## TOWN WARRANT

---

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the reports of Selectmen and other town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges, and for removal of snow and sanding roads.
5. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid Construction of Class V Roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose a sum in accordance with the action of the present legislature.
6. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.
7. To raise and appropriate money for support of fire department.
8. To raise and appropriate money for town library purposes.
9. To raise and appropriate money for Town Poor, Old Age Assistance and Soldiers' Aid.
10. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.
11. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries.
12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control. (By request).

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate to the White Mountains Region Association, for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town together with the other towns in the region, a sum not exceeding 10c per \$1000.00 of the assessed valuation of the town for 1944. (By request).

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate as a bonus for Dr. F. J. Kasheta.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital of Plymouth, N. H. (By request).

16. To see if the town will vote to transfer from unencumbered surplus the sum of \$1000.00 raised at the 1944 town meeting to a capital reserve fund for the purpose of construction and maintenance of town roads, or for the purpose of highway equipment, or for such other purpose as may be determined by the voters.

17. To see if the town will grant a discount on property taxes of 1945, and determine date and percentage of same.

18. To authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

19. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be required by law to construct, with State Aid a bridge over Baker River on the East Warren Road where the so-called Batchelder Bridge now stands, and pass any vote relating thereto.

20. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dunbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## HELP THE WAR EFFORT BY PREVENTING FOREST FIRES

---

NO ONE is exempt from helping to win the war! EVERYONE, regardless of age, has his or her place in the overall effort! Some men, because of age are called upon to bear arms; man ships, submarines and planes; minister to the injured and maintain morale. Women, in large numbers, are serving with the armed forces as nurses and members of the several women's military organizations — WACS, WAVES, SPARS, etc. War industry has taken millions of men and women whose accomplishments have been the marvel of the world. Civilians at home are doubling up on their activities because of the shortage in manpower, purchasing bonds, assisting in numerous patriotic undertakings, maintaining home morale and, on the whole, carrying on with a cheerfulness and determination that is typically American. Yet, despite the time, thought and effort we are all putting into the war effort in general, we are, true to our peculiar American characteristics, heedless and careless about many important things and one of these is FIRE as it relates to our forests.

Much harm can be done the war effort because of our carelessness with fire. Lumber has gone to war in a BIG WAY! Our New Hampshire forests are contributing their full share insofar as manpower permits. Fire, the greatest enemy of the forests, destroys, during each of these critical years, hundreds of acres of valuable trees that could contribute to the war effort. Forest fires disrupt the war's business by taking men from their important work in industry and on the farm and reduces production of necessary war materials and food. Forest fires require the spending of much money and material that might otherwise be diverted into vital war channels. Forest fires are, for the most part, unnecessary and avoidable for ninety-eight percent of such fires are, annually, the result of human carelessness—yours and mine. This can and should be remedied—NOW! You can HELP THE WAR EFFORT by PREVENTING FOREST FIRES! The rules of the game are simple.

1. **Always** be careful with fire in or near woodlands.
2. Comply with regulations governing the use of starting of fires there.

Remember

a. You need written permission from your local forest fire warden for debris burning fires when the ground is not covered with snow.

b. Be sure your match, cigar, cigarette and pipe ashes are OUT before dropping them.

3. Be fire-minded NOW as never before; be careful; caution others to be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden, your town, your nation and yourself!

## ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.

2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.

3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.

4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.

5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
