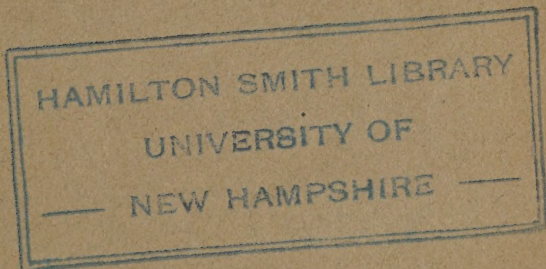

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Finance Committee recommends \$7875.00.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and ploughing snow for the ensuing year. \$6,000.00.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and building bridges. \$500.00.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day observance. \$10.00.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library. Total of \$300.00.
7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$800.00 for the support of the Tamworth Community Nurse. Recommended.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment and repairs of snow removal equipment. \$1,200.00.
10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for Tarvia. Recommended.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Tamworth Fire Precinct. \$500.00.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Wonalancet Fire Precinct. \$100.00.

14. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$725.80 for same. Recommended.

15. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for the Cleveland Hill road and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1974.00 for the same.

16. Is it expedient to revise the constitution?

17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to be expended at the discretion of the Selectmen for the promotion of winter business. Recommended.

18. To see if the town will vote to adopt Sections 79-90 inclusive, of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire, relative to the conduct of caucuses.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for white pine blister rust control, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for winter-time sanding of town highways.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to purchase land for a town rubbish dump.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the purpose of bringing the town records up to date.

23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the

Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the V. T. Hammer lot, at public sale to be held in the month of August.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

Substantial savings in the cost of plowing snow, owing in part to the light winter of 1936-37, in conjunction with reduced costs on several other items and the sum of \$1,000.00 raised last year for debt service, have enabled your officers to reduce the Town's deficit to a little over \$100.00. It is not thought necessary to raise a sum to meet this small deficit this year.

Sums of money raised under the Warrant, if in conformity with the budget prepared by this Committee cooperating with the Selectmen, will result in a tax rate of about \$3.00. An article appears in the Warrant to see if the Town will raise \$500.00 for winter-time sanding of highways. This sum does not appear in the budget, and is neither approved nor disapproved by this Committee. It should be understood that the cost of sanding highways cannot be met from the maintenance appropriation, and the Town Meeting must determine whether or not this additional expenditure is advisable.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I herewith submit my fourteenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The old saying, "Hitch your wagon to a star," has lately been changed to "Hitch your wagon to the next job in hand." Doing that job as well as you can is what brings competence, character and happiness. Schools are aiming to fashion character as well as intelligence, and earnest, untiring effort on the part of pupils is essential. Parents and teachers should cooperate to bring about the best results. Education today is looking at the side of service, asking how young people can become helpful in the community. The great world need at present is for a real, intelligent unselfishness among nations and individuals.

In the country at large, it is said that half of the parents of pupils now in high school had, themselves, no high school education. Thus parents are pushing their children up to greater accomplishment. Boys and girls should appreciate this and give their best efforts in school work.

Tamworth schools are housed in buildings generally well-equipped.

Certain minor repairs and improvements I would recommend. Chocorua School should be painted outside and in. Whittier should be painted inside. New flush toilets are badly needed at the Village Schools. More screens are needed for windows and doors. The playground at the Village should be enlarged.

High School

The high school has taken a forward step this year in introducing a course in Chemistry and providing laboratory equipment. This compares favorably with larger schools. Chemistry is a live, practical subject. Boys need it in vocational work and girls need it, especially as a qualification for training as nurses.

Playground and athletic activities furnish pleasure and good training for the boys and girls.

The orchestra has continued to be a very interesting and helpful extra curricula activity. It is a great addition to the school.

Prize speaking, debates and plays keep the English department active and practical.

Last June we graduated a class of ten fine young people. Kenneth Brett is making good in the University of New Hampshire. Margaret Welch is succeeding in the Nurses' Training School at St. Johnsbury, Vt. Louise Hidden is in Keene Normal School. Phyllis Greene is attending Concord Business College. Ethel Bennett is taking a post-graduate course at Tamworth High School. It is to be hoped that all will eventually be able to go on to advanced education.

Health Work

The health work is under the care of Dr. Edwin Remick and the efficient nurse, Ruth A. Allen, R. N. The children are being carefully examined and defects gradually remedied.

Attendance

For the year ending June 30, 1936, we had an average attendance of 160.6, an average membership of 165.5 and a percent of attendance of 97. According to register records, schools having an attendance of 95% or over are as follows:
