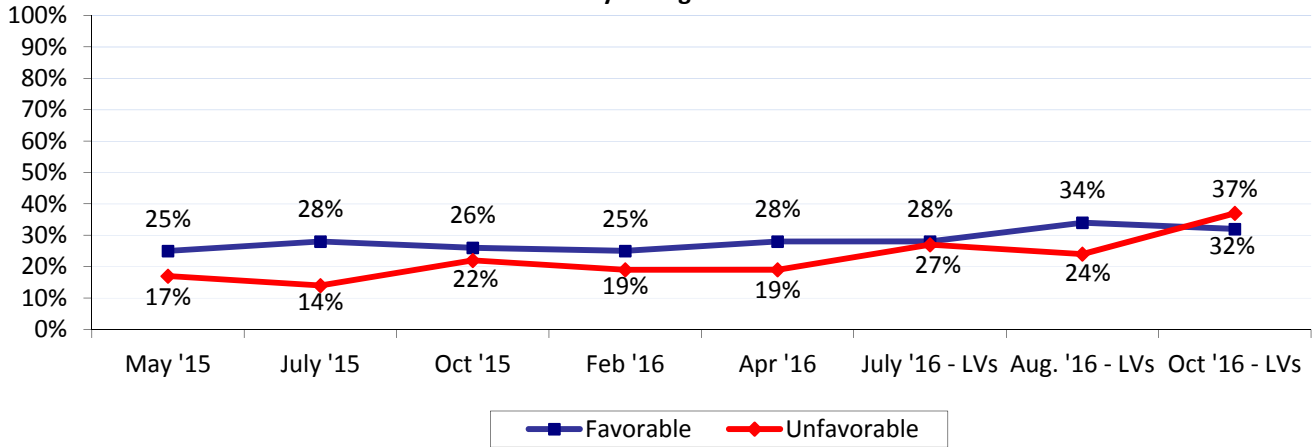

### Favorability Ratings – NH Gubernatorial Candidates

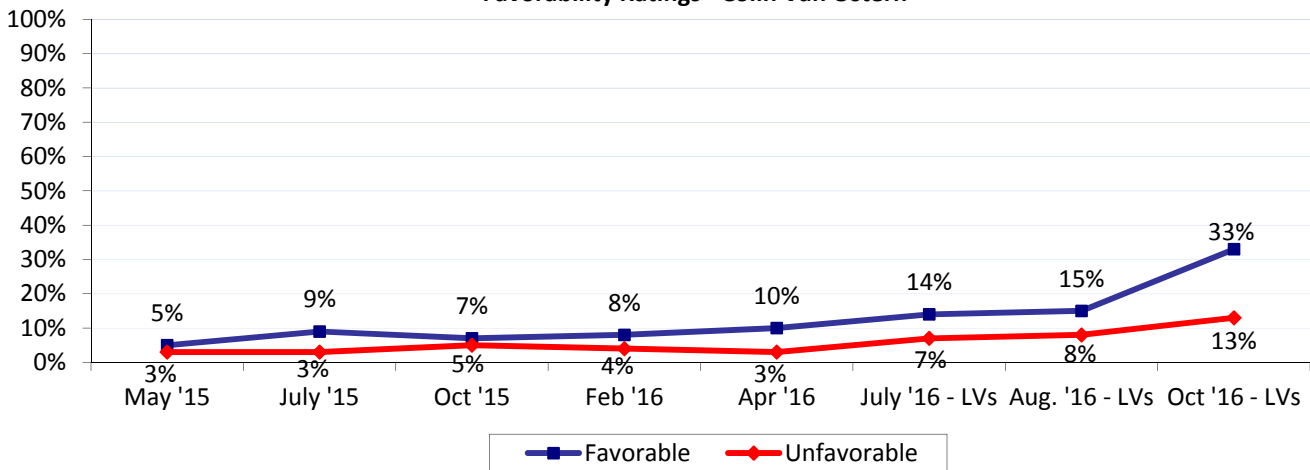
The race for Governor is still up for grabs largely because neither candidate is well-known to New Hampshire voters. Executive Councilor Chris Sununu is the best known candidate for Governor, but is not very popular in the state. Currently 32% of New Hampshire likely voters have a favorable opinion of Sununu, 37% have an unfavorable opinion, 7% are neutral, and 24% don't know enough about him to have an opinion. Sununu's net favorability (the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion) is -5%, down from +10% in August. Sununu is very popular among Republicans (+40%) and very unpopular among Democrats (-43%) while Independents are divided (0%).

Favorability Ratings - Chris Sununu

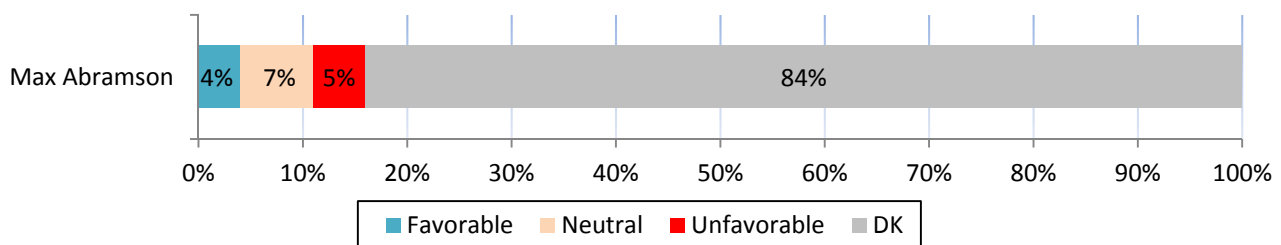


Executive Councilor Colin Van Ostern remains less known than Sununu but is more popular – currently 33% of New Hampshire likely voters have a favorable opinion of Van Ostern, 13% have an unfavorable opinion, 7% are neutral, and nearly half (47%) don't know enough about him to have an opinion. Van Ostern's net favorability is +20%, up from +7% in August. Van Ostern is very popular among Democrats (+50%), somewhat popular among Independents (+11%), and somewhat unpopular among Republicans (-13%).

Favorability Ratings - Colin Van Ostern

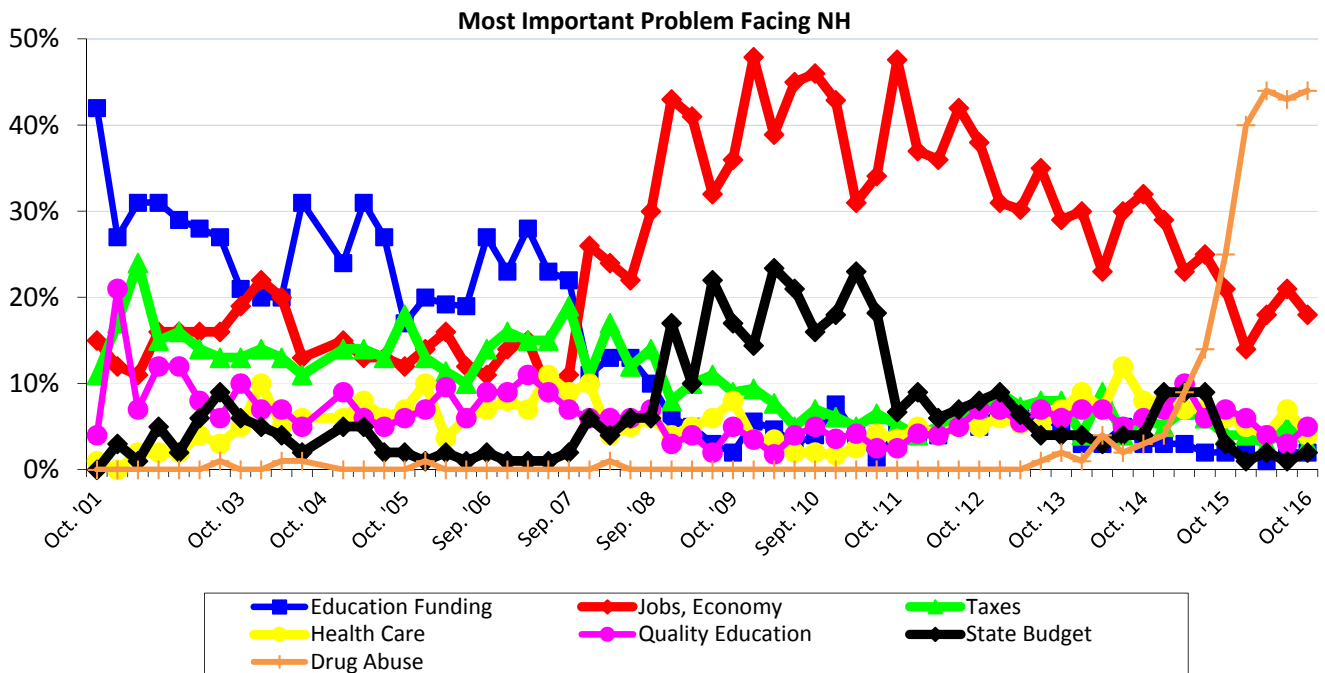


Only 4% of likely voters have a favorable opinion of State Representative and Libertarian candidate Max Abramson, 5% have an unfavorable opinion, 7% are neutral, and 84% don't know enough about them to say. Abramson's net favorability is -1%.



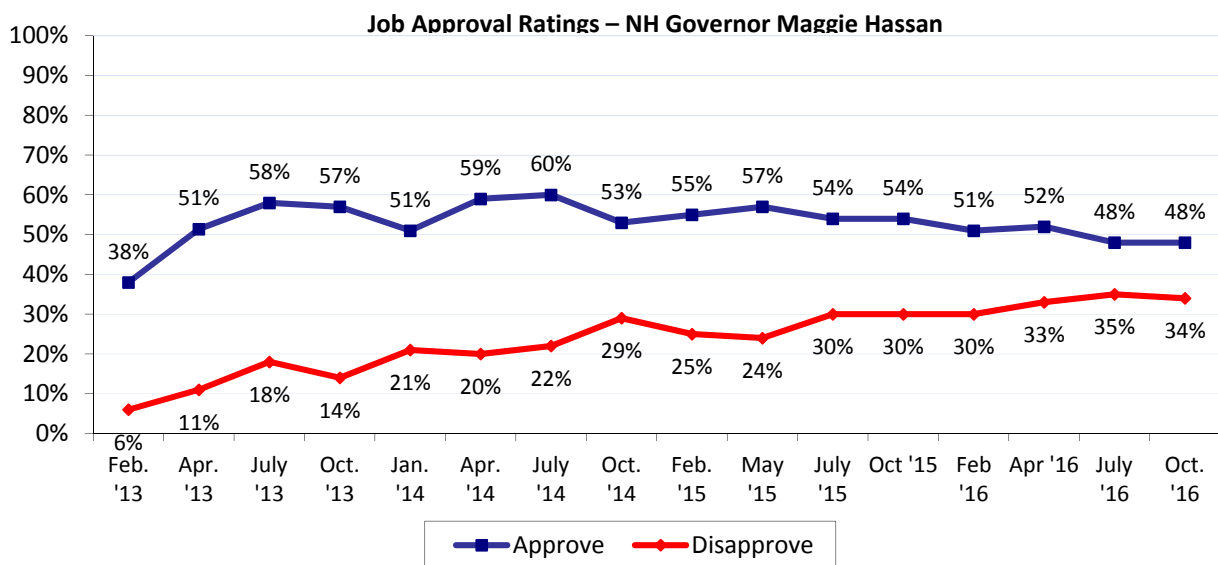
### Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

Granite Staters remain very concerned with the drug crisis facing the state -- currently, 44% of New Hampshire adults cite drug abuse as the most important problem facing the state, followed by jobs and the economy (18%), education (7%), health care (4%), taxes (3%), and the state budget (2%).



### Gubernatorial Approval

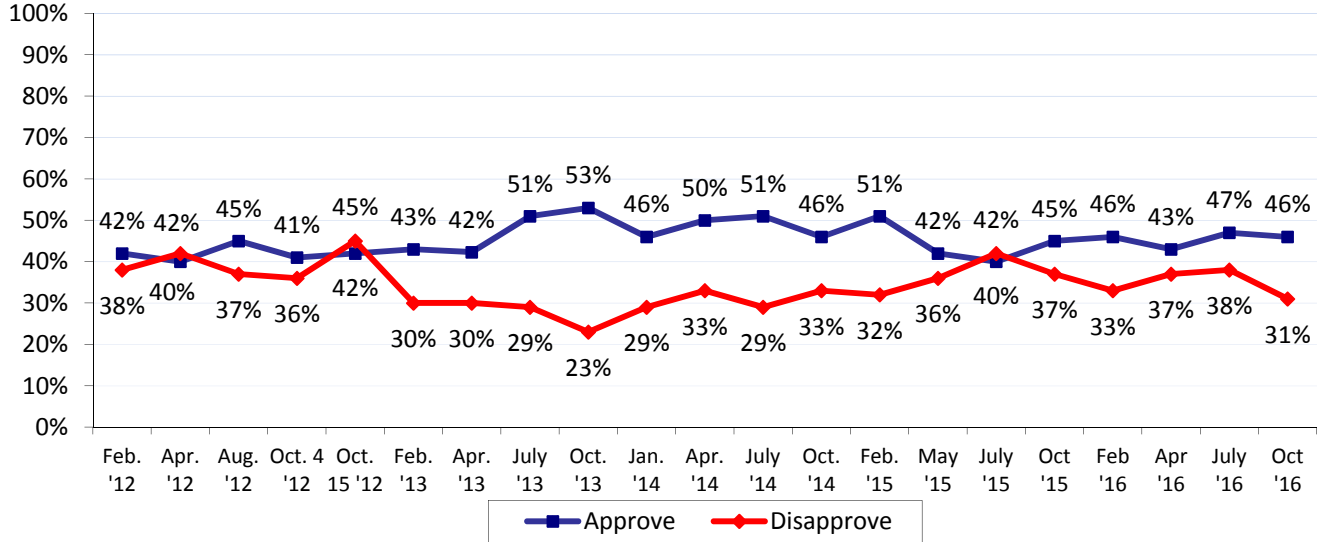
Outgoing Democratic Governor Maggie Hassan, who is running for U.S. Senate, remains relatively popular as she prepares to leave the corner office. In the latest Granite State Poll, 48% of New Hampshire adults say they approve of the job Hassan is doing as governor, 34% disapprove, and 16% are neutral or don't know enough to say. Democrats (76% approve, 13% disapprove) highly approve of Hassan's job performance, while Independents are divided (33% approve, 36% disapprove) and Republicans disapprove (22% approve, 58% disapprove).



### Approval of New Hampshire Legislature

New Hampshire residents are divided on how the state legislature is performing its job. Currently, 46% of New Hampshire adults approve of how the state legislature is doing its job, 31% disapprove, and 23% are neutral or don't know enough to say. Half of Democrats (51%) and Republicans (47%) approve of the state legislature, while only 32% of Independents approve.

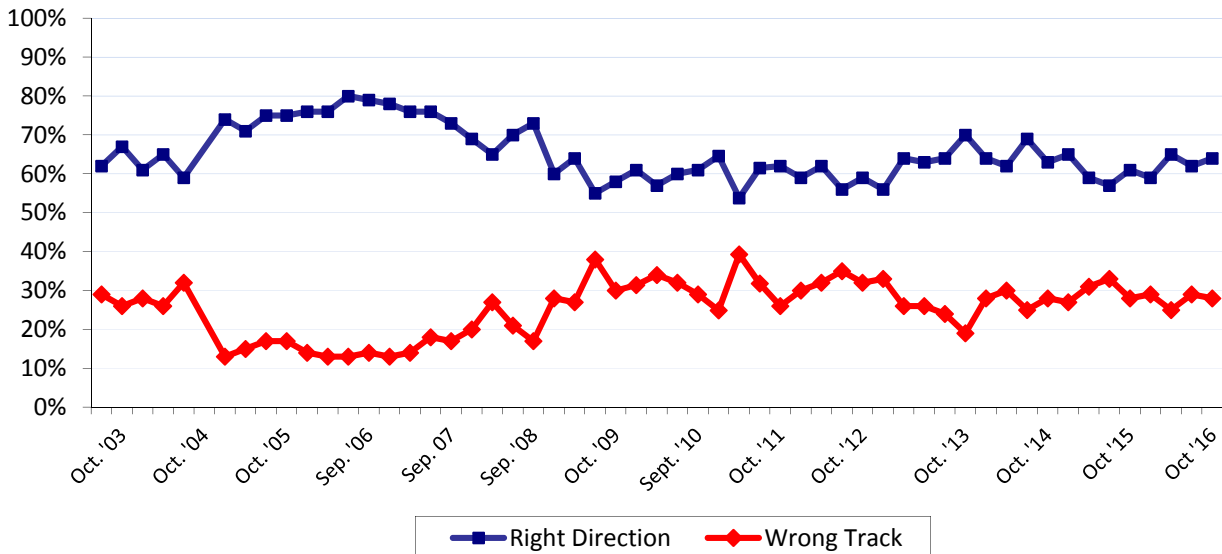
Approval Rating – NH Legislature



### Right Direction or Wrong Track?

New Hampshire residents believe the state, as a whole, is headed in the right direction. Currently, 64% of New Hampshire adults feel the state is heading in the right direction, 28% think the state is seriously off on the wrong track, and 8% are unsure. Majorities of Democrats (79%) and Independents (58%) and half of Republicans (50%) say the state is headed in the right direction.

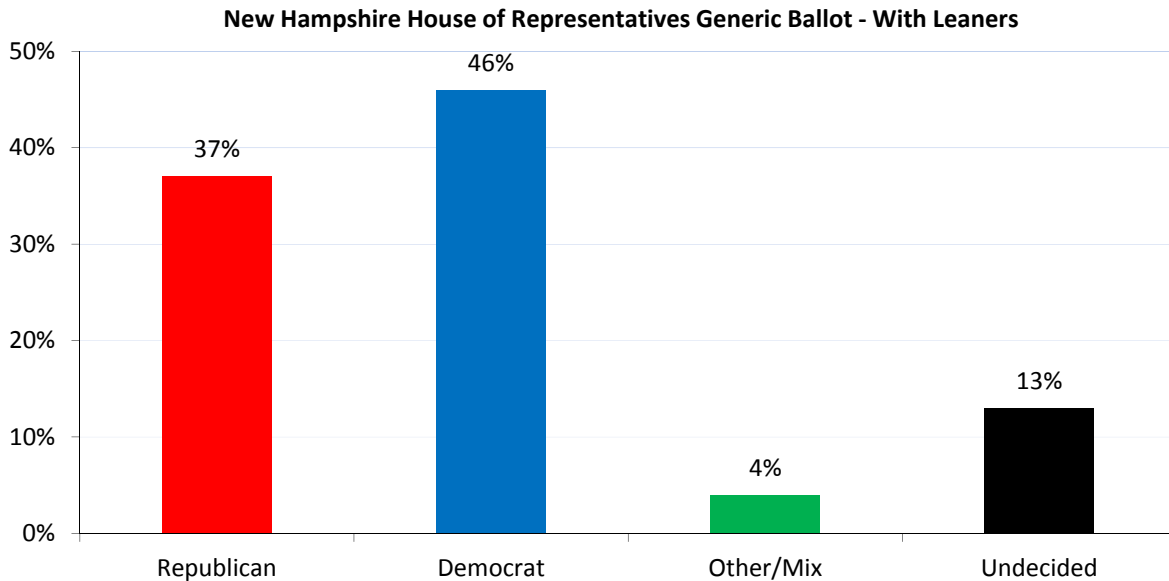
NH Heading in Right Direction or On Wrong Track?



### New Hampshire House of Representatives

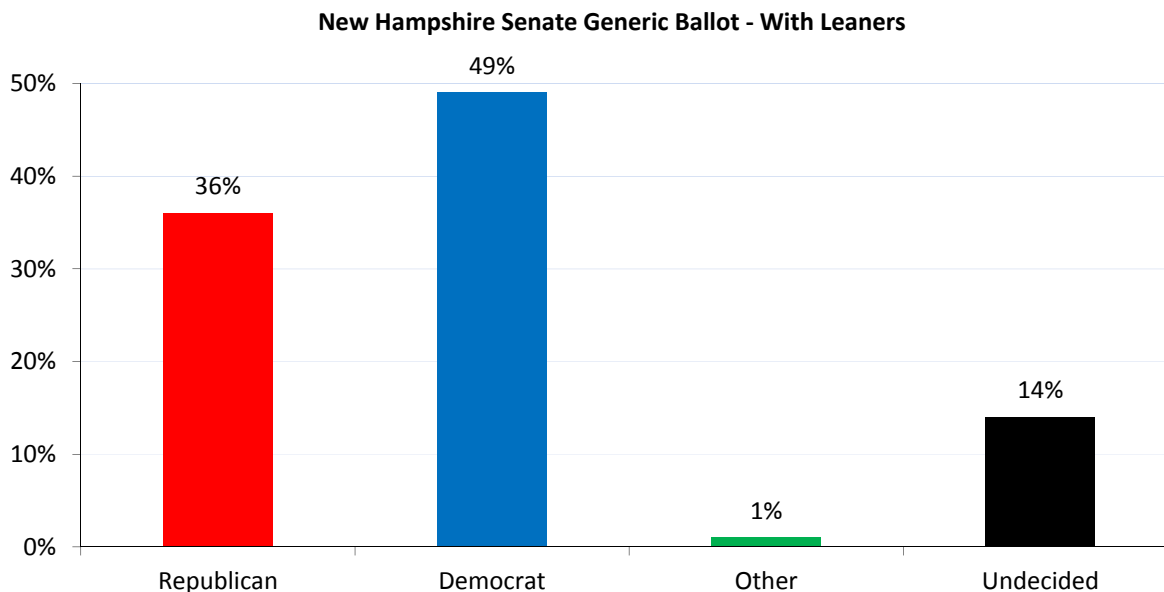
Likely 2016 New Hampshire voters were asked which party's candidate they planned on supporting in the upcoming election for state representatives. Voters are currently divided on which party to support, with 35% supporting Republican candidates, 43% supporting Democratic candidates, 4% supporting another party or a mix of Republicans and Democrats, and 17% undecided.

When undecided voters were asked which way they were leaning, the percentages become 46% for Democratic candidates, 37% for Republican candidates, 4% for another party or a mix of Republicans and Democrats, and 13% are still undecided.



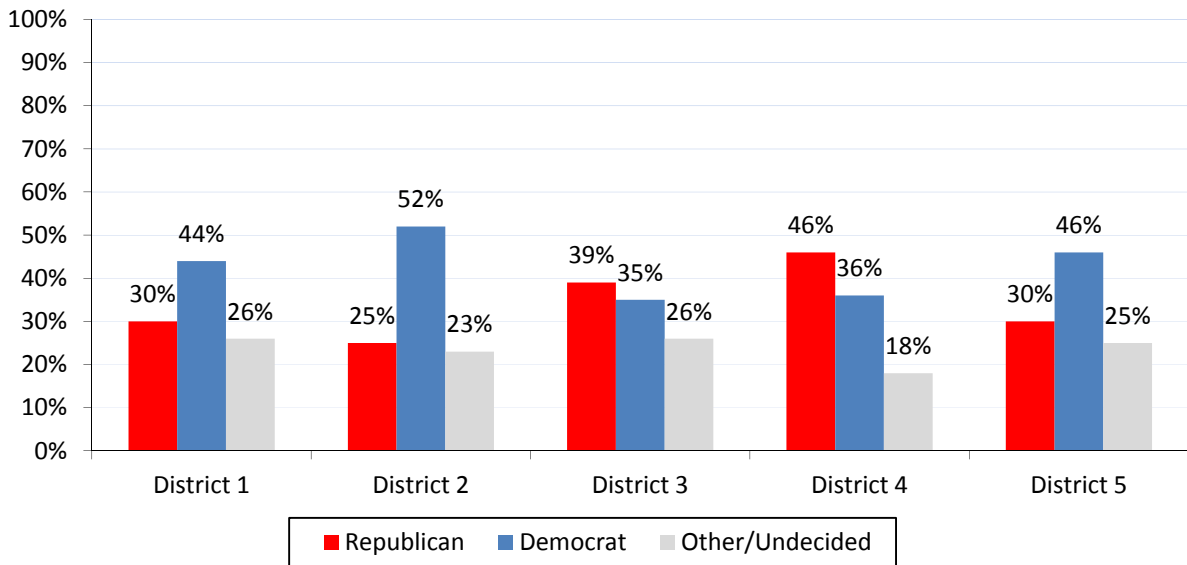
Likely 2016 New Hampshire voters are also evenly divided on which party to support for the State Senate, with 34% supporting Republican candidates, 47% supporting Democratic candidates, 1% supporting another party, and 17% undecided.

When undecided voters were asked which way they were leaning, the percentages become 49% for Democratic candidates, 36% for Republican candidates, 1% for another party, and 14% are still undecided.



Currently 43% of likely 2016 New Hampshire voters would support the Democratic candidate for Executive Council, 34% would support the Republican candidate, and 22% are undecided. Broken down by district, Democrats currently have the advantage in three districts, while Republicans have the advantage in two.

## Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center and funded by WMUR-TV, Manchester, NH. Nine hundred and seven (907) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between October 11 and October 17, 2016. If a household included more than one adult, the adult who had the most recent birthday was selected to be interviewed.

The margin of sampling error is +/- 3.3 percent for the entire sample. Included were seven hundred seventy (770) likely 2016 general election voters (MSE +/- 3.5%). These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.1%.

The random sample used in the WMUR Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
